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'I told you so'

Retired Shepard principal pleaded with Iowa Board of Medicine to revoke her attacker's license

Sherri Moler likes to tell her children that her four favorite words are "I told you so."

So when the Iowa Board of Medicine met in emergency session on Monday, July 3, Moler was ready.

For the past three years, beginning in July of 2020, she has attended every meeting of the board by Zoom, and shared her painful story of being sexually assaulted by Dr. Lynn Lindaman in July of 1975.

Every time, she's practically begged board members to revoke his medical license. Nearly every time, the board's reply has been the same: "Thank you, and as you know, we can't comment." Eventually, they even quit thanking her.

On July 3, in response to events that had played out five days earlier, the board convened again, and again, Moler's face popped up on the screens of those in attendance by Zoom.

This time, the 62-year-old Eldridge resident wasn't allowed to say a word, but she sent a loud and clear message by holding up a sign that read: "I told you so."

"I knew from my experience in dealing with the board, and how they worded the agenda, that they wouldn't be taking any public comment," said Moler. "I had it all planned out. My sign was ready."



Walcott honors German sister city at weekend festival

Bredenbek Bash is theme for 2023

"Prost" is German for "cheers," and Walcott Day organizers are hoping there's plenty of cheer to go around at the annual festival.

New pipeline regulations will change

Supervisors want more feedback before local rules become permanent

New county regulations on carbon waste pipelines will certainly change over the next month as Scott County supervisors craft an ordinance to protect residents from explosions, leaks and lawsuits

Supervisors voted 5-0, July 6 for 1,600-foot setback on new hazardous liquid pipelines from most occupied buildings, but with a possibility the county's appointed board of adjustment could waive that requirement.

Supervisors discussed the scope and timing of the pipeline companies' safety plans, and the likelihood regulations would be challenged in court.

Last month, county leaders met with federal officials in Des Moines, and Wolf Carbon Solutions representatives in Davenport, before crafting regulations as an amendment to the county's zoning ordinance.

Supervisors said federal safety rules, and lawsuits by pipeline companies also influence their consideration.

"This has a feeling to me that this project is going through no matter what happens in the county," supervisor Rita Rawson said. She joined the unanimous vote for regulations that board chairman Ken Beck said will likely be changed in second reading tentatively set for 5 p.m., July 20, and third reading, Aug. 3. Supervisor discussion would take place at committee meetings 8:30 a.m., July 18 and Aug. 1.

"I'm not sure we're there yet with a one and done solution," Beck said at the meeting.

The amended ordinance calls for:

- New hazardous liquid pipelines no closer than 1,600 feet to residential, commercial and industrial areas, as well as municipal boundaries. Supervisors said without it, federal rules would create a 50- to 100-foot limit.
- Pipeline companies to secure state and federal permits and easements before construction begins.
- An emergency plan submitted to the Scott County Emergency Management Agency.

• Pipeline infrastructure, including substations and pumps, could not be taller than 35 feet.

Mary Lou Engler, of Eldridge, was among three residents who spoke in favor of regulations. She thanked supervisors for initiating action.

"Thank you very much for the safety plans you've put in there they'll have to address. I think 1,600 feet is better than the 100-foot it could be. It's very disturbing to think that pipeline would be as close as 1,600 feet."

She also warned the pipelines will bring more decisions to the county board.

"This will not be the only issue from the pipelines. They've stated they hope to draw more industrial development to Iowa farm fields and generate more waste for the pipeline." Engler said.

Supervisors discussed whether any county rules would stand against the Iowa Utility Board and new federal safety rules expected yet this year. They also noted at least three lawsuits filed by pipeline companies challenging county rules.


Iowa legislators earlier this year discussed, but declined to pass any regulations on the pipelines, or ban the use of eminent domain to seize easements from unwilling landowners.

Beck said that leaves counties in a tough spot.

One county's setback waiver might lead to a pipeline company choosing a path that requires court-ordered easements for other property owners.

"The problem is eminent domain is hanging out there. That's where it gets tricky doing these kinds of waivers," Beck said.

He also worried pipelines could challenge a uniform countywide 1,600-foot

setback.

"A house 600 feet away could evacuate more quickly than a school, nursing home," he said, offering examples. "We'll be contested in court and can lose."

Supervisor Jean Dickson, who is an attorney, warned of, "litigation where county ordinance conflicts with federal law. Has our counsel confirmed? Are we pretty sure it does not conflict?" she asked.

Planning director Chris Mathias said it's impossible to tell now.

"This is all uncharted territory," Dickson said. "Should we require a safety plan before the shovel is in the ground? I'd like to say we could."

Mathias said as of now, the Iowa Utilities Board has all the authority.

Supervisor Ross Paustian joined the majority vote. "Let's go ahead on first reading. It kind of puts the pressure on Wolf."

John Maxwell agreed. "We're walking down a new path, trying to figure it out as we go."

Beck invited more public input. "We have three readings. It can change through these readings. We can go forward, but need more information to see what can work. If we lose in court, the setback might be back to 50 feet. So, let's keep massaging it as we go."

Beck said he, Mathias and county planning staff met with Wolf representatives June 27, "at their request."

Beck said they discussed the proposed regulation and the 1,600-foot setback. He said they learned that Wolf's proposed path through Scott County, "can't make 1,600 feet everywhere. That was the essence of the discussion, to see what flexibility we had."


That led to the Planning and Zoning Commission recommendation to allow the Board of Adjustment to waive the 1,600 foot if the pipeline company provides a safety assessment.

Beck also said Wolf advised more accountability for any firm hired to develop or assess a safety plan. "They told us they can make a study turn out any way they want it," Beck told supervisors.

Scott County provides just a fraction of the carbon waste pipeline footprint envisioned across the country. Planning director Chris Mathias attended a federal Pipeline and Hazardous Materials Safety Administration conference, May 31 through June 1, in Des Moines last month and learned the Department of Energy reports 10,000 miles of pipeline under way, and plans for 90,000 miles. "Our interstate highway system isn't that long," Mathias told supervisors.

The federal DOT reports 47,000 miles of interstate highway.

Maysville annexation

Supervisors backed Marvin and Marjorie Reimers' request to annex their 5.72 acres at 9540 New Liberty Road, into Maysville. The couple plans to deed an acre to grandson, Kent, for a home lot that straddles the city limits.

Maysville council and mayor support the annexation, and neighbors presented no objections.

The family believes building the home will be easier if all of the property is in city limits.

"The City of Maysville is supportive of this proposal. Moreover, this proposal would be more heavily scrutinized if the property stayed under county jurisdiction due to our agricultural preservation policies," county planning direct Chris Mathias wrote in a memo to supervisors. "In staff's opinion the annexation will allow the property owners and the City to do what they want and will meet the County's land use policies of pushing development to the cities."



Olathea Overlook

A new Olathea Overlook rural subdivision north of LeClaire offers six new home lots ranging from 1.8 to 12 acres on former golf course property overlooking the Mississippi River.

Scott County supervisors on July 5 approved a six-lot plat submitted by Steve and Lisa Zelle. Their Legacy Development subdivides 39 acres, part of the old Olathea golf course.

Supervisors accepted the planning and zoning Commission's 4-0 vote for the final plat, with six conditions. Among them are establishment of a homeowners association to maintain roads and stormwater drainage, and a surety bond if infrastructure improvements are not completed.

All lots are accessible from the north on 277th Avenue. There is not access from River Road. The approved plat created these lots and sizes: Lot 1, 1.65 acres; lot 2, 1.8 acres; lot 3, 2.49 acres; lot 4, 8.97 acres; lot 5, 12.02 acres; lot 6, 9.39 acres.







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

After meeting in closed session for just over an hour, the board reconvened in open session and unanimously voted to approve what it called "an agreement not to practice."

The board didn't disclose the terms of the agreement, disseminate a copy, or even announce the name of the physician to whom it pertained. They did not take any comments from the public.

The board was initially scheduled to meet on Friday, July 12, but the meeting was most likely moved up after Lindaman, 72, was arrested on Wednesday, June 28, following a joint investigation by the Ankeny Police Department and Iowa Division of Criminal Investigation (DCI).

Police allege that on Monday, June 26, Lindaman committed a sex act in Ankeny against "a child born in 2015" by using his hands to touch the child over the child's clothing. The next day he allegedly touched the same area of the child through "skin-to-skin contact" according to police records.

He was charged with two counts of Sexual Abuse in the Second Degree (Class B felony) against an 8-year-old child, and was booked into the Polk County Jail where he is being held on \$1 million cash bond.

For nearly her entire adult life, Moler has been an advocate for children.

As the former principal at Alan Shepard Elementary in Long Grove (she legally changed her name from Marceau for personal reasons), and during a 34-year career in education, Moler has always championed what she believes to be best for kids.

Now, she is left to try and process how "the system" failed an 8-year-old girl, and how a man, convicted of lascivious acts with a child 48 years ago, was allowed to practice medicine.

After a three-year fight to get Lindaman's medical license revoked and bring

some sense of closure to her own story, Moler was ready to celebrate on July 3.

Once again, just

like it has at every meeting since July 2020, the board disappointed her by not revoking his license.

"I had a cold beer sitting next to me, and ready to pop it," said Moler. "I had so much hope that they were going to the right thing.

"I'm pissed, and it's extremely frustrating because I was so sure they were going to revoke his license. He's in jail. Why would they not? They are a bunch of cowards."

Since she wasn't al-

lowed to speak at the meeting, Moler took to her computer and almost immediately sent a letter to Iowa Gov. Kim Reynolds. In her July 3 letter, Moler again outlined her journey, asked Reynolds for a private meeting, and to take action against the board.

"I firmly believe that the medical board needs a complete overhaul," she

wrote. "They have failed me. They have failed me, they have failed the public, and they quite obviously failed this young child.

"Their choice to ignore his conviction and my pleas are an absolute stain on the entire state of Iowa. I am wondering how many more victims will need to come forward before something permanent is done. I believe I deserve an answer as to why they ignored his previous felony conviction of Lascivious Acts with a Child (ME)."

An emotional week for Moler

While Moler had been dealing with the board for the past three years, the previous week had been extremely emotional, ever since Lindaman had been arrested on June 28.

Sitting in her Eldridge home, exactly 24 hours after his arrest, Moler was still trying to come to grips with what had just transpired.

just transpired.

"This is about three years too late," said Moler, her voice cracking with emotion. "My biggest fear was that there was another victim, and that's what I kept telling the Medical Board, that research is going to tell us that I'm not the only one.

"The frustrating thing is that I told my story constantly. I told them details that I hadn't told my own kids. They had the opportunity to revoke his license. If you look at the law, there are eight reasons or criteria that a license can be revoked, and he met four of them. Not just one, but four of them."

Moler, who retired as Alan Shepard

principal in 2018, but still teaches at St. Ambrose University, wasted no time in sharing her anger with the Iowa Medical Board, and immediately fired off an email to executive director Dennis Tibben within hours of learning of Lindaman's arrest.

She wrote:

"I assume you already know this. I just received a phone call from the Polk County Prosecutor's Office. Dr. Lindaman was arrested today. There is another victim. The abuse took place within the last three years, since I have been begging you to take action. To revoke his license. He is in jail.

"This never should have happened. I hope you and your entire board can sleep well tonight. You failed this child. Had you done the right thing - what you all KNEW was the right thing - that child would have been safe. I will not be quiet about this. I am sick. You should be, too."

Moler knows she did everything she could to convince the board to revoke Lindaman's license, but like any true educator, she can't get the recent victim out of her mind.

"I am in no way responsible for what happened to the victim, and I'm amazed at the courage it must've taken to come forward," said Moler. "I also know that they're going to be 62 years old some day, and this is always going to be part of their life. I know what they're in for. The system is broken. Hopefully this will help fix it."

Moler certainly has done her part. Ever since she found out that Lindaman was practicing medicine in Iowa, and along with attending every meeting of the Iowa Medical Board for the past three years, she's written over 1,000 emails, mailed more than 200 letters, and spent thousands of dollars in her quest to have his license revoked.

However, to fully understand the passion and anger that fueled her fire, it's necessary to chronicle her entire journey

A shocking discovery

In March of 2020, North Scott's boys' basketball team was playing in the state tournament in Des Moines. Moler's son, current North Scott High School assistant principal Dan Marceau, was the school's assistant basketball coach.

"My grandson had been born five weeks premature, and Jessica (Dan's wife) couldn't drive," said Moler. "We went to the basketball tournament, and I was in my hotel room in the middle of the night. I was scrolling on my phone, and an ad popped up for Lindaman's practice in Des Moines.

"I don't know if it's because I bought my tickets electronically, or because he was an orthopedic doctor that had advertised in the tournament program. I have no idea why or how I got that ad."

What Moler does know is that she immediately recognized Lindaman's name. She clicked on the website, saw his picture, and knew instantly that the man staring back at her was the same man who had sexually assaulted her when



she was 14 years old.

Moler was stunned, shaken and scared, and in the days, months and years since, memories of the assault, recollections of the ensuing trial, followed by endless questions of how a convicted man could be practicing medicine, crept to the forefront of her mind.

COVID hit two days later, and the world shut down. Moler contacted her attorney, John Flynn of Brubaker, Flynn & Darland in Davenport and was told she needed to get the court records from Johnson County, where the assault occurred

"Because of COVID, they wouldn't let anybody in the courthouse," said Moler, "and when I called, they said there was nothing there. My attorney then sent an FOI (Freedom of Information) request, and I received an eight-page document. Although it's very difficult to read, and if you look at it carefully, the words 'convicted, guilty, lascivious acts with a child and deferred judgment' are all crystal clear."

Moler also received copies of three articles that were printed in the Daily Iowan (DI), the University of Iowa student newspaper, detailing a February 1976 trial.

Moler doesn't want this story to be about her, but she is the central figure in a tragic drama that began playing out when she first crossed paths with Lindaman on July 10, 1975.

It was then that Moler was a participant at a University of Iowa sports gymnastics camp, where Lindaman, then 24, was serving as a counselor and athletic trainer.

Moler went to the trainer's room at the University of Iowa Field House after injuring her back, and that's where she met Lindaman, who assaulted her during the appointment. She immediately reported the incident to a resident's assistant, who called campus security.

Lindaman was interviewed twice over the course of the next four days, and on Aug. 4 he was arrested and charged with committing lascivious acts with a child.

According to a story in the DI, Lindaman admitted to molesting Moler during his first interrogation, but later denied it, saying he'd been confused. Lindaman eventually pled not guilty, and at his trial, on Feb. 25, 1976, he said he didn't remember the extent of his contact with her

Forty-five years later, after reading the DI articles and other case reports, Moler began remembering details of the assault, and the trial.

"Over the course of the last three years, a lot of things came back to me," said Moler. "I remember what I wore, and it was the first time my mom let me wear pantyhose, instead of tights, with my saddle shoes. I had on a white blouse and a pink wool skirt. The night before the trial, my dad and I stayed at The Highlander, which was a big deal."

The trial lasted one day.

"When they called me into the courtroom, I had to see him (Lindaman)," said Moler. "He was wearing a white neck brace. I remember the county attorney tried to just ask me yes-and-no questions, but the defense attorney objected immediately, claiming the questions were leading. So, I had to tell everything that happened.

"The county attorney was a big guy, so he stood where I wouldn't have to see the defendant, and he kind of blocked my view."

Moler also had to listen to Lindaman's testimony, and one thing she doesn't recall is what was reported in the DI coverage of the case.

According to the article: "During his testimony, Lindaman said, 'no force, no assault, no emotional harm' had been done to the girl. He said he had 'suffered' more than she had. When Lindaman said this, the girl left the courtroom."

"I don't remember running out of the courtroom at all," said Moler.

That day was the last time she would set eyes on Lindaman, until she saw the picture on his website 45 years later.

The next day, a jury of seven women and five men deliberated for more than four hours before finding Lindaman guilty, and Moler, who had returned to her Maquoketa home the day before, found out about it when she came home from school.

"I remember walking in the back door and seeing my mom hanging up the phone on the wall in the kitchen," said Moler. "She said, 'He was found guilty.' And I remember thinking, 'Of course he was, this happened. How could he not have been found guilty?""

Sentencing was set for April 2. The maximum sentence for the crime was five years in the state penitentiary, but the judge gave Lindaman a deferred judgement, meaning that after he served 12 months probation, the court sealed the public documentation.

Lascivious acts with a person under the age of 16 is not a forcible felony. Moler never went to the sentencing hearing. She just assumed Lindaman had been sent to prison.

That was far from the case.

Lindaman graduated from the University of Illinois College of Medicine in 1984 and did his orthopedic surgery residence in Grand Rapids, Mich. He eventually moved back to Iowa, and the Iowa Medical Board approved his license in 1990

His pediatric orthopedic practice apparently thrived, and he became an active member of the track community. According to his Facebook page, he was a nationally certified jumps coach, a national level official, and head of U.S. Track and Field in Iowa.

The fight begins

After her discovery in March of 2020, Moler was infuriated with Lindaman's continued involvement with children. She filed her initial formal complaint with the Iowa Medical Board in July of 2020, and felt confident she'd been heard when she and her attorney attended their first board meeting.

a celebratory feeling," said Moler. "And the board was like, 'No, we aren't going to do anything."

Two months later, the board sent her a form letter saying that the complaint and all related information "are confidential and cannot be shared with the public" under Iowa law.

Moler received another letter in January of 2022, and the board reaffirmed its decision.

"After careful review of the investigative materials obtained in this matter, the Board voted to close this matter at this time without taking public disciplinary action against Lindaman," the letter states. "Although this may not be the outcome you were seeking, you can be assured that your complaint was investigated, and the Board reached its decision after full review of the investigative record."

Moler refused to give up.

Meeting after meeting, Moler kept returning to tell her story, and meeting after meeting, her request to have Lindaman's license revoked was never addressed.

Eventually, she took on a grassroots approach, and started contacting the organizations and businesses that were listed on Lindaman's website and got favorable responses from many.

Among them, his privileges at the Surgery Center in West Des Moines were revoked; he was no longer allowed to be a preceptor with Des Moines University College of Osteopathic Medicine; and USA Track and Field, through SafeSports, initiated a no-contact order.

Lindaman was banned from working with University of Iowa athletes and schools associated with the Iowa Girls High School Athletic Unions, was not allowed to attend the Drake Relays, and he is no longer listed as a provider for Blue Cross/Blue Shield.

When she spoke at the Medical Board's October meeting, she said the vast majority of organizations listed on Lindaman's website had "severed ties and demanded that their organizations be removed.

"There were 11 organizations listed, and now one remains," Moler told the board. "Make no mistake, I have sent them a follow-up letter as well."

In addition, thanks to a previous suggestion by the Medical Board, Moler had contacted the state ombudsman, which led to a terse email exchange with the Iowa Attorney General. She had also sent letters to state and federal politicians, including Gov. Kim Reynolds. State senator Mark Lofgren was the only one to respond.

"Please know that my endgame was never the Iowa Board of Medicine," Moler told the board in October. "Had you done your job, by revoking his license, this could have been handled quickly and professionally. He is over 70 years old and could have quietly resigned without incident.

"Because you passed the buck, stating that other organizations recommended this action, which is nothing, it is now causing the Medical Board to look unprofessional and inept. You chose to protect one of your own.

"You know he should not be practicing medicine in the state of Iowa," Moler continued. "It makes no sense to me that essentially every single organization, facility and college took action. Except for you, the one organization that is designed to protect the public from dangerous physicians. You had one job, and you did nothing.

"I am not done. I am not quitting. I am not going away. I think by now, you know that."

A potential compromise denied

When the board met again in January, Moler was in attendance. This time, her

request was simple. All she wanted the board to do was change the wording on the renewal applications that would prevent doctors who have deferred judgements in abuse cases from practicing medicine.

"Eventually I became a thorn in their side," she said. "They became very short with me. I'm sure they were sick of hearing from me, and I was telling them the same thing they'd already heard over and over again.

When he applied for his initial license in 1990, Lindaman checked "no" on the question, "Have you ever been convicted of a felony?" He was right in doing so, because in 1975, lascivious acts with a child was not considered a felony.

It's not certain when the change was made, but new applicants are now asked to disclose any deferred judgments. However, the current renewal application asks licensees to disclose "any" criminal charges since the date of their last renewal, regardless of whether these charges were later dropped, or if the case had not yet been fully resolved by the courts.

"I finally said, 'OK, you want me out of your hair, and frankly, I don't blame you, but can we come to an agreement?" said Moler. "All I was asking is that the renewal application language match the initial licensure language, including, 'Have you ever been convicted, given a deferred judgement, an administrative pardon, any of those things.'

"I had finally decided that if I could get that language changed, I would have closure, and could walk away knowing that I've done something. That's all I was asking, and I would quit bugging them. They said, 'No.' It would have been a simple fix.'

Lawsuit filed

While Moler didn't receive good news from the medical board in January, it proved to be a monumental month on another front.

Last September, Congress passed The Eliminating Limits to Justice for Child Sex Abuse Victims Act of 2022, which

allows sex abuse victims to sue their attackers decades after the fact.

Moler's attorney, John Flynn, took

"When the law changed, John asked what I wanted to do," said Moler. "For me, it's never been about the money, but I said if that's the only way we have to bring some awareness to this, and some level of accountability to the board, then I'll trust his judgement. He said, 'I think vou have a suit.'

In January, Flynn filed a petition in Johnson County to get Lindaman's initial confession from University of Iowa campus security, which was not public record. Lindaman and his attorney were notifed that the hearing was taking place, but didn't show up.

"I still think he was arrogant enough to think that nothing would happen,"

She said that Flynn said the judge didn't even hesitate in granting access to the document.

'The university was happy to turn them over, but they just needed a judge's authority," said Moler. "Lindaman had confessed in a 27-page typed confession, and I read every single page. He lied and lied and lied, but the investigator was very skillful at getting to the truth.

"In his confession, He did eventually say most of what happened. There were several lies of omission, but he owned it. Still, he pled not guilty.'

Moler and Flynn continued to gather information, and then found out that Lindaman posted a message on his practice's website that he was retiring as of May 1, and Moler filed her lawsuit on Tuesday, May 23 in U.S District Court.

The lawsuit alleges that Lindaman's 1975 assault caused Moler to experience emotional problems, including major depressive order, post-traumatic stress disorder and generalized anxiety throughout her adult life, and that she has suffered financial injury in the form of expenses related to therapeutic ser-

The lawsuit seeks actual damages of \$150,000, as well as punitive damages and attorney fees.

According to Moler, the Polk County attorney's office had a hard time tracking Lindaman down, and he was finally served on June 9. On Friday, June 23, Lindaman's attorney asked for an extension in responding to the suit, and Flynn agreed to 20 days.

Lindaman was in jail five days later.

What's next

The phone call that Moler received on June 28 changed everything, and it's going to take time for the former educator to process and plan her next steps.

"My anxiety is quite high to begin with, and when I got the phone call I didn't answer because it was a number I didn't recognize," she said. "The woman left me a voice mail, and then texted me, and said she was a victim's advocate and that the Polk County prosecutor had reached out to her to contact me and let me know that there was a second victim."

When Moler returned the call, she

out about things that have happened to them, and always, always, always, I've encouraged my teachers to call it in. It's not their job to call it abuse, but their job to report it. DHS will decide if it's abuse.

"This woman kept asking if I was alone, and if I had a support system. She asked if I wanted to keep talking, and asked if I was safe. I told her I was, but that my biggest fear all along was that there was another victim, and now it was an 8-year-old.'

Up until now, Moler's public journey had included her attendance at medical board meetings, two television interviews, one in 2022, an interview with blogger/journalist Lyz Lenz in February, and an Iowa Capital Dispatch story at the time of her lawsuit in May.

"I tried to get The Des Moines Register to write a story along the way because I wanted his name and picture out there," said Moler. "I begged them to do a story, and now, suddenly, they're calling me.

"What I'm trying to wrap my head around is that I know that I did everything I possibly could've, and then some. When the advocate called, she said, 'Sherri, there's a chance that when this child reported it, and I assume to her

parents, that her parents knew to ask questions very carefully because of the publicity you brought to this.'

"That's helping me, but the bottom line is there was another victim, and I firmly believe this was 100-percent preventable. That tells me that I probably wasn't the first, and I hope she's the last, but we weren't the only two.'

Moler doesn't know what the future looks like, but she's trying to move for-

"I'm done with the victim shaming, and I'm done hiding behind it," she said. "It was not my fault, and it was nothing I did. I'm not comfortable talking about it, but I'm not going to be embarrassed or humiliated any longer.

This is my story, but I don't want it to be about me. Instead, it's about the fact I kept saying there are other victims, and now there is another one. The Iowa Medical Board is made up of physicians, and it seems they protect their own. Somebody owes a lot of people some answers.'

Moler didn't get any answers on July 3, but at least she was able to tell the board "I told you so."

Cheek said he 'may' not vote against library lease

Eldridge council member says he and mayor have discussed library options

Eldridge council member Bruce Cheek said he has no intention of closing the Scott County Library headquar-

Cheek responded with a prepared statement after residents John Ryan and Ron Iossi opened the July 3 Eldridge council meeting with concerns about Cheek's reproach of county library board president Kristal Koberg Schaefer at the June 19 council meeting.

On July 3, Cheek said he was unsure how he would vote for renewing the library's lease with the city-owned build-

ing, which expires in 2025.

"There are tons of opwe're tions looking This has been

going on for years. Never did I ever say I would close the library. I've been thinking of different options. Myself and mayor King have thought of a whole bunch of different ways of doing that, maybe even adding onto the library. That was my first suggestion. And when it got done and the library moved in, the police department would remodel it into city hall."

Council members Bernie Peeters and Brian Dockery said there have been no council discussions about library op-

"I don't think you should take one person's view as policy agenda or direction where the rest of council going," Peeters said. "This is a back-of-the-roster concern for many, many years. It always comes up. There is no ongoing conversation taking place about it."

Dockery agreed. "Let me give you some relief," he told Ryan and Iossi. "We don't have liquid cash to build a library or city hall police station. We haven't had any discussion as a group on that."

The council members' remarks follow residents' defense of the Eldridge main branch.

"I was rather upset. There were thoughts to not renew the lease and tell them to go away.

I would rather we didn't do that," Ryan told the council. "When I read the North Scott Press I was fighting mad."

Resident Ron Iossi reacted similarly. "I watched it on video and was as concerned as you were.

I also looked back at council meeting minutes over the last year. I found nothing regarding discussion of a police station. I checked with a couple of council members. They too, cannot remember

The June 21 NSP reported Cheek's comments and his inclination to vote against any lease extension. On July 3, he said he "may" vote against it.

Cheek read from a prepared state-

ment: "I am not taking aim at the library. I need everyone to hear me. As a council member, we are trying to find a replacement for the city hall of Eldridge and the police department. It is my obligation as a councilman to choose what's in the best interest of the citizens of Eldridge. our disposal and make the best and most efficient decision... The library is one of the options we have explored," Cheek said. He said options include moving it to a different location, "or even build a new building.

There are several options, and we are trying to review them all."

Neither the library nor city hall construction plans have been addressed in a public session according to reviews of council minutes and NSP coverage.

Iossi said his concerns about the library follow concerns about the fired city administrator and clerk.

We as a family take a lot of pride in Eldridge and the North Scott area. Like many of you we have a lot of strong ties. We have a new city administrator, and a new clerk... Eldridge needs that hope about moving forward... We're excited about that...

"A couple years ago we went through a lot of ugliness involving the city administrator and city clerk. The Eldridge community took a beating... a lot of us citizens found ourselves trying to defend what is going on in Eldridge.... It's pretty tough at that point. I thought we were back on track," Iossi said. "Unfortunately, last month's meeting brought some more ugliness to the table.

Iossi suggested a city hall open house, to show the community the true needs.' Then let a citizen's advisory committee with council representatives examine alternatives. 'I'm sure there's a lot of interested citizens in this community once they are educated about what the needs really were," he said. He asked the council to censure or

reprimand Cheek. "Bruce Cheek and I

Part of that is to explore every avenue at have been friends for 58 plus years.... We go back a long way. But Bruce's behavior at last meeting was very embarrassing for me...

Cheek tried to interrupt, and Mayor Frank King admonished Iossi: "Please don't call anyone out for that. I don't believe he actually said he wanted to kick the library out of the city of Eldridge.'

Iossi asked to continue and said Cheek's response to the library board president, "is nothing short of disrespectful and ill-conceived based on false pretenses, and a personal agenda. He literally came out of left field with some of his comments and brought shame to this body... I think he owes Koberg Schaefer an apology.... The citizens of Eldridge are watching," Iossi said.

Sidewalk waivers

Council members revised city sidewalk law to allow industrial property owners to bypass regulations requiring sidewalks. Council members voted 4-0 to allow those owners to ask the council to waive the sidewalk requirement in industrial areas where the ordinance has not been enforced. The vote is the first of three needed to enact the change.

The council also approved the first two industrial property owners who filed waiver requests the last week of June.

Wapsi River Properties II LLC, doing business as Eldridge Storage, planned for 300 N. 16th Ave. Wapsi River owner Charlotte Courtney filed the waiver request June 23. Focus Storage already opened at 3420 S. 11th Ave., offering indoor and outdoor storage in the Blackhawk Trail Industrial Park. Focus president Kevin Koellner filed the waiver request June 21.

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

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

Fire report shows chlorine levels during June 29 leak

Eldridge staff responded quickly and thorougly to a June 29 chlorine leak at the city's water treatment plant, city administrator Nevada Lemke told council members at the July 3 meeting.

The leak sent potentially lethal levels of the chemical into the air just outside the water treatment plant at 505 W. Donahue St., according to Davenport fire department reports.

The report documents the response from an 8:26 a.m. alarm until 10:43 a.m., when the Davenport hazardous materials team left.

Eldridge police officers and fire department volunteers had secured the scene, alerted nearby residents and commenced evacuations when the Davenport hazmat team arrived and measured contamination.

"The entry team ... identified 50 ppm (parts per million) outside the door. Inside, after normal ventilation, readings dropped to 1.6 ppm. The leaking tank was removed from the room and monitored with no readings," according to the report.

The Centers for Disease Controls notes that, "exposures to 30 ppm have been reported to cause intense coughing fits and exposure to 40 to 60 ppm for

30 to 60 minutes or more may cause serious damage. A concentration of 34 to 51 ppm has been reported to be lethal in 1 to 1.5 hours."

The Davenport fire report said, "the entry team and backup team exited the hot zone and entered the decontamination corridor with no incident."

The chlorine leaked from a 150-pound container being handled by city utility employees.

"Eldridge personnel advised that they were changing out an empty chlorine cylinder and upon opening the full cylinder, chlorine was smelled and personnel evacuated," according to the Davenport fire report.

Firefighter Amanda Mussman set up a decontamination zone at Sixth and Donahue.

The Davenport hazmat team, "turned off all cylinders at the main shut-off point and tightened the vice point holding on the distribution apparatus. After a couple of minutes, the readings in the room had dropped to 1.6 ppm chlorine."

Eldridge firefighter Tyler Schmidt assumed unified command of the Davenport and Eldridge firefighters.

Corporal Punishment, Restraint, and Physical Confinement and Detention

State law forbids school employees from using corporal punishment against any student. Certain actions by school employees are not considered corporal punishment. Additionally, school employees may use "reasonable and necessary force, not designed or intended to cause pain" to do certain things, such as prevent harm to persons or property.

State law also places limits school employees' abilities to restrain or confine and detain any student. The law limits why, how, where, and for how long a school employee may restrain or confine and detain a child. If a child is restrained or confined and detained, the school must maintain documentation and must provide certain types of notice to the child's parent.

As a district we strive to do everything possible to mitigate situations so that restraint or seclusion is not necessary. In the event that the safety and well-being of any students are in danger, an employee that has been trained will restrain or seclude the student for the shortest amount of time possible to ensure safety.

Gender and sexuality

Pride vs. love

Pride month is now over. After a month of being inundated with parades, commercials, pride emphases at ballparks theme parks, and more by the media and some so-called progressives, we finally get a short break from "pride this, pride that."

The Bible never talks about loving oneself, but does say, "Love the LORD your God (wholeheartedly)...love your neighbor as yourself." True love, godly love, focuses on God and others, never self.

Love and disagreeing with one's behavior or lifestyle are not contradictory, despite what some say. So lovingly and respectfully use your freedom of speech affirmed by the First Amendment in the U.S. Constitution. Love never fails!

Supreme Court Justice Sotomayor's dissent of a recent ruling favoring a web-designer's free speech based on her Christian beliefs ignores that this ruling would also apply to her refusing – on the basis of her religious beliefs - to serve a white person who asked her to design a KKK website or one with pornography, profanity, or hate speech against those of other minorities or religious beliefs. I also disagree with her subjective statement, "LGBT people have existed for all of human history." In the Bible, Adam and Eve and their early descendants were heterosexual. Homosexual behavior is not even mentioned until thousands of years later in the historical account of Lot at Sodom. (Genesis

That date never came. Seven weeks later, on May 30, he died after suffering a fall outside his home on May 21. He was 76.



Wind turbine company hosts Durant meeting July 13

Triple Oak Power hosts an informational meeting 5:30 – 8 p.m. Thursday, July 13, at the Durant Lamp Community Center, 606 Fifth Ave., about a wind turbine project intended for the area.

Jesse Bermel, director of Midwest Development for Triple Oak, reserved the room for the meeting.

In a 2022 interview with the North Liberty Chamber of Commerce, Bermel said he's done wind turbine development in 12 states, including two in South Dakota.

"I come from Iowa in the Midwest. We have a lot of land where we could put turbines," he said in the interview.

"We lease lands, providing payments not only to landowners, but also the community... There really is minimal land being taken out of production.

Those payments can help sustain families and communities. "Rural communities are losing population all the time."

He said contemporary turbines are quieter

"Sound and shadow are the two biggest concerns," he said. "Technology has come a long way. You hear the woosh-woosh of the blades. The best way to address that is with distance. The farther away, the less you're going to hear it."

"The trailing edge blade with combed teeth is replicated from an owl. The de-

signed blade could put a little strip of bumpy ridges. It doesn't cost energy production, but pushes sound away."

He said the blades cast shadow over roads, that, "sometimes folks get like a vertigo."

He said setback rules would assure shadows wouldn't cross roads.

Anticipated battery development will improve storage options that make turbines more valuable, he said.

He said misinformation about turbines remains a big challenge.

"You have a former president saying they kill all the birds and give you ear cancer and things like that. Eldridge seeks new police officer

Eldridge is looking for a new police officer to replace John Behrens, who resigned after joining the force in January 2022.

The council authorized hiring a replacement, and made permanent a \$3,000 hiring bonus the council authorized for Behrens, and the last police officer hired. • Approved a Class C retail liquor license for Double Barrel Drinkery LLC, 350 E. LeClaire Road. The business occupies the former Tony Sacco's restaurant, next to the new Luminous Dance Force studios

• Approved a five-day class C retail liquor license to Cabos, 1500 E. LeClaire Road, for use July 8 in downtown Eldridge summer festival.

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

Parents/Guardians considering the use of the open enrollment option to enroll their child or children in another public school district in the State of Iowa should be aware that: House File (HF) 2589 eliminates the March 1 deadline for open enrollment. This change allows parents/guardians to apply for open enrollment at any time without the need for good cause. The receiving district may deny an open enrollment request if one of the following applies:

- The application violates the district's insufficient classroom space policy
- The district does not have the appropriate special education policy
- The application would adversely affect the district implementation of a court-ordered desegregation plan.
- The student has been expelled or suspended.

If a parent/guardian moves and wishes for their student to continue at the original resident district under open enrollment (often known as the "continuation rule"), requests cannot be denied due to insufficient space policies.

Parents/Guardians of open enrolled students whose income falls below 160% of the federal poverty guidelines are eligible for transportation assistance. This may be in the form of actual transportation or in the form of a cash stipend. Be aware that open enrollment may result in the loss of athletic eligibility.

Concerning Video Cameras

The North Scott Community School District Board of Education has authorized the use of video cameras on the school district buses. The video cameras will be used to monitor student behavior to maintain order on the school buses to promote and maintain a safe environment. Students and parents are hereby notified that the content of the videotapes may be used in a student disciplinary proceeding. The content of the videotapes are confidential student records and will be retained with other student records. Videotapes will only be retained if necessary for the use in a student disciplinary proceeding or other matter as determined necessary by the administration. Parents may request to view videotapes of their child if the videotapes are used in a disciplinary proceeding involving their child.

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



'It was exciting to see everybody pull together'

Lancers erupt for eightrun fourth inning against CCA; Will face Xavier in Tuesday's regional final

North Scott softball appears to be peaking at the perfect time.

With a 4-1 road win against Class 5A No. 4 Muscatine in the MAC finale, and a 12-2 home triumph over Class 4A No. 14 Clear Creek-Amana in the regional semifinal, the Lancers may have just played their two best games of the season last week.

"Gosh they were great," said a firedup Holly Hoelting after her team defeated Clear Creek-Amana last Saturday to advance to the regional final. "They've worked so hard for this. I'm so proud of them."

The game started off with a bang as freshman Adalynn Johnson crushed a no-doubt two-run home run in the bottom of the first inning to put North Scott (Class 4A No. 11) up 2-0.

In the circle, senior Maddy McDermott was steady as ever. In her five innings of work, she struck out five with zero walks and two earned runs allowed.

"She did a really good job of getting ahead. That's huge with pitching," Hoelting said. "The senior pitcher that she is, she is in control. And that's great for the rest of our defense. Her and Teagan (Kelley) did a really great job today."

Four of her five punch outs were strikeouts looking. She had Clipper hitters guessing all night.

"Throwing everywhere in the zone is really important for us," McDermott said. "I think Teagan did a really good job framing and Coach did a really good job pitch calling."

Both of her earned runs came in the top of the fourth when the Clippers tied

the game with a pair of two-out hits.

The momentum was starting to shift back into the first-base dugout. But not for long.

At one point in the bottom of the fourth inning, nine consecutive Lancers reached base safely. It resulted in eight runs.

"We just knew that we had to switch our mentality into attack mode," Mc-Dermott said. "Them scoring those two runs, it really made us want it more."

"(Scoring two runs) wasn't going to be good enough," Hoelting added. "They scored, so our job was to answer back in that same half inning so that the momentum doesn't go in their favor."

Seniors Abby Rouse and Shelby Spears got the party started with singles. Kelley scored one run on a 1-2 fielder's choice exchange that was not quick enough to the plate.

At the top of the lineup, juniors Sydney Skarich and McKinley Toohey added RBI base hits to continue the rally. Johnson walked and McDermott singled to add another run.


With the score at 6-2, Clear Creek-Amana went to the bullpen to stop the bleeding. It wasn't enough as seniors Khylie Wainwright and Carley Bredar each reached base to bat around in the lineup.

Rouse scored a run on a sacrifice fly to center field, and Spears tallied her second single of the inning and plated the eighth run of the frame.

"We talked about the process of innings. Their teammate just has to move the runner and each teammate did that," Hoelting said. "It was exciting to see everybody pull together."

After another scoreless inning for Mc-Dermott in the top of the fifth, and two quick outs to start the bottom of the inning, Johnson, McDermott, Wainwright and Bredar all hit singles to initiate the run rule.

This regional semifinal win had extra special meaning for this group of play-

ers. Not only was it the final home game of the season, but it is likely the final game played on the current Lancer Softball Stadium field.

The team is expected to move across the street in 2024 and play adjacent to the sports practice facility once the construction job is complete.

"This field has been through a lot with us," McDermott. "I think that it's really important that we were the last one's on this field and ended on a good note."

On Saturday, the Lancers wore their blue socks in honor of the late coach Denny Johnson who had an immeasurable impact on the program.

"It's about something that's bigger than yourself," Hoelting said. "I think that's been a huge part of this stadium. There is so much softball tradition in this community. It's amazing for them to get that win, for them to win big and know that we're moving up."

Splitting with the Muskies

Making up for a rain-canceled double-header, North Scott traveled to Muscatine and split with the 5A powerhouse last Wednesday.

The entire series was a low-scoring grind fest between two of the MAC's best teams. Muscatine took game one 2-0 in which there were only seven hits between the two teams.

Muscatine had six of those hits and

A devastating heartbreaker

North Scott falls 4-3 to Pleasant Valley in nine innings during substate semifinal matchup

There is no way to sugarcoat the ending to Monday night's game. It was painful. Excruciatingly so.

North Scott was one out away in the eighth inning from a historic upset against Class 4A No. 9 Pleasant Valley in the substate semifinal. Instead, the Spartans celebrated on their home field in the bottom of the ninth.

There were hugs after the Lancers' postgame huddle in right field. There were tears too. There were uplifting words. But it was not easy to walk off

"Just understand that it's a game," said Lancer co-coach Travis Ralfs on his and co-coach Brad Ward's message to their team. "We wanted more. We could have had it. But, you know, it's a game. So, we move on. We know what this feels like. You don't want to go there again. So you just have to continue to work hard. And I know these kids are going to.'

The ending notwithstanding, Monday's substate semifinal featured a quality baseball game from start to finish in front of a crowd of hundreds of specta-

The Lancers opened up the scoring in the top of the second as the bottom of the batting order executed small ball to perfection.

Junior Jackson McCallister started the inning with a single. Senior Adam Link bunted him over to second on a sacrifice. Senior Brock Lynch hit a ground ball to the second baseman, allowing McCallister to advance to third. Finally, junior Max Huntley scored McCallister on a single.

After the Spartans tied the game in the bottom of the third, the score remained at 1-1 for the next four innings.

The lack of scoring was not due to a lack of opportunity, however. In the first seven innings, North Scott and Pleasant Valley combined to strand 18 runners on the bases.

For the Lancers, senior starting pitcher Ian Dittmer put on a show. He threw a career-high 110 pitches over six and one-third innings. He allowed just three hits, one earned run and struck out five Spartans.


Ward called it "his best game of the year. Hands down."

Junior Carter Harms came in relief of Dittmer and recorded two consecutive outs to send the game into an eighth inning.

In the top of the frame, Link wore a pitch to get on base. As he was attempting to steal second base, Pleasant Valley's reliever threw over to first base. The subsequent throw from the first baseman sailed into left field, and Link took advantage by sprinting to third.

Two batters later, senior Noah Young hit a ground ball wide left of the first base bag. The first baseman grabbed it, but Young beat the pitcher to the bag.

"We tried to reiterate how proud we were of them and their effort," Ward said. "They competed at a high level against two A-plus pitchers. And it was right there for the taking... We competed like Lancers do and we are just so proud of them."

Over the course of the season, Smith turned into the ace of this staff. He progressed at a rapid pace from last year, going from a 3.27 ERA in 25.2 innings in 2022 to a 2.41 ERA in 52.1 innings this

Additionally, with nine more strikeouts Friday and totaling 78 on the year, he passed Grayson Drezek and Jake Matthaidess for the second-most punchouts in a single North Scott season.

"Last year I was blessed to get in a few games and feel what the atmosphere was like here," Smith said. "I feel like that year prepared me for this year. All my coaches in the offseason helped me work on my arm. I just feel like, in the next few years, I'll keep this going and going and going.3


Lancer junior Carter Harms was North Scott's top bullpen arm this season, throwing to a tune of a 2.83 ERA and 1.32 WHIP.

The Saints did not record an extrabase hit in their win, instead grinding out 10 singles, three walks and receiving help with multiple Saber errors.


Senior Duanna Coyle, sophomore Carley Jonker and freshman Jaselle Lang led the way with two singles.

Mayor John Kostichek called the meeting to order at 6:00 p.m. Council members present: Kirk Koberg, Harry Knutsen, and Lisa Mengler. Everett Bieri participated by phone. Absent: Jacob Puck. Staff present: Jackie Huston, Jeff Blake, Tabetha Wright, and Paul Stagg. Public Works employees, Jamie Poggenpohl and Neal Krebs attended for the Brus hearing.

Huston introduced Tabetha Wright, the newly hired Deputy City Clerk, who will replace Huston upon retirement on July 14th.

Approval of Agenda. Knutsen moved and Koberg seconded to approve the agenda. Motion carried. Introduction of Audience/Public Comments. No comments.

Consent Agenda. Mengler moved and Koberg seconded to approve the consent agenda including the invoices and minutes from June 19, 2023, with two corrections. Knutsen stated that only one section of the bridge sidewalk had been repaired and Bieri had mentioned the signs were painted.

Mointes from June 22, 2023. Koberg moved and Knutsen seconded to approve the minutes from June 22, 2023. Motion carried with Mengler abstaining due to absence from meeting.

Andrew Brus – Appeal Hearing for Golf Cart Permit Revocation. Chief Blake read the revocation notice which included two violations within three months and stated the order and rules for the hearing and stated the hearing was being recorded. Stagg, Public Works Director, explained they were responding to a water main break on June 20th on W. Bryant Street and the intersection of W. Bryant and S. Rowe was cordoned off with barricades, cones, and City vehicles with flashing lights on. He presented a map showing the location of vehicles, barricading, excavation, and Brus golf cart path through the repair area. Neal Krebs and Jamie Poggenpohl, Public Works employees, confirmed that Stagg's map was accurate and stated they had placed the cones in the places indicated on the map. Both confirmed that Brus had driven through the cones and through the repair area. Brus stated that he did not notice any cones. Aaron Hamilton with Needham Excavating stated he was the backhoe operator and there were cones or barricades around the intersection. He saw the golf cart drive through the repair area and he is irritated by citizens entering a construction area due to safety concerns. Zoe Needham with Needham Excavating and Hamilton confirmed that the map presented by Stagg was accurate and that Brus had entered and exited the repair area through the cones and past the dump truck. Brus stated his disagreement with the location of the excavation and vehicles shown on Stagg's map. He presented a map showing what he thought the locations were. Both Hamilton and Needham disagreed with Brus' map and again confirmed that Stagg's map indicated the accurate locations. Brus read his appeal letter indicating that he was just curious about the excavation, did not see any cones around the repair area, and just drove around the cones and past the cones and sund he responded

Huston stated that the City Attorney indicated that under the current Code they would have to revoke for 24 months, however if the Council agreed to change the Code, they could continue the decision until the Code could be changed. Approval to close Heritage Recreational Trail for Kids Run and Fireworks on July 14th. Bieri moved and Mengler seconded to close Heritage Recreational Trail at Prairie View Park for the kids run and fireworks on July 14th, with a rain date of July 15th. Motion carried.

Sanitary sewer is not available within 200 feet of the property, so a septic tank could be installed, unless the Council would approve running the line to within 200 feet. The Council determined the sewer line for just one home would be cost prohibitive, but questioned the possibility of rezoning the property from SA to R-1.
