





# 2022 MAYFEST • CHAMBER HISTORY PERRYVILLE AREA CHAMBER NEARING 100 YEAR ANNIVERSARY

The first meeting of the newly organized Chamber of Commerce of Perryville was held at the Court House on January 19, 1923. The following were elected at the first Executive Board meeting: Phil Zoellner-President, Robert T. Brown-Vice President, Harry R. Phillips-Secretary and Ed. P. Krisler-Treasurer. From February 1923 through May 1936, the minutes were handwritten in a hardbound notebook. The current mission statement is: "to support and assist existing businesses; serve as the principal advocate for business in partnership with the community; act as the primary catalyst in promoting the economic health of the Perryville area, stimulating jobs and improving the quality of life."

The Perryville Chamber of Commerce celebrates 99 years this year. Can you even imagine all the changes the chamber has seen in those 99 years?

The February 1929 committees included: Entertainment; Telephone; Cow Day Program; Paving; City Limits Extension; Railroad; and Road Committee.

It is interesting to see over the past 99 years how committees under the Chamber have evolved. In 1940, the committees included: Road Sign & Highway Beautification; Merchants Interest; Agriculture; Airport; Streets and Roads; Parks. In 1956, the committees were Agriculture; Special Activities; Publicity and Signs; Merchants; and International Shoe Relations. 1979, the committees included: Merchant, Agriculture, Industrial, Legislative, Social Events, Community Betterment, Membership, Highway & Publicity & Signs and the Finance Committee. In 1992, the committees were: Community Betterment, Community Relations, Business and Mayfest.

Today our committees include: Networking & Education; Com-

munity Impact; Administration & Leadership; Mayfest; Xquisite Women's Conference. With a growing and continuously changing community each Board of Directors is constantly working to evolve the Chamber, so its programs are beneficial to all member businesses no matter their size.

Following are just a few things from the past: In 1935 meetings were held in the Ross Hotel. Items in the minutes included the International Shoe Factory, the Shoe Factory land lots that were for sale, and the Telephone Company made an interesting talk on the new telephone building and system that was to be installed assuring everyone that before the next annual meeting the building would be completed and the new system in operation.

In 1950 items on meeting agendas included: notice of 123 chamber members; immediate need for additional outlets from

the public square of the city of Perryville so as to connect with Highway No. 25 and an order was set to acquire right-of-way in order to assure the extension of North Jackson Street to Highway No. 25.

In 1963, the first executive secretary was hired. Viola Blechle came on board and was an important asset in the development of the permanent office of the Perryville Chamber of Commerce. Viola held her office until 1990. She saw many changes and improvements in the town that she so diligently served. Viola Blechle definitely left her mark on this organization and the Perryville community.

From the minutes of July 22, 1971: The Historical Society contacted the Chamber for funds to purchase the Faherty House. It was voted that the Chamber give \$100 to assist in the purchase.

From the minutes of April 28, 1983: Perryville Soccer Cup Tournament was hosted and Perryville held the first soccer tournament in Southeast Missouri. Now we are home to the beautiful Bank of

Missouri Soccer Complex. Soccer is a big part of the Perry County community.

Today, the Chamber has more 360 business members, which include more than 400 individual members. We value our members and strive to promote their businesses and their community activity. The Chamber office strives to inform this and surrounding communities on everything Perry County has to offer. We believe in shopping local and promoting everything in the community we live, work and play in. Including our small businesses, our schools, entertainment, industries, health and tourism. We welcome everyone who moves into our community and invite travelers to come and enjoy all our beautiful county has to offer.

## MAYFEST 5K WILL BE CROWDED ONCE AGAIN

If a person wanted to kick the Mayfest off with a little morning jog, they are in luck.

The Perry Park Center will host its 35th annual Mayfest 5K Run/Walk Saturday, May 7.

Recreation Supervisor Tessa Bollinger is excited about the milestone event.

"It's one of the biggest 5K's that the Park Center hosts every year," she said. "It's always a fun and well attended race."

Registration is open from now until the time of the event. Signups begin at 6:45 a.m. on that Saturday and run until 7:45 a.m. The registration fee is \$20.

The course will not change from last year's event that started and ended at the Park Center and wound throughout the City Park. In past years, there has been a kids race, but that will not happen until a later time.

"We haven't made any major changes to the route or the event itself," Bollinger said. "We plan on having a kid's race later on down the road and make it its separate event."

Bollinger noted that there are already about 80 participants signed up, and they are expecting between more than 100 runners on race day.

"That's a great number for us," Bollinger said. "We hope we can have some good weather for the race. I couldn't be more excited. It will be fun to interact with all the runners and be involved in the community."

Each participant is guaranteed a t-shirt if they registered before the early bird date on April 25. Any entry received after the early deadline is not guaranteed a shirt on race day, but Bollinger said they can be ordered.

"The shirts will be a little different than in past years, because we are going off the theme of 'Peace, Love and Perryville," she said. "They will be bright colors."

Awards will be handed out for the top overall male and top fe-



male runners as well as the top three in each age division.

"There are a lot of unique items," she said. "We have 10x10 and 10x20 booth spaces available. Some of them can fill it up pretty full with different things. It seems like a majority of the things there are a lot of home decor, hand made, wooden items, candles and soaps."

Another part of the craft fair is the Alpha Delta Kappa baby photo contest, a local fund-raiser that helps the organization bring in money for scholarships.



# "THE OUTEST CONTEST IN TOWN" TO CROWN CRAWLING KIDDOS DIAPER DERBY/DECORATED DIAPER SET FOR MAY 7

In years past, the event has taken place on the street. This year, the event will be held at the Perryville Downtown Plaza stage.

Yamnitz reminds those interested in signing up their youngster for the decorated diaper event that it's about a diaper and must be more than just a costume.

"The main thing with the decorated diaper contest is that the diaper must be visible,"

Yamnitz said. "That's what you decorate. If you want to incorporate any other decorations, that is fine."

The 2022 theme is "Peace, Love & Perryville", gives participants a wide variety of options in terms of what they'll be wearing for the derby Saturday, May 7.

Judges determine the winners in the decorated diaper contest.

"They go by the best costume, the best reaction from the crowd," Yamnitz said. "There are a couple of different things that they judge on."

Both the decorated diaper contest as well as the diaper derby are opportunities to get the younger generation involved in Mayfest, Yamnitz said.

#### CAVING EXHIBIT TO HIGHLIGHT AREA'S UNDERGROUND FEATURES

Those seeking more information about local caving will have the opportunity to educate themselves Saturday, May 7 at the Chamber's annual Mayfest.

The SEMO Grotto organization will provide an informative exhibit along Jackson Street.

"Hopefully they'll learn that we exist here in town and that if they have any caves on their property, we'd be more than happy to come out and check those out," said Josh Cooper, president of the SEMO Grotto group. "We offer courses if you are interested in caving,

It's an opportunity to learn, noted Cooper.

"Just kind of that we're here and that we exist," he said. Not everyone may be on social media, read a story about caving in the newspaper or listen to the radio, according to Cooper.

People will be out and about the first full weekend in May, though.



"A lot of people show up to Mayfest," Cooper said.

Cooper described how he developed an interest in local caving.

"I got involved with caving through the caving courses that were offered," Cooper said. "Gary Keene was in charge of them. I had always heard about the SEMO grotto before but I didn't know a whole lot about it. So I asked him about it."

Keane was serving as the organization's president. Cooper now serves in that capacity at SEMO Grotto.

"It kind of all stemmed from there," Cooper said.

As for the reason for a caving exhibit, Cooper said it just began with an idea and trying to answer a couple of open-ended questions.

"Why aren't we getting involved with all these community things? Why don't we do something with the Mayfest to get people to know that we're here?" Cooper said. "Maybe they're interested in it and they hear about it but they don't know how to go about getting into it any further than that," he said. "Not everybody wants to go through the courses in the city and maybe not everybody knows that we even have them.

"Why don't we put a booth together and let people know that hey, 'This is what we're doing, this is what we're involved in, this is (part of) the things that we do, we can help landowners and go and survey their property more or less in finding caves and documenting them

Earlier this year, SEMO Grotto had a booth at the Missouri Speleological Survey. That event took place March 5-6 at the Catalyst Center for Business.

"I've always wanted to put some sort of booth together and get

some involvement with the community," Cooper said.

Many individuals stopped by, looking for more information about SEMO Grotto. Cooper is optimistic more will do the same May 7 at the Mayfest booth.

Caving season is typically March through October, according to Cooper.

"We'll go out and document any caves or karst area that they have on their properties without having to go into the caves at that point," Cooper said. "We just found nine caves on a property that we gained access through the MSS event and we added those to the database and one of them was like a 50 foot pit that is highly decorated. Nobody's ever been in there. It's never been documented."

One of the features of the caving exhibit is a "squeeze box," for individuals to try wiggling their way through close quarters.

"We're going to bring a Squeezebox out hopefully to drum up a little interest and see if anybody wants to try to squeeze through them," he said. "We're going have a little bit of room and we'll catch the people coming to and from the carnival," Cooper said. "I wouldn't mind it being kind of a staple at the Mayfest."

Those stopping by will get the opportunity view caving gear.

"We will have some gear there, for everyone to check out the gear that we offer for use through the caving courses," Cooper said. "I might bring some of my personal gear just to kind of show and tell about them. I will have some documents and handouts on caving in and maybe the critters and stuff that you might find in them. You can stop by and check out those like guides for responsible caving and things like that."

#### BIKE EXHIBIT TO PROMOTE LOCAL CYCLING

While many may venture to the Mayfest Saturday morning after the annual 5K run to check out the craft fair area, a newer attraction on the other side of the square may be geared for those interested in more recreational activities. A mountain biking exhibit will be available to stop by from 11 a.m. to 4 p.m. Saturday, May 7.

"We were trying to think of ways to get the message out, to get the word out around Perryville that, number one, we have a bike rodeo coming up to get kids interested in and together (about bike riding) and show them things about biking to generate interest in and get a bigger group together for mountain bike riding," said Chad Sutterer.

An educational "bike rodeo" is in the works for Saturday, July 9, from 9 a.m. to noon at the Bank of Missouri Soccer Complex.

"The whole thing behind all of it is that we're getting the mountain biking trails put in at Legion Lake," Sutterer said. "What we're doing is getting, number one, the kids who already liked to ride bikes. We want to be able to tell them and get a community around biking here in Perryville. We want to kind of try to pull everybody together."

Many residents and visitors may not be aware of the improvements in the works at Legion Lake, according to Sutterer.

"People don't know what's going in," Sutterer said. "There are other people who like riding bikes that know nothing about it. We're trying to promote things so that we can get people in and be able to say,

'Hey, this is what we have going on.' There is going to be a bike rodeo, there's going to be a skills class, and we're getting a mountain biking trail."

A competitive cycling team could be in the works in the near future, according to Sutterer.

"There is the a potential to have a NICA (National interscholastic cycling Association) team here," Sutterer said. "With that kids ages sixth grade through 12th grade can actually race on a mountain biking team. We're going to have a skills park out there. We're going to want to be able to be promoting all this stuff so that people know it's here, know what's coming. They can use it. We want to get a whole community around biking here in Perryville."

Just what can visitors expect to see at the new cycling exhibit?

"We're kind of still putting that together," Sutterer said. "But we'll have some different levels of mountain bikes so people can see like, this is what an entry level bike looks like. This is what you can expect from a little bit higher one. This is what a top of the line, full-suspension (model) looks like. We're doing it. We think what are the other things we're gonna have there?

The plans is to have a couple little demos and we may have some of the like NICA kids riding around to demonstrate some things and also get attention."

The exhibit will be located on Jackson Street.

"We wanted to be out where people are going back and forth down towards the rides and carnival stuff," Sutterer noted.

While the funding for the mountain bike trail has been approved, there is still quite a bit of planning involved. Sutterer is optimistic about the future and what will soon be available for cyclists at Legion Lake, though.

"That's like a dream come true for me," Sutterer said. "When we were traveling around the country on traveled the West for like eight months. We went to all these different towns and all these towns had local riding (parks) and all these people would flock to it in the afternoon and evening when people get off work and parents and families and their kids were always riding bikes and they had places to actually ride bikes.

Sutterer remains optimistic about cycling in Perryville.

"I knew that there were people who like riding bikes here but we didn't have anywhere to go. There is interest, no one really knows much about it. I'm super, super excited about the future."

Sutterer referred to the cycling course, which has not been scheduled yet, as more of a "bike handing 101" activity.

"We also are promoting a class to get more people interested like it's going to be like a bike one on bike handling one on one type thing.
