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Hutcherson Signs with Super Bowl Winning Buccaneers

May 1 — After months of anticipation and years of hard work, former Huntingdon High School football standout and University of South Carolina redshirt-senior lineman, Sadarious Hutcherson learned his fate with the NFL. He will begin his professional career with the reigning Super Bowl Champion Tampa Bay Buccaneers.

UNKNOWN SUBSTANCE LOCATED ON EUCLID

The 320-pound guard entered into the NFL Draft with a good showing at the NFL Combine. Before Thursday's draft festivities in Cleveland, Ohio, it was predicted Hutcherson could be drafted as high as the third-round but more likely in the sixth or seventh round. By Saturday evening, much to the chagrin of his friends, family and supporters, Hutcherson went undrafted.

Budget Amendments on County's Agenda

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

We opened August 6, 1970, with 135 chairs and added a dining room in 1972 for a total of 300 seats," she said.

Forestwood not only catered to the dining needs of area families, it also proved a meeting place for area clubs, businesses and organizations. The McKenzie Lions Club conducted business at the restaurant for 15 years and McKenzie Rotary Club utilized the facility for 26 years for its weekly meetings.

The restaurant also served as the location for Ms. Tibby Edwards Liles radio talk show, which was broadcast live from the restaurant for seven years. "The Tibby Edwards Show" featured numerous celebrities on the hour-long event.

"Hal and Dixie Holbrook held their wedding rehearsal dinner here, as well as Hal's birthday dinner. We had Hal's birthday one night and the wedding rehearsal the next night," she remembered.

"We have had so many governors and state senators here," she continued. "Once during a celebration for former Governor Gordon Browning's birthday, four other governors and ex-governors attended."

Ms. Sherwood stated she is proud of the fact that she has always operated the restaurant amid harmony

"I have been here through five mayors of McKenzie and have never

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Lou Sherwood Forestwood Restaurant

t seems 1996 was a transitional year for McKenzie as three memorable and iconic businesses locked their doors for a final time. Moseley Seed and Feed, Wrinkles Hardware and Forestwood Restaurant. While working on the story for John Moseley, I came across the story of Lou Sherwood's retirement written by Linda Bolton.

Below is the piece remembering Forestwood Restaurant:

A 26-year-old McKenzie landmark is changing face, with the closing of this week of one of the city's oldest and finest family restaurants. Forestwood Restaurant closed Tuesday evening and Adrian's Car Stereo will be relocated to the Highland Drive building.

Forestwood owner Lou Sherwood said the decision to close was made because of family illness.

"I have a lot of wonderful memories to take with me when I lock these doors," said Ms. Lou. "I made a numerous amount of friends that I'm going to miss seeing day after day. I owe part of my success to my children and grandchildren," she said. Ms. Sherwood's son, Steve, served as general manager and cook, and daughter, Patsy Melton served as manager and waitress throughout the years. Her daughter-inlaw, Genia Sherwood, and grandchildren, Torey and Adrain Green and Ross and LaTisha Sherwood have also worked at the restaurant in various capacities over the years.

Ms. Lou said she and her family left McKenzie in 1946 and lived in Memphis for 11 years, followed by 11 ¹/₂ years in Scottsboro, Alabama where she owned and operated Lou's Diner for four years.

"That diner is still open. But my home is McKenzie and Trezevant, so we decided to move back," she said.

From 1966 until March 1969, she owned and operated Silver Dollar Restaurant at the intersection of Highway 79 and Old McKenzie Highway where Union Planter Bank [now Regions Bank] is now situated.

"They had built a new Pure Oil Station at that location and I went in beside it," she said.

"But I'm proudest of this place (Forestwood) and my many repeat customers.

McGahey sisters have been in her employment for several years. "I have so many good supporters. It has been wonderful," she said. When asked how she plans to spend her retirement years, she stated, "I'm just going to rest. I have worked in the restaurant business for 50-plus years

HCMC Offering COVID-19 Vaccine to 16, 17 Year Olds

PARIS — Henry County Medical Center continues to be a COVID-19 vaccination provider to the area, working with the State of Tennessee and the Henry County Health Department to vaccinate our community. The State of Tennessee is now open to anyone who wants to have a COVID-19 vaccine.

Due to the need, HCMC is offering the Pfizer vaccine with preference given to 16 and 17 years of age in the region. Pfizer is the only vaccine that is approved for those 16 and older. Those interested in the Pfizer vaccine are required to sign up.

The Pfizer vaccine will be offered the following dates at Henry County Healthcare Center Plumley Rehab Parking Lot:

First Dose – Saturday, May

8 a.m. and 4:30 p.m. The following information must be provided when signing up:

- Name Date of Birth
- Age as of May 8, 2021
- Parent or Legal Guardian's Name:
- Phone Number of Parent if a Minor or Participant's Number

For minors, a valid photo ID and a parent or guardian must accompany and remain present with the minor to receive the vaccination. If they are 18 or older, a parent or guardian is not required to accompany them.

The event is a Drive Thru event and participants are asked to enter the North Entrance to Hospital Circle from Tyson Avenue (this is the entrance closest to the Emergency Department Entrance). Participants will not be able to access the vaccine POD from the South Entrance. Participants are expected to answer a few questions as well as remain on our HCHC Plumlev Rehab Parking Lot for up to 30 minutes of observation after receiving the vaccine. If you have had COVID-19 within the last 60 days, you will not be eligible for the vaccination. Also, if you have reactions to shots or have allergies, you should consult your primary care provider before proceeding to have the vaccination. And, anyone receiving a vaccination during the community vaccination POD will need to complete the vaccination process by receiving the second dose at the same location 21 days after receiving the first one.

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

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
