
"It's a little bit more than usual and the most we have ever heard," Dreyer said.

The Perryville baseball team is young yet again this season, but as new coach Donald O'Keefe said "Nobody really cares,"

The Pirates will have two seniors this year in Dane Lauck and Jon Ward, with a variety of juniors, sophomores, and even some freshmen seeing some playing time this year. But O'Keefe knows teams won't take it easy on them just because they are young.

"People really don't care about that stuff when they play you," he said. "It's a group that is hungry and wants to learn. The good thing about a young team is that you continue to see them grow throughout the year."

Although the team is young, O'Keefe will lean on Lauck on the mound and throughout the year in different situations.

"He is a kid that does everything you ask of him and he loves playing the game," he said On the mound, the Pirates will lean on Lauck, Troy O'Keefe and Grant Smith. O'Keefe raved about Smith's ability on the mound for this season.

"He's a guy with his velocity that you could see him take over some games against certain opponents," O'Keefe said.

O'Keefe is looking for big years out of players like Adam Green and Logan Hoehn, who was an all-conference player along with O'Keefe and Smith last season. But he is going to focus more on small ball, instead of smashing pitches over the wall this year.

"Our offense is going to be how baseball was created in the 1800s, where you put the ball in play and put pressure on the other team," O'Keefe said. "Last year, we averaged close to 10 strikeouts a game. So you're giving up about half your game to not even putting the ball in pay. For us, that's going to be how we play and bunting and baserunning is a heck

of a weapon in high school baseball."

Defensively, O'Keefe believes that his team has some work to do in the field.

"Our conference is not a friendly conference with teams that will make you pay and if we make mistakes that will put pressure on our pitching," O'Keefe said.

Perryville finished last season 4-16, which included losing 16 of its last 18 games. O'Keefe has a different method of gauging team success this season that goes beyond wins and losses.

"I want to see the program stabilize again," he said. "I want us to play hard and when teams play us I don't want them to have a good experience. The wins and losses are for other people to be concerned about. I want to bring Perryville baseball back where it should be."

each ran cross country.



"I think if you ask any of the girls they will tell you that they were not satisfied with the way the season ended," Perryville coach Jerry Fulton said. "I think that has helped them focus on this year and what we need to do."


do some great things as well this year."

The Saxony Lutheran baseball team has been successful over the past five years, and coach Paul Sander believes this year should be no different.

"I think we will have a solid lineup and some guys moving up from the JV that should compete and give us a competitive season. How high we go is a little hard to predict, but we have potential." Sander said.
