Two-vehicle collision injures two

Logan-Magnolia junior in critical condition

A late afternoon accident on Friday, March 25, sent two individuals to area hospitals.

According to the Iowa State Patrol, the accident happened at approximately 5:35 p.m. on Overton Ave south of Logan.

A 16-year-old unnamed juvenile, later confirmed to

be Ava Fischer of Logan, was southbound in a 2010 Hyundai Tuscon, negotiating a curve, when she crossed the center line and collided head-on with a northbound 2009 Toyota Tundra operated by Jason King, 43, of Woodbine.

The Tuscon came to rest on its top in the east ditch and the Tundra came to rest on the roadway.

King was transported to CHI Health Missouri Valley by ambulance and Fischer was transported to Bergen Mercy in Omaha, Neb. with serious injuries via LifeNet.

In an update provided via social network, Fischer arrived at Bergen Mercy in critical condition with two broken legs, a severed artery, a clogged artery, several spinal fractures, a broken neck, skull fracture, and a brain bleed.

She was placed in a medically induced coma and on a ventilator.

According to the update, due to the loss of blood and being put on blood thinner, no major surgeries had taken place. However, her legs were stabilized from the outside

and a stint was inserted into her artery to stop the bleeding.

The biggest concern over the weekend was the brain bleed. A sensor was inserted into her brain to monitor activity and bleeding. She was also been put on anti-seizure medication. The first data came back from that sensor with good news – Ava's brain pressure is normal at the time and no seizure activity was found. Bleeding had not worsened.

Her family requested community support for Ava on

Sunday, and asked anyone able to arrive at the Bergen Mercy parking lot at 5 a.m. for a prayer vigil. Logan-Magnolia Schools sent a bus of community supporters for that purpose, leaving Logan at 3 a.m. Sunday.

According to the most recent update, Ava has undergone several surgeries, is showing signs of understanding commands and is moving her feet. She remains in a medically induced coma and ventilated

Three finalists named in Missouri Valley Superintendent search

The search for Missouri Valley's next superintendent of schools, to begin duties locally on July 1, has been narrowed down to a field of three.

The process thus far has included a community-wide survey to determine which qualities and characteristics the community prioritizes. The Missouri Valley Board of Education has worked with Grundmeyer Leader Services during the search.

In an announcement last week, the district named the three finalists: Brett Abbotts, principal of Roosevelt Elementary in Council Bluffs; Christi

Gochenour, secondary principal at Logan-Magnolia, and Jay Lutt, Superintendent and PK-3 principal at Westwood.

The three candidates share a strong background, experience recruiting staff, effective management of resources, and engaging with families and communities in a meaningful way.

Additionally, according to the press release, each finalist promotes communities of care within their districts.

Brett Abbotts

Abbotts has implemented a school improvement plan designed to raise student achievement and enhance

social-emotional learning for all students, according to the announcement. He has also focused on recruiting and retaining high-quality teachers and staff, as well as creating an environment in which students, families, and staff feel valued and respected.

Prior to his current position, Abbotts was an assistant principal, athletic director, and special education director in the AHSTW Schools in Avoca.

Christi Gochenour

Gochenour has led the development and implementation of Logan-Magnolia's vision of learning, promoting

safe and effective learning environments, provided a vision for district-wide professional development, and established systems of support for special education staff, according to the press release.

Prior to serving in her current role, Gochenour was a school improvement and professional development consultant for Green Hills Area Education Agency and she has served as an adjunct instructor at Morningside College.

Jay Lutt

Lutt's focus throughout the pandemic has been on strong communication with families,

as well as bringing technology resources to students, and implementing specifically designed instruction into the school's multi-tiered systems of support.

He previously served as superintendent of the Farragut and Hamburg districts, and was an elementary principal and curriculum director in the Moravia, Orient-Macksburg, and Prescott districts.

Board and stakeholder interview teams will conduct final interviews with each candidate on March 31 after which the Board plans to reach a final decision quickly.

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Council considers water service contract

Following the PeopleService update at the regular Missouri Valley City Council meeting on Tuesday, March 15, council considered companies willing to contract water services.

Dakoda Tish, PeopleService operator in Missouri Valley reported that the contracted water service provider had received new meters for the local plant, and that they spent last month performing plant maintenance.

"Last month we focused on maintenance in our plant," Tish said. "We ended up removing, replacing and repairing one of the backwash lagoon pumps. We also re-

placed some clay valves and the motherboard for garage door number two because it burnt out on us."

Additionally, the crew monitored water levels as required while work was conducted near the tower.

"We did have MidAmerican come at the end of February/beginning of March to take down their tower and install their new tower up at the top end of Third Street," Tish said. "We had to monitor the reservoir levels and the (water) tower levels manually so that tied up a couple of days. We had no disruption of service at that time."

Tish reported that the Highway 30 lift station is running as expected and added that the crew is planning pre-

discharge sampling within the next month.

They also plan to schedule someone to sonar the lagoons for sludge depths as well.

"We are going to try to get it when the lagoon is at its highest," he said.

City Administrator Jodie Flaherty then relayed to council that the provider's contract is nearing its term. PeopleService has held the contract since 2009, according to Flaherty, and the last contract was a five-year term.

"Our water services contract is up this year," Flaherty said. "I just need to know which way you want to go. If you want to go out to bids for proposals."

Flaherty added that the City has been discussing the

current contract with PeopleService representatives.

"I think we should check out some other facilities and see if we can get it a little cheaper," said Mayor Pro Tem Sherman Struble. "We have gone up every year with PeopleService."

Flaherty said that she knows of only one other company that contracts water service, though some companies will buy the utility – an option in which council was not interested.

"We would have to give PeopleService notice by April 1, so it would be a very quick process to go through," Flaherty added. "We could schedule a walk-through and a special meeting."

Chad Meyer, President of

PeopleService, asked council if there are service issues that have not been addressed.

"I think you guys do a very good job, but the last couple of years it kind of went down hill," Struble said. "That is just my opinion. And for awhile we didn't have anybody licensed there running the place."

Meyer answered that the company is working on staffing issues, and Tish and Garrett Borden are both working on the certifications.

"(Certified operators) are just hard to come by these days," Meyer added.

Council decided to schedule a special meeting for Tuesday, March 29 to further discuss the matter.

Missouri Valley corn grower earns top state honors in National Corn Yield Contest

Kent Beebe of Missouri Valley placed third in the state in Conventional Irrigated Class with a yield of 280.0928 bushels per acre. The hybrid used in the winning field was Wiffels Hybrids W8646RIB. The winning field was located in Iowa.

Beebe was one of 530 state winners nationwide. The 2021 contest



participation included 7,213 entries from 47 states. Of the state winners, 27 growers – three from each of nine classes – were named national winners, representing 14 states.

The average yield among national winners was more than 376.7593 bushels per acre – more than double the projected 2021 U.S. average of 177 bushels per acre. While there is no overall contest winner, yields from first, second and third place farmers' overall production categories topped out at 269.4164 bushels per acre.

"The National Corn Yield Contest provides a special two-fold opportunity – contribute to the knowledge that will help corn farmers thrive in the future while enjoying good-natured competition and camaraderie with their peers today," said Lowell Neitzel, chair of NCGA's Member and Consumer Engagement Action Team.

"At its core, NCGA shapes dynamic, change-

driven farmers, from the grassroots activists speaking up on policy issues to the dedicated farmer leaders who lead our organization.

"As farmers, we always strive to do more with less. We innovate using data, technology, and hard-won expertise. We work tirelessly to leave our farms better for the next generation, with gratitude to those who cared for it before us. Challenge yourself to be a part of building for tomorrow! I invite new and old faces alike to enter the contest in 2022. I urge you to learn how to start making that positive change today by going to ncga.com."

Farmers are encouraged through the contest to utilize new, efficient production techniques. Agronomic data gleaned from the contest revealed the following:

• Average planting population for the national winners was 38,111 seeds per acre, compared to 34,751 for all entrants.

- National winners applied an average of 276.1851 pounds of nitrogen, 82.5925 pounds of phosphorus and 134.0740 pounds of potassium per acre.

- Average commercial nitrogen use per bushel of yield was .88 pounds for the national winners and .89 pounds for all entrants.

- 40 percent of the national winners applied trace minerals, compared to 41 percent of all entrants.

- 45 percent of national winners applied manure, compared to 18.35 percent of all entrants.

The National Corn Yield Contest began in 1965 with 20 entries from three states. At that time, the highest overall yield was 218.9 bushels per acre, while the national yield average was in the mid-60 bushel-per-acre range.

All 2021 contest winners were invited to attend the 2022 Commodity Classic held March 10-12 in New Orleans, La. For a complete

With Heartfelt Gratitude

I just thought it was old, but obviously it was special to her. She smiled softly as her fingers wrapped around the single, curved brass handle on the tiger-oak frame and tugged the glass door open. Though I was only ten at the time, the next two hours of my life remain indelibly etched in my mind. For on that winter day, sitting next to our mother at the kitchen table, I learned the true meaning of gratitude.

"This was a wedding gift from my folks." Her blue eyes

shone brightly as she reached for an oval glass tray with two "bowls" on it. Lovely pink and red roses were painted on the front of each. "It's for cream and sugar," Mom explained to me as she reverently placed the set on the table and wiped the dust from the tops.

I decided they must have needed a lot of those cream and sugar things back in the day because she brought out another pair, these of shiny glass, textured in what looked like dents. It was also a wedding gift, from the neighbors, and she spoke their names.

At the back of the cabinet was an iridescent vase with a gold rim. "Julia gave me this for my birthday a long time ago." I wondered if my aunt knew then how much her sis-

ter would love her flowers. A round ceramic teapot came out next, spotted with bright red, green and blue polka dots. I knew this was a gift from Lilly, another of her sisters. Sometimes Mom would get it out and make tea, just for the two of us.

She loved every treasure in that old wooden hutch and the person who gave it to her.

Was Mom grateful because at times in her life she had so little? Was it because she grew up with very few gifts?

Whatever the reason, I cannot help but think that her grateful attitude affected how she and Dad raised their children. From a very young age we were taught to say "thank you."

Many times at that same

kitchen table Mom sat by each of us as we penciled words onto cards. When we received gifts, we wrote thank yous. A dollar bill tucked into a birthday card? We wrote a note. Unemployment Insurance bill moving through the chamber

The largest bill to move out of each chamber this week was HF 2355, the Unemployment Insurance reform bill. There has long been a need to reform Iowa's Unemployment Insurance Trust Fund laws in order to balance the need for those terminated through no fault of their own, against the need for the fund to grow during the good times of low unemployment.



The UITF is an account employers are taxed to fund according to state law in order to help unemployed Iowans between jobs. It is regulated by the state to keep the fund balance healthy during times of both high and low unemployment. During historically low unemployment, as we saw during the great economic times of the Trump Administration, the fund should have moved to the lowest tax bracket. Due to fraud and improper claims, this didn't happen.

During the late pandemic, Iowa's trust fund was pummeled by a massive number of unemployment claims from the early business shutdowns. Along with this legitimate use of the fund, there was a growing and sophisticated fraud effort ranging from individuals filing single fraudulent claims to multi-state operations using computers to steal identities and addresses to file thousands of claims automatically. We obviously must address this issue for both good times and bad.

HF 2355 has several sections, indicating just how far behind the modern market environment we are currently.

The bill changes the length of assistance from six months of coverage to four months. Iowa Workforce Development shows over 80,000 jobs open across the

state. It should not take anyone half a year of benefits to find a job in this environment. States that are ahead of ours show a history of job seekers becoming employed in less than half the time as we shift the benefit by two months. Iowa's data shows an average of twelve weeks of benefits before employment, a whole month shorter than the sixteen weeks we have set.

Next is the addition of a one-week period from filing a claim to the start of assistance. This is the most necessary but controversial part of the bill. Waiting one week before starting a payment gives Workforce Development time to do verification of eligibility, notify the employer, and check the claim for fraud. This policy is big. The amount of fraud nationwide has been conservatively estimated by the US Labor Bureau to be over \$87 billion during the Covid extended unemployment benefit period. Iowa has reported over \$5 million in fraud losses in each of 2019 and 2020. That was only what was identified. In today's system, Iowa starts processing the first payment before all of the checks can be finished. It is practically impossible to claw back the money once it is disbursed. The department needs a week head start. Forty other states have this provision including all the states that surround Iowa. Even the United Auto Workers union recognizes this policy as necessary as they also wait one week before starting strike pay.

Improper use during the first week includes businesses shutting down for a week for regularly scheduled maintenance. They tell their employees to stay home and have them file unemployment when they know those same employees will be hired back the next Monday. Unions will also play the game, as they pull their apprentices off jobs to attend regular training. The

apprentice is told to apply for jobless benefits, but they know they will be back on the job in a week as they weren't actually laid off. Each of these examples are costs that should be born by the business or union, not the business taxes that sustain the fund for real unemployment.

HF 2355 also puts into code definitions of misconduct to guide the department and judges as they decide contested cases. Currently, the department can make a ruling, and it can be appealed to an administrative law judge. This judge can make essentially any ruling and not have a written guideline to which to refer. Defining misconduct offers consistency and predictability as all parties and judges can refer to the same definitions. The bill also allows parties to go straight to District Court instead of having to stop at the Employment Appeals Board.

The message I constantly receive from home is that all those who can work, need to work and that programs still pay people to stay home. The House has almost identical language passed out of their chamber. It should not take long to negotiate and strike a deal. I am sure the governor will sign it as this was originally her idea, and she presented this policy during her annual Condition of the State address in January.

In other news, it appears that the session may be wrapping up a week or two before the April 19 scheduled close. We are still working on the budget, but the House has passed us a few budget bills already. Large issues still to resolve include E-15, pharmacy benefit manager regulation, school choice, and the bottle bill. Other good bills will pass, but these seem to take the largest portion of my time at the Capitol and at forums.

On Thursday, April 7, at 2 p.m., author Linda McCann will present a program based on her book Prisoners of War in Iowa at the Missouri Valley Public Library.

From 1943 to 1946 Iowa had about 25,000 German, Italian, and Japanese prisoners of war. There were two main camps, Algona and Clarinda, and seventeen branch camps, where the prisoners worked for short periods of time.

The POWs worked in fields harvesting crops, in canning factories, corn seed dealers, helping to supply the needs of the people at home.

The accuracy and predictive power of weather forecasting is impressive, especially when compared with what it was several decades ago. But lately meteorologists are telling us that the weather is becoming less predictable in many ways, thanks to one of the exotic features of many weather phenomena, such as atmospheric rivers, pyrocumulus clouds (firestorms), and even pyrocumulonimbus columns (vast firestorms that can generate lightning and cause smoke particles to enter the stratosphere). Trying to predict extreme events such as floods, droughts, and fires is proving difficult, and their likelihood by looking at how often they occurred in the past has led to drastically underestimating their current likelihood. Many places around the world are now having "thousand-year floods" every decade, illustrating just how much we are underestimating these events. Many scientists are proposing that geological epoch we are living in be called the Anthropocene, because humankind is having a significant impact on the planet's ecosystems, including its weather. According to NOAA, "At present, humans are putting an estimated 9.5 billion metric tons of carbon into the atmosphere each year by burning fossil fuels and another 1.5 billion through deforestation. The land carbon cycle is 'in the hole,' but it is not as bad as it once was. The good news is that, but 11 billion tons is a lot, and there is little doubt that we are contributing to climate change that is proving catastrophic. We should all consider how our habits and everyday life contributes to the fate of our planet and remember that we are called to be good stewards of the earth." - Christopher Simon

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
