


















Perry County harvests 57 deer during early youth season

Toward the end of October while many may be thinking of their wardrobe and costume options for another holiday centered around the color of orange, Halloween, and trick-or-treating, for the younger hunters in the area they had other thoughts while donning their orange vests and hats — would they be landing a trophy buck or settling for something a little smaller, such as a doe or button buck during the early portion youth deer hunting season.

Youth hunters — those at least 6 and not older than 15 on the opening day — in Perry County this fall harvested 57 deer during the early portion of the youth deer season. Of those 57 deer, 33 were bucks, 7 button bucks, and 17 does.

This was down from 100 deer that were harvested in the early youth portion in 2022 during the two-day period.

Preliminary data from the Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC) shows that young hunters ages 6 through 15 harvested 11,118 deer during Missouri's early youth portion of the 2023 deer hunting season, Oct. 28- 29. Top counties were Franklin with 258 deer harvested, Osage with 224, and Texas with 209. Of the deer harvested, 6,857 were antlered bucks, 3,410 were does, and 851 were button bucks.

Bollinger harvested 90 deer with 47 bucks, 8 button bucks, and 35 does.


Youth hunters harvested 13,877 during last year's early youth portion.

"Although the rain this past weekend was desperately needed given how dry it's been this year throughout much of the state, it did put a damper on the early youth portion," said MDC's Cervid Program Supervisor Jason Isabelle.

Isabelle noted that the below average temperatures were conducive to good deer movement, but the combination of cooler temperatures and rainy conditions that persisted throughout much of the weekend likely reduced the amount of time many young hunters were able to spend afield.

Archery deer hunting continues through Nov. 10 and resumes Nov. 22 through Jan. 15, 2024. The November portion of firearms deer season runs Nov. 11-21 followed by the CWD portion, which is open in CWD Management Zone counties, Nov. 22-26. The late youth portion runs Nov. 24-26. The late antlerless portion of firearms deer season runs Dec. 2-10 in open counties and the alternative methods portion will occur Dec. 23 through Jan. 2, 2024.












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Tips for successfully hunting white-tailed deer

3. Failing to remain alert. When you're out in the field, it's important to frequently scan in all directions. You don't want an animal, hunter or hiker to break your concentration or cause you to unintentionally pull the trigger.

4. Neglecting to pay attention to wind direction and temperature. When planning your hunt, make sure to keep these factors in mind. The wind direction and ambient temperature can increase your chances

of being spotted or influence where animals hide.
