## Memorial Day Ceremony In Waynesboro "A Day Of Remembrance"



A special ceremony honoring those who gave the ultimate sacrifice for their country was held on Memorial Day, Monday, May 25<sup>th</sup>, on the courthouse lawn in Waynesboro.

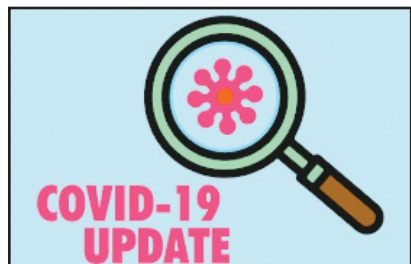
The annual ceremony, hosted by American Legion Posts 130 and 254 from Waynesboro and Collinwood, featured greetings and remarks from officials including Tennessee State Representative David Byrd and Wayne County Executive Jim Mangubat.

The Roll of Honor was read, which includes the names of all Wayne County service men and service women who perished during World War I, World War II, the Korean War, and the Vietnam War. The names of Wayne County veterans who have passed away since Memorial Day 2019 were read as well.



The ceremony concluded with the placement of a wreath on the Veterans' Memorial, followed by a 21-gun salute, the playing of "Taps," and the raising of the national colors by the American Legion Honor Guard.

## Wayne Medical Center To Receive More Funding For Rural Hospitals



Last week, Governor Bill Lee announced the final distribution of \$10 million in Small and Rural Hospital Readiness Grants to support smaller hospitals that are facing financial strain due to the ongoing response to COVID-19. Wayne Medical Center will be the recipient of a grant in the amount of \$500,000.00, the maximum awarded. This grant follows a previous Rural Hospital Readiness Grant awarded to Wayne Medical Center earlier this month in the amount of \$190,820.00.

"Our small and rural hospitals play a critical role in their communities, providing both necessary care to patients and good-paying jobs to residents, and we're proud to support these hospitals through such unprecedented times," said Governor Lee. "We'll continue to work with hospitals across our state and the federal government to ensure hospitals have the resources they need to maintain operations and serve their communities well."

"I personally want to thank Wayne Medical Center and their staff for the great work they

are doing as they serve on the frontline of this pandemic," said State Representative David Byrd. "They are certainly deserving of this additional funding to help in the fight against COVID-19 in our community."

Spread across 29 hospitals in 28 counties, the grants help smaller hospitals bridge funding gaps created by reduced patient volumes while federal funds become available. Applicants were required to demonstrate that they are actively pursuing available federal relief.

## Inmates At SCCF Build Wood Duck Nest Boxes For TWRA

On May 20<sup>th</sup>, 2020, Tennessee Wildlife Resources Agency personnel met with inmates at Core Civic South Central Correctional Facility in Clifton to pick up some wood duck nest boxes. The nest boxes were constructed by the inmates from South Central Correctional Facility.

The inmates are able to recycle wood pallets, and the inmates who are assigned to the Wheels for the World wood shop are able to make wood duck houses to the exact requirements. All parts are recycled and are excellent quality. The houses will be used throughout middle Tennessee to provide wood ducks with much needed nesting habitats. Wood ducks naturally nest in hollow tree cavities, but sometimes a suitable natural nesting site is not available.

These nest boxes will be placed at Laurel Hill Lake and VFW Lake, and

some were given to David Crockett Park. The boxes will be placed on a tree or pole that hangs over the water about six feet high in sites that are suitable brood habitats. It is best to find shallow fertile wetlands with thick cover to place the boxes. Predator guards, which are metal cones around the tree, will also be placed under the boxes to help keep snakes and raccoons from getting in the boxes and destroying the nests. The boxes have a hinged side opening that makes it easy to clean out the old nesting debris in early spring and replace it with four inches of fresh

cedar shavings for new nesting material. Also, inside the nest boxes are screens or hardware cloth which assist the young hatchlings in climbing out of the boxes.

There was great interest in getting the boxes from TWRA wildlife management areas throughout middle Tennessee, and the prison partners are planning to make more nest boxes soon to be distributed to other locations. TWRA personnel were Pam McDonald, Tony Self, and Ben Garland.

on to their reward.

Some of them went to their graves as a result of armed conflict on the battlefields of our long memory; Europe, The Pacific, Italy, North Africa, Korea. Some of you know of whom I speak.

Others succumbed to mortality in the swamps of Vietnam, the deserts of Iraq and Afghanistan, the jungles of Panama and other worldwide hotspots. Some of you know of whom I speak.

These are grandfathers, great-grandfathers, uncles, great-uncles, cousins and other family members who live on with us only in pictures or the stories of youth told by those left behind to support their efforts on the home front. Some of you know of whom I speak.

We also remember those who, by God's mercy, returned to us wounded in body and spirit, many living out their lives in misery, not understanding the reason for their hardships, but victimized by their sacrifices. Some of you know of whom I speak.

Their own memories were scarred by the horrors they witnessed, many refusing to talk about what they saw and taking their own "memories" to their graves. Some of you know of whom I speak.

Others returned to reestablish lives, create families, build businesses, spread the faith that sustained them through the years of watching men perpetrate horrific acts of violence against each other and to teach their children about the greatness of America.

Our "Greatest Generation" that saw 16,000,000 men and women in uniform (a full 20% of our adult population) gave way to a new "Generation" that lost 58,000 in the jungles of Southeast Asia to the newest "Greatest Generation," an all-volunteer force, the best-educated and best-equipped in the history of the planet.

Regardless of the decade, today in this solemn assembly we pause to remember those who served us who are gone on. In this moment, you may choose to close your eyes to visualize the faces of your family members, friends, neighbors, former employees, church members, students.

Perhaps that visual is an old black-and-white photo of an Easter Sunday, all-dressed-up picture where you remember the last time you saw or spoke to the one who is now missing.

Perhaps it is a staged school class picture, marked up at a later date with the names of those lost with the year they passed. Perhaps it is a wedding photo, where a husband went off to war, never to return.

Perhaps it is a stack of letters, tattered by years of unfolding, especially the one received after the news of that loved one's loss on a battlefield thousands of miles away. Perhaps it is the closet still filled with the clothing of one who passed that still bears the smell of our loved one.

All these prove to us how powerful memory is, how important it is that we not minimize it, and how healing it is that we gather in this moment to recognize those whose actions continue to provide the freedom we enjoy.

Perhaps your loved one served the nation at a time devoid of conflict. We gather here to also observe the memories of those who still took that sacred oath and stood ready to engage any force that threatened the homeland.

Whichever conflict your loved one served in, or whether they served the nation in the absence of conflict, this day is their day. And please, while we honor all who serve and remain with us today, we will gather again on November 11 and honor them. On that day, they will be able to experience our appreciation while they live.

But today, for this moment, we pause to catch that visual reminder, watch an old home movie, thumb through a family Bible, or take our children or grandchildren through a tattered scrapbook, or stand silently at a final resting place.

Those who put self aside, who traveled far from home and endured the loneliness of separation and who endured numerous hazards; all for those of us standing here today within the sound of my voice.

We remember you. We salute you. We honor you. And we search for the same character that you modeled before us.

May God bless them. May God bless us. May God bless our nation.

- Do not touch your eyes, nose or mouth with unwashed hands;
- Stay home when you are sick;
- Cover your coughs and sneezes with your arm or a tissue;
- Clean and disinfect objects (e.g., cell phone, computer) and high-touch surfaces regularly;
- Practice social/physical distancing from others, be safer at home; and,
- Wear cloth facemasks or coverings in public.

All Tennesseans, especially those in high-risk populations, are encouraged take the

following actions to reduce the possibility of getting sick with COVID-19:

- Keep space (at least 6') between yourself and others;
- Limit your time in public to essential needs only, such as grocery trips, medical care, pharmacy needs or emergencies;
- When you are in public, avoid crowds as much as possible, and keep away from others who are sick, limit close contact and wash your hands often;

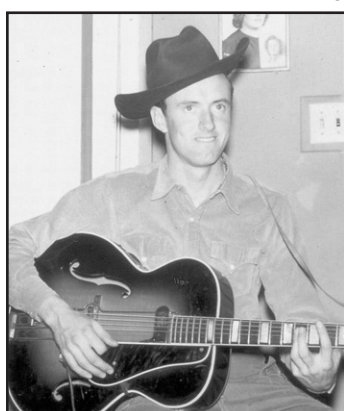

be evaluated as a trusted source before implementing advice. "There is no safety guarantee when working with machinery or heavy tools, but safety should always be the number one goal," says Graves.

For those who are clearing debris after a storm, follow these guidelines as well:

- Treat every downed power line as if it is 'live.' Stay away and let the power company crews remove limbs and trees from power lines. Never touch a power line with anything, nor touch anything that may be in contact with the power line. Remember, the lines are uninsulated and may be over 14,000 volts and capable of currents in hundreds of amps. Electricity can arc a considerable distance and travel through trees to electrocute you. Moving a power line with a wooden pole is very dangerous, because the pole will conduct electricity. Linemen use specially designed tools and safety gear, and have been properly trained to safely handle power lines.

- Broken limbs hanging in trees are nicknamed widowmakers. Don't work underneath them. They can fall without warning. Even small limbs can cause very serious or fatal injuries.

- Downed or damaged trees and limbs can be under very high stresses from being bent. Use extreme caution and relieve the stress with a series of shallow cuts to the outside of the bend before attempting a cut all the way through. Failure to do this can cause the limb or trunk to snap violently.

- Never attempt to remove a lodged tree by cutting the tree it is leaning against! The results are often fatal. Lodged trees are best removed by professionals using a tractor or winch to pull it down in relative safety.

- Never turn your back on a falling tree! Have at least two clear routes at angles opposite to the direction the tree is supposed to fall. Keep your eyes on the tree so you can alter your course should something unexpected happen.

**Parental Monitoring Helps Youth Succeed**

Parents who are aware of their children's activities and whereabouts have kids who are less likely to get involved with problem behaviors.

Remember the slogan, "It's 10 p.m. Do you know where your children are?" It reminded parents about the importance of monitoring their children. Research shows that parents who are aware of their children's activities and whereabouts have kids who are less likely to be negatively influenced by peers or to get involved with problem behaviors.

But how can parents monitor their child's activities?

Experts suggest that good parental monitoring involves setting clear expectations for behavior, having consequences in place when the rules are broken, and actively tracking your child's behavior.

Children of all ages need limits to help provide them with structure for living. Setting limits teaches children that you care about them and that you want them to be safe and responsible. It's a good idea to involve children in your limit discussions since they are more likely to cooperate in meeting that limit. However, keep in mind that these discussions do not always mean that parents

and kids agree on every limit but at least they've had input. Be sure the rules are reasonable, clear, positive and enforceable. Your children should understand the "why" behind the limit and why it is important to follow it.

After rules are established, create consequences with your child if the rules are broken. Consequences should be related to a specific rule, and be reasonable and respectful.

Tracking your child's behavior should start in early childhood and continue throughout the teen years, evolving as children grow and mature. Some things you can do to monitor your child are ask questions. Remember who, what, where and when. For example, with whom will you be, what will you be doing, where will you be, or when will you be home. Other ways to track your kids' activities include checking in with them by phone and getting to know his/her friends and their parents.



**Chainsaw Safety Tips**

Use Common Sense and These Tips to Stay Safe

Springtime in Tennessee often comes with severe weather that can cause property damage. University of Tennessee Institute of Agriculture professor Chris Graves advises following common-sense safety practices while cleaning debris.

"Every year, I coordinate federal chainsaw safety training for the Department of Forestry, Wildlife and Fisheries, and teach this material as well. Chainsaws are specialty tools that, if mishandled or used incorrectly, can seriously injure the user or someone nearby," says the expert. "These protocols will be crucial to ensuring that homeowners and others stay safe."

- Recognize that not only is the chainsaw operator at risk, others in the vicinity can be injured by limbs or debris thrown by trees as they fall. Everyone in the area must wear proper clothing and safety gear.

- Everyone in the area must always wear an approved hard hat. Even small debris striking you in the head can cause traumatic brain injuries. It may also momentarily disorient you and cause you to be injured by the saw or other objects.

- Wear proper footwear, which includes sturdy shoes or boots with non-slip soles. Steel-toe safety shoes or boots are recommended. If these are properly sized, you won't feel the toe cap. The toe cap withstands more than 1,500 pounds, so imagine what your foot would look like without its protection.

- Eye protection is vital. You are at risk of chips from the saw as well as twigs and other objects. Consider a mesh face shield for your hard hat because it will not

fog up like goggles and is comfortable for those who wear glasses.

- Hearing protection, whether ear plugs or muffs, prevents noise-induced hearing loss. A chainsaw is loud enough to cause hearing damage in just a few minutes, even for bystanders. Hearing protection also reduces the saw noise to a level safe for your ears, and you can actually better hear unusual sounds and warnings if your inner ear is not overwhelmed.

- Gloves with leather palms can absorb some of the vibration from the saw. They can also help protect you from scrapes and abrasions from your surroundings. Gloves with Kevlar padding provide even more protection from cuts.

- Kevlar chaps prevent cuts and scrapes from limbs, thorns, etc., and they are designed to protect you from incidental contact with the moving saw chain. They cannot provide absolute protection from a saw under full throttle, but many cuts to the legs are from a coasting chain after a cut is completed or situations such as stumbling or falling.

- Make sure the saw is in good working order and properly sharpened. Dull saws slow you down and if you get frustrated you might make mistakes. Have a spare chain and tools with you so you can quickly make repairs and safely return to work.

- What dulls a saw faster than anything else? Hitting a steel wedge or other hard objects. Plastic wedges are inexpensive and can prevent costly downtime, yet are strong enough for serious blows with a heavy sledge hammer.

Graves adds that there are many educational tutorials on YouTube from chainsaw manufacturers, but cautions that all material should

**Weekly STEM Activity**

Last week's STEM activity dealt with a process called paper chromatography. When you dip the paper in the water, the dried black pigment dissolves and begins to separate. The water travels up the paper, carrying the pigment

along with it. Since the different colored pigments are carried along at different rates, some will travel farther and faster than others – how fast each pigment travels depends on the size of the pigment molecule and how strongly the pigment is attracted to the paper. Since the water carries the different pigments at different rates, the black ink separates the colors that were mixed to make it, resulting in a rainbow on the paper.

This week's STEM activity is best done outside... it can get a little wet and messy! We're going to make a tornado in a bottle! The supplies you will need are two empty bottles (you can use 20 ounce bottles or 2 liter bottles, but they will need to be the same size), water, duct tape, and food coloring.

Fill the first bottle until about two-thirds full and add food coloring. Align the second bottle's opening with the first, and secure it in place with duct tape. Move your bottles in a circle until the water is moving like a vortex inside, and flip it so the empty bottle is on the bottom to watch your tornado spin! (You may need to move it in a circle just a little more to keep the vortex moving.)

How does this work? How is the action in this bottled tornado similar to the action of a real tornado?

## Tennessee Revises Child Support Guidelines

The Tennessee Department of Human Services (TDHS) is implementing revised child support guidelines this week that will help align all child support orders with changing family economics, improve the system for both custodial and noncustodial parents, and meet new federal requirements.

These are the first major changes to Tennessee's child support guidelines since 2005, and they include:

- Granting noncustodial parents the right to request a modification of their child support order if they are sentenced to or currently serving more than 180 days of incarceration.
- Allowing credit for health, vision and dental care paid by stepparents in the child support calculations.
- Creating a minimum child support order of \$100 for noncustodial parents in some circumstances.
- Establishing a self-support reserve for noncustodial

parents to ensure they have enough resources for basic needs while fulfilling their child support obligations. Under this change, child support orders in most cases would leave the noncustodial parent with at least \$1,150 a month to live on.

•Allowing a person's criminal record to be used to determine a parent's income if there is no other evidence to use in child support calculations.

"These revised guidelines were created through two years of collaborative work involving parents, attorneys, and our staff who were all committed to improving the child support system and helping build a thriving Tennessee," said Commissioner Danielle W. Barnes. "Parents depend on child support to create a better life for their children and it's important for the system to reflect the changing economic realities of today's families."

To ensure these revised

guidelines don't create an influx of new child support modification requests, TDHS is implementing a temporary requirement for case modifications that will remain in effect until November 10, 2020. During this time there must be a change of circumstances, such as income or number of children, in addition to at least a 15% change between the amount of the current support order and the amount of the proposed order for the case modification to be granted.

Additionally, parents with an iPhone can download an app to get an estimate of what their child support order will look like under these new guidelines. The app can be found on the Apple store by searching Child Support Calculator of TN. Parents who already have the Child Support Calculator of TN app will need to update it to reflect the new guidelines.

The TDHS Child Support Program provides services

that promote parental responsibility to meet the financial needs of children and their families and provides the following assistance:

- Location of a child's parent(s) for the purpose of obtaining support or establishing paternity.
- Establishment of paternity.
- Establishment and enforcement of child support orders.
- Establishment and enforcement of medical support.
- Collection and distribution of payments.
- Modification of child sup-

port orders.

•Enforcement of spousal support orders, if child support is involved.

The Child Support Program additionally provides support services to help noncustodial parents find the employment and job training they need to meet their child support obligations. Barriers such as lack of education, job skills, substance abuse, health problems, and transportation hinder the ability to obtain long term employment and develop strong relationships with their children. The Child Support Program has partnered with agencies to create a referral network to address these needs.

staff to schedule these patients and provide the care that they need," said Dr. Chaney.

MRH hospitals continue to have a no visitation policy, with limited exceptions, in an effort to protect patients and mitigate potential spread of COVID-19. Only specific patients are allowed to have one support person present during their visit. These exceptions include surgical patients, emergency room patients, expectant mothers and pediatric patients. Exceptions for end of life care and those patients with physical or cognitive disabilities will be reviewed on a case-by-case basis. All support persons who meet exception criteria must go through a screening process and are required to remain in the facility. Both patients and support persons are encouraged to bring a personal mask with them, which they must wear at all times while in the hospital.

Those patients seeking care at a Maury Regional Medical Group practice or outpatient services including—but not limited to—urgent care, cardiac diagnostics, imaging, physical therapy, sleep

studies and wound care are also asked to bring a personal mask with them during their visit and to come alone whenever possible. At times, visitors may be encouraged to wait outside of the facility or return at a later time to maintain appropriate social distancing within designated waiting areas.

"Our region has done an outstanding job of social distancing, hand washing and respiratory hygiene to slow the spread of COVID-19. As more businesses open, our communities must remain diligent in continuing to utilize these practices. We must work together to balance safety measures with the health care needs of our region," said Dr. Chaney.

According to Dr. Chaney, facilities continue to be cleaned to the same strict standards the organization has always practiced and additional protocols implemented include regular disinfection of frequently touched surfaces, social distancing and masking.

TN, and stole a 4-wheeler, a truck, and other items. Hanback was booked into the Wayne County Jail on \$77,500.00 bond.



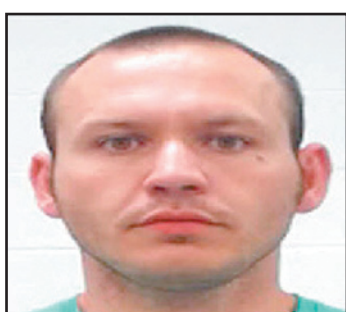

## Snap Benefits Will Soon Extend To Online Purchasing

U.S. Secretary of Agriculture Sonny Perdue announced last week that households in 13 new states, including Tennessee, will soon be able to purchase food online with their Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) benefits. Once operational, online purchasing will be available in 36 states and the District of Columbia, home to more than 90% of SNAP participants.

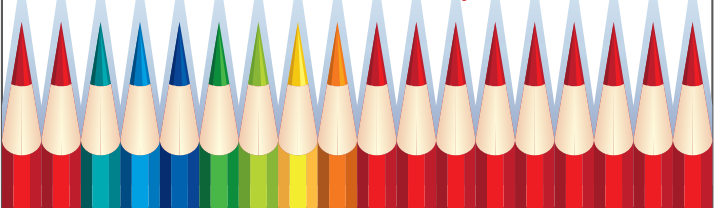

#### Final actions of the 2020 legislative session through March 19

Our last update discussed the significant bills that we passed through March 19<sup>th</sup> regarding Education. I would like to now give you an update on legislation that we have passed involving Health. One of our main concerns is ensuring the health and welfare of Tennesseans and I believe the passing of this legislation is a step in the right direction. My office is always open to assist you with whatever needs you have, especially during this time. I am committed to serving District 28 and am available any time to provide assistance.

Legislation helps rural health clinics recruit doctors -- The General Assembly enacted legislation allowing rural health clinics to employ a physician, a move that will help many Tennessee counties. Current law prevents corporations from employing doctors due to a ban on the corporate practice of medicine with certain exceptions for hospitals, nursing homes, and federally qualified health centers. The measure was passed to aid efforts to recruit doctors to work in Tennessee's rural health clinics and in economically distressed communities.

New law encourages lower health care costs through Association Health Plans -- Legislation which aims to lower premiums and overall health care costs for small businesses through Association Health Plans (AHP) was approved this year. The new law aligns Tennessee's AHP laws with new federal rules put into place by President Trump's administration to help small businesses purchase

affordable, high quality health insurance as a result of increased flexibility.

AHPs allow small businesses and entrepreneurs to band together with other businesses to purchase insurance with the bargaining power of a big company. The plans are similar to comprehensive large group or self-insured insurance policies offered by most large employers, covering the same types of treatments and procedures.

Since 2003, average family premiums for Tennessee small employers have increased over 75 percent, while at the same time deductibles have spiked. As a result, almost 30,000 fewer workers at small businesses have private insurance coverage due to the decreased affordability.

New law encourages alternative pain treatments to opioids -- Legislation encouraging the use of more alternative pain treatments rather than opioids was approved during the 2020 session. The new law amends the state's opioid reform legislation to include medical devices like pain pumps, spinal cord stimulators, occupational therapy and non-opioid medicinal drugs as non-opioid based alternative therapies for chronic pain. A 2019 law called for alternative pain treatment for chiropractic care, physical therapy, acupuncture, and other treatments to be encouraged for pain relief before opioids are dispensed. Both measures are part of an ongoing effort in Tennessee to provide alternative pathways to treat pain in order to curb opioid addiction, which has claimed the lives of thousands of Tennesseans.

New law ensures 911 operators are trained for CPR --

Legislation passed the General Assembly this year to ensure 911 operators across the state are prepared to provide CPR instructions to a caller in an emergency situation. Currently, not all counties allow 911 operators to run callers through CPR instructions. The new law ensures all 911 operators in the state will provide telecommunicator cardiopulmonary resuscitation (T-CPR), as well as receive proper training to administer it. The legislation also includes liability protection for those providing this service.

Senate approves increase in ambulance reimbursement rates -- In addition, legislation that I co-sponsored passed this year increasing the percentage that public and private ambulance services are reimbursed by the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid (CMS) for performing Medicaid transports. On average, ambulance services are reimbursed at 50 percent of the Medicare rate. The new law increases that percentage to 67.5 percent. The state will provide \$7 million to cover the increased reimbursement from federal dollars. Ambulance providers will then draw down approximately \$21 million, for a total of \$28 million going to public and private providers across the state so that lifesaving care can be more adequately compensated.

Legislation gives health boards more tools to protect patients -- The General Assembly enacted legislation giving health-related boards more tools to take swift action to limit the authority of health care providers who have been disciplined in other states. The measure allows all health-related boards to restrict licensure of potentially dangerous practitioners to protect patients when there is a contested hearing. It also provides health boards with new options beyond only suspension, which can be helpful for rural communities that have a limited amount of physicians.

## Excerpts From 2020 Commencement Addresses

“If the world is going to get better, it’s going to be up to you,” former President Barack Obama said in his ‘Graduate Together’ speech. “With everything suddenly feeling like it’s up for grabs, this is your time to seize the initiative. Nobody can tell you anymore that you should be waiting your turn, nobody can tell you anymore that this is how it’s always been done. More than ever this is your moment, your generation’s world to shape,” he continued. “You’ve got more role models, more road maps, more resources than the civilrights generation did. You’ve got more tools, technology and talents than my generation did,” Obama said. He added, “No generation has been better positioned to be

warriors for justice and remake the world.” “Dreams are a great test, because a dream is going to test your resolve, and you’re going to know a dream from a pipe dream,” renowned film director Steven Spielberg said to 2020 graduates. “You’re going to know a dream from a casual brush with something that you got excited about, and then it evaporates.” He continued, “A real dream is something that not only hangs on to you but you will hang onto it. And it will power you through every obstacle that people and your environment will throw against you. If we’re in service of our dreams versus our dreams being in service to us, it becomes something greater. It allows us to be game, and it allows us

to get over our fear to go forward no matter what obstacles are thrown in our path.” “Congratulations to you, chosen ones,” actor Tom Hanks said in his commencement speech for graduates of Wright State University in Ohio earlier in May. “I am calling you ‘chosen ones’ because you have been chosen in many ways. First, by the temperament and discipline you’ve lived by, by the creative fires that are inside of you, and the instinctive lunges of your desires,” Hanks said. He continued, “The future is always uncertain, but we who celebrate what you have done, who celebrate all of your achievements, we are certain of one thing on this day: You will not let us down.”
