# Remembering Charlie Wisecup

## A family man

Charlie Wisecup was born and raised in Missouri Valley, and he grew up where the Wisecup Farm Museum sits today.

Hogs, cattle, chickens and an orchard were all part of his family’s farm. Growing up as the only boy with four sisters, Charlie spent much of his time working.

That ethic is something he carried down when he had a family of his own.

“He didn’t give you a choice,” said Lee Wisecup, Charlie’s son, with a laugh. “You just had to do it.”

Most importantly, if Charlie was doing something, he wanted his family along with him. That’s part of the reason that his relatives are so involved in many things going on in and around Missouri Valley today.

“Everything he did, he made sure his family was involved, too,” said Arthur Wisecup, Charlie’s grandson. “It’s not new to us; it’s just how we were brought up.”

With several grandkids

who didn’t go to school in Missouri Valley, Charlie and his wife Julie traveled many miles to catch their various sporting events and extracurricular activities.

Julie mentioned one instance where they drove to Doane University to see their grandchild run in an 11-second race, and that’s just one out of several examples.

“They’d go to everything,” said Sue Honnor, Charlie’s daughter. “They’d come down and

watch the kids sing for three minutes.”

With a condo at the Lake of the Ozarks, family reunions were held there for several years. A caravan of over 50 people would go down together, and the family came to be known as the “Orange Hat Gang” because Charlie would always sport an orange cowboy hat everywhere he went. Going down since the 70s, Charlie was often

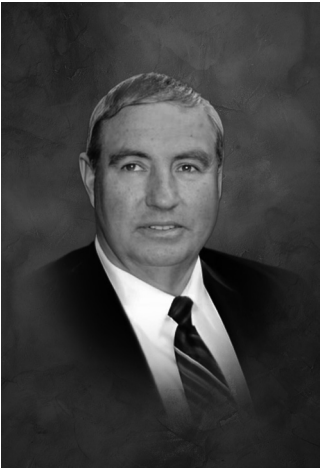

# Peter Rea to Present New Bertrand Program at the Missouri Valley Library

On Thursday, March 30, at 6:30 p.m., DeSoto Ranger Peter Rea will host a program about the artifacts resurrected from the area’s most iconic Civil War era’s historical presence, the steamboat Bertrand.

Rea’s main focus will be the items that salvagers brought up from the wreck, which was discovered in 1968 at the DeSoto bend of the Missouri River. The Bertrand floundered and sank on April 1, 1865.

The wreck was identified in part by two items: a wooden crate with the words “Bertrand Stores” and a slate chalkboard

with a known passenger’s name on the top frame.

The artifacts are of special interest to Rea, who has spent many hours in research and study of the steamboat and its cargo.

The Bertrand and the Missouri Valley area maintain their historical significance as a touchstone for researchers due to the volume and diversity of its Civil War era artifacts.

The program will take place in the Library’s Community Room and is free to the public.

Back on the farm hankies seldom served such melodramatic measures, but the soft cotton squares were definitely handy to have on hand. On a hot day in the hayfield, the men moved and stacked 80-pound bales. Every so often one of them would tug his bandana from his back pocket and mop the sweat from his face. If they were lucky to have

an extra one along, it served as a sweatband under their farm caps.

Later in the season Don or Delmer, or whomever drew shoveling duty, tied a handkerchief over his nose and mouth and climbed the ladder to the top of the granary bin. As the elevator hauled oats up from the trailer, he shoveled the final bushels into the corners. (Even bin space was not wasted!) The hanky, a farmer's dust mask, kept some of the grain dust out of vulnerable lungs.

Wrapped around a finger that was injured in the shop, a handkerchief stopped bleeding until Mom could administer first aid back in the house.

Dad would tie a red bandana to a fencepost to mark a row at the end of the field where a rock had emerged.

Not having to search the whole area, the boys quickly found the potential combine wrecker and hauled it to the rock pile.

A handkerchief tied around a group of extra washers and bolts kept them from getting lost out in the field. On the drive through the shelterbelt when Dad noticed a batch of purple plums, he would stop, pick a few and carefully place them in his clean hanky. When he got home, he proudly presented them to Mom. Hardly a chivalrous gesture, Dad's gift was more likely a hint that the plums were ripe. Wild plum jam was his favorite!

Eyeglasses needed cleaning? Windshield smudges needed buffing? The versatile handkerchief saved the day! Then, of course, there were times when hankies were

needed for noses.

The farmers at our house, young or old, never walked out the door without tucking at least one clean, perfectly-pressed-into-a-square handkerchief into their pockets. You just never knew the uses you might find for a handy hankie!

approached by people who recognized the family's jet skis and his orange hat.

Because of the quality time spent together, the Wisecup family is a tight knit one. For Charlie's funeral, there will be relatives traveling from California, Minnesota, New Mexico, North Dakota, Philadelphia, South Dakota and Texas.

"He was very family oriented. Everybody was invited to come, including (extended family)," Julie said of the Wisecups' trips to the lake.

For Charlie's relatives, every day was a story. With all kinds of projects he'd often enamor himself with, Charlie would find a way to get the help he needed.

"There'd be a lot of times you'd just show up and be like, 'What the hell are you doing right now?'" said Garth Brown, Charlie's grandson. "Grandpa had this elaborate plan of what he was doing and how he was doing it."

"Then he conned you into it," Arthur responded.

"I only need you for a minute!" Lee quoted.

'He just didn't stop'

With Charlie Wisecup, it's easier to lay out the things he wasn't a part of than the things he was.

Part of the Harrison County REC board, Modale Co-Op board, Wilson Subdrainage Committee, County Pork Producers board, a 4-H leader, Sunday School teacher and superintendent and a veteran,

Charlie found time for all of his involvements. It's quite possible some of those involvements are missing here.

"That's the problem: he was involved in so much crap that you can't remember," Garth said.

Farming on his own for nearly 50 years, the idea for the Wisecup Farm museum first started with one tractor that Charlie's aunt gave him in the 80s. After a couple good friends began to help him, his hobby "became out of control," Julie said.

But Charlie didn't just pursue his own interests. He would answer calls from members of city council and give his thoughts on anything they threw his way. The Wisecups also sold land to McDonald's and Texaco to help bring business to town.

Arthur described his grandfather as an "icon" of town, noting that the museum being the first landmark before you get into town made Charlie feel inclined to make his town better.

How people around the area felt about Charlie can be summed up in one story from Julie.

There was someone in town who was helping to beautify Missouri Valley, and they had people write down who they thought was a leader of the community who would assist with the project. Unsurprisingly, Charlie got a lot of names on those papers.

"He said, 'Now why are they writing me down? I'm no entrepreneur.' He did not think

he was, but he totally was," Julie said. "He just thought he was doing things that should be done."

Always on the move and up to something, Lee said many people couldn't believe it when they found out Charlie had passed.

"He just didn't slow down," Garth said. "Up to 86 (years old) he was crawling around on the ground, working on stuff, he was in and out of the shops in town. He just didn't stop."

'You got what you got'

Everyone in the Wisecup family agrees that, with Charlie, "you got what you got."

The same guy around everyone, he'd often pay for the meals of people that stopped at the filling station when they were traveling and needed help. Julie recalls one time that there was a family with four boys, and the boys were so well behaved in the restaurant that Charlie bought their food for them.

"I just remember growing up, if there were people with some kind of need, like a financial need, Dad was more than willing to give them a job for them to help out," said Tammy Wisecup, Charlie's daughter.

Her sister Sue agreed.

"He helped so many people," she said. "People in the church, people in the community. It didn't matter what walk of life you came from, he accepted everybody for who they were."

At the 4-H bake sale at the county fair, Charlie would often feel sorry for the little boys

that would bake muffins. He had a deal with the auctioneer, and Charlie would bid back and forth to keep the price going up. Imagine the cost when his own granddaughter participated.

That's not to say that Charlie never got into trouble. The thing is, Charlie had a tendency to get out of that trouble due to his good nature.

These instances often revolved around one of Charlie's latest bright ideas, like how to load up and transport equipment for the museum.

"He'd always have some way, and he'd figure out how to do it," Arthur said.

Julie recalls a time where an old building that was no longer in use at DeSoto Bend caught Charlie's eye, and he thought he could use it for something. Lee noted that he and his father tried not to take the building down Highway 30 and went six miles around, but then were unable to fit through a bridge.

"Here they are moving it down Highway 30," Julie said. "He got stopped (by law enforcement), and they said, 'Oh, it's just Charlie.'"

Arthur shared a similar experience when, in one of the family's old cars, Charlie was convinced to squeal the tires. Unfortunately, he did so right in front of an unmarked state trooper.

"We got pulled over, he doesn't have his phone on him, doesn't have his license on him, has his pocket knife on him, and it was a big one," Arthur said. "I look at him and I'm like, 'If that's me I'm going to jail! For you, see you later.'"

Each year, Charlie would have a holiday party for all the people he did business with. He would also put on a two-day music festival, and people from around the country came. After Charlie's passing, Julie even received a thoughtful email from a lady in Ireland who was once at the festival.

With so many lives touched by Charlie and his impact on the community, those thoughtful messages and visits have been constant for the Wisecup family since Charlie's passing.

"Getting cards from all sorts of people, and just listening to different stories from people that worked with Grandpa that I didn't know worked with him over the years, hearing the funny stories those people had with him, that brings a lot of comfort and laughs in times of sadness," Garth said. "Hearing how ornery he was or how generous he was, that's really helped me."

To Charlie's relatives, the wild days with their husband, father or grandfather were normal. What seems so interesting to people on the outside looking in was just part of the day-to-day, which is part of what made Charlie so special.

"We just lived it," Lee said.

A celebration of life will be held on Sunday, April 2 at Wishing Hills Barn from 1 to 5 p.m. In lieu of flowers, memorials will be designated by the family at a later time. All are welcome to come with a memory of Charlie to write down in the family's memory book.

House Republicans set education reform agenda

Education Reform

House Republicans set an ambitious agenda for education reform for the 90th General Assembly. After hearing the concerns of parents across the state, many of our legislative priorities centered around protecting children from inappropriate material and curriculum. The fact of the matter is that parents send their kids to school to learn reading, writing, math and science. Classroom time should be devoted to instruction on those core subjects, and discussions on social issues, including sexual orientation and gender identity, should be left to parents. At the end of the day, no school

should provide children with inappropriate material and instruction, and this last week, the Iowa House passed two proposals to prohibit schools from doing such.

House File 597 addresses the concerns that legislators heard regarding the challenges presented in removing obscene material from K-12 school libraries. Parents have expressed that their right to protect their children from inappropriate material is currently bypassed through cumbersome and one-sided book reconsideration policies and committees which historically determined the material the parents have questioned is, in

fact, age appropriate. Iowans began contacting their Representatives for solutions to address the problem of obscene material in Iowa's schools. In response, the House passed legislation to tighten the age-appropriate definition to prohibit schools from providing sexually explicit images and passages to children. Claims made that House Republicans are banning books are far from true. Parents retain the right to provide their child with books and material they feel necessary, our proposal simply ensures that the material provided by schools is age appropriate.

House File 348 prohib-

its classroom instruction on gender identity and sexual orientation in K-6 grades. In these grades, these complex social topics are inarguably not age appropriate. False claims that this proposal was an attack on LGBTQ Iowans were addressed in amendments that made clear this legislation prohibits school instruction, curriculum or promotion of any sexual orientation and identity to children. Again, these social topics should be left to the parents, and schools need to prioritize teaching students reading, writing, math and science.

After listening to Iowans who have expressed concerns over

the material and curriculum their children are exposed to at school, House Republicans have worked closely with parents, teachers, and administration to protect children from inappropriate content in Iowa schools. We remain dedicated to continuing to deliver on our promise to protect Iowa's children.

Government Realignment

This week, the House passed a historic government realignment bill, taking the number of state departments from 37 to 16 and restructuring state government for the first time in nearly 40 years to better serve

Iowans. The 1,500 page bill, Senate File 514, was extensively reviewed by legislators and staff who also worked with state departments to ensure smooth transition and implementation of the consolidation. By aligning functions and services that provide the same services, taxpayers will have a more straightforward process to interact with the government and receive the essential services without unnecessarily going through several agencies in order to receive one service. This important proposal pools state resources, increases government efficiency, and saves taxpayer dollars.

City Council Meeting Minutes  
March 13, 2023

The regular meeting of the Modale City Council was held on March 13, 2023. Mayor James Cox called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m. Councilmembers present were Katie Offenbacher, Blair Adams, Terigene Tiffey, Kathy Dugdale, and Amber Larsen. Visitors present were, Troy Groth, Jason Pavlik, Jennifer Skinner, Ashley Hayes with SWIPCO, Dustin Wallis and Elissa Kappes family. Staff present were Marty Skinner, Linda Windschittl, and Shauna Gerke  
Consent Agenda: Offenbacher requested Gerke add contacting attorney re: Sundquist non-responsive to the special meeting minutes. Dugdale would like to see the King Foundation grant funds be moved out of the general fund listing and be itemized on the Clerk's report. Tiffey made a motion to approve the consent Agenda. Dugdale seconded; motion carried with a 5-0 vote.  
Marty Skinner reported on Public Works. The water lines and softeners were moved, the new tank will be here around the end of the month. He needs to get quotes to fix the drain north of the Diner. He will call again on the roads; the water tank issue has taken precedence. He'll get quotes on the streets and drain issues. He will start sampling the sewer lagoon soon in preparation for it to be drained for the Lagoon project.  
A discussion was had regarding the Lagoon project. Troy has the contract prepared; Dustin should have the bonds Wednesday. Once those are received, Troy

can finalize the contract and get it sent off to Argotsinger for review and approval. Ashley Hayes with SWIPCO expressed concern that it has taken three months to get a contract. The current project deadline is October, 21, 2023. IDEA-CDBG said it isn't an issue to extend; they are prepared to allow an extension to December 31, 2024. The City will be required to draft a letter requesting the extension, provide a Gantt chart, etc. Tiffey asked if there was a deadline to request the extension and Hayes reported they would need the request no less than 30 days before the current deadline, but 60 days is preferred. The Council would like to avoid an extension, if possible, but greatly appreciates the fact they are willing to provide one if it becomes necessary. Resolution 23-06 approving contract and performance and/or payment bonds for the Wastwater Treatment Lagoon Improvements Project was read. Larsen motioned to adopt said Resolution, Offenbacher seconded. Motion carried on a 5-0 vote. At 7:16 p.m. Mayor Cox opened the public hearing on the proposal to enter into a Sewer Revenue Loan Agreement. There was no public input on the matter, so Mayor Cox closed the hearing at 7:21 p.m. Resolution 23-07 authorizing and approving a Loan Agreement and providing for the issuance and securing the payment of a \$474,000 Taxable Sewer Revenue Note, Series 2023 was read. Tiffey made a motion to adopt said resolution, and Larsen seconded the motion. Motion carried on a 5-0 vote. There were no citizen inquiries. Jennifer Skinner reported for the Library. Book Club is going

great. They are awaiting bids for the storage room door, as well as one from Kirlin to wire a light to stay on overnight in the library. They are awaiting word to see if they will receive an AARP grant for a raised bed community garden area between the library and the Post Office. They are going to start a sun study of the area. Dee (Diane) requested another meeting on 3/14 or 3/21 at 7 p.m. Gerke reported that 3/14 wouldn't work, but that 3/21 was a possibility. Skinner also enquired about NextLink internet and whether or not it was installed as previously scheduled. It will be installed both at the Library and at the City Park on March 24th. Jason Pavlik reported for the Fire Department. They had one (1) fire and four (4) rescue calls last month. The thermal imaging camera has arrived, so the Jimmy King Foundation grant has been finalized. They will be hosting a soup supper on March 25th from 4-7 p.m., which is the same night as Mondamin's Fire Ball. They are also hosting an Easter Egg hunt on Saturday, April 8th at 10 a.m. Dugdale will share the details on the City's FB page. Jason asked that Linda get the City's budget listed on the Fire Department's spreadsheet. Danko is working on the pumper. A discussion was had regarding looking at "new" pumpers and how to pay for them. He and the Council asked that Gerke reach out to the surrounding Townships for additional information. There was discussion, but no action taken, regarding Ordinances, the Heartland Co-Op property switch, the AFR report, project needs, and the requisition form. The Employee Handbook looks good. Move forward as is.

Offenbacher shared the new quote for a 96" slide for approximately \$17,000, installed. This will be paid with grant money. It can be installed before the end of April. Adams made a motion to move forward with the purchase. Tiffey seconded. Motion passed 5-0. Postings were made in the usual posting places regarding bids for the apartment above the post office as well as the windows, doors and general concrete work around the Legion Hall. One bid has been received on the apartment project. Cleanup days have tentatively been set for May 6, 2023, depending on availability. Council asked that the date be approved by Marty. Ronnie Schulz and Mark Long were not in attendance. The flag has been replaced outside of City Hall. The contract with the Harrison County Sheriff for the 2023-2024 fiscal year was reviewed. Offenbacher made a motion to enter into said contract, and Dugdale seconded. Motion passed on a 5-0 vote. Dugdale secured a grant from the Harrison County Community Foundation via the Community Foundations of Southwest Iowa for handicap accessible sidewalks around the Veteran's Memorial Plaza (to the west of the Legion Hall). Knott Brings Pelvic Health Physical Therapy to CHI Health

MISSOURI VALLEY, IA – When Marissa Knott was a senior in high school, every parents'worst nightmare happened: A severe car accident. Knott spent just under a week in the hospital. The wreck resulted in a dislocated neck, which, in turn, led to torn ligaments and bleeding andswelling in her spine. Surgery left her with four screws and a plate in her neck, but she escaped neurological deficits. That's when she knew she wanted to use her second chance in life to help heal others through rehabilitation. Now, after graduating from the University of Nebraska Medical Center with a doctorate in Physical Therapy, and after serving CHI Health's Woodbine Clinic since 2020 as a physical therapist, she is bringing a new service to Harrison County: Pelvic Health.

Pelvic Health physical therapy is a conservative approach to treat pelvic floor dysfunction, including bladder, bowel, and sexual dysfunctions, as well as chronic pelvic, low back, and hip pain. Knott explained that the pelvic floor muscle group sits like a sling within the pelvis and provides pelvic organ support and stability. “Physical therapists are experts in muscles and physical function. The pelvic floor is an intricate system of muscles and can be addressed by physical therapy techniques such as strengthening, stretching, relaxation, and mobilization,” Knott explained when asked why she would choose this area of expertise. “Specialized services such as pelvic health physical therapy require additional training including extensive

study and coursework to specialize in treating individuals with pelvic health conditions.” Pelvic health physical therapy, according to Knott, is an underserved area of the medical field in rural areas, with the closest option, prior to her specialization, was in Council Bluffs. “I am a firm believer you shouldn't have to travel such a distance for great medical care,” she said. This is the first time pelvic health physical therapy has been available in Harrison County. “I am proud of Marissa and excited that we are able to offer this new service,” CHI Health Missouri Valley President David Jones said. “We are working hard to continue to grow our services and enhance the health in the lives of those that live in Harrison County. Dedicated employees, like Marissa, who are passionate about what they do, is one of the reasons why we're able to continue this growth.”

Knott is currently accepting pelvic health patients at the CHI Health Woodbine Clinic. Appointments are available by calling (712) 642-2179. In the future, Knott will also be providing educational classes to the public, free of charge, to “spread knowledge of a commonly misunderstood part of the body” and how she is able to help through pelvic health physical therapy. To continue to grow her area of expertise, she will also be attending a Pelvic Health Conference in May, hosted in a joint effort between CHI Health and Creighton University. “I am both excited and proud to be offering this service. I truly believe it will make a huge difference in so many people's lives,” Knott said.

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# Hawkeyes fly to new heights - records fall - state dreams reached

Record-setting WH boys basketball team reaches 2023 Class 1A State Semifinals

Five individuals working as one, making the extra pass, setting screens, shutting down the opponents’ best player, boxing out for a key rebound, winning the hustle points by chasing down all the loose balls. This is the formula any basketball coach looks to execute during any basketball season.

The West Harrison coaches and players have dedicated the past 10 years to playing in Omaha Sports Association club ball, summer leagues and weekend tournaments. The commitment these players made proved that the time invested pays off in the end.

Their effort was paid off, as West Harrison has finished the past two seasons in the Class 1A State Basketball Tournament at Wells Fargo Arena in Des Moines.

“If we each did our part and played our role, we knew success would follow,” stated Hawkeyes’ Sage Evans. “We knew we would only get better with time. Even after losing Grant (Gilgen) and Brecken

(Pavlik) as sophomores, we knew we if we kept working, great things would come.”

The Hawkeye ‘Fab-Five’ seniors, Walker Rife, Sage Evans, Brady Melby, Koleson Evans and Mason King, slowly worked their way into the varsity line-up. The four years before they entered high school (2015-16 through 2018-19), they had a combined record of 27-63. In the past four years (2019-20 through 2022-23), they combined for a 74-24 mark. Plus they set multiple school records along the way.

“The school records were just the icing on the cake,” stated Sage Evans. “We didn’t care who had the points, rebounds, steals or assists. The only stat we cared about was the final score on the scoreboard – All we wanted to do was win.”

“When we came in as freshmen, we knew we could do some big things because we had a lot of success when we were younger,” stated Brady Melby. “We’ve been playing with each other since the second/third grade, we just needed to believe and trust the process. Everyone had a role on this team and we knew

what we needed to do.”

“As freshmen, we just wanted to help the team anyway we could, as we played our roles and did what was best,” added Walker Rife. “If we challenged the varsity, it helps us all down the road, improving both our strengths and weaknesses.”

Along the way, West Harrison took the area by storm, by winning three straight Rolling Valley Conference titles, three straight Class 1A District finals appearances, two straight sub-state finals victories, and back-to-back Substate victories. West Harrison made their first appearance in the Class 1A State Tournament in 2022, and made a repeat trip in 2023, capturing the school’s first state tournament victory in school history with an 87-61 win over Dunkerton.

“The best part of the season and last four years was how great it was to revive the community and all of our elementary fans,” Sage Evans added. “We proved what can happen if you work hard, and hopefully we’re in the crowd someday cheering for them.”

Sage Evans added, “The community backing was amazing, as it was an awesome to experience all those moments in history with my best friends, who are like brothers to me. I could not ask for any better teammates.”

“It was awesome to see so much school pride from within the community, especially from

the elementary,” added Melby. “You don’t realize how much they look up to you, and we really got to see that the last couple of years. It was an awesome experience to go cheer for them at their little league games on a Saturday. They thought it was amazing that we came and watched them.”

“We had to contribute a lot as sophomores, and earning the school’s first conference title was huge,” Rife added. “We played our roles and did what was best for the team. We were constantly the underdogs, and that drove us harder. The community and even the elementary got behind us, and we proved if we outwork and out hustle our opponents, we could be among the best.”

## School Records

This past four-year run, West Harrison has rewritten the school-record board by setting over 20 new single-game, single season, and career individual records, and another 10-plus team records.

“Once we had the games in hand, because winning was the first priority, we’d do everything we could to help the individual reach their individual school record,” Sage Evans added. “We knew they were close before we started the game, but we wanted the victory first.”

“We knew if we played as a team, the records

would come,” Melby stated. “We just wanted to win, we worked together as a group and took on any and all challengers. Once we took care of the win, we wanted to make sure our teammate would get the record. It was fun to be apart of it and see them achieve it.”

“The school records are not what drove us, all they did was add to our confidence,” Rife added. “We wanted to play our best, advance, and keep playing as long as we could.”

## Best Memory

“Hands down, when we beat AHSTW in the substate final our junior year, the atmosphere was great,” stated Sage Evans. “It was standing room only, and the noise level was out of this world. We were huge underdogs, and no one picked us to win, and that made it all the sweeter.

“It has to be the District Semifinal win over Tri-Center, the Mason McIntosh for three buzzer-beater,” stated Melby. “It was the best feeling ever, so exciting to do it on our home floor in front of our home crowd. It has been a blast to be on two consecutive state tournament teams, and part of the first state tournament win in school history.”

“Mine will be that night at Thomas Jefferson High School,” stated Rife. “The atmosphere that night was unreal, just like it was earlier in our state win over Dunkerton. It was amaz-

ing.”

## Final Thoughts

Sage Evans concluded, “It has been so cool to have the same coach, my dad, since we were little. The coaches invest so much time and make the ride that much more enjoyable. It just goes to show you, hard work will pay off, and it will help you get where you want to be.”

Brady Melby finished up, “The process did not just happen, as we’ve been considered the underdog for so many years, especially against AHSTW. Our team mentality used that to help drive us to success that past couple of years, and we accepted the challenge to beat the better team. If you work hard and believe in yourself and your teammates, anything and everything is possible. I can’t thank Coach Rowdy Evans and all the coaching staff enough. He’s one of the good ones, and has always encouraged all of us to believe in our own self-worth.”

“I’m a teacher assistant for my mom, and these kids look up to us,” Rife concluded. “They made us feel like ‘ballers’, and it made you smile knowing you were having such a positive impact. I just keep saying, don’t try to just improve yourself, help out a friend or a teammate. If you’re both interested, you grow together, you work together, and it means more in the end.”

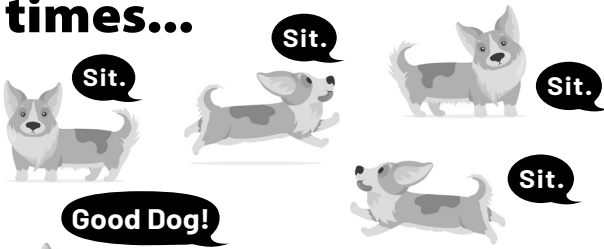

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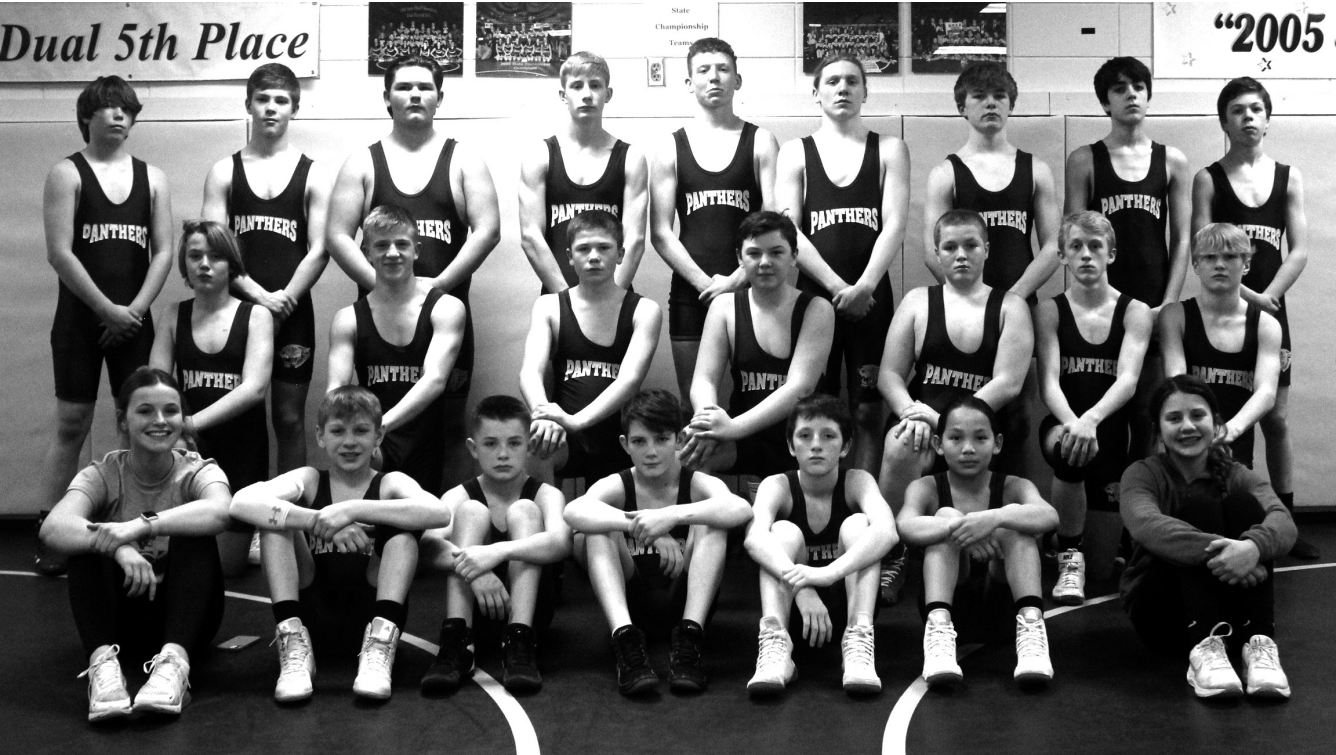
