# **How To Keep Ticks At Bay In Your Own Yard**



hile warmer weather and increased outdoor activities find more Marylanders outside, they also put people at greater risk for encountering ticks and contracting Lyme disease and other tickborne diseases.

In addition to performing a tick check, homeowners can take other actions to reduce the tick population in their yards, thus reducing exposure for themselves.

guests and their pets.

#### 1. Clear out

Reduce your tick exposure by clearing out areas where lawn and tree debris gathers. Ticks thrive in moist, shady areas and tend to die in sunny, dry areas. Locate compost piles away from play areas or high traffic. Separate them with wood chips or gravel.

#### 2. Clean

Eliminate leaf litter and brush around the house and lawn edges. Mow tall grasses and keep your lawn short.

### 3. Choose plants

Select plants and shrubs that are not attractive to deer or install physical barriers to keep deer out of vour vard.

### 4. Check hiding places

Know tick hiding places and check them frequently. Fences, brick walls and patio retaining walls are popular hiding places.

### 5. Care for family pets

Family pets can suffer from tick-borne disease and also carry infected ticks into the home. Talk to your veterinarian about using tick collars and sprays.

### 6. Call the pros

Professionals use barrier sprays that can kill live ticks on the spot, as well as "tick tubes." Strategically placed, tick tubes prompt field mice to incorporate tick-killing material in their bedding, effectively eliminating hundreds of tick nymphs found in each mouse nest.

When people are outdoors away from home, the CDC recommends wearing long-sleeved, long-legged, light-colored clothing. Tuck pant legs into socks to refuse ticks an entry point. In addition, be sure to spray clothing and any exposed skin with a product containing 20% diethyltoluamide -DEET — the most common active ingredient in insect repellents. Clothing and other gear, but not skin, can be treated with Permethrin, a chemical that will kill ticks and mosquitoes on contact and should last through several washings.

Finally, check carefully for ticks after being outdoors.

ur new garden area is marked with stakes, the tractor and tiller is ready for pickup, and the excitement is palpable. What is it about a garden that engenders so much hope each spring? Especially a new garden!

The marked area looked huge to me, but when Rick and I started talking about what we wanted to plant, I started to worry that it wasn't big enough to accommodate all that we wanted to plant with using recommend-

ed plant spacing.

So I got out paper and a pencil, and we started deciding how many of each of the larger plants (tomatoes, peppers, blueberries, blackberries) we wanted to plant.

I Googled plant spacing and found a helpful resource at www.gar-deningknowhow.com.

Using a ruler, I drew an X for each large plant with their recommended spacing in the drawn-to-scale garden. I had two long rows and then left a little extra space on one long side for the snap peas that will be climbing that fence. Toward the end of the garden, I placed three rows for the smaller items like

it is never too early to start researching Anne Arundel County requirements. If the lot is in a water-privileged area, early planning is even more important. Your experienced builder or a specialist in the field should be able to assist in this process and give you the necessary guidance.

If you prefer to research on your own, the Anne Arundel County website (www. aacounty.org/eannearundel/index.cfm) has a wealth of information regarding the permit process, planning, zoning and other pertinent resources. Navigating the permit process in Anne Arundel County can be a challenge, so many people find the assistance of a professional to be helpful.

There are two types of loans

that can be utilized to complete the construction of your new home. With both loan types, you would typically make interest-only payments during construction.

A construction loan will finance only the construction of the home and is typically used by builders who will sell the property upon completion. This type of loan usually has a one-year term, and once the construction is complete, the property would need to be sold or refinanced to obtain permanent financing.

A construction/permanent loan can offer the convenience of one settlement, which reduces settlement costs. Homeowners can expect to pay interest only on the funds as drawn during construction, and when construction is complete, your loan will convert to the permanent financing phase and your interest rate does not change.

During the loan process, your bank will require that an appraisal be done to determine the fair market value of the home after construction is complete. The appraiser will need to be provided with building plans, a spec sheet, and a cost breakdown to complete the appraisal. These items will present the layout and design for the home, the exact materials to be used, and an analysis of the total expenses to be incurred.

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## The Lawn Care Checklist



ur lawns are waking up from winter dormancy and they are hungry. Now is the time to really get a head start on your spring lawn care to set a foundation of health that can be carried throughout the rest of the year.

If you follow the On The Green spring lawn care checklist, you'll have your lawn ready to thrive in no time!

### **Spring Cleaning**

Lawn debris like sticks, branches, leaves, or anything else that you find lying on your lawn will set up your lawn to fail. That's not what we want.

If left out on your lawn, this debris will create a perfect environment for:

- Lawn pests like grubs, armyworms and billbugs, which
  can cause significant damage to your lawn. This lawn
  debris is also the perfect
  home for fleas and ticks.
- Lawn diseases like snow mold, spring dead spot, brown spot, dollar spot, or fairy ring.

While you're cleaning, check if the exterior of your home needs any attention. Clean out the gutters, check for any cracks or gaps in the siding, and check your caulking so you can keep those outdoor pests right where they belong, outdoors. You should also empty any standing water around your property as these are mosquito breed-

ing grounds!

### **Dethatch**

Thatch is a beneficial layer of decomposing grass clippings, dead grass roots, and yard debris that settles down at the base of your grass, right at the soil level.

Having a thin layer of thatch is great for your lawn and provides benefits like:

- Providing insulation from temperature fluctuations to your grass roots and crowns.
- Slowing the loss of water.
- Protecting your soil from overheating.
- Making your lawn more tolerant of foot traffic. If your lawn has too much of a thatch buildup, you could run into some problems. Too much thatch means your grass isn't getting access to all of the nutrients that it needs

to grow strong and beautiful.

Signs that your lawn has too
much thatch include:

- Your lawn feels spongy when you walk on it.
- Measure it with a ruler. If your thatch is more than three-fourths of an inch thick, you may need to break it up a bit.
- Do a wedge test. Using a trowel or shovel, cut out a small section of your turf.
   Make sure you go down into the soil. Pull the wedge out and you'll have a perfect cross-section of your lawn.
   You'll be able to see exactly how thick your thatch is. If it's more than three-fourths of an inch, it's time to break it up.

A great way to eliminate a thatch problem in your lawn is with a thatching rake. A

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re you tired of bailing, pumping, mopping and vacuuming when rainwater floods your basement? Have you lost personal treasures or endured the hassle of restoring your property? Are you facing increases in your homeowner's insurance because of basement flooding? Have you finally reached the point where you can't take it anymore?

After researching extensively and gaining the approval of Anne Arundel County plumbing inspectors, the latest in backup sump pumps is now available. This pump does not require a battery that must be maintained and can only last for a limited amount of time when your electricity is out. Instead, it operates by using water-power supplied through your public water supply, which flows virtually without interrup-

The Basepump water-powered backup sump pump is the finest pump of this type on the market. Compared to similar products, the Basepump is capable of pumping twice the volume of water while using the same amount of fresh water (two gallons pumped per one gallon used). Additionally, as the Basepump has a built-in atmospheric vacuum

breaker (AVB), it does not require an expensive reduced pressure zone backflow preventer (RPZ), which is required by code on the installation of competitors' pumps and requires annual testing by a licensed plumber.

During installation, a float is mounted in the sump pit above the normal high-water mark. Under normal conditions, your main electric-powered sump pump will handle all the pumping duties. When water rises higher than normal for any reason, the Basepump float in the sump is lifted and hydraulically activates the Basepump Ejector in the ceiling through a pressurized plastic tube. As municipal water rushes through the ejector, it creates a powerful suction force that causes the PVC pipe

to act like a giant soda straw, drawing water up from the sump and ejecting it outdoors. As the water level falls, the float drops back down and a pre-set timing control keeps the ejector running for about 30 to 45 seconds before shutting off the system. This allows a full pumpdown of the sump, unlike some other pumps.

lettuce, spinach, carrots and radishes. At the very end, I drew in my zucchini plants so they can cascade as they see fit in that space. By drawing it out, I quickly realized our planned garden area wasn't big enough!

One of the great ideas that Rick had was to create two separate areas: one for seasonal items such as tomatoes and lettuce that have to be planted every year so the ground can/should be tilled each year before planting, and the other for perennial items such as the blueberries, blackberries, asparagus and rhubarb that will remain or come back each year. This area cannot be retilled

without destroying the perennial plants.

And bless his heart, Rick said he would even cover the blueberry and blackberry area with tall netting to keep out pesky berry-stealing birds!

So with our new drawnout plans, we added another 20 feet to the garden to accommodate all of the plants we decided are must-haves. Rick went to pick up the tractor and tiller, and I repositioned the stakes 1 foot wider than the proposed garden area so it would provide the tiller clearance.

After making some lemonade to share for after the tilling — yes, I was channeling my inner Ree Drummond (the Pioneer Woman) — I

heard the tractor coming up the road.

Rick got right to tilling up the garden areas, and the soil looks great. He gave each row four good passes until the ground looked fresh and ready to plant.

To see what kind of soil we have, I took two mason jars and got soil samples from six locations in each garden. I used one jar for each garden area since they are in different locations in the yard. Tomorrow, we are taking those to Bowen's Farm Supply to get tested locally.

And then we can see what soil amendments and conditioners we need. Homestead Gardens recommends Biochar as a great amendment prod-

uct and Bloom for soil conditioning.

We've learned that even if we spend more for great plants, they won't thrive with their full potential if you don't have great soil to grow them in. So go get your soil tested now and get your beautiful dirt all ready for spring growing!

We'll write back and keep you posted on the process and production! And yes, that lemonade tasted especially good after we were finished with the tilling. Happy spring gardening to you!

thatching rake has sharp tips that are used to tear out the thatch. Make sure to do this when your lawn is dry, as walking around on a wet lawn can cause even more problems for your turf. Use your thatch rake to re-rake your grass as if it were leaves. Once you've loosened up that layer of thatch, remove it and water your grass!

### **Weed Control**

Nothing ruins the look and feel of a lawn quite like weeds. Whether it's crabgrass, dandelions or anything in between, it's best to get ahead of these weeds before they get ahead of you. A great way to control weeds in your lawn is with pre-emergent and post-emergent herbicides.

Pre-emergent herbicides are best used in the early spring when the soil temperatures are below 55 degrees and the weeds haven't started germinating. Pre-emergents form a protective barrier in your soil that will make it difficult for weeds to take root and start to grow. They are a great way to protect your lawn from weeds before they start to appear. Unfortunately, pre-emergent herbicides don't work on weeds that have already sprouted. For already established weeds, you'll need to use a post-emergent herbicide.

If weeds are popping up in your lawn, a post-emergent herbicide is the way to go. Spray these herbicides directly on the weeds in your yard. The herbicide will systematically attack the

weeds' root systems, resulting in total elimination and a weed-free yard.

Here are two post-emergent herbicides, each proving its own benefits:

Systematic herbicides — Most effective at controlling perennial weeds. The chemicals get absorbed into the weeds, destroying both the visible and invisible portions of the target weed.

#### Contact herbicides —

Most effective at controlling annual weeds. They kill the weeds on contact, making it impossible for the plant to continue to receive essential nutrients for growth and germination.

## After Weeds Arrive: Pull Them

Pulling weeds is one of the most tedious tasks of spring

lawn care, but it's effective. Walk through your lawn and landscape, and hand-pull any weeds. Keep in mind, when you hand-pull the weeds, you have to ensure the roots also get pulled or else the weed will be back in no time.

Waiting for a wet day can help, as damp soil makes the weeds and their root systems easier to pull. If you pull the weed but miss the root, use a gardening tool to dig deep and remove the entirety of the weed's roots; otherwise the weed will keep growing back.
