Michael Glover— 17 counts aggravated sexual exploitation of a minor; one count sexual exploitation of a minor. According to the indictment, Glover knowingly possessed more than 100 images that included a minor engaged in sexual or simulated sexual activity, and promoted, sold, distributed, transported or exchanged more than 25 such images.

Tiffani Hulen— one count aggravated statutory rape; one count solicitation of a minor; six counts solicitation of a minor to observe sexual conduct.

Madison Nabors— Aggravated child abuse, endangerment neglect, Haley's Law, under 8; possession of meth; possession of Schedule VI; possession of drug paraphernalia; theft of merchandise under \$1,000; shoplifting; shoplifting; public intoxication. According to the

indictment, a child 8 or under for whom Nabors was responsible tested positive for meth, and she left a child unattended in the Walmart parking lot while intoxicated.

but provides bags of foods to elementary school children in need

for the weekends and holidays," explained Hannah.

The nonprofit provides more than 500 bags weekly for chil-

dren at Northside, East Hardin, Pickwick Southside, Parris South, West Hardin and Adamsville elementary schools.

"While we do get some food from the Church of Latter-day Saints, we mostly purchase all of the food ourselves at an average cost of \$5,000 a week — and it's more when students are off from school for breaks. We rely solely on donations to help make sure children in our community do not go hungry," Hannah shared.

Our Daily Bread was founded by Hannah's parents, Finley and Judith Beckham, who also serve as the organization's co-presidents.

"We also couldn't operate without our volunteers. Our volunteers are amazing and it is hard, physical work. With that said, we

could always use more if people are willing to help," Hannah said.

As for the weekly food boxes the organization previously provided to others in need, she said they are working restore the program, but it will not be until next year.

Happy Thanksgiving, everyone!

I'm sure those who cooked the traditional Thanksgiving meal will have leftovers for days. I have a wonderful recipe for leftover turkey that my family loves almost as much as our Thanksgiving meal. It also makes great finger foods for those football parties.

Cranberry turkey sliders

Ingredients

- 16 ounce package Hawaiian rolls (12 count)
- 1 pound deli turkey, thinly sliced.
- 1 cup cranberry sauce (jellied or whole berry)
- 6 slices Havarti or provolone cheese
- 4 tablespoons unsalted butter, melted.
- 2 teaspoons Worcestershire
- 2 teaspoons Dijon

- mustard
- 2 teaspoons minced dried onion.
- 2 teaspoons poppy seeds
- 2 teaspoons fresh minced chives

Directions

- Preheat oven to 350.
- Spray 9x13 baking dish with cooking spray.
- Slice rolls in half lengthwise and place the bottom half into the baking dish.
- Layer the deli turkey across the rolls
- Spread the cranberry sauce evenly across the top of the turkey.
- Add 6 slices of Havarti or provolone cheese in an even layer.
- Place the top bun layer onto the sliders.
- Mix the melted butter, Worcestershire, Dijon mustard, minced dried onion, poppy seeds and chives in a small bowl. Generously brush across the tops of the slider buns.
- Cover the baking dish with foil and bake in oven for 15-18 minutes, or until the sliders are warmed through and the is melted.
- Remove foil and bake for another 3-5 minutes to brown tops of the sliders.
