Gardening To Prevent Flood Water In Your Home



It's that time of year! Spring is teasing you with warmer temperatures, and you are ready to get your hands in the soil and start your summer garden. What kind of plants can you use and how can you lay out your flowerbeds to prevent water from getting into your home? Gardening doesn't have to be all about "curb appeal." It can also be functional. Here are some quick tips to prevent water from getting into your home.

Create a water garden. A natural-looking water garden should have sloped sides with planting terraces that step down toward the deepest area of the pond. This allows you to

plant a diversity of plant material and create different habitats while keeping water drainage to one area.

Plant native. Using native plants can help prevent soil erosion. Here are wild flowers to consider: black-eyed Susan, foxglove beardtongue, cardinal flower, and butterfly weed.

Use mulch. Covering the bare areas in your lawn or garden with mulch or straw is an effective method for preventing erosion from rain. Mulch spread over the surface of the soil reduces the impact of raindrops striking the soil. Use mulch in landscaping and on bare spots near your home to keep water away from your foundation.

TIP: Always wear a mask when spreading mulch. It contains mold spores that can irritate your throat, nasal passages and lungs.

Install rain barrels. Did you know that up to 40 percent of



total water use during the summer can come from watering lawns and gardens? Rain barrels are an effective way to capture rainwater to use in lawns and gardens. Rain barrels can be attached to storm drains to catch runoff from your roof. The water you collect can then be reused to water your lawn and garden. For more information on rain

barrels, contact the Chesapeake Bay Foundation.

Grade your yard. To avoid incoming water, the ground should always slope away from your home in all directions surrounding your perimeter. You'll need to understand the high and low points of your home, and use extra dirt to slope accordingly. Have a plan in place or work with a professional to make sure vents, basement windows, pipes, drains and other areas aren't negatively impacted during the grading process.

The first day of spring is March 20. Be ready for April showers by landscaping your lawn to prevent water damage to your home.

ho says you need a lot of space to create an outdoor oasis? With quality decking materials and the right furnishings, you can turn less into more. Here are five space-saving decking tips to build your own compact paradise.

1. Use the right materials and design

Start with engineered woods. They have the beauty of natural woods, but they last for decades and won't require routine maintenance. Consider board layout: deck boards that run

parallel to your home stop the eye and make the space look smaller. Boards that run diagonally tease the eye away from the deck and into the yard. Also consider color. Light-colored deck boards have a similar

impact, making the deck feel a bit larger than one with a darker palette.

2. Re-imagine railings

The wrong choice of railing can make a deck feel closed off, especially in a small space.

To keep yours feeling open and inviting, choose a design and color that won't overpower the deck, such as black aluminum railing or cable-style railings. For decks lower to the ground, consider built-in planters or benches instead of railing, which will eliminate the need for extra furniture and will open up the layout.

3. Go vertical

Tall furnishings can draw the eye upward and make a deck look and feel more spacious. Try outfitting your deck with a wall garden, screen, arbor or pergola.

4. Illuminate!

Lighting can create a unique, warm ambiance in a smaller deck. To make better use of limited space, hang bistro lights or opt for lighting solutions that >>> Continued on page 18



Roof Tear-Off Versus Second Layer Of Shingles:

What You Need To Know



ere is a scenario we hear about all the time: "This contractor told me I don't need to tear off my existing shingles when we re-do our roof."

We get it. Replacing a roof is not what many people want to spend their hard-earned money on. It is important to remember that homeowners enjoy the benefits of having a sound roof over their heads every day.

Your roof is debatably the most important element of your house. If you don't have a sound roof, the problems with your house will multiply rapidly. A roof protects everything under it and it needs to be done right.

Should You Tear Off Your Old Roof?

Many people are attracted by the idea of overlaying existing asphalt shingles, especially if the price quoted is lower and the contractor seems confident you don't need to tear off vour old roof.

However, the truth is, so many variables have to be just right in order to make it work that it's much more likely to cost you money in the end.

For a second layer to be as good as a roof tear-off, you would need sound decking, no leaks and a roof with no sidewalls where flashing is needed to tie the tiles in to the exterior walls.

If you don't tear off the old layer, you can't examine the decking. You can't know for sure that there aren't any soft spots or haven't been any leaks.



Why A Roof Tear Off Is A **Good Idea**

Remember, this is your one chance to make sure there are no problems with decking, and have been no holes made in your soffits or fascia. It's not a good idea to skip that opportunity.

In addition, if you overlay over existing shingles, you miss the opportunity to install an ice and water-leak barrier to your wood decking. If your existing roof is old, the barrier may not have been applied the last time your

roof was replaced. It's worth getting underneath to see.

Ice and water barriers are a last line of defense against the damage wrought by ice dams in the winter. You never know when you're going to get one of those, in spite of your best maintenance habits.

Why Adding A Second **Layer Of Shingles Could Cost You Money**

Saving money is the name of the game with many home repairs. There are two ways of looking at it - scrimp and cut corners to save up front or do the job right and maintain it so you won't have costs in the future. Adding another layer of shingles seems like it would save you money by not having to pay your contractor to tear off your old roof.

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Stop The Bites! - Helpful Hints For Homeowners To Reduce Mosquitoes



e may not love all of the rain and wetness that has been inundating our area this past year. but we know of at least one insect that is: mosquitoes. Mosauitoes require standing water for their eggs to hatch. Some species lay their eggs where it is dry but know it will be wet after a rainfall while other species lay their eggs directly in water. Some species need only a teaspoon of water to deposit eggs into. They can hatch in places like gutters, plant container saucers, toys, buckets and small



ruts. Although not all water sources can be eliminated, homeowners can do their part in reducing the standing water on their property.

Homeowners can follow these tips or seven T's for mosquito control:


TIP. A small bottle cap filled with water holds enough water

for mosquitoes to breed. Since mosquitoes breed in standing water, the elimination of standing water decreases a mosquito's breeding ground. The biggest offenders are bird baths, play sets with tire swings, tree houses, portable fireplaces and pits, and corrugated drainage piping. Have a tire swing? Drill holes in the bottom of the tire to empty water or even replace the tire with a wooden or plastic swing. After every rain event, homeowners can walk around the yard and tip over containers holding water and drain piping.

TOSS. Toss that yard trash, bag up those clippings and leaves, and make sure firewood is stacked neatly. Build or install a firewood holder to be sure that your firewood pile does not trap water.

TURN. Walk the yard every few days and turn over items that could hold water and trash. Look for children's portable sandboxes, slides or plastic toys; underneath and around downspouts; in plant saucers, empty pots, light fixtures and dog water bowls.

TARP REMOVAL. Many homeowners have tarps or covers on items residing in their outdoor spaces. If not stretched taut, they are holding water. Check tarps over firewood piles, portable fireplaces, recycling cans, boats, sports equipment and grills. Use bungee cords to keep tarps tight.



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Did Your Trees Weather The Wet Winter?




s residents face the adverse effects from a wet winter and head into spring, a question many homeowners wrestle with is "Can this tree be saved?"

Get Ahead Of The Weeds

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

panel and then slowly open up the main valve. Check that your irrigation zones are working properly and that all your sprinkler heads are clean.

As important as water is for the landscape, remember that too much water can also cause damage. Spring rains are usually adequate for the landscape. Save the irrigation for when temperatures warm and surface soil begins to dry. Deep, infrequent water is key for best results.

sons it doesn't cut down much on the amount of work:

- · A second laver is more difficult to install properly. I won't speak to a haphazardly done job. You will get what you pay for with that. Doing a second layer right means a lot of prep work goes into the overlav anyway, and flashing (which, remember, is the most vulnerable point on your roof) is harder to guarantee. The savings you're going to see may be in the range of a modest 25 percent.
- · That second layer of shingles won't last as long. That in itself eats away at

the savings.

· You could be adding weight to your roof with a second layer that your house cannot handle. This is especially true if there is huge snowfall.

Takeaway

Replacing your roof is a good opportunity to fix any underlying problems you might have. Find a reputable contractor who will do the job right and your cost will be up front.

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
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Start Fresh With Outdoor Design
