# Abuse victim's family sues Eldridge and chief

An Eldridge couple that had publicly supported the city police department and chief Joe Sisler, has sued both alleging they ignored direct requests to



keep an officer away from their 14-year-old daughter.

The couple claims Chief Joe Sisler did not investigate their concerns raised at least four months before Andrew Denoyer's arrest on felony sex abuse charges for offenses committed

"..Chief Sisler was more concerned about the reputation of a sexual predator than the health, safety and welfare of Denoyer's

minor victim." Lawsuit against city of Eldridge and chief Joe Sisler

against the girl while on duty. Denoyer confessed, pleaded guilty and is serving a 10-year prison term for sexually abusing the girl.

The couple and their family, "were friends with Denoyer and his family,' and "were supportive of law enforcement," according to the suit. Both parents confronted Sisler publicly, on North Scott High School grounds.

The lawsuit alleges the family's claims

are supported by Eldridge police bodycam video showing Sisler deferring concerns and defending the officer. The suit names two other officers aware of the concerns.

'Chief Sisler stated he was concerned about Denoyer because Denoyer may be plagued by accusations. Chief Sisler was more concerned about the reputation of

# **Eldridge welcomes RILCO** with \$3.5 million tax break

Vapes lead high school discipline referrals

The North Scott School Board reviewed a partial discipline report for the 2022-2023 school year at its Monday meeting.

The board saw numbers for major referrals at the high school and junior high. A report for the elementary schools will be available at a future meeting.

At the high school, the greatest number of referrals, 39, were drug and vape related. This was up four from 2021-2022. Referrals for skipping class were up significantly over the previous school year, from eight to 36. Other discipline problems in the 2022-23 school year. (2022 esults in parenthesis):

Eldridge council members officially welcomed RILCO to town with a series of votes that implements the \$3.5 million in property tax rebates the council agreed to earlier this summer.

The votes create a new Lincoln-LeClaire Urban Renewal Plan that will allow the city to pay RILCO incentives, and consider similar tax breaks for four undeveloped lots that cover land east to Scott Park Road.

"We wanted to create a new district, on land where the future use is intended as industrial," said assistant city ad-ministrator Jeff Martens. Martens also serves as planning and code official.

"The new district is good for 20 years, and we can amend it in the future to include land farther south, as interest

The council votes on Sept. 5:

Altered the city's 30-year-old urban renewal plan by carving out 91.154 acres to create a separate urban renewal area.

Created the new, independent Lincoln-LeClaire urban renewal area.

Established a 10-year tax rebate deal for RILCO

The new plan authorizes the council to borrow against future tax revenue, but Martens said the intention is solely

communicating that, too. So it's kind of a lot of a collaborative effort.'

You look at a number on a report, and you say, 'oh, these are big numbers' or whatever," said Stutting. "We've all been walking through our buildings. I have no fear walking through our buildings. I know (people) are going to see kids engaged. There's not a lot of discipline problems.

He said there were occasional scuffles in the high school, but added, "all-out fights don't even happen, compared to maybe other districts.

"Our kids are engaged, from elementary, all the way through to high school. And when they're engaged, you have less discipline problems.

"I feel really good about what I see," Stutting continued. "I know you see a report, and numbers are numbers, but anecdotally ... we all have problems, don't get me wrong ... but it's a pretty good environment in every single one of the buildings.'

"You take a look at ... defiance, 55, when you've got almost 600 kids in your building," added Wood. "You know, 190

## Lancer stadium work begins Nov. 6, after last home game

### No home track meets next season

The North Scott school board approved several bid schedules for upcoming projects, including Lancer Stadium.

Stutting said demolition at Lancer Stadium was expected to begin on Nov. 6, after the last home football game. He also revealed that, due to the construction going through the spring, there would be no home track meets. "I haven't heard of a way where, if you start construction, you can save a track season."

He said the North Scott track team would host its relays off-site in the spring of 2024, with options for Brady Street Stadium, or the Bettendorf or Pleasant Valley tracks. "Even the practices will have to be modified," he added, saying there would only be threequarters of a track at any given time.

The Lancer Stadium project will be bid in two phases, due to needing lead time on ordering the bleachers. Bid packages will go out on Sept. 18 for Phase One, with bids due on Oct. 3. The board will approve the bids at the Oct. 9 meeting. Phase One includes demolition, foundation work, site work within the field, and the turf package.

Phase Two, for buildings and site work, will have bid documents go out on Oct. 30, with bids due on Nov. 16. The board will approve the bids at the Nov. 27 meeting.

Wood asked what would happen to the existing bleachers. Stutting said the smaller, portable bleachers on either side of the main bleachers will be moved to the soccer pitch. He said it was more than likely the main bleachers would be demolished for scrap.

### 27 meeting.

Stutting described the bid process for the wrestling facility as "a little bit complicated," because construction will have to be timed around the arrival of the mats, which will require 14 days to cure before they can be installed. He said they did not have a definite date for the arrival of the mats yet.

Phase One of the wrestling facility (wrestling rooms and lobby) will see bids due on Oct. 4, and the board will approve the bids on Oct. 9. Phase Two (locker rooms and accessory spaces) will see bids due on Dec. 7, with board approval on Dec. 18.

Board member Molly Bergfeld extended a thank you to volunteers who had helped with the interior demolition at the old Eldridge Rec & Fitness Center. Stutting said they had saved the school district approximately \$200,000 through their efforts.

Stutting and Bergfeld said the Lancer Stadium project is currently at about \$1 million over budget, but Stutting added that other projects, such as the welding lab, are currently under budget, and the district will also see some contingency funds from the softball field project coming back.

### **Construction update**

Stutting said the softball complex will be complete within the next 30 days. The press box will be installed by the end of this week. He said work on the concession stand and restrooms is nearly complete.

As to Alan Shepard, completion is nearing on the walls, and the roof will be going on soon. Crews worked at the site last Saturday, but work on the exterior was delayed due to

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# Benson pleads guilty

### Agreement includes \$36,346.20 restitution to Eldridge

Denise Benson's guilty plea on two of five criminal charges comes with a restitution order for \$36,346.20 to the city of Eldridge, for losses that totaled \$82,786.33.

Benson pleaded guilty Sept. 8 to first degree felony theft and non-felonious misconduct in office. County attorney agreed to dismiss charges of unauthorized use of a credit card, identity theft over \$10,000, and forgery.

Sentencing is scheduled for Dec. 8. The agreement does not specify any sentence. The county attorney is "free to make any recommendation following receipt and review of the pre-sentence investigation," according to the agreement.

"Should Defendant have a criminal history more extensive than that revealed in the pleadings, defendant violates the law or is arrested for further offenses, this agreement is voidable by the State. The State may withdraw any recommendation previously agreed to and the State may reinstate all charges covered by this agreement," assistant county attorney Steven Berger wrote in the agreement.

Eldridge police removed Benson from her clerk's office Oct. 4, 2022, and the city initiated a state audit. Audit results released May 25 found \$76,171.90 in improper disbursements.

Benson was charged June 14 with felony first-degree theft, forgery, identity theft and a misdemeanor count of misconduct in office

An Iowa state auditor's investigation found thefts mostly through Benson's use of city Amazon and other credit cards, from December 2016 through No-

vember 2022.

Almost all of Benson's credit card thefts were covered by city insurance. The city documented restitution of \$24,460, including a \$2,000 insurance deductible.

Theft of city funds deductible, \$2,000 Iowa state audit cost, \$10,000

Legal fees, \$6,975 Califf & Harper legal fees, \$4,985.

City credit card points redeemed, \$500

Two Eldridge council members hope a Scott County judge is mindful that Denise Benson's first felony was a series of thefts over at least six years.


"This may be her first offense technically, but it happened many times over the years," council member Bernie Peeters said Monday.

Council member Brian Dockery agreed.

"We should have restitution, so insurance shouldn't have to cover much," Dockery said. "I don't know if they consider this just a first offense, but this first offense occurred multiple times.

Hopefully, Courts will treat us equitably."

### Council OKs new townhome plan for Grunwald Grove

The Eldridge council approved the final of three readings applying a new, planned residential overlay district on the Grunwald Grove second addition already zoned R-3 for multifamily homes. The overlay district was created to allow developer Dale Grunwald to build attached, fourplex townhomes, instead of the condominium buildings allowed under R-3.

Builder Jim Rasche's Encore Homes LLC will construct the twostory townhomes.

The overlay creates 38 attached townhome lots accessible by private drives from the new Rosebud Circle, which has two entrances from West Lincoln Road. The 110-by-43-foot townhome buildings are 65-feet apart, and open to a 24-foot-wide street that will be maintained by a homeowners association.

The townhomes are surrounded by 22 single-home lots facing Redbud Circle.

Grunwald said he sought the change to accommodate buyers, who are more interested in townhomes than condos.

The council also accepted Grunwald's new final plat, which shows the townhome lots in place of the eight condo buildings. The council approval gives Grunwald one year to begin construction.

to rebate taxes to RILCO now, then consider similar incentives to others who develop in the new area. He said no citypaid infrastructure will be needed to accommodate the company.

RILCO is a Rock Island-based industrial lubricant supplier that intends to consolidate offices in Eldridge.

RILCO owner Conrad Wagner's GRT Eldridge Property LLC, bought the Petersen warehouse and adjoining lot Dec. 12 for \$12.05 million. The latest assessor valuation puts the warehouse property at \$7.5 million, and the 11.4-acre lot to the south at \$484,500. Combined, the current taxable value is just under \$8 million.

The new agreement requires RILCO to make renovations that bring the property value to at least \$13.9 million.

Company representatives plan extensive renovations to the current building, including creation of a corporate headquarters visible from U.S. 61. Much of that building has been vacant since 2012.

In May, RILCO executives told Eldridge council members the company planned a \$7.5 million renovation of the existing 328,000 square-foot building, plus a new 58,000 square-foot building to the south.

The company expects to consolidate jobs from throughout the Quad-Cities, and add "20 to 30" more. "Hourly rates range from \$17 to \$96 per hour. Of the 81 jobs created, 62 are in excess of 125 percent of the Scott County median income," the company wrote in its application for taxpayer help.

For RILCO, the council agreed to rebate up to \$3.5 million in city, school, county and other property taxes on the existing building, and a new one the company plans.

That includes a \$2.1 million rebate for RILCO's construction of a 58,000 squarefoot addition to the south.

RILCO initially sought a full rebate over 10 years. The council countered with rebates of 100 percent for the first six years, 90 percent in year seven; 80 percent in year eight; 70 percent in year nine and 60 percent in year 10.

The agreement also authorizes the city to pursue other development agreements within the area. "Such agree-ments are unknown at this time, but based on past history, and dependent on development opportunities and climate, the City expects to consider a broad range of incentives as authorized by this Plan, as amended, including, but not limited to, land, loans, grants, tax increment rebates, public infrastructure assistance, and other incentives. The costs of such development agreements will not exceed \$1,000,000.'

The agreement approved by council references a "hotel," among RILCO's commitment. Martens on Sept. 8 told The NSP that was an error by the law firm that prepared the agreement.

The new district expires in 2043, Martens said. Creation of the district required signatures from RILCO and the owners of four other parcels in the district, Martens said.

agement Trust, based in Bouton, Iowa. The council approved the first two readings in June by 4-1 votes, but waited on the final reading until they amended city code to allow consideration of more



industrial uses. Council member Brian Dockery initially voted, "no," in June, but voted "yes," last week. He had suggested the review of industrial uses, and on Sept. 5, supported the amendment that gives final authority for more industrial uses upon review by the appointed board of adjustment.

For general industry, the ordinance adds parking lots, landfills and outdoor storage among the uses the board of adjustment could approve on review.

The only prohibited uses in industrial areas are for dwellings, churches, schools, hospitals, clinics, and most salvage and junkyards.

The amended ordinance defers to the board of adjustment on any other uses.

### **Employee handbook changes**

Council members declined any action on Mayor Frank King's request for a vote affirming the authority of the city's current employee handbook.

"There is ongoing work that needs to be done on a new version that is floating around," King told the council. "We're continuing to work under the old structure that John Dowd did. There seems to be some conflict on that.'

The council has never publicly discussed handbook changes. Council member Brian Dockery said, " I don't know why there would be any confusion on this. For the record, we continue to operate under the law we have until we change it.

King did not elaborate to council members about his reasons to seek the vote.

He did appear at the Eldridge Electric and Water Utility Board meeting an hour before the Sept. 5 council meeting. At that time, King asked the board for clarification on utility board structure in relation to the city administrator and council.

Utility lineman Tate Olson also attended. According to the meeting minutes, "Olson spoke on behalf of (utility line foreman) Jacob Rowe and urged the board to come together to a solution regarding the utility organizational chart." Rowe also attended the utility board meeting.

### **Paving Sheridan Meadows parking lot**

The new contract will surface a park-ing lot that serves the ball diamonds at Sheridan Meadows Park.

"The current parking lot is gravel, which is a heavy maintenance item. Additionally, it is difficult for those needing wheelchairs or walkers to traverse the loose gravel. Vandalism is also a common occurrence on the gravel parking lot," public works director Brian Wessel, and sewer plant superintendent Tony Rupe wrote to council.

The work continues accessibility improvements to the park. "Once the parking lot is complete, city staff will begin working on a plan to make the final gravel portions across the creek and to the restrooms ADA accessible," the two department heads wrote.

### New insurance agent

The city has contracted with Eldridgebased KLD Insurance Consultants for employee health benefit insurance.

City administrator Nevada Lemke said she authorized the change from North Risk Insurance because KLD offers the same products, but is local. She said commissions remain the same.

KLD owner Kari DeCasteker first pitched council members at an Oct. 3, 2022, meeting.

 Filled vacancies on the stormwater advisory board by reappointing Steve Puls to a six-year term, and adding new members Ryan Iossi and assistant city administrator Jeff Martens to six-year terms, and Jennifer Vittorio to a twovear term.

· Approved resident Jerry Downs request to vacate the city's drainage easement across his property at 717 St. Andrews Circle.

The corner lot includes a backyard abutting Lincoln Road that includes a 25-foot easement for drainage from surrounding lots. The city's engineer, code enforcement officer and Planning and Zoning commissioners backed Downs' observation that no other lots drain into the easement.

'We agree that the final grading on lots 6, 7 and 8 is different from what was shown on the final plans," code enforcement officer Jeff Martens wrote to the council.

"My wife and I greatly enjoy living in Eldridge," Downs wrote to the council. "We like the community and peacefulness of the city. Removal of the easement would allow us to fence our entire back property and would allow us to more fully utilize the area for our grandkids and ourselves."

### **POLICE:** Parents say they asked chief Sisler to keep officer away from girl

a sexual predator than the health, safety and welfare of Denoyer's minor victim," according to the lawsuit.

Attorneys for the city of Eldridge and its police chief say Sisler never knew specific allegations of sexual abuse. The city's response, filed Sept. 1, also disputes the (couples') interpretation of officers' body cam videos. The city of Eldridge also denied liability, citing state law, and a 2023 Iowa Supreme Court ruling that shielded the city of Muscatine from an officer's on-duty rape in 2013.

*The NSP* is not naming the plaintiffs to avoid pubicly identifying the teenager.

In a statement released Monday after *NSP* calls, Sisler wrote, "the city has no further comment."

"The city is aware of a lawsuit filed by the ... family regarding a former police officer. It referred the lawsuit to legal council," Sisler wrote.

On Monday, Mayor Frank King deferred any comment to the city's insurance firm attorneys, who are representing the city and the chief. King said Sisler remains on the job.

"It is an ongoing thing. Until we hear more back, the city doesn't have any comment," King told *The NSP*.

Council members Brian Dockery, Bruce Cheek and Bernie Peeters confirmed the suit. All said they had not read the lawsuit.

Council members Dan Collins, and Adrian Blackwell did not return calls from *The NSP*.

### **Concerns arise in 2021**

The father of the girl was among Eldridge residents who publicly defended Sisler at a crowded, May 19, 2021, Eldridge council meeting. That's when Sisler apologized for his remarks at a previous meeting when he accused the council of ignoring police concerns.

The father stood to defend the chief: "Don't ever apologize for being passionate about your job. Take pride in your passion," he said.

"Denoyer, as part of his official duties and while on duty as a police officer, would often park in the driveway of plaintiffs' home while he completed paperwork related to his police work," the couple allege in the lawsuit filed Aug. 9 in Scott County District Court.

The couple's lawsuit claims that in spring of 2021, an Eldridge citizen

complained to the Eldridge Police Department, "over concerns about how frequently and for how long Denoyer's police vehicle was parked at the family's home," according to the suit.

Shortly after, the couple and their daughter attended a party at Denoyer's home, where other Eldridge officers were present. The lawsuit alleges the girl became drunk on alcohol provided by Denoyer.

"Upon discovering their daughter's consumption of alcohol, the (couple) became upset and proceeded to leave the party to take (the girl) home.

"While the (the couple) were leaving the party, Denoyer's father-in-law stated his belief that Denoyer was sexually abusing (the girl). The (couple) heard this statement, as did some of the Eldridge Police officers at the party," the family alleges in the lawsuit. The lawsuit claims the father told Sisler about his suspicions, and Sisler asked him to file a written statement. That statement detailed the suspicions, asked for a police investigation, and requested Denoyer have no contact with the girl.

"Instead, Chief Sisler ignored the (couple's) report, ignored their request that Denoyer have no contact with (the girl), and ignored their request that Chief Sisler investigate the allegation of Denoyer's sexual abuse...," according to the lawsuit.

Instead, the suit alleges Sisler "told Denoyer to stay away from (the couple), but did not tell Denoyer to stay away," from the girl. Rather, Chief Sisler merely told Denoyer to do his 'due diligence' when having contact," with the girl.

The suit alleges Denoyer ignored that request.

The couple claims Denoyer pulled the father over Aug. 25, 2021 in Eldridge.

"Denoyer knew it was (the father's) car when he pulled him over. Denoyer issued (the father) a warning for tinted windows; however, Denoyer himself had recommended the tinting to (the father). Denoyer pulled (him) over to harass him and send a message to the (family)."

The suit alleges that Denoyer was sexually abusing the teen at the time, including while on duty.

"Because of the information in the possession of Chief Sisler and the City of Eldridge, Denoyer's ongoing sexual abuse ... was expected, foreseeable, and sanctioned.

"Members of the Eldridge Police Department knew Denoyer was sexually

"Chief Sisler knew (the girl) attended that school. Despite this, and despite being told three months earlier that the (couple) had reason to suspect that Denoyer was sexually abusing (the girl), Chief Sisler allowed Denoyer, a sexual predator, to go to the school and interact with children.

The suit said the mother alerted Eldridge school resource officer Jack Schwertman that Denoyer was not supposed to have contact with the girl, and asked to speak with Sisler.

"Instead of taking appropriate action against Denoyer, Chief Sisler instructed his officers to arrest (the mother) if she did not 'calm down,'" according to the lawsuit.

"Officers Schwertman and (deputy chief Andrew) Lellig stated that (the mother) was the problem, not Denoyer," according to the lawsuit.


The lawsuit includes details the couple drew from Eldridge police officer body cam video.

The father arrived at the school minutes later, and confronted Sisler. "As captured on Officer Lellig's body camera, Chief Sisler responded, 'Why don't you grow up a little bit..."

The suit alleges Sisler "got in (the father's) face in an aggressive and threatening manner."

It also claims Sisler threatened arrest of a principal who witnessed the interaction.

"Before the principal could say anything, Chief Sisler ordered the principal to go back into the school or Chief Sisler would charge him with interference with official acts," according to the suit.

abusing (the girl). Despite this, the Eldridge Police Department did nothing.

"It was common knowledge within the Eldridge Police Department that Denoyer was a sexual predator who targets underage girls," according to the lawsuit.

The suit claims officer Tony Cavanaugh, "was present when Denoyer was talking to an underage girl about oral sex. ...The girl told Denoyer she was a minor. Denoyer responded by saying he would look her up when she turned eighteen. Officer Cavanaugh simply laughed at Denoyer's statement."

### **Confrontation at school**

The lawsuit describes a Sept. 23, 2021, confrontation at an Eldridge school, where (the mother) arrived to pick up her daughter, who was ill.

"To her shock and disgust, Denoyer was in the auditorium with (the girl), holding her hand. There was no reason for Denoyer to be with (the girl), as the school nurse was present."

The family learned that Sisler had scheduled Denoyer to make a presentation to a student assembly. The suit said police video shows:

\* "Sisler told (the mother) that he did not know what the allegations about Denoyer ... were, and that he would love to have a written report on the subject. This was false. (The father) had given Chief Sisler the information in a written statement three months earlier."

\* "Sisler stated there was nothing in the statement about inappropriate behavior. This was false.

\* "Sisler stated that, if he were (the mother), he would be more concerned about his daughter's health than who was holding her hand." He said, "Denoyer holding (her) hand had nothing to do with the allegations of an inappropriate relationship."

\*"Sisler stated that he had gone beyond what he should do to address the report of one of his officer's sexual abuse of a minor child. This was false," according to the lawsuit.

The day after the confrontation at school, the family contacted the Scott County Sheriff's Department. Deputies

alerted the Iowa Division of Criminal Investigation, which initiated an investigation. Denoyer was arrested four days later, Sept. 28. He pleaded guilty, June 14, 2022, and was sentenced to 10 years in prison July 29.

He began his term Aug. 8, 2022, and remains at the Newton Correctional Facility.

### City denies actions, liability

The city's Sept. 1 response to the lawsuit denies most of the family's claims. Twelve times, the city said the family's account is "a mischaracterization," of the body cam video. Nine times, the city asserts "Chief Sisler had no knowledge about the allegations regarding sexual abuse," as of Sept. 23.

Attorneys for the city deny any officer overheard the sex abuse allegations made by Denoyer's father-in-law at the May 15 party.

The city claims, "on June 23, 2021 – more than a month after the May 15, 2021, graduation party ... (the father) contacted Chief Sisler and vaguely said he had a problem with Denoyer, and he wanted him to stay away from the ... family. In response, Chief Sisler asked (the father) to come to the police department and file a complaint."

According to the city's response:

"When (the father) came to the police station on June 23, 2021, he did not fill out a complaint against Denoyer, but instead only prepared a written statement. The written statement prepared by (the father) speaks for itself. It is admitted that in the written statement (the father) refers to the comments allegedly made by Denoyer's father-in-law at the May 15, 2021, party.

"However, when (the father) prepared the statement, he told Chief Sisler he did not want the police department to do anything with the written statement, and he did not want to get Denoyer into trouble, he just wanted the statement to be filed. Therefore, Chief Sisler did not review the written statement, and placed it in a file," the city of Eldridge attorneys claimed in their response.

The city attorneys say, "following the meeting with (the father), Chief Sisler told Denoyer that he should avoid contact with the ... family."

The city denies that Sisler "led the (family) to believe the department would investigate..."

The city also denied any knowledge of Denoyer's performance concerns as a

Davenport police officer before he joined the Eldridge force. The city alleges the family has, "thus far refused to provide proof of any such claims."

The city claims Sisler sent Eldridge officer Schwertman to the family's home, Sept. 23, just hours after the confrontation at school.

"The conversation at the (family's) residence was over an hour long and the meeting was captured on body camera. Despite Chief Sisler's request to the (the family) to prepare a report, they failed to appear on September 24, 2021," the city alleges.

The city claims Sisler called the Iowa DCI to request an investigation.

Denoyer's offenses were first disclosed publicly Sept. 28 by an Iowa Department of Public Safety release about his arrest. That statement said DCI was alerted by Scott County Sheriff's deputies.

#### Liability shields

The city's response includes two affirmative defenses that claim state law and case law shield it from liability in this case.

State code 670.4 expressly exempts "any claims for punitive damages," in this case, according to the city.


The city response also cites Code 670.12: "All officers and employees of municipalities are not personally liable for claims which are exempted under section 670.4... An officer or employee of a municipality is not liable for punitive damages as a result of acts in the performance of a duty, unless actual malice or willful, wanton and reckless misconduct is proven."

The city's response also cites a new case law where an appellate court judge dismissed any liability for the city of Muscatine after an officer committed an on-duty rape. Thomas Tovar raped the companion of a drunk driver. He was on duty when returning her to a hotel room. He was criminally convicted in 2014. The Iowa Supreme Court on June 9 this year ruled the victim could not seek damages from the city of Muscatine.

The city's response emphasizes Denoyer's liability.

"While the City and Sisler deny all liability to plaintiffs related to Denoyer's acts, should any liability or judgment be rendered against them, they move for a judgment in contribution and/or indemnity and/or equitable indemnity against Denoyer."

The city and Sisler demanded a jury trial.



### **CITY RESPONSE TO LAWSUIT**

"Chief Sisler sent Officer Schwertman to the (couple's) house to follow up to get more information related to the allegations involving Denoyer... that the (couple) brought to their attention during the discussion at the high school. The conversation at the (couple's) residence was over an hour long and the meeting was captured on body camera. Despite Chief Sisler's request to the (couple) to prepare a report, they failed to appear on September 24, 2021. Chief Sisler called the lowa Department of Criminal Investigation (DCI) himself...on September 24, 2021, to report the information he learned about Denoyer the day before."

Per Chief Sisler's request, the DCI opened the investigation which ultimately proved that Denoyer engaged in three counts of sexual abuse of the minor."

### **Elected officials respond**

### **Mayor Frank King**

"The city of Eldridge is aware of the lawsuit. Right now, we've referred this all to our legal counsel for review and to represent the interest of the city. We just don't have any comment, because it is pending."

"I've read what it said. It's an ongoing thing. Until we hear more back, the city doesn't have any comment.

### **Brian Dockery**

"I can't talk about it. I don't know anything about police cam videos. I have not read the lawsuit. Our insurance carrier's attorneys are handling it. We haven't discussed a whole lot about it at council at all. There's a process. We've got to go through discovery before we know the facts."

### **Bernie Peeters**

"There's nothing to know yet. They haven't given us a copy. I did not know there were any videos available. It's not like we get informed of all this stuff way ahead of time. We've been told there was an investigation, and a lawsuit, briefly that things dealt with Denoyer.

We have not discussed that in any official capacity. I was briefed on it maybe twice. Until I get information from official sources, I can't say."

### **Bruce Cheek**

"I really don't have any idea at this time. It's an ongoing thing. I shouldn't be talking about it because I don't know anything yet."

Cheek said he had not read the lawsuit and was not aware it had been publicly filed.

Cheek said he consulted with Mayor King after being called by *The NSP*. Cheek said council member Bernie Peeters arrived at King's auto shop with a copy of the suit provided by *The NSP*.

Council members Dan Collins and Adrian Blackwell did not return calls from *The NSP*.

be worked out, including the volume on the system. "There were some neighbors that I talked to, and we were able to adjust some of the zones."

"I didn't realize how passionate she was for a lot of the same things we are," he said. "It was a really neat opportunity to get to talk to her."

Knoche also told the board about a visit from the North Scott Class of 1973. He said that his tours usually last about an hour, but members of the class asked many questions, and their visit ended up lasting nearly three hours. "They let me know they wanted to know about all the construction going on in the district and the future.

"That was pretty neat. They're excited - the school has changed a lot, the high school itself. But to see what's going on at the other buildings was pretty neat.'

He said several classes from the 1970s would possibly be back for Homecoming and were exploring donating to the Lancer Legacy Fund.

Stutting also commended staff throughout the district for working to comply with a series of new laws passed by the Iowa Legislature in the last session. "Our staff, making the adjustments, with the new state laws, they're doing it. It's not always clear. But I've got to give our staff credit. They know the work's there; they're doing the work."

Bergfeld asked Stutting about open positions throughout the district. He said there were still special education teaching and aide positions open, as well as some coaching jobs. He added that he was working to determine the number of extracurricular activity advisor positions, such as Lego League at the elementary schools, that were still open. "If we don't have that filled (the kids) don't get that experience," he said. He said many of the advisor positions do not require a coaching endorsement, and only need to pass a background check.

Knoche said he was excited about the teacher apprenticeship program, which could help fill the special education slots the near future. "The neat thing about all of these candidates is they're candidates that already know what it takes, because they're in that (program), and that's pretty powerful in itself."

"No surprises when they graduate and are in the real world," added Bergfeld.



# Private pipeline meeting leaves leaders with more questions

### Wolf Carbon meets chiefs, mayors and superintendent at Donahue fire station

Wolf Carbon Solutions' pipeline path through Scott County would come within 1,400 feet of Donahue's Glenn Elementary, and be about 700 feet from the closest residence, company representatives told county officials at a private meeting in August.

Wolf Carbon Solutions' meeting with rural fire chiefs, some elected officials and a school district representative left mixed impressions on those attending.

County board chairman Ken Beck called the two-hour long, Aug. 23 meet-

ing at the Donahue fire station, "very productive from my perspective.'

But two mayors, a fire chief and a county planning board member thought differently.

Donahue mayor and firefighter Ken Schoenthaler said he convened the Aug. 23 meeting to give his public safety colleagues a chance to directly ask Wolf about the pipeline path they are negotiating through the county.

They'd reached out to me. I said I'd like you guys to talk to the other mayors in the line that goes out from Dixon all the way to Princeton, with representatives of school district and superintendent, so you'll understand the impact you're having on North Scott county; so they can realize at end of day, they picked the worst possible route.'

Schoenthaler said he targeted invitations to assure no elected board would have a quorum in violation of open meetings laws.


He said participants included Long Grove mayor Mike Limberg, Eldridge mayor Frank King, Eldridge council member and firefighter Dan Collins, Long Grove fire chief Josh Roe, county planning and zoning board member Joan Maxwell, Donahue farmer and pipeline opponent Amy Nelson and North Scott schools superintendent Joe Stutting. Representatives from Dixon, also attended.

"It was a very sparse group. We just wanted to have an informal. let's get to know each other, let's talk this out without name-calling and fit-throwing session," Schoenthaler said.

Schoenthaler said Wolf representative Todd Peterson attended.

The NSP on Sept. 1 sought input from Wolf Carbon about the meeting. Wolf senior vice president of corporate development, Nick Noppinger responded by directing the NSP to the Washington D.C.-based Locust Street Group.

Locust Street Group did not respond to a Sept. 4 emailed request from The

NSP.

The Iowa Utility Board is considering carbon waste pipeline proposals from Wolf and two other firms. State law gives the IUB sole authority. Iowa legislators declined to consider changes in that law, including the code that empowers the IUB to grant eminent domain rights for private developers.

County board chairman Beck disclosed the Wolf meeting at supervisors' Aug. 31 public meeting.

"A few of mayors felt they didn't get the information they were looking for. But I explained to them, this was a meeting Wolf was looking to get information from them and what they needed," Beck said.

Beck told supervisors that Wolf reppath about 1,400 feet from Glenn Elementary. "The closest residence would be 700 feet. Those were numbers I hadn't heard before. But this is a work in progress," Beck told supervisors.

"From what came out of that meeting, I think Wolf got a pretty good eye opener how this county works, especially on emergency response from fire districts, he told supervisors.

He said firefighters wanted to learn the training and equipment needed to respond to liquid carbon spills.

"As it was said to them, we don't have money to do that, so Wolf, it's your responsibility. We didn't ask for this to come through, so you need to provide the training. From that standpoint, I think Wolf got the picture and understood. I think mayors were looking for a

Long Grove mayor Mike Limberg was among them.

"The way they were talking, it made it sound like it was a done deal; and we all know, IUB has final word," Limberg said. "The two who spoke were very personable. It's great they traveled as far as they did. But they made it sound as if it was done. The tone was, this is what's happening.

"I appreciate the fact they offered more assurances of safety aspects, but I'm not so sure it's not just smoke and mirrors."

Long Grove fire chief Josh Roe agreed.

"We got a lot of smoke, I think. We didn't get any real square answers on anything. Someone questioned about how many feet from schools. They said 1,400. Where'd they come up with that number? We don't know. What equipment do we need? They don't know."

County planning and zoning board member Joan Maxwell, of Donahue, said she came loaded with questions, most of which remain unanswered.

"They didn't say how many people they've talked to, or percentages of how many across Iowa have signed up. How close are you to laying pipe in the ground? We don't know. How many have said yes? We don't have a number. I didn't capture a whole lot out of it," she said.

She and her husband, John, own Cinnamon Ridge Dairy Farm, and are among those approached by Wolf to negotiate an easement. John Maxwell is a county supervisor and North Scott board member. Joan Maxwell said she attended because her husband could not.

Both Maxwells said they rejected easement offers. Joan Maxwell worries

that Wolf is securing easements before those property owners and their neighbors have any clue about safety.

"They're going out talking to landowners, trying to pit landowners against each other.

All they look at is that one little narrow path. They're affecting any possible expansion of our farm, or any changes we want to make. It's not right," she said.

She also does finances for the Donahue fire department.

"They really don't know what's going on at the local level," she said. "If more equipment needs to be purchased, or ongoing training, where is that coming from? Our budget already is at the max.'

She said Wolf representatives did not understand the regional collaboration rural fire departments rely on.

"They didn't understand how fire department are funded. They didn't understand you just don't train fire departments along the pipeline. Everyone needs to know," she said.

They seemed unaware that Park View relies on Long Grove volunteer firefighters, or that hazardous material emergencies rely on back up from Bettendorf and Davenport.

"I went to the meeting because John wasn't able to. I didn't realize I'd actually be feeding them information," she said.

Donahue fire chief Schoenthaler called the meeting, "a conversation starter."

'No one at Wolf can now say they don't understand our concerns. They picked an extremely bad route to go because of all the different things it touches, our comprehensive plans and growth potential and property values. I'm not going to get into the farmer side and that. That's not my thing. I'm on their side. But this was primarily set up for municipalities

to air their concerns about what's going on. I think they know. I think they understand."

A key point is that the pipeline affects growth plans already in place by the cities in its path.

"As all of us are growing. Eldridge and Long Grove, someday, are going to grow together. North Scott is a growing, vibrant area. They will say you already have natural gas lines going through there, this isn't any different. Well, yeah, it is," Schoenthaler said. "What kind of growth do you see when people see an asphyxiant line going through there?"

Like Joan Maxwell, Schoenthaler said he's concerned that negotiations are proceeding before any federal or state safety rules have been drawn up for liquid carbon pipelines.

The pipeline is being championed and funded by ADM to remove liquid waste from plants in Clinton and Cedar Rapids. Wolf hopes the pipeline will draw more industry to Iowa that produces carbon waste.

The liquid residue from ethanol manufacturing would be piped to central IIlinois, for underground injection into an existing ADM well near Decatur.

Schoenthaler said rural towns and fire departments are pretty much on their own. Scott County supervisors in July abandoned talks of local regulations af-

ter other counties were sued by pipeline companies for similar regulations.

"The problem you get into, is there's so much money out there, counties could go broke with lawsuits; so I can see why county is hesitant to get into legal spitting match with these guys, because the pockets are so deep. You're talking ADM and all that. And the governor's on their side and the whole Republican party. But I'm not going to completely throw the Republican party under the bus. This whole carbon idea came from the Biden administration," he said.

# Scott County juvenile center leads Iowa in right direction

Over the last several years, I have had the pleasure of watching the evolution of The Scott County Youth Justice & Rehabilitation Center, which has been a true testament of what authentic youth and family engagement should look like.

The leadership and staff in both the community-based programs and the detention center demonstrate passion and authentically com-

Iowa Juvenile Court Service Transition/ Reentry Program Manager mitting themselves to bridging the gap between generations, creating meaningful connections, and empowering youth and their families in our community. In fiscal year 2022, 73 percent of the

73 percent of the youth admitted to the Youth Justice & Rehabilitation Center identified as youth of color. There has been a significant decrease in the number of youth admitted to the detention center over

the last five years. In fiscal year 2018, 351 youth were admitted to the detention center and in fiscal year 2022 there was about a 45 percent drop to 157 youth. We certainly could attribute some of this to COVID, but more importantly the organization increased the community services offered.

The Center currently offers community-based services such as in-home detention, enhanced in-home GPS detention, auto theft accountability, youth centered planning meetings, school families to accept interventions and create environments both in detention and in the community that are inclusive and supportive, leading to stronger social cohesion.

The Youth Justice and Rehabilitation Center staff have focused on empowering youth for success in school, home, and the community. The staff focus on inspiring and empowering the youth by providing mentorship, educational opportunities, and platforms for their voices to be heard.

In fiscal year 2022, the school-based Restorative Mediation Program served 570 unduplicated youth with 94 percent completing mediation successfully. There were also zero instances of further fights after completion.

The staff providing these services not only provide mediation in the schools, but frequently you will find them checking in with youth after services or the youth reaching out looking for additional guidance and support. Staff have continued to mentor some of the youth months after the services have ended to help the youth stay focused and on track.

This program also accessed available funding to expand connection to social services in the community. Recently, they provided 100 summer passes in the Davenport area which included access to the YMCA, swimming pools, museums, and baseball games.

Eighty-six percent of the youth who've successfully completed the Auto Theft Accountability program have not reoffended six months post program completion, and 79 percent of youth have not reoffended one year post program completion.

In the detention setting, staff have been able to engage the youth and uplift their voices to provide feedback and ideas to new strategies such as Positive Behavior Intervention Support (PBIS). PBIS is an evidence-based incentive model aimed at focusing on youth's strengths and positive reinforcement. PBIS implementation phase began in January 2022 and it's the first detention center in Iowa to implement this model.

The staff can now be seen as more of a coach than a referee in the detention setting. By developing healthy and positive relationships with the youth and their family, it has allowed for shared ownership in creating a safe and healthy setting. The youth assisted in creating their new point sheets and incentives that strictly focus on positive reinforcement as opposed to a deficit-based approach.

One major impact to this new system has been in-room confinement, which has decreased by 99 percent, averaging at just about 1.35 hours per month in 2023.

Since implementation, the Center has seen about a 60 percent decrease in staff assaults and school refusals have been cut in half. The detention center also offers the youth opportunity to engage with other volunteers outside of the detention center.

It's rare that the center doesn't have volunteers actively participating in weekly activities such as trauma informed yoga, Life's of Legacy, spirituality groups, and young men's groups. This allows for the youth to have positive trusting relationships with community members when they are released from detention.

When youth have experienced transferring from detention to a more long-term out of home placement, it's not uncommon for the detention staff to continue to stay a part of the youth's treatment team whether it's communication by phone or approved visits in the new setting.

Through these interventions, youth and families are positively impacted by increasing the number of formal and informal supports, connecting to long term resources, engaging in prosocial activities, and becoming more selfaware of their strengths, talents, and skills. In a previous position, I was able to hear firsthand from youth and witness the Youth Justice and Rehabilitation Center staff employ key elements to authentic youth and family engagement such as nurturing strong family bonds and empowering youth for success. The staff have been committed to fostering strong familial relationships. They promote open communication, respect, and mutual support among family members. Although their services are geared towards working with the youth individually, the staff take the time to build relationships and trust with the caregivers as they recognize that a resilient and united family unit forms the foundation for positive development. With this type of focus, the staff have been able to connect the youth and families to longerterm services to meet and address the underlying issues.

### Diversion success in Scott County

In FY22, the school-based restorative mediation program had 798 youth referred from 11 different secondary schools in the Davenport, Bettendorf, and North Scott school districts.

570 of those youth were unduplicated. 228 youth were referred more than

once for having verbal or physical altercations with other students.

747 completed a successful mediation and/or were able to resolve the issue without a mediation. Overall 94 percent of youth referred participated in a successful mediation and/or created a plan to ensure cooperation between the parties in the future.

51 youth did not complete a successful mediation due to having one or both youth refuse to participate, or one youth did not return to school.

The staff help foster new relationships between the family and providers by taking time to build trusted relationships between themselves and other providers. For example, diversion staff meet bi-monthly with various service providers and school liaison's allowing them to discuss successful approaches working with specific youth and families and for shared accountability to helping the youth be successful in the school settings. Leaders in the diversion services have also spent time providing training opportunities to other professionals on how to effectively engage vouth and their families in services. The Scott County community is very fortunate to have the Youth Justice and Rehabilitation Center as partners in the juvenile justice continuum of services where there is a shared vision of authentic youth and family engagement. This type of partnership and collaboration will increase our initiatives to help address social issues, reduce youth vulnerabilities, and increase community resilience.'


### Memories



### NORTH SCOTT GOLF Adkisson wins River King Invite; Lancers take second

### North Scott puts two golfers in top four in best tournament finish of year

If one were to script a perfect bounceback week for North Scott's boys' golf team, it probably looked like what transpired at Valley Oaks Golf Course last Thursday.

North Scott went shot-for-shot with MAC juggernaut Pleasant Valley for most of the day and finished in second place with a team score of 300 — its best of the season by eight strokes.

The team did not leave empty-handed as freshman Jaxon Adkisson won the tournament with a one-under 71, beating out Spartan Ethan Blomme by one shot.

"It was kind of a strange tournament... for the first six to eight holes, I didn't talk to Jaxon or see him at all. (The groups) got really spaced out," Lancer coach Mike Wuertz said. "By the time Jaxon was through six holes, I hadn't talked to him or anything.

"I went over and talked to his dad, and he said Jaxon was doing well. So, I let him be... Pretty much every time I went up to watch Jaxon, he was making a putt.'

Adkisson was actually four-under through 13 holes before two holes dinged up his card.

"The fact that he got to four-under-par was really encouraging because that is a really tough course," Wuertz said. "There are a lot of holes where you can make a big number. There are a lot of penalty and out-of-bounds areas. It was really impressive. I know he had bad holes on 14 and 15, but otherwise, he played pretty much flawless golf.'

Teammate Jack Gomez was not far behind on the leaderboard as he also posted a season-best round.

The junior carded a two-over 74 and

placed fourth at the tournament.

"Jack just played really steadily," Wuertz said. "He didn't make a ton of birdies, but he made a lot of pars and putted pretty well.

"He's capable of shooting really low and has the potential to play as well as anybody in the whole state. It was good to see him turn it around a little bit. I know he changed a couple of things up with his game since the last meet, so it was good to see that it worked out for him.'

Rounding out the Lancers on the scoreboard were junior Evin Pieper (T11, 77), senior Keaton Kress (T13, 78), junior Wade Briggs (T17, 81) and sophomore Spencer Voss (T26, 88).

Kress also shot a season-best round, which could give him a much-needed confidence boost going into the back half of the season.

"Keaton hit the ball really well and, for the most part, chipped and putted re-ally well too," Wuertz said. "He's a really talented player. He just needs to have a little more confidence sometimes, and I think that round on Thursday will help him get there."

Behind Pleasant Valley and North Scott on the team leaderboard were Central DeWitt (316), Davenport Assumption (325), Burlington (341), Davenport North (351), Clinton (375) and Davenport West (376).

And were it not for a few bad holes toward the end of the meet, the Lancers had a shot to win the event as a team.

But nevertheless, this meet was a huge confidence booster after falling short of expectations last week and losing sophomore Vaughn Roseman for the season.

"Sometimes, when you lose one of your best players, it makes everyone want to step up more," Wuertz said. "Not that we want to play without Vaughn — we want him to be there. But I think that's what happened. We were right there with Pleasant Valley the whole time, and it was exciting to watch."

This coming week's meet will offer

a bit of home cooking in an unconventional way.

"I've played Palmer probably a thousand times," Wuertz, a graduate of Bettendorf High School, joked. "They have changed the course a little bit in the last 10 years, but it's a really nice course... You just have to keep the ball in play. The greens are pretty fast, so staying below the hole as much as you can is key.

"It's challenging, but hopefully we can build up the momentum we got last week, and hopefully it's another good meet for us."

### After 3-0 start, NS falls in championship game to fourth-ranked Xavier

There is certainly no shame in falling to the fourth-best team in Class 4A. But there's no doubt North Scott (No. 5 in 4A) left The Pit on Saturday wanting more.

In three tough sets with brutal ballstriking from both sides, the Lancers lost 14-21, 21-19, 10-15 to the defending Class 4A state champs.

"That was the one we were looking forward to, but I'm proud of how my kids responded," Lancer coach Taryn Van Earwage said. "We could have folded in that second set, and it was cool to see their grit, determination and willingness to do whatever it took to win that set.

"It definitely sucks to lose, but we can learn and grow from that."

This match was for the title of Lancer Volleyball Invitational Champions after both teams cruised through the first three rounds of pool play.

Neither team had dropped a set to that point, with North Scott recording quick wins over Davenport West (21-12, 21-10), Moline (21-6, 21-11) and Bettendorf (21-7, 21-12).

The Lancers only won consecutive points twice in the first set while Xavier went on runs of three straight points four times.

The second set was a different story as North Scott jumped out to a 6-2 lead and was able to hold the slight edge all the way to the finish line despite tough resistance from the Saints.

In tournament play like this, the Lancers emphasize these fast starts more than in best-of-five matches as there is a reduced window to make up for a slow start.

"Best of three is definitely a different game," senior Georgia Brunkan said. 'You can't mess around in the first cou-

ple points. You have to start right away.' The first 20 points of the decider could not have been tighter as neither team extended beyond a two-point lead.

But Xavier buckled down and coaxed a number of errors from the Lancers' side to win the final five points and take the set, and the match, 15-10.

"In pressure situations, we need to force the other team to earn their points," Van Earwage said. "(In the third set) there were nine errors that they literally didn't have to do anything for. Especially when you are playing to 15 in those shorter sets, we don't have the room for as many errors.<sup>3</sup>

"Even though we did lose, I think Xavier was definitely our best match. Just the drive that we had and the energy we had, we just need to carry that throughout the whole season."

Van Earwage agreed with the senti-ment. She said, "Yes, we lost, but I saw the potential of how good we could be. And I saw really good team volleyball. That's something we look for all the time, especially when we play against

high-level teams."

Across the four games, junior Abbey Hayes led the Lancers with 29 kills with senior Kaci Johnson (21) and junior Emee Allard (18) also packing serious punches.

Senior Emma Schermerhorn continues to lead the way in the assist department, racking up 42 on Saturday. Johnson was heavily involved here too and contributed 40.

Not one, not two, but 26 Lancers across the varsity and junior varsity squads set personal records last Thursday at Seminole Valley Park.

"Ava has been racing really well. Stretching back to last season she has PR'd in 8 out of her last 9 races which is unbelievable," Knoche said. "Last season was her first year running crosscountry and we are just seeing constant, consistent improvement.

Overall, the North Scott boys (326 points) finished in 11th place out of 18 teams at the race with Cedar Rapids Kennedy (39), Pleasant Valley (52) and Cedar Rapids Prairie (100) taking the top three spots.

On the girls' side, Pleasant Valley (34) got into the top spot with Ankeny Centennial (61) the only other team under 140.

Ankeny Centennil had both of the individual winners, however, with Anika Mohrhauser winning the girls' race (18:18.84) and AJ Schermerhorn (15:13.48) winning the boys' race.

In case all of the personal records set on Thursday weren't enough motivation to keep getting better, a trip to Scott County Park should do the trick.

The Lancer Cross-Country Meet, which took place on Tuesday, is one the Lancers look forward to every year and it is an opportunity they don't take for granted.

"We are blessed with a beautiful park that we are able to practice in at Scott County Park," Knoche said. "Our course is tough, but our kids practice out there multiple times per week and are very familiar with our course and know when they can push the pace.

"It's always fun to race with your home crowd cheering for you. The kids realize they are fortunate to get to compete on our normal course so I think their efforts will reflect that."
