Lifetime Achievement Award

Sherman Struble was awarded the Lifetime Achievement Award. Sherm is currently a Missouri Valley City Council member and remains active in the community in a variety of ways. He has served on the City Council since 1992, a position he takes very seriously.

Additionally, he and his wife of nearly 60 years, Melba, are active volunteers with the Harrison County Food Pantry and Clothing Exchange, and he serves as an Elder in the Community of Christ.

Gochenour excited to head Missouri Valley district

After months of searching the Missouri Valley school board has named Christi Gochenour as the district's next superintendent, according to an announcement on Friday, April 1.

Currently Gochenour serves as the middle school/ high school principal in neighboring Logan-Magnolia Community School District.

"I was ready to be a Superintendent. I have had my EDS, my specialist degree, since 2015," Gochenour said. "I am really excited. There have been other Superintendent positions that have been available, but this is home for me. My family is there, and between Logan and Missouri Valley – that is just home."

She added that she looks forward to the challenge of leading systemically, and enhancing what is already in place.

"(I want) to be able to look systemically and be able to help grow and continue the district's forward motion," she said. "The stage is set and now I get the opportunity to keep designing that stage. Their foundation is really solid. They have a solid instructional staff, a solid administrative staff and a solid

school board."

The biggest challenge that she foresees is just learning the job, and ensuring that she continues growing the district in the direction it is headed.

"I am humbled beyond imagination. The idea that I get to lead a district that is progressive, and that is home for me is humbling and I am grateful that they are giving me the chance to help them continue growing," she said. "I am going to miss where I am at, because we have done a lot of great things."

Gocherour added that she looks forward to working with both districts, and others, via the regional CTE academy.

For now, in addition to finishing out her contract at Logan-Magnolia, Gochenour plans to sit in on board meetings prior to July 1, when she begins her duties heading up the Missouri Valley Community School District.

PeopleService to continue local water service

Missouri Valley City Council considered two water service proposals at the March 29 meeting, but ultimately decided to continue the contract with PeopleService for five years.

Chris McMillen, Director of Sales for People Service presented their proposal at the March 29 council meeting.

He began by thanking the City of Missouri Valley for 10 years of partnership and stated that what sets their company apart from others is their customer-driven approach to service.

McMillen acknowledged the challenges of staffing qualified operators in the industry, but added that longtime operator Jonathan McDonald continues to oversee local operations.

McDonald did not have his certification for the majority of the time he ran the local operations, and now serves in a different position for the compa-

ny. He maintains daily communication with the current provider, Dakota Tish. Three other licensed operators provide additional oversight, according to McMillen.

Tish expects to take his Grade 1 WT and WD exams by this summer, and already holds a Grade 1 WW certification for systems that only require a lagoon.

Finally, McMillen added that the City has several projects progressing, and PeopleService providers hope to see those water projects through to completion.

The estimated annual cost of the service provided is \$244,932 beginning July 1.

City Council received a second proposal for a five-year contract from U.S. Water Services Corporation.

This proposal also offered lump sum pricing for operations and maintenance of the local water and wastewater systems, but no annual cost was provided in the proposal.

Missouri Valley schools received grant to support Hope Squad program

Missouri Valley Schools recently received a \$32,300 South-west Iowa Mental Health and Disabilities Services grant to continue the district's Hope Squad program for the next two years.

"We are so excited about the funding," said School Psychologist Angie Williams. "This money will allow us to purchase the Hope Squad curriculum at all three levels (elementary, middle, and high school) for the next two years."

Prior to receiving the grant funding, the local district was able to purchase just one year of the three-four year curriculum. But the grant will sustain the program for up to four years.

A portion of the grant funds will be used to celebrate the week May 1-7, 2022, during which the Hope Squad will host a Hope Walk and other events at the school.

The Hope Walk is scheduled for Sunday, May 1, from 5-7 p.m., and will include live music at the Missouri Valley High School track.

"We will have a singer, Jocelyn, who recently competed on America's Song Contest, and who writes and

sings uplifting songs," Williams said. "T-shirts and goodie bags will be provided to all who register by April 15. Smoked On Arrival food truck will be on-site for people to purchase food at a reduced rate. The goal of the event is to host a family-friendly, community event where people can come together to support suicide prevention and reduce the stigma surrounding mental health."

A video will be shown to all participants during the Hope Walk to share information about the Hope Squad program and its focus on mental health and suicide prevention.

The remaining funds would be used for the Hope Week scheduled for the spring of 2023.

Hope Squad continues throughout the year, and in July or August the Hope Squad advisors will host a summer retreat for all members in grades 4-12. During the retreat members will engage in fun activities, learn additional curriculum, and plan the agenda for the coming school year - including the next Hope Week.

Hope Squad advisors will each be paid a stipend of \$300 to plan and host the event. The remaining funds of that allotment will be used

for food and materials needed for the retreat.

Additionally, in September advisors will travel to Utah for training. This past year, the advisors were trained in a virtual format due to COVID restrictions. The benefit of attending the training in Utah is that advisors will be able to tour existing Hope Squad at all levels and be able to hear their ideas and experiences.

The budget for this would cover the airfare, hotel, and registration expenses for this training.

Because Missouri Valley is the first Hope Squad in the state of Iowa, other districts have reached out to the district regarding the local experience, and the advisors hope to be able to have enough knowledge and information to support surrounding teams, as well as their own.

Hope Squad meetings are held during the students' lunch time to avoid taking students from instruction time, but because students get their lunches in the cafeteria, meeting time with the group is limited.

"Hope Squad meetings can be intense, as students are learning information about suicide prevention and mental

health," Williams added. "Funds will be used to provide food during these meetings, as currently parents have been volunteering to send snacks and drinks."

Provide lunches for the meetings will maximize the time that the group has to meet and learn the information.

Finally, money is budgeted for Hope Squad gear for members. The goal is for students to advertise that they are members of the group in order for peers to know who is trained and can help them if they are struggling. Wearing shirts and sweatshirts will help identify members to all, as well as promote the Hope Squad group in the school and community.

"The members of Hope Squad have worked hard to help promote a positive, supportive culture at all levels," Williams added. "They have learned how to recognize suicidal warning signs in others and then know how to respond to get that individual help."

Street projects prioritized as grant funding is considered

Missouri Valley City Council considered two water service proposals at the March 29 meeting, but ultimately decided to continue the contract with PeopleService for five years.

Chris McMillen, Director of Sales for People Service presented their proposal at the March 29 council meeting.

He began by thanking the City of Missouri Valley for 10 years of partnership and stated that what sets their company apart from others is their customer-driven approach to service.

McMillen acknowledged the challenges of staffing qualified operators in the industry, but added that longtime operator Jonathan McDonald continues to oversee local operations.

McDonald did not have his certification for the majority of the time he ran the local operations, and now serves in a different position for the company. He maintains daily communica-

tion with the current provider, Dakota Tish. Three other licensed operators provide additional oversight, according to McMillen.

Tish expects to take his Grade 1 WT and WD exams by this summer, and already holds a Grade 1 WW certification for systems that

only require a lagoon.

Finally, McMillen added that the City has several projects progressing, and PeopleService providers hope to see those water projects through to completion.

The estimated annual cost of the service provided is \$244,932 beginning July 1.

City Council received a second proposal for a five-year contract from U.S. Water Services Corporation.

This proposal also offered lump sum pricing for operations and maintenance of the local water and wastewater systems, but no annual cost was provided in the proposal.

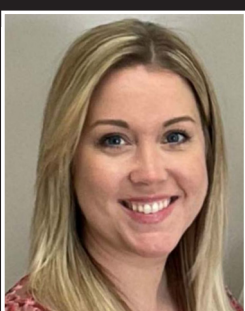

Mom sniffed in disdain when the Wisk parrot cried “Ring around the collar!” humiliating the poor housewife as she examined her husband’s stained white shirt. Our mother used Tide. She claimed Tide cleaned up collars just fine, but you can bet she paid close attention to those shirt collars as she pressed the iron over them. No parrot was going to screech over her shoulder.

The “Little Dab’ll do ya” Brylcreem tube had

a spot in our mirrored cabinet. Probably there were no other hair gel products on the grocery shelf when Don or Delmer needed it. The ad slogan, “Keeps hair looking clean and natural” never entered their minds. Certainly not!

My sisters preferred Doublemint gum. They chose to spend their nickels on the green package because they liked it best. They were certainly NOT influenced by the harmonious hype of the Doublemint Twins, “Double your pleasure, double your fun!”

The pleasant scent of Dial soap wafted from the bathroom soap dish. Practicality prevailed; we used Dial because it got us clean. NEVER did the thought enter our minds that if we used a different bar, we might smell offensive to others: “Aren’t you glad you use Dial? Don’t you wish everybody did?”

I never did figure out what the “something” was about an Aqua Velva man, but I do remember when Dad splashed it on I decided that he probably didn’t need Dial soap for the rest of the week.

As the youngest and most rebellious of the family, I sometimes stood before the bathroom sink mirror checking for yellow as I brushed my teeth (with Crest) and sang, “You’ll wonder where your teeth all went when you brush your teeth with Pepsodent.”

The little boy counters, “Oh, I’m glad I’m not an Oscar Mayer wiener...” (I sided with the boy.)

Likely, you were immune to those television commercials, too, and just tuned them out like we did.

You probably don’t remember the choruses of children and adults, the provocative female voices, or the orchestras and bold brass bands where lyrics and melody joined forces: “Plop, plop, fizz fizz, oh what a relief it is.” “Things go better with Coke.”

“My dog’s better than your dog, my dog’s better than yours...” “You can trust your car to the man who wears the star...” “Mr. Clean gets rid of dirt and grime and everything that’s in it...” “Nothing says lovin’ like something from the oven and Pills-

bury says it best!”

So, how long will it take to stop singing them in your head?

Education Transparency Matters

House Republicans believe that every parent should play a central role in their child’s education. Parents and students matter, and we’ve worked hard to give them a greater say in the education process by passing many different pieces of legislation over the last two years.

This week we passed House File 2577, which aims at creating a more transparent classroom so parents can view classroom instructional material being taught to their children. School districts would post the syllabus, textbooks, and other related classroom documents so parents can access and view all this information through an online portal.

Parents deserve to know what is being taught to their children in school. The purpose of this legislation is to empower parents,

while at the same time making it as simple as possible for our educators. Under the proposal educators would update their online postings throughout the year, allowing for discussion on current events or other topics that they deem most engaging and educational. To comply with this bill, the new information being taught must be publicly accessible, for parents to view it, and it would be uploaded by the end of the week on an online portal.

In addition, we have heard a lot of concerns

about obscene books and other materials in school libraries and classrooms, and this legislation seeks to address this problem from the angle of transparency. Our bill would require a catalog be published online of every book in the school library and would allow parents a protocol for preventing their child from checking out specific books that they deem as inappropriate. Parents have every right to access this information, and the steps laid out in this legislation ensure parents can have over-

sight on the materials their children are seeing or reading. Parents can also talk with their local school boards and superintendents to address concerns over certain materials and potentially have them removed.

The bottom line is this, parents should know what is happening in their children’s education. We want to ensure parents have this information so they are aware of the materials their children are seeing in the classroom. Parents deserve all the transparency

and understanding of instructional material their children are learning. The purpose of this is to provide parents access to a child’s weekly classroom teachings and to enable them to better understand and oversee the curriculum. As stated before, parents matter and deserve transparency. House Republicans will continue to work on ways to promote the voice of parents and work alongside our fantastic educators to promote a transparent educational experience.

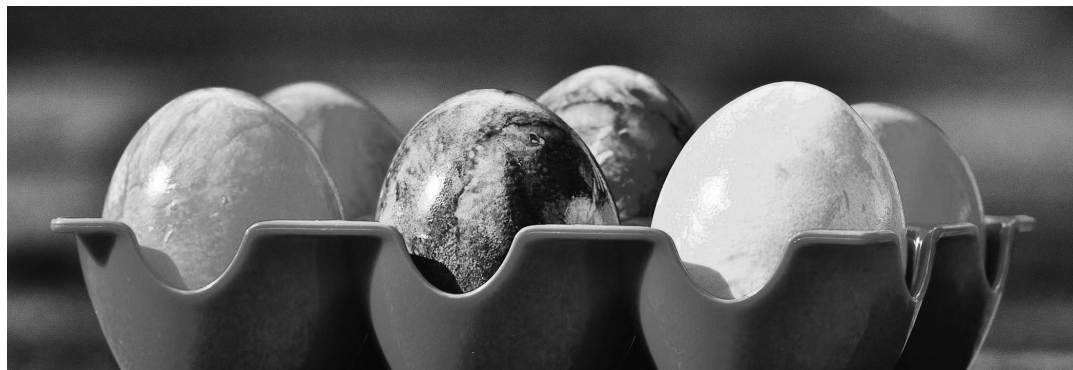

WHO IS COUNTING?

The philosopher John Stuart Mill claimed that we should act in such a way as to maximize happiness (and minimize pain and suffering), and not just our own, but the pleasure and pain of everyone who might be affected by our actions. This means that we should try to predict the effects of our actions ahead of time, and to count ourselves in the equation, but not count ourselves any more than we count others. At times we may have to sacrifice our own happiness if we know that doing so will enhance the happiness of others or spare them pain. A similar type of calculation is often done in relationships, when we ask ourselves if we are getting as much out of the relationship as we are putting into it, or if the other person is contributing as much as we are. The idea that in love we shouldn't be tallying up costs and benefits is romantic, and perhaps ideally, we shouldn't, but it's tempting to agree with the founder of Utilitarianism, Jeremy Bentham, when he said that "Men calculate, some with less exactness, indeed, some with more; but all men calculate." The fact that we all calculate may simply reflect that we all have an innate sense of fairness. We all know the feeling of being taken advantage of, when we feel that we put in more than others or received less. But perhaps we should try to calculate less, or at least feel good about putting in more and receiving less. For it is in giving that we receive, and those who give the most of themselves are invariably the happiest. "Do nothing out of selfish ambition or vain conceit. Rather, in humility value others above yourselves, not looking to your own interests but each of you to the interests of the others." - Philippians 2:3-4 NIV

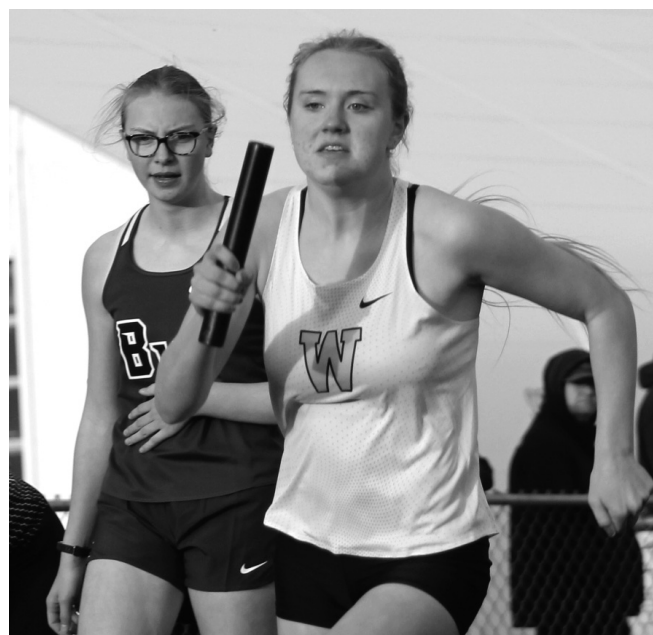

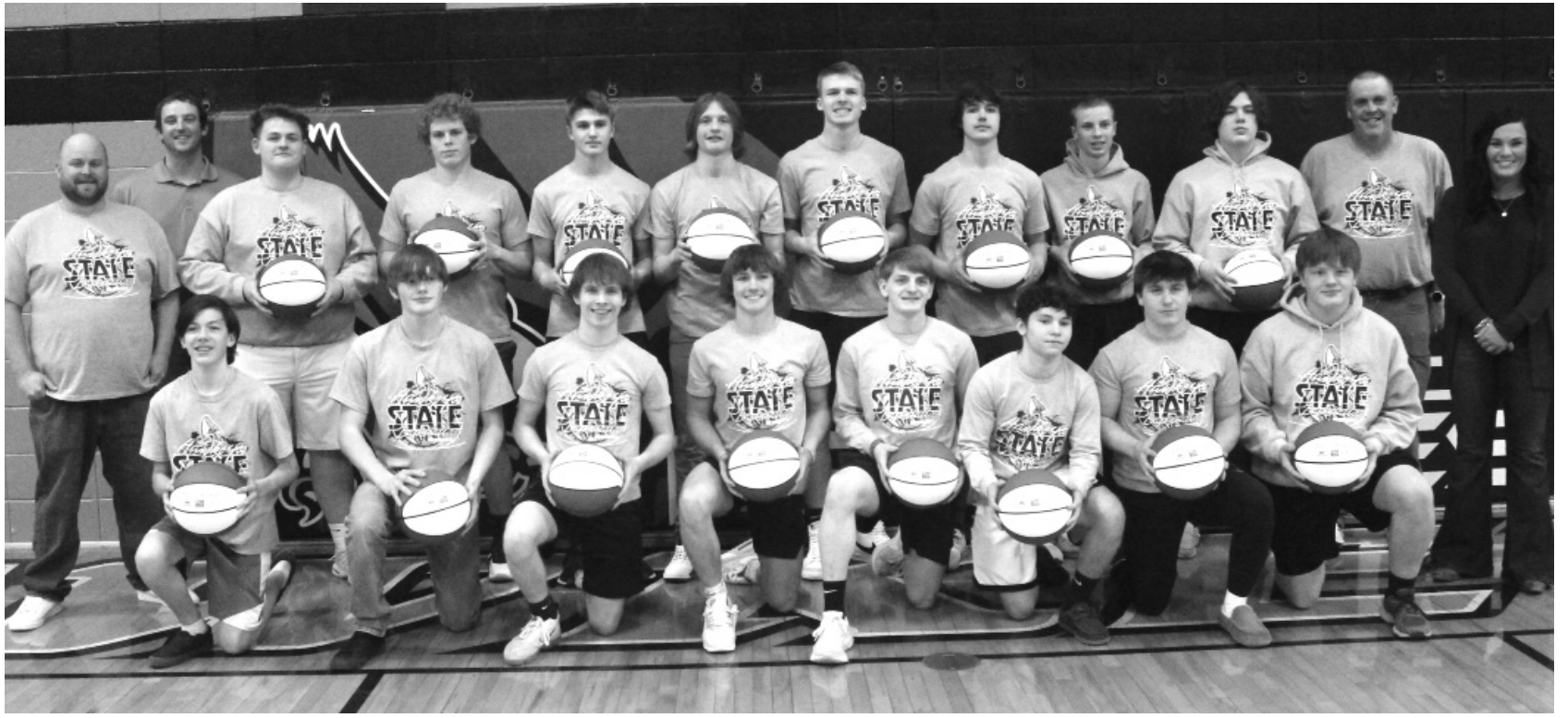

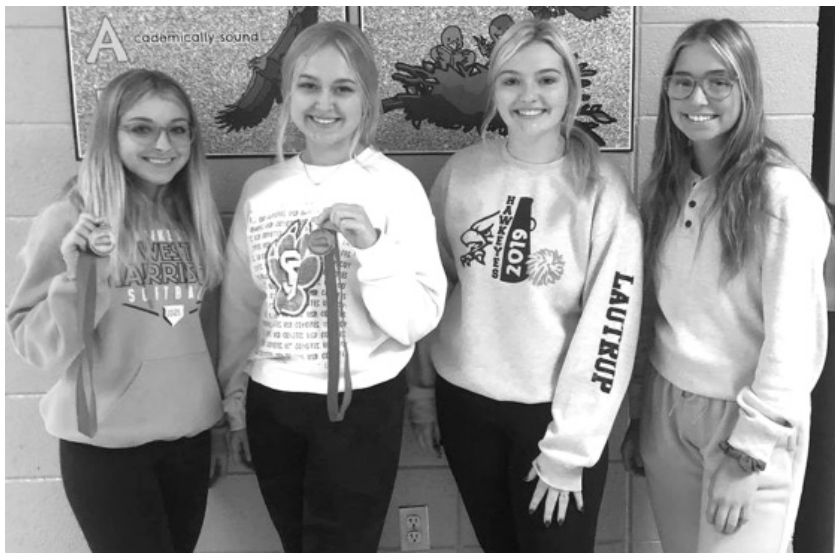

Focus groups identify community needs and opportunities

On March 26th, residents participated in a focus group workshop as part of the Iowa's Living Roadways Community Visioning Program. The focus groups are part of an input-gathering process underway to identify transportation needs and opportunities for enhancements in Logan. Students also participated in their own meeting on March 28th.

During the focus groups, participants utilized a map of Logan to identify places where

traveling around Logan is difficult as well as areas that are considered assets. After reviewing the maps, participants identified three locations in the community that best reflect the transportation assets and barriers discussed. These locations will be photographed by Iowa State University student interns.

Some of the major needs and opportunities that emerged are – recreational trail, improved sidewalks city-wide, improved

cross-walk safety on state high highways through town, pedestrian connectivity to major 'city-centers' including the community schools. Improved handi-cap accessibility on 4th ave, and improved lighting and signage through town. The above-listed ideas are just a few of many, and they are not final plans. They are simply ideas to assist the committee in defining project areas and what will be prioritized.

The next step in the process will be a goal-

setting meeting to be set in the coming weeks. During this meeting, the Logan Visioning Committee will review the information they have gathered and identify priorities for the transportation enhancement plan for Logan.
