Auditorium debuts to rave reviews

North Scott's High School auditorium reopened Monday with a snip of a ribbon and a strong cheer for the star of the show: A community voluntarily pitching in on the \$3.75 million provided by taxpayers for the makeover.

Lancer Legacy chairman Nick Hansel reported contributions of nearly \$50,000 in the last 72 hours as auditorium contractors joined community members to commit to multi-year pledges.

"This is not normal," Hansel said. "This is how we love each other and pick each other up."

In all, he told the crowd that Lancer Legacy foundation donors provided \$200,000 to help cover the details that drew cheers.

The makeover provided new seats, wider aisles, audio equipment, stage rigging and catwalks and air handling equipment, along with the most obvious and welcome addition: An expansive, 2,700-square-foot lobby with additional restrooms long sought by Lancer Productions fans.

"As I heard the toilets flush, I thought of you, Donn Wilmott," Hansel said, only half-joking. School board member Donn Wilmott sug-

gested early on that the renovation include more restrooms.

Wilmott couldn't make Monday's event, but most other school board members did, mingling with generations of North Scott families serenaded by school choirs, bands and orchestras.

"I painted a lot of sets in this theater," said Joni Kuehl Schneider, a high school Spanish teacher who was a senior when North Scott opened the auditorium in 1982.

The eight-month renovation includes a gallery for student art, and suspended glass balls fashioned mostly by high school students.

Marshall Mess, an Ed White Elementary third-grader, and son of high school art teacher Michelle Mess, made two of those globes but couldn't distinguish his among those dazzling above. She took students to a Davenport glass studio where they learned how to make the mobile, which will be a permanent exhibit.

Michelle Mess said the renovation provided a learning experience for her, too. She helped design the lobby's art wall and convinced the district to go with Lancer

Theater community shares memories of stagehand

Tim Cook dies on St. Ambrose stage

Count Tim Cook among the hundreds of North Scott students who found themselves in theater.

The same community celebrating renovation of the high school auditorium is mourning the death of a 45-year-old theater pro who muscled heavy gear into the Taxslayer Center and other arenas, while deftly handling tech duties in community theater and occasionally assuming onstage roles.

His tech and acting debut occurred on the North Scott stage.

"Tim had a work ethic unparalleled," said Tom Goodall, the longtime Lancer the-

ater teacher who welcomed Cook into his family. "It didn't matter what role, lead or minor. Tim did what he could to make things successful."

Cook was working on St. Ambrose's renovated Galvin Fine Arts stage when he died in a fall on Sept. 26.

Cook's daughters, Catelyn, 20, Cassidy, a North Scott High School junior, and Cook's fiancée, Heidi Thompson, are planning a remembrance celebration 6-10 p.m., Oct. 27 at the Center for Living Arts, 2008 4th Ave., Rock Island, one of the many theaters he supported.

Memorials may be made on GoFundME under Tim Cook's Memorial Fund; at the celebration; or sent to First Central State Bank 500 E. LeClaire Road, Eldridge, IA 52748 payable to Cassidy Cook.

"Everyone he met always felt like they'd known him forever," said Catelyn. "You instantly felt like he was your best friend because he was such a caring guy. I'm biased, but he's the best dad anyone could hope for."

Ohl family puts grief to work

New endowment helps others coping with pancreatic cancer

Three years ago, pancreatic cancer wasn't even a blip on Peggy Ohl's radar. She'd never given it any thought, and had no idea that in nine short months her world would be turned upside down.

It's now been two years since her husband, Dr. Brent Ohl, died after a courageous and short four-and-a-half month battle with the disease, and the Eldridge mother of two sons is now channeling her grief into helping other families dealing with what she went through.

Thanks to the generosity of countless individuals, and two successful fundraisers, Peggy has established the Dr. Brent Ohl Strong Pancreatic Cancer Support & Awareness Endowment Fund.

A third Ohl Strong event, scheduled for Saturday at Sheridan Meadows Park in Eldridge (see story on page 5A), will raise additional funds for the \$25,000 endowment.

"After Brent died, I knew I wanted to do something because I wanted him to be remembered," said Peggy. "I thought about a scholarship through the North Scott Foundation, for someone going to medical or nursing school, and really, I thought about a lot of things."

"The endowment just sort of happened, and now it's something I feel super passionate about. My vision, and my mission, is that I want to help people who have just been devastated."

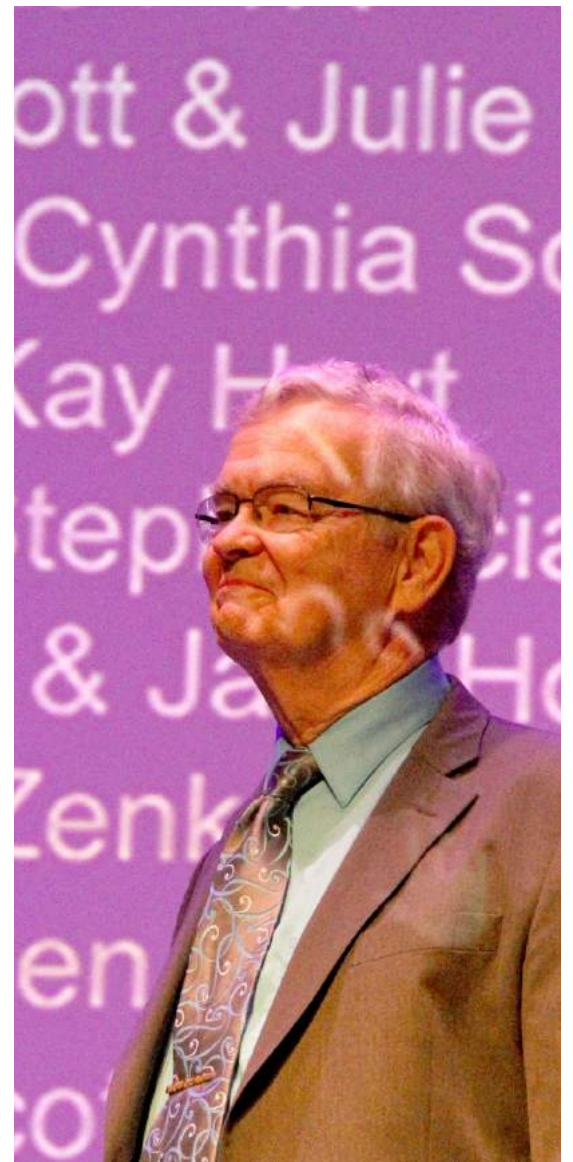

red, high school principal Shane Knoche said.

"I can't believe I had an opportunity to get so involved in the design. I'd never done anything like that," Mess said.

Superintendent Joe Stutting thanked the community, contractors and board members for the project budgeted from cash reserves.

"This is the main place every kindergarten through 12th-grader comes through. This room sees the highest percentage of our students," Stutting told the crowd.

Students offered backstage tours and shared their enthusiasm for the renovation. Ethan Jost worked the new soundboard, a permanent structure that shields all wiring, unlike the temporary

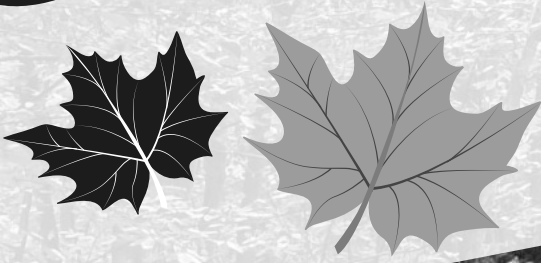
boards surrounded with cables.

Backstage, Hunter Frerichs showed off rigging with easy-to-handle safety switches that can stop descending backdrops in an instant without students grasping at ropes and pulleys.

"I've got some friends who work at Hancher, and they say this is just like theirs," Frerichs said.

I want them to know other people have gone through it and that they aren't alone."

Brent, a 1986 North Scott graduate, was a popular anesthesiologist at Unity Point Trinity in the Quad Cities. He was diagnosed with pancreatic cancer at the age of 48, and less than five months later he was gone.

"Brent's cancer was so aggressive," said Peggy, "and that's what's so terrible about pancreatic cancer. Pretty much, unless they find it some other way, just by chance, by the time you find it, it's almost too late.

"It would be great to find a cure, but I'm going to leave that up to somebody else. I want to try and help people when they've just been devastated with this diagnosis."

The vehicle to provide those funds is the endowment fund, and it was established earlier this year through the Trinity Health Foundation. However, the seeds were planted within two months of Brent's death, when friends organized a Stroll for Ohl event through the streets of Eldridge, and \$14,000 was raised and donated to National Pancreatic Research.

"The very first event was organized by nurses at the hospital," said Peggy. "I went and participated, but didn't do anything. I went to the meetings for the second event, but just kind of sat back and didn't really know what I was doing."

Last year's event was a pickleball tournament at North Scott High School, and nearly \$10,000 was raised. Attending that event ignited a passion inside Peggy, and once she got hooked up with the Trinity Health Foundation, there was no stopping her.

"There was a girl who worked for the foundation, and she was energetic and had tons of passion," said Peggy. "She's the one who suggested an endowment, and she made me believe that it could happen."

Nathan Sondgeroth, vice president of Gift Planning for the foundation, was more than happy to get on board.

"Dr. Ohl really was beloved, and he was just a great spirit within the hospital," he said. "When he passed away, there was an outpouring of really grass-roots support for Peggy and her family, and people wanted to do something

"They raised a nice chunk of money that first year, and it went to a national non-profit, which is great, because they

are really sort of attacking the research side of things.

"But in year two, Peggy wanted to insure that dollars helped local people who were struggling with the initial diagnosis of pancreatic cancer, and that's how the Foundation became involved."

The money that was raised a year ago was put into an account, and then Peggy went to work raising the necessary funds to reach the \$25,000 threshold required for an endowment.

"Myself and the Foundation reached out to a lot of Brent's partners and staff at the hospital, and tried to hit that \$25,000 mark," said Peggy. "We did it, and now it's an actual endowment that will always be there, and we'll be able to give gifts off of the interest earned.

"I love that it's local. The money doesn't go anywhere, but stays right here. I don't have to do anything with it. I don't even touch it, and that's the beauty of it. I just have the passion, and I want to do something good in Brent's

memory."

Nearly \$800 in interest has already been earned, and will soon be finding its way into the hands of individuals who have recently been diagnosed with pancreatic cancer.

"We're very fortunate that Peggy has been willing to have this legacy live on through Dr. Ohl and this fund," said Allison Beardsley, director of the Trinity Cancer Center. "It's unfortunate that we are at the point of working with Peggy on this, because she has lost her husband, but to have her and her family step up and really support these patients, who are going through this horrible experience, it just means the world to me."

Beardsley said the funds will be used in one of two ways, and can be utilized by anybody who is diagnosed with pancreatic cancer at Trinity's endoscopy center, or who is treated by a Trinity physician.

When patients are first diagnosed, they are assigned a social worker who

gets to know the patient and their family, and identifies any potential needs. When those needs are determined, the social worker can share them with the Cancer Center, and patients are provided a small gift card to help them along.

"In addition, when a patient is officially diagnosed in our facility, usually the endoscopy unit," said Beardsley, "we are starting to give patients small gift cards as a token to let them know we're here and we're supportive.

"They can use it for whatever they want, and we want them to know we'll be here throughout their journey. Pancreatic cancer is very rare, and often, when people are diagnosed, it's usually in the very late stage with very high mortality."

Peggy would like to eventually grow the endowment to where more money can be given to patients.

"My goal is to eventually have enough

interest in there — because there's not a lot of people who have this diagnosis — to be able to eventually give enough money that they can go use it for their transportation to get a second opinion, or coordinate their care," said Peggy. "Statistics show that if you get a second opinion or coordinate your care at a higher university, you can extend your life. Brent figured that out, and it would be awesome to give somebody \$1,000 with no strings attached to go get additional treatment."

When patients receive assistance from the endowment, they will receive a 5x7 card that gives a summary of who Brent was and how the endowment works. They will also receive an Ohl Strong bracelet.

"This has kind of consumed me, but in a good way," said Peggy. "It's a way to channel my grieving. When you have all this love for somebody, and this void in your life, this helps me deal with it. It feels right."

She said that helping others in their time of need is a way for her to pay back the North Scott community and Trinity Hospital for all the support they've given her family, and to keep Brent's legacy alive.

"The support we received is totally overwhelming, and you can't imagine it until you really experience it firsthand," she said. "Another reason I'm doing this is because I want to give back a tiny bit of what was given to us, to somebody else."

Ohl Strong event has something for everybody

For the second straight year, Ohl Strong will be built around the backdrop of a pickleball tournament, with a giant tailgating party thrown in for good measure.

While last year's event was held at North Scott High School, this year the tournament and party have been moved to Sheridan Meadows Park in Eldridge.

The pickleball tournament has been broken down into two shifts, with one beginning at 8:30 a.m. and the other a 1 p.m. A Pickleball 101 class will be held at noon, at a cost of \$10, and equipment will be provided.

"We thought we'd tie in tailgating because that's something Brent would love and will bring in a whole different group of people," said Peggy Ohl.

and Raffle items, and among the items up for grabs are a pontoon rental from Grace Marine, two tickets to the Iowa-Northwestern game, with a parking pass and dinner at Stella's; four tickets to any University of Iowa wrestling meet; four tickets to the Iowa-Nebraska game, with a Lexus rental for the day and a parking pass; and two John Deere Classic hospitality suite tickets.

Attendees are invited to bring their own coolers and beverages. There is a playground nearby, along with a sand volleyball pit and area to play bags.

"I envision us sticking around until the Iowa game is done," said Ohl. "I want people to know that they can drop by anytime. It's going to be a really fun day."

"My goal is to make this something that people will want to do in the future. I want it to be a nice event. I want them to say, 'Man, that was kind of fun. I want to plan on that next year.'"

Friends and colleagues are struggling to understand the accident.

"I honestly don't know how the accident could have happened," said Joe Goodall, Tom's son and a lifelong friend of Cook's.

Cook took young Joe on his first motorcycle ride and would have taken him to his first Grateful Dead concert in Chicago if Tom Goodall had said "yes."

Years later, Joe was Cook's supervisor in the stagehand union that led both to

work at theaters and arenas across the region. That's why the accident mystifies Joe Goodall.

"It was a space he was familiar with," Goodall said of the Galvin stage. "He'd been in the space working for Ballet Quad-Cities for a week up in the same space. It was a space similar to space he grew up in at North Scott High School with a grid system above the stage that's walkable. It doesn't require any harnesses and has railing all the way around. I can't for the life of me think how it could have happened."

Goodall said OSHA is investigating the accident, but he hasn't heard any details.

"I'm still trying to wrap my head around it. He was working with another guy. Tim had just gone up a staircase, and the other guy was following him, maybe a minute behind. He was on the staircase, about half way up when he heard Tim fall."

Friends are flush with stories about Cook as a savvy stagehand, trusted friend and theater fanatic.

"You only had to meet Tim once to remember him and be touched by him. He really cut through all the BS quickly when you met him. You knew you could trust him with whatever you needed to

say," Joe Goodall said.

Joe was in grade school when he met Cook, a Lancer Productions teenager who flourished under Tom Goodall's theater guidance.

Cook grew close to the Goodall family, and ultimately went to work for Joe in the stagehand union.

"He is a very good lighting tech and a very good stage manager," said Joe, still describing his friend in the present tense.

And he was an even better family friend. A few years ago, Joe wanted to surprise his parents by finishing the basement in their new Eldridge home while they were away on vacation. Tom recalls returning to the airport from Hawaii to a message saying the basement had water damage.

Instead, they were surprised with new drywall and ceiling installed by Cook, family and other friends.

Friend after friend shared similar stories.

Jeff Ashcraft was looking for a volunteer sound technician for last month's Playcrafter's production of "Tuesdays with Morrie."

"He responded to a Facebook post and just jumped in. We hadn't seen each other face to face in a year and a half. Then he spent the last three and a half weeks working on the show, and he was doing it for free," Ashcraft said.

Tom Goodall recalled that Cook not only handled tech duties for Gigi's dance studio, he sometimes took stage roles alongside the young dancers.

"He did everything, and I mean every-

thing," Gigi Bohach said.

She remembers Cook was barely 21 when he helped stage manage their 1994 show, "A Swinging Safari."

"He literally was on trapeze and came swinging through on a flying trapeze as Tarzan, complete with the yell," Bohach said. "North Scott people could never forget that."

At the Center for Performing Arts, Cook pitched in with tech work and daughter Catelyn remembers his annual turn as the "grumpy dad," in "Spring Awakening."

"I always felt bad for whoever played the role of his kids," Catelyn said.

Over Labor Day weekend, Cook joined Joe Goodall on the stagehand crew working the "Marvel Universe" show at the Taxslayer Center. Cook was a mega Marvel fan and wore a different Captain America shirt to each show. Cook managed to pose for a photo with the show's Captain America shield, now a treasured image to his friends and family.

"I'm wearing a Captain America bandana right now trying to keep his memory alive on my first day back at work," Joe Goodall said in an interview Sunday from the Peoria Civic Center, where Cook also was scheduled to work the Shinedown concert. The work brought Cook to Chicago's United Center, as well as arenas across Iowa and the Dakotas.

"There is an inherent risk with some of the work we do because our work environment often is in the dark and constantly changing," Goodall said. "A lot of those local stagehand unions know and feel the loss as well."

9-percent raise keeps Eldridge building inspector

New \$72,200 salary fends off Rock Island offer

The City of Eldridge has a building inspector for the long haul, or at least as long as they'll have him.

The Eldridge City Council approved a \$6,000 raise (9 percent) for Ray Nees at Monday night's regular council meeting, bringing his annual salary to \$72,200, and it was enough to counter an offer from the City of Rock Island and keep Nees in the Eldridge fold.

Monday's action came at the recommendation of city administrator John Dowd and the city's personnel and finance committees after Nees had informed Dowd that he had been offered the head position in Rock Island.

In a memo to the council, Dowd wrote that Nees is a valuable employee, and it was in the best interest of the city to

offer a pay increase to attempt to keep him.

The two committees agreed to a 10-percent limit, and when Dowd asked Nees what it would take to keep him, the agreed to number was 9 percent.

Prior to voting on the pay increase, Mayor Marty O'Boyle and all five council members weighed in with positive remarks.

"This has been an interesting discussion that came out of the clear blue," said O'Boyle. "Ray has done a very, very good job in serving everybody, and he comes with a great list of credentials."

"As long as he's been here, I have yet to hear a negative comment about his performance in the field, and that says an awful lot. He has a unique ability to do his job the way it's supposed to be done, and help sell the city at the same time."

Councilman Bernie Peeters, the head of the personnel committee, said it was important to consider how well Nees worked with other city departments, as well as a wide variety of contractors.

"Sometimes Ray is the only face contractors ever see, and for a lot of people, he is the City of Eldridge," said Peeters. "Looking at Ray's situation, we felt we had some great stability."

"What we'd have to go through to get somebody with his qualifications, this is

something the city could commit to and hope he would consent and stay with us."

Councilman Brian Dockery, head of the city's finance committee, said the city had money to absorb the increase.

"I'd like to thank Ray for giving us the opportunity to keep him," said Dockery. "This is not a position you can replace easily, and with Ray's expertise, knowledge and personality in dealing with city staff and people out there, we have to pay a competitive wage."

Councilmen Steve Puls, Frank King and Adrian Blackwell also weighed in with positive comments.

"I don't have any complaints with Ray," said Puls. "He returns calls and explains everything very professionally. I think it's worthwhile that we do keep some stability, and he works well with the rest of the staff and city hall."

"My wife works in that department, and I hear how the day goes," said King. "I know of situations where he's diffused problems because he's a people person. He was able to work it out and turn a bad situation into a positive one, and kept the ball moving down the road."

"Your communication is excellent," said Blackwell. "You've taken the initiative to keep us posted. I'm glad you're going to stay."

After the meeting, Nees had nothing but positive things to say about his three years in Eldridge, and said he's now here for the long haul.

"It was a tough decision because I was in a unique position to choose between two really, really good jobs," he said. "I was asked to apply in Rock Island, and ended up getting offered the position."

"There was a lot of opportunity there, but there's also a lot of opportunity here. I've been here three years, and I can say that working with the other departments, city administration and the council has been absolutely the best of anywhere I've worked in the past 24 years."

Nees said the decision to stay was difficult only because he was being offered a much higher salary to leave, even higher than the one he was granted Monday night.

"But ultimately, I'm 53, and I plan on working until I'm 65," he said. "I want to be in a place where when there's a problem, I can call the other people in the city and work together to get something done."

"We don't play the blame game, and this is a good place to be. The decision I made this week will be the last one like it that I make in my career. It just made sense that I was going to stay here."



NSP CANDIDATE INTERVIEWS

Recorder: Vargas vs. Carpenter

Incumbent faces second challenge from employee

Scott County Recorder Rita Vargas is seeking her fifth term and faces Republican Mindy Ortiz Carpenter, a 39-year veteran of the recorder's office who now serves as a real estate specialist.

NSP: Why run now?

Vargas: "There's a big project coming up that I'd like to see through. It's going to be a multi-year plan," to digitize archived records.

"We're hoping to go back to 1972 and do our books. ... That would give us 40 years recorded documents that would be available to the public.

Carpenter: "We need strong leadership. We need somebody who comes in the office every day. When you elect an official, you pay for a full-time employee. We don't see that today.

"I personally know how the office runs. I personally know peoples' strong points, where they should sit in the office to make it run smoother, faster, better. I will not make promises to people just to pacify them.

"It's time for new leadership and it's time for new change and time for you guys to elect somebody who's going to do the job.

NSP: What management experience will help you as recorder?

Carpenter: "I manage the real estate department. I listen. I do not feel like I'm over them. I work with them. ... I respect my staff. They would respect me.

Vargas: I am there. I'm not there every day, because there are days I have to go to Des Moines. I'm on several committees. Recently, there was a procurement committee I was on. That required I go to Des Moines a few times.

"A handful of recorders worked with vital records people in Des Moines," digitizing public records. "The other five on that committee are from small counties, so I took my turn as a large county."

"We do take debits and credits at our counter. That's one of the things I brought to that office before any of the other (recorder) offices had that service.

NSP: From audience. What services could be made more convenient for taxpayer?

Carpenter: Moving passport service to five days per week," from the three days,

they currently are available.

"Right now, we cross trained, so everybody in the office knows each other's jobs, which is wonderful, so when we have vacations or illnesses.

"Now that they do that, we're not in the minor leagues any more. We're in the major leagues. Now they need to be put back to the positions where they're strongest at, so that would make office run smoother.

"Last year in the real estate department, which I oversee, we were two weeks behind in recording real estate documents. ... Because we were cross training, we had employees sitting there who didn't know what they were doing.

"Management is not training employees. Staff has to train the employees and that puts their job way back.

I don't know why staff trains employees anyway. If you want it done right and know how the office runs and you'd want to train yourself.

"I know everybody's job, so when the work flow gets heavy, I'm actually going to jump in. I'm not there to sit in a chair. I'm there to work.

Vargas: Cross training is, "just something we have to do. No question about it. We have to have everybody trained to do every position.

"Change is always very difficult, but they've said that they're fine. I think there's been more harmony in the office because of the rotation into different departments.

As far as getting behind, we have several people who take off one day a week all summer long and that throws a monkey wrench into the works.

They're entitled to their vacation, that's perfectly fine. But I have to figure out then how am I going to get that seat filled that day.

"On passports, I can't have it five days a week because I don't have staff for five days a week.

Vargas said the office processes about 125 passports a month. "I'm not an agent and I'll tell you why I'm not. I can't be an agent because my name is on the birth certificates. Five years ago the state department changed all the rules of how this had to be done. I can't have my name

on the passport application if it's on the birth certificate as well.

NSP: From audience. What community involvement and leadership experience do you have?

Carpenter: "I go to the gym every day. I enjoy reading books. The biggest joy of my life is my three grandsons and two live here in Eldridge. That's why I was kind of excited to come here tonight. I want them to know you work in a job and you work hard, and come to work every day and do the best you can, you can do anything you want.

Carpenter said she's participated with the United Way and her union.

Vargas: "I'm actually with the recorder's association. I am the vice president for District 6. Also, I'm very active in LULAC (The League of Latin American Citizens). I've been on many different boards throughout the years, including Big Brothers and Big Sisters.

NSP: What will your partisan political membership be evident in your service?

Vargas: "It's really not a partisan position whatsoever.

Carpenter: "If it comes down to it, I don't think the recorder should be an elected official. I think she should be hired. There's nothing political-wise to the office. It should be your skills, and knowledge and punching the clock every day.

NSP: Make your best pitch to voters.

Carpenter: "I've been there 39 years. I

will be in the office just like I am now, 7:30 to 4:30 every day. My coworkers respect me. They like me. They know I'm there to help them.

"When customers come in, I do not have to pass them along to a coworker. As far as her saying we're shorthanded, no we're not. Everybody knows their jobs. When (Vargas) says someone takes one day a week of vacation, that would be me. In summers I take Thursdays. That's a NaNa Day," Carpenter spends with her grandkids. "But after 39 years, I'm entitled to a vacation day.

"By saying that, maybe it's a pat on my back if she's saying the department drops down because I'm the one who runs it and I do my job well.

"I really think I'm the best leader. I think you should vote for someone whose going to come to work, do their job, be nice to the staff, don't make false promises, be honest and have integrity.

Vargas: "I think I've done a lot of things in that office to make it more convenient and accessible to all. We just want to keep moving forward with getting our historical documents on there as well. Many times we get people from all over the country who come because their families had farms here. I take them down the basement and we go through those old records looking for what they want. I answer questions from customers all day long.

"And yes, there are sometimes maybe there is something I don't know. But I'm not afraid to admit I might have to ask somebody else to do that. I am there just about every day, but I'm not required to punch a clock. I'm there, I answer phones and I answer emails ... Throughout the day, I field all those questions as well."

Treasurer: Duax vs. Fennelly

Candidates follow famous fathers' leads

Bill Fennelly's retirement after 23 years as Scott County Treasurer leaves a vacancy that Scott County voters will fill with either his son, Mike, or Jane Duax.

Mike Fennelly is a real estate investor and small business owner running as a Republican for his first-ever bid for public office. Duax is an educator who has been a small business owner, social worker, and Democrat candidate, also following the footsteps of a her late father, former Davenport Mayor and Scott County Supervisor Robert Duax.

Both Duax and Fennelly participated in the North Scott Press' Sept. 20 forum.

NSP: Tell us about your background

Fennelly: "I've been in small businesses for the last 32 years as owner and operator.

It pretty much pertains to everything that happens in the treasurer's office. You have to deal with financing, you have to deal with the public every day. I'm probably the right fit for this job.

"I started in construction busi-

ness and had multiple employees. ... Then I did buy Circle Tap (in Davenport) and if anybody has ever run a restaurant, it's definitely the hardest business I've ever run. It's 24/7, employees, dealing with the public every day. I ran that for 17 years.

"Now I've been in a real estate investment business. I'm not a Realtor. I buy and sell homes, properties, farms.

"I do talk to my father on a daily basis. I really know how the office works. I know a ton of the employees. They're committed.

"For the last 20 plus years, I was an advocate of youth sports. I coached a lot of teams, was on boards of Little Leagues. I'm a member of the Knights of Columbus. As a family we do the Night to Shine Tim Tebow thing. Everyone should do

that.

Duax: "I've worked in four different sectors. I started out as a teacher and was in the field of education for 17 years.... The last eight years was with Black Hawk Community College recruiting adults to be volunteers for students who can't read above the eighth grade level.

"I worked for United Way of the Quad-Cities. I was in charge of the funds distribution process.

"I had 14 years with nonprofits over the years. I also was a small business owner. I owned a bookstore and art gallery on Harrison Street.

"Then I went off to graduate school in Albany, NY. They had a terrific women-in-public-policy studies. I earned a master's with an emphasis in public policy and worked in the New York State Assembly for a session.

"I was at Sears and Roebuck for five years, selling bench power tools. They loved me so much they made me a manager, of men's clothing department and shoe department.

NSP: What experiences will help you as Treasurer?

Fennelly: "I wouldn't just go in and change things. I'm a team player, too. I would go in and talk to all the managers to see what's going on. The only thing changing is the technology, and they've definitely kept up with that."

Fennelly described a Polk County treasurer pilot program that allows car dealers to handle more vehicle registrations.

"There are 80 car dealers in Scott County alone. They're working on a pilot program and they're going to get all the kinks out. Scott County is waiting until that gets done and will be offered to dealers. ... Zimmerman and Hiland across the river sell a lot of cars to people who live in Davenport. The dealers would do all the paperwork and then send it to us."

Duax: "I'm extraordinarily comfortable with computers, and with Excel in particular. I took class at community college.... I'm comfortable with technology. I'm smart and I'm detailed oriented and won't have any issue with the tech-

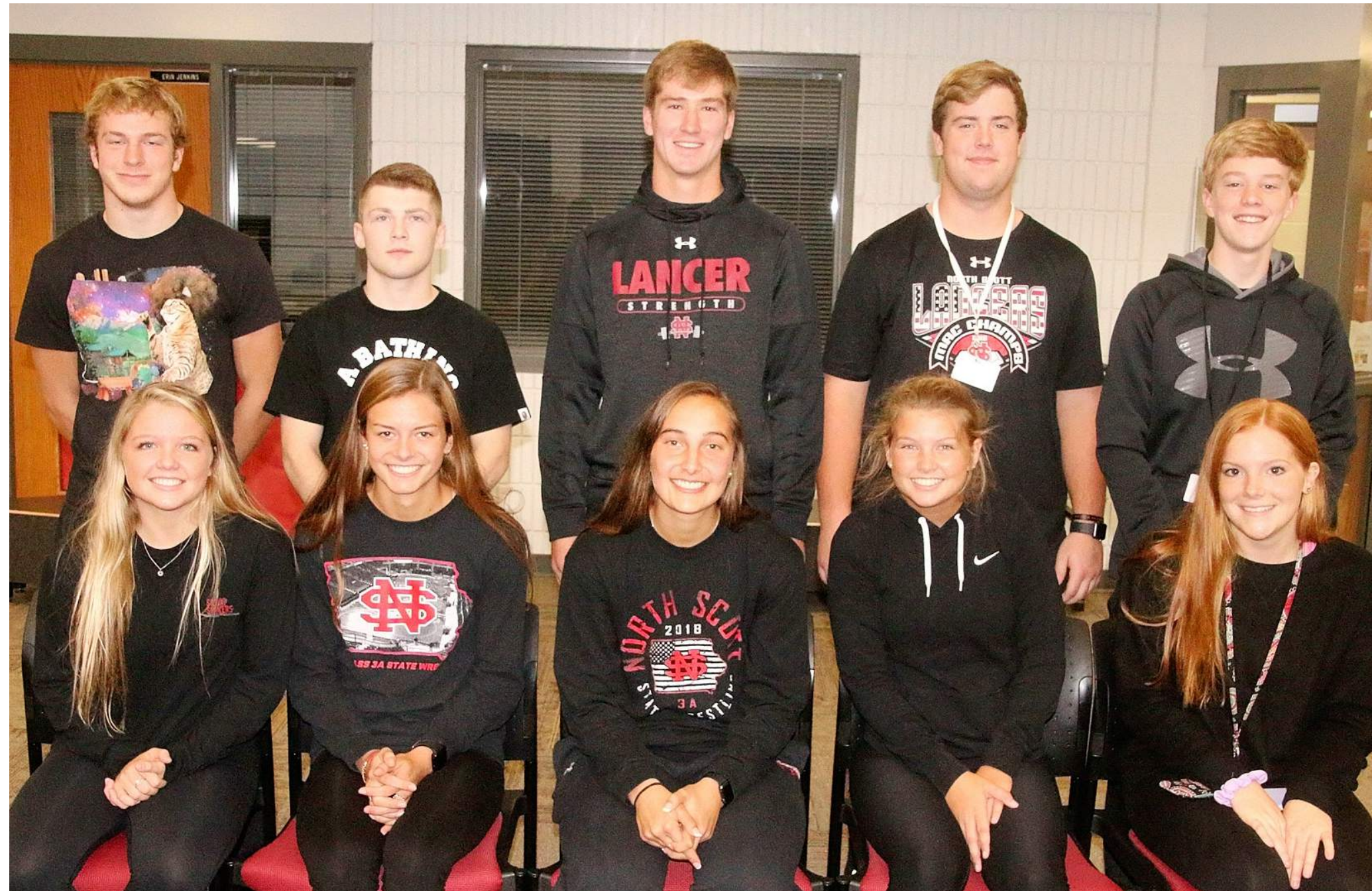

Although the two educators worked in different buildings, they are longtime acquaintances as both grew up in Maquoketa and they graduated from high school just a year apart.

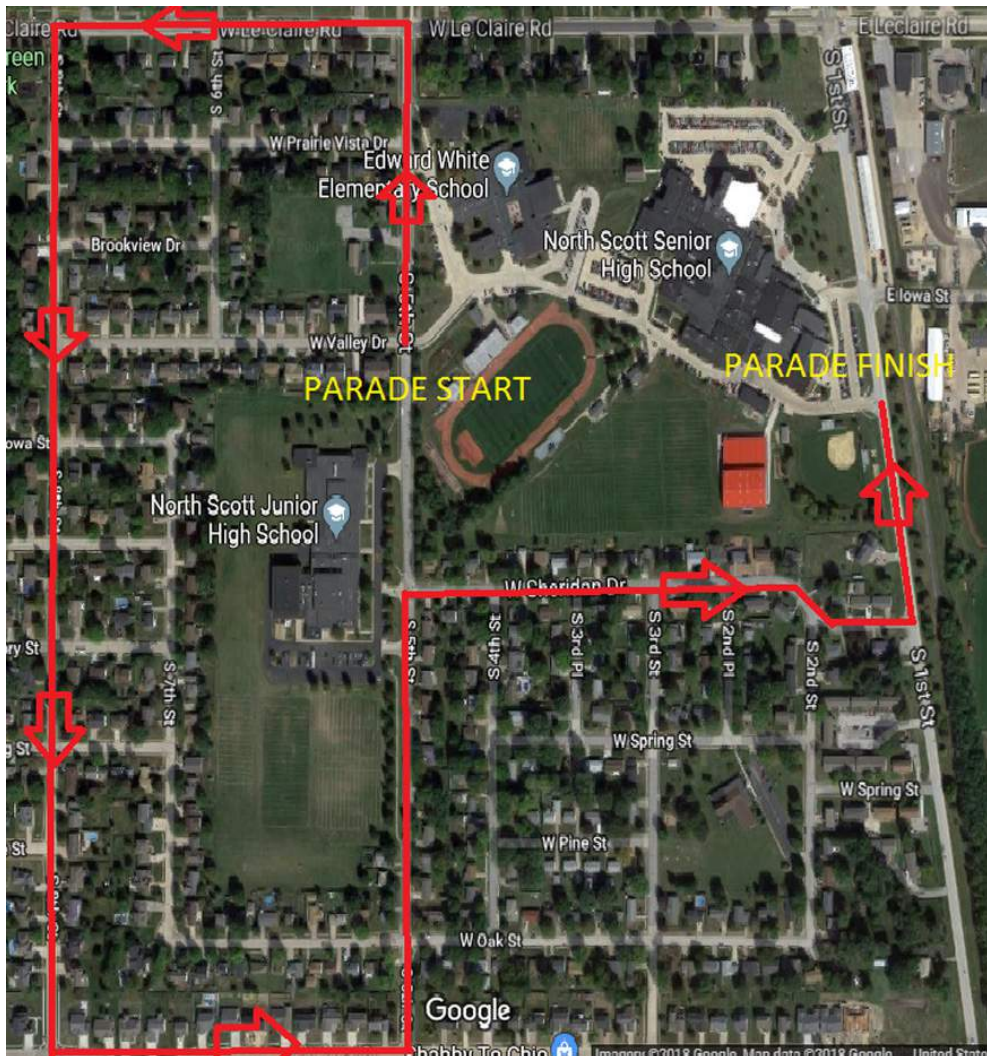

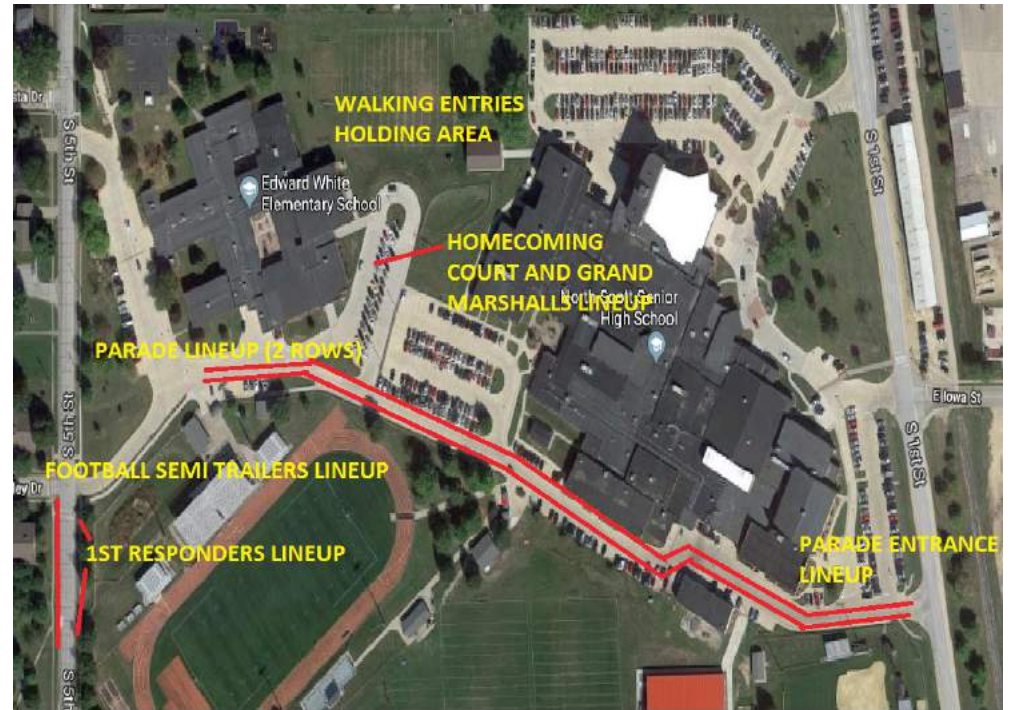

nology.”

NSP: Why are you running now?

Duax: “The first time I ran for any office, it was sort of like a practice job interview. As sort of a lark I ran for 5th ward city council in Davenport back in 2011. It was because there was an opening. I won the primary by 85 percent and it freaked me out, because I didn’t want the job. I didn’t think I’d win by that much.

“Then I thought, maybe I do want this. I worked real hard, then lost by absentee ballot vote.

“Two years ago, ran for county board of supervisors. I worked really hard and I won my primary, but I lost (the general election) by 240 votes.

“This year, Duax said she knew many of those running for supervisor. “I thought Diane Holst was going to run for reelection, too, and I really admire here. I didn’t want to run against Brinson (Kinzer) and Diane Holst.

“My dear friends Ken Croken and Rogers Kirk, who I’ve know for 20 years, both asked me if I was running for county board.

“We needed someone to run against Mikey Fennelly because Bill Fennelly is not Mike and Mike’s not Bill. And I won the primary by nearly 3,000 votes.”

Fennelly: “Everybody asks, well why now? I was never going to run against my dad. I’m a little smarter than that. My dad was always in pretty good shape. We talked about it four years ago and he was still ready to go and healthy and I

still had kids in high school. So I said, in four years, I’ll go. So that’s why.”

NSP: From the audience. When investing tax revenue, will you consider supporting local banks or credit unions instead of large national institutions? As treasurer, how would you advise supervisors who make that decision?

Duax: I’m campaigning on that very issue. Our money needs to be held First Central State Bank, Walcott Bank, Blue Grass Bank, Quad-City bank, not Wells Fargo bank. That’s the only policy piece I’ve been running on.”

Fennelly: “I know they put it out for bid now so it’s open to any bank or credit union. You want to get best value for people of Scott County, so we’re not going to say, ‘Wells Fargo, we’re not going to take your extra one percent on our money.’

“It’s open for any credit union or anything.”

NSP: From the audience. How could the treasurer’s office improve and enhance tax receipts for Scott county?

Fennelly: “It’s an option if you want to

pay online. I think about 66 percent of the people pay their vehicle registration online. If you want to pay on credit card, there is a small fee the county doesn’t get. You want to put that out for bid, too.”

Duax: “I’ve heard from people who pay online that they’re concerned about the fees associated with paying online and wondering where those fees go.

“You get all the way through paying online and you’re hit with a \$12 fee. Who pays that \$12? Can we get a better fee? Can that come back to the county?”

NSP: What parts of your party membership would you bring to this office?

Fennelly: “I’m going to treat anyone who walks in the door the same. It doesn’t matter, Republican, Democrat or independent. We’re there to serve the people.”

Duax: “I grew up in a Republican household and I’m pretty fiscally conservative, so saving money and looking for cost-cutting measures. I’m socially liberal. ... That social liberalism or social justice, more, I’m going to care about our staff and make sure they have

great health benefits. ... I’ll go to bat every time for the employees. I believe in benefits, I believe in health insurance, I believe in fair wages.

NSP: Make your best pitch to voters.

Duax: “I feel like I’ve been training all my life to be a public servant. I feel like I have been a public servant in the volunteer work I’ve done over the years.

She shared childhood memories of helping her dad’s Davenport and board of supervisor campaigns.

“We spent many a summer afternoon driving country roads, talking and stopping to farmers, then getting to stop for an ice cream cone. I really developed a love of Scott County through my adolescent years.

“Then I realized I wanted to learn how government really works. That’s why I studied public policy.

“The timing is right for me. My kids are grown, practically. I’ll work it 40 hours per week. I’ll get certified from state treasurer’s association. You have to be in the office three years to get certified, and I wondered why Bill Fennelly never did. Barb Vance, his assistant is. And I will, and become cross-trained. I’ll work very hard for the tax dollars that are paying my salary.”

Fennelly: “I think with my strong work ethic, my manager skills and leadership, I will fit perfectly in that office. I understand the value of customer service. That’s the biggest part. I’m just excited for the opportunity to serve as your Scott County treasurer.”

Niabi Zoo says farewell to beloved long-term resident

One of Niabi Zoo's oldest residents, Molly, a 35-year-old female Plains Zebra, was euthanized last week due to chronic joint and bone issues brought on by her advanced age.

The animal was under extensive veterinary care that included chronic pain management for the last two years.

"This is never an easy decision, and the zoo's keeper staff, veterinary team, and managers in the end had to consider the animal's quality of life, and the fact that her condition would only deteriorate," said director Lee Jackson.

Jackson said Molly was an "extraordinary animal."

"Only about 25 percent of plains zebras reach the age of 24 in captivity, and in the wild, none do," he said. "According to the American Zoo and Aquarium Association's Plains Zebra species survival plan and studbook, there are 270 Plains Zebra in North America, and the Niabi Zoo's 35-year-old female was the third oldest on record.

"This is a remarkable testament to the level of care afforded the animals at the Niabi Zoo, and to the tireless dedication of our keeper, and veterinary staffs."

As animal care science and veterinary techniques have improved, many animals in zoos are living well past what can be expected by their wild counterparts.

"Molly came to Niabi at the age of one from another institution," said Kristin Stump, primary hoof stock keeper at the zoon. "She was a recognized fixture at the zoo for a generation of zoo visitors.

Impressions

Last week, as I have done annually except for one year since 2003, I joined with friends from the upper Midwest USA and Canada to be inspired at an event called a Rotary Zone Institute. That's where district governors (which I was in 2004-05) meet our international leaders, and learn about progress toward our organizational and humanitarian goals.

The above quote from Malcom Bane (1912-82), a pastor from Odessa, Texas, fits here. If we waited until we could solve all the world's problems, nothing would get done. But the Rotarians at the Institute at Erie, Pa., a city on the northwest tip of Pennsylvania that touches Lake Erie, are people of action, so we take one step at a time.

I love my local community, and this is where I most like to be, but participation in events like this, where we meet face to face with persons from different states, nations and cultures, has given me a broader view on matters that affect us all, such as community development, literacy, health, human trafficking, and many more. Which is why I go.

It is also good for the soul to meet extraordinary people who work to make the world a better place. In this, and future columns, let me tell you about some of them.

Razia Jan

She is a member and past president of the Rotary club in Duxbury, Mass., but this formidable changemaker spends most of her year in Afghanistan, the country of her birth. She came to the U.S. in 1970, and for two decades was proprietor of a tailoring business.

Then came the attacks on the World Trade Center on Sept. 11, 2001. Razia was deeply moved to make a contribution, and rallied her New England community to send more than 400 homemade blankets to the rescue workers at Ground Zero.

Her efforts expanded to include sending care packages to U.S. troops in Afghanistan. Through her involvement with the military's Operation Shoe Fly, she coordinated the delivery of 30,000 pairs of shoes to needy Afghan children. She made handmade quilts commemorating Sept. 11 which have been exhibited in Madison Square Garden, the chapel at the Pentagon, and at fire stations.

We've all heard about Malala Yousafzai, the courageous young girl who defied the Taliban in Pakistan and demanded that girls be allowed to receive an education. She was shot in the head by a Taliban gunman in 2012, but survived and went on to receive the Nobel Peace Prize and has become the *cause célèbre* for all, like me, who believe the way to a better world is increased educational opportunities for girls regardless of religion, nationality or culture.

Razia Jan is taking Malala's work to the next level. When she learned of a historic former boys' school in the Afghan district of Deh'Subz that had been nearly destroyed during decades of war, she began planning to rebuild the school to provide Afghan girls with a more promising future. The Zabuli Education Center opened in 2008 and

now provides free education to girls who were previously denied an education. The girls, at last, have an opportunity to escape the vicious cycle of poverty, malnutrition and hunger. But it hasn't been easy. Razia captivated her audience of 500 when she described her confrontations with the religious leaders (all men). When 35 men said the elder would meet her face to face and bulldoze the school, she didn't back down. "I'll bulldoze the bastard," she warned.

The elder stayed away and the school was built. Enrollment increased every year, and 10 years later, the student body numbers 640. Grads are midwives in a region where 40 percent of babies die in childbirth. The Afghan Ministry of Education declared the school "perfect," which has inspired village elders to support girls' education and hail Razia as the "Mother of Deh'Subz."

The next step, she said, is to build a college. Never underestimate a woman of her determination! "Every day, I thank God for Rotary supporting us," she said. "I've been poor all my life, but my heart is in the right place."

Indeed. She has received many awards, including CNN's 2012 Top 10 Hero Award, the 2007 Woman of Excellence award from Germaine Lawrence Inc., multiple Rotary awards, and certificates of appreciation from the Army Corps of Engineers and the American Legion. She serves on the Interfaith Council, the No Place for Hate Committee, and Jordan Hospital's board of directors.

To meet and be inspired by people like Razia Jan is why I attend Rotary Institutes. You can learn more about her foundation, Razia's Ray of Hope, including how you can support her work, at www.raziasrayofhope.org.

In a world that at times seems crazy, we celebrate people who are making a difference for the good in our local community, as we often do, and around the world.

We are all connected. Ultimately, what happens over there matters here.

And also ...

- Tim Cook, a friend of our daughter Aimee, greeted us with a smile at the Playcrafters Barn Theater on Sept. 16 when we attended "Tuesdays with Morrie," which I wrote about two weeks ago. All was right with the world that day. Now he is gone, the result of a freak accident doing what he loved — theater. Tell people you love how you feel, and make every day count. You never know!

- Ouch! The Cubs were supposed to win the National League Central, weren't they? But how can anyone dislike the Milwaukee Brewers, the small market team that got hot at the right time, winning their last eight games? If the Cubs won Tuesday night, they'll face the Brewers again. Is a repeat of 2016 possible? Go Cubs!

Or an adult woman conspired with Democrats to falsely implicate a federal judge and others for a felony. Either would be state and federal crimes. Neither falls outside any statute of limitations.

If the Brett Kavanaugh investigation was in the hands of professional law enforcement, the next steps would be clear. FBI professionals would conduct a thorough investigation.

Instead, a room full of viciously partisan senators drug the nominee, a witness and the nation through a fruitless spectacle, and only later allowed a weeklong FBI investigation as a compromise.

Worse, I heard Sen. Charles Grassley and other GOP senators explicitly trash the value of FBI investigations. Grassley cowered behind former Sen. Joe Biden's harsh dismissal of past FBI investigations requested by Senate committees.

Biden said it. He was wrong, too. FBI investigations aren't useless time wasters as Grassley and Biden would have us believe. They are meticulous reports that collect first-hand data, then hand it over to others to act upon.

I heard Grassley and his GOP committee majority tell Americans they are not interested in further data from the FBI, or any other witnesses mostly because they believe Sen. Diane Feinstein and her Democratic colleagues are playing games with the committee.

I heard Sen. Lindsey Graham seethe with anger over Feinstein withholding the information for political purposes.

Makes me angry, too. But I'm counting on sober senators to work through their anger and get at facts.

Graham's anger over Feinstein's behavior drove him to ignore evidence of potential crimes clearly dropped in his lap.

Graham made a strong case against Feinstein for obstructing any investigation. But his committee isn't in charge of slamming Democrats. His committee is tasked with vetting Supreme Court justices.

Most of the questions from GOP senators and their hired gun were

aimed at discrediting the witness and Democrats.

FBI agents certainly could shed light on the crimes Christine Blasey Ford says happened in 1982, or the crimes Republicans infer were committed this summer when they believe Ford conspired with Democrats.

Time certainly complicates criminal investigations. It doesn't prevent them.

Just last month, Scott County prosecutors pursued a conviction in a 28-year-old homicide. They interviewed old witnesses, reviewed data and presented it to a jury that could not reach a conclusion.

Go to lowacoldcases.com/solved to read facts about old cases from 2012, 2009, 2005, 1999 and 1992 pursued to convictions decades later.

Professional law enforcers routinely resurrect cold cases to piece together new evidence.

Grassley, Graham and their GOP colleagues seemed oblivious to that possibility. All that seems to matter is sticking it to Democrats.

All that mattered to Democrats was turning a senate confirmation hearing into a campaign event for the fall election. Instead of asking questions to fill in pertinent details, senate Democrats lauded the first witness, then goaded the next.

And Judge Kavanaugh took the bait. As a judge, Kavanaugh certainly knows how witnesses should behave. As a witness, Kavanaugh taunted senators, turning questions back on them and dragged out his own answers to fill Grassley's entirely made-up schedule.

Taunting senators and filibustering direct questions are not crimes. Sex assault and false report of a felony, are.

In my view, they are crimes more important than hustling a highly partisan nominee to a lifetime government job.

It's been three months since President Trump's July 9 nomination of Kavanaugh. Grassley famously allowed a Supreme Court vacancy for nine months, the longest Senate confirmation delay in history, specifically so President Trump could fill it.

Let the professionals at the FBI tell the Senate committee how long a thorough investigation of these possible crimes should take.

Let the committee proceed with the best information possible, not just the best it can muster in a week.

Kaeli's dancing dream exceeds expectation

There's no question that University of Iowa freshman Kaeli Verbrugge had plenty of goosebumps when she took to the Kinnick Stadium field for Iowa's home opener last month.

Becoming a member of the school's Spirit squad was a dream come true for the 2018 North Scott graduate, but when it came time for the "greatest tradition in college football," the end-of-the-first-quarter wave to

patients of the Stead Family Children's Hospital, you have to forgive the bubbly Verbrugge for getting a little emotional.

Talk about a cool moment!

Standing on the sidelines, her arms outstretched, along with those of 70,000 fans, players, coaches and officials, Verbrugge's wave was a little more personal as she gazed at the hospital windows.

She knew that looking down was a young family with a 4-month-old baby who just happened to be her namesake, and they all shared a special connection.

Verbrugge met Andy and Nicole Knapp the summer before her senior year of high school, when she attended a church camp at Grinnell College. Nicole was Verbrugge's huddle leader, and the two developed an instant friendship.

"We kept in touch after camp, and had a really good relationship," said Verbrugge. "Then I was on Facebook one day and happened to read that she was pregnant, and that they were going to stream their reveal party live."

Verbrugge made sure to watch, and she was totally taken aback when she found out it was going to be a girl, and that Andy and Nicole were going to name their daughter Kaeli.

"It was like, 'Oh my goodness, how cool.'" said Verbrugge. "Then I was reading the comments, and noticed she was spelling it the same exact way my name is spelled.

"I texted Nicole right away, and she said she fell in love with the way I spelled it, 'cause it was so different, and that just getting to know me was amazing, and that I was such a sweet girl.

"I was just in shock, and never would've imagined that to happen."

Before little Kaeli was born on May 11, it was discovered that she had a hole in her heart and a narrow pulmonary artery. When she was 13 days old she had her first open heart surgery, which was followed by a lot of complications that left her in critical condition.

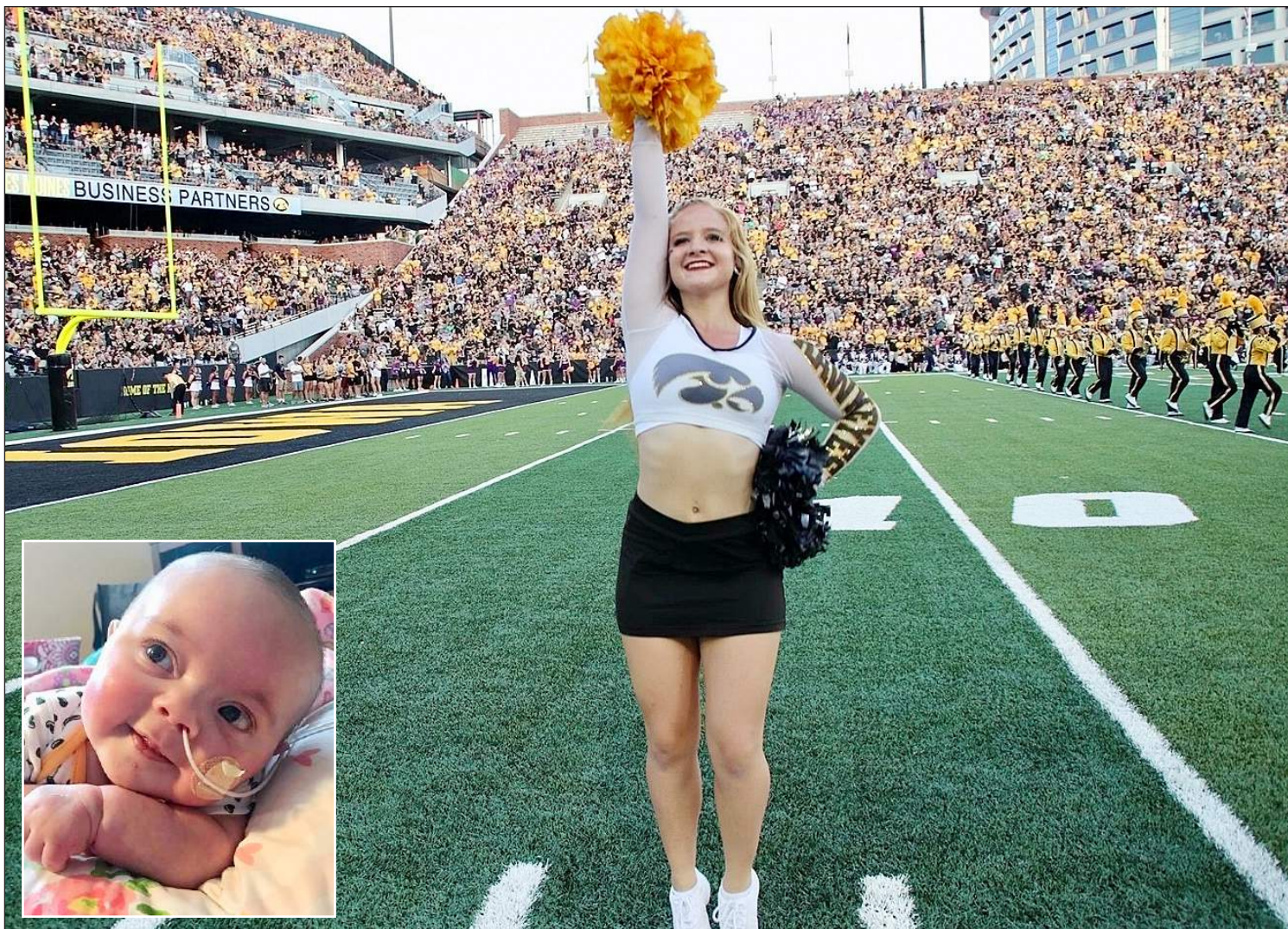
Later, she was able to go home a few days at a time, but had to keep coming back to the hospital because of low oxygen levels. In August, she underwent major heart surgery, and has been recovering ever since.

"Right after she was born, my boyfriend, Cole Graham, and I went up to see her the first weekend in June," said Verbrugge, "and that was my first time seeing the hospital.

"Nicole showed up on the 12th floor when we were there, and we got to go see Kaeli. She was all bundled up and asleep, with every sort of hookup you could imagine. She was so teeny tiny.

"I was in awe at that point of how strong she was, and how strong her parents were," she continued. "This was their first child, and it was very overwhelming 'cause I'd never seen anything like that."

Little Kaeli was in the hospital for all four Iowa home games in September, and at the end of each first quarter, and Kaeli the dancer looked toward the

hospital and waved.

"Knowing she was up there was just incredible," said Verbrugge, "and I knew they were looking down on me. Nicole texted me afterwards and said she was telling everyone up there about me, and using her binoculars to try and find me.

"I was in shock about that, and there were definitely a lot of emotions knowing she was up there."

Verbrugge stopped by the hospital two other times after that initial visit. Little Kaeli was finally discharged on Monday, Sept. 24, two days after the Wisconsin game.

"It's definitely been a special way to start my freshman year," said Verbrugge, the daughter of Wade Verbrugge and Tracy Verbrugge. "It was crazy walking into Kinnick the first time. We walked out of our locker room, and the amount of fans was incredible.

"Experiencing that excitement was amazing."

Dancing a dream

Being a member of the Iowa Spirit Squad is a dream come true for the former Lancer Silver Shaker. She vividly remembers dancing at the state competition and looking up to the elite Hawkeye dancers who were competing in the collegiate division.

"They are such an elite team, that has placed in the top three at nationals, that I never imagined that I'd be on the team," said Verbrugge. "Even now, when I'm at practice, I have to remind

myself that it's real."

Verbrugge's journey began last fall when she made the decision to attend Iowa and pursue a major in speech and hearing. She knew she wasn't ready to give up dance, and attended a few tryout clinics over the next few months.

"I went to a few of those just to get my face out there, cause it's good to know the coach before tryouts," she said.

Official tryouts were held over the course of three days in April, starting on a Friday night and wrapping up on Sunday in Carver-Hawkeye Arena.

Nearly 50 girls were trying out for 20 spots, including members of last year's squad.

Verbrugge was fortunate to make the first cut on Friday night, and advanced to Sunday's final round of cuts after a strong showing on Saturday.

There, in front of a live audience, Verbrugge was paired with another dancer and the two performed a pair of routines in front of a line of judges.

"I was really nervous on Sunday," said Verbrugge. "The first two days were a lot more laid back, because you weren't in Carver and there wasn't a crowd. The last day I definitely had a lot

of nerves walking into Carver. There were a lot of people watching."

Verbrugge did well. After the routines were completed, the judges and the Iowa coach retreated to a back room to make their final decisions, and the former Lancer was thrilled when the coach came back and read off her number.

She was one of eight freshmen to make this year's squad.

"I was in shock for a little bit, and just wanted to make sure I heard my number," said Verbrugge. "I was just looking for my parents, and there were lots of emotions. It was a pretty awesome moment."

Over the summer she had to make trips to Iowa City to learn routines, and the team attended a team camp in the Wisconsin Dells in July.

"Camp was actually my first time dancing with the whole group," said Verbrugge, "and dancing at freshman orientation was my first time in uniform representing the Iowa dance team."

With four home football games in September, it's been a pretty hectic start to her college career, but Verbrugge is loving every minute.

Over the course of the next several months, she'll dance at volleyball and basketball games, as well as wrestling meets. The team will also participate in several competitions.

"So far, it's been really awesome," said Verbrugge. "I've loved every second of it, and I'm looking forward to the rest of the year."

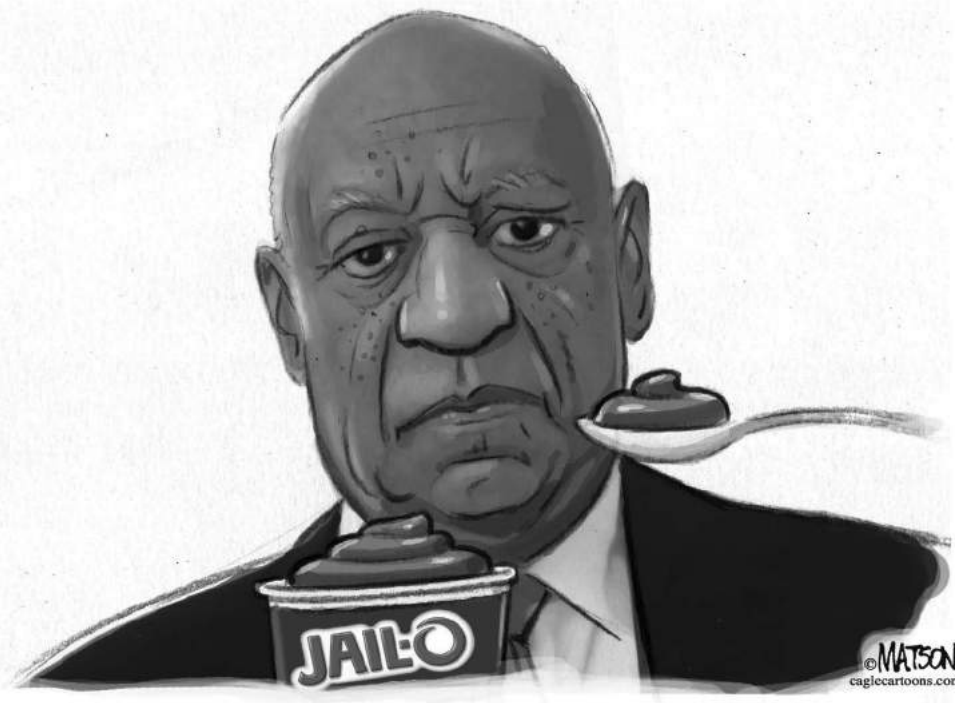

The Lancer football team defeated Morrison 26-14 to stand at the top of the Illowa Conference along with Sterling Newman with a record of two wins and no losses. Team members included Denny Strobbe, Dan Van DeWiele, Bob Wallace, Dick Pischke, Larry Litscher and Steve Billups.

Mr. and Mrs. Vincent Sheridan of Long Grove learned that their son, Dennis, had been assigned to overseas duty with the Army in Viet Nam, where he would serve as a field medic.

Oct. 5, 1978

Subscribers of the 30-year-old McCausland Cooperative Telephone Company voted to approve the sale of the company to Central Scott Telephone Company of Eldridge for \$97,000. With the purchase, McCausland subscribers would receive the benefit of extended area toll-free calling to Davenport, Bettendorf, Blue Grass and Buffalo, Eldridge, Park View, Long Grove and Donahue and most of

the rural portions of north central Scott County.

Janice Welch, Peggy Geary, Teresa Nelson, Michelle Steffe, Cathy Zimlich, Monica Seghers, Rebeca Schatz, Sue Cartensen, Jayne Tombergs, and Sharon Spies were selected to represent North Scott High School as candidates for homecoming queen.

Jim Kuhl was elected president of the Scott County Farm Bureau. Wayne Waetke served as secretary with Glen Keppy as treasurer.

Sept. 29, 1993

Edgar Holden, outgoing president of the Pioneer Settlers (a group that included individuals whose forefathers settled in Scott County before Dec. 31, 1846), passed the ceremonial cane to new president Gene Ehrecke.

Robert and Suzy VenHorst hosted a family cookout at their home to celebrate their 25th wedding anniversary.

1990 North Scott graduate Joanne Wilson, daughter of Richard and Jean Wilson, Bettendorf, was the drum major for the Iowa State University Marching Band where she lead the 265-member band at seven home football games and also at half time of the road game with Kansas. She had also performed a senior percussion recital at the music hall at ISU and was active in many musical groups as well as Golden Key Honor Society and Kappa Delta Pi Honorary Education Fraternity.

Jason Shannon shot a 39 to lead the North Scott golf team to a victory over Davenport West. Mark Andresen, Cliff Duda, Eric Langan and Chris Deutmeyer also contributed to the win.

Oct. 1, 2003

McCausland residents Bill and Donna McCaughey sold their business, The Corner Market, after operating it for 28 years and living in the community for over 50 years. The combination grocery store, restaurant and gas station sold kitchen staples, prepared meals and gas. Town residents depended on the business for groceries, for gas, and to provide restaurant fare.

The Scott County Library held a week-long grand opening celebration for the newly renovated \$2.5 million facility. The building had formerly served as home to Slagle's Supermarket. As part of the festivities, former library director, Kay Runge, returned and reminisced about the history of the Scott County Library System, recalling memories, some humorous, from the years she served as director. Iowa's first lady Christie Vilsack visited Eldridge, where she toured the Scott County Library and held a public forum to discuss this particular project and also other Iowa achievements that were helping to transform the Iowa economy. She presented a proclamation from the governor to Eldridge mayor Frank Wood. The document declared that Sept. 23 had been designated as "Pride in Eldridge Day."

Bob Wiese of Eldridge was honored for 50 years of service to the Eldridge Lions Club.

Oct. 2, 2013

A new bookmobile was unveiled at the Scott County Library's "Sundaes on Sunday" open house. The unit was purchased for \$244,185 and was paid for with private donations.

Members of the Walcott American Legion Post 548, Walcott American Legion Auxiliary, Walcott Day Committee and other volunteer service organizations presented an American flag to every classroom at Walcott School.

North Scott teachers and administrative retirees were honored at the district's Employee Recognition Program at the North Scott High School auditorium. The group included David Griffin, Brad Merrick, Jeff Newmeister, Marcia Donaubauer, Linda Mixdorf, Jan Goettesch, Donna Sharp, and C.J. Albertson.

Pickleball enthusiasts in the North Scott area organized and began meeting at the North Scott High School tennis courts twice a week, where North Scott school building and grounds workers had painted the appropriate boundary lines on three of the courts.

Taking care of business

Lancers roll past Liberty; will entertain Clinton for homecoming game

It was a business trip, pure and simple, because, well, no one expected this to be much of a game.

They were right. It wasn't.

Amidst the backdrop of a new, glitzy and big-dollar high school stadium, North Scott provided plenty of thunder to dim Iowa City Liberty's Lightning with a never-in-doubt 44-15 Class 3A district road win Friday night.

It was North Scott's fifth straight victory as the Lancers continue to follow the road map of last year's 8-1 season, when they dropped the season opener and then reeled off eight regular-season wins.

Now, things get decidedly tougher, as the sixth-ranked Lancers head into the make-or-break part of their schedule, starting with Friday night's Homecoming tussle with Clinton.

While the Lancers will wear the favorite's tag, they'll need to keep their heads on straight and not look past the visiting River Kings, with unbeaten Clear Creek-Amana and arch-rival Davenport Assumption — two games that will most likely determine the district champion — looming on the immediate horizon.

The River Kings are coming off back-to-back losses to Assumption (40-7) and Clear Creek-Amana (28-0), but they are 3-3 on the season after posting what was thought to be an impressive 3-1 non-district start.

"Clinton's quarterback got injured early last year, and he's been running

Lancers ready for strong end-of-season run

Schrock, Lafrenz lead the way at Wartburg

A week that began with the frustration of a last-minute meet cancellation ended on a positive note for North Scott's cross country teams.

Just don't pay attention to the team standings from Saturday's Wartburg Invitational.

After having Tuesday's (Sept. 25) meet at Iowa City West called off because of a late afternoon thunderstorm, North Scott put in a hard practice instead, and it paid off with some strong performances in Waverly.

Yes, the Lancer girls, who dropped out of the Class 4A rankings, came home eighth in a star-studded 25-team field, but they were competing without senior Sommer Clydesdale, who was attending a wedding, and junior Presley Case.

North Scott's boys finished 12th, but were running without senior Gabe Jen-

sen and sophomores Max Adkisson and Owen West.

"Wartburg is a unique meet where teams from all over Iowa and Minnesota come to run," said Lancer coach Amy Knoche. "We told the kids before their races that some of the best talent in the state of Iowa is here, and to be one of the best."

"We ended up having a record-setting type of day. Of the 12 boys we took, all of them ran season personal records, and 11 of them walked away with a career PR. On the girls' side, of the 12 running,

10 ran season bests and seven ran a career PR."

Even though it may not be evident in the team standings, Knoche said Saturday's meet might be a turning point for both squads.

"We have yet to fire on all cylinders at a meet this season, and I'm looking forward to our meet in Clinton (on Saturday) when we will finally be at full strength," she said. "Some of the kids have been frustrated because they

the heck out of it lately," said Lancer coach Kevin Tippet. "He throws it well and they have some good skill kids. I think it will be a new test this week. Every week I think it gets a little bit tougher."

It appears that the Lancers are in taking-care-of-business mode.

"It feels good to be 2-0 in district, but none of us expected anything less," said senior linebacker Mason Watts. "We expect to win out our district, and we'll keep practicing with that attitude no matter who we play."

"I feel good heading into Homecoming. I'm very confident with the way we've been playing, so Homecoming should be just another game."

Everybody knows that Homecoming Week brings a whole different set of emotions and distractions, and Tippet say it's important for his troops to keep their heads focused on the task at hand.

"I'll probably get myself in trouble for saying this, but Homecoming's a great week, and it's a lot of fun, as long as our guys keep focused on the main thing," he said. "If you take care of business on Friday night, it's a fun week, but it's not a lot of fun if you lose a football game."

Apparently, seniors Nile McLaughlin and TJ Yates have heard Tippet's message loud and clear.

"Homecoming will be fun, and there's a lot going on this week, but we just have to make sure we're focused," said McLaughlin. "We just have to keep our heads straight."

"We'll stay focused," added Yates. "It's been kind of fun ruining other people's homecomings, so hopefully we can take care of business and make sure that doesn't happen to us."

"I'm definitely confident the further that we head into district games. I'm feeling really good about the team. We need to keep getting better throughout the season, and we have to peak at the right time."

North Scott seems to have done just that, as Friday's win over a young and inexperienced Liberty team kept the Lancer Express headed in the right di-

rection.

With a brand-spanking-new No. 6 state ranking plastered on the back of their jerseys, the North Scott attack was methodical yet precise as the Lancers scored on their first three possessions and rolled to a 41-7 halftime advantage.

Following back-to-back games where the Lancers left yellow laundry lying all over the field, Friday night's effort was a load of a different color as North Scott eliminated any drive-killing penalties.

"It was a good, solid win," said Tippet, in his shortest post-game talk of the season. "We did some things better, but we need to keep climbing that ladder. We can't be satisfied with where we're at. We have to keep building."

Later, after his team had headed for the showers, he reiterated that he was happy with his team's effort, and how they bounced back from a sluggish performance at Central DeWitt a week earlier.

"We had a couple small penalties here and there, but nothing major," said Tippet. "We played cleaner, and overall I'm pretty happy."

"In practice, we just talked about it really coming down to being disciplined to doing your job on a consistent basis.

We talked about how if you weren't disciplined, it was going to cost you playing time. We can't continue to reward the same behavior, and either you can do your job or we have to find somebody who can do your job.

"I like how they responded. We did a good job tonight."

The Lancers looked sharp from the opening kick-off, marching 60 yards in 10 plays, with senior Jacob Porth opening the floodgates with a two-yard run.

North Scott racked up 308 yards of offense in the first half, and other first-half scores came on McLaughlin strikes to junior Ty Anderson (6 yards) and senior Carson Rollinger (25 yards), and paydirt-finding runs by McLaughlin (2 yards), Porth (8 yards) and junior Quentin Allison (5 yards).

"Getting off to a good start is important, and it's always good to have a score on the first possession," said McLaughlin, who completed 14 of 19 passes, for 194 yards, in just two quarters of action. "We knew they weren't the best, but we knew they were going to give us a little fight. We prepared like it, and it was good."

North Scott's defense was just as sharp. While the Lightning did finish with 175 yards of total offense, 76 came on their lone score of the first half, when there was a mix-up in the Lancer secondary.

"We blew a coverage on their first touchdown, and it was a play we had practiced against all week," said Tippet. "We just weren't as disciplined as we should've been on that one, but overall, I thought our defense played well."

Watts agreed with his head coach. "We knew that they were very run-heavy, and it was nice to take away the run early, and they had to resort to the

This wasn't expected to be much of a contest, but after the way the Lancers played against Central DeWitt the previous week, I wasn't taking anything for granted.

It was clear from the get-go that Liberty, with a lineup that included just one senior, 10 sophomores and three freshmen, was totally overmatched. Quarterback Nile McLaughlin set the tone on the opening drive with three big completions, and connected on his first eight tosses. It was clear the Lightning had no answers.

The Lancers were just as impressive on defense with four quarterback sacks and another tackle for a loss.

North Scott should be heavily favored again this week, but then it's Katie-bar-the-door with two games that will most definitely determine the district championship. They will travel to Clear Creek-Amana before hosting Assumption in the regular season finale.

Slow start no problem for Lancers

McLaughlin, Powell lead NS girls past Blue Devils

Wanting to build momentum for the post-season, North Scott kept the train on the rails last week as the Lancers picked up their fourth straight Mississippi Athletic Conference win with a 23-25, 25-21 25-19, 25-23 win over Davenport Central on Tuesday.

After overcoming a slow start that had coach Allie Miguel pacing the sidelines, the Lancers found their rhythm thanks in part to freshman Ella McLaughlin's personal coming out party and won for the eighth time in their last 11 outings.

The Lancers, who maintained their No. 13 Class 4A ranking last week, will now look to finish the season strong as they await the announcement of the all-important regional pairings.

They were scheduled to host Muscatine last night (Tuesday), where a win would keep their slim MAC title hopes alive, and they'll travel to Clear Creek-Amana on Saturday for a five-team round-robin invitational.

There, they will take on the No. 15 Clippers, as well as Mid-Prairie, Union, Central DeWitt and Iowa Valley. They will visit Davenport North on Monday.

"Things are good," said Miguel. "With us, Clinton and Dubuque Wahler all being ranked, we're hoping that maybe we all won't end up in the same bracket. Maybe that's wishful thinking, but we're

anxious to see how things fall out."

The Lancers kept the hopes of an alternative regional path alive with the win over Central, but they had to overcome a shaky start to do it.

"It turned out to be a really good game, and I think we were pretty evenly matched," said Miguel. "It took us a little while to warm up, and I was a little nervous for the first set and a half.

"I just think we came out a little flat, and our energy wasn't quite where it needs to be. That's something we've struggled with all season, and we don't seem ready to go from the first point."

The Blue Devils took advantage, and controlled the net while winning the opening set, and then jumped to a 10-4 lead in the second set before North Scott finally came to life.

Sparked by the serving of sophomore Taylor Robertson and junior Adriane Latham, the Lancers battled back to eventually tie the count at 20, and then won four of five points for the victory that launched a three-set winning streak.

"Our girls are a little bit more laid back in nature, and they just need to be pushed a little more to get out of their comfort zone and go hard right away," said Miguel. "They did a really good job of responding, and they've done a good job of fighting back all season.

"I liked the way the girls clawed back and made a big statement in that second set."

After finding the win column, the Lancers kept the pedal to the medal and got contributions from just about everybody.

However, it was McLaughlin and junior Emma Powell who led the hitting parade with 16 kills apiece, while junior Kendal McNaul was also in double digits with 10.

"Everybody ended up playing well, but Ella, Emma and Kendal were all on fire in that second set," said Miguel. "It's just so nice to have all that firepower with a balanced attack.

"When you sit back and watch, and

you can see three excellent hitters that do a good job for us day in and day out, and it's not always the same three, it's fun to have that versatility."

"It was a fun night, and especially fun to watch Ella come out of her shell a little more," said Miguel. "She was hitting some awesome line shots like crazy, and Kendal did an awesome job in the middle and really got us some kills in sets two and three."

Senior Maddie Allison was again a tiger on defense, leading the Lancers with 25 digs, while Powell added 24, as well as

four ace serves.

Latham, who has filled in admirably for injured senior Emma Morgan, finished with four ace serves, while Robertson and junior Sam Lee had three timely aces.

"Sam has been our little go-to server lately, and she has stepped up and did some good serving," said Miguel. "Adriane also did a great job, and she got on a couple of runs with some aces that helped us in key times.

"I feel really good with where we're at right now. The girls are working hard as a team, and we're getting some good team wins."

haven't been posting times up to their expectations, but I've been telling them to be patient and to trust the process."

The Lancers have been starting to change the emphasis in practice, from endurance training to more speed work, and it appears they are starting to reap the benefits.

"With all of our kids running outstanding at Wartburg, this race was just the shot of confidence that they needed to propel us into the homestretch of our season," said Knoche. "I can't praise the kids enough on how pleased I am with how the day went."

It was cool and damp in Waverly, which made for ideal racing conditions, except for a few muddy areas that were nothing like what the Lancers had already encountered earlier in the year.

On the girls' side of the competition, junior Abbi Lafrenz led the way with a 28th-place finish, while senior Chloe Engelke finished 48th, marking the first time she wasn't the first Lancer across the finish line.

Junior Zoe Warm, seemingly feeling no ill effects from a hip injury sustained in her previous outing, came home 56th, followed by sophomore Grace Sindt (60th), freshman Ava Garrard (67th), junior Emily Kundel (71st) and senior Katie Jackovich (134th).

"Abbi is a kid who always seems to peak at the right time at the end of the season," said Knoche, "and this year is turning out to be no different. She is running strong with a lot of confidence.

"Chloe finished in the No. 2 spot, but is still running consistent. She finished only 3 seconds off her season best, so it was still a good race for her."

Knoche said that Warm was one of the biggest surprises of the day.

"She had a phenomenal race, taking 90 seconds off of her previous season best time, and running a career PR," said Knoche. "To be honest, after not being able to finish her last race, I wasn't sure what she would be able to give.

"Zoe comes from a bloodline rich in North Scott cross country history, as both her parents and her uncles ran for excellent teams at North Scott in the 1990s. I think having that background and being around running all her life has just made her so mentally tough."

Knoche said the only negative on the day was the fact that Jackovich had an issue with her heart.

"Katie had another episode that didn't allow her to be at her best," said Knoche, "but I'm confident she'll bounce back."

Onalaska captured the team title, placing all five runners in the top 17, followed by Pleasant Valley, Dubuque Senior, Urbandale, Iowa City Liberty, Bettendorf, Indianola and the Lancers.

Schrock paces boys' team

Although the Lancers finished in the middle of the 27-team field, which was topped by Dubuque Hempstead, Dubuque Senior, Indianola and Linn-Mar, their performance just might be a sign of good things to come.

Competing without Jensen and Adkisson — who were with the school choir at the Kansas City Renaissance Festival — and West, who is still out with an injury, the Lancers still gave a good accounting of themselves.

"Having those three guys out gave some of our other guys, who have been competing for spots, a chance to run against varsity competition," said Knoche. "They really stepped up their game and ran well."

Up next

The Lancers were scheduled to compete at Thursday's Saber Invitational in DeWitt, a popular race on their schedule, but due to Homecoming festivities they have pulled out of the meet.

They will next take to the track on Saturday at the Clinton Invitational, and it will be their final tune-up prior to the MAC meet on Thursday, Oct. 11, which will also be at Clinton.

Although it's beginning to sound like a broken record, senior Jackson Schrock again led the Lancers, this time with a 29th-place finish, and his performance is something to remember.

"Jackson had a career day," said Knoche. "His time of 16:32 ranks him fourth on North Scott's list of fastest 5k times for boys, and cements him as one of the greats to go through the North Scott cross country program.

"He was one that had been frustrated with his race times this season. He is the hardest worker we have, and has been clocking some impressive times at practice, but had yet to bust one in a race. This race is just what he needed mentally to keep pushing."

Chase Porter finished 48th, followed by fellow sophomore Will Dowda (78th), senior Colin Wiersema (84th), junior Bryce Golden (89th), sophomore Ben Boddicker (104th) and freshman Luke Crawford (105th).

"Chase continues to run well, and also had a career day," said Knoche. "Will was a great surprise, and he just keeps dropping time, running over a minute faster than he has all year. Colin had a gutsy finish at the end, kicking it in to pass six or seven guys in the last 200 meters."

Loehr would cap the drive with the TD run, followed by a successful PAT.

"The defense would then take the field, with the Blue Devils opening with their own 22 yard line, after terrific kickoff coverage. The defense would get a three and out, with Connor Lutke getting a tackle for loss, along with tremendous pressure on the quarterback by Hunter Kaufmann. After a bad punt by Central, the Lancers would take over with only 35 yards needed to gain to score for the second drive of the night. After this great field position, our offensive line would respond with a well blocked play, allowing Butler to gain 20 yards on a run to setup the Lancers inside the red zone. Jakob Nelson would then get involved on the drive, with key catches that ultimately led to another Lancer score, with the Lancers going up 14-0 after two drives.

"The defense would then respond again, limiting the Blue Devils on the ground and in the air. Central would ultimately try to convert a fourth and long at midfield, but Hunter Kaufmann would have great coverage to get the turnover on downs.

"After scoring the first two drives on the night, we would look to keep the momentum going. We would take over at midfield and look to score. The Lancers would convert a nicely executed 15 yard gain, with Loehr connecting to Ryan Campbell for a nice catch to move within the red zone. We would end up driving into the 15 yard line, but would not convert the drive into points. Central would take over in the red zone and a lost opportunity would occur.

"The Lancers would then take the field on defense, continuing to dominate the line of scrimmage. Adam Allen, Lucas Oeschner, Hunter Kaufmann, along with the linebackers of Connor Ludtke, Jakob Nelson, Ryan Campbell, Joe Knepper, and Braxton Townsley really stuck to the game plan well and limited the Blue Devils running attack. This group, would get another stop on the next drive, setting up great field position for our offense. Unfortunately, some timely penalties and miscues limited the offense somewhat in the second quarter.

"The Lancer offense would get back on track in the second half, set up by an interception by Ryan Campbell, to allow the offense to take over inside the Central 20 yard line. This ultimately led to another score to put the Lancers up 21-0 in the second half. On the next drive Central would lose possession of the football after a fumble, and allow Loehr to connect with Nelson on a 40 yard catch for the touchdown. It was nicely executed and a nice call by our offensive coordinator Coach McLaughlin to get the big play. All week long we have preached to make the big plays in order to win the football game, and the guys responded. This put the Lancers up 27-0 and a great cap to the night for the offense. While our offense wasn't perfect we believe we can keep getting better, having eleven guys execute and be more consistent. Central would score one touchdown on the night, but overall the defense played lights out and look to improve moving forward. We look forward to getting better as a team while learning to work hard, be unselfish, and have integrity in all aspects of life."

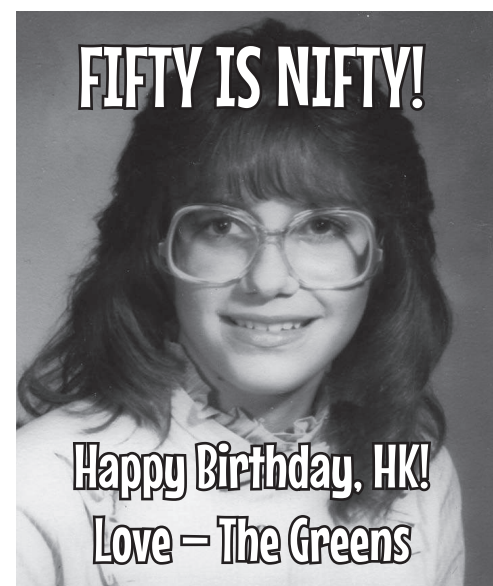

**Board Minutes
September 24, 2018**

NOTE: These minutes are unofficial until approved by the board at the next regular meeting.

A regular meeting of the North Scott Board of Directors was held on September 24, 2018, at 6:30 p.m. at the Jr. High. All members were present: John Maxwell, Molly Bergfeld, Joni Dittmer, Glen Keppy, Tracy Lindaman, Mark Pratt and Donn Wilmott.

President Maxwell called the meeting to order at 6:30 p.m.

There were no changes to the agenda. Dittmer moved to approve the minutes of the September 10, 2018 Special Meeting and September 10, 2018 Regular Meeting, seconded by Wilmott. Motion unanimously approved.

Board Treasurer Steve Fahrenkrog presented the Treasurer's Annual Report. The treasurer's cash balance on June 30, 2018 was \$15,765,344.68 while the secretary's cash balance was \$15,406,932.27. Interest earned for the year was \$371,986.05, an increase of \$228,258.69 over the previous year. Dittmer moved to approve the Treasurer's Annual Report, seconded by Keppy. Motion unanimously approved.

Jill Van Roekel, Director of Business Affairs, presented the 2017-18 Certified Annual Report (CAR). The General Fund current assets totaled \$24 million and general fund liabilities totaled \$17 million. The General Fund fund balance was \$6 million for FY17, it is \$6.9 million for FY18. Revenues totaled \$34.5 million, while expenditures totaled \$33.6 million. General Fund expenditures by object are the same as the prior year; 83% of those expenditures are for salaries and benefits. The solvency ratio is an indicator of our financial position. This ratio went up from the prior year, from 15.9% to 18.3%.

Van Roekel also reported on the Special Ed Supplement (SES). Revenues increased due to Special Ed weightings. Expenditures also increased. Medicaid revenues decreased slightly, and the Special Ed deficit was increased. At one time, the District's Special Ed deficit was nearly \$1 million; the current deficit is \$286,740. Van Roekel asked for board approval to request additional allowable growth and supplemental aid for the negative special education balance.

Wilmott moved to approve the CAR, seconded by Dittmer. Motion unanimously approved.

Dittmer moved to approve the request for additional allowable growth and supplemental aid for the negative special education balance, seconded by Wilmott. Motion unanimously approved.

Jill Van Roekel reviewed several items regarding the bill list, and presented the following bills for approval: General Fund - \$142,300.77, Student Activity Fund - \$21,707.88, Management Fund - \$14,381.97, Sales Tax Fund - \$260,340.20, PPEL Fund - \$12,479.00, School Nutrition Fund - \$46,133.11, Child Care Fund - \$3,772.13, Agency Fund - \$34.99, for a total of \$501,150.05. Keppy moved to approve the bills as presented, seconded by Dittmer. Motion unanimously approved.

Joe Stutting presided during the election of officers, and called for nominations for President. Dittmer nominated Glen Keppy for President, seconded by Wilmott. Motion unanimously approved. Stutting then called for nominations for Vice-President. Wilmott nominated Mark Pratt for Vice President, seconded by Dittmer. Maxwell nominated Tracy Lindaman for Vice-President, seconded by Dittmer. Nominations were 4 votes for Tracy and 3 votes for Mark. Tracy Lindaman was declared Vice President. Motion unanimously approved. The Oath of Office was administered by Board Secretary Terina Bruns to the President and Vice President.

A roster of Board meeting dates for 2018-19 school year was presented. Board meetings are scheduled for the 2nd and 4th Monday of each month, with the exception of December and March. A work session will be held on the first Monday in March. Only one Board meeting will be held in June and July, on the third Monday of each of those months. Meetings are usually held at the Administration Office; however from September through April, the second regular meeting of the month will be held at one of the schools. Meetings are scheduled to begin at 6:30 p.m. unless otherwise noted. Maxwell moved to approve the roster of the board meeting dates as presented, seconded by Dittmer. Motion unanimously approved.

The list of Board Committees was reviewed and discussed. There were no changes to the Committees. Maxwell moved to approve the Board Committees as presented, seconded by Lindaman. Motion unanimously approved.

Joe Stutting recommended that the firm of Lane & Waterman continue as the District's General Legal Counsel for the 2018-19 school year, Lynch Dallas continue as the District's Legal Counsel for negotiations, and the Ahlers Law Firm continue as the District's Legal Counsel for bond and financial issues. Maxwell moved to approve the appointment of Legal Counsel as presented, seconded by Bergfeld. Motion unanimously approved.

Joe Stutting presented a Resolution to Designate Financial Depository Institutions for the 2018-19 school year, and updated TELF Plus Program Resolution. Maxwell moved to approve the resolutions as presented, seconded by Dittmer. Motion unanimously approved.

Joe Stutting presented board policies #503.1 - Student Conduct, #505.9 - Parent and Family Engagement, #606.9 - Insufficient Classroom Space, and 211.7R1 - Rules of Order Regulation for review. Maxwell moved to approve the policies as presented, seconded by Wilmott. Motion unanimously approved.

Joe Stutting presented requests from the Music, Athletic and Drama Boosters to utilize the District's concession stands for 2018-19 school year. Maxwell moved to approve these requests as presented, seconded by Wilmott. Motion unanimously approved.

The administration is recommending The North Scott Press be named the official newspaper for required publications of the school district. Maxwell moved to approve The North Scott Press as the District's official newspaper, seconded by Lindaman. Motion unanimously approved.

Kelly Rolf, John Glenn Elementary Principal, presented the annual Equity Report. The report included information on preschool - 12th grade student enrollment date by race/ethnicity, and high school advanced math and science date by race/ethnicity and male/female. Teacher demographics were also included in the report. Maxwell moved to approve the report as presented, seconded by Wilmott. Motion unanimously approved.

Shane Knoche, High School Principal, presented the annual High School Course Enrollment Data. The report included information on grades 9-12 student enrollment in courses by race/ethnicity and male/female. Shane reported the major diversity is the low SES and is really what they are focusing on. Maxwell moved to approve the report as presented, seconded by Dittmer. Motion unanimously approved.

Maxwell moved to approve the consent agenda, as follows; seconded by Dittmer. Motion unanimously approved.

SCOTT COUNTY ORDINANCE NO. 18-06

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND THE ZONING MAP BY REZONING APPROXIMATELY 3.56 ACRES IN SECTION 5, LECLAIRE TOWNSHIP FROM AGRICULTURAL-PRESERVATION (A-P) TO SINGLE-FAMILY RESIDENTIAL (R-1), ALL WITHIN UNINCORPORATED SCOTT COUNTY.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF SCOTT COUNTY IOWA:

Section 1. In accordance with Section 6-31 Scott County Code, the following described unit of real estate is hereby rezoned from Agricultural-Preservation (A-P), to Single-Family Residential (R-1) to-wit:
