

Pirates baseball team to play hard, earn respect

Coach Don O'Keefe, the coach of the Pirates boys' baseball team, is in his second stint at Perryville High School.

"The first time I was here was for about eight years," he said. "This one is going to be for my

third year."

Looking back at last year's season, O'Keefe said, "In my opinion, for us, it's about the goal, and the kids understood this was a program that needed to get stabilized. The year before I came back a couple of years ago, they were at about 16 kids, and we were kind of in a lull. The issue wasn't just winning. The team's passion at the games became a problem. So, last year's team did an excellent job.

"You're talking about a team that finished 13 and 9, but the years before had struggled to win two or three games. It was a big step forward. Numbers-wise, we went from the year where we had around 16 players to where I think we're sitting at 27 kids on this year's roster, so that's a nice improvement from what it was. We're hoping to get it back to what it used to be the first time I was here, where we were sitting at about 45 kids on the roster."

O'Keefe admits his goals for teams he coaches are "a little different" from what reporters and fans might have in mind.

"My job is not to worry about wins and losses, anything like that," he said. "My job is, whenever we go to practices — which I absolutely love — we identify what we have to work on and guide kids that way. Then, from there, we play games, and those games will tell me, hey, here are the things we need to work on at practice to help these kids out. For myself, I think that when we play teams, and they walk away going, 'These dudes can play baseball,' I think that's what I'm looking for. You have the respect. You can't control the wins



and losses, but you can certainly control coming out and playing really hard for seven innings. If the other team can look you in the eye and go, 'We respect you,' and if our kids can go home, look in the mirror and say, 'We gave everything we could,' that's what I'm looking for."

O'Keefe has several players he's keeping his eye on this season.

"We have some good ballplayers, and we have some guys that are up-and-comers," he said. "I think our pitching staff is something that's kind of exciting. We have senior Troy O'Keefe, who's a good ballplayer, and then we also have Waylon Huber. Both of those have started out of the gates really well. We've got others like Evan Hayden at pitches and Hunter Elder that we're kind of expecting to fill in those shoes and be able to give us innings and do well. We have a great catcher, Barrett Wheeler, who's a junior and a workaholic. We've got other kids like Ty Peeler and Dalton Fritschie. They have known me since they were younger, so when we make decisions, they know what I expect of them."

When asked if he had anything else he wanted to say about the team, O'Keefe replied, "Our expectations are we're going to come out each game, and we're going to play extremely hard. That's my only expectation. As long as we do that, we'll be ready. And whenever we get a chance to play, we'll look forward to doing so."

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Pirates golf team off to good start with a solid team

Justin Dreyer has coached the Perryville High School golf team for 14 years, but his involvement in the sport started long before that.

"I started golfing in the sixth grade," he said. "We actually started golfing with my dad. He picked up the game of golf when me and my brother did.

When asked what he enjoys about coaching golf that keeps him returning year after year, Dreyer said, "Golf's a very unique sport, different than any others. I just really enjoy being out there with the kids, teaching them the game. With golf, a lot of it is mental — your mental ability to get over a bad shot. Just talking through the game of golf with our kids is probably the part that I enjoy the most."

According to the coach, this year's team features a solid blend of experienced players and newcomers.

"It's probably about 60/40 this year," Dreyer said. "I've got a good veteran group this year that has come back. Most of them have played varsity for a year or two, and then we've also got seven freshmen that are new to us this year. A couple of them are brand new to the game, as well, so it's exciting. It's fun seeing the progress that they make. We always tell them that we don't care what they're able to shoot. When they come to us or at the start of the year, we want to see them progress throughout the year and get better."

According to Dreyer, the team competes in about 14 matches or tournaments each year, and they began competing against other teams last week.

"We're off to a really good start," he said. "We've got four wins and one loss so far on the year."

As the season progresses, Dreyer anticipates a competitive one for the PHS team.

"We've had three different games," he said. "With golf, some are just dual matches where it's just you and another school. Some are tri-matches where there are three because we've actually had three matches this year. Our record varsity-wise is four wins and one loss because we've had a couple of tri-matches.

I think we're going to have a very good year. We've got a bunch of good golfers on the team and really just good individuals, good people. We've had very good starts in the year, and I think we'll keep that up."

Dreyer mentioned several players from whom he expects great things

this year.

"Our number one is junior Derek Martin. He was actually one stroke away last year from making it to the state tournament. He's put a lot of time in and gotten better. He's had a really, really good start to the year. And then there are our seniors — Logan Hudson, Nate Moll, Wyatt Schremp, and Jake Cissell. Those guys have been with us for several years, and they have really, really improved over the last couple of years to where they're going to be key members of the varsity team and helping us reach our goals. I feel like any of those five could be the best score of the day because they're right there. They could match Derek with what he shoots if they have a good day. Those five kids I just mentioned will be the core of the varsity team, and I'm excited to see what they can do this year."

PHS girls' soccer team can take on the best teams

Dwayne Hadler, the girls' soccer coach at Perryville High School, was present when the team was formed in the late 90s.

"I was a head coach in '98, '99 when the program started," he recalled, "and then I left after two years. Then I came back six years ago as an assistant, and this is my first year as a head coach for the girls."

When asked about the team's performance last year and his expectations for the girls this season, Hadler said, "Last year, we won districts but lost in the quarterfinals. We lost, I believe, six seniors last year. Our numbers are definitely low this year,

but the players we have are very talented, so we should be pretty strong again."

Although this is Hadler's first year as head coach, he benefits from years of experience working with the team as an assistant coach.

"I've been around them for some of them all four years," he said. "So, for me, it was definitely a pretty easy transition. I've made a little bit of changes since becoming head coach, but why mess with something that's been successful over the years?"

As of last week, the soccer team has played two games — one win and one loss.

"We played St. Pius on Tuesday in the Fox Tournament and lost 2 to 1 in overtime," Hadler

said. "And then we played Windsor last night and won 1 to 0. St. Pius is in our district. We're probably one of the stronger districts in the state for our class — it's gonna' be competitive.

"When our districts get here, that'll be the challenge. It's gonna' be a very difficult district. There are several teams in it, not to mention the regional rivalries that are very good teams. This area is very strong with soccer. To be honest, we have a lot of tough battles."


Looking over a roster of his players, Hadler sees a lot of potential in his upperclassmen.

"We have five juniors and two seniors," he said. "We definitely look to the leadership of the two seniors, Caroline Grimaud and Jewel Riney. When Hadler was asked what he thinks makes for a strong team, he said, "We have a lot of soccer-talented players playing through the club systems in the area. I've been very successful and so have most teams who have the desire to win — that attitude of 'whatever it takes to win.' That's probably our strength.

"Our core is dedicated and has a very strong drive to win. I'm really looking forward to the season. We may be small in numbers, but we will be a strong team for sure. I'm really excited to see what this team can accomplish. We've already shown that we can play with the good teams, and I can't wait to see how the rest of the season turns out.

Pirates track team down in number but not in talent

If you're looking for an example of longevity in a profession, you couldn't find a better one than Brent Broeking, who has served as a track coach at Perryville High School for 24 of his 25 years there and has been the head track coach for 14 years.

When asked if he believed his length of tenure at PHS has contributed to building strong track teams, Broeking said, "Yes and no. Sometimes, it's hard to get kids out nowadays. There's a lot of other stuff they can be doing. A lot of kids want to specialize in just one sport. It does help a little bit. I've been around, I know the sport, I know the complications.

But it's always a struggle sometimes getting kids out to tracks. It's not always the glamorous sport. It's like, 'Oh, it's just running,' Which is unfortunate. We've been pretty successful at Perryville with our track program."

According to Broeking, approximately 50 boys and girls have registered for this spring's team.

"This is down a little bit," he said. "Usually, we have a little bit better than that. There are lots of reasons why. They always want to go to work and earn money. Teenagers want to have a car and do those

things. Some play other sports, and they get tired. It's just hard to get kids out sometimes nowadays. There are so many other things they can be doing.

"What I have is quality. I just wish I had a little bit more quantity. Some come out because they realize they're good at this sport. Some come out because they're just wanting to stay in shape for another sport, which is just fine. Sometimes, they do that and realize, 'Hey, I'm pretty good at this sport, also.' Some just want to be a part of something, and they see track as an easy way of doing that."

Broeking noted that while they lost a few seniors who had previously been on the team, they had six seniors participating.

"They're a quality group," he said. "We have Ellie Gerler; she's a senior thrower and has been in the state tri-meet the last two years. I expect her to probably be there again this year. Another thrower, Ben Huber, went to the state track meet last year. He's a junior. We've got several freshmen that have come out — Destyn Morgan, Xzyavier Wilson, Sophia Coppaway — I'm kind of excited. We have several returning. Our middle-distanced crew just came up short of making the state track meet last year, so hopefully, they'll get over that hump this year. We had a lot of quality returners.

Saxony baseball has busy season ahead

Saxony Lutheran baseball coach Paul Sander has had just one losing season in his two decades on the bench as a Crusader. He doesn't expect that to change this season, despite getting off to a slow start.

"We've had a history of having very competitive teams," Sander said. "I think it'll be another very competitive team. What the ceiling is on this team, is still to be determined to some degree because we're younger than we normally are.

"We only have three seniors and have a lot of underclassmen and we're I'm trying some different line-

So that's a little different than in the past. We have seven freshmen this year who are all very competitive and all seven have good futures here with baseball at some point on varsity."

The Crusaders opened their season March 21 with a 10-0 victory over Fredericktown/Marquand-Zion, then suffered back-to-back losses to Scott City and Meadow Heights, falling 4-1 and 7-6, respectively, on the front end of a string of five consecutive road games in seven days.

All told, the Crusaders are scheduled to play 12 games in 16 days by April 9.

"We won't have many practice days from here on out," Sander said. "We have games every day, but about four or five dates."

There's a method behind the scheduling — which also includes the junior varsity squad — Sander said.

"They learn from games," he said. "In my opinion, you give them the fundamentals, you give them your strategy, you give them the technical parts of the game and practice early, and then you hope that they can relay that to the field throughout the season."

This year's varisty squad is led by three seniors and team captains — first baseman Isaac Koenig, shortstop Jake Sparks and center fielder Brayden Moore, who's signed to play for Westminster College in Fulton after graduation.

"[Koenig and Sparks] are second-year starters," Sander said, "so a lot if expected from them. [Moore] is a three-year starter and he should be the leader of the club. He is a well-rounded player who does a lot of things. He runs well, he hits well, he can go get a ball center field. he's kind of the leader or the squad as far as people looking to play at his level."

The rest of the team includes five juniors, three sophomores and five freshmen. And Sander expects all of them to compete.

"My strategy has always been in the 19 years I've been here is that we want to win every JV or every varsity game we play," Sander said. "We are playing to win that game and I am playing the best nine players that I feel that they give us the best chance to win. And I don't care whether they're freshmen or seniors."

In the end, it's the wins that matter.

new season, but she didn't hesitate to speculate that it should be a good one.

"The upcoming season will be one to watch with five seniors and two juniors this year that bring exceptional skill, experience and leadership to the team," Terrell said.

This will be the fourth season for the Crusaders' program and only its second as an affiliate of the Missouri State High School Activities Association.

Since the program's inception in 2022, Saxony Lutheran has shown steady improvement, finishing 2022 at 5-7, 2023 at 9-5 and 2024 at 11-8 under then-head coach Stephanie Brown, who returns this year as an assistant, along with Dawn Ozark, who will coach the junior varsity.

"We just keep improving and that's all we can ask for," Brown said last season. "We are only three years into the program and some of these teams have been playing for decades."

The 2024 Crusaders ended the season with a 3-1 loss (25-21, 14-25, 18-25, 13-25) to Oakville in the first round of the Class 1, District 1 tournament.

This year, Terrell is coaching a seasoned group led by seniors Noah Kirn, Mason Lohmann,

Carson Martyn, Seth Mueller and Owen Bucheit, along with juniors Jonathan Palmer and Brayden Zoellner.

"In addition, we have a talented group of younger players who are sophomores and will be playing and contributing to our defense and offense teams and a freshman who will be setting," Terrell said.

The Crusaders opened the season with a 3-1 victory — 27 - 25, 25 - 23, 14 - 25, 25 - 19 — over frequent opponent Collinsville, Ill. They saw action from March 28-29 in the Belleville East Tournament and will travel to Maryville (Ill.) Christian on April 7.

Terrell said her goals for this season are simple.

And so we try to put a schedule together that really challenges us. It helps to be in the SEMO Conference. "We'll go play whoever will play us and we may get our teeth kicked in, but that will only help us for later in the year."

Returning this year for the Lady Crusaders will be seniors Abigail Haley, Adalina Deckerd, Amelia Wilson, Camille Richey, Faith Dreyer, Isabel Brown, Margaret Hillin, and Aleigh Miller. The team also includes seven juniors.

"Our district just came out and it's a pretty nasty district, so I think there's probably five teams in our district that have a legitimate chance to win the district," Crawford said. "And so it's really going to be about who's healthy, who's playing their best soccer at the end of the year, and who has the best team chemistry.

"We hope to have a run, but you also got to have a little bit of luck in the postseason."

Last season, Saxony Lutheran senior John Hartmann finished his one and only track season with a state championship in the high jump with a height of 6 feet, 6.25 inches.

This year, Hartmann won't be around, but the Crusaders and Lady Crusaders already look like they have a few standouts that could step up big this season for coach Max Weiser, including anither pole vaulter.

The Crusaders have already competed in one meet — the Notre Dame Frozen Invitational — with the with the boys team finishing in a tie for 15th with 10 points, while the girls finished 9th with 40, led by junior Casey Call, who finished second in the pole vault after clearing 3.2 meters in the pole vault and Rebecca Younk, who finished second in the javelin with a throw of 31.17 meters, along with senior Abigail Haley, who finished fourth in the 100 hurdles with a time of 17.30 seconds and sixth in the 300

hurdles at 52.19.

Sophomore Raylee Matthews finished fifth in the long jump, clearing 4.74 meters, ahead of Yunck who came in eighth at 4.34.

On the boys' side, junior Nashaun Davis finished third in the 110 hurdles with a time of 16.14 seconds.

The Crusaders were scheduled to compete in the Festus Invitational on March 29.

In the 2024 state championship meet, other finishes for Saxony included a sixth place finish for Call in the pole vault, while Haley finished 11th in the 300-meter hurdles with a time of 49.02 seconds and 12th in the 100 meter hurdles (17.14). Yunck finished 15th in the javelin event.

At the district level, Hartmann came in first in the high jump with a height of 6-4.75, while Call finished first in the pole vault with a height of 10-2.50 and finished third in the high jump at 4-7.0. Haley was second in the 100 meter hurdles with a time of 17.20 seconds, and finished third in the 300

meter hurdles (51.42).

In other events, Mark Richey finished third in the 3,200-meter run with a time of 11:19.84; Joseph Zoellner came in third in the discus with a throw of 131 feet, 8.75 inches; the girls 400 relay team finished third at 52.16 seconds; the girls 800 meter relay team finished third at 1:53.04. The 41,600 meter relay team finished second at 4:23.13 seconds; Matthews finished second in the long jump at 16-1 and Yunck finished second in the javelin with a throw of 108-2.75.

Key returning athletes include Clayton Gremaud, a senior sprinter who placed 7th at state last year and is looking to place higher this year; Carter Henneman, a sophomore distance runner who has school records and is looking to improve further; Reagan Meyer, a two-time state champion in the mile and 800 meters who is "hungry to be the best," Hager said; Kale Meyer, a junior who is new to the sprinting events but is expected to be a strong contender; and Sophis Taylor, who barely missed qualifying for state last season.

Hager said there are also several new freshmen that she's excited to see compete, including Bryn Renner, a freshman sprinter; and Anna Welker, a freshman distance runner who qualified for state in cross country.

"I hope we can lay some really solid foundations for my new athletes and my freshmen, get them



strong, teach them as much as we can," Hager said. "Last year we had three that went to state. I would love to see us double that or more this year. We just moved down to Class 1 this year. So I am really hoping that we can at least double our amount that we take this year and also hopefully bring home one or two district titles as a whole team, not just in individual events but as a whole team."

Signs of sports injury in young athletes

Youth sports attract scores of participants each year. The National Council of Youth Sports estimates that around 60 million children are registered to play youth sports in the United States. Solutions Research Group Consultants estimates that more than four million Canadian youths participate in one or more organized sports and activities.

The benefits to sports play are numerous, but the advantages to being active and competitive should not overshadow the need to be safe during sports play. According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, nearly 2.7 million young people are treated in the emergency room every year for sports-related injuries.

Parents, coaches and other adults working and volunteering in youth sports must learn to recognize signs that a player has become injured and address those injuries as soon as possible. It can be hard to spot certain sports injuries. The following are some sports injuries and their symptoms.

- ACL tears: Anterior cruciate ligament injuries occur when the ligament connecting the thigh bone and the shin bone tears after an athlete suddenly turns and changes direction, which is common in many sports. Pain is often immediate when suffering a torn ACL, and swelling can occur within several hours of being injured. The child may express that they heard or felt a pop in the knee area and are having trouble supporting their weight.
- Internal abdominal injuries: Internal injuries are less common than other sports injuries, but Stanford Medicine Children's Health says some studies sug-

gest they are on the rise. Injuries to the kidneys, spleen and liver can occur. These injuries can produce pain in the abdomen. The spleen is in the upper left side of the abdomen. The liver is in the upper right side. The kidneys are on the flanks of the body. Blood in urine may be a sign of internal abdominal injury and needs to be addressed promptly.

- Ankle sprain: When the ankle twists or the foot rolls on its side, the ligaments that support the ankle joint can stretch and tear. Swelling and pain usually occur on the outside of the ankle within minutes to a few hours of the injury, depending on injury severity. Because it may be impossible to differentiate an ankle sprain from an ankle fracture without an x-ray, particularly if the pain in the ankle makes putting weight on it unlikely, a visit to an orthopedic doctor may be necessary.
- Broken bones: Bone fractures often happen during collisions with other players or from falls. Sometimes a fracture is obvious, but not always. A snap or grinding sound at the time of injury often signals a fracture, says VCU Health. If there's a break in the skin and the bone is showing, or the athlete cannot bear weight or use the extremity after 15 minutes, an X-ray is likely.
- Concussion: Any activity that can cause an injury to the head may lead to a concussion. A concussion is a mild traumatic brain injury that occurs when the brain is shaken or hit. It can cause temporary changes in brain function. The American Academy of Pediatrics says signs of a concussion can include an athlete who appears dazed or stunned. There may be confusion and the youth could move clumsily and answer questions slowly. An in-



ability to recall events before or after the head trauma, or losing consciousness even briefly, are additional signs of concussion. In older children and teens, nausea, vomiting, balance problems, light sensitivity, and headache also can occur.

• Growth plate injuries: Growth plates are soft cartilage at the end of bones like the arms, legs and fingers that are replaced by strong bones as children get older and stop growing. Growth plates are more susceptible to injury than the rest of the bone. A fracture may not be readily vis-

ible in a growth plate, but doctors can look for other signs. The Mayo Clinic says pain and tenderness and an inability to move the affected area or put weight or pressure on the limb are signs of a growth plate injury. It's important to note that growth plate fractures occasionally can be caused by overuse from repetitive throwing or during sports training.

Young athletes should be encouraged to participate in sports, but adults should be mindful of common sports injuries and learn how to spot them.

What parents should know about asthma

No one ever fully knows what's around the corner in regard to their personal health, and children are not immune from that uncertainty. A child can seem fully healthy one day only to be unexpectedly diagnosed with a medical condition the next.

That scenario has unfolded for millions of children diagnosed with asthma, an incurable yet manageable disease. The Asthma and Allergy Foundation estimates that 4.9 million children in the United States have asthma, while Asthma Canada reports that more than 900,000 Canadian youths under the age of 19 have the chronic disease. Such figures underscore how important it is for parents to learn the basics of asthma.

What is asthma?

Asthma Canada reports that doctors define asthma as a chronic inflammatory disease of the airway. The World Health Organization reports that asthma is caused by inflammation and muscle tightening around the airways that makes it harder to breathe.

What are the symptoms of asthma?

The AAFA notes that asthma often begins in children, but its initial symptoms tend to vary depending on a child's age. Babies and toddlers exhibit different symptoms than school-aged children and teenagers.

The AAFA reports that, among babies and toddlers, signs and symptoms of asthma may include:

- Persistent, repeated coughing, which can occur at night
 - Fast or rapid breathing

- A need to work harder to breathe
 - Flaring nostrils
- Skin that sucks in around and between ribs or above the sternum
- Exaggerated belly movement
- Panting even when engaging in normal activities, such as playing
- Wheezing (a whistling sound)
 - Trouble sucking or eating
- Tiredness that contributes to disinterest in normal or favorite activities
- Cyanosis, a tissue color change on mucus membranes (tongue, lips, and around the eyes) and fingertips or nail beds. Cyanosis appears grayish or whitish on darker skin tones and bluish on lighter skin tones.

Signs and symptoms that affect school-aged children and teenagers may include the above but also:

- Shortness of breath
- Cough
- Pain or tightness in the chest
- Waking at night due to these symptoms
- A drop in their peak flow meter reading (if your child uses one)
- Exercise intolerance marked by an inability to engage in physical activity that's normal for the child's age

Why do millions of children develop asthma?

Medical experts are uncertain about the exact causes of asthma in youngsters. However, the AAFA identifies various risk factors that could increase a child's



- A family history of asthma
- Respiratory illnesses, such as flu, RSV and colds
- Allergies and eczema (atopic dermatitis)
- A mother who smoked during pregnancy
- Exposure to secondhand and thirdhand tobacco smoke or e-cigarette aerosol after birth
- Living in an area with high air pollution

What is the prognosis for children diagnosed with asthma?

Treatment is vital to con-

trolling asthma and limiting the extent of its effects on children's lives. According to the AAFA, when a child's asthma is under control he or she can expect to live a life with few or no symptoms and no interruptions to daily activities like sports, play and exercise. Kids whose asthma is being treated also can expect to miss fewer school days and require fewer trips to urgent care facilities and hospitals.

Asthma affects millions of children. Parents who learn about the disease can better identify when kids need treatment that can greatly reduce the effects asthma has on their daily lives.



Tips to reduce youth sports head injuries

The benefits of youth sports are numerous and varied. Making friends and getting regular physical exercise stand out as benefits of sports participation. But youth sports also pose a danger that athletes and their parents should not overlook.

Head injuries are a very real concern for young athletes. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, which collects data about traumatic brain injuries, says about seven out of 10 emergency department visits for sports- and recreation-related traumatic brain injuries and concussions affect children ages 17 and under. Boys have about twice the rate of emergency department visits for these type of injuries than girls. However, the CDC warns that girls have a higher chance for sports-related concussion than boys in sports that use the same rules, like soccer and basketball. Preventing concussion and TBIs comes down to education and practicing certain safety guidelines.

It's important to know which youth sports produce the highest rates of concussion and other head injuries. Boys tackle football, girls soccer, boys lacrosse, boys ice hockey, boys wrestling, girls lacrosse, girls field hockey, girls basketball, boys soccer, and girls softball have the highest rates of concussion in this order, according to a 2018 report in the journal Pediatrics. Across all sports, two out of three concussions result from collisions among athletes.

New concussion guidelines are updated in schools and youth sports programs across the country, and it's important for coaches and volunteers to



abide by them. For example, U.S. Soccer implemented new guidelines that state no child under the age of 10 should be heading the ball during practice or games. For athletes between the ages of 11 and 13, heading should be limited to practice only.

Young athletes should wear the right protective equipment for their sports, such as helmets, padding, eye and mouth guards, and shin guards. This equipment should be worn consistently, fit properly and be well maintained.

Full-contact play should be delayed until later in adolescence. The Children's Hospital of Philadelphia says high schoolage athletes are better equipped cognitively to understand and learn proper sports play techniques to protect themselves from injury-causing impacts. Coaches should teach and consistently emphasize proper technique to young athletes.

By implementing these strategies, the number of head injuries incurred by young athletes can be reduced considerably.



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
