Again, thank you to our athletes and our advertising sponsors. Here's to a great season and many more to come in the years ahead.





Perfect Game Keeps Fillies from State Title

The Huntingdon Fillies proved hard to hit in the Spring Fling. Natalie Kreuziger pitched in all four rounds of the tournament. She threw a total of 421 pitches, 271 of which were strikes accounting for 49 strikeouts. Kreuziger allowed nine hits and walked only nine batters. Over the four days, the Fillies outscored their opponents 10-2. The Fillies were the only team in the 2A softball bracket to make it to Friday's championship unscathed.

HUNTINGDON O, **LIBERTY CREEK 1**

MURFREESBORO (May 24) — The Huntingdon

Fillies and Liberty Creek Wolves game was a battle from the circle. For the Fillies, Natalie Kreuziger faced 22 batters, striking out six. She threw 77 pitches for 46 strikes giving up one hit and two walks. Liberty Creek's Kaylor West pitched a perfect game allowing zero hits and zero runs over seven innings, striking out five. This was the first perfect game in eight years and the fifth perfect game in state tournament history.

Liberty Creek took an early lead in the second inning when Maisen Lewis doubled, scoring Hailey Langston who was on base after being hit by a pitch.

In seven innings pitched, West threw 79 pitches for 55 strikes for five strikeouts.

This was the Fillies' tenth appearance in the state tournament and best finish as the runner-up.

HUNTINGDON 6, **RIVERSIDE 1**

MURFREESBORO (May 23) — In the third round of action, the Huntingdon Fillies ousted the Riverside Panthers 6-1.

Riverside got on the board in the first inning after Lauren Ruehl bunted into a fielder's choice, scoring Kylie Frost.

Huntingdon captured the lead, 2-1, in the bottom of the first after Josie Sanders walked, and Josey Stokes singled, each scoring one run.

Playing from Stewarts Creek High School, they picked up three solid wins knocking off Smith County and Riverside before battling Loretto at MTSU for the title.

HUNTINGDON 3, LORETTO 4

MURFREESBORO (May 24) — Despite out-hitting Loretto five to four, Hunting-

banks, Braylon Rich, Silas Sharp, and Brady Warbritton each collected one hit for the Mustangs.

Sawyer Raines was the starting pitcher for Huntingdon, allowing two hits and one run over one and one-third innings, striking out one and walking three. Eubanks came in and pitched three and twothirds innings. He allowed two hits and three runs (two earned) while striking out two and walking four. Graham Bartholomew closed the game.

Loretto was the first to get on the board in the first inning when Mason Tidwell hit a solo home run to left field. Rich hit a second, tying the game at one in the top of the third.

A tag up by Jackson Traglia gave Loretto the lead, 2-1, in the bottom of the fourth.

In the fifth inning, Carter Daniel hit a two-run RBI double to right field, scoring Clint Seymore and Tidwell giving Loretto a 4-1 lead.

Down but not out, the Mustangs brought it to within one run in the sixth inning. Rich doubled off a line drive to right field. Then, Bennett singled to left field. Bartholomew advanced the runners after grounding out. Sharp hit





double play in the game.


HUNTINGDON 10, Smith Co. 1
