Touring exhibit, 'Tennessee Waters' now open

The Johnsonville State Historic Park began its "Tennessee Waters shaping our land, our lives, & our future" exhibit Thursday, April 18th with an opening reception, which included a presentation.

After being introduced by Park Manager Bob Holliday, the presenter Hobart Akin, Cultural Resources and Exhibit Specialist with Tennessee State Parks, started with the focus on "People, Parks, and Water."

Bearing on the importance of water and his own finding of it to be a source of personal relaxation, he pointed out that such a source of recreation would be found to be ideal by state park originators.

Then reflecting on park history, Akin referred to the establishing of the Great Smoky Mountain National Park. And through a dated video was the presentation of the parks

development, and purposed designed to be a source of recreation among an unaltered "landscape".

But when it came to state parks, he said such scenery was created using artificial lakes and reservoirs.

Akin then turned to a 1962 reference to the TVA, which had a great influence in Tennessee by "putting water to work."

And with work in mind, he said the development of the Tennessee River tributary system was put into effect. He added that such efforts were purposely kept out of private influence, and was instead directed by the state.

He explained that the reason behind state development was to improve lives economically, and it also resulted in public parks' recreational creation.

Akin then showed a dated state park video. And refer-

ring to that video, he said that there were often partnerships between the State Conservation Commission Service, the TVA, and/or the Department of Agriculture in park development. And with that in mind, he gave an example of how in 1942 the Federal Government threatened to pull Tennessee Park funding.

He added that past park water recreational development had been very important. And for that purpose, Akin emphasized that reservoirs were developed to create lakes for

the availability of water recreational experiences within 50 miles or an hour of every Tennessee. He said it was an effort to be of focused on until the 1970's.

He pointed out that since then, the aim of aquatic development has changed, resulting in "a diverse range of parks" currently with a historic focus.

And with that reality, Akin ended the presentation.

He then accepted questions from those present. See Exhibit p. 9

Feds Grant Gov. Lee's Request for Major Disaster Declaration to Provide Flood Relief in Humphreys Co.

FEMA has approved Humphreys County for (PA) Public Assistance (roads, bridges, culverts, debris removal etc.).

However, (IA) Individual assistance for homeowners has not been approved, but is still under review.

Tennessee Gov. Bill Lee announced, the federal government has granted his request for Major Disaster Declaration to make federal recovery assistance available to 56 county jurisdictions impacted in February's flooding and severe storms.

"The devastating flooding and severe weather required a comprehensive response and stretched many local jurisdictions to their resource limits," Gov. Lee said. "For the counties working to rebuild bridges, roads, utilities, and other infrastructure, this federal assistance will support their recovery efforts."

Humphreys county is included in the declaration.

The major disaster declaration covers the time period of Feb. 19, to March 30, 2019, and will allow government entities and certain private non-profits in the eligible counties to apply for reimbursement of specific expenses related to the disaster under the Federal Emergency Management Agency's (FEMA) Public Assistance (PA) program.

The federal declaration also makes Tennessee eligible for the federal Hazard Mitigation Grant Program, <https://www.fema.gov/hazard-mitigation-grant-program>, which provides assistance to communities to prevent or reduce long-term risks to life and property from natural hazards.

FEMA is still reviewing

Gov. Lee's initial request to provide assistance in five Tennessee counties - Decatur, Hardin, Humphreys, Perry, and Sevier - through the Individual Assistance (IA) program.

On March 8, 2019, Director Patrick Sheehan of the Tennessee Emergency Management Agency (TEMA) requested FEMA conduct joint Preliminary Damage Assessments (PDAs) in Tennessee to quantify the magnitude of flood damage at the county level.

Based on the FEMA joint PDAs, the requested counties demonstrated they had met or surpassed federally-established loss thresholds to qualify for relief through FEMA's PA program, with qualifying losses for county, municipal, state agency, and utility infrastructure impacts and emergency expenditures totaling \$68.3 million.

The February storms caused more than \$80 million in damages to the state's transportation network. The Tennessee Department of Transportation (TDOT) has executed more than 50 emergency contracts to repair nearly 300 locations in 73 counties. TDOT has received \$10 million in federal disaster relief funds and will work with the Federal Highway Administration for reimbursement for costs related to the storms.

The Tennessee Department of Agriculture is coordinating with partners to assist farmers experiencing flooding in low-lying areas and river bottomlands, particularly in West Tennessee.

"Our farmers and foresters rely on their local transportation and utility infrastructures being in good condition," Agriculture Commissioner Charlie Hatcher, D.V.M. said. "These FEMA programs will assist with road and bridge repair while our farmers contin-

ue cleaning debris, repairing structures, and adjusting their planting times."

Tennessee Rivers Past, Present and Future at Johnsonville State Historic Park

Special programs planned for Saturday, April 27th

The past, present and future of Tennessee Rivers will be the subject of programming planned for Johnsonville State Historic Park on Saturday, April 27th.

From 10am-4pm the park will host a Civil War Naval living history program titled Mr. Lincoln's Brown Water Navy. Visit with Federal sailors and learn what role the Navy played in the Civil War history of Johnsonville. Find out how the sailors spent their time around the Army supply base at Johnsonville. The program will take place at the Soldier Huts Living History Area of the park. From the park entrance the event area will be at the first parking area on the right.

At 11am enjoy the 1 hour video - Civil War Sabotage. When the SS Sultana exploded on April 27, 1865, more than 1,800 died - outnumbering the death toll from the Titanic disaster. Why, then, do so few people know about one of the worst maritime disasters in U.S. history? And what caused the explosion that took so many lives?

Also at 2pm look to the future of the Tennessee Valley with Dr. Brad Collett of University of Tennessee-Knoxville for Visionary by Design: Contemplating a New Century of Innovation in the Tennessee River Valley. 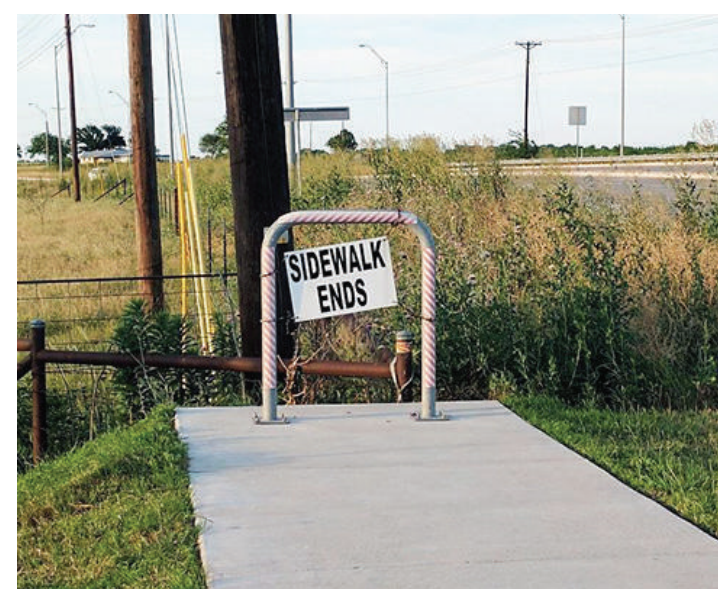
Question...Is humanity regressing... or is insanity progressing?

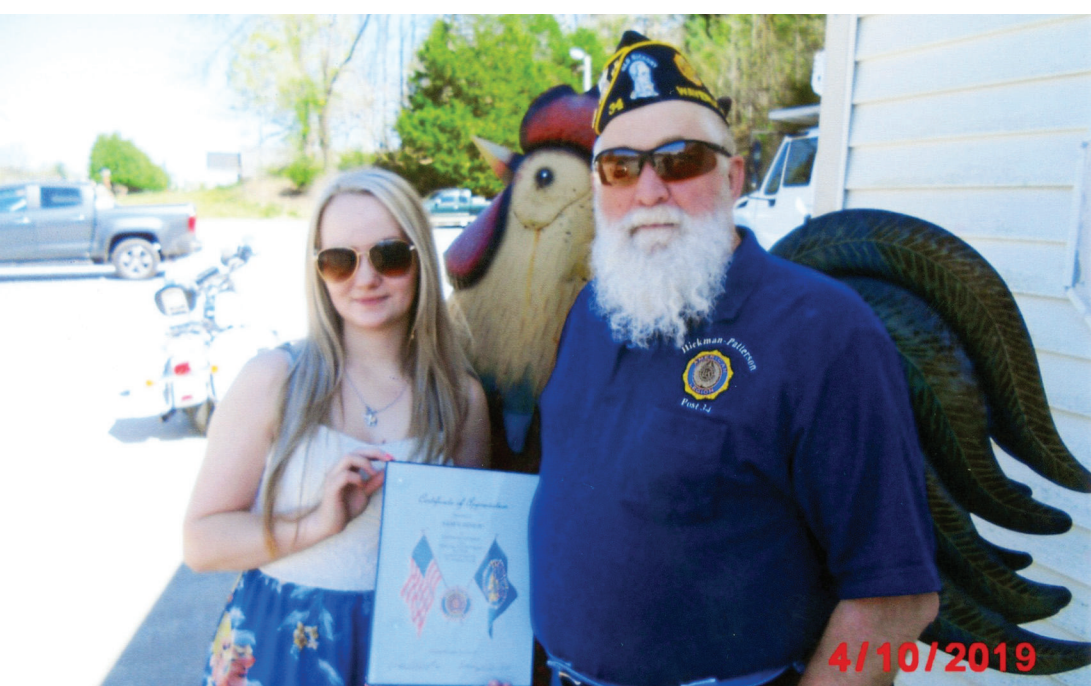

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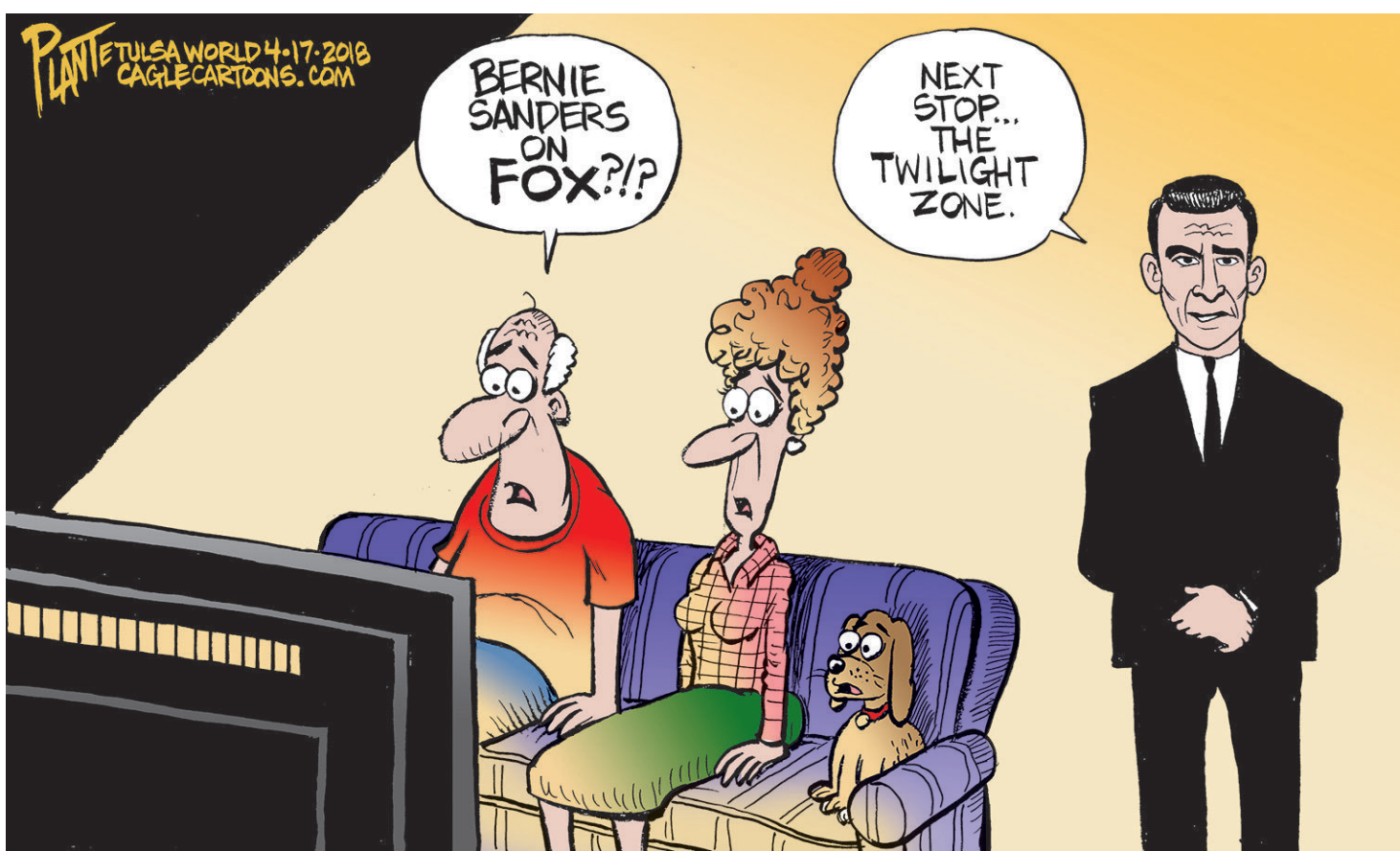

General Sessions Court Report

The Following report is based on the results from the General Sessions Court as presented in the Criminal Court Docket for hearings held on April 11 in Humphreys County.

Those who had Hearings presented on April 11, 2019:

U.S. Senator Lamar Alexander Op-ed: Shorter FAFSA application will help 400,000 Tennessee families

There are not many things that United States senators can do to cause 20 million American families — including 400,000 families in Tennessee — to say, "thank you."

After five years of work, Congress is ready to do just that by shortening the Free Application for Federal Student Aid — the FAFSA — from 108 questions to two dozen, and eliminating the need for families to give their financial information to the federal government twice.

The FAFSA is the form that 400,000 Tennessee families, including 5,600 Memphis high school seniors and their families, fill out each year to apply for federal student aid.

But many more students and their families ought to be applying for federal student aid. A volunteer mentor with Tennessee Promise, our state's program that provides two years of free community college, told me the FAFSA is so intimidating that the form has a "chilling effect" on families who are interested in sending their student to college.

The students we most want to help are often the ones most intimidated by this federal form. The former president of Southwest Tennessee Community College in Memphis told me he believes that he lost 1,500 students each semester because the complicated FAFSA discouraged students and their families from applying.

Former Tennessee Gov. Bill Haslam told me that Tennessee has the highest rate of students filling out the FAFSA, but that the form is still the single biggest impediment to more students enrolling in Tennessee Promise.

After the form comes the threat of being selected for "verification," a complicated process that stops Pell grant payments while a student scrambles to submit federal tax information or prove he or she did not have to file taxes.

Southwest Tennessee Community College administrators told me almost half of their applicants — approximately 9,500 — were selected for verification in fall and that process is even worse, they tell me, than filling out the FAFSA itself. This spring semester about 400 students who were registered for class still had not been able to resolve the verification and receive their Federal grant or loan.

My goal this Congress is to pass bipartisan legislation that solves this problem and completes five years of hearings and work by senators and by both the Obama and Trump administrations.

This legislation would dramatically reduce the number of questions on the FAFSA, as most experts agree that most questions on the form are unnecessary. Legislation already passed by the Senate last year would allow applicants to send their tax information from the IRS to the U.S. Department of Education with one click, which would answer 22 questions at once.

If Congress takes these steps, we will have made seven big improvements for students and families applying for federal financial aid:

1. Reduce 108 questions on the FAFSA to no more than 25.
2. Automatically transfer a student's tax data to the U.S. Department of Education, which will dramatically decrease the number of students selected for verification.

3. Make sure families know they can use their tax information from the previous year to fill out the FAFSA, which means they can apply for federal student aid sooner. This allows students to apply to school in the fall, rather than having to wait until spring.

4. Allow students to find out as early as eighth grade how much Pell grant funding they may be eligible for, helping them make informed decisions sooner.

5. Make sure students know they can now complete the FAFSA on their mobile phones. I visited Sevier County High School in November with Education Secretary Betsy DeVos and saw students zipping through the FAFSA app that the Trump Administration developed to make it easier for students to apply for federal student aid.

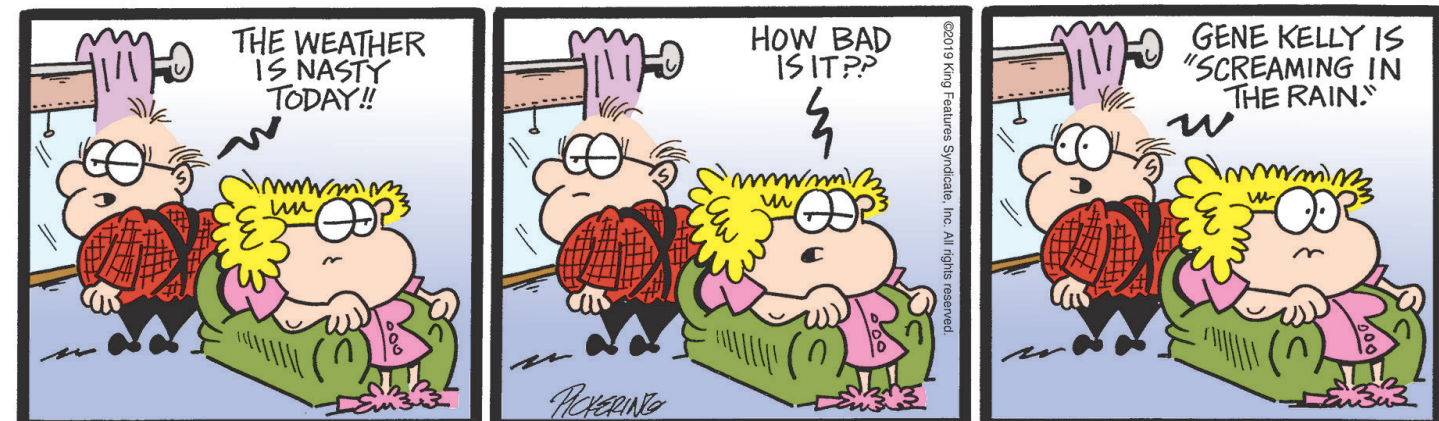
6. Increase the number of eligible students who receive the Pell grants by making it easier for more students to apply for federal aid.

And 7. Help taxpayers by stopping \$6 billion in mistakes — that is the amount the U.S. Department of Education estimates is issued in improper payments every year.

The Senate education committee is considering other steps we could take to make college worth students' time and money, such as making it easier to repay student loans and reducing the amount of time colleges and universities waste on federal red tape, but there is already bipartisan desire to simplify the FAFSA process and reduce its "chilling effect" on the students we most want to benefit.

Since then all service member's sacrifices are remembered by the Poppy and are exchanged for contributions, often being the only fund-raising method for the group.

The Veteran Affairs & Rehabilitation program stands to improve the lives of active members, veterans and the families of each group by providing a platform where the members can volunteer at Veteran Affairs health care facilities.

Another program The American Legion Auxiliary is responsible for is the Girls State and the Girls Nation programs. These programs give aspiring young women leaders the opportunity to learn the importance of responsible citizenship. Each year two young women are selected from each Girls State program to travel to Washington, D.C. Girls Nation. During the program students run for office, elect a Girls Nation president, meet government officials and visit the White House.

Where I first saw the light The cross is one of the most recognizable symbols in the world and rightly so; it represents mankind's hope for eternal life. Does this sound religiously dogmatic? It is honesty, humility, and sincerity that God uses to reveal the truth about his love and forgiveness to others much more than we can with our social religiosity. Jesus loves you so much he willingly went to the cross and died so that you could be saved and live forever. He rose from the dead and is now waiting for you to respond to his love. Issac Watts wrote the hymn "At the cross" and here is the chorus. "At the cross, at the cross where I first saw the light, and the burden of my heart rolled away, it was there by faith I received my sight, and now I am happy all the day."

Strawberry-Raspberry Jam

For every 2 (8 oz.) half pints of jam, you will need:
 1 cup crushed strawberries
 1/3 cup crushed raspberries
 1 1/2 Tbsp. pectin
 1 2/3 cups granulated sugar (for reduced sugar jam, use 1 cup)

2 half-pint (8 oz.) canning jars, with lids and bands
 Prepare and measure ingredients for recipe. Combine prepared fruit in a saucepan. Gradually stir in pectin. Bring mixture to a full rolling boil that cannot be stirred down, over high heat, stirring constantly. Add sugar, stirring to dissolve. Return mixture to a full rolling boil. Boil hard for 1 minute, stirring constantly. Remove from heat. Skim foam if necessary. Ladle hot jam into jars. Jam may be refrigerated for up to 3 weeks. To preserve jam, process jars in boiling water bath for 10 minutes. Check lids for seal after 24 hours.

Strawberry Ice Cream

1 quart ripe fresh strawberries
 3/4 cup sugar (or more, to taste)
 Pinch of Kosher salt
 1 1/2 cups buttermilk, preferably full-fat
 1 1/2 cups heavy cream
 Hull the strawberries and place in a large bowl. Add sugar and salt. Coarsely crush the strawberries with a potato masher, combining with the sugar. Stir in the buttermilk and heavy cream; mix well. Pour mixture into ice cream maker and freeze according to directions. Makes 2 quarts. Recipe is easily cut in half for smaller amount, using counter top ice cream maker.

This Paula Deen recipe tastes like Starbucks:

Iced Mocha Frappe

4 cups hot brewed coffee
 4 (1 oz.) pkgs. hot chocolate mix (3/4 cup size)
 4 Tbsp. sugar
 1 cup heavy cream
 2 tsp. vanilla extract
 whipped cream, for serving
 In a heat-proof bowl, add coffee, hot chocolate mix and sugar. Stir until well combined. Pour the mixture into ice cube trays. Freeze ice cube trays, covered, for at least 3 hours or up to 1 week. (If freezing for more than one day, you may need to remove from freezer awhile before making, and be sure to use a heavy-duty blender). When ready to serve, place frozen cubes in blender. Add the cream and vanilla. Puree until smooth. Pour into tall glasses. Top with whipped cream, and drizzle with chocolate syrup if desired. Makes 4 servings.

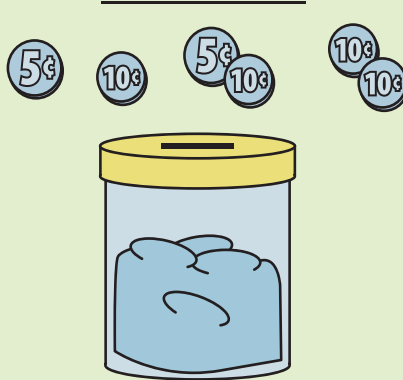

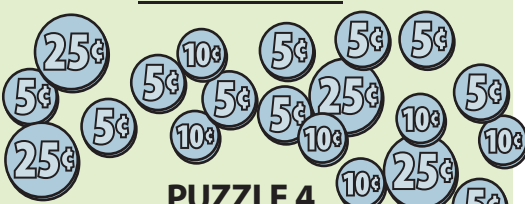

NRCS Bears Sign-Up Deadlines For Opportune Funding Of Improvement Programs

Tennessee NRCS Now Accepting Applications for RCPP Partnership Projects Aimed at Improving Water Quality, Wildlife Habitat and Soil Health Application Batching Deadline is May 17, 2019

The United States Department of Agriculture Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) recently announced the sign-up deadline for funding opportunities to improve water quality, wildlife habitat and soil health in three Regional Conservation Partnership Program (RCPP) project areas in Tennessee. Funding is available through the NRCS Environmental Quality Incentives Program, Conservation Stewardship Program, and the Agricultural Conservation Easement Program-Wetland Reserve Easement, under the RCPP Farm Bill program.

To be considered for program funding, applicants must operate land within the focus area of the respective RCPP project. The deadline to submit applications for fiscal year (FY) 2019 funding is May 17, 2019.

"The Regional Conservation Partnership Program puts local partners in the driver's seat to accomplish environmental goals that are most meaningful to that community," said Sheldon Hightower, Tennessee NRCS State Conservationist. "It draws on local knowledge and networks to fuel conservation projects, bringing together a wide variety of new partners including businesses, universities, non-profits, and local governments."

Funded FY 2019 RCPP Projects include: West Tennessee Floodplain and Wetland Restoration Project

This project started in FY 2016 and NRCS invested \$1.87 million to fund a partnership with West Tennessee River Basin Authority. In FY 2019, NRCS will fund \$295,407. The goal of the project is to measurably improve the water quality and ecological integrity

of the identified watersheds through implementation of NRCS soil health initiative practices, grade stabilization structures, riparian forest buffer, sediment basins, wetland enhancement, and wetland restoration. The watershed approach used will result in significant resource improvements and benefit producers by reducing flooding and improving soil health.

Advanced Precision Agriculture for Sustainable Conservation

NRCS will invest approximately \$5.5 million to fund a Critical Conservation Area in the Mississippi River Basin. Security Seed & Chemical, Inc., will spearhead this project that encompasses the Cumberland River basin in Tennessee and Kentucky, which spans nearly 18,000 square miles and is home to nearly 2.5 million people. This project will occur in the Red River and Lower Cumberland watersheds, two of the 14 watersheds that make up the Cumberland River Watershed.

Both surface water and groundwater impairments are a concern in the watershed with nutrients, bacteria, and sediment being the primary issues. The partners will work with producers to improve water quality by maximizing fertilizer uptake, preventing sediment and nutrient losses, using science-based precision agricultural practices, and implementing high nutrient reducing structural practices. The goal is to advance the implementation of on-farm precision agriculture practice to help ensure the sustainability, resilience, and continued productivity of the area's working lands while simultaneously improving the producer's bottom line. The

partners assembled for this project are some of the most advanced, cutting edge companies in the U.S., which assures that both producers and NRCS staff will have access to the most up-to-date technologies available today. Another goal of this project is to work with NRCS to improve and update practice standards and enhancements, so they work better for producers and achieve higher results for the environment.

Reversing Declines in Grassland Biodiversity

NRCS will invest \$4.5 million to assist the American Bird Conservancy and its partners with a multifaceted conservation program that will complement existing efforts to reverse the decline of grassland habitats in the Southeast U.S., especially near protected landscapes. The project seeks to recover populations of grassland bird species deemed in need of conservation attention by Partners in Flight, as well as the native biodiversity associated with the historic grassland landscapes of the Interior Low Plateaus ecoregion of Tennessee and Kentucky. Conservation efforts will include removal of woody cover and prescribed fire, reversion of cropland or fescue pastures to native grasses, increasing forb-to-grass ratios, changing grazing intensities, and altering haying regimes.

USDA Announces Sign-Up Period for Updated Conservation Stewardship Program

Deadline to be considered for funding is May 10, 2019

The next deadline for Conservation Stewardship Program (CSP) applications to be considered for funding in fiscal year (FY) 2019 is May 10, 2019. USDA's Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) plans to invest up to \$700 million for new enrollments and contract extensions in fiscal year 2019. The 2018 Farm Bill made several changes to this critical conservation program, which helps agricultural producers take the conservation activities on their farm or ranch to the next level.

"CSP continues to be a very effective tool for private landowners working to achieve their conservation and management goals," said Sheldon Hightower, Tennessee NRCS State Conservationist. "It is the largest conservation program in the United States with more than 70 million acres of productive agricultural and forest land enrolled."

While applications are accepted throughout the year, interested producers should submit applications to their local NRCS office by May 10, 2019, to ensure their applications are considered for 2019 funding.

The 2018 Farm Bill authorizes NRCS to accept new CSP enrollments from now until 2023, and it makes some important improvements to the program. These updates include:

- NRCS now enrolls eligible, high ranking applications based on dollars rather than acres. For fiscal year 2019, NRCS can spend up to \$700 million in the program, which covers part of the cost for producers implementing new conservation activities and maintaining their existing activities.

- Higher payment rates are now available for certain conservation activities, including cover crops and resource conserving crop rotations.

- CSP now provides specific support for organic and for transitioning to organic production activities and a special grassland conserva-

tion initiative for certain producers who have maintained cropland base acres.

About the Program

CSP is offered in Tennessee through continuous sign-ups. The program provides many benefits including increased crop yields, decreased inputs, wildlife habitat improvements and increased resilience to weather extremes. CSP is for working lands including cropland, pastureland, rangeland, nonindustrial private forest land and agricultural land under the jurisdiction of a tribe.

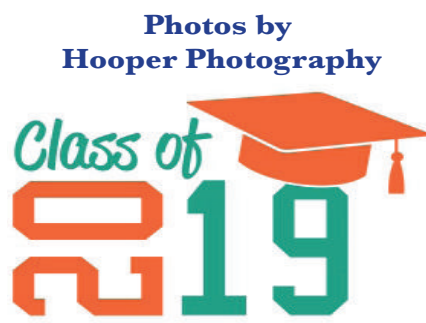

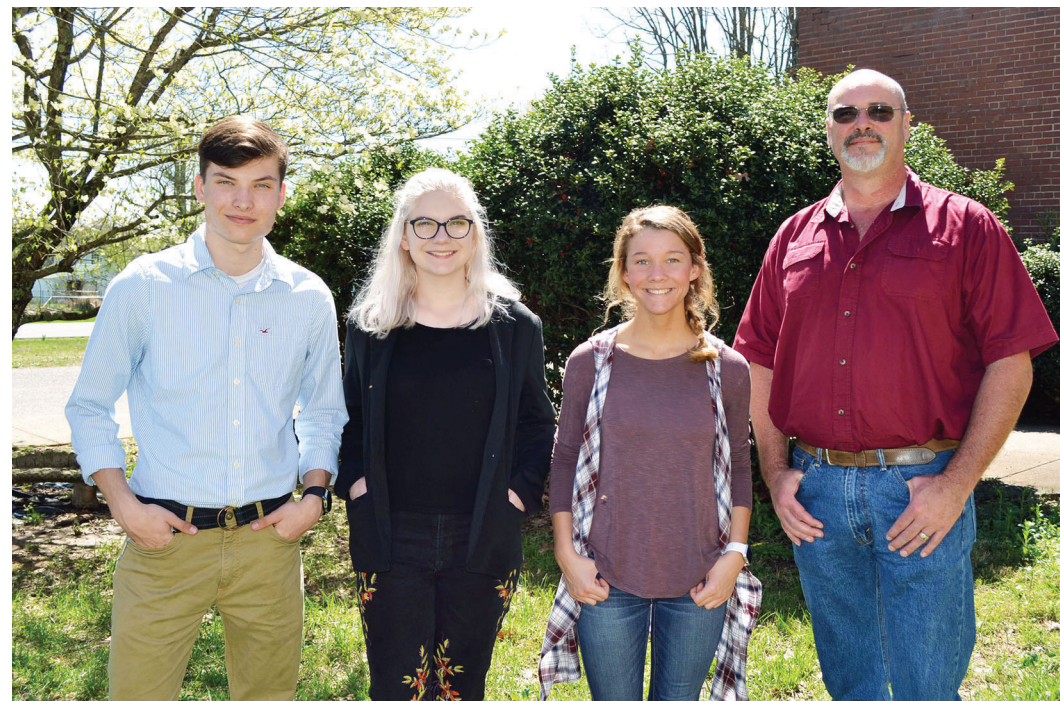
