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No word but 'heroes' will do

Dawn Spring ends gun threat at Junior High

Students, parents and colleagues are offering up prayers of thanksgiving on behalf of Dawn Spring, the North Scott Junior High teacher credited for a life-saving intervention with a 12-year-old student.

Police and school officials agree: Spring's actions saved her own life and those of her students. She and guidance

counselor Holly Leinhauser are being called heroes, and the boy faces an attempted murder charge.

In the meantime, the North Scott community tries to come to grips with the Friday morning incident in a North Scott Junior High classroom.

The NSP has learned from various sources that the student told his fellow classmates to get down, then pointed the gun at Spring.

He pulled the trigger, but the gun did not go off. Spring talked the student into going out into the hallway and to

the guidance office, where she and Leinhauser disarmed him.

Eldridge Police Chief Dave Kopatich said the teacher alerted school authorities, and principal John Hawley called Eldridge police.

Kopatich confirmed the weapon was displayed in a "threatening" manner and that students and staff in the classroom believed the student intended to use it.

He said the weapon, a .22 caliber hand-

A road for remembrance

Iowa 130 renamed from Tipton to Davenport

About 30 miles of Iowa 130 will be dedicated Sunday to a fallen soldier who probably would have preferred to remain a little less conspicuous.

Gary Hein was a quiet, determined, 21-year-old Army soldier when he died in Vietnam. If mortar fire hadn't hit his barracks in Plieku, Vietnam, Dec. 6, 1969, he quite likely would be farming in or around his family's Bennett farm. That was his plan all along until war intervened, his brother, Dale Hein said.

At 5 p.m., Sunday, Sept. 9, Dale, his three siblings and many friends and relatives will gather at the Bennett Legion Post 104, 242 Main St., to formally dedicate the old road as Gary L. Hein Memorial Freeway.

It's a road Dale Hein drives almost every day.

"He'd probably say, 'No, this is not necessary,'" Dale said. "He was quiet. He was the nice guy. I was the troublemaker. If he was supposed to be home at a certain time, he always was. He was just laid back, really determined and dedicated to what he wanted to do. He wanted to come home and farm."

But a draft notice sent him in a different direction. "He got sent over there,

knew he had to do it, so he just did it."

The dedication is a gift of Gary Hein's classmates. The Bennett High School Class of 1966 pushed the notion, and raised funds to help pay for signs in Tipton, Davenport and each side of Bennett marking the memorial.

"A soldier goes off to war when the country calls him to a fight. Whether

A private reception was held on Aug. 12 with family and friends to remember, celebrate and honor the life of Carolyn C. Moon, whose family founded the Iowa 80 Truckstop at Walcott.

In a release, the Figge said, "Carolyn C. Moon had a mind for mathematics, business and engineering, but it was her love for people that inspired her to make Iowa 80 Truckstop the best and biggest truck stop in the world. To her, the truck stop was about taking care of the people they served."

"Carolyn graduated from Southwest Missouri State University with a degree in mathematics. She was recruited by Lockheed Missile in California, and later was the only woman to work for Boeing Aircraft in Wichita in the engineering department."

"My mother loved art," said Moon's daughter, Delia Meier of Eldridge. "She was a painter, architect, seamstress and created the most amazing miniatures

"This major gift will continue to make a difference for our community for generations," said Figge executive director Tim Schiffer. "We are so grateful to the Moon family for their generosity," he added.

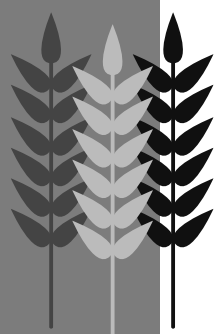

gun, was fully loaded, and that the student had no other ammunition on him. No shots were fired. The 12-year-old suspect is charged with class B felony attempted murder, and class D felony of carrying weapons on school grounds.

"We have to thank (the two teachers) for their quick and calm response," said Hawley. "Had they not reacted the way they did, we would be in a very different situation. No words but 'heroes' could describe them."

Some students agreed. By Saturday, a social media meme declared Spring, "an American Hero."

Spring acknowledged the support in a brief social media post at 7:19 a.m. Sunday.

"God is our protector and HE is the reason why last Friday's events played out the way they did. My student teacher and Holly, along with our students, staff and law enforcement, did amazing work as we pulled together in the face of adversity."

Supt. Joe Stutting was among the many who commended Spring, and said her actions reflect more than her security training.

"I cannot give enough credit to how she made all the difference in the world," said Stutting. "The outcome we had was the direct result of how she reacted and handled the situation."

"We have training, absolutely, but would I want to say that that's what ultimately helped her to handle it the way she did? No. It's also her upbringing, natural characteristics and the good decision-making she made at the time. A lot of factors came into play."

"I could not be more proud of the entire North Scott staff," he continued. "Obviously, the teacher and counselor involved, but also the student teacher in the room who kept the students calm."

The incident took place shortly before 8:30 a.m. during the first period of the day, and forced lockdowns at both the

junior high and high school.

Three Eldridge police squads responded to the junior high, including school resource officer Bruce Schwarz. School officials locked down the junior high while officers investigated, and police took the boy to the city police station, where he met with his parents before being taken to the Scott County Juvenile Detention Facility.

North Scott schools alerted parents via email about 9:27 a.m. that the junior high was locked down after police and administrators secured a student who brought a gun to school.

"Officer Schwarz and the rest of Eldridge PD came to our rescue immediately and handled the situation quickly and effectively," wrote Hawley, in an email to district staff. "Officer Schwarz entered the classroom and was able to reassure the students that they were safe."

"His communication showed why having a resource officer in schools is important. His calm and competent approach showed us the way in many instances."

In the same manner, school counselors from across the district descended on the junior high and spent the day comforting students.

High school counselors came to the school immediately and were able to take care of the students in the classroom where the incident occurred.

"Confidently yet compassionately, they were able to calm our students down and give them the security that things would be OK," said Hawley. "Since this was a seventh-grade student, we have known him for only a week. The elementary counselors also rushed

to our aid and were instrumental in meeting the needs of all students."

Hawley also praised his own staff.

"Our junior high staff was amazing," he said. "They say that you find out who you are when adversity hits, and if that is the case, we found out that our staff is willing to do anything to help our students."

"Whether they comforted students, found students in their classes to get them to their parents, covered classes for each other, covered lunch duty or made phone calls with students, they rose to the occasion."

"We have received many words of encouragement from our community," he continued, "and it is our staff that deserves much of that praise. In our faculty room, the motto is, 'Work Hard + Work Smart + Work Together = THE LANCER WAY!' That was never more evident than today."

Some parents came to the school to pick up their children early, and Hawley had kind words for them, saying they were incredibly understanding and patient in a time of crisis.

"We always wonder what the reaction of parents will be in a situation such as this," said Hawley, "but I can tell you that they made our jobs easy. There was no panic, nor did they come in demanding things. They allowed us to do our jobs, and that gave us the confidence we needed."

School board president John Maxwell also weighed in with high praises for the North Scott staff.

"All of the training we've done was well performed," he said, "and the teacher really did perform above and beyond. She was very calm in a very extremely

explosive information.

"As a school, we will be forever grateful for her performance. As a board member, the safety of our students is always our first concern. We will move forward committed to keeping kids safe, and make sure the safety of our kids is our highest priority."

Stutting said that the district covered the rest of Spring's classes for the day, and he expected her to be back in the classroom this week.

"When you go through something traumatic like this, if she needs time to recover, we will certainly give her all the time she needs," said Stutting.

When classes resumed Tuesday, the district also had extra counselors on hand.

"Like with a lot of things, you try to get back into a routine," said Stutting, "but we will have extra counseling for students and staff, and we'll bring in outside agencies that specialize in violent crime and post traumatic stress syndrome."

Stutting also said the district has reached out to the family of the 12-year-old suspect, who also has two other siblings in the district.

After a traumatic day for students, staff and the entire North Scott district, everyone will continue to work through the process of healing.

Through it all, Hawley is grateful for the North Scott community.

"I do not believe it is a coincidence that these people have been united at this time for miraculous reasons," he said. "Many people will question how this could happen in small-town Iowa. I will question that as well. However, I will also be thankful for the strong community we have."

Guns in schools 'grossly underestimated'

An excerpt from a March 2018 PEW Research Center report on guns brought to public schools.

U.S. students were caught with a firearm at school at least 1,576 times during the 2015-16 school year, according to a federal database with information collected from states through the Gun-Free Schools Act.

This data is incomplete, though. The federal numbers are lower than the numbers recorded by at least five states — Iowa, New Jersey, Maine, Maryland and Washington — in recent years, according to a Stateline review.

In Iowa, 15 firearm incidents were recorded in 2015-16. Only one shows up in the federal database. Iowa education officials did not respond to a follow-up question about why the state and federal data are different.

In Washington state, the federal data shows a decline from 162 firearm incidents in 2009-10 to 13 in 2015-16. But

the state count shows 128 incidents in 2015-16, about the same as 2009-10, when there were 130 incidents. State education officials confirmed the state data is accurate.

Mike Donlin, program supervisor for the school safety center at the Washington department of education, said he wasn't sure why the numbers were different.

Federal and state data grossly underestimate threats to schools, said Kenneth Trump, president of National School Safety and Security Services, an Ohio-based school safety consulting firm. With no nationally enforced reporting system, he said, schools' reporting is a "goodwill effort."

The 1994 Gun-Free Schools Act requires students who bring guns to school be expelled for at least a year in most cases, but some gun advocates say it isn't the federal government's place to make such judgments.

friendly fire or combat, I can't see where it makes any difference. To me, a soldier giving his life for the country is what's relevant," said classmate Wes Moeller, who helped lead the memorial.

Moeller said he got inspired a few years ago.

"My wife and I were able to take some road trips, and we'd see the memorial roads and memorial bridges on our route," he said. "I didn't know what the process was. How does something like that come about? Who seeks permission? Who do you seek permission from?"

He contacted the nearest Iowa Department of Transportation office. "They said go to a person in Cedar Rapids. He said, 'No I'm not the person, go to someone in Ames.' He sent me several pages of instructions."

Then the hard work began. "Almost everybody thought it was a great idea. But we had to get approval of all the governments along the way.

"I wasn't worried about being told 'no.' I've had a sales background," Moeller said.

Instead, everyone said yes. "Through their support and approval, each of the cities along the road, the township trustees, county supervisors,

they all said, 'yes.'"

The Bennett alumni raised more than \$2,000, enough to cover four, \$350 signs and leave a little extra for maintenance and replacement.

The memorial caused Moeller and Dale Hein to reflect on a time very different than today.

"Even as grade school kids, as little boys, we knew they were drafting and there was going to be an obligation to the government. Some could bypass it by school, physical condition or whatever. But most of us were waiting and we accepted it."

Moeller and Gary Hein were drafted. Dale Hein enlisted.

"Our paths didn't cross much," Moeller said in that brief time after high school. "He was going to be a farmer, and it wasn't long before we were off in the military. My last recollection would have been at school graduation, shaking hands and saying, 'See you later.'"

In April, 1969 Gary Hein deployed to Southeast Asia and served eight months before his death in an accidental bomb blast that hit his barracks.

Brother Dale had enlisted in the Army and was called home from training in Georgia.

"The hardest part is you're trying to grieve, but trying to remain strong, too. My folks are devastated. But life goes on

and four other kids are still there," Dale Hein said.

After about a month's leave, Dale Hein returned to service. But his brother's death made him a sole surviving son, grounds for an honorable discharge.

The intervening years were tough on their parents. Mom Arlene died in 2017. Their father, Lloyd, died in 2008.

Dale said their sorrow lived until the day they died.

"When Dad went to see the doctor that last time, he asked, 'What's wrong, Lloyd?' Dad told him, 'I'm the last one. My brothers and sisters are gone and my son died in the war.'"

At Sunday's memorial, Dale Hein will

be joined by his sisters, Sandra Mueller, of Wisconsin Rapids, Wis., Cindy Gibson, Cary, N.C., and Navy veteran Twyla Hein, of Tipton.

He and Moeller expect a warm welcome Sept. 9 at the Bennett Legion Hall.

But it's not the picture Dale Hein envisioned when he and Gary were in high school.

"We were close. I remember seeing pictures of our folks when they were younger. My dad would be standing there with his brothers and their wives. I always thought that one day, that would be us. Me and him with our wives and kids. All of that came to a crashing end."

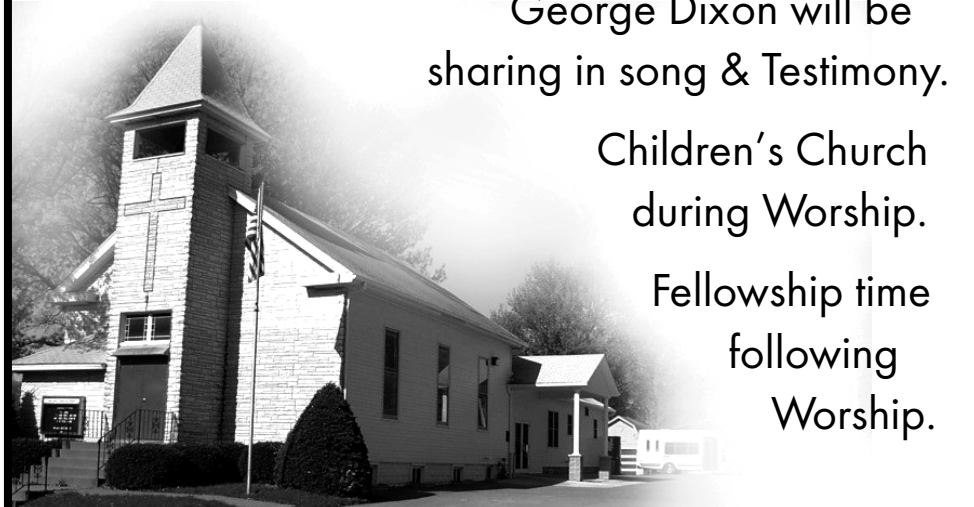

Winds hit Long Grove the hardest

It sounded like a tornado. Wind damage looked like a tornado. But National Weather Service forecasters in Davenport say the storm front that moved through late Sunday, Aug. 26 brought only heavy winds that toppled trees in Long Grove, Grand Mound and DeWitt, but spared most of Scott County.

"The stuff around the Long Grove area was 65- to 75-mph winds," forecaster Bill Nichols said. "You had winds even stronger around the DeWitt area."

The meteorologist's distinction is lost on Curtis Guy. Winds tore limbs that landed on each of the four vehicles parked at his 102 W. Edgewood Lane home in Long Grove's Langman Addition, which took the brunt of the damage.

"You could hear it coming, and it swept through here in just a few seconds," Guy said.

Neighbors gathered Monday after the storm to help each other clear limbs.

Long Grove mayor Mike Limberg said he found trees down all over town.

"Our older section of town with mature trees really got hit hard. The wind was the worst I have seen since living here the last 16 years," he said.

The wind uprooted some trees. Oth-

ers snapped 20 feet or more above the ground, and left twisted stumps, fueling speculation about the tornado.

But the NWS' Nichols confirmed the weather service detected no circular patterns.

"We would have seen different patterns, but that probably doesn't make much difference to the people stuck with the clean up," he said.

"Top awards are nice, but a white ribbon can help you learn for next time," she said.

Davis also worked as a supervisor for the dog show.

She served on the 4-H Youth Committee, giving hours of time and discussion to the entire 4-H Program in Scott County.

The Iowa 4-H Foundation sponsors

the annual Iowa 4-H Hall of Fame induction ceremony. Counties nominate volunteers, community leaders, and Extension staff members who have exemplified outstanding service and dedication to the 4-H youth program in their county.

Only one individual or couple per county can be nominated each year. Inductees can be recognized posthumously.

The Iowa 4-H Hall of Fame was established in 2002 as 4-H celebrated 100 years of a program dedicated to teaching youth life skills. During those 100 years, it became evident that one of the essential elements of the 4-H program was the commitment of caring adults.

Inductees into the Iowa 4-H Hall of Fame represent the many people in Iowa who have contributed countless hours to the 4-H program. These adults have modeled volunteerism, community service, integrity, and leadership to Iowa's youth. 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Voter cards are in the mail

Nearly 22,000 Iowa voters will receive a new voter registration acknowledgement from the Iowa Secretary of State's Office. The cards are being sent to ensure Iowans who registered to vote or updated their registration between July 25 and Aug. 17 have accurate information following a recent court ruling.

The new cards were mailed Aug. 27 and should arrive within the next two weeks. The cards instruct voters that for elections held in 2018, registered voters are required to provide an approved form of identification or sign an oath of identification at the polling place before receiving and casting a ballot.

For voters who do not have an Iowa driver's license or non-operator's ID, the voter acknowledgement includes a

voter ID PIN card, which can be used for identification purposes. Receiving an updated registration acknowledgement does not mean voters are registered more than once.

Iowans with questions about mailing should contact the Iowa Secretary of State's Office or their county auditor.



Pulling for a Cyclone – but no lightning, please! – in the Cy-Hawk game

The good news is that nobody was struck by lightning.

The bad news is that my brother, Al, and I and two others were gone 12 hours (six on the road) on our Labor Day weekend to see one of the most anticipated season openers in Iowa State football history last Saturday, Sept. 1, at Jack Trice Stadium in Ames – and the 7 p.m. game was canceled after just four minutes of play.

It was a hot and muggy night, but the sell-out crowd of 61,500 was hyped. The 20-percent chance of rain that was forecast did not keep 'Clone fans away. The tailgating atmosphere and pre-game festivities with the ISU band and sky divers oozed pride for Iowa State.

Let the season begin!
Four minutes into the game, the Cyclones took a 7-0 lead over FCA pre-season No. 3 rated South Dakota State, on a 55-yard pass play from quarterback Kyle Kempt to DeVonte Jones, and the stadium rocked.

Before the ensuing kickoff could take place, the teams were escorted off the field and fans were advised that the game was suspended until 30 minutes after any lightning within 8 miles. A radar map filled the jumbo-tron and we waited ... and waited ... and waited.

Shortly before 9:30 our group gave up and headed for the car. Minutes later, the game was cancelled. The storms came later, and we drove through intense rain and saw spectacular lightning coming home on Highway 30.

Had the game started earlier, it would have been played. Next week's opponent, Iowa, had no weather issues in its season opener that kicked off at 2:30 – a 33-7 win over a Northern Illinois team that is picked to finish near the top of Mid-American Conference.

The ease with which Iowa won that game and the fact that Iowa State will effectively be playing its season opener on the road against an arch-rival who got to play a game, tilts the advantage to the Hawks for next Saturday's Cy-Hawk game. Both teams are coming off 8-5 seasons and bowl game victories, and thus have high expectations. These are teams that last year defeated both Oklahoma (ISU) and Ohio State (Iowa)!



Last Saturday, Iowa coach Kirk Ferentz surpassed Hayden Fry to become the winningest coach in Hawkeye history with 144 wins. That ranks him No. 5 all-time among Big 10 coaches, behind only the legends Amos Alonzo Stagg, Woody Hayes, Bo Schembechler and Joe Paterno.

Although Ferentz is paid an absurd \$5.075 million, I attest that he is a decent person. His first cousin, Jim Ives, from Troy, Mich., is a friend of mine through Rotary and service to others runs in the family. Despite the rivalry, I cannot dislike the Hawkeye coach. He always speaks plain English, tells the truth and has his team well prepared, this year with a veteran quarterback, Nate Stanley.

However, in this series anything can happen. The teams are 10-10 in the last 20 games, and Ferentz' record against Iowa State, after starting 0-4, is 10-9. This Cyclones' team in coach Matt Campbell's third season has more talent and depth at more positions than in recent years, and is led by a sixth-year winning quarterback, Kyle Kempt.

But Iowa State has a mountain to climb after Saturday's game was wiped out. My head tells me that that, and the home field, favor Iowa, but my heart is still with State. Beating Iowa is the way the 'Clones win respect around here. That's why I'm pulling for a Cyclone – but no lightning, please! – at Kinnick Stadium come Saturday.

North Scott's Zach Petersen (55) will travel with ISU, and Jared Rus (27) is on the roster. Former Lancer Mark Kallenberger (71), who moved to Bettendorf, plays for the Hawks.

The CyHawk trophy, for the best achievement in all sports, has resided at Iowa State since 2013. The teams tied in 2015-16 so it stayed with its previous recipient, and Iowa State won it last year by a single point, with academics being the tiebreaker. – BT

WE WILL BE LANCER STRONG

It wasn't supposed to happen here

It wasn't supposed to happen here. That was the refrain that played over and over across northern Scott County on Friday after news broke that a 12-year-old boy had been arrested for attempted murder at North Scott Junior High.



Campbell's Scoup

The news was unthinkable, unimaginable and most definitely unbelievable. In fact, this was the exact scenario that people move to North Scott to get away from.

Our questions were endless. Social media was running rampant. News media flocked to North Scott Junior High.

To be certain, this could have been much worse, and if things had played out differently, CNN, ABC and a host of other national news outlets would have been broadcasting live from Eldridge.

Thankfully, that wasn't the case.

At the end of the day, a junior high teacher was being called a hero, the family of a 12-year-old boy was left to reconcile what had happened, and the rest of us could only wonder what took place in that seventh-grade classroom, while thanking God that no one was hurt.

Initially, information was vague, as very few details were being divulged. Later, when social media caught fire, a story of terror and heroism began to emerge.

On my way to Friday night's football game, I walked past the home of the teacher. It was dark, with no signs of life. Again, I wondered. How was she doing? What was going through her mind? How on God's earth did she have the wherewithal to handle such an unthinkable situation?

Of course, officially, no one is supposed to know the name of the hero, although, because of social media, we do, and everybody's hero has been identified as social studies teacher Dawn Spring, along with guidance counselor Holly Leinhauser.

On Friday, Supt. Joe Stutting was the only one talking, as other school administrators had been told to refer all questions to the superintendent.

As a journalist, I was torn. I respect Stutting immensely, but I also deeply respect and appreciate the men and women who work under him. As a reporter, I wanted to know how they felt. How did they handle the situation? What was going through their minds?

In addition, I would consider several of them personal friends, with relationships built on mutual trust developed over many years of working through the joys and tragedies that have been woven into the fabric of Lancer Nation.

Fortunately, after a conversation with Stutting on Monday, he agreed to allow comments from junior high principal John Hawley, and also said more information may be released this week.

Friday was definitely a most difficult day in Lancer Nation, and here's how this story unfolded within our office:

We first learned of the incident shortly after 9 a.m. Friday morning after a parent had received a text from their child, informing them of a lockdown at the high school and junior high.

We reached out to school officials, but they were plenty busy. Soon, we learned that the lockdown was because

of an incident at the junior high, and that all people were safe.

Mark Ridolfi went to the junior high, and I went to the high school. Mum was the word, and by then, at the high school, it was business as usual. Mark took a quick photo of the three squad cars he encountered in the junior high parking lot.

It wasn't long before word began to spread as to what had supposedly happened. We received copies of the official statement that school officials had sent out to all parents. We learned that a student was in custody.

Immediately, I saw another side of the story. While a school district was feeling relief over a tragedy averted, one family in our midst was beginning a painful journey with a very uncertain future.

In tracking down the story, we knew school officials would be incredibly occupied with more important issues, so we chose to bide our time. Early on, Mark and I decided that we would not be the guys standing outside the junior high preying on students and parents as they left the building. That's not our style.

We reached out to Stutting and Hawley by email and text, asking them to call. Soon, it was the Eldridge Police Department that released an official statement detailing the arrest and charges against a 12-year-old boy.

Those charges shocked us. Attempted murder. Those two words alone told us that this was something more than a student simply having a gun in his possession. The words were chilling. Someone had been threatened. This was serious.

By early afternoon, social media was hot on the trail. We started piecing the story together with off-the-record comments and what we had heard on the street.

Everything was coming into focus, and we felt we had a solid and reliable description of what happened in that classroom earlier in the day.

We knew the teacher's name. We knew the name of the student who had been arrested. What had transpired was truly shocking and unimaginable. The teacher was indeed a hero, and her

actions were beyond exemplary.

Maybe we don't need to know the details of what happened in that classroom. And I understand the need to protect the privacy of the people involved, especially children.

However, does there come a time when certain parts of the story help a community heal, or unite, or bring about an understanding or empathy?

When I know someone's story, I can more easily walk in their shoes. When we accurately tell others' stories, we humanize the situation. When we don't, we are left to rely on social media for potentially inaccurate information.

As I walked into Lancer Stadium for Friday night's football game, I was bothered by the TV reporters trying to interview people about the events of the day. I'm a member of the media, and even I was irked by the invasion.

Our community's feelings were still raw. We were still searching for answers, and all people wanted to do was enjoy the first home football game

of the season.

Now we are left to pick up the pieces, move on and help our community heal.

Saturday afternoon, I sat with my wife on the porch swing beneath the deck of our Eldridge home, and watched a group of boys playing in the backyard creek.

I love watching the neighborhood kids, whether they're looking for crawdads or hitting golf balls on their makeshift course through neighboring yards.

As I watched, I wondered. Several of them appeared to be of junior high age, and I couldn't help but question how had their lives changed over the course of the last 24 hours? What had they seen? What had they heard? How were they coping?

They were daunting thoughts, and questions that would go unanswered.

Later Saturday, I was on Twitter, and saw a tweet from Aaron Schwartz, the high school's dean of students.

His thoughts were poignant, and deserve to be shared.

"I am heartbroken by what our students and community are enduring," he wrote "I am hopeful because of the training we have, and the growth we will continue to make to keep our kids safe, because we love them.

"We are, and will be, Lancer Strong."

We live in a loving and caring community. We have the benefits of an incredible school district with an exemplary staff. That was never more evident than last Friday, and for that I'm forever grateful.

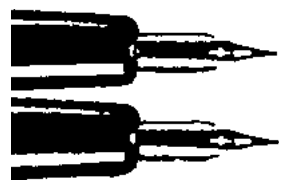
Teal season open in Iowa until Sept. 16

Iowa's first duck hunting season began Sept. 1 with the 16-day teal-only season. These fast-flying early migrators use the first cool spell in late August as a sign to start heading south.

Teal season shooting hours are sunrise to sunset, which is different than regular duck season to help prevent misidentification. The daily limit is six teal (blue-winged, green-winged or cinnamon only) with a possession limit of

18. Nontoxic shot is required, and guns must be restricted to hold no more than three shells.

Teal have a well-earned reputation as an easy-to-decoy species popular with young and novice hunters, said Orrin Jones, waterfowl biologist with the Iowa Department of Natural Resources. It's also considered one the most popular ducks for the dinner table.

Lancers roll

McLaughlin's 5 TD passes spur North Scott to 54-0 rout of Davenport Central

You couldn't have drawn up a better scenario, and it's just what the football doctor ordered.

Now it's time to bring on PV.

On a day when the North Scott community was rocked by a school lockdown and the arrest of a 12-year-old student on attempted murder charges, the Lancers gave their fans something else to think about with a feel-good, attitude-changing 54-0 whitewashing of Davenport Central Friday night.

Just one week after struggling to load their vaunted pistol offense against Class 4A powerhouse Iowa City West, coach Kevin Tippet's boys were firing from all chambers as they notched their first win of the season.

It was just seven days earlier, in that demoralizing 28-7 loss to the Trojans, where the Lancers got pushed, shoved and kicked all over the field. Oh, what a difference a week makes!

With a No. 8 Class 3A ranking providing a little bit of swagger, the Lancers put together a strong week of practice and turned into the bullies on the block as they took control early and never let up.

"We played with a chip on our shoulder, because last week left a bad taste, and we just need to keep getting better," said senior lineman Brady Ernst. "We just practiced with that chip all week, and that's the way we need to continue playing."

"We were in control most of the night. They had that big play at the beginning, but after that we responded and everybody played good."

The lone Blue Devil bright spot came on their opening drive, when they converted a 42-yard pass play deep into Lancer territory. However, on the very next snap NS senior TJ Yates came up with a game-changing fumble recovery,

and the tables had turned.

"The thing I liked is that we faced adversity right off the get-go when they hit a big play," said Tippet. "We got the turnover, came down, put it in and got up."

"We didn't play perfect, but we kept grinding it out and found ways to punch balls into the end zone."

It was definitely a confidence-building win, and the school's new state-of-the-art scoreboard definitely got a workout.

Yes, it was a dominating performance.

Unlike a week earlier, the Lancer offense was far from anemic as it racked up 478 yards of total offense, built a 40-0 halftime lead, and enjoyed the benefits of a running clock for the second half.

After a rough outing in the season opener, senior quarterback Nile McLaughlin proved why he is one of the top signal-callers in eastern Iowa, as he tossed five touchdown passes, piling up 260 yards through the air, and added 42 more on the ground.

Senior scatback Jacob Porth finally found some running room behind an offensive line that totally controlled the line of scrimmage, and kicked off a 42-yard night by notching North Scott's first score on a two-yard jaunt.

However, it was a pair of McLaughlin tosses, 37 yards to senior Carson Rollinger and 49 to junior Ty Anderson, that set the tone of the drive.

North Scott made it 13-0 on a 14-yard McLaughlin-to-Yates scoring strike, and after an interception by senior Garrett Willey, McLaughlin hit Rollinger with a pair of back-to-back, double-digit yard-

age receptions, with the final one covering 13 yards for the score.

The Lancers increased their lead to 26-0 with McLaughlin's 8-yard scoring strike to senior Grant Solis, and after the first of two fumble recoveries by senior Mason Watts, McLaughlin and Rollinger hooked up again, this time from 34 yards out on a big fourth-and 14.

North Scott's defense was stellar, and they forced a fifth Blue Devil turnover on Central's next possession — with Watts being Johnny-on-the-spot — and the final score of the half came on a McLaughlin-to-Cade Akers toss that covered the final two yards of an eight-play, 55-yard drive with 37 seconds on the clock.

"We were just more physical tonight," said a smiling McLaughlin, whose big night came on his dad's birthday. "We pounded them, and it was good all around."

"It felt really good back there, and I felt really comfortable the whole game. The offensive line did an amazing job."

Doing the dirty work up front, among others, were Gabe Stricker, RJ Kadlec, Ernst, Gordy Field, Teagen Fletcher and Jackson Stoeven and Antonio Bojorquez.

McLaughlin, and Tippet, said the performance was made possible by a good week of practice.

"We really got after it in practice," said McLaughlin. "We had lot harder practices. We got after each other and made sure we could be better tonight."

"One of the things we talked about is not making excuses," said Tippet. "We knew we needed to be more physical on offense and defense, and I thought our practice on Monday had a lot more energy."

"I felt that three of our four days we had pretty good energy, and it was physical, and it was tough. As a coach, maybe we need to do more of that."

Whatever the Lancers did in practice, certainly translated into more confidence on the field.

"The difference was we came out with a lot more fire," said Porth, who broke free on runs of 14 and 24 yards. "The line was looking better. Creds to the line and creds to Nile for his five touchdown passes."

"It was fun to get the running game untracked, and fun to find some holes and break free for once. We really committed ourselves to coming back this week and proving who we are to this town."

While McLaughlin's big night was worthy of headlines, it was a total team effort, from the starting crew to the reserves who took over in the second half.

Rollinger latched onto five of McLaughlin's aerials for 109 yards, while junior quarterback Trent Allard rushed for 37 yards in four carries — including a 20-yard scamper to finish the scoring — and also added a four-yard scoring strike to Ben Belken, who also had an interception and fumble recovery.

Junior Luke Kroeger tacked on 42 yards in 14 second-half trips.

"Nile just gives me a good chance, and

"I love throwing to Carson," said McLaughlin. "He's always open. Somehow he'll find a way, and I'll see him out of the corner of my eye, and he's there."

Now, all eyes will be on Pleasant Valley, and Friday's trip to Spartan Stadium.

"It's nice to get a win, and nice scoring 50 points as opposed to seven," said Tippet. "You feel good about this, and I'm sure we'll find things on film to get better, but we have a really quality team next week with Pleasant Valley."

"We'll have to be ready."

Scott's takeaway

Lancer coach Kevin Tippet was concerned about Davenport Central's athleticism, but that ended up being a non-factor as the Lancers cruised to their 18th straight win over the Blue Devils.

This game was won in the trenches. The O-line dominated the line of scrimmage, and Lancer defenders frolicked in the Blue Devil backfield. For all intents and purposes, this win was in the books early in the second quarter.

Nile McLaughlin looked cool and comfortable triggering the pistol offense, and it was good to see him utilize a bevy of receivers. Carson Rollinger is turning into Mr. Excitement.

Defensively, the Lancers were in a league of their own. Forcing five Blue Devil turnovers was key, and Mason Watts and Ben Belken are proving themselves as havoc-wreaking linebackers.

The Lancers are now 1-1, and a true measuring stick of this game is what happened 11 miles to the southeast in a battle of 4A powerhouses, where third-ranked Bettendorf earned a hard fought 10-7 win over No. 7 Iowa City West.

Perhaps the 28-7 loss to West in the season opener wasn't as dismal as I thought.

Up next

The Lancers can't afford to rest on last week's laurels, as they will face a hungry Pleasant Valley team on the road this Friday.

"PV is a quality team, and a heckuva lot better than the one we just played," said Lancer coach Kevin Tippet. "They opened with a really tough schedule, and we'll have our hands full."

"We've had great games with them the last 10 years, and I expect that this will be no different."

North Scott has won the last two meetings between the two teams, including a 23-14 victory a year ago.

No panic in Lancer attack

Despite slow start to 2018 campaign, NS girls have high hopes.

The season is far from over, and while goals may start to change, confidence is still running high in North Scott's volleyball camp.

Yes, an 0-2 start to the Mississippi Athletic Conference season isn't what anybody was expecting, and although the Lancers have dug themselves a pretty big hole in terms of challenging for the MAC title, the Lancers have high hopes for another successful season.

"If we play well, I think we can be in every game we play," said Lancer coach Allie Miguel, following her team's disappointing 25-16, 25-18, 25-18 loss to Pleasant Valley on Tuesday (Aug. 28). "We just have to make sure we show up mentally and physically on the court. We need to have the right mix of girls on the court."

"I think PV was really ready for us, and I don't think we were quite ready for what they had," she said. "It was a little bit of an eye-opening experience for us, and pointed out some stuff we need to work on."

Juniors Emma Powell and Grace Boffeli led the Lancer offensive attack with seven kills apiece, while sophomore Taylor Robertson dished out 14 assists. Allison contributed a team-high eight digs to pace the defensive effort.

"Maddie is doing great job in the back row just getting touches on everything," said Miguel, "Emma Powell in all six of her rotations. She does just awesome. I also think Taylor has stepped up as a setter. She's asking some good questions and is picking up a lot of stuff as a sophomore. I've been really impressed with her."

There's no doubt the Lancers have had a tough go, and you'd be hard pressed to find a schedule that is so front-loaded with competition. North Scott is now 5-5 on the season after playing 10 matches in seven days.

"Playing a tough team like PV was a challenge after a busy week," said Miguel, "and I think we just got tired. Our schedule is hectic, and it's not easy, but it will make us better."

Allison and Kroeger said the Lancers aren't even close to throwing in the towel or getting down on themselves.

At practice these past couple days," said Allison, "we've been playing with some new rotations that we plan to use against Bettendorf, and we've also worked on some different defenses to solve some issues we've had."

"Also, we've been focusing on having fun while we play the game. When we do that, that's when we play to our fullest potential, and hopefully we can start getting some wins."
