### Committee prepares to request bids for ambulance services

The county is preparing to request proposals for ambulance service bids as the current contract with ProMed ends in June.

The Public Works and Safety Committee unanimously passed the RFP on Monday, January 27 at 4:30 p.m. during its regular business meeting. It will move on to the Fiscal Review & Budget Committee on February 6 for consideration before moving on to the full commission.

In other business, the committee approved two vehicles for surplus property from the Emergency Management Agency and Property Assessor's Office; and a homeland security grant received by the Emergency Management Agency to be used for communications equipment.

Also approved to move to the full commission was a grant to be used for the purchase of a new fingerprint machine at the jail.

Road Supervisor Randy Woods recommended low bid for construction on the E. Little Richland concrete bridge that was washed out during the flood.

County Executive Jessie Wallace reported to the committee that John Allen Construction, LLC, Big Sandy, has been hired to build the new hangar at the airport.

With no other business the meeting adjourned at 4:15 p.m.

## HiSET exam offered as new high school equivalency program

Change has been the operative word in Tennessee's adult education system over the last year, and the current change adopted by the state is Educational Testing Service's HiSET program. Tennessee is one of several states that will be offering the affordable, accessible alternative to the GED test. HiSET is an acronym for High School Equivalency Test and will offer students paper-based testing in addition to computer-based testing. The test includes elements that are critical to providing out-of-school youth and adults with proof of their readiness for higher education or the workplace.

Beginning January 1, 2014 the move to HiSET from GED has been an easy transition. The HiSET exam covers the same content areas as the current GED test, and will be accepted by institutions in the same way; however, the HiSET program's advantages include:

- Affordable test fee to keep this valuable credential accessible for candidates, states, and educational programs
- Up to two retests within 12 months for a nominal fee
- Flexibility with the use of existing test centers, test prep and curricula
- English and Spanish versions of the test
- Computer-based and

paper-based testing options

• Test design and validation by experts in assessment development for fair and reliable results

The SDA 33 Adult Education Program continues to offer free preparation classes in Waverly for participants 18 years of age and older. Classes are offered at the Humphreys County Center for Higher Education. A partnership with UT Martin will continue and the HiSET exam will be administered in Dickson County. The test costs \$75 and an online pre-registration is required as well as a pre-paid fee with an electronic check option, gift card, or PayPal account.

The GED test will continue to be offered in

larger testing centers in Tennessee. Adult education centers will not be offering GED instruction. The GED test is only available in the computer-based version and will cost \$120. Students will also have to pay for an online GED practice test before they can take the GED test. These GED stipulations and the cost of the test have led to the transition to the HiSET program. Having an affordable alternative available for the students is of utmost importance for the future of the workforce.

## Funding available for Farmland Preservation in Tennessee

2014 Signup Deadline Is February 28<sup>th</sup>

Eligible entities interested in the Farm and Ranch Lands Protection Program (FRPP) should sign up by the end of February to receive consideration for funding in fiscal year 2014.

FRPP provides matching funds to help purchase development rights to keep productive farmland in agricultural uses. The USDA partners with State, Tribal, or local governments and non-governmental organizations to acquire conservation easements from landowners. USDA provides up to 50 percent of the fair market value of the conservation easement, and eligible entities working with landowners provide the remaining 50 percent. Applicants must have an established agricultural land protection program; the authority to hold and manage easements; the capacity to acquire, manage, and enforce the easements; and ability to supply matching funds.

"Farmland adds to the beauty of our state, yet we are losing farmland at an alarming rate. The FRPP program provides matching funds to help eligible organizations permanently protect farmland," stated State Conservationist Kevin Brown. "Tennessee has

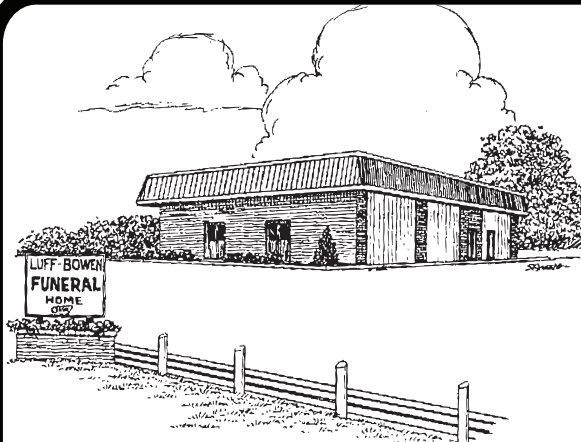

Mackie has always been a soft-spoken, gentle lady with an obvious love for children as well as, a desire to help them learn and grow in their abilities. I have seen this with our own children by their interactions with her through the years. Her work ethic, dedication to her community and deep faith in the God she serves has always been impressive to me.

I have also known several of her immediate family members for most of my life. Mackie called a few days ago to tell me she had written her memoirs and was having them printed in a book.

And so I sat back, relaxed and began scanning the pages, which start with a family history and progress until the present time.

First let me say, I haven't written a book review since Mrs. Charlotte Warren's high school English classes. But, I intend to today.

The book is written in a first person style. From the very beginning, as I read the text, it was if I could hear Mrs. Mackie's voice speaking the words to me as she told her life's story. It contains the good and the bad times, the happy and the sad, the hope to rise above and the hopelessness of being alone, the good feelings of accomplishment and the disappointments of bad choices.

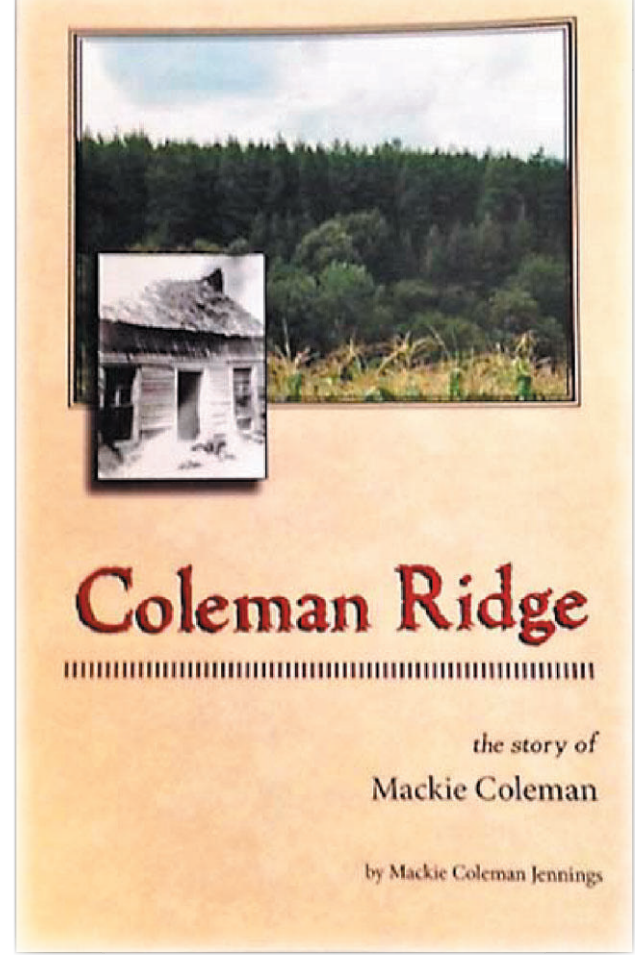
This book is not only her personal journey of achievement beginning in a society that was stacked against her and her family, but also reflects the same journey and obstacles so many of her peers faced as they grew up in the South, poor and black.

As I continued to read, again as if Mrs. Mackie were speaking to me, I found myself seeing the events she describes here in Humphreys County, remembering many of the folks she mentions and learning many things I had not known took place here.

This book is a family history, but within it I also read a lot of Humphreys County history. It tells of the racism they faced here and of the slowly changing social attitudes they experienced. It describes radical changes as they developed from her elementary school days, through college and then as a teacher and

administrator in the educational systems she served. It also describes the pain and anguish brought on by failed relationships and social stigmatism.

It is a story of family love and devotion. It is a story of aspiring to rise above the bigotry and social injustices of the day. It is a story of overcoming racism by working to prove the value of equality for everyone. It is a story of this social change as it evolved during the author's life. It is a story of the personal pride and satisfaction that comes from working hard to make a difference. It is



a story of an unrelenting faith that God would always ultimately make things right for those who work to reach their goals.

I highly recommend this book. I believe you too; will come away from it with a better understanding and a greater appreciation of the contributions towards a better world Mackie and so many others have made in our community. In a word, it is inspiring.

If you have the pleasure of knowing Mrs. Mackie, upon completing her book, your love and respect for her will probably grow. If you don't know her, you will be reading the story of someone you will want to meet and be proud to call a friend.

You have the opportunity to meet Mrs. Mackie and pick up a finished copy of *Coleman Ridge* at a book-signing event at The Humphreys County Library on Tuesday, February 4<sup>th</sup>, from 5 p.m. until 7:30 p.m.

# Let's Be Right on Flag Etiquette...

The American Legion strives to increase the knowledge of the general public in the proper display and respect for the flag of the United States of America.

According to information prepared and distributed by the National Americanism Commission, "In the 1976 revision of the Flag Code by Congress, the symbolism of the United States flag is considered to be a living symbol representing a living country. This reference was added in response to the strong feelings of respect and reverence accorded by many of our citizens. In addition, the flag represents the many freedoms, rights and responsibilities not entrusted to the citizens of any other country in the world. Therefore, the proper display and use of the United States flag is the responsibility of every American citizen. It should be pointed out that the Flag Code is simply a guideline for proper flag etiquette. The law does not provide penalties for violations of any of its provisions. Misuse and improper display will, however, most likely incur ridicule and harassment from those more familiar with these provisions."

The following "question and answer" format concerning proper flag etiquette will be presented in The News-Democrat for the next several weeks.

We hope this information will be instructive, interesting and helpful in affording the greatest degree of

respect as we fly our United States flags.

**Second of a series:**

**Q. Is it permissible to fly the flag of the United States during inclement weather?**

**A.** The flag should not be displayed on days when the weather is inclement, except when an all-weather flag is displayed. (All-weather – nylon, synthetic, or other non-absorbent material)

**Q. Is the flag to be displayed only on National holiday?**

**A.** The Code suggests displaying the flag every day, but especially on holidays, including state holidays and during local celebrations.

## Commentaries — Hold the congratulations for Congress

Now that Congress has its immense, \$1.1 trillion bipartisan funding bill in hand, the media has been commending Congress for finally doing its job. This praise works only in the context of recent history, however. The bill that congressional leaders produced is hardly a triumph. Instead, it's another example of Congress's stubborn determination to deal itself out of the budgeting process.

Before this current budgeting era, Congress used procedures that put the ideals of representative democracy into practice. It divided its responsibilities into policy development, which was in the hands of its various "authorizing" committees; and establishing funding levels, which was done by the appropriations committees in the House and Senate. They held hearings, debated furiously, accepted and rejected scores — if not hundreds — of amendments, and ultimately produced a series of bills for Congress to consider.

The process didn't work perfectly. It produced hiccups and grandstanding, and required a lot of negotiation and compromise. But it also spread the work of Congress among expert members, employed the capabilities of dedicated and knowledgeable legislators, and provided for deliberation, open debate, accountability, and a reasonably democratic outcome.

No more. Now, continuing resolutions and omnibus bills lift responsibility from most members' hands.

They produce decisions, but not in an open, democratic process. They're basically developed in secret by a handful of leaders and their allies and staff; allow very few, if any, amendments; sharply limit debate time; severely restrict members' ability to study thousands of provisions; and require an up or down vote.

Most troubling, they're larded with policy decisions that in the old days would have been debated by the authorizing committees.

Moreover, with omnibus bills, the truly difficult but crucial work that Congress needs to be doing doesn't get done. It isn't scrutinizing the budget of each department to look for programs and line-items that have outlived their usefulness. It can't examine and analyze difficult policy questions carefully. It won't question whether entire agencies and even departments still serve the purposes they were designed for. It isn't even bothering to look beyond discretionary spending to consider reforms to Social Security, Medicare and Medicaid, which is where most federal spending goes.

Congress no longer seems to know how to run a budget process. Most of its members have never experienced the traditional method. They just know how to hold their noses and vote up or down.

I thought it was sad that our President stated that he felt some people in America "really dislike" him because he is black. You can find almost any group

in America. There are people who don't like white people, and people who do not like Christians and some people who don't like Jews and some people who do not like the poor and some who don't like the rich. Unfortunately, we could say there are "some" for everything. Hate requires a lot of energy. This country needs to use that energy in a more positive way.

If we, as a country, do not work together we are going to fall apart. Nobody can have everything his or her way. America is not here for just one group, one religion or one political party.

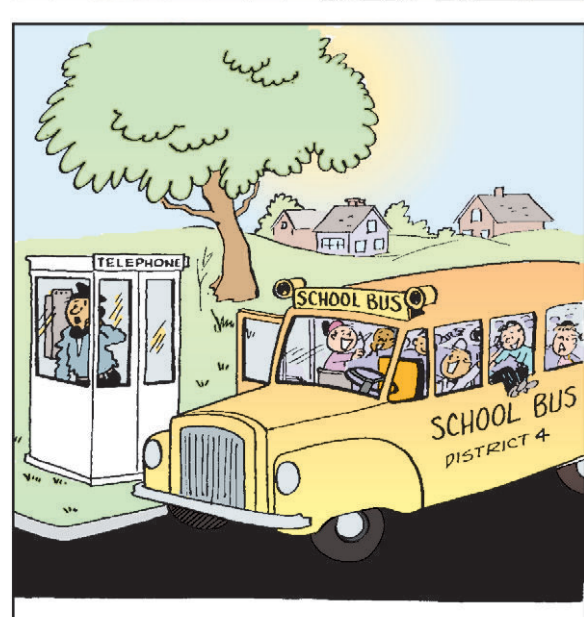
Our President must remember twice the majority of voters, not just African American voters, elected him. At one time he had a popularity poll of seventy percent. That's a great number for any politician regardless of race.

## Getting results for Tennessee in the United States Senate

As I prepare to stand up for Tennesseans and get results on the most pressing issues facing our country in 2014, I thought I'd share with you some of what got done in 2013.

**Challenging a Radical Labor Agenda** – I challenged the Obama administration's unconstitutional recess appointments to the National Labor Relations Board, and demonstrated why the proposed increase to the minimum wage would actually harm the job prospects of those making minimum wage or seeking employment.

**Leading the Fight Against Extension of Federal Wind Subsidies** – I have led the fight in the Senate against the wind production tax credit, a subsidy that delivers expensive, unreliable electricity and wastes taxpayer money.

**Encouraging Use of Nuclear Power and Solving the Nuclear Waste Problem** – In a time when nuclear power provides 60 percent of our reliable, air-pollution-free electricity, I helped draft legislation to begin consolidating spent nuclear fuel and finding a permanent repository for the nation's nuclear waste.

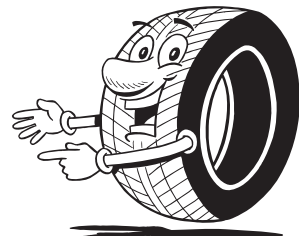

been allotted \$1,085,122 through the FRPP to protect farmland this year.”

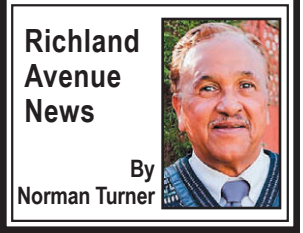
To assist the eligible entities cover their portion of matching funds, landowners can make a ‘donation’ by accepting less than the appraised value of the easement as compensation for the easement. Eligible entities that partner with the landowner must provide the balance of 50 percent of the appraised fair market value. The eligible entities must provide at least 25 percent of the purchase price (appraised fair market value minus landowner donation) in cash. Only landowners who meet USDA conservation program eligibility requirements (which include an average adjusted gross income of less than \$1 million) are eligible.

Land proposed for funding in FRPP must meet one of three eligibility categories: contain at least 50 percent prime and unique farmland soils or soils of Statewide and local importance; include historic or archeological resources; or support the purpose of a State or local farmland protection program.

FRPP, which is administered by the USDA's Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS), accepts applications for funding on a continuous basis. But applicants who want to be considered for 2014 funds should sign up before February 28<sup>th</sup> fiscal year 2014. In the event the signup is extended, it will be posted to the NRCS-Tennessee website for FRPP.

Application documents can be found on the NRCS-Tennessee website for FRPP at [www.nrcs.usda.gov/wps/portal/nrcs/main/tn/programs/easements/farmrach/](http://www.nrcs.usda.gov/wps/portal/nrcs/main/tn/programs/easements/farmrach/). All requested information should be included in the application or attached as a supplement. Responses are used to rank proposals. Individual parcels will be evaluated for eligibility, with the highest scoring parcels receiving funding. FRPP has enrolled over 1,125,480 acres on 4,249 farms and ranches nationwide since Congress first authorized the program in 1996. For further information, contact Wayne Coates, 931-296-3442 ext 3.

## Kick Off a Safe and Delicious “Big Game”

On February 2<sup>nd</sup>, the professional football season is coming to an end with the “Big Game”. So often, people celebrate this sports event in their home with lots of food. To make sure all goes well with the food, start with a safe kick off and maintain a sure defensive strategy to avoid foodborne illness.

For certain, start the

game with safety. That means clean utensils and clean work surfaces for preparing the food. Keep those hands clean as well by washing before, during and after food preparation. This can prevent a lot of fouls from being called.

When preparing your food, take advantage of a “time out” to use a food thermometer. This helps you to make sure your meat and poultry dishes are safely cooked. Cooking to the correct internal temperature insures the food is done and that harmful bacteria are

killed.

For whole cuts of fresh beef, pork, veal and lamb, cook to 145° F, follow by a three minute stand time. Ground beef and meat mixtures should be cooked to 160° F. Ground, whole, or pieces of poultry, as well as casseroles, should be cooked to 165° F.

**Follow game regulations by sticking to the “Two Hour Rule”.** Avoid keeping perishable foods at room temperatures longer than two hours. Some examples of perishable foods include meats, poultry,

eggs, cheese and foods made with mayonnaise. Handle these foods with extra care and abide by the “Two Hour Rule”.

If there is ever doubt about whether or not these foods have been at room temperature longer than two hours, it pays to be very cautious. Follow the principle: “When in doubt, throw it out”. Further, to abide by the “Two Hour Rule”, make two platters and rotate the fresh one out of the fridge at halftime, returning the other platter to refrigeration.

Another part of the

game plan is to “Keep hot foods hot and cold foods cold”. Hot foods should be held at 140° F or warmer. During the game, you can keep hot foods hot with slow cookers or simple electric hotplates.

Cold foods should be held at 40° F or colder. Foods can be kept cold by nesting dishes in bowls of ice. Here's another idea. If you have a party tray, remove the lid and fill with ice. Place the tray on the lid for a simple, inexpensive cooling station.

Hunting seasons are winding down, with only small game and trapping still open. The youth waterfowl season is open for the next two Saturdays, February 1 and 8, where youth waterfowl hunter's ages 6-15 may hunt waterfowl when accompanied by a non-hunting adult at least 21 yrs. of age, multiple youths may be accompanied by a single qualifying adult. State bag limits apply. Rabbit and squirrel hunters are taking advantage of the absence of deer hunters and hitting the fields and woods with good success. Trapping season continues until the end of February, and as a reminder, the Tennessee Free Trappers auction which is normal held in late winter here in our county, will not be held this year, the only auction by the Tennessee Free Trappers will be held in Dekalb County at Alexandria Tennessee Fair grounds on February 15. Contact Jackie McMurtry 615-672-4163. Local trappers may also contact fur buyer, Joey Brake out of Cumberland City/Erin 931-721-6532, or may contact NAFA directly. Remember all Bobcats and Otters must be tagged before selling; contact myself (931-209-5756) or TWRA office (1-800-372-3928).

Lake levels remain 1-2 feet over normal winter pool, with levels at New Johnsonville predicted to be around the 356 feet level by Friday. Flow rates remain average around 60,000 cfs and water temperatures remain in the mid to upper 30's in most areas. Listen in to the *Woods and Waters* radio show every Friday at 5:10 pm on WQMV 1060 AM, the past few weeks I've been talking about "varmint" hunting. Varmints are considered animals like coyotes, ground hogs, bobcats, and foxes. Now that deer season is over with, hunters can expand their hunting season by going after these varmints.

**Some Super Bowl snacks! Homemade Caramel Corn**

½ cup uncooked popcorn (or 5 cups popped popcorn)  
 1 cup brown sugar  
 ¼ cup light corn syrup  
 2 tsp. molasses  
 ½ cup butter or margarine  
 ¼ tsp. baking soda  
 ½ tsp. salt  
 ½ tsp. vanilla  
 Preheat oven to 250°. Spray or butter a rimmed baking sheet. Make popcorn according to package directions. Place popcorn in a large bowl and set aside. In a saucepan, place brown sugar, molasses, butter, corn syrup and salt. Bring to a simmer, stirring frequently. When temperature reaches 250 degrees on a candy thermometer (about 5 minutes), remove from heat. Whisk in vanilla and baking soda. Pour mixture over popcorn and stir to thoroughly coat popcorn. Spread popcorn evenly on prepared baking sheet. Bake for 1 hour, stirring every 20 minutes. Allow to cool before breaking into pieces. Store any leftover popcorn in airtight container. Makes about 5 cups.

**Sweet & Sour Meatballs**

1 lb. ground beef  
 1 egg  
 1 onion, chopped  
 1 cup dry bread crumbs  
 salt and pepper, to taste  
 1 cup water  
 ½ cup cider vinegar  
 ½ cup ketchup  
 2 Tbsp. cornstarch  
 1 cup brown sugar  
 2 Tbsp. soy sauce  
 In a large bowl combine beef, egg, onion, bread crumbs, salt and pepper. Roll into meatballs about 1- 1 ½" in size. In a large skillet, over medium heat, sauté the meatballs until browned on all sides. In a separate medium bowl, mix together the water, vinegar, ketchup, cornstarch, sugar and soy sauce. Pour over the meatballs. Cook over medium heat and allow sauce to thicken. Heat until sauce starts to bubble. Serve over cooked rice or noodles.

**Jalapeno Popper Dip**

8 oz. cream cheese  
 ½ cup mayonnaise  
 ½ cup shredded Cheddar cheese (or Mexican blend)  
 ½ cup shredded Parmesan cheese  
 1 can (4 oz.) chopped green chiles  
 2 jalapeno peppers, diced  
 ¼ cup panko bread crumbs  
 ¼ cup shredded Parmesan cheese  
 Mix together the cream cheese, mayonnaise, Cheddar cheese, ½ cup Parmesan cheese, chiles and jalapeno peppers. Place mixture into a baking dish. Toss together bread crumbs and ¼ cup Parmesan cheese; sprinkle evenly over cream cheese mixture. Bake at 375° for 20-25 minutes, or until the sides are bubbling and the top is golden brown. Serve with tortilla chips and/or crackers.

This recipe is easily doubled for a larger amount. Raw peanuts are found in the grocery store with other bagged nuts, usually near baking goods.

**Candied Peanuts**

1 cup sugar  
 ½ cup water  
 2 cups raw peanuts (skin on)  
 Preheat oven to 300°. In a medium saucepan, combine sugar and water. Place over medium heat and stir until sugar dissolves. Add peanuts to sugar water and continue to cook over medium heat, stirring constantly, until the peanuts are completely sugar-coated and no sugar syrup remains, about 30 minutes. Pour out onto ungreased rimmed cookie sheet, and spread out evenly. Bake for 30 minutes, stirring every 10 minutes. Allow to cool completely on cookie sheet. Store in airtight container.
