# Foreign exchange student set to depart Missouri Valley

Emma Baes sits cheerily in the warm-lit living room of her host family. She's excited to be speaking about her journey as her year away from home comes to a close. Soon, she'll return to her home of Brussels, in Belgium, and say goodbye to her host family, the foreign exchange student program she's a part of and the little Iowa town of Missouri Valley that's been her home for the past 10 months.

When asked why she decided to join the foreign exchange student program and leave home for a year,

Baes said, "A lot of my friends were doing it, too, so I knew if I wasn't doing it I will be kind of be alone in my country, because everyone else was leaving."

The opportunity to immerse herself in the English language is also an invaluable experience to Baes, especially when she considers her career and future.

"It's really something to do when you speak French to learn English because everyone in the world speaks English," she said.

At first there were some difficult things to adapt to.

Growing up in rural Manilla, Iowa, Vennink went to school at North Missouri State University before transferring to Wayne State in Wayne, Neb., and earning his degree.



# Robbery takes place at Mondamin bank

STAFF REPORTS

On May 3, 2023, at approximately 9:29 a.m., the Harrison County Communication Center received a notification of a robbery at Midstates Bank located in Mondamin. Law enforcement was then dispatched to the scene.

An investigation into the robbery found that a suspect entered the lobby of the bank, displayed a firearm and demanded money from bank employees.

According to a release provided by Harrison County Sheriff Brandon Doiel, "The suspect is described as being approximately six feet tall, thin build, wearing a dark-colored full face mask, light-colored jacket with hood, dark-colored pants, gloves and a backpack."

After collecting money, the

suspect exited the building and headed north by foot through the alley located on the east side of the bank.

The Harrison County Sheriff's Office is working alongside the Federal Bureau of Investigation to resolve the incident. The investigation is ongoing at this



As she drove, her thoughts centered on the day ahead—the last

day of school before summer vacation. It was a special day for her

fifteen students who had shared the one room school of Boomer Township #3 for the last nine months. Ranging in age from five to thirteen, she loved every one of them like family. They had grown, studied and learned together.

The youngsters deserved a fun day and the young teacher was determined to give them one. The Chevy Coupe bounced over the potholes in the dirt road. At last, she arrived at the place just off main street in Missouri Valley. The owner hurried out lugging a huge canvas-covered bundle. He placed it in the back. "There you go, Miss Bertelson. I hope your kids enjoy it."

"Oh, they will." The woman smiled. She paid the man and included a deposit on the containers. It took a chunk out of her \$60 a month paycheck, but it was such a treat for the children, it was worth it.

She jounced the six miles back to the school, unlocked and prepared for the day. The students had decorated the classroom in a circus theme. Colorful drawings of tigers, elephants and clowns framed the slate blackboard. They had cleaned and scrubbed their desks the day before.

The teacher carried in the chocolate cake and cookies that she and her mother and sister had baked the night before. She made another trip with water, lemons and sugar for lemonade.

Tires crunched on the driveway. Families arrived, carrying covered bowls, hampers and cardboard boxes. Men took the front door off its hinges and laid it over sawhorses, making a serving table. Soon, smells of fried chicken, meatballs, baked beans and apple pie melded deliciously.

Adults paged through scrapbooks on display at the recitation bench. Every August the teacher handed out blank booklets and proudly watched her students fill them with their best work. Parents, grandparents, friends and neighbors wandered through the school, admiring the artwork and complimenting the children and the teacher. The whole community gathered for this special day.

Soon it was time to eat. The women fetched plates, silverware and cups they had brought and handed them out to their family. With full plates, the party-goers sat together on steps, at tables or in the student

desks. They chatted and laughed. The bell on the roof nearly rang itself with all the happiness that rose up from that little schoolhouse.

A traditional game of kittenball followed, with the men and kids joining in. Swings and jump ropes had no time to be still. Inside, the women chatted cheerfully.

Just when the day couldn't get any better, the teacher asked two men to bring out her surprise. She unwrapped the thick canvas blanket and prepared to scoop from the five-gallon tin of Gillette's ice cream! Everyone rushed to their stashes for bowls and spoons. Some requested two scoops. Some came back for another bowlful.

One little girl, about 4, peeked shyly around her mommy's skirt. The teacher knelt down. "Would you like some ice cream?" The child nodded, her brown eyes sparkling.

The mother thanked the teacher. "This is so nice. Such a treat! She has never had ice cream before."

The schoolteacher watched as the little girl slid into a small desk. She used her fist to dip the spoon into the creamy whiteness and then tasted it with her tongue. Heaven shone on that little face. The teacher's heart melted.

Everyone pitched in to put the schoolhouse back in order. With hugs and thanks, the content-

ed crowd filed out the door. The teacher found herself alone again. She emptied the crockery water cooler in the hall and brought in the flag.

On her drive to town to return the ice cream containers, the woman looked back on the special day and smiled. In three months, she would return to her one-room schoolhouse. Some of the students would be back for another year. New children would come – like the shy little girl today.

The teacher found herself looking forward to the next year. Maybe she would find more reasons for the special surprise. It was, after all, the teacher's treat!



Oops! say "oops" a lot. And even when I don't say it out loud, I think "oops" a lot. Every slip of the tongue, every misstep and every misplaced item is an oops. It's why pencils have erasers and oops is always on the tips of our ongues. And not to be too harsh about it. Oops is sometimes "oopsy dialsy," the more playful rendition of "oops" when we mean that we've nade a mistake but it doesn't amount to much, or when we're trying to leip the child who just tripped and we think they're on the verge of tears. When we have really messed up it requires more than saying "oops" or my bad." When we have really messed a mess of things or done omething horrible which hurts someone deeply we need to beg their orgiveness, and this may require sincere words of apology and a fair mount of groveling. 

Now, as an Operations found out that wasn't Technician and Park Ranger, Vennink's job

offers a variety of duties. "We're kind of jacks of all trades, and that's one nice thing about this line of work," he said. "I can do law enforcement, this week we're doing a cooperative burn week in the Loess Hills so you can do firefighting, you might be doing carpentry one day and plumbing or electrical the next, reverse. Sometimes we or groundskeeping. And you deal with the public using the areas, and you get to meet some really great people."

Finding people that want to do this is getting harder, but maybe that'll change."

With HCCB, though, Vennink feels fortunate to be with an entity that fits his values.

ognition for his 25 years with HCCB, Vennink said it is simply a testament to the county he works in, as he remains passionate and fits in well with the job and





pinged in a field near County Road P26 in the DeSoto bend area. His car was still parked in the lot when first responders arrived.

Members of the Omaha

Police Department assisted with the search on Thursday, as well, providing drones and the ABLE-1 helicopter. A LifeNet helicopter also made the rounds over the area. Later that night, Harrison County K-9 assisted, but was unsuc-

cessful in locating Harvey.

# **BAES:** Foreign exchange student set to depart Missouri Valley

Baes wasn't used to American food—the fat content caused her stomach pain for a long time in the beginning. Restaurant etiquette also confused her—back home in Belgium, going out to a restaurant was a formal affair one dressed up for. Here in America, she was surprised by the casual clothes her and her host family went to dinner in, as well as the price of tips given to wait staff. In her home country, they would never pay more than two to five euros in tips. On top of all that, her independence was also severely limited.

In Belgium, the urban landscape and the train allowed her to go anywhere she wanted with her friends or by herself. She didn't need a car, and the age to get a license is 18 in Belgium, so Baes couldn't drive when she came to America. Instead, she had to rely on her host parents, Dave and Diana Hodges, and her friends to drive her where she needed to go. Her new rural landscape didn't have the same easy access as her home did. as there was no area she could simply walk to on her own. Staying in became more of a normal habit for Baes.

The cold was another obstacle. Changing the degrees from fahrenheit to celsius on an app called Weather Bug, Baes watched the Iowa winter temperature drop to the negatives and wondered how people could survive such a cold season. The weather was 30 to 40 degrees

colder than back home in Belgium.

Her biggest acclimation was getting used to her family and friends not being around. At times she grew homesick. Her surroundings might not look much like her home, and she was grateful to escape that reminder, but in her eyes, "People are people. People are the same." And she grew to miss the people she knew the most.

"I went to a time when I was homesick last month and you can't do anything," Baes said. "You want to go home and get over everything, so some people get home when they have that, but I was trying to have my mindset, 'you can do it, you can do it.' It makes you grow up, I feel, to have to do that."

It wasn't all difficult though. Baes found her new classes easy and

pleasant, though the school schedule was new to her. In Belgium, she didn't go to classes for eight hours a day for five days a week. Instead, her schedule was fixed to resemble college—she had different classes during different days of the weeks that lasted for different hours, and she had more control over what she wanted to study. She could choose to spend two hours a week focusing on a single subject, five hours or seven hours. Here in America, she didn't have that same control.

She was also surprised by the lack of focus on politics in her new classes. In Belgium she studied politics intensely – those of her own country and others.

"We learn a lot about politics," Baes said about her home country. "I feel like sometimes I know more about (American)

politics then some people able to be so far away here because of the class I had. Also, I have easy class here, so I don't really know how they learn."

The lack of interest in the subject of politics surprised her, as well.

School was far more than just classes for Baes, though. She involved herself in as many sports as possible. In Belgium, there was no time in between her studies for sports, and if she wanted to play sports she would have to join a club and pay a fee. In America, she took the opportunity to play as much as she could — basketball, cheerleading, soccer. She even attended her little host sister's gymnastics events, and would yell at her request, "Go my little chicken!" in French as her host sister per-

formed. Now Baes' year in America comes to a close. When she reflects back, she thinks about what she has accomplished.

"English, first, of course," Baes said. "But also maturity, like being from my home, it makes me be more able to do stuff by myself and other stuff. For example, if I have a situation and I'm upset and want to call my mom, I can't since the time is so different. I can't call her and say, 'What am I doing? Can you help me?' She's not here, so I need to figure it out by myself. Yes, I have my host family and they can help me, but I'm more making my own decisions."

Originally Baes had hoped to find a host family in California or Florida. Iowa was not a place she'd even heard of before, and she'd wanted to go someplace warm and balmy.

She doesn't regret ending up in Missouri Valley, though.

"I think I would never have the same experience if I went to California, because it's more like my country, the way people live, but here I feel most of American people live like this, so I really feel the experience of living like American people," Baes said.

To top it all off, Baes' host parents have a visit to Europe planned to see her again. She will be their tour guide as they explore Brussels and Paris, and then they will see Rome and some other stops before returning to Baes and heading home.

Baes has left a mark on the Hodges family, and in so, a mark on Missouri Valley. Missouri Valley has also left its mark on her, and as eager and excited as she is to get home, she is also sad to see this time in her life go.

"It's for sure sad because I know that coming back (to Missouri Valley) won't be for a long, long time," Baes said. "...Like I knew I was going to come home, but it's also super exciting."




