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Tubbses sell eastern Iowa newspapers

After a half-century of ownership of North Scott Press, Inc., the Tubbs family of Eldridge has sold three eastern Iowa newspapers to 37-year-old J. Louis "Louie" Mullen of Buffalo, Wyoming.

Included in the sale are:

The North Scott Press of Eldridge, Iowa's largest paid circulating weekly newspaper, first published in 1968, where Bill Tubbs has been publisher since 1971;

The Wilton-Durant Advocate News of Wilton, the merged publication of the *Wilton Advocate* and *Durant News*, which has been publishing since 1894, and part of the Tubbs organization since 1980; and

The West Liberty Index, the merged publication of the *West Liberty Enterprise* and *West Liberty Index*, first published in 1868, which the Tubbses purchased in 2018.

The search for new owners included potential buyers in the local communities, as well as nationally, according to John Cribb, of Cribb, Cope & Potts, of Helena, Mont., who represented Bill and Linda Tubbs in the sale.

The sale will become effective Sept. 1. Terms were not disclosed.

"We believe the future is in good hands with an owner who understands the val-

County considers negotiations on RR merger

Scott County Board chairman Ken Beck's threat to object to the Canadian Pacific railroad merger drew a response from the railroad that another supervisor says may be a first step in negotiations for a settlement.

Supervisor John Maxwell disclosed the response and strategy in Q&A after a presentation by logistics consultant Drew Wilson of ABDW Logistics at North Scott Rotary on Friday. Maxwell acknowledged that despite a consensus to send the letter, "we felt the merger will go through."

"It's a little bit of a chess game, so to speak," Maxwell told the Rotarians.

Beck on Friday confirmed that Canadian Pacific officials responded to news accounts of supervisors' intention to oppose the merger. "CP stopped to talk with Mahesh (county administrator Mahesh Sharma) and I, since they were traveling through the area and volunteered to send us information. We have not sent the letter yet but still intend to send the letter," Beck wrote to *The NSP*.

Beck said he met Thursday with railroad officials.

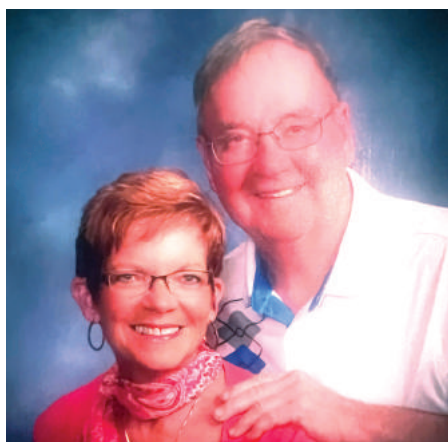
McCausland brings tractors, vintage cars and music

Happy Joe's closes Eldridge store

California couple owns LeClaire Road building

Happy Joe's closed its Eldridge restaurant Monday due to staffing shortages, company representative Kristel Whitty Ershan said.

"We have been battling staffing issues for quite some time now," said Ershan, daughter of the late Lawrence "Happy Joe" Whitty.

The Maquoketa location also closed, and the company in August shut its Davenport store at 2630 Rockingham Road.

The Eldridge closure ends decades of service to North Scott residents from the iconic restaurant that was sold in 2017 to Dynamic Restaurant Holdings Group, which also acquired Happy Joe's Bettendorf headquarters.

In 2021, new DRH president and CEO Tom Sacco expected big growth from Happy Joe's nationally.

"I'm looking forward to sharing it with thousands and thousands of families and hundreds and hundreds of thousands of guests around this country in the years to come," Sacco to QSR Magazine in its April 26, 2021 edition. The magazine covers the franchise food industry and wrote that, "since Sacco took over, the brand opened two new franchise units in Urbandale and Cascade, Iowa," as well as Missouri and Wisconsin.

"The four openings are more than Happy Joe's opened in the past five years combined," QSR reported.

DRH launched Tony Sacco's Coal Fired Kitchen chain in Eldridge in 2021, then closed after 18 months.

Ershan said Eldridge staff members have been offered positions elsewhere.

"It was a little difficult to give the level of service we wanted to," Ershan told *The NSP* Monday.

"We have been battling staffing issues for quite some time now, and these issues have led us to this very difficult

decision," she said in a prepared statement.

Customers calls are being directed to the Happy Joe's at West 50th Street and Welcome Way, in Davenport.

Guests can call 563-386-1766.

"We want to thank the Eldridge community and all our loyal guests for their years of support and patronage," Ershan said.

The 5,816-square-foot main restaurant was built in 1997, with a 3,733-square-foot addition added in 1998, according to Scott County assessment records.

Lancer's LC, a company formed by Mel Foster's Rob Fick, sold the building July 2, 2013, for \$1.18 million to KJTLJ LLC, a company formed by Larry Whitty, son of Happy Joe.

The restaurant deeded the property to a holding company, LK Diversified, owned by Happy Joe's son and daughter, Larry and Kristel Whitty, Feb. 1, 2018. LK sold it to Steve and Dinah Wang, of Acadia, Calif., Aug. 30, 2018, for \$1.22 million.

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RAILROAD: Train traffic threatens growth of Maxwell's ag tourism business

“CP Rail discussed many aspects of the proposed project, and we are waiting to receive hard copies of what was discussed,” he told *The NSP* Monday.

He declined to divulge those details, and urged interested residents to attend the Surface Transportation Board hearing, 6-8 p.m., Tuesday, Sept. 13 at the Davenport RiverCenter, or online hearings if they want to learn more.

At an Aug. 18 supervisors meeting, Beck said he would team up with Muscatine County supervisors and send a letter to the federal Surface Transportation Board formally objecting to the merger.

City councils for Davenport, Muscatine and Bettendorf accepted cash settlements from the railroad in exchange for supporting the merger.

Davenport council accepted a \$10 million offer; Muscatine and Bettendorf council members agreed to take \$3 million for each town.

Princeton council is scheduled to consider a resolution opposing the merger Sept. 8.

LeClaire mayor Dennis Gerard said the council will discuss a \$750,000 offer from the railroad at next week's meeting.

“We will review the consultant study reviewing all our crossings, and then come up with a plan to be shared with the residents and businesses for their feedback. We will also pursue additional grants, and I would envision additional signalization and potential quiet zones,” he told *The NSP*.

Last week, Camanche council members voted down the railroad's \$200,000 in exchange for closing two of the town's seven rail crossings.

At their Aug. 18 meeting, all supervisors had concerns about the merger, but no formal vote was taken. Beck said a vote was not needed to draft and send the objections.

Share your input

Public hearings are scheduled Sept. 12 in Itasca, Ill.; **6-8 p.m., Sept. 13 at the Davenport RiverCenter**; Sept. 14 in Excelsior Springs, Mo.; and Sept. 15 in Vidor, Texas.

Online public meetings will take place on Sept. 7, 8, and 19.

Go to CP-KCSMergerEIS.com website for instructions on how to submit comments and additional information on the in-person and online public meetings. Comments are due by Sept. 26.

Maxwell said he believes the tactic worked.

“We threatened to do a letter, and they already set up a meeting with chairman Ken Beck about some of those concerns,” Maxwell told *The NSP*. “So it was an effective statement. If they come to the table and are willing to negotiate and solve some of these issues and resolve issues people have concerns with, it truly will be a let-it-ride kind of thing. But if they take a no response approach, it doesn't bode well for them.”

The U.S. Surface Transportation Board must rule on the merger and is hosting a public forum 6-8 p.m., Sept. 13 at the Davenport Rivercenter.

Canadian Pacific's plan to merge with Kansas City Southern would link the two U.S. rails solely on tracks that run through Scott County, tripling local train traffic and creating the first Canada-to-Mexico line with a single company.

Canadian Pacific said the merger will spur rural development, especially in areas such as Davenport with room for side rail expansion.

Davenport businesswoman Michelle Solis Russell, of Davenport, is among those leading regional opposition to the merger. The co-owner of Russell Construction said the increased rail traffic presents safety hazards to towns, businesses and homes along the line, and will restrict riverfront access through Davenport.

She said county and municipal leaders have done nothing to inform, educate and draw residents into the conversation.

“A lot of people have a lot at stake. Griffin Hahn, of Hahn concrete, has facilities in Muscatine, Davenport and Pleasant Valley. Trains go directly through the center of their operations. They were not made aware in any formal way,” she said.

“I'm disappointed my city didn't do that, didn't make that effort. They're thinking this ship has sailed. But had city officials made the effort to engage taxpayers, engage companies, to find out, and get the strength of leverage from residents and taxpayers and companies, they might have thought differently,” Russell said.

Maxwell said he's mindful of the riverfront impact. His Cinnamon Ridge Dairy Farm near Donahue hosts thousands of tourists each year, and he was counting on even more through contracts with Viking Cruise Lines, which planned to host excursions from a Davenport dock to the dairy farm.

“That is something that also needs to be dealt with in that, when boats unload. If we have more train traffic, that access would be limited,” Maxwell said.

Supervisor Ken Croken shared those concerns about riverfront access. He is a partner in the River Bandits baseball team that plays in Davenport's municipally owned, riverfront stadium.

“I am quite concerned, less so about economic impact. The greater concern is safety of our visitors. A prolonged closure of Gaines Street crossing would limit access and make a mass evacuation impossible if needed,” Croken said.

Croken said he thought supervisors

clearly opposed the merger.

“It's not clear to me what we're negotiating. What is the end game?” he asked.

In Illinois, a coalition of suburban Chicago communities have formally opposed the merger. Illinois Sens. Dick Durbin and Tammy Duckworth wrote objections, as well. Their letter said: “The proposed merger will have significant impacts on communities in Illinois, with CP projecting the merger could add between eight and 11 freight trains per day on its tracks that run through Chicago's western suburbs ... Since CP's initial filing, Metra and a coalition of Illinois communities — including DuPage County, Bartlett, Bensenville, Elgin, Itasca, Hanover Park, Roselle, Wood Dale and Schaumburg — have filed comments with the Surface Transportation Board opposing the merger as currently proposed.”

Iowa's congressional delegation has not made any statement on the merger.

The railroad's own analysis projected the merger would add eight trains a day across Illinois, from Bensenville, in suburban Chicago, to Sabula Junction, Iowa.

In Iowa, from Sabula Junction, through Scott County to Kansas City, it would add 14.4 trains per day.

The same CP analysis said the tracks between Clinton and Davenport average one major incident, or derailment, every 13.49 years. If the merger proceeds, the railroad expects an incident every 4.92 years. Further impacts of the merger are detailed in a 357-page environment impact statement you can find online with this story at northscottpress.com.

According to the statement, Canadian Pacific has “voluntarily proposed mitigation measures to help address potential noise impacts, including a commitment to fund the improvements necessary to maintain existing Quiet Zone designations in communities where the Proposed Acquisition might otherwise cause the designation to be lost.”

Gather for the Cure celebrates survivors Oct. 8 at Scott County Park

Registration is under way now for the second annual Gather for the Cure event to mark Breast Cancer Awareness Month, to be held Saturday, Oct. 8, from 9 a.m. to noon, at Whispering Pines Indoor Shelter, Scott County Park.

Register to attend at genesishhealth.com/gather.

Gather for the Cure is an opportunity to celebrate breast cancer survivorship, remember those lives lost to breast cancer, learn about available programs and resources and raise money to support the Genesis Voucher Program.

The program provides free breast imaging to qualifying patients. The event is presented by the Genesis Foundation.

Attendees will be able to visit vendor tables and the Pink Heals fire truck, participate in Living Proof art sessions and join in a one-mile casual walk in the park. There will be live music, food and beverages and prize drawings.

Gold sponsors of the event are Radiology Group, P.C., S.C. and IHMVCU; Silver Sponsors are Dr. Angela Stork – Genesis Health Group Surgical Associates, Silvis, Mel Foster Co. and RSM US LLP; while Bronze sponsors are Cobham Mission Systems and Cintas.

The event is free, but registration is encouraged, and donations are accepted. There is a fee to participate in the walk — \$20 until August 31 (guarantees a commemorative T-shirt), then \$25 after August 31 (guarantees a commemorative T-shirt). Walk registration is online and will be cut off after September 16. Retired Isabel Bloom sculptures and the newest Isabel Bloom “Fight Like a Girl” ornament will be for sale at the event.

In addition, “In Honor” or “In Memory” yard signs may be pre-ordered online for \$50, no later than September 23. These signs will be lined up along the walk route and can be taken home at the conclusion of the event.

Money raised through the event will be used by the Genesis Foundation to help fill a funding gap created when the

Susan G. Komen organization ended financial support to voucher programs in the Quad-Cities region in 2021.

Because cost should never be a barrier to accessing essential life-saving breast imaging, the Genesis Foundation is committed to raising the funds needed to meet the demand — an estimated \$50,000 annually.

“There isn’t a single person who hasn’t been touched by breast cancer,” said Diane Koster, Genesis Women’s Health Grant program specialist. “This event helps us continue to build support for our community to fight breast cancer with the hope to continue for many years to come, until we never lose someone again.”

Genesis has been administering the voucher program since 2001, providing no-cost mammograms and ultrasounds in a timely and efficient manner.

From July 2020 through December 2021:

- 328 individuals accessed the voucher program (148 Iowa residents, 180 Illinois residents);
- 73 patients received multiple exams covered by the voucher program;
- 215 screening mammograms covered;
- 81 diagnostic mammograms covered;
- 95 diagnostic breast ultrasounds covered;

• \$58,400 paid out to cover breast health services;

According to the American Cancer Society, there were an estimated 2,770 new cases of female breast cancer in Iowa and 11,340 new cases of female breast cancer in Illinois in 2021.

“These are not just statistics, these are real people. Your mother, sister, daughter, friend,” said Koster. “Together, we can impact these numbers and decrease deaths from breast cancer by supporting the voucher program.”

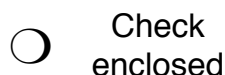

Our big decision

North Scott is the only place in Iowa where a community was formed by a newspaper.

Fifty-one years ago this week, Linda and I came to Eldridge to raise a family and pursue the dream of building what was then the 3-1/2-year-old newspaper, *The North Scott Press*, to be the best that it could be.



Impressions

Sometimes that seems like yesterday, but the years have gone by quickly, and now we are tasked with ensuring the future of this newspaper to serve our communities.

It's been a great run, but it has become increasingly clear, due to age and personal health issues, that we will not be able to do this forever; and with no family to carry on, our newspapers — *Eldridge North Scott Press*, *Wilton-Durant Advocate News* (since 1980) and *West Liberty Index* (since 2018) — deserve leadership which we are not able to provide as in the past.

This decision has weighed heavily on both of us, working into our retirement years, as we strived to find a succession plan that would be true to our values amidst a changing newspaper publishing environment: strong, independent newspapers staffed by individuals who advocate for the publishers, put the reader first, and want their communities to succeed. When looking for a buyer, this was more important to us than price.

Conversations began in 2021

In the spring of 2021, we began conversations with a broker, John Cribb, of Helena, Montana, who is regarded as among the best in the business. A year later, in February 2022, we signed a contract tasking John to find an owner who could carry on, and hopefully improve or expand upon, our life's work. Potential buyers, both within the local community and nationwide, were considered.

At many levels, the battle between head (knowing what must be done) and heart (the love of what we do, and our desire to stay in our present roles) has not been easy. There have been sleepless nights, but at last we have an answer.

In June, we signed a Letter of Intent with J. Louis "Louie" Mullen, a young and enthusiastic community newspaper man from Buffalo, Wyoming, whose mantra is, "If it isn't broke, don't fix it." He owns newspapers in smaller communities in Wyoming, South Dakota, North Dakota, Washington, Michigan and Oregon, and thus far, three in Iowa (Harlan, Red Oak and Glenwood), which will become six when our transaction is finalized on Sept. 1.

Community progress

Thus, with tears in our eyes and bushels of thanks to readers, advertisers and a team of loyal, dedicated employees, we move on as owners. There remain unfinished tasks, at the newspaper and in the community — still no rec trails connecting Eldridge with Davenport, and still no hard surfacing of Hillandale Road — but we move to the next phase knowing we have given our best for our readers, our community, and our profession.

Our true joy is seeing the communities, whose progress we have supported, succeed: the Eldridge Community Center, the library and its

First Amendment Room, the North Scott Fine Arts Auditorium, the parks, the ballfields, the rec trails, the amenities close to home for persons of all ages. And coming later this year, the North Scott YMCA!

These — and the people — are why we will continue living in the community we love as long as Providence provides.

A new owner

In many ways, the work of building this business, which we have always viewed as a community trust, was light work compared with the tasks associated with exiting. It's not easy, my friends! But after hours hammering out details, all parties are on board, and your local newspaper will have a new owner come Sept. 1.

(For the record, *The NSP* was founded Jan. 31, 1968, by publishers of the *DeWitt Observer*, the late Robert and Frances Melvold of Maquoketa, and Robert Parrott of DeWitt. In 1971, I became the first resident publisher. Mr. Parrott sold his ownership in 1994, and the Melvolds in 2000. Linda and I have been sole owners since.)

The good news is the new owner's intent to keep the ball rolling. Said Louie: "The Tubbses have made it their life's work to assure your community has a trusted voice in the newspaper, and I intend to honor that tradition."

Great team

That begins with retention of the current staff, and the new owner has told us that is his plan. Mr. Mullen's representative, Joshua Byers, publisher of the *Harlan Tribune* in Harlan, Iowa, will be here this week to work with our team and assist with details of the transition.

Many things will stay the same, but a new owner inevitably brings fresh ideas and energy.

Going forward, Linda will soon be fully retired, but I will be in my same place at the office and will continue writing "Impressions." I will contribute content from time to time, and will continue my volunteer work as editor of newsletters for my Rotary club and district.

But my role at the paper will be different; a change that will allow others to grow, and me to pursue "bucket list" items, including attending more activities of our six grandkids, ages 8-14, in the Madison and Des Moines areas.

One thing will not change: My heart will always be with North Scott and greater rural Scott County — just 30 miles from the farm in Brookfield Township, Clinton County, near the village of Elwood, Iowa, where I grew up — and the only place post-graduation from ISU in 1971 I have ever worked (not counting weekends at the National Guard in 1971-77). In this era of high mobility and many job changes, I consider myself the luckiest person in the world.

Thank you, North Scott, and Walcott, and readers and advertisers everywhere who have made it possible. We love you!

What happened to accountability?

Editor:

Call me a heartless independent, but what has happened to accountability in our country? With minimal help from my parents, I paid for four years of college and three years of seminary studies in the 1970s, using all of my summer earnings for seven years and pay from three jobs a week in graduate school. I couldn't afford a car and its maintenance until my first year at the seminary, and my wife and I didn't buy our first home until I was 44 years old.

Like others in my generation, when I began college, I was told that I was responsible for repaying my own debts and any student loans. Although we had to work hard and hold off on degrees, cars, and homes that we couldn't afford, we paid our own way. Yes, college was much less expensive back then, but our salaries were also MUCH less than today!

My wife and I were blessed to be able to pay 25 percent of our four children's college fees (with another 15 percent from an inheritance). Our children paid their 60 percent by scholarships and jobs that included serving as resident assistants (RAs). Only one of our four children had a car of their own during their four years of college, a used car needed for student teaching. She then borrowed her car to her two brothers while a volunteer missionary in Poland and Turkey. While working full-time as teachers (high school and elementary), that daughter and our eldest son, respectively, spent \$18,000 of their own salaries for masters' degrees in education.

All students are told what their repayment responsibilities are before taking out student loans, especially since most will later earn higher incomes. If any — including minorities — feel they won't be able to repay loans after college/graduate school, they may need to study later, working to save up for college, or enter the military (with college benefits). Many do!

Now our president (before elections) is proposing that millions of Americans pay some of their taxes to forgive up to \$10,000 of student loans to nearly 40 million Americans — individuals who earn less than \$125,000 a year, and couples earning less than \$250,000 a year — sums that far exceed earnings of many of us Americans. If \$400 billion of student loans is forgiven, that's more than half of the 2022 budget (\$778 billion) for our entire U.S. military!

I have no problem of forgiving part or all of student loans for those who took out loans with every intent to repay them, but then could not because of an accident, illness, injury, or service in our military. The rest should pay, practicing delayed gratification on expensive phones, cars, homes, vacations, and eating out until they can afford them.

Why should those without a degree or lower wages bail out those who are or will be wealthy?

Also today, Senator Elizabeth Warren said in an interview that forgiving student loans of struggling individuals will allow them to buy a home and spend more money elsewhere to help our economy, something she said would be good for all Americans. Yet, recently, our Federal Reserve has increased interest rates to slow spending which, theoretically, will lead businesses to drop prices due to less demand and more supply of their products, in order to cut down inflation for the good of all Americans. To whom should we listen?

Lastly, a response to editor Kathie Obradovich (Iowa Capitol Dispatch) who slammed Republicans who "snubbed" media at the State Fair. Kathie, what would you say about President Biden, who doesn't hold meaningful "give-and-take" press conferences? Is he snubbing media or is he unable to give coherent answers to difficult questions on his own?

North Scott Vision 2025: Vote Yes for progress!

It's hard to believe that it's been almost 30 months since North Scott and Eldridge residents came together to pass a bond referendum to build a new YMCA.



Campbell's Scoop

That impressive structure now looms large on LeClaire Road, and before the snow flies we will all be able to utilize a facility we could only dream about when we went to the polls in March of 2020.

The bond issue passed in a landslide, with a 78-percent

approval rate, and shortly thereafter construction began on the \$14 million building that came about with a three-prong financial partnership between the school district, city of Eldridge, and YMCA.

Now, a little more than two years later, and because of the forward thinking of the North Scott School Board, residents will again be asked to cast their votes on Sept. 13, and a "Yes" vote is just as important now as it was then.

The North Scott Vision 2025 plan is impressive, and lays out a blueprint to not only provide better learning environments in our current facilities, but also expand career pathways to students in construction, diesel mechanics, HVAC, plumbing, electricity, veterinary technology, food science and more.

Regional Innovation Center

In 2023, scheduled improvements include construction of a new state-of-the-art Regional Innovation Center, an addition at Alan Shepard Elementary in Long Grove, and the relocation of the high school softball diamond to form an impressive athletic complex near the tennis courts, baseball diamond and soccer field.

The recommendation for 2024 is to improve the high school welding and metal lab, add classrooms and a gym to Neil Armstrong Elementary in Park View, renovate the music wing and woodshop area at the junior high, and give Lancer Stadium a long overdue makeover.

If you want the nuts and bolts of the plan, you're invited to attend public

North Scott Supt. Joe Stutting will outline the

proposals and financing plan, as well as address the impact to district taxpayers.

There's no denying the \$45 million proposal is huge, and the \$25 million bond referendum that voters are being asked to approve is no small chunk of change.

However, how do you put a price tag on education, and ultimately, the future growth of our communities?

Growing tax base

Because of the growing tax base in rural Scott County, with new industry popping up all over our landscape, now is the perfect time to propose a referendum of this magnitude.

Rising home values and a jump in commercial development are bringing North Scott more property tax money than ever, and since 2019, the school board has budgeted to drop the district's tax rate from \$13.74 to \$12.14 per thousand dollars of taxable value.

In 2021, North Scott's rate was 115th lowest among 340 districts, according to the Iowa Department of Management. In eastern Iowa, only Cal-Wheatland, Delwood and Tipton rates were lower.

The board believes it can launch this expansion and still keep the rate under \$12, and remain the lowest taxing school district in Scott County.

I have faith in Stutting, and I have faith in the board, people we elected to chart a path for the future, and to control the district's purse strings. If they say it's good for kids, that's good enough for me.

Mayors united

But don't just take my word for it. Take a look at the accompanying letter to the editor below, and take note of the signatures at the bottom.

Those six area mayors are also elected officials, chosen by people in their respective communities. They, too, are encouraging you to vote "yes." Not because someone is twisting their arm,

but because they know that North Scott Vision 2025 is also good for their towns.

The North Scott School District is uniquely made up of seven small communities, but we are all "One North Scott." What's good for one is good for all.

The improvements to our current facilities are much needed and overdue, and there's no doubt the crowning jewel of the referendum is the Regional Innovation Center. That project alone gives our communities opportunities for skilled labor that we are desperately short on, and it's a big reason for people to live in all of our different towns.

"There are students out there excited to get into the trades," said Donahue mayor Ken Schoenthaler, "and you can't find people to do that kind of work. If we have a place where people can learn the trades, they will not only want to go to school here, but also live and work here in the future."

Well said, Schoene.

In full disclosure, I was asked to chair the "Vote Yes" committee for the YMCA project, and three months ago I

agreed to the same role with the North Scott Vision 2025 Yes committee.

Slam dunk

My "yes" vote is a slam dunk, and the additional \$48.46 tax hit I'm going to take in 2025, and the \$11.01 increase in 2026 is a small price to pay to ensure a viable future for not only the school district, but my community as well.

Iowa law requires a 60-percent voter approval, so every "yes" vote counts. I encourage you to do your part on Sept. 13, or vote early at the Scott County Library in Eldridge on Wednesday, Sept. 7.

The school district has a well-thought-out strategic plan, and one small part states that it "wants to be a place where people work, live and learn." This referendum touches all the bases. In the end, it's a home run.

They both were in band and now in choir and know the value the junior high music wing renovation will bring. They are both taking career and technical education courses, developing relevant skills that will increase their employability, and they know the value that the Regional Innovation Center will bring them and students across eastern Iowa. They both participate in athletics and have developed grit and friendships as a result, and they both take rigorous class loads enabled by our educational facilities.

North Scott communities are thriving and growing because of the jewel of a school district we have. The investments proposed in Vision 2025 address facility improvement needs and also look to the horizon to enhance student experiences and opportunities, both in the "core" classrooms, but also in the classes and other experiences that further help them grow.

Thanks to those whose previous investments in the North Scott school district made it so appealing for our family 5.5 years ago. 1982: McCausland Centennial

Aug. 30, 1972

The very first Frontier Day was set for Sept. 4, with plenty of activities, including a breakfast, tractor pulls, a horse show, games, a pork roast, and a dance featuring Rosie's Polka Dots.



Our Past

From the files of *The North Scott Press* compiled by Erin Gentz

• Two area young men were killed in separate motorcycle accidents. Sixteen-year-old Lee Marti of rural Long Grove died Aug. 27 when the motorcycle he was operating struck a van on the McCausland blacktop. On Aug. 28, 20-year-old Donald Lemke of rural Davenport was killed near Buffalo when a truck made a left turn into the path of his motorcycle.

• Five candidates were running for three seats on the North Scott School Board: incumbents Phyllis Heuer of rural Princeton and Harland Rohlk of Donahue, and newcomers Earl Brockhouse of rural Princeton, Dr. Patrick Keefe of Eldridge, and James Tank of Eldridge. Bob Dahlquist was running unopposed for the position of school treasurer, which had previously been held by Tank.

• The Scott County 4-H Judging Team placed first among 25 teams at the Iowa State Fair and earned the right to compete at the national competition. Team members were Randy Blake, Karen Lage, Linda Newell and Roger Blake, and they were coached by Bob Lage and Bill Petersen.

• Members of the North Scott Athletic Boosters lobbied the school board to construct a fence around the athletic field. President Henry Keppy III said a fence would help cut down on vandalism, losses in ticket revenues at home games, and liability of the district if children got hurt playing on the bleachers. The board took no action at the meeting.

Sept. 2, 1982

• McCausland was gearing up for its Centennial celebration, which would span all three days of the Labor Day weekend. Activities included a historical play entitled "McCausland Reflections," dances, breakfasts, a horse show, softball, games, a classic car show, tractor pulls and a costume contest.

• A group of residents in Park View asked the Iowa Commerce Commission to investigate the community's utilities. Residents and energy officials met to discuss utility bills and why Park View had seen such a dramatic increase in recent months.

• The Eldridge Bike Shop BMX team had only been in existence for five weeks, but it had already collected three team trophies at various competitions. Team members included Doug Nigh, David Feyen, Tom Adamski, Darelle Nigh, Mark Bixby, Shane Voisine, Mike Bedford, Joe Meyer, Brett Arnold, Tony Sebolt, Gregg Hemple and Dennis Anderson.

• North Scott High School social studies teacher Milt Schatz related his experience of traveling to Mexico to visit a buddy from the Korean War, Fernando Corral.

Sept. 3, 1997

• Michelle and Brent Arp of Dixon were happy to be home with their infant son, Michael, who was born three months prematurely in March. Michael spent 83 days in the hospital in Iowa City and weighed less than two pounds at birth. Now five months old, Michael was doing well, and the Arps described him as their "miracle baby."

• John Strazewski, a member of the Eldridge City Council since 1992, announced he planned to run for mayor after Brian Roesler said he would not seek a third term.

• A Cincinnati, Iowa, man was found guilty of attempted murder, willful injury, and going armed with intent after attacking another trucker in Walcott in February. Glen Hudson and the victim had been arguing via CB radio over the use of bright headlights. Shortly after, they pulled into the Pilot station in Walcott, where Hudson struck the other trucker multiple times in the head with an aluminum baseball bat. The victim suffered brain damage, and the severity of his injuries made the Scott County Attorney's Office decide to pursue the attempted murder charges.

• Seniors leading the North Scott volleyball team were Kelli McCoy, Stephanie Mangels, Stefanie Bockenfeld, and Lindsay Wood.

Sept. 5, 2007

• Georgine "Jean" Schinckel of Walcott was one of four women named an Iowa Master Farm Homemaker for 2007 by "Wallaces Farmer" magazine. She and her husband Jack had recently retired, but during their years in the ag industry, they raised "crops, hogs, cattle, and four daughters on the family farm north of Walcott."

• Six firefighters were slightly injured when a shell misfired at the start of McCausland's fireworks display at the conclusion of the 125th anniversary celebration. The errant shell also ignited the rest of the fireworks. "We had a full (25-30 minute, \$3,000) display in five minutes," said fire chief Josh Luckritz. The firefighters suffered minor burns, and no onlookers were injured.

• A public grand opening celebration was scheduled for Grand Haven Retirement Community in Eldridge. The complex opened for occupancy on July 28, and was already home to 38 residents, who so far were enjoying their new homes and amenities.

• Four candidates were vying for two open seats on the North Scott School Board: Doris Tuftee, Sue Cannon, Steve Abney and Tim Lane.

• The Kevin Tippet era began on a high note, as the North Scott football team opened the season with a 21-7 win over Pleasant Valley. The game also marked the debut of Spartans' new head coach, former PV standout and NS assistant, Rusty VanWetzinga.

Aug. 30, 2017

• Randy and June Reimers of rural Maysville were counting their blessings as June was continuing to recover after being hit by a truck while walking along Highway 130 in April. She had been in a coma for over a week at University Hospitals in Iowa City, and spent nearly three months at a brain rehab facility in Ankeny. Doctors said her progress was remarkable. The Reimers said they were grateful for the support of their community.

• North Scott maintenance director Leland Zenk told the school board that nearly every project on the five-page list of summer jobs was completed in time for the start of the school year. There were improvement projects in all seven school buildings.

• The North Scott varsity volleyball team won the Maquoketa Invitational, racking up wins over Camanche, Central DeWitt, Maquoketa and Northeast, their only loss coming at the hands of North Cedar.

• Peggy Bowers and Marilee Schafer, owners of 2 Sisters shop in Eldridge, purchased the Forget-Me-Not consignment shop from Regina Paasch-Meyer. They planned to consolidate locations, but said each store would retain distinct merchandise.

Railroad's safety record is not stellar

Editor:

I am interested in the material taken from the Canadian Pacific Railway regarding its merger. It says it is going to add 1,000 jobs. The railroad has already installed the towers for it to go automated – what jobs?

CP calculates the merger will add \$716 million in new revenue each year and reduce costs by another \$173 million per year. The company on Oct. 1 reported a record \$1.94 billion in third-quarter earnings, and is on track to surpass last year's \$5.7 billion in annual revenue. For who?

This is not a U.S. company sending U.S. product in these additional trains – crude oil from Canada to Mexico. The federal legislators in Illinois have already sent a letter to the Surface Transportation Board in opposition. The deals it has tried to cut in Iowa – except for the bribes taken by Bettendorf, Davenport, and Muscatine – have been to close crossings and add more tracks which negatively impact citizens.

And let's not forget the danger to the Mississippi River.

The document redacts the names of short line railroads that would lose corn syrup shipments after the merger. "We would expect that a CP/KCS single-line route offering would attract some of this traffic." Is this a monopoly? Does this put smaller rails in a position for CP to purchase them because of loss of business?

The number of trains, the pollution, and their safety record – five cars of coal into the Mississippi in June near Lansing, and a car of fuel into Nahant Marsh during the pandemic when it was closed is terrible. CP's safety record, which is easily available online in Canada, is full of deaths, explosions (crude oil trains), destruction of farmland (crude oil trains) and lack of responsibility.

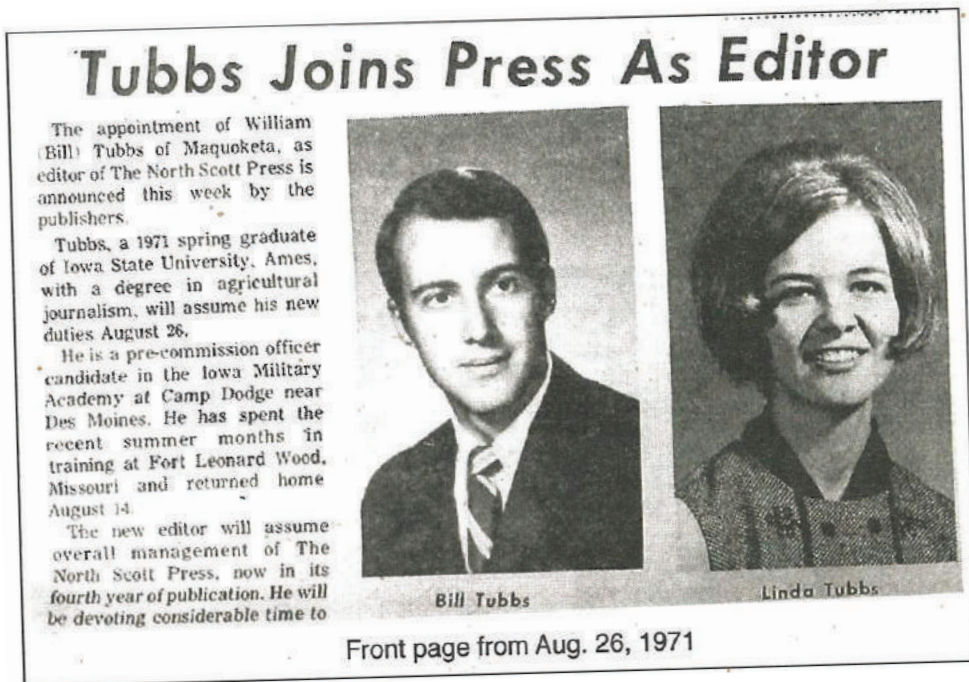

Lancers stare down adversity, roll past Wildcats in season opener

Well, that answered a few questions! A season outlook filled with uncertainty, and muddied even more with unforeseen Week 1 injuries, got off to an impressive start for North Scott's football team Friday night as the not-so-healthy Lancers rolled to an impressive 47-7 season-opening victory over Davenport North.

Question: Was there truly a quarterback battle brewing in the preseason?

Answer: Yes. Junior Kyler Gerardy was named the opening night starter, and put his stamp on the position with one heckuva varsity debut. However, senior Drew Kilburg made the most of his second-half opportunity, and proved that he is more than capable of handling the Lancer offense..

Question: With senior Miles Robertson the only returning starter in the receiving corps, who would step up?

Answer: Take your pick. The Lancer receiving room took a hit early in the week when Robertson went down with an injury. No worries. It was next man in for the Lancers, and Gerardy connected on his first 15 passes, and utilized nine different receivers in the opening half. Case closed.

Question: What about that green North Scott secondary, where senior and all-district cornerback Cole Jennings was the lone returnee?

Answer: Inexperienced, yes, especially since Jennings was in street clothes with what is expected to be a short-term injury. However, after giving up a 74-yard touchdown pass on North's opening possession on a defensive mix-up, the Lancer defense was stout, and allowed only 98 total yards in the first half.

Question: How good is this Lancer team?

Answer: If Friday night's blowout win over the Wildcats — where the Lancers turned on the running clock with 2:45 left in the third quarter — is any indication, there's no doubt this is not a rebuilding year for Tippet and his staff. As ususal, the Lancers just reloaded.

After 17 wins in their last 18 games, the Lancer ex-

"Our ceiling's pretty high right now," said Gerardy, who showed glimpses of greatness while passing for 201 yards (18-for-20) and rushing for a team-high 113. "If we keep going to work, everything will play out for itself."

After a week where the injury bug bit the Lancers big time, and with senior defensive back Adam Link

still nursing an ankle injured during baseball, they stared adversity in the face and left Tippet standing in awe of their effort.

"I don't know if I've ever been prouder of a team after a Week 1 game," said Tippet. "I've been doing this a long time, but we had some adversity, some guys out,

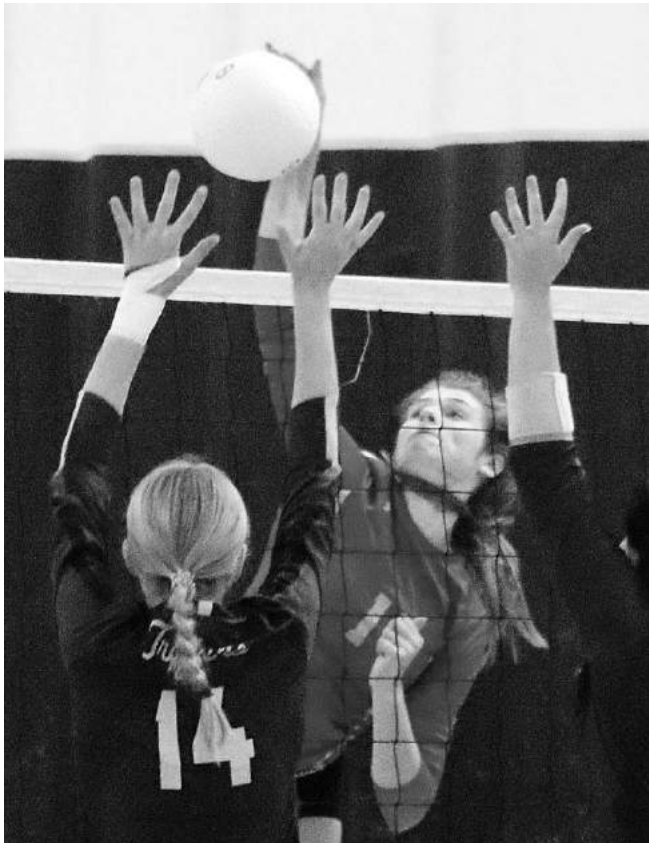

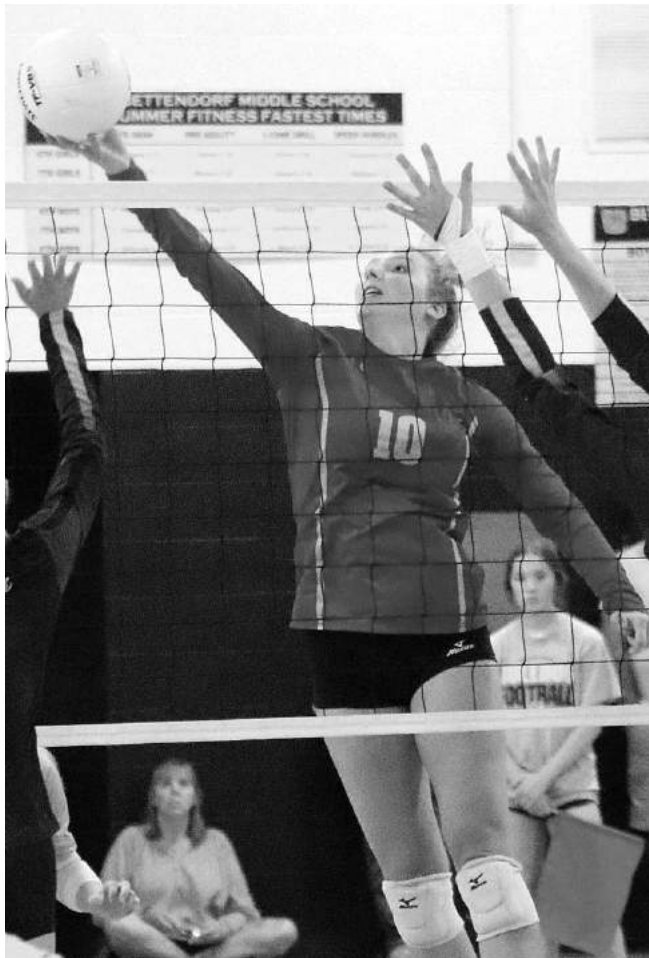
"I feel good about tonight, and moving forward," said VanEarwage, following her team's fourth win of the season. "Last year we didn't do well at this tourna-

ment, so to go 3-0 definitely gives us a little bit of confidence.

It was another stepping-stone week for North Scott's boys' golf team, as the Lancers lived in the present with a strong third-place finish at Monday's (Aug. 22) Bobcat Invitational at Western Dubuque, and then built for the future with a second-place finish at Thursday's home quadrangular.

North Scott was breathing rare air on Monday as four players shot in the 70s to post a 312 total, which trailed only Pleasant Valley (293) and Wahlert Catholic (299) in the 11-team field.

Senior John Dobbe led the way with a round of 76, followed by sophomore Jack Gomez (78), freshman Vaughn Roseman and senior Cal Behm, who carded matching 79s.

Seniors Drew Sacia and Keaton Kress weren't far back, turning in rounds of 81 and 85.

"It was another tough field," said Lancer coach Collin Ellis. "We played well, but there's room to get better. Four scores in the 70s is pretty cool. Now we just need to get one or two guys to go low, low, and give us a shot to win one of these. We're consistently putting up competitive scores, and the boys are pushing each other every day."

The Lancers have gone toe-to-toe with some of the top teams in the state, and Thursday was a good day to give the starters a break, and a chance for others to gain valuable varsity experience.

Davis' breakout performance leads Lancer effort

Running 55 miles a week over the summer has paid off for Nik Davis, and the North Scott senior appears poised for a breakout cross-country season.

Davis was running with the big dogs in Tuesday's (Aug. 23) season opener at the Mount Vernon-Lisbon Invitational, and his fourth-place finish paced the Lancers to a seventh-place finish in the star-studded meet.

Davis, as well as the Lancers, went toe-to-toe with some of the state's elite.

Class 4A No. 13 Dubuque Hempstead captured the team title (50), followed by No. 9 (4A) Urbandale (53), No. 1 (3A) Marion (60) and No. 9 (3A) Mount Vernon-Lisbon (115). Ames (123) and Center

Point-Urbana (170) were fifth and sixth, and the Lancers put up a 181 total.

Marion's Jeddiah Osgood, the No. 1 ranked runner in 3A, cruised to the individual title, and while finishing fourth, Davis beat the tenth-ranked runner in 4A and the 16th-ranked runner in 3A.

"I was happy to see Nik out in front most of the race," said Lancer coach Amy Knoche. "He was right up with guys who were ranked. He's been working really hard this summer, and set a career PR (17:02), and it was good to see his hard work pay off."

After Davis, the Lancers were a bit strung out as Knoche termed the meet a "learning experience" for her team.

"Christian (Hughes) led the first 400 meters, and some of our kids found out

Knoche was also impressed with North Scott's sixth and seventh run-

ners, sophomore Brody Westendorf and freshman Carter Unwin, who finished 72nd and 73rd, within a second of each other.

"It was nice to see Brody and Carter run well," she said. "It was Carter's first high school race, and for him to be in our top seven was a real positive thing going forward."

The Lancers were scheduled to compete at last night's (Tuesday) Clinton Early Bird meet, and Saturday is the big Spartan Invitational at Crow Creek Park.

"It was not a bad week," said Knoche. "I was happy with the effort. There are always things to improve upon, and I think the first meet showed that. We'll go from there and get better at them."

Lancers hang tough with elite teams; finish fourth

North Scott's girls' cross-country team didn't crack the preseason Class 4A state rankings, but it appears the Lancers won't be able to fly under the radar for long.

They took on some pretty stiff competition at Tuesday's (Aug. 23) season-opening extravaganza at the Mount Vernon-Lisbon Invitational, and brought home an impressive fourth-place finish while finishing behind three state-ranked teams.

"Bailey was kind of a question mark before the race, as she wasn't feeling good because of the heat," said Lancer coach Amy Knoche. "We questioned if she should run or not, but she fought hard."

"Peyton is just a grinder, and is a good

competitor. I was surprised to see Hattie in the three spot, just because she doesn't really enjoy running. However, she's such a great athlete and competitor, and on race day you just know that she's going to show up."

Hagedorn, Riniker and Kaitlyn Knoche ran together much of the race, and finished with 21 seconds of each other. That was good to see, but the Lancers need to tighten the pack.

"We were strung out a little bit from start to finish, and what I'd like to see is that back group find a little surge to move up. I think that can happen, because we're pretty balanced, and I'm pretty sure our finishing order is going to be different every meet, depending on who is feeling good."
