Planning a Private Pool Oasis

Saying goodbye to the public pool and hello to your own backyard oasis is a big step.

Before you get too deep into dreaming of lying poolside just steps from home, however, there are a few things to consider.

UTILITIES

Look around your yard and see whether there are any overhead wires or other utilities that need to be moved. If so, bear in mind that they will be moved at your expense and on the utility company's timeline. Call about any underground utilities. Check on your original house plans or make a free 811 call to confirm what's under your yard. Check for easements on your property while you're talking to utility companies and the city or county records offices.

TERRAIN

While you're looking for utility lines, notice how your yard is shaped. If you're on a hill at all or have a dip in the yard, you may have to have a retaining wall or dirt work done before the pool can go in. It's expensive but pales in comparison to having to fix the damage if your pool slides suddenly into your neighbor's yard.

Make sure there's enough room for heavy building equipment to access the area where you want the pool.



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Dump trucks, concrete mixers and more may need to get into your yard, and this may mean tearing out a fence or wall. Sometimes, contractors can use smaller equipment, but it takes longer and may be more costly.

PROTECTED AREAS

Research whether your home is in any sort of protected area, such as a historic district or wildlife zone. To put a pool in, you'll need to go through a different approval process involving more boards

than just your HOA. Speaking of homeowner's associations, you'll need to check with them, too.

ABOVE GROUND, TOO

Just because you're popping up an above-ground pool

instead doesn't mean you can skip these steps. Above-ground pools still may need dirt work to prepare the right pad for the pool to sit on to prevent damage to the pool, to your property and to your neighbors' properties.

Pressure or power washing can strip off years of gunk, grime, pollution, leaving your sidewalks, driveways, home exterior, roof and patios looking brand new.



WHAT IS YOUR LEVEL **OF EXPERIENCE?**

Ask about not only the estimator at your home, but also the owner of the business and the members of the crew you'll be working with. Get examples of past work and carefully review before and after photos of previous jobs.

HOW LONG WILL IT TAKE?

Make sure you understand


how long the crew will be at your home, if you need to be there the entire time, and any work you may need to do before they arrive. This includes moving any patio furniture, trimming landscaping and more.

DO YOU OFFER A **SATISFACTION GUARANTEE?**

Have reasonable expecta-

tions of what a pressure washing will do at your home. Remember that it's a pressure washer, not a magician. Deteriorated surfaces will be clean and deteriorated when they're done. That said, ask the contractor about what happens if you're unhappy with the finished product. Ask about any warranties they offer and get a detailed estimate before the contractors begin work.

For the last eight years, J&R Construction has been remodeling homes and businesses throughout Texas, New Mexico, Oklahoma and Kansas, bringing to life the vision and ideas of many home and business owners.

Jose Leyva worked in the oilfield for nine years until the industry began to tank in 2013, leaving little to no hope for the workers who had dedicated many years to the advantageous, yet unpredictable field.

"I started with yards then I would fix faucets and stuff like that. The first few years of my company, I was doing it all on my own. I learned a hundred ways on how not to do something before I learned how to do

it right."

Competing with more established construction and home improvement companies, Leyva knew that it was going to take more than being on foot to advertise his business and get his name out to the public, and trying to figure out how to do that was an obstacle he was willing to face, but unsure of what his next move should be.

"Those were hard years and I wanted to give up, but I was determined because I knew I had all I needed: God."

"I was relying on God, but also putting in my effort. God says help yourself, and I will help you. He doesn't say stand still. Prayer and faith is great, but not followed by any action is worthless."

After a while, the work started to pick up and Leyva knew he needed some help and began the hiring process. The people he would hire on through the years would bring their own knowledge and expertise to the company, therefore furthering its growth.

Keep Your Garage Door Rolling

Regular maintenance keeps your garage door (and, let's face it, your life) moving smoothly.

Here's what you need to do and what you should leave to the professionals.

SAFETY TESTS

There are several safety tests for you to perform on your garage door. Failing any of these tests warrants a call to a professional for repairs.

Check the balance by disconnecting the garage door from the opener so you can operate it manually. Lift the door about halfway up, then release it. The door should remain in place. If it slips, call in the calvary.

You can check the mechanical reverse feature by placing a piece of wood or a brick on the floor in the path of the door. Activate the door to close. When the door hits the obstacle, it should reverse. If it doesn't, start dialing.

Lastly, test the door photocells. Locate the two photo sensors at the base of the garage door. Check the alignment of the sensors; they should light up when they are properly aligned. Keep adjusting them until they light up. Activate the garage door and as it closes, wave an object across the sensor path. The door should reverse. Test at least three different points in the beam's path.

If your door is more than 20



years old, it may lack some of these features and need an upgrade.

CHECK THE HARDWARE

Twice a year, inspect your garage door and its hardware. Check the tracks and hinges and tighten any loose bolts or fasteners on moving parts. Inspect the rollers for wear. Steel rollers will show worn

bearings and may look lopsided. Nylon rollers tend to crack. Install replacements as needed. Look for wear in the lift cables on the door. If they're excessively rusted, deteriorated or broken, call for service.

SERVICE YOUR CHAIN OR BELT

Check the drive chain or belt from the opener to the door if

you hear groaning or slapping sounds as the door operates. Start by disconnecting the opener from the power source and raise the garage door to about chest height. Detach it from the opener and close it by hand.

Locate the adjustment bolt that connects to the chain or belt. There should be nuts on either side to adjust the drive

mechanism. Use a wrench to turn the first nut at the side of the assembly counterclockwise. Move to the next nut and turn it clockwise. The chain or belt should pick up slack. Tighten the chain or belt until it is about a quarter inch from the bottom of the rail. Don't overtighten it. Reattach the door to the opener and reconnect the opener to the power supply.



Shedding Some Light on Home Solar

Consumers shopping around for home improvement projects may be leaning toward overhauls that can reduce energy consumption and save them money in the long run. This is a driving factor behind a growing number of homeowners investigating solar energy for their residences.

How does solar power work?

Solar power harnesses the sun's energy and converts it into electricity that can be used in homes. Many people are familiar with photovoltaics (PV), which are the panels that absorb sunlight

and create an electric field across their layers. Another solar technology, known as concentrating solar power, is primarily used in large power plants and is not appropriate for residential use, according to Energy.gov.

According to the Office of Energy Efficiency & Renewable Energy, hundreds of thousands of solar panels have been put in use across the United States since 2008.

Costs associated with solar

The upfront expense of solar panels is significant, costing

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

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anywhere from \$10,000 to \$14,000 for initial installation. However, comparatively speaking, homeowners can spend \$1,500 or more per year on electricity, so solar panels will pay for themselves over time. Keep in mind that costs may vary depending on energy needs and how many panels will be required to service the system.

How much electricity can I expect?

The Federal Trade Commission's Consumer Advice says that the amount of power generated from a so-

lar energy system depends on a few factors:

- The average number of hours of direct, unshaded sunlight your roof gets each year;
- The pitch (angle), age and condition of your roof, and the compass direction it faces;
- The size and strength of your system; and
- Environmental factors such as snow, dust or shade that may cover the system.

Save even more money

Consumers can contact their utility companies to find out if they provide homeowners who produce solar power with "net metering." This program pays the homeowner money or gives credit for excess power the system produces and returns to the electric grid. Individuals also may be eligible for energy tax credits or other benefits.

Homeowners may find it worthwhile to explore solar energy, particularly if they consume a high amount of electricity.





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
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Spring is the Time for Texans to 'Two-Step' Toward Fire Ant Control

Spring is an ideal time to take the first step to fire ant control, said a Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service expert.

"This is the time of year when ants begin foraging for food and when spring rains percolate through the soil and destroy underground fire ant tunnels," said Robert Puckett, Ph.D. AgriLife Extension

entomologist in Texas A&M's Department of Entomology, Bryan-College Station. "This causes them to deposit new tunnel soil as a mound on the surface above, making them much easier to locate." Puckett said the Two-Step Method is AgriLife Extension's preferred means of fire ant control.

About the Two-Step method

The Two-Step Method is less labor-intensive, less toxic and more environmentally friendly than most other means of do-it-yourself fire ant control. It can be an efficient, effective and safe way to control fire ants for an individual home, large property or entire community.

The first step involves semi-annual broadcast applications of fire ant bait. The second in-



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volves follow-up treatments of individual mounds or "nuisance" ant colonies, such as those in sensitive or high-traffic areas.

• Step one: The use of fire ant bait as the first step is effective as temperatures begin to rise and ants begin to gather forage to feed their new brood.

"Spring and fall are particularly good times to apply baits," Puckett said. "Once it gets hot and dry, as in the summer months, fire ants become less active, and mounds become less visible as ants go deeper into the soil."

Broadcasting bait

across a property is also advantageous in that users don't have to find the fire ant colonies, he said.

"Fire ant colonies can be difficult to locate, especially over a large area, so using a bait is less costly in terms of

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Extension developed the Two-Step Method was to help consumers make sense of all the fire ant control products on the market.

The insecticide label determines where a product can be used, whether it's a lawn, garden, agricultural production pasture or orchard. Users should always read the pesticide label to be sure the site they are treating is listed, then follow all label instructions.

Puckett provided the following suggestions related to fire ant control:

• Do not use gasoline or other petroleum products to control fire ants. Although these kill fire ants, they are highly flammable and are dangerous to both the user and the environment.

- Don't leave insecticide granules on streets or sidewalks after application. Sweep up any excess product so it doesn't wash into gutters or storm sewers and affect the water table.
- Always follow label directions on the proper disposal of pesticides. Do not pour pesticide leftovers down the drain as they are not easily removed by regular wastewater treatment.

time and the amount of product needed for treating larger areas," Puckett said. "Ants pick up the bait and return it to the nest, so they do most of the work for you."

He said the fire ant bait concentration is very low compared to residential insecticides.

"The recommended amount of grains per area is fairly low, so it's not necessary to use a lot of insecticide," he said. "While the efficacy of baits may differ, they all work pretty well."

The baits that work faster are also usually more expensive, so Puckett said homeowners should determine if the cost is worth the result.

• Step two: Because fire ant mounds are most visible this time of year, especially after a rain, they are easier to locate to do the second step. This involves treating the largest or most troublesome mounds with an individual mound treatment, such as a liquid drench or some form of granular, non-bait insecticide or dust.

"Most contact insecticides applied directly to the mound kill the colony in one-to-two days," Puckett said. "If the area has just a few mounds, then it may not even be necessary to apply bait as a first sten."

He said it is extremely

important to follow label instructions and not mix too little or too much water if using a liquid insecticide.

"Aside from the label being the law, these products have been tested for efficacy and safety at a particular concentration, so you don't want to guess at what may or may not happen if you vary from instructions," he said.

Wearing proper protection such as gloves and possibly even safety goggles is key if you're mixing chemicals. Puckett said to always be mindful of protecting yourself and the environment.

Proper use of fire ant control products

Puckett said one of the reasons AgriLife



Foundational Tips for No-Dig Gardening

Texas A&M AgriLife

No-dig is a gardening method that has been growing in popularity, and its practice perfectly matches its name. As a low-effort form of gardening, no-dig literally means you do not need to dig or alter the

Joe Masabni, Ph.D., Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service vegetable specialist from the Texas A&M Department of Horticultural Sciences, said no-dig gardening utilizes adding compost

on top of your soil and letting its microorganisms give your plants the nutrients they need. "It's similar to how nutrients are transferred in a forest," Masabni said. "When leaves fall to the ground, they form a layer above the soil and then they rot. releasing nutrients to the plant roots."

How to start your nodig garden

Starting a no-dig garden is not a challenge, especially if you already have a raised-bed garden. When starting your bed, cardboard is

a key component.

Masabni said using cardboard in your nodig garden creates a physical barrier against weeds for protection. You can also use cardboard on the top of your garden instead of mulch to further prevent weeds.

"If you're starting a new garden, you'll need to build the frame and put cardboard at the bottom, then fill with compost, plant in the bed and then leave it alone," he said.

Already existing gardens with raised beds



iust need an addition of compost and plants and for gardeners to refrain from any tilling. Masabni has a variety of video examples online regarding no-dig gardening.

Best practices for a successful garden

While no-dig gardening is a low-maintenance option for home gardeners, there are still some important practices for caring for your garden. Gardeners should still add fertilizer to their no-dig gardens to help their plants.

"Compost by itself is not enough plant food all season long," Masabni said. "It is important to add additional fertilizer on the top of your garden, whether it be chemical or organic."

Additionally, Masabni

said gardeners should never step on their nodig garden to avoid damaging the layers of compost. Choosing a location for your garden away from foot traffic and in the right part of your yard can contribute to your nodig garden's success.

"Gardeners should be mindful of their location to avoid any standing water in your garden; selecting a location away from a low spot in your yard is a good choice," he said. Masabni also said nodig gardening can be practiced with squarefoot gardening and companion planting for expanded benefits.

Good things come to patient gardeners

When starting their journey with no-dig gardening, gardeners must practice patience with their yields.

"In the first year or so, a till garden will give you a better yield than a no-till garden," Masabni said. "But over time, the nutrients will build up in the layers of good quality soil and you will have a successful yield without as much effort."

While no-dig gardening takes a different approach, he said reframing your mentality and learning new skills is always a good practice in gardening, especially in the first few years of maintenance.

"Take note of your mistakes and try new things to keep the passion and pleasure of gardening alive, and learn to improve year after year," Masabni said.

- may attract a variety of pests, including termites and weevils. Firewood also may contain eggs that were laid before trees were cut down. If firewood is needed, it should be stacked far away from a home.
- Clogged gutters: Ignoring clogged gutters can lead to pest prob-

lems. Mice, squirrels, birds, ants, and spiders may be attracted to damp leaves in clogged gutters. Leaves offer shelter, nesting material and possible food sources of insect life.

• Dirty dishes and indoor trash: Leaving food-covered dishes in the sink invites pests. Leftover food attracts cockroaches. flies. ants, and more. Even if time is short, it's best to wash dishes or load them into the dishwasher. Overflowing trash also draws pests

into a home.

• Clutter: Clutter provides hiding places for all sorts of rodents and insects, which can hide out in cluttered areas and remain comfortable. Going room to room and clearing out extraneous items may help reduce pest populations. Focus on the garage and basement, in particular.

Pests are attracted to certain conditions, and remedying these issues can help reduce pest infestations.

- In fact, certain conditions may be inviting pests to a property.
- Garbage: Piles of garbage offer food and shelter to pests. Removing garbage piles and cleaning up food waste promptly can make a difference.
- Stagnant water: Mosquitoes breed in standing water, which is water not affected by waves, current or a filtration system. Anywhere water has pooled, mosquitoes may be breeding.
- Moisture or standing water: Additional sources of water and moisture may attract pests like gnats, mos-



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Caring for Patio Furniture

Part of getting ready for summer is getting ready to spend more time outside, lounging in your patio furniture, enjoying the sunshine, visiting with friends and family or cooking out.

Here's how to keep your furniture looking fresh for years to come.

CLEANING

Regular cleaning plays a big role in caring for your patio furniture. For most materials, mild soap and warm water can work wonders. For some pieces, such as wicker or rattan, run a vacuum with a soft brush attachment over the furniture to remove any loose debris first. Rinse your furniture well to remove any soap residue. Let the furniture completely air dry before using it.

While bleach may cure a variety of conditions, it's not the best thing to use on patio furniture. Not only can it discolor fabrics and cushions, it can also weaken the fabric and shorten your furniture's useful life. If you don't want to use soap, vinegar is generally safe to use; make sure to spotcheck whatever cleaner you're using to make sure it doesn't damage your fabrics and other materials. Clean your patio furniture once a month to keep it looking its best.



PROTECTING

Once your furniture is clean, protect it from the elements. Routinely check wood furniture for rotting, warping and cracking. Once repairs are made, seal it with a coat of protective sealant appropriate to the type of wood used in

your furniture.

Rattan furniture can be warped or discolored by exposure to moisture or humidity, so keep these pieces away from water sources and clean up spills or rainwater immediately. Periodically paint metal furniture with a rust-resistant

paint.

Store plastic furniture out of direct sunlight when it's not in use to prevent fading or deterioration.

STORAGE

When you're not using your patio furniture or during

severe weather, store it in a dry, protected area such as a shed or garage. Store it off the ground and use furniture covers to protect it. If you don't have an indoor storage option, consider using waterproof furniture covers to protect your investment.

Common Landscaping Fixes

Summer means spending more time outside and that extra time in your garden may mean you'll see problems cropping up.

Here are some common landscaping problems and how to solve them.

OVERWATERING

Overwatering plants leads to fungus and plant disease, spongy lawns and shallow root systems. Understand the watering requirements of the plants in your garden and carefully manage the amount of water you give your landscaping. Plant native plants to help minimize your watering needs and keep your landscaping looking healthier all year around.

BARE SPOTS

Bare spots in your lawn can be the result of soil compaction from heavy foot traffic, drought, disease, chemical burns, or weed or insect infestation. To fix these spots, you'll need to first determine the cause. If it's foot traffic, install stepping stones or a pathway to keep pedestrians off the grass. If it's weeds or insects, determine what you have before treating it. Once the yard is treated, you can start growing new grass.

New grass can be grown from seed. Spread straw as a



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mulch to help keep the young grass moist and safe from foraging wildlife. You can purchase lawn patch products that contain seed, fertilizer and mulch blends. Sod is also an option; keep sod moist until you can install it. Make sure it's level and makes good contact with the rest of the lawn.

POOR SOIL QUALITY

Sandy, silty or soils rich in clay can adversely affect your landscaping. Clay-heavy soils tend to make it difficult for water to drain or create shifting issues. Clay is great for building on, but could be bad for your garden. Sandy soil allows water to pass through which makes it good for areas that need drainage improvement.

You can amend your soil to help improve it. The experts at your local home and garden center can give you advice on what types of soil you have and how to best amend it for your landscaping.

EROSION

Erosion is when soil wears away from water and wind. This can cause loss of fertile topsoil and harm plants, walkways and other landscaping elements. Retaining walls can help hold back soil. Amendments such as mulch and plantings like groundcovers also help.


