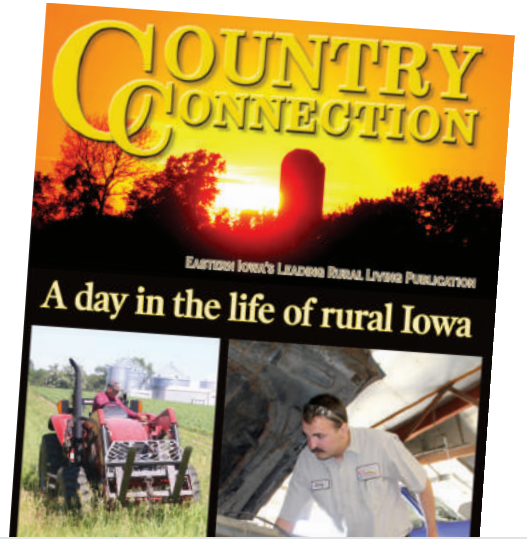

NS Special Olympian joins Iowa's top athletes

Alli Schneckloth earns Des Moines Register's statewide honor

Alli Schneckloth beamed from the stage at Wells Fargo Arena, posed for photos with NFL star Curt Warner and celebrated her inclusion among Iowa's top prep athletes.

Alli's decade of Special Olympics achievement earned her the Des Moines Register's first-ever recognition of Special Olympics athletes at Iowa's High School Athletes of the Year celebration Friday in Des Moines.

She was picked from among three nominees to join the salute shared by top

prep athletes across the state. Alli, her parents Tim and Brandi Schneckloth and siblings Peyton and Sophie waited anxiously for the selection to be announced.

"It was an incredible night for our whole family," Tim Schneckloth said.

Alli, 18, has competed in Special Olympics for 11 years, including basket-

ball, bowling, cycling, golf, skiing, flag football and track and field.

But it was skiing that brought her to competition. Her father is a longtime ski instructor who had her on the Chestnut Mountain hill as a child.

"Alli has grown up skiing. Skiing was

Schilling aims for Iowa bid

Former Illinois congressman eyes Iowa 2nd District campaign

Former Illinois congressman Bobby Schilling is among three Republicans considering bids for Iowa's Second Congressional District against Democrat Rita Hart, who has seen all but one potential Democrat challenger disappear.

Schilling confirmed Monday his "serious" look at running will culminate with an announcement around July 8.

"We're feeling things out, seeing what kind of support we've got. If everything

looks good – and right now I think it's looking good – we'll make an announcement," he told *The NSP*.

Bloomfield business owner Steve Everly alerted Scott County Republicans June 18 that he'll seek the nomination.

Osceola Mayor Thomas Kedley announced his candidacy earlier in June.

Neither returned calls or emails this week and last from *The NSP*.

Schilling, now of LeClaire, served one term representing Illinois' 17th Congressional District, before losing to Democrat U.S. Rep. Cheri Bustos in 2012.

Bustos is seeking her fourth term, and now chairs the Democratic Congressional Campaign Committee, which vets candidates.

Schilling supports Trump agenda

Schilling said committing to a full-time campaign was among his biggest hurdles to announcing.

"I want to make sure I can run full time. I don't believe there is a path to victory running part time. I've cleared that

Eldridge council gets behind fitness center

All five Eldridge city council members are behind a North Scott fitness center and agreed voters should have a say in financing.

The council conducted a lively discussion Monday attended by 15 residents, almost all of whom are Eldridge Fitness Center members. No council action was taken during the work session intended to begin serious discussion of financing options.

Discussions about a North Scott YMCA began in 2016 when council members faced rising costs and dwindling membership at the city-owned fitness center. The crowd of fitness center members seemed eager Monday to learn more and grilled council members on details.

The costs of a proposed \$14.6-million center would be split between the city and North Scott School District.

School board members have supported, but not formally voted to finance about \$7 million.

The full cost includes an indoor, competitive pool that would allow North Scott to field its own swim team. It also includes up to \$1.9 million for an outside community pool.

City Administrator John Dowd presented three possible options for the city's roughly \$7.6 million share.

Council members dismissed one borrowing plan that would be repaid by using up to about half of the city's sales tax revenue for 20 years. That plan would require no public vote.

They also showed little support to borrow solely through general obligation bonds, which would require a vote and push the city's stable, \$6.50 general fund property tax rate up \$1.12 per thousand dollars of assessed value.

All seemed to prefer splitting the debt repayment between sales tax and a debt levy increase that would require approval by up to 60 percent of voters.

School superintendent Joe Stutting has previously said any district funding option likely would involve a referendum as well.

Dowd suggested that March 2020 would be the soonest the city could work out enough details to present the question to voters.

The 15 residents peppered council members with questions.

Richard Heiman asked about the location. Council members last year agreed to consider city-owned property at South Third Avenue and East LeClaire Road that was purchased for a new city hall. Voters rejected that plan.

Mayor Marty O'Boyle said the city land may count towards its share of the facility.

Dennis Healey asked about the Scott County YMCA's share of costs. So far, research and design costs have been shared equally among the city, school district and YMCA.

"Why put the Y on the shingle if school and city will own it?" Healey asked.

O'Boyle said the YMCA will operate the center, provide the employees and schedule activities and events. "The Y

offers membership benefits, here and at other locations."

He said a new facility, "won't need much maintenance at first."

Healey disagreed: "The day you build it is the day it will start."

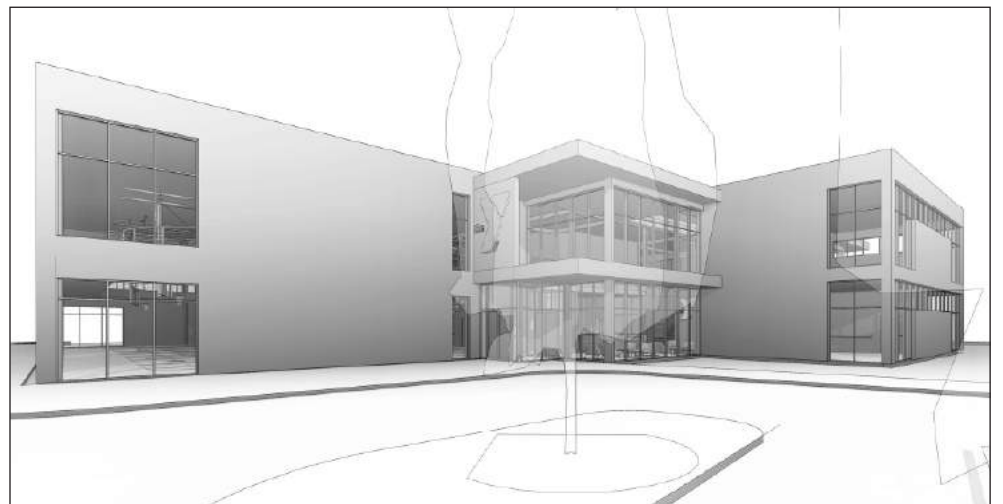
Glendena Heiman asked if a non-profit similar to Lancer Legacy would be formed to raise money or seek other sources.

Other Scott County YMCAs have received generous allocations from the Scott County Board of Supervisors and the casino gaming authorities.

Council member Dockery said other sources are welcome and anticipated. But financing calculations right now are based on school and city taxpayer support.

Dockery likened Monday's discussion to the start of the Indy 500. "We're just pushing the car out on the track. There are a lot of laps ahead."

Mayor O'Boyle said a North Scott YMCA is a quality of life issue that merits taxpayer support. Using Dowd's preliminary estimates, O'Boyle said the

owner of a \$200,000 market value home might pay \$60 to \$65 per year more in taxes. "That's \$5.50 per month, which is less than a McDonald's kiddie meal. If we really, really as a city want this, we need to step up to the plate."

Council member Peeters said Eldridge taxpayers should take comfort in City Administrator Dowd's budget estimates. "I wish my wife and I could handle our money like John handles city money," he told the audience.

a major part of her physical therapy. She was in a walker when we first started up here. The skiing helped her physical mobility and coordination. By the time she was eight, she was competing in the winter games," her dad said.

Like every top Iowa athlete honored that night, Alli persevered through hardships and disappointments.

"Alli's always been shy and timid. Special Olympics does a great job of helping her to push and stretch herself out of her comfort zone. There were times Alli said, 'I don't want to join.' But we reminded her she had signed up, she had committed."

Tim Schneckloth works for the Fellowship of Christian Athletes and witnessed similar challenges with those teenagers.

"The toughest thing to this day is to let Alli do it solely on their own. But it can hinder their growth. We're at that stage you've got to do it your self."

Tim Schneckloth said his daughter's might not have found that determination if not for a supportive North Scott community.

"I'm so thankful for support of Jen Unwin, her teacher and coach, the administration, and even the students who come in and work with Special Olympic kids. We couldn't ask for a better community for Alli to grow up in."

Unwin was there for Friday's honor. "We had no idea who the winner was

County considers \$37 million jail and detention center expansion

Study anticipates near tripling of juvenile detention by 2037

Scott County Supervisors on Tuesday heard recommendations for \$37 million in jail and juvenile detention expansion, plus another \$6.6 million to more quickly expand the current jail capacity. Representatives of Wold Justice Planners presented three options to accommodate an expected 255 percent increase in local juvenile detention and a 26 per-

cent increase in adult detention by 2037. Wold representative Roger Schroeffer said the Scott County juvenile projections outpace projections nationwide. "Nationally, we don't see this level of increase. It's much flatter. But the spike in juvenile crime in Scott County is really what's going on," Schroeffer said. The Wold report said juvenile detention has 18 beds. Juvenile Detention Center Director Jeremy Kaiser said the facility has average 22 children this year. He said another 13 juveniles charged as adults are being held in the Scott County jail. The consultants say the detention cen-

ter will need 43 beds by 2027 and 64 by 2037. Part of that is due to impending federal rules. Kaiser said by 2021, federal rules will forbid any juveniles from being held in an adult jail, even those charged as adults. "This is a huge crisis for us, no matter what the trends say," Kaiser said. County board chairman Tony Knobbe said Tuesday's presentation was the first step in a long process that should include discussion of, "other thoughts, options, ideas and concepts to alleviate the pressure for these needs." The jail averages 342 inmates per day

and can accommodate 365. The consultants expect the county will need room for 428 by 2027, and 484 by 2037. Wold offered two options ranging from \$16.3 million to \$23.9 million to expand juvenile detention next to, or combined with a jail expansion. A Scott County jail committee recommended a third option to move juvenile detention elsewhere for \$23.3 million, an estimate that does not include land acquisition. Wold also offered two jail options of \$11.9 million to \$12.8 million to expand the Scott County Jail. The jail committee recommended a third expansion option estimated at \$14.5 million. Wold also detailed a \$6.6 million plan to reconfigure the current jail to accommodate more women inmates. The report recommends adding 11 correctional officers to the 59 currently on staff. Wold's recommendation is five more than Sheriff Tim Lane requested earlier this year. His request was tabled until this report was complete. Wold's options one and two create a jail, juvenile detention and courthouse complex that cover almost all the parking area around the current jail and courthouse. The third option leaves much of the parking, but notes that space could accommodate even further jail expansion in the future. Wold consultant Schroeffer said all of the options are "scalable," and could be built out over time. The recommendations come from an 11-member justice planning committee that includes Sheriff Tim Lane and three other sheriff and jail supervisors; Detention Center Director Jeremy Kaiser; Count HR Director Mary Thee, Budget Director David Farmer and County Facility and Support Services Director Tammy Speidel. Supervisor Ken Croken asked that City of Davenport leaders be included in planning. "We are essentially creating a penal colony in the middle of downtown Davenport. That's not conducive to development," Croken said.

Churches, civic groups provide meals for North Scott kids

A 2017 brainstorm that launched the North Scott Feed Our Children Ministry blossomed into a community effort providing sack lunches to thousands of North Scott kids. Faith Lutheran Church pastor Carrie LaPlante updated North Scott School Board members on the ministry at a recent meeting. She and volunteers Beth Ann Anderson and Amy Powell launched it in 2017 after seeing local news reports about blessing boxes. The first year, the program served 715 lunches. Last year, they served 3,600, and expect to grow more this year. Community volunteers pack sack lunches at Faith Tuesdays and Thursday. Some are delivered. Others are picked up by families on their way to lunchtime activities. Many North Scott teams, churches and civic clubs join the volunteers. "Lots of teams embrace this, and it's been a ton of fun getting to know them," LaPlante said. "We're getting to know the children, building relationships and finding better ways to help kids in our community." The community has responded. LaPlante said she's continually surprised by the food, napkins, lunchbag and cash donations from the North Scott community. She recalled running out of juice boxes one day. Water and sewer contracts launch \$7 million upgrade

Disposable wipes slow system

Park View Water and Sanitary District trustees awarded more contracts as part of nearly \$7 million of water and sewer treatment improvements planned over the next two years.

Trustees meeting June 19 also learned about a near overflow of sewage lagoons blamed on heavy rains, illegal sump pump discharges, and wads of disposable wipes clogging intake screens.

Trustees Eric Schryver and Ken Uhlenkamp were absent.

Treatment plant supervisor Brent Earley said he and assistant Rick Baughman cleared pump screens the day before heavy rains May 29. Those rains, and hundreds of sump pumps infiltrating sewer system pushed the sewage lagoons within five inches of overflow. Normally, the lagoons maintain a two- to three- foot margin from top capacity.

The disposable wipes are sold as “flushable,” but do not decompose like toilet paper.

“Had we not cleaned the pumps that day, we’d have had overflow,” Earley

told *The NSP*.

He expects the district will have to address an estimated hundred or so sump pump discharges that improperly move stormwater into the sewer system.

That likely will be after the district completes sewer and water treatment plant upgrades.

Sewer work on track for spring

Three trustees awarded Strand Associates engineering of Madison, Wis., a \$310,000 contract to begin designing an estimated \$5.53 million sewer treatment system.

Earley expects the plan will be ready for review by the Iowa Department of Natural Resources by September, with bidding to begin in November. He expects trustees to review bids and award bids in January and work to begin in spring.

The work is similar to upgrades across Iowa required when the DNR toughened treatment standards.

The work is financed through Iowa’s State Revolving Fund, a low-interest loan program funded in part by the legislature’s water quality initiative of 2018. The Park View district, like most Iowa municipal districts, has been raising rates to cover those payments.

Next month, Earley plans to add mi-

crobes to reduce the volume of sludge in existing lagoons to eat up about four feet of sludge. He and Baughman will shovel the microbes in powder form from a boat to reduce the amount of sludge that may have to be excavated.

Trustees also approved two contracts totaling \$18,850 with Terracon Consultants, of Bettendorf, to determine the stability of the lagoon grounds. One contract covers soil test boring for two new treatment buildings. The other contract calls for test borings on the lagoon berms. Earley said one lagoon will be drained and he wants to assure the berm can withstand the weight of water on one side.

“When you drain one cell, that berm becomes a dam. This will determine if it’s solid enough,” he said.

Water treatment work begins

Work will begin on the district’s estimated \$1.35 million water treatment upgrade with a \$52,500 contract with Northwest Mechanical of Davenport. The firm will improve piping at the district’s water treatment plant No. 1 at 104 Park Lane Circle. That will allow continued treatment when the district shuts down its other treatment plant next to the water tower.

Earley said the district plans to divide

a water holding tank at the No. 1 plant to allow longer oxidation time before water is released to the system. More oxidation will help remove manganese and other solids that cause the brown water some residents have grown accustomed to.

“It’s not a health concern. It’s an aesthetic problem. It sometimes doesn’t taste good, and can stain clothes,” he said.

District trustees also are working with the Park View Owners Association to obtain about 5,000 square feet of land next to the water tower for a 180,000, above ground storage tank. The tank will replace the water tower, which will be dismantled when water treatment improvements are complete.

Car wash mystery resolved

Trustees agreed to resolve APEX car wash’s outstanding \$5,153.77 water bill by discounting about half, and allowing payments over four months.

Trustees agreed to dismiss half the bill and charge the car wash about \$1,000, its average bill over the past three quarters. The remaining \$1,500 will be paid by APEX over the next four months, Earley said.

The car wash meter showed 4,000 gallons used from March 25 to 26, far more than customary use.

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

CONGRESS: Hart faces one primary challenger

hurdle, so if I decide to do it, I can run full time."

If he proceeds, Schilling said voters can expect to see him in every small town.

"One of the things I'll do that'll be a little different is go to smaller cities and let them know who Bobby Schilling is."

Schilling and his wife, Christine, in 2016, built a new home at 28007 231st St. Court, LeClaire, which is in Iowa's Second Congressional District.

He said Iowa's congressional district will give him a better shot than he believed he got in Illinois' 17th.

"I do not have the liberals in Washington DC, or Springfield drawing a map favorable to opposition, which happened to me in 2012. I think Iowa has one of the fairest mapping systems in the United States. That's a very positive thing not just for Republicans, but Democrats, also."

He said he remains an ardent President Trump supporter and believes most district Republicans do, too.

"I don't necessarily agree with all the tweets that go out. I look at what he actually accomplishes and I don't listen to the news media. I look at Hispanic unemployment rates, GDP improvements, women's wages and things like that. The key indicators show he's actually doing a really, really good job."

"Hopefully that will happen with the tariff situation. One thing I will say about Trump, for 4 or 50 years we've listened to both Democrats and Republicans talk about tackling trade issues, and none of them had the guts to do it. This is the first guy in a long time we've actually had go

after the trade deficits we have with China.

"My thoughts and hopes are that what he's going to do is get a lot of this under control. He's going to minimize any damage he does. And for American farmers, he's going to make sure they're financially stable with this trade war going on."

Hart focused on rural development

Rita Hart said she's spoken with Bustos.

"Cheri has been very encouraging. It's always good to talk with her. She's really a common sense, let's-get-it-done, hard-working congresswoman," Hart said.

Hart said she also spoke with other Democrats interested in the job.

"We're happy a lot of these good people were considering it. We had some great conversations with them and now they're all on board," Hart said.

Another Democrat, Newman Abuissa of Iowa City, announced his candidacy. Abuissa is an Iowa Department of Transportation engineer, and former board president for the Iowa city Human Rights Commission.

The NSP was unable to contact Abuissa through phone calls and emails sent since last week.

Hart gave up her state Senate seat in an unsuccessful bid for lieutenant governor, an experience that influenced her congressional decision.

"At first when really considering it,

you tend to talk about all the negatives. It's not something I ever thought was something I really wanted to do, get on plane, go to Washington D.C., leave my farm, my home and husband and be gone a lot.

"I did a lot of soul searching. It made me think of everything I've done and why I do things I do. I figure you've got to talk through the sacrifices it takes, and have to be willing to figure how you can do something you don't really want to do."

What she really wants to do is contain health care costs for Iowans, encourage rural economic development and revive infrastructure investment.

"Economic development is something I've always concentrated on in my senate service. I know that's the name of the game for every town across the district," she said.

Hart specifically said her campaign will not be an attack on the president.

"I think more in terms of what is happening on a local basis. My stint in the state legislature made me more aware of how policy affects people on a local level and what your representative can do to shape those policies. To me, it's more personal than looking at leadership at the very top."

Hart did not disclose a fundraising goal, but Federal Election Commission records suggest she's looking at a \$3 million campaign.

FEC records show Loeb sack spent \$699,336.20 defending his seat in 2015-16 against GOP challenger Dr. Chris Peters, whose campaign spent \$208,818.45

In the 2017-18 campaign, Loeb sack spent \$2,354,379.50 to again defeat Peters,

who spent \$853,952.41.

"I've heard all kinds of numbers. The other thing I hear when people talk about the numbers is, 'oh my gosh, that's crazy.' The money is totally out of control."

GOP challengers

Peters bowed out May 16 in a video posted to his Facebook page.

"I think there's a great opportunity for the right candidate in southeast Iowa. It should be very competitive. ... I just can't do it this time. I need to focus on family, work and myself. I will stay very active though. ... I'm not ruling out a run in 2022. You haven't heard the last from me."

Osceola Mayor Thomas Kedley is campaigning. Kedley grew up in Clinton and teaches American history in Osceola. His campaign website is kedleyforcongress.com.

Scott County GOP Chairman Dave Millage said he was contacted by Steven Everly, of Bloomfield, about intentions to run.

Millage said he got an email Wednesday. Everly owns Ardent Lighting in Knoxville. He lost a Republican primary for state Senate District 14 in 2012.

Millage said Scott County Republicans, "want to hear about progress on the embargo and trade agreements. That's very important to manufacturers and farmers in our district." He also said GOP voters want to hear, "plans for how we're going to pare down the deficit."

Dan Doyle will return to his Princeton hometown July 6 with a truckload of garden tractors. He wants you to bring yours, too.

Flooding washed out Princeton's annual garden walk, so some community members are holding a garden tractor show 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., July 6 at Grissom Elementary School's parking lot.

Doyle will have his Deere, and some Simplicity models. But the showpieces are the Allis Chalmers, Oliver, White, Massey Ferguson and Ford garden tractors manufactured to resemble their farm tractor big brothers.

Walcott City Council

Monday, June 17, 2019
The semi-monthly meeting of the City Council of Walcott, Iowa, was held on Monday, the 17th day of June 2019, at Walcott City Hall. Mayor John Kostichек called the meeting to order at 6:00 p.m. Council members present were: John Brockmann, Tim Koehler, Lisa Mengler, Jacob Puck, and Larry Smith. Absent: None. City staff present: Jeff Blake, Lisa Rickertsen, Tom Schirman, and Paul Stagg.

Approval of Agenda. Mengler moved and Smith seconded to approve the agenda. Motion carried.

Introduction of Audience/Public Comments. There were no public comments at this time.

Consent Agenda. Puck moved and Koehler seconded to approve the consent agenda including the invoices, minutes from June 3, 2019, Scott County Humane Society Agreement renewal, May 2019 financial reports, Resolution 2019-26 - Approving Transfer of Funds (year-end transfers) and annual cigarette permit renewals for Casey's, Dolgencorp (Dollar General), Iowa 80 Truckstop, and Pilot Travel Centers #043 and #268. Roll call ayes: Puck, Koehler, Mengler, Smith, and Brockmann. Motion carried.

Request for Dog Park. During the last council meeting, resident Joe Aubry inquired about having a dog park in Walcott. Aubry was present and discussion ensued on possible interest, locations, current problems with owners not cleaning up after pets, and that a dog park would create additional work load for city staff. Attorney Schirman stated there are many items and rules to consider for a dog park. Mengler questioned and Stagg responded that there are currently issues with dog waste not being picked up at Prairie View Park (recreational trail), Water Tower Park, and on the city lot adjacent to the railroad. Dogs are not allowed in City parks, with the exception of Prairie View Park, and pet owners are responsible by City Code to promptly clean up, remove and lawfully dispose of pet waste. Resident Larry Koberg stated the Hearts and Hands Foundation had looked into the topic in the past and urged Aubry to contact the committee. Mengler asked staff to gather information from other communities and bring the topic back at a future meeting.

Wescott Park Temporary Fencing. Larry Koberg stated there may be a men's fastpitch tournament the weekend of July 27th at Wescott Park and requested to keep the temporary fencing up through the potential tournament. Koehler moved and Mengler seconded to allow the temporary fencing to remain up at Wescott Park, to be removed after the proposed tournament the weekend of July 27th. Motion carried.

W. Otis Street Improvements Project.
• Resolution 2019-27, Approving Change Order for the West Otis Street Improvements Project. Koehler moved and Puck seconded to approve the change order in the amount of \$4,580.19, as recommended by Stagg and the City Engineer. Roll call ayes: Koehler, Puck, Brockmann, Mengler, and Smith. Motion carried.

• Approval of Payment #8 to Cornerstone Excavating, Inc. Koehler moved and Puck seconded to approve payment number eight to Cornerstone Excavating, Inc. for \$56,773.89. Motion carried.

Public Sidewalks – Sidewalk Reimbursement Program. Stagg reported on four properties with sidewalk deficiencies to participate in the sidewalk reimbursement program. He also stated he would like to install sidewalks at Wescott and Victory Parks where gaps exist, prior to continuing residential sidewalk gaps. Mengler moved and Smith seconded to approve the proposed list for the Residential Sidewalk Repair Program and to have Stagg pursue bids on installing sidewalks at Wescott and Victory Parks. Motion carried.

Avenue of Flags Participation. Discussion was held on participating in the Walcott Legion's Avenue of Flags program on city property along Main Street, Water Tower Park, and at the water plant. Smith moved and Puck seconded to approve participating in the Walcott Legion's Avenue of Flags, up to eight flags. Motion carried.

Ordinance 505-19, Amending Chapter 167 Pertaining to Accessory Buildings. Mengler moved and Koehler seconded to approve the third reading of Ordinance 505-19, Pertaining to Accessory Buildings. Roll call ayes: Mengler, Koehler, Smith, Brockmann, and Puck. Motion carried. The separation distance requirement from primary structures will be five feet, for accessory buildings 288 square feet or less as recommended by the Planning and Zoning Commission.

Ordinance 506-19, Amending Chapter 106 Pertaining to Solid Waste Collection Fees. Puck moved and Smith seconded to approve the third reading of Ordinance 506-19, Amending Chapter 106 Pertaining to Solid Waste Collection Fees. Roll call ayes: Puck, Smith, Mengler, Koehler, and Brockmann. Motion carried. This ordinance increases the garbage rate 2%, from \$12.87 to \$13.12 beginning with the July 1st bills.

Public Works Department Report. Stagg reported on project updates and the community design workshop that will be at the Walcott Legion on Wednesday, June 19th from 6:00 - 8:00 p.m. Brockmann questioned the recent sewer main lining in the alley between E. James and E. Otis Streets and stated he doesn't think the main is big enough. Stagg responded that tree roots were removed before it was lined and research concludes that the current 8" pipe is sufficient, which the City Engineer concurred with.

Council Member Comments. Brockmann had several questions, including the recent dust control application on the gravel roads before it was graded and rock applied. Stagg responded that the company hired did not know when they would be in the area and they failed to call Stagg, as requested, prior to applying the dust control. The product applied should still work its way up and another application will be applied later. Puck questioned Stagg about claims that were made by Brockmann at the last meeting that a manhole on W. Bryant Street was installed incorrectly and had to be replaced. Stagg, who was absent at the last meeting, responded that it was inaccurate that any of the newly installed manholes had to be reinstalled.

Following other comments, Smith moved and Puck seconded to adjourn at 6:43 p.m. Motion carried. All votes on motions were unanimous, unless noted.

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER 167 OF THE CODE OF ORDINANCES OF THE CITY OF WALCOTT, IOWA, BY AMENDING CERTAIN PROVISIONS PERTAINING TO ACCESSORY BUILDINGS

BE IT ENACTED by the City Council of the City of Walcott, Iowa:

SECTION 1. SUBSECTION MODIFIED. The last sentence of the first paragraph of Section 167.22 (2) (C) of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Walcott, Iowa, is hereby repealed and the following adopted in lieu thereof:

167.22 (2) (C). Accessory buildings up to 288 square feet must be located a minimum of five (5) feet from a primary structure and/or garage.

SECTION 2. SUBSECTION MODIFIED. The last two sentences of Section 167.22 (2) (F) of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Walcott, Iowa, are hereby repealed and the following adopted in lieu thereof:

167.22 (2) (F). An unattached accessory building constructed pursuant to provisions of the subparagraph must in all cases be located behind the rear building wall of the residence structure and a minimum of fifteen (15) feet from a primary structure and/or garage (when located on a corner lot, the unattached accessory building cannot be located on the "street" or front side of the lot). Rear and side yard setbacks shall be a minimum of ten (10) feet.

SECTION 3. REPEALER. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

SECTION 4. SEVERABILITY CLAUSE. If any section, provision or part of this ordinance shall be adjudged invalid or unconstitutional, such adjudication shall not affect the validity of the ordinance as a whole or any section, provision or part thereof not adjudged invalid or unconstitutional.

SECTION 5. WHEN EFFECTIVE. This ordinance shall be in effect after its final passage, approval and publication as provided by law.

SECTION 3. SEVERABILITY CLAUSE. If any section, provision or part of this ordinance shall be adjudged invalid or unconstitutional, such adjudication shall not affect the validity of the ordinance as a whole or any section, provision or part thereof not adjudged invalid or unconstitutional.

SECTION 4. WHEN EFFECTIVE. This ordinance shall be in effect for the July 1, 2019 billing, after the final passage, approval and publication as provided by law.

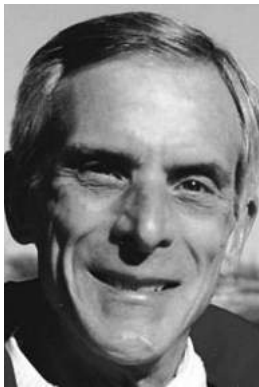

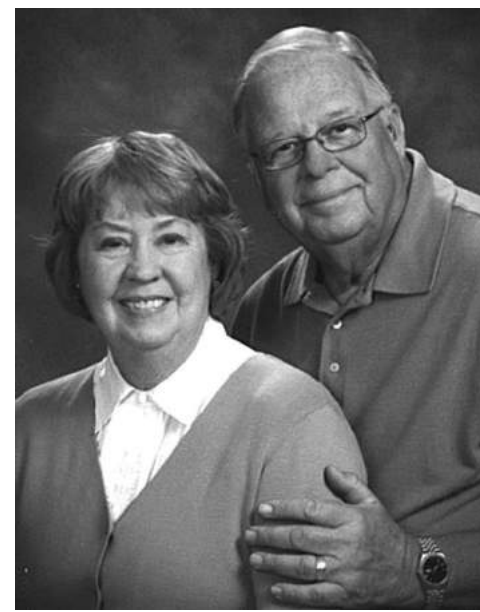

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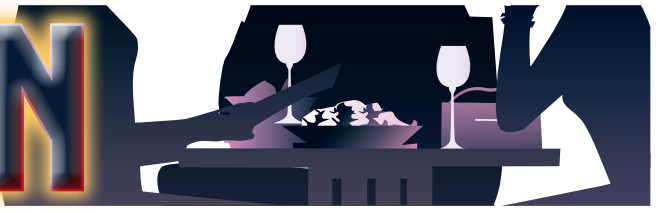

Hard road to the big show for boys

Iowa City West looms as
No. 1 tourney seed

Even though Mother Nature continues to float dark clouds over the 2019 summer baseball landscape, North Scott's post-season path began to come into focus last week.

While the Lancers managed to get in just one game — Tuesday's 4-3, 12-inning loss to No. 3 (Class 3A) Central DeWitt — the Iowa High School Athletic Association did create some news by releasing its Class 4A substate assignments.

The Lancers, who are looking to make a return to the Big Show in Des Moines next month, will have a tough road, and a stop in Iowa City along the way is a distinct possibility.

There's no denying the Lancers will have their work cut out for them.

Third-ranked Iowa City West (15-5) is the clear-cut No. 1 seed in the six-team district, and Cedar Rapids Prairie (10-9) has the inside track at being the second seed.

While there are still plenty of games to be played, Clinton (4-17) will most likely come in at No. 6, and the Lancers are in the midst of a tough battle for the No. 3 seed, and a first-round home game.

North Scott entered Monday's doubleheader at Burlington with an 8-7 record, and also in the mix are MAC rivals Davenport West (9-9) and Muscatine (7-10).

Prairie handed North Scott an 11-5 loss earlier this month, and the Lancers will face the Falcons and Muskies in consecutive doubleheaders on July 2 and July 8.

The actual substate pairings will be announced next week, and this week's games will be a deciding factor. On Sunday, each coach in the district will email their list of how they think the teams should be seeded to state official, and majority rules.

"We told the kids we could be anywhere from No. 3 to No. 5, and it's kind of wide open at this point," Lancer co-coach Travis Ralfs said Monday morning. "No. 3 means you have that home field advantage for the first game, and that's huge."

When substate action begins on Friday, July 19th, the top three seeds will host first-round games. The highest-remaining seed after the opening contests will receive a bye and advance to the substate final on Wednesday, July 24th. The other two teams will square off in a Monday night (July 22) semifinal tilt.

There's no question the Lancers have some work to do, especially since last weekend's games with Sioux City North, Waukee and Fort Dodge were rained out. And, the schedule is formidable.

North Scott traveled to Burlington on Monday, will host No. 1 (Class 3A) Cedar Rapids Xavier on Wednesday, and visit No. 2 (Class 3A) and MAC leader Davenport Assumption on Thursday.

The Lancers will travel to Cedar Rapids Saturday where they will take on No. 9 (Class 4A) Ankeny Centennial and Cedar Rapids Kennedy.

"Four is the magic number," said Ralfs. "Although it also depends on what other teams do, we feel that if we win four games, that solidifies things and we should be in line for that No. 3 seed.

"I know we can do it. I feel confident, but our hitting has to come along."

Sabers edge Lancers in 12

North Scott is in need of some good wins, and they came oh-so-close before suffering a tough 4-3 extra inning loss to No. 3 (Class 3A) Central DeWitt on Tuesday (June 18th).

In a 12-inning marathon against one of the top teams in the state, the Lancers proved that they can hang with the best.

North Scott drew first blood in the opening inning thanks in part to Austin Schneider's leadoff single and Jake Matthaidess' RBI base rap.

The Lancers made it 2-0 in the third when Chase Moseley almost single-handedly manufactured a run with a one-out single and two stolen bases before scampering home on Matthaidess' sacrifice fly to left.

Central DeWitt knotted the count with a pair of runs in the bottom of the frame, with a one-out walk, a single, double and Lancer error doing the damage.

The Sabers took a 3-2 lead in the fourth on Jacob Swanson's leadoff home run, but North Scott knotted the count in the fifth when Layne Hamann reached on an error, Moseley followed with a double and Matthaidess delivered his second sacrifice fly of the game.

That's how things stood until the 12th, although the Lancers had their

chances.

Moseley laced a two-out triple in the seventh, but was stranded when Matthaidess grounded out to the pitcher. North Scott also had runners in scoring position in the 11th and 12th frames, but couldn't push across a run.

The Sabers collected the walk-off win in the 12th on Garrett Finley's leadoff double, a Lancer error and Henry Bloom's RBI single.

All things considered, the Lancers got impressive pitching performances from Carter Wenck and Hamann. Wenck scattered four hits over the first five innings, while Hamann allowed seven, including Finley's double in the 12th, and took the loss.

Jackson Stoefer gave up the game-winner to Bloom.

Offensively, it was Moseley who continued to swing a hot bat, going three-for-four and coming up a home run short of the cycle. Matthaidess drove in all three North Scott runs.

"It was a good game, and we definitely had our chances in regulation," said Ralfs. "We had a couple untimely errors on routine plays that led to a couple of runs. We make those plays the game is over in seven and the Lancers probably win 3-1."

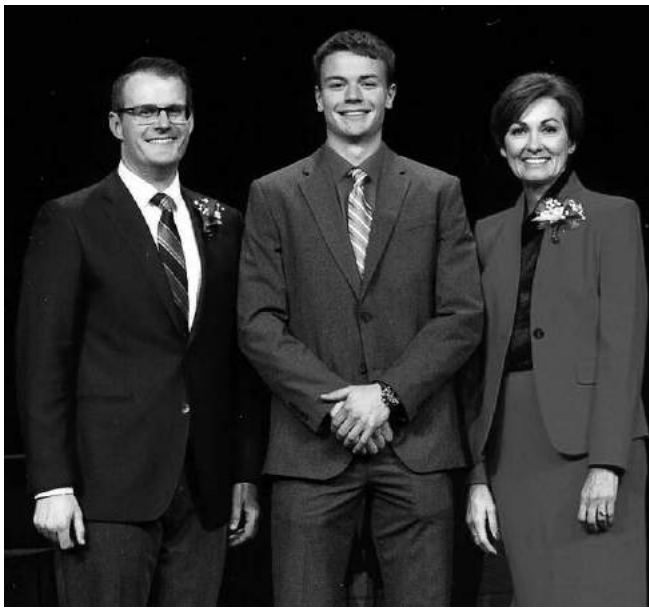

OUR RESPONSE

Flood fight is about politics, not nature

The Mississippi River sure doesn't distinguish between public right of way and private business.

This year's record-high and record-long flood ignored distinctions Davenport city administrator Corri Spiegel made in her needlessly provocative May 29 public statement.

"Davenport's flood plan is not and never was intended specifically to protect businesses," she wrote in an otherwise instructive essay on the city's flood response.

On the Record Davenport spent years and hundreds of thousands of taxpayer dollars clearing homes and businesses out of its floodplain. Yet new development ideas continue to arise, inviting new businesses back in.

In 2014, Davenport courted a developer pitching a retail complex on stilts at the site of The Dock restaurant. That plan included a walk bridge over the railroad tracks and required heavy incentives from taxpayers.

In 2005, some Davenport leaders pushed for a casino hotel smack in the middle of its flooded riverfront. That too, called for taxpayer incentives to build it above flood levels, but the business would not have been accessible.

In 2010, Davenport taxpayers pitched in \$2 million to fortify Modern Woodmen Stadium, a publicly owned facility, and create a temporary walkway to keep customers coming to the River Bandits, a private business.

That's why I'm empathetic to the group of 36 retail business entrepreneurs who responded with a respectful, yet forceful challenge to the city. Writing as the newly formed Downtown Davenport Business Association, the group asked for a clear city policy on flood protection. That needs to come not from hired administrators, but from elected officials.

Business owners speak
Note these concerns weren't raised by their Quad-Cities Chamber of Commerce, or the Downtown Davenport Partnership, which are well-funded business organizations that have strongly influenced downtown development.

This came from 36 small business investors and operators who felt they weren't being heard.

"Due to the lack of transparency, inclusiveness, and adaptability from the city, some business owners are reconsidering their commitment to downtown. We are at a crucial point of the revitalization process and without the City behind its businesses, the area can devolve into the empty storefronts that used to be the norm less than a decade ago."

I recall the floods of '93, '01, '08, '11 and '14, before the three top-ten crests of '19.

And I recall when those flood waters reached the back of empty Second Street buildings.

They're not the only ones measuring Davenport's response.

Princeton's response

Upriver in Princeton, public works supervisor Josh Genz faced exactly the same issue.

Faced with the biggest flood of his lifetime, he deployed a line of Hesco barriers along the sidewalks on the west side of River Drive. They mostly protected private homes to the west. Homes with backyard riverbanks got inundated.

"We got some flak. They'd ask, 'Why one side, but not the other?' But their backyard is the water. I always believed if you help one, you have to help all, but some can't be helped."

But the sidewalk HESCO wall allowed floodwater to cover River Drive, limiting access to homes on the city's north side.

Next time, he might double stack HESCOS down the middle of River Drive to leave one lane open so residents can still reach homes, even if flooded.

Genz used city staff and resources to help fortify the riverfront Blackhawk Bank, which normally has the most scenic drive-thru in America. Genz said that bank was built with ample sump holes to allow pumps to keep up.

The biggest riverfront business, Go Fish restaurant, remained open throughout the entire flood two stories above the water, an example of the benefit of privately funded flood management.

Part of Princeton's flood attack focused on keeping sewers working. Genz and crew built sandbag towers around manholes, then kept pumps running 24/7. Now he's considering bigger pumps with bigger gas tanks to reduce the overnight overtime hours required to refuel.

He's also noting sewer infiltration that threatened to overwhelm sewage lagoons. Lining old sewer pipes is another huge public expense that would protect the basements of private homes and businesses.

Drawing the line

So where do cities draw the line? He confessed empathy with Davenport's city administrator. He can't protect everything.

"I kinda want to see what a big town with a lot of money figures their responsibility is. But we have more residents than businesses on the river."

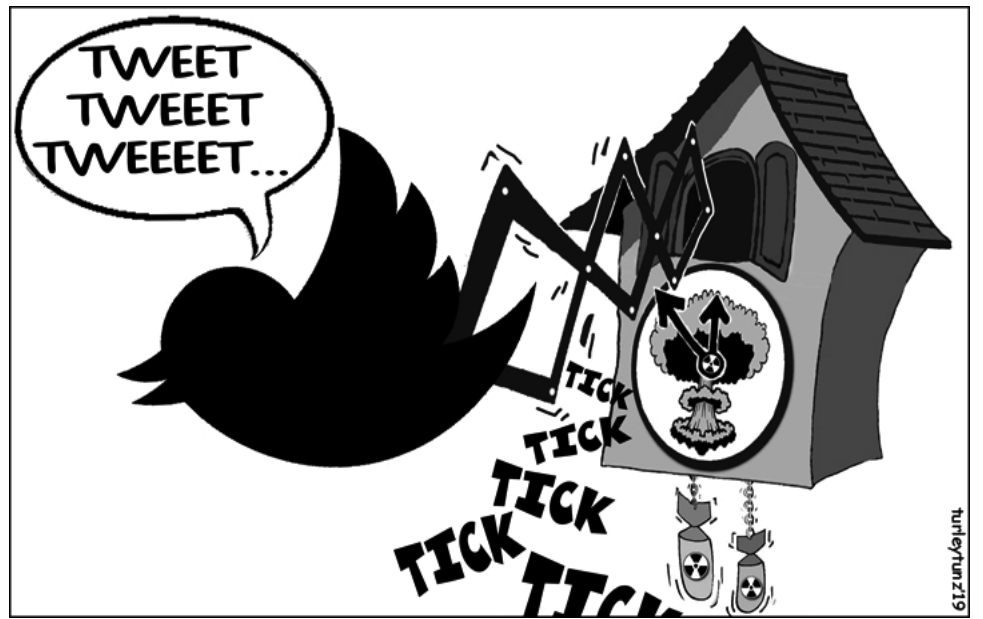
In Buffalo, trains sent wakes and vibrations that stressed sandbag levees, something Princeton never faced.

So a city's flood response is influenced by a lot more than topography and property lines.

It should be influenced by what taxpaying residents want, and are willing to pay for.

And that message can't come from the city's highest-paid hands. It has to come from the elected officials who hired them.

Healthy menu at Go Fish in Princeton

The Scott County Health Department is working with partners in our community to help make it easier to live healthy by making changes to where we work, play and eat. The department's Community Transformation Program assesses food and beverage options at local restaurants and vending machines using the Nutritional Environment Measures Survey.

The survey was developed by Emory University in Georgia to evaluate meal and beverage choices, signage and promotions, facilitators and barriers to healthy eating, pricing and accessibility. Every year, the health department reaches out to restaurants to work with them to reduce barriers and increase healthy eating in Scott County.

The health department has partnered with a variety of restaurants to offer assistance in reviewing menu options, counting calories, and identifying

healthy menu items. The department works with management to acquire a list of ingredients, serving sizes, and product descriptions for each menu item. Following the assessment, the health department and management review results and suggestions.

Most recently, the health department partnered with Go Fish Marina Bar and Grill in Princeton to implement several suggestions such as adding fat free salad dressings, removing breadsticks as a side with salads, offering whole grain bread, and identifying healthy options on the menu.

LEGISLATORS

These new laws will take effect in Iowa on July 1

Republican state Reps. Ross Paustian, Norlin Mommsen and Gary Mohr, in a news release, named the following as significant new laws which will take effect July 1:

House File 772, Empower Rural Iowa Act:

This law creates a broadband grant program to expand reliable internet access to rural and underserved areas of the state. It also makes changes to and provides additional funding for the Workforce Housing Tax Incentive Program to spur development of affordable housing in rural Iowa and areas impacted by this spring's severe flooding.

House File 637, School Employee Misconduct Reporting Period:

This law improves school safety by requiring a school district to report any instance of action taken against a licensed employee for misconduct to the Board of Educational Examiners within 30 days. Under current law, no deadline existed to report this information to the Board.

Senate File 159, Recruiting High Quality Teachers

This law requires the Department of Education to align Iowa's teacher preparation assessment criteria more closely with neighboring states. It also provides for a one-year license for those who have completed their prep programs,

have been offered a teaching contract, but have not yet passed the assessment. These updates will help address the teacher shortage and ensure high quality educators in Iowa.

House File 532, Medical Residencies

This law requires taxpayer-funded medical residencies in Iowa to give priority to applicants that have an Iowa connection. It also requires primary care residencies, including psychiatry, to provide the opportunity to participate in a rural rotation to expose medical residents to rural areas of Iowa.

Senate File 113, OWI Habitual Offenders

This law makes our roads safer by allowing a person charged with a 3rd offense OWI to be charged as a habitual offender. This would triple the time they could be required to serve in prison and improve highway safety by keeping repeat drunk drivers off the roads.

House File 692, Absentee Ballots

This law makes a number of election changes. Most notably, it implements the statewide use of postal service barcodes to determine the date that an absentee ballot was placed into the federal postal service. This will ensure that all legally-cast ballots are counted and not disqualified because of delays from the postal service.

On the record with Democratic, Republican state chairs

The time has finally come to begin figuring out how to start vetting the largest presidential candidate field in history. Next week in Miami, the first Democratic presidential debate will be held over two days June 26-27.

There are a whopping 24 candidates, and 20 will be featured over the two-night event. Wishful thinking has me rather hopeful that, based on not being allowed on the stage and/or poor performances, we could begin

narrowing a field that I think is foolishly too large.

I felt the same in 2016 when there were 16 Republican candidates constantly battling for time on debate stages.

We are in a unique position being here in Iowa, site of the first caucuses in the nation – set for Feb. 3. Being “First in the Nation,” as the slogan says, brings presidential candidates to our backyards cycle after cycle.

Here in Durant and Wilton, we’re even more fortunate to have the state chairs of both the Iowa Republican and Democratic parties from our hometowns.

Jeff Kaufmann, a 1981 Wilton High School grad and self-proclaimed “seventh generation rural Wilton guy,” is the chair of the Iowa Republican Party. He’s worked as a professor at Muscatine Community College for more than 30 years, served as a state Representative in the Iowa House from 2005-2013 and served as president of the Wilton school board prior to that.

He’s been the state GOP chair since 2014 and has signed on to do one more term through January 2021, which will take him through the next presidential election process. He said his allegiance to current Republican U.S. Sen. Joni Ernst and the state legislature were his reasons for accepting the next term. “At the end of my term, I’ll be the longest serving chair in 100 years,” he noted.

Troy Price, the son of Russ and Noreen Price of Durant, is a 1999 DHS grad and has worked in politics throughout most of his career, having served as state political director for President Barack Obama in 2012 and on the Hillary Clinton campaign in 2016.

He was elected Chair of the state Democratic Party in July 2017 and was re-elected unanimously in December 2018. When his current stint runs out, he’ll be the longest serving Democratic chair since 1984.

Conversations with the chairs

I had the opportunity to sit down with both party chairs, in separate interviews, weeks ago to talk about the upcoming chaos of the Democratic presidential process, something Price is living through and Kaufmann knows all too well from 2016.

Price said that juggling the schedules of 24 candidates looking to canvas the state has been interesting to say the least. Two of the biggest Democratic events this year are the Hall of Fame Dinner that occurred June 9 in Cedar Rapids and the fall gala later this year, which Price said will be the biggest event. “That was the event that propelled John Kerry in 2004 and Obama in 2008. It’s an event that helps make presidents.”

Price continued, “Our job is two-fold – part welcome wagon to ensure candidates a good experience in Iowa, and also to be as fair and transparent as possible for caucus attendees and leaders.

One big change Price and the party is implementing is the addition of virtual caucuses, six events starting the Wednesday prior to the caucuses where members of the Democratic Party can take part by phone if they cannot attend their caucus event. When I last spoke to Price about a month ago, he said the many candidates were “doing well and getting out there,” and that some already had positioned strong staff on the ground.

“The first part of the year I tried to get to most of their first trips to the state or at least one for each,” Price said. “As we go forward, I’ll continue to do events with candidates. I want it to be as fair and transparent as possible. My job is no partiality. We want them all to get a fair shot.”

I asked him about the record number, are 24 too much? “There’s definitely a lot,” he said. “Our politics have gotten so angry and upside down. They’ve gotten away from what our country stands for. A lot of people are lending their voice. How many make it to the caucuses remains to be seen.”

Agreement

One area where Price and Kaufmann certainly agree is that Iowa should remain the first caucus state in the nation. “This is the last state where retail politics still exist,” said Price. “It can’t be all won and lost on TV. It’s about meeting people and building a good team.”

As a history and political professor, Kaufmann knows what the antagonists say. “Iowa doesn’t have enough diversity, it’s overwhelmingly Christian, we’re an older state; fair questions,” he said. “Iowa does not choose the president, we start the process. There are four carve-out states and Iowa is in the heartland where anyone can throw their hat in the ring.”

The next statewide events will be the New Hampshire primary Feb. 11, the Nevada caucuses Feb. 22 and the South Carolina primary Feb. 29.

“Take these four states and I’m very comfortable with diversity and geography,” added Kaufmann. “You can’t start in a large state, or you can’t go into a fifth grade classroom anywhere and say, ‘You could be president.’ Whether you like (Donald)

Trump or not, no one would have thought he could become president, same thing with Obama. He overcame the favorite Hillary Clinton in a place like Iowa. We have to start the nomination process in a place like this ... If we’d start in California, we’d have three or four (candidates) on either side. My biggest fear is that we won’t realize what we have until we’d lose it. And it would never come back.

“Obama and Trump are both strong advocates of Iowa being first in the nation. Trump, for all his faults, is all in on Iowa. And he didn’t win (the Iowa caucuses), he was second.”

Electoral College

There’s also been outcry around the nation with regard to eliminating the Electoral College. Spend any time with Kaufmann and you’ll hear him say that without the Electoral College, Iowa would be “flyover country.” He said, “My life would be easier if this were Utah. Boring though, too.”

Kaufmann too knows the chaos of trying to manage multiple candidates, as there were 16 trekking across the state prior to the 2016 election. “Nonstop requests. It was chaos,” he said. “Campaigns were constantly wanting fairness, and the chair before me was biased and incompetent. I had to prove to all 16 that I’d be fair. Like now with the Democrats, we had candidates from all over the spectrum. We expect a lot from our voters. We had record-breaking turnout in the 2016 caucuses. The Democrats will have that too. When you have this job you have to advocate for the people’s choice. We had to wait to see who the nominee was.”

So, simply put, why Trump?
“I started to get it when I started

seeing the crowds,” said Kaufmann.

“Ted Cruz won the caucuses by putting a lot of money into the ground game. Trump got second with little ground game. But this is a phenomenon beyond Trump. This was people wanting to be heard. Some Trump voters were for him, some were against Hillary, but some (Trump votes) were a middle finger to Washington, D.C.

“The big question of 2020 is not whether you like Trump or dislike (the Democratic candidate). It’s will people reward someone who kept their promises? Trump held his promises. If the answer is yes, Trump wins again. If the answer is no and the Democrats don’t go too far left, they win.”

Congressional vacancy

Lastly, at the time I interviewed both of our hometown chairs, it had recently been announced that Congressman Dave Loebsack (D-Iowa City) would not seek re-election for Iowa’s Second Congressional District, which includes Muscatine, Cedar and Scott counties. Kaufmann said it “changed everything,” saying now the seat could be “a toss-up.”

Price said, “It came as a surprise but understandable. He was the only Democrat for four years (from Iowa) in Congress. He’s carried the mantle for the district and state. He’s earned retirement. I’m confident we can hold this seat. I will move heaven and earth to make that happen.”

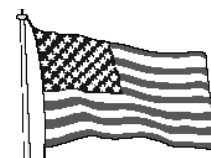

100 years of women's suffrage: Iowans shattered the glass ceiling

Throughout its history, Iowa has been a place where women break barriers. Time after time, Iowa women have shown if they set their minds to something, work hard and believe in themselves, they can accomplish anything.

On July 2, we celebrate the 100th anniversary of Iowans ratifying the 19th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution. It granted women the right to vote.

The most powerful tool we have as citizens is the ballot. I want my three young granddaughters to remember that women were not always afforded the same rights as men. It was a long, hard struggle to obtain an equal voice in our society. Hopefully, they can gain inspiration from the women who made it happen.

One of the country's most important leaders in the women's suffrage movement was an Iowan. Her name is Carrie Chapman Catt. She was the only female in the 1880 graduating class at Iowa State University. After spending time as a law clerk, teacher and superintendent of schools in Mason City, Catt got involved in the fight to allow women to vote.

Iowa women had already made history by that time. The first female elected to public office in the country is believed to be Julia Addington, who became superintendent of schools in Mitchell County in 1869. That same year, Arabella Mansfield became the first woman in the U.S. to pass the bar exam and become an attorney.

However, women's right to vote was still denied. In 1900, Carrie Chapman Catt was elected president of the National American Woman Suffrage Association. She developed and implemented a state-by-state suffrage strategy. Dubbed the "Winning

Plan," Catt's tireless lobbying of both congressional and state leaders eventually turned public opinion in favor of women's suffrage. President Woodrow Wilson converted to the cause in 1918, and one year later, Congress passed the 19th Amendment.

The dream of women being able to vote was finally fulfilled because determined women like Carrie Chapman Catt never gave up on their dream. There were setbacks and heartaches along the way, but she never lost sight of the goal and saw it come to fruition after 33 years of hard work.

In the fields of science, sports, politics and many others, the proverbial glass ceilings across the nation have been shattered by Iowa women. Ola Babcock Miller, Iowa's first female secretary of state, also created the Iowa State Patrol. Edna Griffin fought against the denial of service to blacks five years before Rosa Parks refused to give up her seat on a bus. Mary Beth Tinker successfully fought for students' rights to free expression. Denise Long was the first woman in history drafted by an NBA team. Mary Louise Smith was the first female elected chair of the Republican National Committee. Peggy Whitson has spent more time in space than any American.

The list goes on and on. In the past five years, Iowa women have shattered several of our state's political glass ceilings. In 2015, Joni Ernst became Iowa's first female U.S. Senator. That same year, Linda Upmeyer became our first female Speaker of the House. Last year, we elected a female governor and two females to the U.S House of Representatives for the first time.

The possibilities are endless for what women can achieve. Countless Iowa women led the way. All you have to do to follow in their footsteps is work hard, believe in yourself, and dream big.

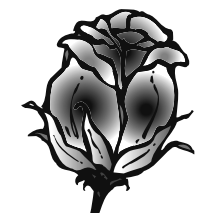

Most people were very satisfied with the educational facilities and staff.

And app. 35% indicated a need for more job opportunities for all ages.

The mayor and the city council have indicated that the results of this survey will be used in determining the future growth and development of Eldridge. This is a comprehensive survey and the results will be available at the town office, or can be obtained from any Jaycee member. Outdoor area nearly doubles seating

The patio is open at Maloney's Pub in Eldridge, 239 N. Second St., Eldridge, completing a dream owner Bob Livingston had since he opened the restaurant five years ago.

The outside area includes a gas fire pit, more tables, four parking spaces and space for a stage beneath a looming "M" just added this week.

"This really came together nicely with help from everyone around here," Livingston said gesturing to his neighbors to the north and south.

His neighbor to the north, Eldridge Lumberyard owner David Fredericksen sold him the 70- by 50-foot lot in August for \$20,000, which Livingston said was more than fair.

Mike Oeschner, owner of Mike's Floorpro to the south, encouraged Livingston to paint the big "M" on the floor covering shop's wall. Oeschner will also help build the stage.

Livingston said he wanted the area for more bar events, including the June 29 motorcycle ride fundraiser that will feature Eldridge building inspector Ray Nees and a friend covering Dave Matthews tunes 5-8 p.m. on the new patio.



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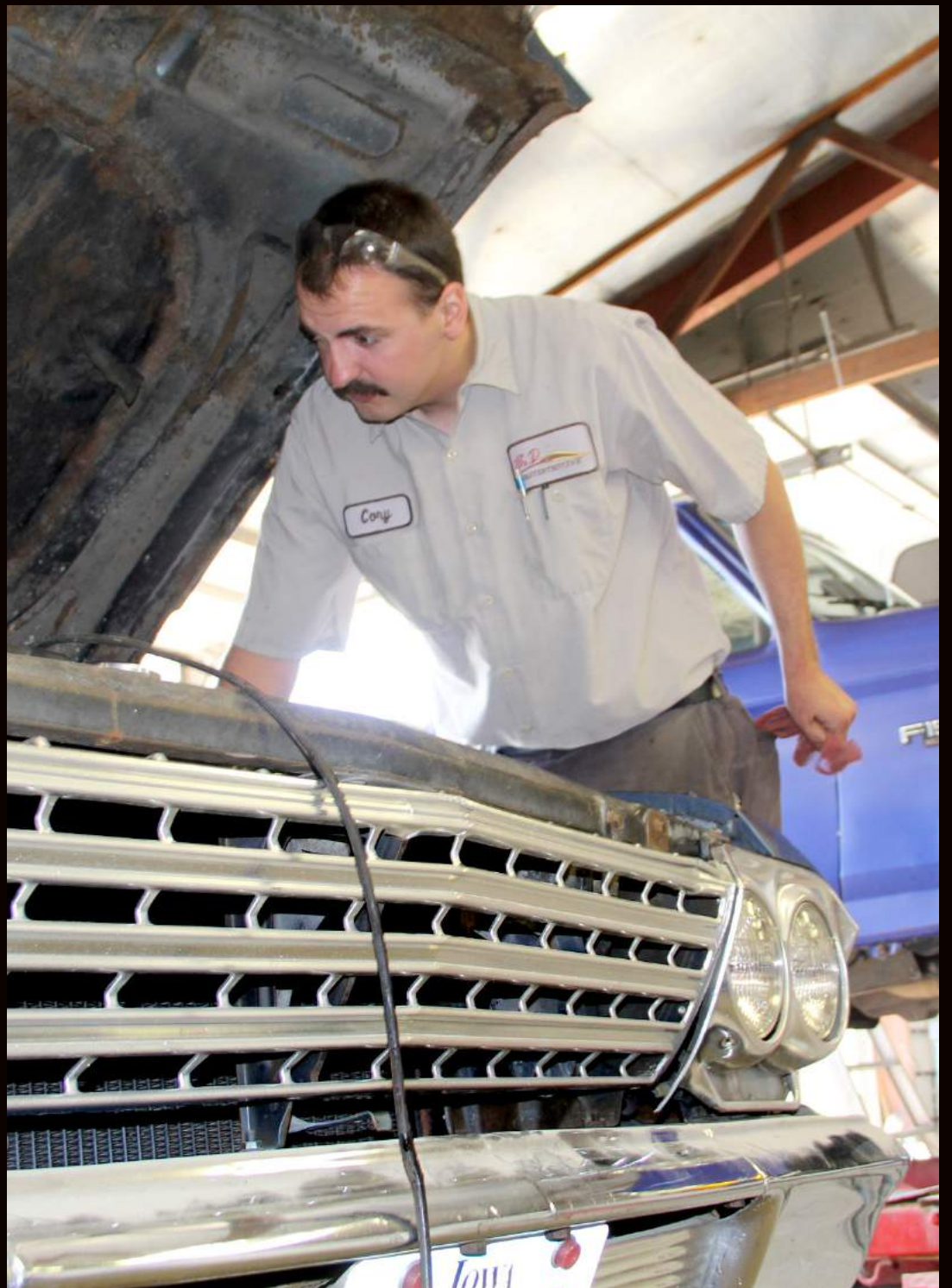

Maxwell farm earns Dairy Sustainability Award

Cinnamon Ridge Farm stands high on a hill outside of Donahue, and now, what happens there is being recognized and noticed across the country.

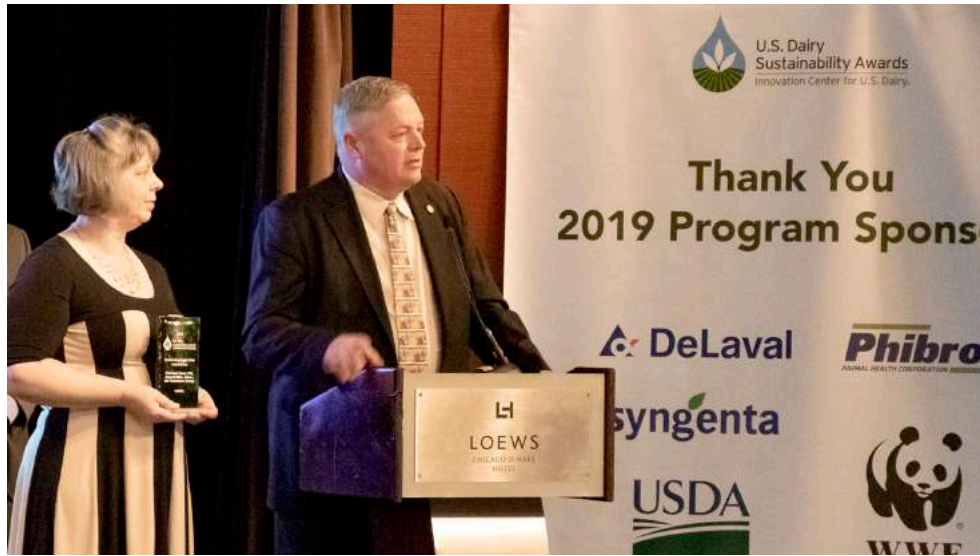
Cinnamon Ridge, and owners John and Joan Maxwell, were one of three farms nationwide that were recognized with the U.S. Dairy Sustainability Award.

The award honors outstanding dairy farms, businesses and partnerships for socially responsible, economically viable and environmentally sound practices.

These practices, both large and small, are steps that add up to promoting the health and well being of consumers, communities, cows, employees and the planet.

The strength of the award has been the unprecedented collaboration with leaders and experts from within and outside the dairy industry, and the eighth annual awards were presented May 8 in Rosemont, Ill.

"John and Joan's efforts on their farm are second to none when it comes to positively impacting their animals, land and the environment," said Lucas Entsch, Midwest Dairy CEO. "Their passion for learning and problem solving has been the driving force behind their flourishing business, and it's exciting to see the legacy they are building for sustainable practices across our industry."

John Maxwell began his dairy farm business after graduating from the University of Iowa in 1984 and immediately faced a challenge: He needed cow feed.

Maxwell used his ingenuity and found a way to grow feed and benefit the environment by using cover crops. He began experimenting and found that rye grass survived the winter and was a great feed option for his herd of Jersey cows.

The 400-acre cover crop offers a destination for his cows' manure as a natural fertilizer, and he saw that implementing no-till practices minimized soil and earthworm disruption, thereby preventing nutrient runoff and erosion.

Consequently, that practice created fertile ground for the ensuing corn and soybean crops to thrive, while cutting his feed bill in half.

In addition, Cinnamon Ridge also repurposes food for its cows that couldn't be sold at retail, such as products that simply may have been mislabeled. One such product was coffee creamer.

The Maxwells checked with their cow nutritionist, who determined the creamer was a good addition to the cows' diet as a carbohydrate source. Now, about 2,200 pounds of creamer arrive at the farm each week instead of going to a landfill.

"It's important to be curious about everything you do," said John Maxwell. "Don't be satisfied where you are. What fuels me is not only how can we grow, but how can we educate others."

To that end, Cinnamon Ridge is also an agritourism destination, and last year hosted 7,000 visitors from 50 countries.

Maxwell said the award is nice, and only a "big deal" because the tourism industry seems to look up to award winners.

"The award kind of gives me a boost to say, 'Hey, I'm doing good things, continue doing things, and let's make these good things great,'" he said. "The tourism industry looks up to award winners. I was nominated by somebody else, and this gives me a way to promote agriculture, for food being safe and nutritious, and all the great things that surround food and us as a nation."

Cinnamon Ridge Jerseys among the nation's best

Rural Donahue herd ranks high in milk production, cheese

John and Joan Maxwell have plenty to keep them busy on their rural Donahue dairy farm, and also find time to serve their communities in a variety of ways.

However, there's no denying the fact that milking Jersey cows is still their

bread and butter, and their Cinnamon Ridge herd has once again topped the charts of the Jersey industry.

According to statistics released by the *Jersey Journal*, the 198-cow herd — owned by John and Joan, his brother, Edwin, and daughters Amy and Kara — tops its peers for standardized protein production, ranks second for milk and cheese yield, and fifth for fat.

"I'm really proud of what our herd has done, and what the farm has done," said Maxwell. "I'm very proud to be surrounded by employees and family mem-

bers that make it happen.

"The Jersey herd is five generations of working hard. I'm lucky that my ancestors picked Jerseys, worked on having them get better and better, and then took it to level where I could take it to next level."

Cinnamon Ridge Jerseys had a 2018 lactation average of 26,523 lbs. milk, 1,252 lbs. fat and 1,003 lbs. protein, with a cheese yield of 3,355 lbs.

The dairy also leads the nation in actual protein production with a 2018 herd average of 2,513 lbs. milk, 1,124 lbs. fat

and 892 lbs. protein.

It's no wonder that seven of the top 305-day milk and protein records completed last year were made by cows in the Cinnamon Ridge milking string, which uses Lely robots for milking.

The herd's leading lady is 4-year-old Plus Partridge, which led the nation in milk (34,500 pounds), protein (1,372 pounds) and cheese yield (4,685 pounds).

Vertical integration through cheesemaking has allowed the Maxwells to capitalize on yield advantages of their own milk and bring the next generation back to the farm.

The family sells cheese, beef and other products to consumers from a stand on the farm and through several other local venues.

"Jersey is the breed of the future," said Maxwell, "because the future consumption of milk is cheese and ice cream, and Jerseys are the better breed for that product."

"At one time, Jerseys were frowned upon as cattle for the poor and folks that couldn't afford a Holstein, but now it's really flipped."

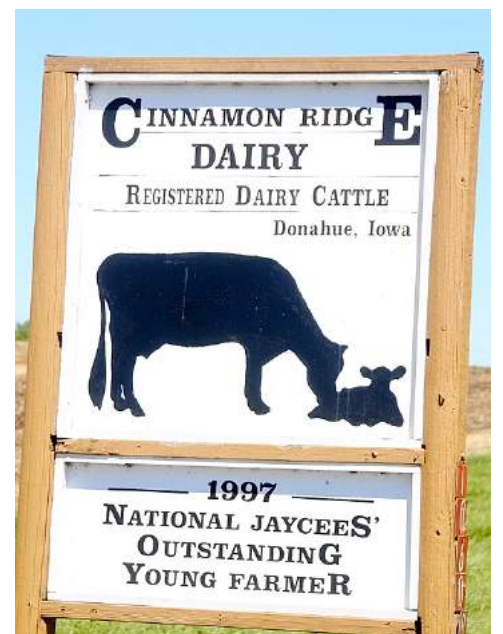

Leazer dairy farm serves as agricultural classroom

As the recent school year wound down, first-grade students from Wilton Elementary spent a warm spring afternoon enjoying a tour of a local dairy farm.

Steve Leazer, his daughter Laura Jones and grandson Hunter Jones, led a tour of his family's farm. The farm was established in 1948 and now has 50-70 cows, chickens and 320 acres of farmland used to produce corn, soybeans and alfalfa.

According to Steve, the family began offering area schools the chance to tour the farm sometime in the 1970s.

As the students toured the farm-grounds, it was easy to see why the family has continued to extend the invitation for so many decades. Steve said the eagerness to learn is the reason they keep inviting the kids back.

"Just seeing what kind of questions they've got and the enthusiasm of it."

Questions asked by curious young minds included how many predators the cows have, how often they eat, how many babies they have and more.

The tour was split into three sections, with Steve leading the feeding area, Laura teaching kids about the milking process and Hunter answering questions about chickens he has chosen to raise on his family's farm.

Steve explained how cows eat, before flipping the switch on a conveyor belt to show the kids how the feeding process works. He told the students that cows had four stomachs, and only bottom teeth, so they need to regurgitate their food and chew it more than once.



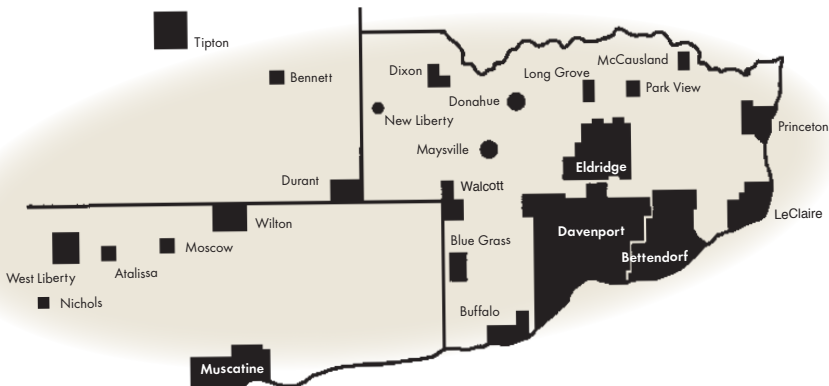

"It's a lot different than us, isn't it?" he asked the students.

Laura explained to the kids that milk gathered on the farm is sent to Prairie Farms Dairy in Dubuque and that it only takes two days for it to hit the shelves of local grocery stores.

In Dubuque the milk is pasteurized and put into gallons or made into milk products. The cows on the Leazer farm produce around 3,500 pounds, or just over 400 gallons, of milk each day. An individual cow can produce around 70 pounds, or just over 8 gallons, of milk daily.

She moved students into the milking room and said grain is offered to the cows as an incentive for them to come and get milked. The cow the students saw milking was named Blue Bell. Laura told the students it would take her

around seven minutes to milk that day and that she would make around 20,000 gallons of milk over the course of her lifetime.

Students eagerly asked questions, wanting to know more about the gentle giants. Laura told them fun facts, including information about their gestation cycles. The kids were especially curious about the babies after seeing calves that had been born in recent weeks and learning that Blue Bell was pregnant.

Cows can give birth every 12-14 months, usually with one calf, sometimes two and rarely three.

This field trip was the first time Hunter, age 9, had the opportunity to help teach his fellow students. His siblings Lizzy and Gunnar may also help as they get older, if they, too, develop a passion for farming as their older brother has.

Steve explained that Hunter is the caretaker for chickens on the farm and has become a young expert on the animal. He was comfortable fielding questions from small groups he took into the coop.

This year the farm only hosted the Wilton first grade class, but the family has welcomed students from Wilton, Durant and Tipton over the decades. Steve explained that they coordinate with the schools to get students outdoors and give them a taste of the farm life.

"You don't have people that are involved in farming anymore, so you've got to get the word out," he said. Steve said he plans on keeping the tradition

going as long as youngsters remain eager to learn.

As far as his favorite part of being a dairy farmer, he said, "You're your own boss. Sometime's that's good, sometimes that's bad."

With the opportunity to share these experiences with his daughter and grandchildren, Steve said the farm is, "a great place to raise a family. There's a certain amount of things that have to be done and that gets passed on to the kids." This unique farming experience has already impacted his grandson, Hunter, as it may well for countless other kids who stop by and take a peek at farm life.

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County fairs take center stage

Take a look at what's on top in Cedar, Muscatine and Scott counties.

Cedar County Fair – July 10-14

The Cedar County Fair Association, Inc., is making some changes this year at the Cedar County Fair, being held Wednesday, July 10, through Sunday, July 14, at the Cedar County Fairgrounds, 1195 210th St., Tipton.

The fair, presided over by board president Lance Schiele, has guaranteed the carnival a specific amount of money "so that we could give our children a deal on riding the carnival rides," according to the fair's website.

"This year, we will have wristbands

every day the entire time the carnival is active. One wristband and the rides are unlimited for that day," says the site.

"We are selling punch cards that have five punches on them. Those punches equal five wristbands. You can share the punch cards, but you cannot share the actual wristbands."

Punchcards are \$40 through Tuesday, July 9, and \$45, or \$10 per day, starting July 10.

The carnival is open five hours daily with extended hours on Saturday. Hours for Wednesday through Friday are 5-10 p.m. On Saturday the carnival is open from noon to 4 and 5-10 p.m. Sunday hours are 11 a.m. through 4 p.m.

Cedar County Fair's grandstand events are free with gate admission. Entertainment this year includes go-kart racing at 7 p.m. on Wednesday; stock car races featuring IMCA-sanctioned Modifieds, American Iron Racing Series and other divisions at 6:30 p.m. on Thursday; an ECIPA truck and tractor pull at 7 p.m. on Friday; the Bill Riley Talent Show at 9:30 a.m. and the Arch Allies, a tribute band, in concert at 8 p.m. on Saturday; and a rock 'n roll cruise-in 11 a.m. to 4 p.m., sanctioned barrel racing at noon and the Tailfins band with music of the 1950s and '60s in the Pavilion on Sunday.

Adult gate admission to the fair for those age 13 and over is \$8 before 4 p.m. and Wednesday evenings and \$12 after 4 p.m. Thursday, Friday and Saturday.

Children ages 6-12 and seniors and veterans pay just \$5 all day every day. Those under age 6 are free.

Sunday is Family Day. Cedar County Farm Bureau is providing free gate admission all day.

Other fair attractions include open exhibits in Floral Hall and the educational Bearadise Ranch, which, according to its website, brings "to you their big, beautiful bruins in loving human care. Promoting habitat preservation and conservation for all bear species."

"We are very excited about this year with all the extras and changes we have made," says the fair board's Sarah Anderson. "We are having a kick-off party on Friday, July 5, to get our fair queen/princesses crowned and show off the new cattle arena."

"Floral Hall/open exhibits has a brand new look and activities. Every day there is something new!"

Season passes are available for the

fair. Those who have them will see everything on the grounds and the grandstand lineup that includes the concert. Selling the cards are all fair board members, 4-H members, the Cedar County Extension Center and the fair office.

Prices are \$25 for adults ages 13-64, \$20 for seniors age 65 and above and \$20 for active veterans or retired veterans with an ID. Passes are \$15 for children ages 6-11.

Muscatine County Fair – July 17-21

The Muscatine County Fair, which dates to 1852, is set for Wednesday through Sunday, July 17-21, at the fairgrounds, 101 N. Clay St., in West Liberty. The theme is "Honoring the Past and Celebrating the Future."

Some special days during the fair have been designated. Kids' Day is Wednesday. Thursday is Military Appreciation Day with free entrance for veterans. Fri-

Mississippi Valley Fair - July 30 - Aug. 4

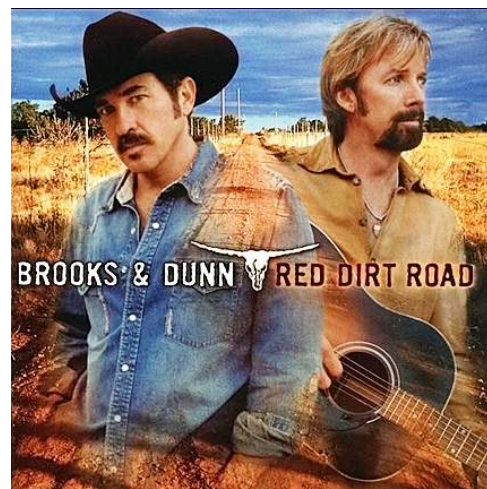
Some special events are planned for this year's Great Mississippi Valley Fair as its home, the Mississippi Valley Fairgrounds, celebrates its 100th anniversary.

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Local crop observations: 'Decisions out of the norm'

A severe winter of extreme cold and snow, followed by floods and continuous rain, have combined for a late planting season and unpredictable crop prospects for eastern Iowa farmers.

Country Connection asked Gretchen Nollman of Nollman Ag Services of Atalissa to analyze what's happened and what to expect.

In addition to being a community volunteer and incoming Rotary club president and coach of the West Liberty cheerleading team, Gretchen has 14 years' experience in agri-business and crop scouting.

After graduating Illinois State University, Gretchen worked for Archer Daniel Midland in 2004, where she traveled/lived to Central and South America trading grain and feed commodities and developing inbound and outbound logistics for local farmers. From there she transitioned to work for Trans-Coastal Supply, where she traded grain and feed commodities still while coordinating shipments of grain and feed ingredients that in containers to Asian, European and African countries for local farmers.

As her career progressed, she ran a multi-location grain elevator in south-central Illinois. Gretchen then relocated with her husband and daughter to Muscatine County in January of 2014. She has worked in agriculture in southeast Iowa with scouting, seed, agronomy and fertilizer as well as with a multi-location grain company trading grain and feed commodities and coordinating logistics.

Her observations on the 2019 crop season:

Mother nature hasn't cooperated: What can we expect now?

The 2019 Spring season has been a rough one with mother nature not wanting to cooperate at all with farmers. There has been corn planted from the start of Easter weekend, through the first week of June, to include original planting and replanting. Bean planting started the middle of May and was still going strong as of June 17.

There have been a lot of decisions from farmers that have been out of the norm this spring, especially when it came to make the decision whether to

replant or not.

Making corn and soybean replant decisions isn't always easy either. When is the right time to re-plant? Was it back when the first field was planted, the farmer waits two weeks for the seed to come through the soil and it hasn't? Or is now finally the right time?

Over the last four to five weeks, farmers have been out in their fields assessing to determine if replanting is necessary.

Reduced plant stands

Various conditions can cause reduced

corn stands, such as cool and wet soils, insect feeding and diseases. It is important to identify the cause before deciding whether to replant. The difficulty of these decisions can stem from predicting how the effectiveness of replant will be, along with the combination of plant-

ing date and changing environmental conditions.

Again, replant decisions are never easy and are ultimately determined by which provides the greatest net income.

Recent thunderstorms have wreaked havoc on localized areas with lots of heavy rain causing flooding in fields which may cause stand losses. Small corn plants are not tolerant of flooding and may succumb to this condition in 1-3 days. Soybeans show slightly better tolerance to flooding, but still will not tolerate these conditions for very long.

Corn sensitivity

Corn seed is very sensitive to soil and soil water temperatures below 50°F during the first 48 hours after planting. Soil temperatures regulate whether seeds will germinate or not. The ground temperature needs to be 50°F for a corn seed to start the germination process. During the first 24 to 48 hours, the seedling imbibes or absorbs water and swells. Cold imbibition, cold chill imbibition, or cold shock are all terms used to describe the same affects caused to seedlings.

If temperatures are below 50°F, cells can rupture, which can lead to nonviable swollen kernels and aborted growth of the root and shoot. Cold temperatures will interfere with proper hydration that could lead to chilling injury and reduced yield.

When temperatures remain above 50°F for the first 48 hours after planting, seeds can be expected to germinate. If the soil temperature dips below 50°F after the imbibition period, it usually isn't an issue, as the seed will be taking in water through a slower process known as osmosis. Also, with cooler temperatures germination will be delayed but should occur.

1/1000th Acre Method - Corn

Count the number of plants in a length of row equal to 1/1000th of an acre based on row width. Multiply the number of plants by 1,000 to get plants per acre. Re-

peat the process in several locations in the field for an accurate estimate.

Stand counts

Stand counts should be taken randomly across the entire area of a field being considered for replant; this may include the entire field or a limited area where damage occurred. In situations such as flooding damage, only a portion of the field may need to be considered for replant.

After a plant stand has been assessed, it is important to consider other factors such as:

- Is the stand consistent, or are large gaps present?
- Will the stand have adequate crop canopy to assist with weed control and

irrigation efficiencies?

• Will replanting provide an economic gain?

• Plant health: Plants that are severely injured or defoliated will have reduced photosynthetic capability and a lower yield potential. Are the remaining plants healthy and relatively equal in maturity?

• Stand uniformity: An uneven stand will yield less than a relatively even stand with the same number of plants.

• Corn yield is influenced by stand density as well as stand uniformity:

- Variation in plant size can have a negative impact on yield.
- The expected yield from the current stand should be compared to expected replant yield.

- Plants with delayed emergence or development are at a competitive disadvantage with larger plants in the stand and will have reduced leaf area, biomass, and yield

Growing season length

Corn growth and development can be measured by calculating the number of growing degree units (GDUs) the crop has accumulated. GDUs are calculated by averaging the daily high (Tmax) and low (Tmin) temperatures minus the base temperature (Tbase), which is set at 50 °F for corn development. Tmax and Tmin are limited to 86 °F and 50 °F, respectively, as the maximum corn growth rate is reached at 86 °F and minimum, if any, corn growth occurs below 50 °F. Daily GDU accumulation can be calculated with the following formula: $GDU = ((Tmax + Tmin)/2) - Tbase$. For example:

• Tmax = 84 °F and Tmin = 53 °F $((84 + 53)/2) - 50 = 18.5$ GDUs

• Tmax = 90 °F and Tmin = 65 °F $((86 + 65)/2) - 50 = 25.5$ GDUs

• Tmax = 83 °F and Tmin = 48 °F $((83 + 50)/2) - 50 = 16.5$ GDUs

The approximate number of GDUs accumulated by the crop can be estimated to help determine crop growth stage.

GDU accumulation required for corn development varies with corn product maturity. In general, products that require most of the growing season to mature have higher yield potential. However, if the growing season is shortened due to delayed planting, an earlier maturing product may be needed to avoid having immature grain at the end of the season.

Switching to an earlier product

Careful consideration of several factors should be given prior to switching to an earlier product, including:



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• Full-season corn products for a given area typically have the highest yield potential.

• Daily GDU accumulation is minimal during the planting season when compared to flowering and dry down periods.

• As planting is delayed, corn product maturities move closer together.

• A primary reason for switching to an earlier-maturing corn product is not due to increasing yield potential, but to reduce the risk of immature and wet grain in the fall.

Deciding to plant an earlier-maturing corn product may depend on corn grain prices and grain drying costs. With high grain prices and low drying costs, planting an earlier-maturing corn product may not be necessary due to the possible reduction in yield potential.

Often, the increased yield potential of full-season corn products can outweigh the costs of drying in the fall. The intended use for the corn crop can also impact maturity selection. If the corn is being planted for silage or high moisture grain, then the cutoff date to plant an earlier maturing corn product can be later than the cutoff date for corn grain.

Historical GDU accumulation data can help estimate how many potential GDUs remain in the growing season. This information can help with deciding what maturity to plant and whether or not the corn product should mature before a killing frost (Figure 2). Switching to an earlier-maturing product should only be considered when there is concern with not having enough GDUs left in the growing season.

Soybean options

Cold stress also can occur in soybean seed if the soil temperature falls below 50°F during the first 48 hours after planting. The germination stage of soybeans consists first of a very fast uptake of water (imbibitional phase) followed by a much slower uptake of water (osmotic phase).

Chilling during the first phase can cause severe problems because the imbibed water is needed to rehydrate the

cotyledons and embryo to the point that cell membranes become functional. Cold temperatures interfere with proper hydration of those membranes.

The imbibitional phase typically is not very long (less than 24 hours) and can occur with relatively little soil moisture since the seed is dry. Thus, getting a cold rain 0-24 hours after you plant can lead to chilling injury in soybean and lower stands.

A key point to consider is that chilling injury on soybeans is likely to be greater if soil temperatures were cold (conservatively, less than 50°F) at planting rather than becoming cold 24 or more hours after sowing. The longer the seed is in the ground at warm soil temperatures before cold temperatures occur, the less likelihood there is of chilling injury. The bottom line is: You can consider planting soybeans if you think soil temperatures won't get cold (less than 50°F) for at least 24-48 hours after planting. If you planted two or more days before the cold rain, there should be no imbibitional injury due to cold temperature.

Hoop method - soybeans

Measure the diameter of the hoop, toss it in the field, and count the number of plants inside the hoop. Do this in at least five locations in the field. Multiply the average number of plants by the appropriate factor listed in Table 3 to get the number of plants per acre.

Several management considerations can help maximize soybean yield with late planting:

- It is generally not advantageous to switch to an earlier maturing variety unless planting is severely delayed (later than June 15).
- In very late planting scenarios, a soybean variety of 0.5 to 1.0 shorter maturity group is recommended.
- Because soybeans are photoperiod sensitive, they will flower at the same

time despite planting date and relative maturity. Earlier planted soybeans simply have more nodes and greater yield potential.

• Delayed planting does delay harvest. Generally, a three-week delay in planting equates to a one-week delay in physiological maturity.

• If planting after the first week of June, increasing seeding rate by 10 percent may be advantageous.

• Increased plant density will hasten canopy closure, make the soybeans taller and increase number of pods per acre.

• Earlier canopy closure can also help suppress weeds.

Late planting will likely not affect

soybean yield response to foliar fungicide or insecticide treatments.

Many obstacles in 2019

Overall the spring 2019 planting season has been a different one with mother nature not cooperating at all, and will not go on record as one that "worked just like the farmer planned."

Farmers have had many obstacles to face regarding doing field work, what to plant where, and the timing of spraying and fertilizer applications. Farming is a risk and reward business for sure and this spring has really proved that to be true.

I have been in agriculture for over 15 years, and I have never seen a year like this. As I work with many farmers throughout Muscatine, Cedar, Johnson Washington and Louisa counties, that is the same statement I hear, that it has been a LONG time since it's been this way OR it has never been this type of a spring.

This spring for myself has been a great experience with many different issues have arisen, to help farmers with advising and consulting crop scouting and helping assist with identifying potential problems and helping them with tough decisions.

Scott County farm field raises \$273,633 for overseas missions

A 40-acre field near the Wapsi River has generated more than a quarter million dollars to help feed people world wide.

For 13 years, Scott County volunteers with Hearts to Harvest has been growing corn and soybeans to help communities in Africa, India, and South America.

Proceeds from the harvest raised \$273,633 since 2006 to help others learn sustainable farming practices that can continue to feed people.

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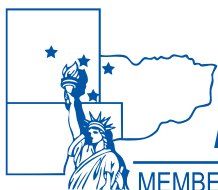
