Park View owners vote for change

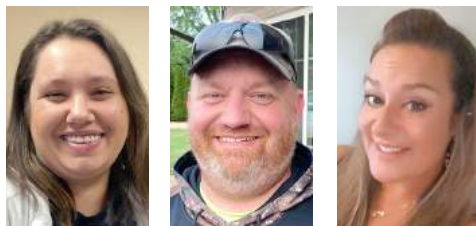
Three new members elected to the Park View Owners Association board promise changes to the operations of the board that oversees the unincorporated community of 3,000.

Current board members also are researching a new tactic to raise more revenue: Creating separate voting groups for residential homeowners and landlords.

The nine-member board convened May 17 for an annual meeting to vote on new members, and bid adieu to veteran Kurt Proctor, who wrapped up nearly 30 years of service to the board.

"I believe in term limits," Proctor joked following the meeting.

Board members have been tough to find, and Proctor said he was thrilled to see five candidates running for three open seats. "Usually at our monthly meetings, we only get three or four residents," he said.

The annual meeting filled the

association board room. "It was good. New, fresh people can get some things started and see them through," he said.

Peterson, Druhl and Lischer join board

Owners Association members elected three new board members.

Park Board member Devin Peterson won after launching a write-in. After the vote, he said association leadership seemed a natural extension of his park board service. Before the election, he posted this statement to the association's Facebook page: "After some peer pressure I have decided to run as a write-in. If you want things to change, vote me in. If you don't, leave me out."

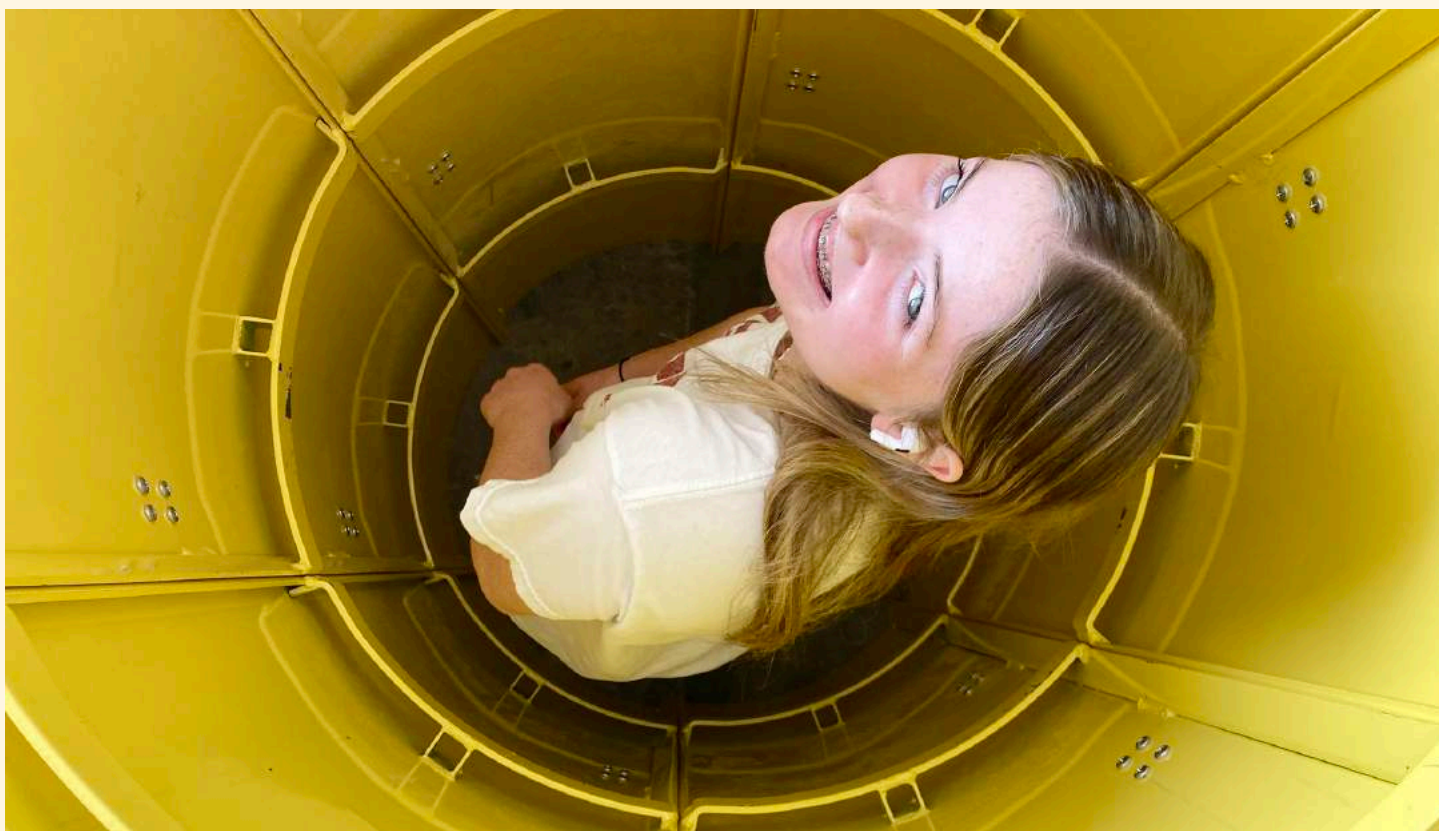
Ashley Druhl and her family returned to Park View in 2021. She is a North

Scott High School class of 2007 graduate who lived in Park View during her high school years. At the meeting, Druhl said board service is her way to contributing to a community she loves.

"I would like to continue to make PV a safe community to raise our children and families," she wrote in a candidate statement. She aims to, "continue building on the sense of community where everyone has each other's back."

Holly Lischer and her family have lived in Park View for 12 years. "I am honored to be chosen by the community of Park View to assist the community now and in the future," she said. "I'm ready to make some positive changes."

Wind farms on county's June agenda

The future of wind power in Scott County hits the Planning and Zoning Commission's June agenda.

Scott County planning director Chris Mathias said the seven-member commission will launch public discussion of wind turbine regulations 6:30 p.m., June 6 at the County Administration building.

"We're not proposing anything at this point. We're gathering information. We want to find out what our commissioners think, and what the public thinks," he said.

He envisions an initial commission discussion, followed by public hearings

they castrated?”
 “Testosterone adds a flavor, more of a smell to the beef,” she said. It also can be a safety issue. Castration leaves the animal calmer.
 “Cash is definitely calmer than the average cow. If he wanted to hurt me, he could,” she said.

Lainey took guesses on Cash’s weight. 500 pounds? 650? A ton?
 “He’s 1,100 to 1,200 now. He gains three to four pounds a day, or about 75 each month,” she said.

She holds no illusions about the animal she tends daily to show in competition this summer. “His purpose in life is to be a meal,” she said.

Her role is to raise him humanely and safely. “You have to know your animal’s temperament. He can’t tell me when he’s sick, so I have to look for clues. He’s a good eater, so if he’s not eating, I know something is wrong.”

Lainey hoped her lessons resonated. “Some have probably never been this close to a cow. But a lot of these kids will be at the fair. It’s good to know how things work. We all live in Iowa, and they’ll be near cattle.”

Scott County farmer Matt Wilson is a long time FFA supporter who recalled his own North Scott FFA experiences. “I’d say 80 percent had some farm exposure, living or working on one. Now, maybe 10 percent,” said Wilson, who helped at the safety days.

Organizer Emma Gravert is among the city kids. “Most of us don’t come from farm families. They wouldn’t know how to act around animals. I don’t come from a farm, but my dad helps, and I go with him sometimes.”

Next year Emma will go to University of Wisconsin - Platteville for an agricultural business education.

Another non-farm kid, Brenna Teerlinck, showed her paint horse, Kat. Brenna is in her fourth year of FFA, and

is the first in her family to show horses. “Having a horse is a serious time commitment,” she told students. That can include four hours early Saturdays preparing for show. “I get to the barn at 5 a.m. I’m home at 6-7 p.m.”

She cleans stalls and waters horses at Lost Grove Barn, and works at Twists ice cream in Eldridge.

And she dotes on Kat. “She’s a princess. She gets what she wants,” Brenna said.

Equipment safety

McKenna McCoy peered over the top of grain extraction rescue walls. River Valley Cooperative safety director Lon Warnecke, and safety coordinator Ray Sterner surrounded her with the steel panels used to free workers trapped in grain bins. Both have used the panels for real-life rescues.

Not all rescues end successfully. But many start the same way, they said.

“This is how it starts. The dad sends you in to start poking it out,” Warnecke said. Moist grain clumps up in storage. A worker is sent in.

“And now, you’re stuck,” Sterner concluded.

In a real rescue, McKenna would wear a dust mask, and be tied to the bin roof. The panels form a cylinder around her. Warnecke dropped in an auger that would remove enough grain to free her.

“It only takes four or five seconds for bad things to happen,” Sterner told students.

Cole Wessel, Kyzer Copp and Tate Moffit demonstrated safe practices for farm vehicles, including a front-loading tractor, a mower, and all-terrain vehicle.

“You are safest when you are in the seat,” Wessel told the group.

They showed the power take off extending from behind the tractor. “Avoid this at all costs,” Wessel said.

Moffit said recklessness and inattention are behind many UTV accidents. “Life can change in a second.

Most people don’t think about that until afterward,” he said.

That’s the prime lesson of safety days, said River Valley’s Warnecke. “Just think about this stuff ahead of time. Cutting corners is what gets you in trouble.”

PARK VIEW: Landlords come around as enforcement begins

In her candidate statement, Lischer said, "I love the small-town vibe of Park view, I love that our children can play outside with no worries like I did when I was young, and I want to continue to make it safe, so we continue to have these luxuries. I want us to have more community involvement as a whole, listen to one another, share ideas and concerns, and not see it get swept under the rug," she said in a candidate statement.

The three outpolled **Allen Steiger**, and **Josh Ong**.

Allen Steiger said he ran because of the great experiences he and his family had in their first year in Park View. "My wife Cassy and I moved to Parkview in the Spring of 2022. We absolutely love it here and are glad we made the move. ... We can find creative ways to avoid incorporating and create small changes to keep our community beautiful and thriving," he wrote in his candidacy statement.

Ong wrote, "I am trying to serve my community and bring a modern/younger perspective to the group. I would like to see dues increased as current state is unsustainable for Park View, thereby avoiding incorporation."

New plan for dues increase

All candidates, and the current board members have supported raising dues. The \$100 per year fee has been unchanged since the community was built in the 1970s. Attempts to vote in raises have been consistently blocked by landlords, whose votes for each rental unit outnumber homeowners.

"We're thinking about dues increases and now we can approach it in an equitable manner," said board member, and legal liaison Sean Stoube. "\$100 a year is nice as community member, but doesn't get what it used to."

He proposed separate homeowner, and landlord voting classes that each require public votes on fee changes. Stoube said any change to fee structure would need approval from a majority of landlord and homeowner votes.

"It seems to be the most fair approach. We've got to work with lawyers make sure we're above board on all of it,"

Stoube said.

Landlord ballots defeated the last PVOA dues vote in March 2020. The final tally among 950 eligible votes was 317-246, with just 50 "no" votes coming from homeowners.

"I get the landlords' concern. They can't really pass it along to tenants all the time. We're hoping to show how the dues can make the community a better place to draw tenants," he said after the meeting.

Stoube said landlords are becoming much more responsive, and hopes that a separate landlord class could lead to negotiations for increasing dues.

He noted that one landlord, Kings Landing LLC, actually paid dues before the PVOA had to file a small claims lawsuit. Stoube said he had scheduled a day off work for the hearing, then heard Kings had paid.

Since 2010, the PVOA has had to file suit at least 30 times to collect dues. Seven of those were against Kings Landing LLC, or its owners, Batfir and Ziza Akiti, of Long Grove.

The suits allege Kings Landing owed \$100 for each apartment unit it owns in Park View.

Scott County court records show PVOA filed suit Oct. 14, 2022, seeking \$2,198.43. It was settled, and dismissed April 5.

The PVOA's April 28, 2021, lawsuit seeking \$4,031.69 in back dues was settled and dismissed July 28, 2021. An Oct. 23, 2017, PVOA suit seeking \$4,609.18 was paid Sept. 16, 2019.

Board secretary Deanna Nielsen noted that more than half of homeowners have included donations above the dues payment this, and most years.

She reported 96 percent compliance this year, with 26 still outstanding, including just one apartment owner. She said Kings Landing LLC is paid up for 2023.

Final notices go out this month, and liens are filed in June, she said.

Code enforcement begins

Board members applauded Scott County enforcement of rental codes, that seem to be getting landlords' attention. County supervisors established rental property codes in 2020, but delayed

enforcement through the pandemic. The ordinance allows complaints by tenants or any Park View resident to trigger an inspection.

County planning director Chris Mathias said code inspectors have responded to a few complaints this year.

"We've not had a lot. But we've seen some lighting that needed to go in, some bad outlets changed out, and some fire alarms added," he said.

He noted that Kings Landing improved siding on one apartment building in response to a complaint and inspection.

Tow truck at tournament

Earlier this month, newly elected board member Devin Peterson criticized the PVOA's decision to call a tow truck on vehicles in no-parking areas around the Park View ball diamonds. The diamonds are owned and maintained by the PVOA,

and operated by the park board.

At the May 13 North Scott Slugfest tournament fundraiser for Lancer baseball, cars filled the no parking areas, and a tow truck showed up.

"Someone from the PVOA took it upon themselves to call a tow truck to tow vehicles that were parked in the grass that they felt were parked 'illegally' before notifying anyone..."

"I felt this was very inappropriate and a strike against the community," Peterson posted on Facebook the day after the tournament.

At the May 17 PVOA meeting, board chairman Mike Wright said he called the tow truck.

"That was me. It was marked enough to make it plain no one should park there. When they got out there and announced the guys were towing, that got them out," Wright said.

WIND: New towers top 600 feet

before county supervisors would consider any changes.

Current ordinance covers home and business-use wind generation, but does not allow the type of development common in western Illinois.

"Our ordinance doesn't allow anything over 199 feet. It doesn't allow the new technology of wind turbines," Mathias said. Contemporary wind farms use turbines exceeding 600 feet, he said.

The newer technology expands areas suitable for wind generation. Mathias said an investor group approached Walcott area landowners earlier this year with development plans.

The Clean Grid Alliance counts 151

wind farm projects in Iowa, generating 12,842 megawatts. The Spirit Lake school district is the first, beginning in 1992.

Last year, Scott County supervisors approved the Planning and Zoning Commission's recommendation to limit solar panel farms with an ordinance outlawing panels on productive, flat farmland. Supervisors restricted commercial panels to the lowest-producing land, mostly in the county's northern border along the Wapsipinicon River.

Clinton County supervisors welcomed solar panel development by unanimously approving an ordinance that allowed a 1,500-acre solar farm in Grand Mound, just north of the Scott County border.

SCHOOL BOARD BRIEFS

Budget amendment

Board members amended this year's budget, adding \$12.038 million to the \$46.7 million spending plan they approved last year.

The amendment draws from loans and savings used by the district for a \$45 million capital plan launched this budget year.

Superintendent Joe Stutting said it also includes the district's purchase of the Eldridge fitness center, which

is being converted to a wrestling gym.

Open enrollment

The board accepted a Pleasant Valley ninth grader this school year.

For next school year, the board welcomed a Pleasant Valley freshman, two junior high students from Davenport, two Davenport and one Bettendorf preschool students, and a fourth grader to Armstrong, and a Davenport second grader to White Elementary.

The totals are part of a \$140,991 Prairie Farms milk contract, that went up 14 percent over last year.

District food service director Amy Guerrero presented 2023-24 food service contracts approved Monday by the board. Included in the contracts:

Bread: The board extended the contract with Pan O Gold, for about \$16,977, or 9.7 percent more than this year. It was the sole bidder.

Pizza: Papa John's, Little Caesars and Happy Joe's won contracts for elementary schools, with each featured twice each month. The high school and junior high will be on a weekly rotation. Total price is estimated at \$85,000.

Happy Joe's pizzas range from \$10.99 to \$12.99 each, and \$1.10 to \$1.62 per slice. Little Caesars costs were \$8-12 per pizza and \$1-1.50 per slice.

Papa John's costs were \$7.50-\$9 per pizza, and 94- to \$1.13 per slice.

Beverages: Pepsi-Cola Bottling won an extended contract valued at about \$38,897.50 for the school year. It includes 1,200 cases of Propel for \$12,000; 500 cases of Bubblr sparkling caffeinated water for \$10,000, and 300 cases of G Zero sports drink for \$6,900.

The board agreed to about an estimated \$700,000 in food and food service supplies from Kohl Wholesale, the Quincy, Ill., firm. The price is North Scott's share of a \$2.347 million contract with the seven-district Mississippi Valley Purchasing Group. The new contract has an option for extensions through June 2029.

The entire group contract includes,

- Meat: \$68,849 for chicken, \$64,490 for pork, and \$34,229 for beef.
- Cereal and muffins: \$294,454
- Dairy, cheese and eggs: \$120,478
- Canned vegetables and fruits: \$165,696
- Fresh fruits and vegetables: \$87,177
- Snacks: \$223,654

Price changes

Elementary breakfasts will cost a dime more, and junior high and high

school breakfast are up a quarter under new food service fees approved Monday by the North Scott school board.

Lunches are up a dime at the junior high and high school.

Day care and adult lunches went up 70 cents, the biggest food service price hike.

Guerrero said the changes reflect some lower federal reimbursements.

Elementary: Breakfasts, \$2; lunch, \$2.70
Junior high: Breakfast, \$2.25; lunch \$2.95

High school: Breakfast, \$2.25; lunch \$3.05, and specialty lunch \$3.30.

Adults: Breakfast, \$2.65; lunch \$4.85.
Daycare: Lunch only, \$4.85.

Guest staff pay raises

Board members left substitute pay at \$125 per day, but increased other temporary jobs the district was struggling to fill.

"The driving force behind it is we have Amazon opening up, hiring 1,000 workers. That's the rationale of getting everything up," superintendent Joe Stutting said.

The goal was to lift most to at least \$15 per hour.

"We were considerably low, at \$11.25, \$12.50 per hour," he said.

The board raised hourly guest pay for custodians to \$17, couriers to \$15, tutors to \$16, and theater workers to \$16.

They also set theater and arts rates, ranging from \$40 per activity for a novice solo contest judge, to \$825 for an experienced accompanist.

Retired district teachers can earn \$155 per day as a substitute.

Stutting said total guest staff pay is about \$40,000.

Policy book changes

Board members approved updates to three policies, and enacted four new ones.

Most are wording changes to reflect new laws and state policies. Among the changes:

Counseling revision: 607.1 was changed to specify the Iowa Board of Educational

Examiners, not the State Department of Education to certify counselors. The policy change strikes "social" development from the list of personal, educational and career development counseling the district provides.

Financial indicators for board: New code 701.5R1 establishes "relevant public sector indicators" the board can use to assess financial trends. New projected guidelines include: Unspent balances of five to 15 percent, and not to exceed 25 percent.

Unrestricted fund balances or solvency ratio should be 7 to 17 percent, and never over 25 percent.

Ban on Chinese contracts: 705.1R2 adopts rules for spending federal grants, and specifically forbids telecommunication and surveillance contracts with at least six named Chinese-owned firms, or any other entity the FBI believes is owned by a foreign government.

Radon: 804.12R1 establishes a radon measuring and mitigation plan. "All new school construction will include radon resistant construction techniques."

The board also:

- Hired Bohnsack & Frommelt accounting firm for up to \$17,600 to audit this fiscal year, ending June 30. The board has used the same firm for previous audits.

- Contracted with Greybeard Investigations for child abuse level II investigations for \$135 per hour, and 55-cent per mile. The investigator is on call as required by state code to follow up on reports of abuse of students by employees. The board named staff members Nicole Litterer and Erin Paysen as Level I abuse investigators.

- Renewed its contract with iJAG for \$25,000. The nationwide nonprofit provides dropout prevention and career consulting for school districts.

- Thanked business director Jill Van Roekel for the district's 40th consecutive excellence in financial reporting award from the Association of School Business Officials.

Eldridge interviews six of 11 applicants for clerk's position

Eldridge council members added two more special closed sessions to the series of private meetings held over the last two months.

Mayor Frank King said much of the work is screening applicants to replace former clerk Denise Benson.

He said six of 11 applicants have been interviewed. The council has completed interviews and King expects a decision by month's end.

"We got started last month, and had

a few more applications come in," King said Monday.

The council met in closed session from 5:21 to 7:04 p.m., Wednesday, May 17. Another closed session was scheduled for 5 p.m., Tuesday, May 23, at city hall, which is after *The NSP* deadline.

Previous closed sessions were posted as being needed to evaluate professional competency for hiring, performance or discharge. The Tuesday meeting notice also said it would address "matters that

are presently in litigation or where litigation is imminent."

Iowa law allows, but does not require any closed sessions. Through May 17, the council has met nearly 10 hours in closed sessions. All of the sessions were posted on a bulletin board outside city hall, former city administrator Tony Rupe said. A review of the city's website shows the April 13 and 17 closed sessions were called as committee of the wholes, and added to the city's online disclosure

after they were held. King said a public notice may have been missed through the city administrator transition, but he vowed openness. "We're trying to proceed as openly as possible. I want everything done right," he said.

Benson was fired in October after Rupe discovered personal items she'd ordered off the city's Amazon card. The council alerted state auditor, and Sheriff Tim Lane said investigators are awaiting the outcome.

He was a lifetime member of the National Education Association, past member of Iowa State Education Association, and North Scott Education Association. In 2022, he was inducted into the North Scott Athletic Hall of Fame. As a former coach and

advocate of fitness, he was an avid member, supporter, and donor of the North Scott Community YMCA.

Bill lived his life to the fullest. He enjoyed hunting and fishing. One of his favorite places was on the Mississippi River at day-break. He enjoyed sharing his catch with others and teaching his grandchildren how to fish. As a proud grandparent, he supported his grandchildren's athletic, music, scouting, and academic events. Emulating his great-grandfather Peterson, he enjoyed gardening, preparing meat (butchering) with neighborhood friends, making old recipes and trying new ones. 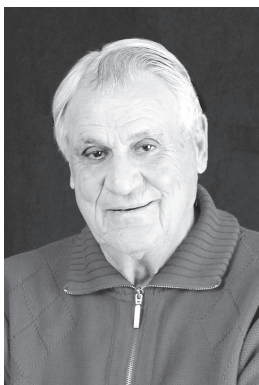

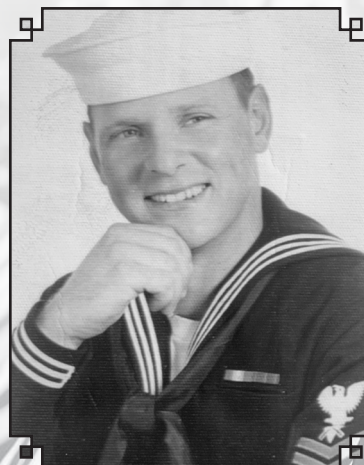

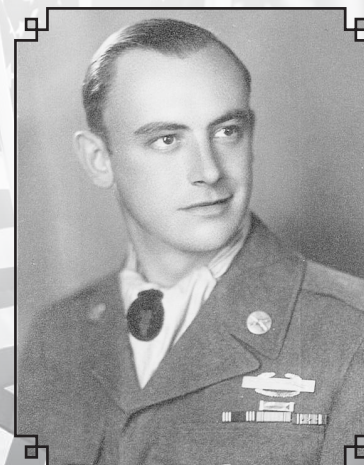

NORTH SCOTT BOYS' TRACK

Sprinters shine and set school record

Voss wins three medals; Marti, Robertson and Krueger join him to set new 4x100 relay time

It wasn't that long ago that these Lancers came away from the Blue Oval underwhelmed in their Drake Relays performance.

Three weeks later, they shook off the disappointment and delivered multiple medal-winning performances and set another school record at the state meet.

The 100 and 200-meter relays have been the North Scott boys' best relays all year, and it was no different at the state meet as seniors Dylan Marti, Lowen Krueger, Miles Robertson and junior Colton Voss sprinted their way to medals.

Their 4x100 time of 42.45 seconds set the new school record and was good for sixth place in a stacked field.

Amazingly, they almost didn't get that opportunity.

"We were pretty darn lucky to be in the finals. We had a botched handoff from the prelims on Friday," Lancer coach Joe Greenwood said. "I think we held our breath for 40 seconds there un-

til we crossed the finish line. But credit to those guys, they ran really well.

"To finish where we did and set a school record after a really long and hot weekend is a testament to those guys, the time they put in and the experience they have. I don't know if all the times I've been going out there we've run our absolute best on that last day. That's really hard to do."

That quartet also placed seventh in the 4x200-meter relay. Eagle-eyed viewers likely noticed that Krueger anchored the relay instead of sophomore Cole Johnson, who had helped set the 4x200 school record the week before at districts.

"We made a change. It was an extremely difficult choice for me," Greenwood said. "It basically came down to the fact that we had a run-off in practice and Lowen was faster. Lowen doesn't get to run that race during the season because it is right before the 110-meter-high hurdles. The hurdles went first on Friday, and then he had about a 50-minute break in between that."

There was little drop-off in performance as that team posted a seventh-place finish in 1:29.27, which was the second-best North Scott 4x200 relay of the season.

"We felt like it was a choice that would better our team. It was not one

that I made in the spur of the moment. It is something I labored over for a few days," Greenwood said. "Cole has been really good for us, but one of my responsibilities is to put the best team out there that we can. And that's why I made that choice."

In the open sprint events, Voss shined for the Lancers by placing fifth in the 100 (11.17 seconds) and missing the finals in the 200 by two-hundredths of a second. He finished 9th in 22.49 seconds.

"If my memory serves me correctly, the last time North Scott placed in the 100 was 2006," Greenwood said. "He got off to a great start in both of his races. That's a pretty talented field he ran against. I feel pretty happy with what he was able to do."

His relay partner, Marti, also ran the 200 and finished 20th in 23.24 seconds.

Krueger wasn't done either as he competed in both hurdle events. He finished 12th in the open event (15.07 seconds) and anchored the relay team with junior Ryan Stickler and freshmen Nolan Reese and Evan Kruse, which finished 23rd (1:04.05).

North Scott's lone distance event, the 4x800, with seniors Nik Davis, Caleb Wilshusen, junior Isaac Foster and sophomore Yorton Hagedorn, was dis-

32-year state tournament drought ends

Lancers qualify for state team tournament; Loehr, Newman book ticket to individual competition

The last time North Scott girls' golf made an appearance in the state tournament was 1991, during the days of Lancers and Iowa golf legend Beth Bader.

It's time to reset the clock. The Lancers are heading to Ankeny.

It went down to the very last players and the final few holes, but North Scott eked out a three-stroke advantage over Bettendorf, 352 to 355, to claim second place and qualify as a team at the Class 4A Region 3 tournament last Wednesday.

On the individual side, senior Elle Loehr (82, T-4) and junior Kaycee Newman (83, T-6) went back-to-back on the leaderboard and made the cut for the individual competition.

"I was just really happy for the girls," Lancer coach Collin Ellis said. "They practice with purpose, they stay late, they sacrifice time with friends and family, they have to make up tests & home-

work when they miss class, I mean the list goes on. So, to see it all pay off for them was pretty special"

The Lancers got their first look at Pleasant Valley Golf Course in Iowa City five days before the regional tournament.

"We played a practice round here on Friday, but I didn't play very well," Loehr said. "So, I worked out some kinks over the weekend and went in with the same focus I had last Thursday."

Ellis added, "It was a tricky little course. There weren't a ton of areas where you can be aggressive off the tee, so we had to pick our spots."

It was a tale of two halves for North Scott's top four scoring golfers. Loehr and Newman both shot a 38 on the front nine, but stumbled a bit on the return trip.

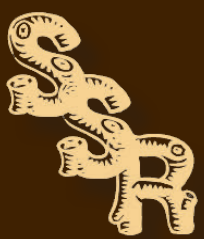
"I went back-to-back birdies, and I thought I was in the zone," Newman said. "But then on the back nine I blew up a little bit. But it wasn't terrible. I managed it."

Newman had a tough assignment playing with Pleasant Valley's Maura Peters, who shot a 69 to lead the field.

Lancers capture three medals in Des Moines

Skarich, Hanenburg and Hansel leave their marks with top six finishes

Qualifying 13 athletes in 13 events, the North Scott girls' track team was one busy bunch last week at Drake Stadium for the state meet.

At the end of it all, the Lancers were able to walk away with three medals and a pair of season-best performances as they left Des Moines Saturday afternoon.

"I thought it was a good effort by all the kids that were down there," Lancer coach Troy Matthaideiss said. "I think that not every result was how we hoped it had gone, but it wasn't for a lack of effort, that's for sure."

"I know each of the kids had a different set of goals. Some of them, their goal was just to get there and they did that. Some of them had a lot higher goals. In terms of how we performed, I thought that we competed hard, gave it our best, gave it our all, and what happened was what happened. We were able to walk away with three medals, which is a pretty tough thing to do at the state meet. Pretty proud and happy about that."

Like last season, the high point of the state meet came in the high jump. Junior Sydney Skarich tied for fourth place, improving on her fifth-place finish from 2022, with a 5'2" leap. She was perfect all the way until the 5'4" bar, which proved just a bit much on Thursday.

"For whatever reason, that height has been her nemesis this year," Matthaideiss said. "She had three attempts at it, and I thought two attempts were great and I thought she was over it. I know she

has it in her — she's done it before."

She was joined in the high jump by freshman Natalie Nwatchock, who finished 21st at the 4'10" bar.

Skarich also set a lifetime best in the 100-meter hurdles with a time of 15.38 seconds. It was only good for a 12th-place finish in the prelims, which shocked the Lancer camp.

"If you told me she ran her lifetime best, I would've said she's in the finals for sure," Matthaideiss said. "That's just a testament to the level of competition that's down there."

In the first event of the meet, Skarich teamed up with junior Harmony Hansel, sophomore Chloe Morrison and freshman Addison Allen for a 15th-place finish in the 100-meter hurdle relay.

Skarich closed out the morning session on Friday with Nwatchock, senior Kaitlyn Knoche and freshman Emily Stutting with a 20th-place finish in the 4x400-meter relay (4:13.11).

North Scott had one runner make Saturday's finals as junior Mercie Hansel nabbed sixth in the 200-meter dash in 25.52 seconds. She was a tenth of a second away from qualifying in the 100-meter dash as well (10th place, 12.71 seconds).

"A couple of the girls she's beaten throughout the year made it to the (100) final, so I think she was maybe a bit frustrated there," Matthaideiss said. "She certainly made it in the 200. To make it to the finals in 4A track in an open sprint event, you have to be fast. We've known that all year, and she went out and delivered."

In the sprint relays, the Hansel twins joined senior Jorie Hanenburg and junior Georgia Brunkan for a 13th-place finish in the 4x100 (50.21 seconds). Mercie also ran with Nwatchock, Hanenburg and Brunkan to a 21st-place finish in the 4x200 (1:47.86).

The Lancers also scored a fifth-place finish from Hanenburg in the shot put. She had been regularly over the 40-foot mark all season but could not find that gear inside the Blue Oval, finishing with

a top mark of 38'07.50".

"I think she had pretty high goals for herself. I think that just being a competitor, she was a little disappointed," Matthaideiss said. "All year we've talked about that consistency piece. But for whatever reason, on this set of days, she was still consistent, it just wasn't consistently 42. She was consistently in that 38 to 39-foot range. That's what it was on those days. I don't think that takes away from anything she's accomplished this year."

Hanenburg also competed in the discus but did not place with three foul attempts.

On the distance side, the Lancers were led by seniors Knoche and Bailey Boddicker in their final high school meet. They teamed with Nwatchock and Stutting in the medley for a season-best performance (20th place, 4:25.70).

In the 4x800, they joined junior Madison Wilshusen and sophomore Kaelin Carlson-Gross for a 23rd-place finish (10:24.87).

Knoche, Boddicker and Hanenburg, as well as the five other seniors cheering from home, helped make this track team a force in regional and state competitions this season.

They have created a family-like culture within the team, and it's no accident that it has stuck over their four years and can get passed down for many years to come.

"Whether it's athletics or not, they're just good people," Matthaideiss said. "They're good teammates. They're good to each other. I think that's a dynamic of this team that goes unnoticed."

"There aren't really any cliques or groups on the team. I think that's a huge testament to these seniors and them being around the program for four years and who they are as people. Everybody is included and everybody is a part of it. They make everybody feel welcome. By and large, that's a reason for some of the success we have. That's not possible just for coaches to speak that. You have to have people that live it."

qualified in the prelims and did not finish.

In the field events, junior Zach McMillian matched his discus result from 2022 with a fourth-place effort and a 168'04" throw.

It was a mixed bag, however, as McMillian uncorked that throw on his first attempt, and fouled on four of his final five throws.

"He did what he had to do on his first throw. After that, I don't know if he was pressing or what the case may have been. He just didn't throw as well," Greenwood said. "He wasn't happy. I'm not going to sugarcoat it. He was pretty upset about things. But I'm never going to criticize somebody who goes out there and gets a fourth-place medal. That's pretty special to be able to do that on that stage."

Junior Luke Belken also competed in the discus and placed 23rd with a throw of 127'04".

In the shot put, McMillian ended up in 10th place but launched the second-best throw of his career (50'08.25"). Senior Nathan Irvin placed 19th with his effort of 45'05.75".

Overall, the Lancers put 14 points up on the board in the 4A competition and tied for 14th. Johnston (84), Ankeny (80) and Iowa City High (79) occupied the top three scores.

North Scott was the highest scoring Class 4A MAC school at the state meet this year, beating out rivals Bettendorf (13 points), Pleasant Valley (12 points), Davenport West (five points) and Clinton (four points) and Muscatine (three points).

Another track season is in the books,

Shorthanded Lancers beat Clinton, fall to PV as eyes turn to regionals

After taking a few steps back in recent weeks, North Scott girls' soccer (ranked third in Class 2A) took one step forward as the regular season concluded last week.

The Lancers (11-3-1) showed progress during the Tuesday, May 16 win against Clinton and last Thursday's loss against Pleasant Valley.

The context of these games is important as the Lancers were without seniors Kendall Knisley, Kenna McGee and freshman Claire Schnorrenberg for both contests.

Even without these key players, the Lancers held tough against Class 3A No. 5 ranked Pleasant Valley, losing 2-1 on the road.

"Tonight's game might have been our best 80 minutes of the year," Lancer coach Dion Ayers said. "The team executed the game plan flawlessly."

North Scott ended its five-year scoreless drought against Pleasant Valley when freshman McKenzie Moeller scored off an assist from junior Reese Hilsenbeck in the 66th minute.

"We connected around 8 passes all within one to three touches and found Kenzie Moeller behind the defensive

line to finish at the back post," Ayers said. "Reese was able to find her and Kenzie did what she's been doing lately — finishing."

The Spartans had scored twice before, however, and North Scott was not able to find an equalizer before the final buzzer sounded.

Entering the second half up by a goal, Pleasant Valley's Joanah Jepsen kicked what Ayers called a "perfectly played ball" to the MAC's leading scorer, Morgan Russmann, who chased it down, outran the Lancer defenders and slid the ball by goalkeeper Natalie Knepper for her 37th goal of the year.

Despite the two goals allowed, it was a successful night for the defense.

"(Seniors) Bella Warm and Paige Coon were outstanding on the outside backs," Ayers said. "They covered a lot of ground all evening. (Junior) Bella Steiner sat back at center back this evening with (senior) Lexi Ward underneath her. They were unbelievable playing together all night. They both understand the game and really frustrated Pleasant Valley's attack. It was good to see we can slide into this formation and be successful."

Two days before, the scoreboard more accurately reflected the defensive effort as North Scott pitched its sixth shutout of the season.

The Lancers cruised to a 5-0 win on the road against Clinton. Hilsenbeck notched her first hat trick of the season, while senior Sophia Solis and junior Delaney Fitzgibbon each added one goal.

"Tonight was a night that Reese was

able to get on track," Ayers said. "We've been pushing her to be more assertive in the offense and to take opponents off the dribble. I felt she did this tonight."

Now, it's postseason time. The Lancers have unfinished business at the James W. Cownie Soccer Park in Des Moines, and the journey continued on Tuesday, May 23 when they hosted Burlington Notre Dame in the regional semifinals.

A victory means the Lancers will host the regional championship on May 25 against either Central DeWitt or Mount Pleasant.

Reflecting on the week, Ayers said, "Overall, they played so well and if we play with this passion and have a healthy roster, we could be a tough challenge for anyone in the state."

Stellar JV season comes to a close

Matching the varsity team win for win, North Scott's JV team concluded its season this week.

The 11-3 JV Lancers finished second in the MAC behind unbeaten Pleasant Valley.

"What a great season for this group," Ayers said. "Our alumni Adriane Latham led this team and they played some outstanding soccer all season. They played team ball and I'm excited to see them develop in the offseason."

Sophomore Meredith Carlson led the team with 11 goals, and freshman Allison Moeller was not far behind with 10. Freshman Isabella Mohr paced the team with eight assists.

Still, she held her own in the best group on the course.

“Kaycee has a tough assignment playing in the No. 1 spot, especially trying to play with someone that fires a -3 round,” Ellis said. “The thing about Kaycee is that she never gives in. She just finds a way, even when it’s not going well. She competes, and that is what a No. 1 player does.”

Loehr admitted to making a few mistakes on the back nine, but it didn’t ruin her amazing run of form, which booked her a spot at the state tournament.

“She’s playing the best golf of her career at the perfect time,” Ellis said. “She medaled at conference, shot her career-low 75, then qualified for state as an individual. She’s a great kid and she deserves it.”

North Scott’s No. 3, Freshman Addison Eckhardt (95, T-17), started the day playing bogey ball but settled in nicely as the day went on.

“There’s been several times during those rounds where I think the wheels are going to fall off. Then I pop back and see her, and she’s got a big smile telling me she’s made three pars in a row,” Ellis said. “It’s tough for freshmen to step into these roles, but she and AJ (Blevins, 102, T-26) have been key contributors to this team. I can guarantee there aren’t many state lineups with multiple freshmen.”

Coming down the stretch, however, all eyes were on junior Kalina Stoefer. When Loehr, Newman and Eckhardt all reached the clubhouse and tallied their scores, they realized North Scott and Bettendorf were deadlocked at 260.

A spot at the state tournament would likely come down to Stoefer against Bulldog junior Kyleigh Meier.

“(Stoefer) was down three strokes going into the 14th hole,” Ellis said. “It’s not a match-play event, but when the teams are as closely matched as us and Bettendorf were, it sure feels like it.”

Those moments at the clubhouse for the rest of the Lancers? Tense would be an understatement.

“It was worse than playing,” Newman admitted. “It was so scary.”

That 14th hole ended up switching the fates of the two schools dramatically. On the par four, Stoefer entered a par into her scorebook, while Meier penciled in a quadruple bogey.

Ellis was texting with coach Zeb Hubner, who was still on the course with Stoefer, Blevins and junior Charity Bendickson (123, 48th place) to see what the scores looked like.

“It wasn’t until Kalina’s last hole that we were able to confirm it,” Ellis said. “All year this team has been able to pick each other up, and it was Kalina’s turn that day.”

Newman called Stoefer’s closing performance “clutch” and Loehr said it underscores the team aspect of high school golf.

“We all contribute at different times and it shows,” Loehr said. “Kalina really brought it home for us. It really showed how much of a team sport it is even when you feel like you’re playing alone.”

The Lancers’ sights now turn to Otter Creek Golf Course in Ankeny, the site of the Class 4A state tournament.

North Scott will join the ten-school field which includes Region 3 champion Pleasant Valley, Southeast Polk, Ames, West Des Moines Valley, Waukee Northwest, Linn-Mar, Cedar Rapids Washington, Western Dubuque and Cedar Falls.

It may be a longshot for North Scott to contend for a team title, so embracing

the moment will be at the front of mind.

“We talked about making sure that the experience is more important than the outcome,” Ellis said. “We’re ranked eighth on adjusted average going in, so we’re not feeling any pressure. The goal is to finish higher than we’re ranked and to just enjoy it. Anything can happen in golf, so our approach is simple — have fun and let the results take care of themselves.”

But before worrying about that, how about a little celebration first?

“Oh yeah,” Loehr said. “No school tomorrow. Ice cream. Dinner. Pool party. We’re just going to have fun.”

On paper, this is a daunting matchup for a number of reasons.

The Class 3A No. 3 ranked Wolves are 17-0 and have yet to concede a goal this season.

That is not a typo. The Wolves have scored 107 goals in 17 games this season and have allowed zero.

68 of those 107 goals have come courtesy of senior forward Jackson Kirsch, who now owns the Iowa state soccer record for goals in a single season.

After beating Waterloo East, the Lancers got an opportunity to scout Marion and Kirsch from the stands. The Wolves defeated Western Dubuque 9-0 in the second game of the doubleheader to set up the substate final clash.

"They haven't given up a goal. That's my main concern. And we're going to

hopefully see (Kirsch) live and see how he moves," Bendickson said.

In contrast to previous years, the No. 2 seeds do not get to host substate games. All games are played at the site of the No. 1 seed.

This does provide some advantages, however, as the Lancers got to make the bus ride up and get used to playing on Marion's pitch.

"That's the only good news about (not hosting). We took the trip. We know what the bus feels like. When you're a second seed, you want to host. But we're a 6-8 second seed, so we can't complain too much.

"As turf goes, it's nice turf. It's new turf. But it's still turf."

The substate final kicks off Wednesday night at 7 p.m.

North Scott scores second ranked win of 2023

Lancers defeat 3A No. 6 Wahlert by 13 and shutout Iowa City Liberty

Lancer co-coach Brad Ward and North Scott Athletic Director Jason Schroeder craft the baseball schedule to be intentionally challenging to better the team.

So far, the results are showing the Lancers can hang with Iowa's elite.

After beating Class 2A No. 2 Beckman Catholic in the opener, the Lancers defeated Class 3A No. 6 Wahlert Catholic on Friday 14-1 en route to a 2-1 week.

North Scott shut out Iowa City Liberty the day before, 6-0, and lost to Class 3A No. 2 Marion on Monday 11-2.

The game against the Wahlert Eagles featured 14 North Scott runs in just five innings of play. Senior Reed Mulligan led the way with a 4-4 day with four RBIs.

Senior Trevor Kilburg and junior Max Huntley each contributed two RBIs, and senior Noah Young smacked two of the team's three extra-base hits.

"I thought our approach was great

against Dubuque Wahlert," Ward said. "We came out swinging the bats and did all of the little things that we need to do to be successful. We were having quality at-bats, putting the ball in play, finding holes and making things happen."

On the mound, senior Ian Dittmer rebounded from his rough opening-night start with four innings of no-hit, one-run ball. He walked three and struck out six on 68 pitches.

It was a continuation of elite Lancer pitching last week. Against Iowa City Liberty, sophomore Kye Smith threw six shutout innings.

"We got a lot of Kye and we expect a lot out of him," Lancer co-coach Travis Ralfs said. "He can put some good things together. He's only 16 years old, but I think he's up to the challenge. He beat a quality program last Thursday, and we're going to expect him to do that throughout the year. We're going to make sure he stays healthy and takes care of his body and does the right things. We'll see where things end up for him, but the sky is the limit."

Those two wins moved North Scott to 3-0, but Marion ended the Lancers' brief unbeaten run with an 11-2 home loss.

Ward and Ralfs had to use three pitchers to record 21 outs, and the offense only mustered three hits and two walks against the Wolves' ace Payton Hodges.

"Tonight was the most quality pitcher we've seen so far," Ralfs said. "He wasn't overpowering our guys, which was good, but we have to do a better job of finding holes and getting run production.

"Marion is a good team. They're number two in 3A. We knew it was going to be a good game. We wanted it to be a good game. That's why we scheduled them. We want to play teams like that. If we don't experience playing good teams, it will hurt us in the end."

After three home games to start the year, the Lancers won't see their home diamond again until May 31.

This stretch of games includes doubleheaders against Burlington and Davenport West, as well as a neutral site game against West Des Moines Valley at

Augustana College.

It is a tough situational spot for the team. Not only are they going on the road for their next six games, but the players have to manage some of the most important weeks on the academic calendar too.

"We still have two weeks of school left. It's hard on these guys. We're getting done at 9:30, 10:00 at night. It takes a toll on a student-athlete," Ralfs said. "We have to get through finals here at the end. It's a lot."

"You have to prepare," Ward added. "Being a student-athlete, you have to look ahead and prepare for what's coming up. If you have a test coming up, you have to find that time, ahead of time, to study and not do it the night before. You can't procrastinate. We try to reiterate that to them to help make them a better student overall, plus a student-athlete."

Band showcase thrills Pit crowd

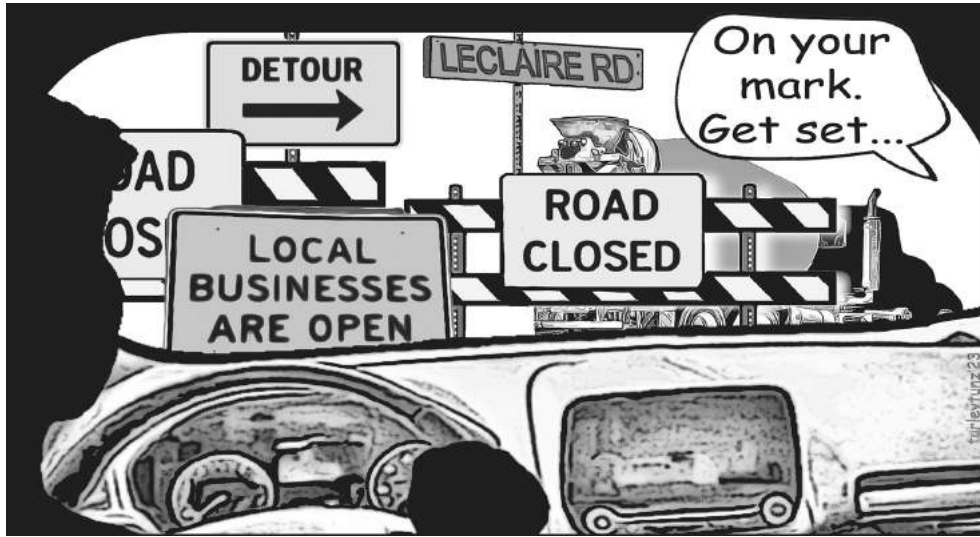
The 18th annual North Scott Band Showcase May 7 was an awesome show and The Pit was packed. The seventh- and eighth-grade bands, and two high school bands performed.

Iowa congressmen ignore seniors in debt ceiling demands

One of Congress's largest tasks is to propose a yearly budget. Once again Congress missed the budget deadline while facing the debt ceiling limit. Americans know that defaulting on the debt will have catastrophic impacts not just here in the US, but globally. Along with the shockwaves to the U.S. and global economies, default could impact payments to beneficiaries, along with military salaries, tax refunds and other payments.

The Alliance for Retired Americans opposes the Default on America Act, the debt reduction package Republican House Speaker McCarthy proposed and that Reps. Ashely Hinson, Randy Feenstra, Mariannette Miller-Meeks and Zach Nunn support.

Under the bill, 22 percent, or 132,000 Iowans enrolled in Medicaid are at risk of losing health coverage due to the work-reporting requirement in the MAGA bill.

And, it isn't just the loss of health care coverage, MAGA Republicans

are threatening food assistance for up to 80,000 Iowans, including older Iowans, with their proposals for harsh new eligibility restrictions in SNAP. The expanded work requirements for 50-55-year-olds means older Iowans could lose access to federal cash and food assistance.

Iowa is currently facing a nursing home crisis. Week after week we hear cases of abuse, fraud, and closings. This bill will reduce oversight of nursing homes, putting seniors in even more danger of abuse and neglect.

While the bill itself doesn't cut Social Security payments to seniors, it does cut the Social Security administrative budget, which would mean more red tape and longer wait times for 709,800 Iowa seniors.

This isn't acceptable. Older Iowans deserve timely access and fewer obstacles to earned benefits and assurances that the programs they paid into won't be put at risk.

We don't have to cut vital programs that benefit Iowa's seniors. There's a better way to reduce debt; making the rich and wealthy corporations pay what they owe in taxes.

President Biden wants to end the tax breaks where billionaires sometimes pay nothing and often pay a lower tax rate than working families. Most support measures that reduce spending to make sure we are best using our taxpayer dollars to benefit the most Americans and know the MAGA effort to hold the debt limit hostage for political gain and cutting services vulnerable Americans rely on is wrong for our communities.

Iowa's Reps. Miller-Meeks, Feenstra, and Nunn went to the negotiating table to wrestle a final concession from McCarthy. They successfully removed McCarthy's proposed cuts to the biofuel tax credits from the debt ceiling hostage demands. But when it came time to fight for the 709,800 seniors and people with disabilities in Iowa, they turned their backs.

Iowa seniors deserve to live with dignity, but Iowa's House Republicans are denying our older Iowans that right.

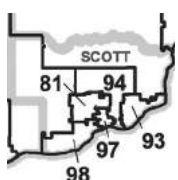

Freedom of the press: Sheriff's plot to kill editor exposed

In my soon-to-be 52 years writing for *The North Scott Press*, I can count on one hand the times I've felt threatened, but those times were mild compared with what Bruce Willingham, the editor of the *McCurtain County Gazette* in Idabel, in southeastern Oklahoma, experienced on March 6.

His newspaper suspected officials were discussing county business after the official meeting adjourned, so he consulted with his lawyers twice, and left a recording device in the room.

What he discovered was shocking, to say the least! The sheriff and commissioners were discussing a plot to kill and bury *The Gazette* reporter! The sheriff apparently was upset about the newspaper reporting of a man who died at a hospital after deputies shot him with a stun gun – and the sheriff's unwillingness to make the body camera recording of the incident public.

The closed meeting gets even messier, and includes talk of how to drive a tank through the newspaper office and call it an accident ... and where to find "two deep holes" to bury the editor and reporter.

Commissioners and the sheriff joked that an arson fire which

killed a woman was "a barbecue," and rued the days when they could, "take a damn black guy and whoop their ass and throw 'em in the cell. Take 'em down to Mud Creek and hang 'em up with a damn rope. But you can't do that anymore. They got more rights than we got!"

This was reported by the newspaper under a page 1 banner headline in the next issue, including the QR code (above) which points to a transcript of a portion of the meeting. There are also sites where you can listen to commissioners and the sheriff say these disgusting things. (I listened. They were actually said. I am not making this up!)

The mayor and governor have called for the

officials' resignations, and the full audio has been turned over to the Oklahoma Attorney General and FBI, who are investigating. The response of the officials, sadly, has not been shame about their racist, misogynistic and potentially criminal remarks, but to claim that the recording was made illegally (sigh).

This one episode makes the recent statement of United Nations Secretary-General Antonio Guterres relevant. The year 2022 saw a 50-percent increase in the killing of media workers worldwide, he said on World Press Freedom Day, May 3, 2023. In addition, digital platforms and social media have made it easier for extremists to push their false narratives and harass journalists.

"Freedom of the press is the foundation of democracy and justice, and it is under attack," he said. "Truth is threatened by disinformation and hate speech seeking to blur the lines between fact and fiction, between science and conspiracy."

Even in the heartland of the USA.

Linda and I were glued to the state track meet on Mediacom Connections last Thursday, in particular, the Waukee Northwest Wolves for whom our granddaughter, Anne and Matt Olson's daughter, Clara, a freshman, runs the second leg of the 4x800-meter relay.

Her relay team qualified for the Drake Relays and placed ninth, for which they were disappointed and determined to do better. Such was their destiny Thursday when all four girls ran personal bests to

place fourth in a school record time of 9:20.84. That was three hundredths of a second faster than fifth-placed Dubuque Hempstead.

The team points from this race helped the Northwest team win the state championship over second-place Ames by just five points, 74-69. Northwest, in only its second year after Waukee opened a second high school, won back-to-back girls' track championships and was state champion in 4A softball.

The suburban Des Moines schools, and especially Waukee Northwest, are growing by leaps and bounds and will always field squads that are talented and deep – which was the key to Northwest's success. The Waukee district enrollment has grown from 1,500 in 2000, to 13,000, an average of 500 each year, and there's no end in sight.

Clara is only the second in her extended family, on both sides, to be a state champion in any sport, joining her great uncle Al Tubbs' 1961 Elwood baseball team which I wrote about last week.

She and her husband, **Dave**, were active in the Jaycees when that group was making a big difference in our community. Dave, who died in 2004, was the "D" of D&L Plumbing & Heating, with the late **Lynn Byers**.

Generations of students knew the gregarious **Bill Erps** as a science teacher and coach at the junior high. His legacy is lasting, as is that of **Carolyn Paustian**, whose family provided leadership in organizations as diverse as the Davenport School District, Iowa Legislature, Farm Bureau, and the Scott County board of supervisors and library.

A U-Haul trailer and a garden tractor were found on property owned by Strout in Arkansas. Meanwhile, Strout had filed a \$500,000 lawsuit against the owner of the rental agency from which the trailer was taken, and continued to maintain the charges were a political smear.

• **Steve Schroeder**, son of **Mr. and Mrs. James Schroeder** of rural Donahue, and **Al Schellenberg**, son of **Mr. and Mrs.**

Walter Schellenberg of McCausland, were chosen to represent the Larry M. Gronewold American Legion Post 532 of Donahue at Boys State.

• The North Scott track team won the Illowa Conference title on the last event of the conference meet, besting Central DeWitt by four points. **Cory Arp** overcame Central DeWitt's **Joe Moeller** on the last leg of the one-mile relay to secure the victory. Other Lancers on the relay team included **Paul Muhs**, **Wayne Corey** and **Bob Warren**.

May 26, 1983

• Virgil Grissom Elementary School would receive a \$17,000 makeover. "Open space" classrooms that had been constructed around the medic center would be enclosed, allowing the rooms to have "better acoustics and better control," according to principal **Dennis Albertson**. "The issue isn't noise, it is that the teachers want to teach in more privacy."

• **Joni Kuehl** and **Mike Campana** were named graduation speakers for the North Scott Class of 1983. Commencement would be held outside at the high school athletic field.

• **Kim Reese** placed second in the 800 run at the state track meet in Des Moines. **Kim Schneckoth** placed third and broke the North Scott school record in the 1500 run with a time of 4:51.48. **Wendy White** came in fifth in the 100 hurdles.

May 27, 1998

• Scott County Conservation Board director **Dan Nagle** planned to retire after 30 years as head of the Scott County parks system. Nagle helped create Pioneer Village at Scott County Park, oversaw the establishment of West Lake Park, and helped add the Buffalo Bill Cody Homestead, Buffalo Shores, Littles Pineo Grove and Cameron Timber Preserve to the parks system. A retirement celebration would be held at Scott County Park.

• **Joe Geerts** of Eldridge got a \$500, five-minute shopping spree at Slagle's Food Pride after winning an Eldridge Lions Club drawing. Geerts donated most of the canned goods and other non-perishables he collected to the North Scott Food Pantry.

• **Frances Haas** and **Scott Tooley** each received a \$10,000 scholarship from the **Alfred and Helen Arp** Scholarship Fund

during the North Scott High School Senior Recognition Ceremony.

• **Joe Welter** and **Ryan Petty** qualified for the boys' state track meet. Welter would participate in the 3200 and 1600 meter events, while Petty would run the 100 dash.

May 28, 2008

• Area residents were feeling the pinch at the pumps, as gas prices topped \$4 a gallon. Government and school district officials were already planning to amend their budgets to account for the increase in fuel prices. "We're \$100,000 over budget in the diesel fuel range for this year," said county engineer **Jon Burgstrum**.

• North Scott senior **McClain Bohach** planned to celebrate graduation before heading to Los Angeles, where he had just been hired as the drummer of the up-and-coming sister rock group **Jewel and Blaire**. Bohach and his dad, **Kevin**, credited the North Scott music department for helping McClain get his start in the industry.

• Members of the Scott County Board of Supervisors and Conservation Board held a ribbon cutting for the new water slides at the Scott County Park Pool. This phase of the renovation project at the pool also included new, handicapped-accessible bathrooms.

• The North Scott softball team began the season with a 5-3 win over Maquoketa, then upset state-ranked Class 3A champion West Delaware, 5-2. Sophomore **Briana Haycraft** struck out 11.

• In celebration of Teacher Appreciation Week, third-graders from Ed White Elementary School visited Grand Haven to talk to eight retired teachers who lived at the retirement community. The teachers, including **Florence Benshoof** and **Bessie Sierk**, had a

combined 200 years experience in the classroom.

May 23, 2018

• North Scott senior **Cailynn Garnica** shared her story of teen pregnancy. After becoming pregnant at age 13, Garnica found a community of support at North Scott Junior High, including her counselor, **Sarah Riley**, who Garnica called her "ultimate rock." The baby was adopted, but Garnica had arranged for an open adoption, and was in frequent contact with the child and family. She said she wanted to go to college to become a psychologist. "I want to help people like me, and mainly, that's because of Mrs. Riley ... I want to be that person for somebody."

• **Atlantic Bottling Co.** announced it would relocate its Quad Cities operation to Walcott, bringing 143 jobs to the community. The company also planned to build a 100,000 sq. ft., \$8 million facility.

• Big changes were ahead, as new coaches took over the North Scott baseball and softball programs. **Brad Ward** and **Travis Ralfs** would serve as co-head coaches for baseball, and **Holly Hoelting** was hired as softball coach.

ORDINANCE NO. 537-23

An Ordinance Providing for the Division of Taxes Levied on Taxable Property in the May, 2023 Addition to the Consolidated Walcott Urban Renewal Area, Pursuant to Section 403.19 of the Code of Iowa

BE IT ENACTED by the Council of the City of Walcott, Iowa:

Section 1. Purpose. The purpose of this ordinance is to provide for the division of taxes levied on the taxable property in the May, 2023 Addition to the Consolidated Walcott Urban Renewal Area of the City of Walcott, Iowa, each year by and for the benefit of the state, city, county, school districts or other taxing districts after the effective date of this ordinance in order to create a special fund to pay the principal of and interest on loans, moneys advanced to or indebtedness, including bonds proposed to be issued by the City of Walcott to finance projects in such area.

Section 2. Definitions. For use within this ordinance the following terms shall have the following meanings: "City" shall mean the City of Walcott, Iowa

"County" shall mean Scott County, Iowa.
"2023 Urban Renewal Area Addition" shall mean certain taxable property in the May, 2023 Addition to the Consolidated Walcott Urban Renewal Area of the City of Walcott, Iowa, the legal description of which is set out below, approved by the City Council by resolution adopted on May 1, 2023:

Lot 1 of Iowa 80 9th Addition, City of Walcott, Scott County, State of Iowa.

"Urban Renewal Area" shall mean the entirety of the Consolidated Walcott Urban Renewal Area as amended from time to time.

Section 3. Provisions for Division of Taxes Levied on Taxable Property in the 2023 Urban Renewal Area Addition. After the effective date of this ordinance, the taxes levied on the taxable property in the 2023 Urban Renewal Area Addition each year by and for the benefit of the State of Iowa, the City, the County and any school district or other taxing district in which the 2023 Urban Renewal Area Addition is located, shall be divided as follows:

(a) that portion of the taxes which would be produced by the rate at which the tax is levied each year by or for each of the taxing districts upon the total sum of the assessed value of the taxable property in the 2023 Urban Renewal Area Addition, as shown on the assessment roll as of January 1 of the calendar year preceding the first calendar year in which the City certifies to the County Auditor the amount of loans, advances, indebtedness, or bonds payable from the special fund referred to in paragraph (b) below, shall be allocated to and when collected be paid into the fund for the respective taxing district as taxes by or

for said taxing district into which all other property taxes are paid. For the purpose of allocating taxes levied by or for any taxing district which did not include the territory in the 2023 Urban Renewal Area Addition on the effective date of this ordinance, but to which the territory has been annexed or otherwise included after the effective date, the assessment roll applicable to property in the annexed territory as of January 1 of the calendar year preceding the effective date of the ordinance which amends the plan for the 2023 Urban Renewal Area Addition to include the annexed area, shall be used in determining the assessed valuation of the taxable property in the annexed area.

(b) that portion of the taxes each year in excess of such amounts shall be allocated to and when collected be paid into a special fund of the City to pay the principal of and interest on loans, moneys advanced to or indebtedness, whether funded, refunded, assumed or otherwise, including bonds issued under the authority of Section 403.9(1), of the Code of Iowa, incurred by the City to finance or refinance, in whole or in part, projects in the Urban Renewal Area, and to provide assistance for low and moderate-income family housing as provided in Section 403.22, except that taxes for the regular and voter-approved physical plant and equipment levy of a school district imposed pursuant to Section 298.2 of the Code of Iowa, taxes for the instructional support program levy of a school district imposed pursuant to Section 257.19 of the Code of Iowa and taxes for the payment of bonds and interest of each taxing district shall be collected against all taxable property within the taxing district without limitation by the provisions of this ordinance. Unless and until the total assessed valuation of the taxable property in the 2023 Urban Renewal Area Addition exceeds the total assessed value of the taxable property in such area as shown by the assessment roll referred to in subsection (a) of this section, all of the taxes levied and collected upon the taxable property in the 2023 Urban Renewal Area Addition shall be paid into the funds for the respective taxing districts as taxes by or for said taxing districts in the same manner as all other property taxes. When such loans, advances, indebtedness, and bonds, if any, and interest thereon, have been paid, all money thereafter received from taxes upon the taxable property in the Urban Renewal Area Addition shall be paid into the funds for the respective taxing districts in the same manner as taxes on all other property.

(c) the portion of taxes mentioned in subsection (b) of this section and the special fund into which that portion shall be paid may be irrevocably pledged by the City for the payment of the principal and interest on loans, advances, bonds issued under the authority of Section 403.9(1) of the Code of Iowa, or indebtedness incurred by the City to finance or refinance in whole or in part projects in the Urban Renewal Area.

(d) as used in this section, the word "taxes" includes, but is not limited to, all levies on an ad valorem basis upon land or real property.

Section 4. Repealer. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Section 5. Saving Clause. If any section, provision, or part of this ordinance shall be adjudged invalid or unconstitutional, such adjudication shall not affect the validity of the ordinance as a whole or any section, provision or part thereof not adjudged invalid or unconstitutional.

Section 6. Effective Date. This ordinance shall be effective after its final passage, approval and publication as provided by law.

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND PORTIONS OF THE ZONING ORDINANCE FOR UNINCORPORATED SCOTT COUNTY TO ADD SNOW TUBING FACILITY AS A SPECIAL USE IN THE, CONSERVATION-RECREATION "C-R". DISTRICT. BE IT ENACTED BY THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF SCOTT COUNTY IOWA:

Section 1. Amend Section 6-5 DEFINITIONS OF the Zoning Ordinance for Unincorporated Scott County by adding:

Section 6-5(106) SNOW TUBING FACILITY A private park facility generally used for the recreational activity of sliding downhill over snow on a large inflated inner tube. Private snow tubing operations shall take advantage of natural topography to provide appropriate slopes and shall not require significant grading. Snow tubing operations may include: mechanical uphill surface transportation utilizing an uphill-tow-style or conveyor-style system; a building to house pumps, snow-making and maintenance equipment and inner tube storage; a Snow Tubing Facility Concession/Warming Area; a scale-appropriate parking lot; and water detention lake. Most snow tubing operations shall require approval from the Iowa Department of Natural Resources prior to construction and operation.

Section 6-5(107) SNOW TUBING FACILITY CONCESSION/WARMING AREA: An enclosed building, limited to 1,200 square feet, containing restroom facilities, a warming area limited to space for changing clothes or preparation for snow tubing, and a concession area limited to the sale of pre-prepared foods with no food preparation that requires an oven, hood or grease trap.

Section 2. Amend the Zoning Ordinance for Unincorporated Scott County by amending Sec. 6-11 D as follows:

D. Special Permitted Uses: Snow tubing facility

Section 3. The County Auditor is directed to record this ordinance in the County Recorder's Office.

Section 4. Severability Clause. If any of the provisions of this Ordinance are for any reason illegal or void, then the lawful provisions of the Ordinance, which are separate from said unlawful provisions shall be and remain in full force and effect, the same as if the Ordinance contained no illegal or void provisions.

Section 5. Repealer. All ordinances or part of ordinances in conflict with the provisions of the Ordinance are hereby repealed.

Section 6. Effective Date. This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect after its final passage and publication as by law provided.

Containing .62 acres, more or less. The parcel is currently C-1 Neighborhood Commercial District and is being rezoned to C-3 General Commercial District.

In addition, the following parcel map is attached herewith and made a part hereto as the same pertains to said area is enacted as a substitute and in lieu of the same area described as shown on said district map.

Be it further enacted that the zoning map, together with the boundaries of the districts, designations, notations, references and other information shown thereon as the same pertains to the area described above are, and by way of amendment, made a part of the zoning ordinance of the City of Eldridge, Iowa, and shall have the same force and effect with respect to said area as if the zoning map and all notations, references and other information shown thereon were as fully set forth or described therein, the original of said amendment is properly attested and is on file with the City Clerk of the City of Eldridge, Iowa.

Puck moved and Mengler seconded to approve Resolution 2023-25. Roll call ayes: Puck, Mengler, Bieri, Knutsen, and Koberg. Motion carried.

Resolution 2023-26, Approval of Wes Wulf Subdivision Final Plat. Rickertsen reported the Planning & Zoning Commission recommended approval of the Wes Wulf Subdivision final plat. Bieri moved and Koberg seconded to approve Resolution 2023-26. Roll call ayes: Bieri, Koberg, Knutsen, Mengler, and Puck. Motion carried.

• Approval of Playground Equipment by the Walcott Lions Club at Water Tower Park. Puck stated for the Lions Club 50th anniversary project they would like to install playground equipment at Water Tower Park. The project is expected to be completed in 2025, depending on fundraising. Mengler questioned the status of removing the water tower so there is no interference with placement of new equipment. Stagg responded he is in the process of obtaining bids to remove the tower. Mengler moved and Koberg seconded to approve the playground equipment project as presented by the Walcott Lions Club at Water Tower Park. Motion carried.

Koberg questioned if this was being done to try and duplicate the three poles at the Legion Veteran's Memorial at Welcome Park, and stated he hopes it doesn't take away from that area.

• Acceptance of Scoreboard/Sign Donation for Larry Koberg Field at Wescott Park from Koberg Family. Puck moved and Bieri seconded to accept the donation of a scoreboard for Larry Koberg Field at Wescott Park from the Koberg family. Motion carried with Koberg abstaining.

Ordinance 537-23, An Ordinance Providing for the Division of Taxes Levied on Taxable Property in the May 2023 Addition to the Consolidated Walcott Urban Renewal Area, Pursuant to Section 403.19 of the Code of Iowa. Puck moved and Mengler seconded that the statutory rule requiring an ordinance to be considered and voted on for passage at two Council meetings prior to the meeting at which it is to finally pass is suspended (waive the second reading). Roll call ayes: Koberg, Bieri, Knutsen, Mengler, and Puck. Motion carried. Koberg moved and Bieri seconded to approve the third and final reading to adopt Ordinance 537-23. Roll call ayes: Koberg, Bieri, Knutsen, Mengler, and Puck. Motion carried.

Ordinance 538-23, Amending Chapter 92 Pertaining to Water Rates. Ordinance 538-23 includes an increase of 4% to both the minimum (base rate) and usage rate, effective with the July 1st billing. Each customer shall pay a minimum bill of \$17.65 per month (increase of \$.65/month), which includes usage up to 1,400 gallons and all usage over 1,400 gallons shall be \$.05 per 1,000 gallons (increase of \$.23/1,000 gallons). Mengler moved and Bieri seconded to approve the second reading to adopt Ordinance 538-23. Roll call ayes: Mengler, Bieri, Puck, Knutsen, and Koberg. Motion carried.

Ordinance 539-23, Amending Chapter 106 Pertaining to Solid Waste Collection Fees (Garbage Rate). Ordinance 539-23 is a 4% increase (\$.60) to the monthly garbage rate, which is the percentage increase the City pays to the collector per contract effective July 1st. Puck moved and Koberg seconded to approve the second reading to adopt Ordinance 539-23. Roll call ayes: Puck, Koberg, Knutsen, Bieri, and Mengler. Motion carried.

Police Department Report. Sergeant Hill requested approval to purchase a new toughbook laptop and docking station, per the project worksheet. Koberg moved and Knutsen seconded to approve the purchase of a laptop and docking station from Platinum Information Services, Inc. at a cost of \$3,448.35. Motion carried.

Public Works Department Report.
• Splash Pad/W. Otis Street. Discussion was held on opening the splash pad and the expected start date for construction on W. Otis Street. Stagg reported the splash pad would not be accessible from Otis Street during the street construction but the construction area could be fenced and the splash pad could be accessed via sidewalk from Parker Street. It was discussed that a portable restroom would be needed if

the splash pad remains open during construction. Council consensus was to have the street construction start on June 26th, after the ISC tournament since the contractor potentially could not start until the prior week. Following further discussion, Puck moved and Bieri seconded to open the splash pad but to close it during the W. Otis Street construction. Motion carried. Council will revisit the splash pad closure when the construction is complete.

Stagg reported on the recent water main break on N. Main Street and reported there is a section on E. Parkview Drive that needs to be replaced. Council consensus was to allow Stagg to move forward with replacing the deteriorated section on E. Parkview Drive in conjunction with the concrete replacement on N. Main Street.

Council Member Comments. Knutsen questioned the status of the sidewalk repairs on the Main Street bridge. Stagg stated he would include those repairs with the concrete repairs on N. Main Street. Koberg expressed concerns on the E. Lincoln Street project, including concrete approaches and usage of private property to access other businesses along E. Lincoln Street.

Possible Closed Session per Iowa Code 21.5(1)(J). Bieri moved and Puck seconded to go into a closed session at 7:03 p.m. under Iowa Code Chapter 21.5(1)(j) to discuss purchase of particular real estate. Roll call ayes: Bieri, Puck, Mengler, Knutsen, and Koberg. Motion carried. Rickertsen, Stagg, and Hill were allowed to stay and all others left the council chamber.

Koberg moved and Bieri seconded to close the closed session and resume the regular meeting at 7:18 p.m. Roll call ayes: Koberg, Bieri, Mengler, Puck, and Knutsen. Motion carried.

Possible Action per Closed Session. Mengler moved and Puck seconded to instruct staff to communicate with the property owner as discussed during the closed session. Motion carried.

Mengler questioned the possibility of the City providing incentives for future development of residential lots. Rickertsen stated the City has potential avenues to provide incentives to developers. Koberg reported a subcontractor of Alliant Energy drove on private property and he felt a fence was located in the easement area, which blocked access to the subcontractor. Stagg will verify the fence is located 10' from the property line, as shown on the building permit. Koberg again questioned the concrete approaches and curb along E. Lincoln Street. A lengthy discussion ensued and it was reported that during the project planning last year two representatives from Liquid Grow attended a council meeting and they chose to have a 4" sloped rollover curb along the property instead of a 6" curb with driveway approaches.

Mengler moved and Puck seconded to adjourn at 7:56 p.m. Motion carried. All votes on motions were unanimous, unless noted.
