Kragel brothers receive Quilts of Valor

The Quilt of Valor Foundation's mission is to cover service members and veterans touched by war with comforting and healing quilts. As representatives of the foundation, St. John's LWML in Charter Oak was honored to present Quilts of Valor to a very distinguished military family.

Don and Judy Kragel have four sons whom all served in the military as well as their father Don. The LWML ladies presented Don with a Quilt of Valor in 2022.

On Sunday, Nov. 2, a Quilt of Valor was presented their son, Barry, as he served 23 years in the United States Marine Corp. On Sunday, Nov. 9, their other three sons: Bradley, Bret and Brian, were each honored with a Quilt of Valor.

Barry Kragel

While Barry Lee Kragel was attending Iowa State, he enlisted in the United States Marine Corps. He received his Basic Marine Training at Quantico, VA, also attending Officer Candidate School and Platoon Leaders Training at this location.

In 1985, Barry graduated from Iowa State and was also commissioned a Second Lieutenant in the United States Marine Corps.

He then attended Naval Aviation Flight Training at Pensacola, FL and in 1987

received his "Wings of Gold." Barry was recognized for Superior Performance and placed on the Commodores List with Distinction.

Barry completed nearly four years of training as an Attack Helicopter Pilot flying the AH-1W Super Cobra. His tour then included deployment to the South Pacific with operations in Okinawa, the Philippines, Korea, Japan and Australia, which also included combat operations as part of Desert Shield and Desert Storm. He spent over seven months in the deserts of Saudi Arabia, Kuwait and Iraq flying over 40 combat missions. Barry received excellence awards in air-to-ground rockets and bombing as well as air-to-air maneuvering.

In 1992, Captain Kragel undertook Jet Transition Training and became an F/A-18 "Hornet" Pilot which he remained for 11 years and six months.

On March 1, 1996, Barry was promoted to Major with the United States Marine Corps. He transferred to Miramar, CA for nearly two years where he was assigned a Fleet Readiness Squadron that trains the "new guys" to fly the F/A-18.

Being assigned as an Executive Officer, Operations Officer and Maintenance

Garrett Brown's father, Casey Brown, visited their 4th Grade classroom on Veterans Day (November 11) to talk about his current role in the US Air Force along with being one of the MVAOCOU High School Science teachers.

He still attends guard duties one weekend a month and training for a couple weeks out of the year. He had been deployed overseas a few times over the course of his enlistment, but the most recent was just last year for a duration of six months from June through December.

Garrett said, "My Dad was able to come home just in time to celebrate Christmas with my mom and three older siblings (Ella, George and Ashley). We were happy that he

was with us. It was really special!"

Henry Kelm's father, Matthew Kelm, visited the classroom the next day on November 12 to talk about his past experience in the US Army. He brought his old backpack, helmet and some uniforms that he wore during Operation Iraqi Freedom. He was deployed a few times during that duration and the longest was 16 months overseas.

Henry mentioned, "Before we were born, my Mom and Dad would write letters to each other from Iowa to Iraq. They still have the letters in a box. So much has changed with technology within the past 20 years!"

Both men spoke about how proud they are to be veterans, the determination and sacrifice it takes to serve the United States of America and the help of their family which kept them going through the tough times.

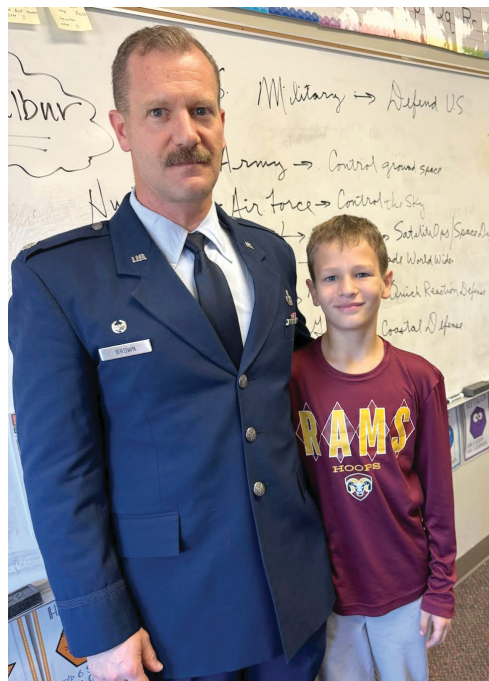

THE WHITING

"LIGHT CHAMPION" BICYCLE



THE BICYCLE

According to the Whiting family, longtime owners of The Mapleton Trust & Savings Bank, later named Valley Bank & Trust, Charles I. Whiting, who started the bank, rode this bike from Onawa to Mapleton in the late 1800s. The bank was eventually owned by four generations of the Whiting Family. The bike was often seen in various community parades through the years.

C.I. WHITING

Charles I. Whiting was born in Alabama and came to Monona County with his parents in 1858. He graduated from Onawa High School and attended business colleges in Dubuque and Des Moines. Following in his father's footsteps, Mr. Whiting with his uncle Baxter Whiting came to the new settlement of East Mapleton in 1877 and established Whiting & Company hardware store. In October 1878, The Mapleton Bank was organized in one corner of the hardware store. Mr. Whiting became the bank president in 1894 holding that position until his death in 1944. In 1879, he married Flora Giddings and they had two daughters and one son. In 1895, at the age of 36, Mrs. Whiting died. At the time of her death pledges were being secured to build an Episcopal Church in Mapleton. Charles I. Whiting chose to provide the funding, as a memorial to his wife, for the construction of this building (the current museum) - Trinity Memorial Episcopal Church. Mr. Whiting's son, Charles G. Whiting's funeral was the last service held in this building. Charles I. Whiting, his son Charles G. Whiting, grandson James G. Whiting, and great-grandsons James T. Whiting and Craig Whiting were actively involved in the bank's operation, members of this church and made numerous contributions to the history of the community.

BANK LOGO

In 1990, The Mapleton Trust & Savings Bank was in the midst of year-long expansion and remodeling project. At this time it decided to adopt a logo for the bank. In selecting a



logo the Whiting family wanted a unique logo that tied it's earliest years to the present. The perfect choice for the new logo was the Light Champion bicycle. Following a complete restoration of the bike, in October 1990 the Whiting's big wheel bicycle was adopted as the logo and immediately it appeared on customer's checks, deposit slips, bank statements, stationary, and other bank documents. And as a part of the remodeling of the bank the bicycle went on display overlooking the bank lobby. The historic bike remained the logo for thirty years until it was replaced in January 2020. At that time the bicycle went on display here in the church building built by C. I. Whiting who had ridden the bicycle to Mapleton over 120 years before. He certainly never expected his prized bicycle would one day be displayed in his church, nor that this building would become a museum.

THE COMPANY

The Light Champion bicycle was made in Chicago by Gormully & Jeffery Mfg. Co. The company was established in 1879 as the first company in the west to produce bicycles. This bicycle was most likely made in the late 1870s or 1880s. The only markings found on the bicycle are the name of the company and the patent date, November 27, 1877, stamped on the edge of each pedal. It is interesting to note that the patent date, November 27, 1877, was exactly two days before Volume 1 Number 1 of The Mapleton Standard was published. This was the first newspaper printed in the new town of East Mapleton and a number of years later it became The Mapleton Press.

The company was sold to the American Bicycle Company in 1900. Mr. Jeffrey sold out so that he could focus on entering the automobile business producing the Rambler automobile. He started mass-production of automobiles in 1902 producing the second most automobiles in the U.S. at the time just behind Oldsmobile. By the end of the first year of producing automobiles Rambler had turned out 1,500 cars, one-sixth of all the existing cars in the U. S. at that time.

A View from the Hill... Peyton's Senior Season on the Volleyball Court

Volleyball has been in Peyton's blood since she was born.

Peyton's mom, Jamie, was the setter, and her stepmom (my sister), Kendra, was a back row specialist my senior year of high school. The year after I graduated high school Jamie and Kendra qualified for the state volleyball tournament. I'm not bitter for or anything. Note: they also dropped down to Class 1A.

I have always loved that Peyton is left handed just like me. She spent most of her career playing on the right side (just like me) but switched to an outside hitter her junior and senior year. It is different seeing her hit on the outside with her left hand.

Over the last three seasons, I have been able to watch a lot of Peyton's games thanks to Hudl (on the internet). I still find it hard to say "Let's Go Cougars."

I hadn't watched her play "in-person" since her sophomore season (September 2023 at the Woodbury Central tournament).

The farthest western game on her senior schedule this season was in Storm Lake in mid-September. My girls and I made the trip and got to watch her play two games that night.

After watching Manson-NWW play Storm Lake St. Mary's, they faced East Sac. When I was in high school East Sac was WLVA (Wall Lake View Auburn), one of our biggest rivals. One thing hasn't changed over the years with East Sac/WLVA, the play isn't over until it's over because they are so scrappy and make impossible plays.

I couldn't believe how much better the seniors have gotten since watching them as sophomores. It was way better watching them in-person.

I love watching Peyton dive and roll in the back row. It brought back memories of me diving around. One time, I hit my hip so hard on the floor, my coach asked if I was going to get back up.

While Peyton is a good hitter, it is her passing that impresses me the most.

I remember one game in high school when I was having a bad night passing and it showed on my face. Our assistant coach Mrs. Brobst said, "passing is an attitude." You have look like you want every pass to come to you and believe that every pass is going to be a good pass. You have to confidence have in yourself.

There are lessons I learned from playing volleyball that I still think about everyday and try to teach my 3rd, 4th, and 5th grade players like you don't end on a missed serve, end on a good one so that is the one you will remember.

I even run some of the same drills that I did in high school as I had the 5th grade girls serve and run. Mr. Voith (my head coach) would have been proud of me as he made us do that drill many times.

Just a few days after we watched Peyton play in Storm Lake, she got hurt chasing down a ball. She had to miss about three weeks of her senior season which was hard on her.

She was able to make it back for their first round Regional game. She was hitting at full power then hit some roll shots then would tip. She had the complete hitter tool box working. There were moments when

you could tell it had been a few weeks since she played.

With the win, Manson advanced to play 45-1 No. 1 ranked Denver in the semi-finals. Lets say Denver was No. 1 for a reason. It was even fitting that the final play of Peyton's high school career was her diving after a ball.

Interesting fact, six schools from the North Iowa Cedar League Conference (Aplington-Parkersburg, Denver, Dike-New Hartford, Gladbrook-Reinbeck (1A) Grundy Center, Wapsie Valley) advanced to the state volleyball tournament.

I love that Iowa Public Television (Iowa PBS) airs the Iowa High School girls State Championship game (both on air and on-line). It give people the ability who can't make it to Coralville the ability to watch these talented Iowa student-athletes.

In addition to writing about Peyton's senior season, I have to write about watching the Class 2A State Championship game on Nov. 6 as Denver vs. Hinton. What a game. Hinton came up just short as Denver won their second-straight title winning 25-22, 26-28, 21-25, 25-18, and 15-11.

Watching Hinton's Bailey Boeve performance in the championship game was special. She missed the State Tournament last year due to a knee injury ended her season early.

The Creighton recruit made up for it as she finished the 2025 State Tournament with tournament-leading 96 kills (28 in the quarterfinals, 30 in the semi-finals, and 28 in the championship), a hitting efficiency of .368 and she collected 38 digs.

While some of her kills could have left a hole in the floor because of her power; it was everything else she that impressed me. I think Bailey was more excited when her teammates got a kill then she got a kill of her own. She was diving all over the floor for every ball. She even had to run around the line judge on a play. Her passing was perfect.

You could just see the excitement on her face with every point no matter who scored the point because it was for the team, a team trying to win a State Championship.

If you have a daughter that wants to be a leader, have them re-watch Hinton's Bailey Boeve's performance in the championship game.

Making Personalized Treasures

Dennis Muckey has always had a passion for woodworking ever since he took industrial arts class in high school. He has built a number of furniture pieces that are still in use in his house including a roll top desk, a corner entertainment center, a chest of drawers, and a bookshelf with drawers. He added a new skill in his woodworking hobby when he learned to use the laser to engrave images into wood.

Muckey became aware of what a laser was when Dennis Benson, (former FFA advisor at MVAO School), ordered one for his class in 2006.

"I learned by watching him and Brett Schrank when they were setting up a project to be lasered," he said. "After about a month I was able to set a project up by myself and lasered my first plaque."

He was able to use the school's laser for 14 years. During that time one of the things that he made was the 3-ring wooden notebooks. Muckey said he has had made over 100 notebooks that he has given (can't use the school's equipment for profit) to graduating seniors, to Missionaries, wedding gifts, friends and family.

"I have notebooks in Papua New Guinea, Beijing, China, Leipzig, Germany, Innsbruck, Austria, and Nairobi, Kenya East Africa," he said. "I also made one for: President Barack Obama, Governor Kim Reynolds, Senator Joni Ernst, Tom Brady, Brandon Scherff, Caitlin

Clark, and Copper DeJean."

One of his first laser project was lasering a bible verse on 200 crosses that he took on a mission trip to Kenya, East Africa that he handed out to the children.

Then COVID-19 pandemic hit and Muckey retired, he wasn't able to use it anymore.

It was in July of 2021 that Muckey found an Epilog Laser in Madison, Wisconsin. He asked a friend to go with him and they left Mapleton at 3 a.m. drove

up to get it and returned back by 7:30 p.m. that evening.

Muckey can laser on wood, metal, plastic, glass, leather, stainless steel, granite, or flat stone; any size up to and including 20" X 24" X 9"; coffee mugs, glass jars, bar glasses, cutting boards, rifle stocks, or metal business cards.

"Now that I'm retired it keeps me connected with people and the community," he said. "I look forward to seeing the people come and pick up their projects that they had me make for them."

Muckey gets at great satisfaction in making the pumpkin, turkey, Christmas trees, and Easter Egg cutouts to give to the first-grade students for them to decorate during the holiday seasons.





CITY OF UTE – SNOW NOTICES

3-3-33 PARKING DURING SNOW EMERGENCY. No person shall park, abandon, or leave unattended any vehicle on any public street, alley, or City-owned off-street parking area during any snow emergency proclaimed by the Mayor unless the snow has been removed or plowed from said street, alley or parking area and the snow has ceased to fall. A snow emergency parking ban shall continue from its proclamation through the duration of the snow or ice storm and the forty-eight hour period after cessation of the storm except as above provided upon streets which have been fully opened.

3-3-31 AUTHORITY TO IMPOUND VEHICLES. Members of the police department are authorized to remove, or cause to be removed, a vehicle from a street, public alley, or highway to the nearest garage or other place of safety, or to a garage designated or maintained by the police department, or otherwise maintained by the City, under the following circumstances:...

6-8-3 CLEANING SNOW, ICE, AND ACCUMULATIONS. It shall be the duty of the owner to keep sidewalks abutting the owner's property clear of the natural accumulations of snow or ice. If the owner fails to do so within twenty four (24) hours after deposit of accumulation, the Mayor may have the natural accumulations of snow or ice removed without notice to the property owner. The Mayor shall give the Council an itemized and verified statement of the removal costs and a legal description of the property at the next regular Council meeting. The costs shall be reviewed by the Council, and if found correct, shall be assessed against the property as taxes. The City Clerk shall be directed to certify the costs to the County Treasurer for collection as provided in Section 364.12 of the Code of Iowa.

Officer for the Marine All-Weather Fighter Attack Squadron, Barry was flying combat missions as part of Operation Southern Watch as the squadron deployed to support Operation Enduring Freedom over Afghanistan.

After serving 23 years with the United States Marine Corps, Barry retired on July 31, 2006 as a Lieutenant Colonel.

With a transfer to Camp Pendleton, CA in April of 2002, for two years Barry Kragel was assigned as an Operational Planner. City of Mapleton
ORDINANCE NO. 490
AMENDING SCOPE OF BICYCLE REGULATIONS IN THE MAPLETON CITY CODE TO INCLUDE ELECTRICAL BICYCLES AND PEDESTRIAN CONVEYANCES
 WHEREAS, the City of Mapleton regulates bicycle use on City streets and public paths set aside for the exclusive use of bicycles, WHEREAS, the scope of the City of Mapleton's bicycle regulations codified at City Ordinance 76.01, does not currently include electrical bicycles or pedestrian conveyances, WHEREAS, the City of Mapleton has determined that electrical bicycles and pedestrian conveyances are substantially similar to standard bicycles and should be regulated under the same Code Chapter of the Mapleton Bicycle Ordinances, **THEREFORE, BE IT ENACTED**, by the City Council, City of Mapleton, Iowa Chapter 76, Sections 76.01-76.13 is amended to read as follows:
Section 76.01 SCOPE OF REGULATIONS. These regulations shall apply whenever a bicycle or pedestrian conveyance is operated upon any street or upon any public path set aside for the exclusive use of bicycles or pedestrian conveyances, subject to those exceptions stated herein. When used in this Code Chapter, the term bicycle shall include "bicycle" and "low-speed electric bicycle" as defined below. The term "pedestrian conveyance" shall have the definition as defined below.

A "bicycle" which shall be a device having two or three wheels and having at least one saddle or seat for the use of a rider which is propelled by human power; A "low-speed electric bicycle," which shall have the same meaning as it is defined by Iowa Code § 321.1(36A), or any successor statute, as may be amended by the Iowa Legislature from time-to-time;
 A "pedestrian conveyance," which shall have the same meaning as it is defined by Iowa Code § 321.1(51A), or any successor statute, as may be amended by the Iowa Legislature from time-to-time.
Section 76.02 TRAFFIC CODE APPLIES. Every person riding a bicycle or pedestrian conveyance upon a roadway shall be granted all of the rights and shall be subject to all of the duties applicable to the driver of a vehicle by the laws of the State declaring rules of the road applicable to vehicles or by the Traffic Code of the City applicable to the driver of a vehicle, except as to those provisions that by their nature can have no application. Whenever such person dismounts from a bicycle or pedestrian conveyance, the person shall be subject to all regulations applicable to pedestrians.
76.03 DOUBLE RIDING RESTRICTED. A person propelling a bicycle or pedestrian conveyance shall not ride other than astride a permanent and regular seat attached thereto. No bicycle or pedestrian conveyance shall be used to carry more persons at one time than the number for which it is

designed and equipped.
76.04 TWO ABREAST LIMIT. Persons riding bicycles or pedestrian conveyances upon a roadway shall not ride more than two abreast except on paths or parts of roadways set aside for the exclusive use of bicycles or pedestrian conveyances. All bicycles or pedestrian conveyances ridden on the roadway shall be kept to the right and shall be operated as near as practicable to the right-hand edge of the roadway.
76.05 SPEED. No person shall operate a bicycle or pedestrian conveyance at a speed greater than is reasonable and prudent under the conditions then existing.
76.06 EMERGING FROM ALLEY OR DRIVEWAY. The operator of a bicycle or pedestrian conveyance emerging from an alley, driveway or building shall, upon approaching a sidewalk or the sidewalk area extending across any alleyway, yield the right-of-way to all pedestrians approaching on said sidewalk or sidewalk area, and upon entering the roadway shall yield the right-of-way to all vehicles approaching on said roadway.
76.07 CARRYING ARTICLES. No person operating a bicycle or pedestrian conveyance shall carry any package, bundle or article that prevents the rider from keeping at least one hand upon the handlebars or steer control of a pedestrian conveyance.
76.08 RIDING ON SIDEWALKS. The following provisions apply to riding bicycles or pedestrian conveyance on sidewalks:
 1. Business District. No person shall ride a bicycle upon a side-

walk within the Business District, as defined in Section 60.02(1) of this Code of Ordinances.
 2. Other Locations. When signs are erected on any sidewalk or roadway prohibiting the riding of bicycles or pedestrian conveyances thereon by any person, no person shall disobey the signs.
 3. Yield Right-of-Way. Whenever any person is riding a bicycle or pedestrian conveyance upon a sidewalk, such person shall yield the right-of-way to any pedestrian and shall give audible signal before overtaking and passing.
76.09 TOWING. It is unlawful for any person riding a bicycle or pedestrian conveyance to be towed or to tow any other vehicle upon the streets of the City unless the vehicle is manufactured for such use.
76.10 IMPROPER RIDING. No person shall ride a bicycle or pedestrian conveyance in an irregular or reckless manner such as zigzagging, stunting, speeding, or otherwise so as to disregard the safety of the operator or others.
76.11 PARKING. No person shall park a bicycle or pedestrian conveyance upon a street other than upon the roadway against the curb or upon the sidewalk in a rack to support the bicycle or pedestrian conveyance or against a building or at the curb, in such a manner as to afford the least obstruction to pedestrian traffic.
76.12 EQUIPMENT REQUIREMENTS. Every person riding a bicycle or pedestrian conveyance shall be responsible for providing and using equipment as provided

herein:
 1. Lamps Required. Every bicycle or pedestrian conveyance when in use at nighttime shall be equipped with a lamp on the front emitting a white light visible from a distance of at least three hundred (300) feet to the front and with a lamp on the rear exhibiting a red light visible from a distance of 300 feet to the rear, except that a red reflector on the rear, of a type that is visible from all distances from fifty (50) feet to 300 feet to the rear when directly in front of lawful upper beams of headlamps on a motor vehicle, may be used in lieu of a rear light.
 2. Brakes Required. Every bicycle or pedestrian conveyance shall be equipped with a brake that will enable the operator to make the braked wheel skid on dry, level, clean pavement.
76.13 SPECIAL PENALTY. Any person violating the provisions of this chapter may, in lieu of the scheduled fine for bicyclists or persons using pedestrian conveyances standard penalty provided for violations of this Code of Ordinances, allow the person's bicycle or pedestrian conveyance to be impounded by the City for not less than five (5) days for the first offense, ten (10) days for a second offense and thirty (30) days for a third offense.
 * * * *

 0 to 3,000; \$37.50 minimum charge

Next 7,000; \$37.50 plus \$6.50 per 1,000 gallons over 3,000
 Next 10,000; \$83.00 plus \$6.60 per 1,000 gallons over 10,000
 Over 20,000; \$149.00 plus \$6.70 per 1,000 gallons over 20,000
SECTION 2. REPEALER. The remainder of Chapter 92 shall remain the same. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with the provisions of this Ordinance are hereby repealed.
SECTION 3. SEVERABILITY CLAUSE. If any section, provision or part of this ordinance shall be adjudged invalid or unconstitution-

al, such adjudication shall not affect the validity of the ordinance as a whole or any section, provision or part thereof, not adjudged invalid or unconstitutional.
SECTION 4. WHEN EFFECTIVE. This ordinance shall be in effect from and after its final passage, approval and publication as provided by law.
