# Princeton hires former Albany chief

McCausland contracts with county to replace retired chief

NSP Assistant Editor Princeton council members hired a former Albany Ill., police chief, and Mc-Causland council members contracted with Scott County to continue patrols since the retirement of Brian Carstens,

who was chief for both towns. Princeton council on June 29 amended

a town ordinance to honor new chief Wyatt Heyvaert's request to continue living in Illinois while his kids are in school.

The Princeton council unanimously voted to hire

Heyvaert full-time, at \$30 per hour with benefits. Council member Karen Woomert said she was impressed with his 20-year law enforcement career, and his candor with the council.

"He seemed a level-headed person, open and transparent about everything," Woomert said.

She said he discussed his resignation as Albany chief after having conflict with the council and his misdemeanor

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# County workers get bonuses, and 12th holiday

# About 450 workers will get checks totaling \$400,000 as incentives

Supervisors allocated \$400,000 to award 1-percent bonuses to all county full-time and most part-time workers, and added a floating holiday they hope will compensate for financial pressures on staff.

County administrator Mahesh Sharma recommended the changes at the June 21 committee meeting in response to COVID and inflation effects on employees.

The bonuses will go to about 425 fulltime and 24 part-time workers, county human resources director Mary Thee said.

The county already pays 10 holidays plus one floating holiday. Supervisors granted a second floating holiday.

"One-time bonuses may not be common in government agencies. But the trend I'm watching, maybe we're starting this, but other organizations are considering this and reviewing it, and if they can afford it, will give more than the 1 percent we have. It will be more common going forward," Sharma said.

"Some of you may ask the question, it may not be enough," he said. "You may be right."

Supervisor Brinson Kinzer responded: "I'm going to be the one who says it's not enough." He said a "double whammy" of COVID and inflation hit employees hard.

Supervisors unanimously supported the bonuses.

"We'll continue to watch. Our job is to make sure we're competitive in the marketplace," Tony Knobbe said.

Board chairman Ken Beck noted those factors hit taxpayers, too. "We'll make sure we're both efficient and competitive. It's a fine balance. We're kind of getting pressure from both ends. Our taxpayers are experiencing the same woes our employees are. This is a good start."

Supervisors will adjust part-time workers' bonuses based on hours worked. The minimum bonus will be \$150. Elected department heads and deputies are not eligible, Thee said.

The bonuses follow 3-percent pay raises supervisors awarded to union, and most non-union staff.

Thee said most county salaries were below recommendations in a 2019 study commissioned by supervisors. Sharma recommended the bonuses to improve retention and recruitment.

"Two things concern me: COVID, which has not gone yet, and number two is inflation. We thought both would be short-term, but short-term has yet to be defined," Sharma said.

# Mount Joy rail crossing

Supervisors backed Canadian Pacific's request to apply for federal funds to cover an estimated \$400,000 tab for putting gates on a rail crossing on 210th Street, just west of U.S. 61. the railroad for a Highway-Railroad Crossing Safety Program grant that would cover 90 percent of the cost. CP would pick up 5 percent, and Scott County taxpayers would cover 5 percent, or about \$20,000, county engineer Angela Kersten said.

The upgrade adds gates and improves the crossing grade in an area that draws 7,000 vehicles a day, she said.

"With recent commercial development adjacent to this railroad track, there is potential for higher frequency and speed of train traffic at this crossing. Upgrading the crossing warning system and installing gates would greatly improve safety," Kersten wrote to supervisors.

"The rail lines feed the industrial park. Hopefully they'll see more traffic," Beck said.

The work would not improve 210th Street. "It's a pretty rough one," Knobbe said.

Kersten said the county could consider using federal pandemic aid to smooth the county's portion of 210th Street between Holden Drive and the rail crossing. "From Holden to the airport is the city of Davenport. We've talked a little bit about improvements there, but they would be lead agency for that."

# Ford tacks \$1,250 onto squad costs

Supervisors agreed to Ford motor company's request to add \$250 to the price of each of five vehicles supervisors contracted for six months ago.

Kersten said Courtesy Ford alerted the county June 8 to the increases, and she advised supervisors to pay.

"I think we're all aware we're seeing this widespread across vehicle and equipment manufacturers. I would not expect to receive any better prices for these vehicles if we were to not pay this and cancel our order," Kersten said.

In November, supervisors accepted Courtesy's bid for four Ford Explorer police interceptors for \$34,216 each, or \$136,864.

In December, supervisors took Courtesy's bid for one more Explorer interceptor for \$34,216.

### Gravel prices rise up to 10 percent

Supervisors stuck with three Scott County quarries to supply gravel and other materials for roads.

Kersten reported price changes – mostly increases – from last year's contracts.

"We are blessed to have several quarries in our counties. Some of our counties out west struggle to get quality rock," Kersten said.

The county will buy materials as needed, and Secondary Roads staff chooses the closest quarry. The contract covers rock and sand of various grades and sizes.

Riverstone Group Inc., bid \$9.25 a ton for rock, up 2.8 percent.

Linwood Mining in Buffalo bid \$11.15 a ton for rock, up 9.9 percent.

Wendling Quarries bid \$10.05 for rock, up 8.6 percent.

# MEDIC contract extended a year

contract with MEDIC ambulance service for a year. The contract allows supervisors to allocate up to a \$200,000 subsidy for the county-wide, non-profit ambulance service.

MEDIC officials approached supervisors earlier this year about becoming a county-affiliated agency with its own tax rate, and become eligible for higher federal Medicaid reimbursement.

Beck said the contract extension, "is to get us through this year. How we proceed is still under discussion."

In a memo to supervisors, county health department director Amy Thoreson said, "Those discussions have resumed ... Amending the current agreement will allow the continuation of operations until those discussions conclude."

# Insurance premiums rise 18 percent

Scott County insurance premiums jumped 18 percent this year for coverage that remains mostly the same, except for a boost in cyber security.

Supervisors approved contracts totaling \$688,858 in premiums for coverage brokered by Arthur J. Gallagher firm of Davenport. Gallagher representative Jeff Young commended the county for liability and workers compensation management that kept premiums from going even higher.

"It's reflective of the superior claimhandling the county does. You don't have a lot of claims. That goes to the department head level and the employee level," Young said about the workers' compensation coverage.

**Liability:** Coverage from Travelers increased 5 percent for up to \$1 million for each occurrence, and \$300,000 from the county's self insurance fund. "They feel Scott County is very well run. They like everything they see from Scott County," Young said.

**Workers' compensation:** \$99,972, a 37-percent increase, from Midwest Employers Casualty Co. The county signed a twoyear contract, with premiums rising 3.5 percent in 2023-24. Supervisors agreed to Young's recommendation for the county to cover up to \$750,000 for claims from law enforcement staff through selfinsurance retention, and \$500,000 for all others.

**Property**: Premiums rose 12 percent to \$168,063 for coverage by Chubb insurance. That includes a \$100,000 deductible, with a \$5 million limit on mobile equipment and a \$2.5 million limit on vehicles damaged while parked. Young said raising deductibles would provide negligible premium discounts.

**Vehicle:** Premiums for regular vehicles increased 5.2 percent to \$40,677. Coverage for Emergency Management Agency vehicles is up 10.2 percent. Combined, premiums will total \$44,942.

**Cyber/internet liability**: Premium doubled with an expansion of coverage to \$1 million, with a \$100,000 deductible for coverage offered by Cowbell Cyber Insurance, of California.

"It's hard to get more than \$1 million," in coverage, Young said. "Money is better spent to fortify existing cyber systems. Medical professional: Premiums are up 25 percent to \$106,316 for coverage from Coverys, of Boston. That covers select health department staff and jail nurses with a \$1 million liability limit per incident, and \$3 million aggregate limit. The county has a \$25,000 deductible. Young said the increases reflect a nationwide "propensity of a lot of frivolous or nuisance claims when it comes to inmate medical-type claims. I don't see that lessening in the future."

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Supervisors extended the county's

InRoads Paving, of Des Moines, bid \$811,801.66; Valley Construction Co., of Rock Island, bid \$820,307.87; and Brandt Construction Co., of Milan, bid \$976,253.34.

Kersten said work will be done in 2023



# Drug enforcement grant

Supervisors accepted a \$59,000 state grant to help fund undercover drug trafficking enforcement by the Scott County Special Operations Task.

The task force, formerly knows at the Metropolitan Enforcement Group, or MEG, has two Scott County deputies and a Bettendorf office. Davenport no longer participates.

The annual grant from Iowa's Office of Drug Control Policy, "is a very miniscule amount of money for what it takes

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# Iowa ag secretary candidates chart different courses

The candidates for Iowa secretary of agriculture offer sharp contrasts in terms of their priorities and assessments of the greatest challenges facing farmers.

The state's incumbent secretary of agriculture — Mike Naig, a Republican – touts his administration's work in the past four years to expand markets for farmers to sustain the industry's status quo, and he's satisfied with the slow but steady progress they've made in protecting topsoil and the state's streams.

His challenger in this fall's election – John Norwood, a Democrat — said Iowa needs a better-coordinated plan to accelerate conservation and water-quality improvements, which includes taking a substantial amount of cropland out of production.

### Norwood: New vision for sustainability

Norwood, 57, is a West Des Moines business consultant and county soil and water commissioner who wants to alter the course of agriculture in the state.

"I think we need a new vision for where we want to go," Norwood told Iowa Capital Dispatch, "particularly if we're concerned about sustainability, resiliency, inclusiveness, diversity. Those are all themes that I'm going to be talking about that are super important to the state."

Norwood's view of the big picture: lowa has not done enough to prevent soil erosion and to keep its waterways clean of fertilizers.

Naig said the biggest concerns for farmers will be higher costs of supplies and workforce shortages.

the Iowa Department of Agriculture and Land Stewardship hired him to be Northey's deputy in 2013.

Norwood grew up in suburban Massachusetts, graduated from Yale University — with a master's degree in environmental management — and moved to Iowa in 2002 with his then-wife, who was hired as a professor at Drake University.

Norwood's view of the big picture: Iowa has not done enough to prevent soil erosion and to keep its waterways clean of fertilizers, he said. There are more than 2 million acres of cropland — about 10 percent of the state's total — that probably shouldn't be farmed because they lie in floodplains or are highly erodible, and farmers should diversify their operations by growing oats, cover crops and others, he said.

"Sometimes the current secretary thinks he's the secretary of corn, beans and hogs," Norwood said of Naig.

### Naig: Focus on expanding markets

Naig said he has focused on expanding markets for farmers, increasing the demand for biofuels and improving water quality — especially by establishing wetlands that can contain nitrogen fertilizer. The state helped build six of them in the past year, he said, and farmers now plant cover crops on a little more than 3 million acres, which reduces erosion.

Those are components of the state's Nutrient Reduction Strategy, a voluntary framework to reduce fertilizer runoff. It's often derided by environmentalists as ineffective.

"It's a strategy in name only," Norwood said. "It's not a strategy. We need to narrow the solutions and figure out how to scale up. It's not doing these things one at a time. ... To ask each landowner to find their own contractor for these projects, it's just insane.'

Naig said the biggest concerns for farmers in the coming years will be higher costs of supplies and workforce shortages. He supports a federal guest worker program that would allow people from other countries to work agriculture-related jobs, and he hopes to increase the demand for Iowa ag products with a renewed push by the Choose Iowa program, which encourages people to buy food, fuel and other products of the state's agriculture.



He faces Naig, 44, who was elected secretary in 2018 after being appointed to the post earlier that year when his predecessor Bill Northey took a leadership job at the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

"We have incredibly strong agriculture," Naig said. "We do have large commodity production of corn and soybeans, but it's what we do with that that adds value. The value-added agriculture comes in the form of livestock production, renewable fuels, renewable materials, renewable chemicals. Those are things that can be an incredibly strong economic impact for our state, and when it comes to those things, we are leaders.'

Naig lives in Urbandale but was raised on a farm near Cylinder in northwest Iowa. He is a Buena Vista University graduate who worked as Monsanto's manager of government affairs before

to employ three people," Scott County Sheriff Tim Lane told supervisors. The grant requires a \$19,667 county match, that Lane said is in the budget and just a fraction of the county's drug enforcement expenses.

### Juvenile diversion grant

Supervisors accepted a \$125,000 state grant to increase diversion programs for juvenile offenders.

The Iowa Department of Human Rights Juvenile Justice Planning Division grant is one of seven awarded to Iowa communities, county juvenile detention center director Jeremy Kaiser told supervisors.

The grant would cover about two and


a half years of services, and can be extended another two and a half years, he said.

The money will expand services, but not staff, for about 50-60 youth each year already going through state-funded diversion programs in Scott County.

"Basically what we'll do is send our youth advocates ... out into the community to meet with the family and the youth, gain an understanding of why the crime occurred and what that youth needs in order to not commit a crime again," Kaiser said.

### 14 new positions authorized

Supervisors authorized 14 new, fulltime equivalency positions for the fiscal year that began July 1, including 11 in the sheriff's department.



All of the positions were part of the county budget unanimously approved in March. The June 23 vote sought by budget director David Farmer formally authorizes these staffing increases and new levels:

• Administration: 0.25 new FTE to reach 5.75:

• Health: 1.1 FTE to reach 51.11;

• Human resources: One FTE to reach 4.50;

• Sheriff: 11 FTE to reach 183.80;

• Treasurer: One FTE to reach 31.0. The new positions leave the county with 532.96 FTEs.

### \$684K for alcohol counseling services

Supervisors renewed a \$648.331 addiction counseling contract with the Center for Alcohol and Drugs Services, a Unitypoint provider, at rates unchanged from this year. County community services director Lori Elam said she expects to present supervisors with a new contract by Jan. 1 that will change services and costs.

The contract now calls for:



• \$295.432 for detoxification. evaluation and treatment;

• \$198,000 for inmate substance abuse treatment and case management;

• \$154,899 for jail-based assessment and treatment.

### Supervisors also:

· Hired Austin Schoeck as assistant county attorney. Schoeck has worked as judicial law clerk and prosecuting intern for Dallas County with four-to-five years experience, county human resources director Mary Thee said. Schoeck was hired at step 5 pay rate and given two weeks paid vacation.

 Hired Brittany Wall as correctional health nurse at entry-level rates.

 Replaced the customary portfolio gifts to employees celebrating service anniversaries, and stopped awarding service pins. Thee said a survey found employees prefer the cards.

• Abated taxes totaling \$2,994 on five homes purchased by the city of Davenport.

• Reappointed supervisor John Maxwell to a three-year term on Fire District #5 board.

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
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# **CHIEF:** Heyvaert brings 20 years experience to Princeton

an Albany property damage accident in August 2021.

Shaw News reported that Heyvaert pleaded in March this year and remains on court supervision. The report said Heyvaert was off-duty when driving a vehicle that struck a parked car on Route 84 in Albany at 3 a.m. on Aug. 27, his birthday. He alerted authorities immediately, and surrendered three days later.

"It's a mistake. I owned it. Wish it never would have happened," he told *The* NSP.

Princeton mayor Kevin Kernan owns a bar in Albany and said he's known Heyvaert, for "four or five years."

"He left due to council issues," Kernan said. "He's been policing a very long time, and is good with the community.'

In a resignation memo to the Albany council, Heyvaert wrote: "I have been in law enforcement for 20+ years and this has by far been the most difficult position I have held," according to Shaw News. "In the end, my position affects more than just me, and when it starts taking a toll on my family, it is time for a change.

He elaborated in an interview with the NSP. "For first seven years as chief, it was outstanding. But last few months, we had new mayor and five out of six new council members. They came in with an agenda. Myself and others were not part of the agenda,"

He worked two months filling in for Fulton police after leaving Albany. He's working now for CDMI Concrete Contractors in Moline.

Heyvaert was a Moline police officer 2004-2010, and in Colona 2010-2012.

Heyvaert might be more widely known for fronting the Dirt Road Rockers band for 11 years. He was in Algona for a July 4 weekend show.

Princeton mayor Kernan commended Heyvaert's social media outreach. "He has Tik Tok videos that went viral," Kernan said.

Heyvaert was Albany chief when he posted a Tik Tok video championing local law enforcement.

"I put one out to keep encouraging law enforcement officers to be community caretakers to serve the communities with pride and mostly my main point of it was to honor those who have served before us that have made the ultimate sacrifice," he told Ourquadcities.com last year.

In the video, Heyvaert recites the poem, "A Sign Along The Road," by retired Ohio state patrol captain.

The road signs along the highways and the interstates that have the name of a fallen trooper or a fallen police officer to signify that that piece of roadway was dedicated in their honor," he reads in the video that got nearly 400,000 views.

Since then, he's posted dozens of videos, many with his daughter.

Others take light digs at President Biden, and are labeled "let's go Brandon."

"Taco Bell; ever since Biden became president, this is the cheapest gas in town," he posted in January.

Princeton council members amended city ordinances to allow police and fire staff to live in Rock Island or Whiteside counties. Mayor Kernan said previous ordinance limited police and fire to Princeton addresses.

Heyvaert said he's willing to continue previous chief Brian Carsten salvage inspection work throughout Scott County. which netted the city \$30,000 to \$50,000 annually.

# McCausland contracts with deputies

McCausland will join Long Grove and Dixon as cities contracting with Scott County Sheriff's deputies for \$65 per hour, a rate that some supervisors worry does not cover the county's costs.

Supervisors signed an agreement setting the rate for the year and asked Sheriff Tim Lane to reassess those contracts and propose rate changes.

Lane said his department pays overtime to deputies who volunteer for the town patrols. The patrols average four or five days per month on dates requested by the town councils.

Supervisor Ken Croken supported the agreement, but had concerns since supervisors added seven deputies in 2020, and the department still relies on overtime to fill vacations, illnesses and other vacancies.

"We're banking on overtime already. We're meeting obligations of these special contractual relationships using overtime. This appears to be rabbits coming out of hats for me. I don't understand how many rabbits are in there," Croken said.

Lane said he has enough deputies, and a budget that covers the overtime.

"We have been able to cover that as overtime. So it doesn't concern me. The need for more deputy sheriffs to cover that does not concern me," Lane said.

McCausland requested the coverage following retirement of Brian Cartsen, who served as police chief for McCausland and Princeton.

Princeton council decided to look for a new chief. McCausland opted for county coverage.

Lane said the county still provides "regular patrols of these towns throughout our shift. That is based on a deputy having time to do that, and part of normal covering of their towns. That is not charged to the city.

"But these cities have had their own police department at some time or another ... What they have chosen to do is not buy the patrol car; not buy the uniforms; not to hire the employee: just have a contract with us," Lane said.

Croken suggested the county should cover the extra patrols.

"Why we don't have a sheriff's department adequately funded and staffed to provide all the essential services that are needed throughout the county is not clear to me. I don't understand why Mc-Causland is paying to get the services its taxpayers already are paying for. This doesn't make sense to me. Sorry," Croken said.

# North Scott Press judged First Place for Best Coverage of Local News

Other First Place awards won by The NSP for work in 2021 are:



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

# Postage rates go up July 10, but this is just the beginning

ver the years, I've been the biggest supporter – and most severe critic – of the U.S. Postal Service. My appreciation of the enormity of its task is born from more than a half century of first-hand experience as a customer whose business model relies on timely delivery.

The average person, I think, doesn't



understand the complexity of the U.S. Postal Service's task - delivering 425 milion pieces of mail daily, through 31,247 post offices, to customers at 163 million addresses in locations as remote as Fort Yukon,

Alaska. Fort Yukon? I've been there. It's a 495-population outpost in the Arctic Circle, reached only by bush pilot or slow boat up the Yukon River. The U.S. Postal Service has a presence there, and in remote crossroads everywhere. It's part of their mandate, and the presence of the U.S. government everywhere.

So yes, delivering the mail is a BIG job. But that doesn't excuse the fact that the USPS cannot guarantee one-day delivery of my First Class letter from Eldridge to the Business Mail Entry Unit near the Quad Cities airport in Milan, Ill. That's the processing center through which all local mail goes, and I have an account there to mail a districtwide newsletter for Rotary three times a year

But last week, Eldridge couldn't guarantee that my check for payment of postage would be there the next day for the price of a 58-cent First Class stamp. If I wanted a guarantee, that would cost \$26-plus. So I decided to drive there and deliver it myself, in person.

I'm not making this up!

Fifty-eight cents? A First Class letter was 3 cents when I was a kid, but 58 cents is still not bad. "A Global Bargain," boasts the USPS website, comparing to \$3.12 in Italy, \$1.85 in France, \$1.14 in the United Kingdom, 95 cents in Germany, 84 cents in Canada, 77 cents in Australia and 73 cents in Japan.

But as of July 10, that will be the OLD price. We'll be catching up. The new price will be 60 cents, and that's just the beginning.

In the column on the opposite page, former Congressman Kevin Yoder (R-Kansas), says within a decade, Americans could be paying well over \$1 to mail a single letter. That's because the postal service, under the leadership of Posmaster Louis DeJoy, appears willing to hike rates every six months at "uncomfortable" levels. All other classes, including

newspapers, will go up, too!

Congressman Yoder's column, which was distributed by the National Newspaper Association, makes many good points. I urge your thoughtful reading.

# Good things happening here

There was positive news in the local community last week. Just before deadline, Mark Ridolfi was able to get the full story about Heath Christians' new ownership of Rustic Ridge Golf Course. The story was widely read in print, and made a HUGE impact on social media where comments were almost unanimously favorable.

Indeed, it's wonderful that this crown jewel will continue with just its fourth private owner in 46 years; that the city of Eldridge was not needed to keep the property as a golf course.

The same week, YMCA CEO Brad Martell led a tour of the North Scott YMCA where construction is moving certainly toward an Oct. 3 opening. A dedication is scheduled for Thursday, Sept. 29 at 5:30 with a public open house on Saturday, Oct. 1 from 10-4.

The proof of the pudding will begin Monday, Oct. 3 and beyond, when the facility opens at 4:30 a.m. That's when membership signups get underway in earnest.

On March 2, 2020, a week before Covid shut everything down, voters approved the Y with a 78.2-percent majority. That's fantastic, but the real test for both the YMCA and the Rustic Ridge Golf Course will be the memberships.

# Congress just delivered major postal reform legislation; so why is the U.S. Postal Service ignoring it?

fter the massive mail slowdowns and postage hikes of 2021, Congress took action to financially stabilize the U.S. Postal Service by passing a historic, bipartisan postal reform bill. The bill



freed the Postal Service from an unreasonable 2006 law demanding that it pre-fund retiree health benefits 75 years in advance a requirement that put billions

of dollars on the

Postal Service's balance sheet each year and motivated it to keep hiking postage rates while reducing services.

Congress passed the 2022 postal reform legislation with the intent to strengthen this critical service and help the Postal Service avoid additional large rate increases and service cutbacks. However, Postal Service leadership has seemingly decided to stamp Congress's message "return to sender.

# Massive rate hikes

The very same day President Biden signed the monumental postal reform legislation, Postmaster General Louis DeJoy announced his plans to increase postage prices at an 'uncomfortable rate" for some time to come. Specifically, DeJoy and the Postal Board of Governors intend to increase stamp prices again in July, again next January, and as often as twice each year after that.

And they can, thanks to a recent Postal Regulatory Commission ruling giving DeJoy the power to initiate postage rates that outpace inflation.

In just a decade, Americans could be paying well over \$1 to mail a single letter. Unless Congress takes action again to hold the Postal Service accountable, let's just say we should all be buying "Forever Stamps" while they are still somewhat affordable.

As a businessman and a fellow Republican, DeJoy should know that raising prices generates fewer customers and can lead to less revenue. The same holds true for unnecessary postage increases. They will not only deter individuals from using the mail, but will also drive away businesses, newspapers, nonprofits, and charities all of which generate more than half of all postal revenues.

The Postal Service already



anticipates losing 42 percent of mail volume over the next decade, driven partly by massive rate increases. Additional unnecessary postage hikes could lead to a huge loss in revenue that will jeopardize the survival of the Postal Service itself and its workforce of 650,000 Americans, many of whom are veterans.

# **USPS: Tangibly linking Americans**

Whether it brings something as special as a handwritten card or something as necessary as medication, the U.S. Postal Service is the only institution capable of going the last mile to reach, serve, and tangibly link every American. Some claim that private couriers like FedEx and UPS could replace the U.S. Postal Service, but that's simply not true.

The Postal Service is unique in that it's obligated to serve every American. It processes more than 425 million pieces of mail (not including packages) each day, delivering them to and from a staggering 163 million delivery points in all of the country's more than 41,000 ZIP codes. The Postal Service goes the last mile, no matter how rural or remote the address - and that's something no private courier could, or would, do.

What can be done to right the ship? First and foremost, the recently passed postal reform legislation can't be ignored by Postal Service leaders. There are new members of the Board of Governors who should push to challenge DeJoy's plans. At the same time, the Postal Regulatory Commission needs to review the freedom it gave to the Postal Service to raise rates.

But if none of these things happen, Congress needs to step in and take action.

Neither snow, nor rain, nor heat will stop the Postal Service, but excessive rates and reduced service just might.

# LETTERS TO THE EDITOR Voice your concern now about more trains coming through Princeton

### Editor:

Your voice is needed against CP rail expansion. We are sure you have heard on the radio, read in the paper, or heard others talking about the Canadian Pacific and Santa Ferailroad merger and its plan to run 14 more trains down our tracks. These trains will be filled with crude oil, which Canada is sending to Mexico.

This is not 14 more cars, but 14 more trains in addition to what we now have. The average CP train is just over a mile-

and-a-half long but can regularly reach up to over two-and-a-quarter miles long.

The concern is derailment, which in Princeton could definitely result in human injury or death, as stated by our fire chief, because of the number of homes next to the track. In addition, there is danger of the inability of emergency workers to get across the tracks, or get the rescue boat into the river during the summer. About three weeks ago, a train derailed up near Lansing and dumped a rail car of coal into the Mississippi. And we are aware of the deaths and property damage here and in LeClaire.

The noise from the trains has increased over the last few years, and the decibel level of the horns has been raised. It is a medical fact that excessive noise is not good for people. The track noise and the blasting of horns create disruption of daily activities and can wake people at night.

An Old Dominion University study found that consistent exposure to 65 decibels or greater of railroad noise pollution could reduce property values by up to 18 percent, a mark well below the 85-decibel average of most freight trains.

The mayors from Clinton (where the trains cross the river from Illinois) to Muscatine (where the trains leave the riverfront to go west) are working as a group to try to stop this merger, or get it off the Mississippi River. Illinois has a website opposed to this route. The economic impact on city development and devaluing of homes is not to be ignored.

The Surface Transportation Board (STB) will make a decision in the next few months. It is getting information from the elected officials, local governments and businesses, but they have asked for individuals to contact them with concerns on the effects of the existing trains and the effect another 14 trains will have.

A "cow chip throw" would also be among the entertainment, with cow chips specially ordered from Beaver, Okla., (home of the National Cow Chip Throw) for the event.

• The Eldridge City Council voted 4-1 to offer the position of city administrator to Donald Sandor, replacing Bill Mortenson who took a job overseas. Sandor was currently serving as city administrator of Elburn, Ill., a suburb of Chicago.

• The Eldridge City Council was also exploring whether to allow alcohol in city parks after receiving a request to sell beer at the new ballpark in north Eldridge. The Kiwanis had contracted with the Eldridge Park Board to sell concessions there, and estimated the group could collect \$800-1,000 in beer receipts during weekend tournaments. The Eldridge Lions Club had also received permission to sell beer at the park during the Summer Festival. An ordinance passed in 1973 prohibited alcohol in all Eldridge city parks.

• French & Hecht wheel manufacturing company in Walcott broke ground on a 27,000-square-foot addition to its plant. Bob Marty, president and general manager, announced that a production plant in downtown Davenport would close and the jobs would be transferred to Walcott. • The Long Grove III team won the Long Grove T-Ball tournament, which included teams of 6-8 year-olds from Long Grove, Donahue and Eldridge. Team members included Jon Nevenhoven, Sean Davis, Randy Riewerts, Jason Brandon, Chuck Parker, Martin Menke, Dawn Strobbe, Barclay Scott, Tom Fritz and Mark Lyons. They were coached by Ken Nevenhoven.

# New laws affect garbage, schools, businesses, women, taxes

Schools are no longer able to mandate vaccines, unemployment benefits last 10 fewer weeks, and Iowans can be charged with elder abuse starting Friday, July 1, as many of laws from the Iowa Legislature's 2022 session take effect.

These may be the final changes to Iowa law coming in 2022, as the governor has said she does not plan to hold a special legislative session following court rulings on abortion. But there are more than 150 new laws which Gov. Kim Reynolds signed from this session that took effect July 1.

Here's your guide to changes going into law across Iowa:

# LEGAL CHANGES

**Appeals court nominees:** A judicial nominating commission will send five finalists to the governor instead of three when filling a vacancy on the Iowa Court of Appeals. The law also allows judge candidates to apply to serve in a judicial district they do not live in, if they live in a contiguous county.

**Elder abuse:** Iowans older than 60 have more legal protections. The new law created criminal penalties for "elder abuse" in state law, as well as a new criminal charge for financial exploitation of people in this category. People charged with assaulting or stealing from Iowans over 60 years old also now face higher minimum penalties.

**Garbage searches:** Law enforcement officials can search an individual's garbage without having to obtain a search warrant under Iowa law. The measure states there is "no reasonable expectation to privacy" for trash that is placed outside a person's residence in a public area. The new law overturns an Iowa Supreme Court decision in 2021, which banned police from searching a person's uncollected trash without a warrant.

**Reproductive fraud:** Using human reproductive material that the patient did not consent to in writing is now illegal in Iowa. Nonconsensual insemination will considered be sexual abuse in the fourth degree, an aggravated misdemeanor. It also changes current law to allow any woman over 18 to consent to their own hysterectomy. Current law states a doctor can require spousal consent.

# **WORKFORCE CHANGES**

**Child care workers:** Know a 16- or 17-yearold looking for a job? Starting Friday, the age limit for workers supervising school-age children without adult supervision dropped from 18 to 16. The law also increased the number of toddlers a child care staff member can care for: seven 2-year-olds per staff member, and up to 10 children who are 3 years old.

**Unemployment benefits:** Starting July 1, Iowans will only have 16 weeks of maximum unemployment benefits, lowered from the previous 26-week limit. The law also adds new rules for eligibility, including a one-week waiting period, and the requirement that workers to accept lower-paying jobs sooner or risk losing their benefits.

### NEW SCHOOL LAWS

Asthma medication: Students with respiratory ailments can now keep and use an inhaler or other medication in school, with written parental permission and a doctor's statement. Schools are now allowed also to stock the medications and appropriate personnel may administer it to students reasonably believed to be in respiratory distress.

**Child care payments:** Families who use state aid to pay for child care can make additional, private payments to their child care providers. The current system reimburses providers with 50% to 75% the market rate for care. But now, child care centers can charge the difference between the state assistance and the private pay rate.

**Teacher licensing:** Teachers no longer must take a standardized test to obtain a teaching license in Iowa. Under previous law, Iowa teachers pass a series of standardized tests, which are also used to certify teachers in states like Nebraska and Kansas.

**Vaccine mandates:** Child care centers, public K-12 schools and Regents universities can no longer require students to receive a COVID-19 vaccine in order to attend school. The law, which stands until 2029, builds on Iowa's existing guidelines that government buildings – including public schools – cannot require vaccine status disclosure.

**Aircraft taxation:** Under new law, aircraft owners in Iowa don't have to pay sales tax on parts and labor. Aircraft owners could save up to \$700,000 a year, according to legislative fiscal analysts.

Food delivery: Food delivery apps like

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Grubhub, DoorDash and Uber Eats are required to enter a formal agreement with restaurants they deliver food from. Before advertising a restaurant's menu, apps must reach an agreement with the restaurant owner for the food to be available on the delivery platform. The new law also sets new standards for delivery vehicles, which include requirements that food is kept at a safe temperature and in a clean space in the car, and that drivers could not work for a rideshare app and pick up passengers while delivering food.

# NEW PROTECTIONS, SERVICES

**Abortion alternatives:** This new law establishes a statewide program to advocate against abortion by providing pregnancy support services. The program, which has \$500,000 in funding, will support organizations that help mothers and families navigate pregnancy, including adoption education services, funds for food, housing and counseling, as well as child care assistance.

**Mobile home costs:** Landlords must provide an extra month notice for rent increase or lease cancellation to mobile home owners starting Friday. While Democrats criticized the law for not going far enough, it's a step toward the protections mobile home owners have long sought against unfair or predatory practices by park owners.

# WHICH LAWS TAKE EFFECT LATER?

Bottle recycling: Iowa grocery and con-




venience stores will not have to accept customers' empty beverage containers, when sweeping changes to the state's "bottle bill" take effect in January. Retailers will not have to accept bottles if they are licensed to prepare ready-to-eat food. They can also not accept containers if they are located within 10 miles of a redemption center or mobile redemption center in more populace counties, or 15 miles in smaller counties.

Republican lawmakers said the new law means many grocery stores will likely stop taking bottles, passing the labor onto redemption centers. Centers will collect 3 cents per container, up from 1 cent.

**E15:** Gas stations will largely be required to sell gas with 15% ethanol, known as E15, starting in 2023. Retailers can apply for waivers if they do not own equipment compatible with the blend, or if they are a small enough company. The law also requires any new gas equipment installed to be compatible with 85% ethanol gas, and 20% biodiesel gas.

**Tax cuts:** Tax reductions will phase in gradually under the law Reynolds signed in March. In 2023, Iowa will no longer tax retirement income, which includes 401(k)s, pensions and IRAs. Farmers will also be eligible for new exemptions. The larger change is to Iowa's income tax. All income will be taxed at a 3.9-percent rate by 2026, with the state gradually eliminating higher tax brackets starting in 2023. Corporate taxes will also decrease over time, cutting the top rate from 9.8 percent to 5.5 percent.

# Hoelting's girls will open regional tourney action at home on Saturday

It's crunch time, and there's no way to sugarcoat the importance of the week.

The long bus rides are in the rearview mirror, and the hot summer sweat from days and nights on the diamond both lingers, and fuels what could be a promising run for North Scott's softball team.

While the Lancers were still hoping to claim an impressive top-three finish in the Mississippi Athletic Conference standings, with last night's (Tuesday) doubleheader with No. 4 (5A) Muscatine being a determining factor, there's no doubt there are bigger fish to fry.

Yes, it's tournament time for the Lancers, and their tourney trek will begin Saturday, with a 7 p.m. Class 4A regional semifinal tilt against either Central De-Witt (12-23) or Clinton (0-29).

The Lancers have swept both teams, while Central DeWitt owns a pair of wins (16-3, 11-3) over the winless River Queens.

North Scott has certainly primed the postseason pump with a schedule that exudes toughness. The Lancers have won six of their last 10 games, and their 25-9 record is deceiving.

All nine losses were to ranked teams, including the No. 1 teams in 1A and 4A. Hoelting's girls have defeated six ranked squads, with Saturday's 10-2 victory over 5A No. 1 Waukee Northwest being the crowning touch.

The Lancers will be looking to book their 15<sup>th</sup> trip to the big show in Fort Dodge, and first since finishing fourth in 2020, following a runner-up finish the year before.

and most likely standing in their way in next Tuesday's regional finals will be No. 10 Western Dubuque (22-16).

The Bobcats are the defending Class 4A champions, and they most certainly won't want to give up their title without a fight. In addition, there could be a heavy dose of revenge in the air as the last time the two teams met was in the 2020 regional finals, where North Scott rolled to a 10-0, five-inning win.

Like the Lancers, Western Dubuque's record is deceiving, as the Bobcats also play a predominantly 5A schedule. However, they have been struggling of late, having lost five of their last 10 games, and they will take on the winner of Maquoketa and Decorah in their Saturday night regional semifinal.

Assuming both the Lancers and Bobcats are victorious on Saturday, North Scott will host Tuesday's regional final, with the first pitch scheduled for 7 p.m.

Hoelting is trying to keep things in perspective. She acknowledged that last night's twinbill with Muscatine was important, because a top-three finish in what could be the state's toughest conference would be quite an accomplishment.

However, the postseason has always been a focal point for the Lancers, and that finally begins this week.

"Saturday is where we're really focusing," said Hoelting. "Obviously, we want to win Tuesday, but we're taking it as a chance for us to get better, and a chance for somebody else to challenge us before we go into postseason, and see what we can do.

"We know that we have to get past Central DeWitt or Clinton, but we also know that Western Dubuque is a possible matchup in the regional finals. They are a good ballclub, and they won't be a pushover.

"We're making sure that we're preparing every day," she continued. "Yes, we play Muscatine, but we're also talking about some of the things Western Dubuque or Central DeWitt will do. We're preparing for the long haul."

Hoelting likes the way her team is trending. While junior Maddy McDermott might be considered the team's ace in the circle, junior Shelby Spears and eighth-grader Chevelle Kingsley have pitched well of late.

"I feel good with Maddy, and we're really trying to figure out how the other two fit in with a relief role," said Hoeltvisiting Spartans eked out a 2-0 win in the opener, pushing across two runs in the second, and then rolled to a 10-0 win in the nightcap.

"I wasn't very happy with our performance against Pleasant Valley, but only because we didn't perform well at all on offense," said Hoelting. "We didn't scratch a run across. When you don't score, it doesn't matter how many they score, because you're never going to win. That was upsetting."

McDermott scattered nine hits in the opener, and struck our four, but the Lancers could only manage two hits of their own.

The nightcap wasn't much better, although North Scott did manage seven hits, with McDermott and Adalynn Johnson leading the way with two apiece. Kingsley took the loss, although she only gave up five earned runs.

# What a weekend

While getting swept by Pleasant Valley wasn't a pleasant experience, the Lancers flushed it quickly and had a solid weekend in Iowa City.

First up was No. 14 (4A) Benton Community, and the Lancers got a solid pitching performance from Shelby Spears, while also banging out 13 hits en route to a 9-7 win over the Bobcats.

Spears scattered six hits and allowed five earned runs to pick up the win, while Maddy McDermott led the offensive onslaught with a three-for-four day in the batter's box, that included a home run, double and five RBIs.

Spears and junior Carley Bredar also had two hits, and every single Lancer starter had at least one.

The only blemish on the weekend came later Friday afternoon, as the Lancers dropped a 6-4 decision to No. 11 (4A) Bondurant-Farrar.


The Lancers managed just four hits, with sophomore Sydney Skarich collecting half of them. McDermott took the loss, giving up five earned runs despite fanning seven.





Darrell Pidgeon April 21, 1939 – June 24, 2022

A 61-year romance ended when Darrell Wilson Pidgeon, 83, of Parker, Colo., passed away June 24, at The Denver Hospice. Darrell was the husband of North Scott graduate Ann Lage. The couple met in a cattle barn when both were showing at the 1961 National Dairy Cattle Congress in Waterloo, when Ann was a senior at North Scott.

Darrell was born to Leonard Wilson Pidgeon and Thelma Gumley Pidgeon in Wilmington, Ohio.

Darrell parlayed the purchase of two Guernsey heifers when he was a 10-yearold 4-H boy into a lifetime career in the dairy cattle industry. After graduating from Wilmington High School, where he played baritone horn in the marching band, he received his BS in dairy science from The Ohio State University. Darrell paid his way through OSU traveling across the country -- often by boxcar -working a fitter and showman.

Darrell gained a keen eye for good cattle, which translated to his winning the national collegiate dairy judging contest as a member of the OSU dairy judging team in 1964 and receiving the Dairy Shrine Kildee Scholarship for graduate study. He used the scholarship to obtain a master's degree in dairy genetics from the University of Missouri, and joined American Breeder's Service as a young sire analyst.

Darrell and Ann were married Sept. 27, 1969, at First Presbyterian Church, in Davenport, and spent part of their honeymoon riding in a boxcar with nine Holstein heifers from Wisconsin to the Western National Holstein Show in San Francisco. The couple moved to Colorado in 1973 -- never expecting to still be there 50 years later -- when Darrell became a partner and herd manager at Paclamar Farms, Louisville.

Darrell was introduced to the cattle export business when the Paclamar herd was sold to an Italian businessman, and he rode in the plane with the cows when they were flown from Denver to Rome. For the next 25 years, Darrell pioneered a global movement of dairy animals to countries with great need to improve their dairy herds and milk production. Working with Dave Bachman, Sheyboygan Falls, Wis., he arranged the export of U.S. Holstein heifers to Eastern Europe when trade was just opening with those Communist countries. Darrell vividly recalled armed soldiers always met the cattle planes when they landed in Budapest, Hungary, and intently watched him and the plane until the American cattle were unloaded.

Darrell had a groundbreaking opportunity with the Inter-American Development Bank in 1977, when the bank launched Prodel, an ambitious project to provide a more wholesome and stable milk supply to Mexico City. Darrell traveled with Prodel officials and Mexican dairymen to select 24,000 bred heifers from the U.S. and Canada, opening new markets for high-quality grade North American heifers. Darrell and Ann returned to Colorado in 1980 and formed their own export entity, Pidgeon Cattle Co., focusing on exportation of live Registered Holsteins to the Asian market.

In September 2021, Darrell was recognized by the National Dairy Shrine as a Dairy Pioneer for his entrepreneurial work in the dairy cattle export business that helped open and develop markets for U.S. Holstein cattle around the world. The Missouri Hall of Dairy Honors recognized Darrell for his Meritorious Service to the dairy industry in January 2022.

Darrell is survived by his wife, daughter Marla and her partner Amy Hagerman, Denver; son Andrew and his wife Kelly and their two sons Graham, 10, and Brady, 7, McLean, Va.; his sistersin-law and brothers-in-law Richard and Jane McCurdy, Goodyear, Ariz.; Dean and Karen Potratz, Pewaukee, Wis.; and Janie Pidgeon, Wilmington; nephews John Potratz, Brooklyn, N.Y.; Daniel Potratz, Waukesha, Wis.; and Kyle Pidgeon, Wilmington, Ohio.

He was preceded in death by his parents and a brother Phillip Pidgeon, all of Wilmington.





The College of Lake County is a comprehensive community college system including three campuses and more than 15,000 students. Williams' responsibilities included leadership of the college's academic departments.


