Tennessee sellers of vaccine disinformation have their YouTube channel removed

A major online seller of disinformation about COVID-19 and its vaccines has had one of its channels removed from You-Tube, last month, days after an Associated Press investigation detailed how they work with other spreaders of false information to make money.

The Truth About Vaccines YouTube channel was taken down, Ty and Charlene Bollinger said in a post on the messaging app Telegram. The Bollingers' channel had about 75,000 subscribers but some of its videos had a much broader reach, including one that had over 1.5 million views and featured Robert F. Kennedy, Jr., a prominent voice in the anti-vaccine movement.

A message that greets visitors to the channel says the account was "terminated for violating YouTube's Community Guide-

Still, the Bollingers operate The Truth About Cancer, another YouTube channel with more than 166,000 subscribers. Anyone who goes to that channel and searches "vaccines" will find videos that sow distrust and fear about vaccines or push disinformation about COVID-19. At least one includes debunked falsehoods about the presidential election.

"While that continues, You-Tube can't be said to have taken effective action," said Imran Ahmed, CEO of the Center for Countering Digital Hate, which monitors online disinformation.

"They've taken some action, but they need to act in a comprehensive way against those people they know abuse that platform to spread misinformation that might lead to people not taking cancer medication, not taking crucial vaccines that protect them against disease," he said. "This is life and death stuff."

The group earlier this year named the Tennessee couple among its "The Disinformation Dozen," which it said were responsible for nearly two-thirds of the anti-vaccine content online. Ahmed said that the move would disrupt the couple's business, which relies heavily on free videos to generate sales leads.

But he said YouTube parent Google has known for months about the Bollingers pushing misinformation, and that the removal had taken far too long.

The Bollingers are also operating accounts on other social media platforms that remain up, including a Facebook page that has more than 1.1 million

The Bollingers complained about YouTube's decision in a post on Telegram, writing that "I think they are desperate and are losing." It was unclear who they were referring to.

An AP investigation published last month showed how the Bollingers had worked with others in the anti-vaccine movement to make money by selling disinformation, an enterprise that the Bollingers have said generated millions of dollars for themselves and their affiliates. The story also detailed how the Bollingers

used connections from their anti-vaccine business, including Kennedy, to raise money for a Super PAC.

Platforms including You-Tube, Facebook, Instagram and Twitter have for years allowed anti-vaccination propaganda to spread and been slow to crack down on misinformation about COVID-19, removing just a fraction of the false content.

Ahmed said that there has now been a series of actions by social media platforms against the people his group identified as the worst anti-vaccine disinformation offenders.

"But it's all too piecemeal," he said. "If they're given any means by which to survive, these bad actors will try to adapt and try to focus on the channels they have available to them."

Study: Tenn. ranks 7th from bottom in health care

The U.S. health care system faced new levels of scrutiny in the past year amid the COVID-19 pandemic. There were shortages of medical masks, ICU beds, as well as nurses. But even before the pandemic, some states were much better equipped to handle both everyday health needs -- and the pandemic -- than others.

There are many states in which residents are much more likely to lack health care insurance. In many of these states, there are also fewer medical professionals relative to the population, which can hinder access to care, as well as underfunded medical hospitals.

The health care system in Tennessee ranks as the seventh worst in the country.

Tennessee's health care system ranks among the worst in the U.S. largely due to the state's relatively low spending on health care and hospitals as well as fewer than average numbers of health professionals per capita. The state spends \$111 per person on health care and \$56 per resident on hospitals, both well below the respective nationwide per capita figures of \$205 and \$294.

Tennessee residents may also have a harder time accessing certain health specialists than people in other states. There are 157.7 mental health providers per 100,000 residents in the state compared to 261.2 per 100,000 in the U.S. as a

The state ranks lower in the in the study.

number of dentists per 100,000 residents with 55.5 dentists per 100,000 residents in the state compared to 71.2 per 100,000 people nationwide. Just over a fifth of Tennessee adults report being in poor or fair health, the seventh highest share in the country.

To identify the states with the worst health care systems, 24/7 Wall St. constructed an index comprising six health measures for each state: the share of residents without health insurance, state spending on health care as well as on hospitals per capita, and the number of dentists, doctors, and mental health providers per 100,000 people. Each of these measures was weighted equally in the index.

Only Indiana, Nevada, Mississippi, Arizona, Georgia and Texas ranked below Tennessee

Ayers Foundation assisted Hardin County teachers with tech training for remote learning

Those who impart knowledge - teachers in Hardin County - were behind the learning curve themselves at the beginning of the school year 2020-21. How does an educator quickly learn all the technology and strategies required to keep up with the varied teaching settings this year presented?

With COVID-19, the school year was extraordinarily unusual. School routines were almost nonexistent and were continually disrupted by quarantining.

From the beginning, parents had the option of hindering the spread of COVID-19 by letting them learn from home.

School attendance requirements for students who learned at the school building went through several changes during the year. For a time students were divided into two groups that attended every other week.

Teachers were faced with making lesson plans for students in all these diverse situations as well as learn themselves how teach the children at home via an online audio and web conferencing platform called Zoom.

The Ayers Foundation partnered with and funded several organizations who provided essential training needed to make this year successful.

Hardin County is one of 15 rural school districts participating in the Tennessee Rural Acceleration and Innovation Network (TRAIN), a partnership with The Ayers Foundation, the National Institute for Excellence in Teaching (NIET), the Ayers Institute for Teacher Learning and Innovation, and the State Collaborative on Reforming Education (SCORE).

"Supporting rural Tennessee has always been our passion, and this has been a time when we believed philanthropy had an even bigger role to play in ensuring students and teachers in rural Tennessee had what they needed to be successful," said Janet Ayers, president of The Ayers Foundation. "Rural Tennesseans have faced many of the same challenges as those in larger and better resourced communities, so we wanted to rally in

support of local school districts to help them to be successful during this incredibly challenging school year."

The TRAIN partnership provided trainings as needed to educators in Hardin County, generally doing so virtually via Zoom, An expert from NIET or the Ayers Institute would connect directly with teachers and administrators to model something – such as how to set up an engaging Google Classroom or what it looks like to translate teaching strategies into a virtual classroom - or to coach and provide feedback. This could be for just a couple hours or for a full day.

"This school year has brought all school systems many new challenges. Our district has made the health and safety of our children a top priority while at the same time recognizing there must be an even greater emphasis on teaching and learning," says Hardin County Director of Schools. "Our partnership with TRAIN has been a lifesaver for Hardin County Schools. Through this network, we have been provided great support and resources and are able to learn new ideas which help us to be so successful during such a critical time."

In Hardin County, the TRAIN partnership helped to train and support 275 teachers and school leaders across all seven Hardin County schools, which has impacted 3,376 students across the

At the beginning of the school year this training and modeling focused on virtual

NIET specialists met with some lead teachers in August who were creating virtual template lesson plans and units their peers could work from, and they provided some ideas and feedback to help ensure teachers had a strong outline and template for virtual lessons.

In September, they presented virtually to all teachers in Hardin on specific instructional strategies for online classrooms and how to plan for virtual lessons.

This spring, mostly in April, NIET and Ayers have met virtually with school leadership teams to help them strengthen their coaching and leadership strategies so they can better support their teachers. NIET has also been helping instructional leadership team members with analyzing data and setting goals for the upcoming year.

"This school year has taught us the importance of being flexible and open to new ideas. Our teachers and students have truly been amazing," Davis said. "We have been able to provide our students and teachers the support they need through the support we have received from TRAIN partners. We are forever grateful for our partnership with The Ayers Foundation, NIET, and the entire TRAIN network."

Sunrise Aftercare – Hemingway

He was an accomplished writer, a precious soul loved by many of the public who read or have read his work. Yet, he was a troubled soul. Sadly, his life did not end well and many in his family members struggled with mental illness. At one point in time there were seven suicides in the Hemingway family with the most prominent being Ernest.

His granddaughter Mariel, who struggled with depression and suicide, said, "I started to realize I had a great understanding of the whole space" and "I was drawn to being able to tell a story so that other people do not feel alone, so they do not feel isolated inside the darkness - because there is so much darkness when you do not speak about it, and there's so much hope and light in recovery if you're able to tell your story."

She said she did not have clinical depression, but did have a genetic predisposition for it. To the best of our understanding, Ernest was one who struggled mightily with his "demons," whatever they were, in addition to his drinking, insomnia, etc.

It was said that he was tortured by "fantasies of suicide (that) thronged his mind, intermingled with fears of insanity." (Biographer Kenneth Lynn)

There is still a stigma surrounding the subject of mental illness. We do not like to talk about this topic – not families (the Hemingways did not) nor society.

Yet, if we are to change the ugly trend of self-induced deaths from people struggling with mental illness then we are going to have to get comfortable talking about this topic with family and others. Along this same line we need to encourage more mental health survivors, people who are living with illnesses above the neck to tell their story to others.

Shackelford's grief support group, Sunrise Aftercare, is held every third Thursday, at 6 p.m., in the conference room of the TVEC. David Coy of Shackelford is the facilitator. Unity Hospice Care is a partner.
