St. Martin's Volunteers Assist Afghan Refugees

ugust 2021 marked yet another crisis in Afghanistan. The country has suffered invasion, war and devastation for decades. This time, the Taliban — a nationalist movement that grew into a significant revolutionary group and political organization - returned to the country in force.

In an aggressive move to usurp the internationally backed Afghan government, Taliban forces bulldozed across the countryside, quickly reaching the country's capital of Kabul. As the insurgency swept in, Afghanistan's president, Ashraf Ghani, flew out. With him fled thousands of others. Political dissidents, employees of American companies and government agencies, human rights defenders, and vocal supporters of the American mission rushed to exit Afghanistan.

The United States recognized a responsibility to assist and support people fleeing Afghanistan because those people had worked for the Unit-

ed States government or otherwise supported U.S. efforts in the country. President Joe Biden's administration ultimately approved temporary refugee status for about 76,000 people.

Maryland received over 2,000 refugees who were placed throughout the state. Two-hundred refugees, including 40 families, were placed in two Anne Arundel County hotels.

The government's financial commitments to the refugees ended 90 days after entry to the United States. After that time, the refugees became responsible for supporting themselves and their families. Many struggled to find housing they could afford, jobs, entry to the school system, and access to health care. As the government reduced its initial support, nonprofit organizations stepped up. Giving Back, Linda's Legacy identified the immediate needs of the refugees and set up a network of assistance.

Dawn Major heard about the influx of refugees at a presentation by

remaining land for a neighborhood common area or other environmental features.

But sometimes houses are clustered together without preserving the land. That is an issue District 5 Councilwoman Amanda Fiedler hopes to change. Fiedler sponsored Bill 73-22, which was discussed by the seven-member Anne Arundel County Council on September 6, after the Severna Park Voice went to print.

"The intent is to fully capture the intended outcome of 'cluster development' by expanding the definition to include the elements of conservation and preservation of natural features etc. that cluster development is intended to produce," Fiedler said. "Without those, a proposed development would not fit the definition and thus should not be able to use the flexible lot sizes clustered together."

Fiedler said she spent more than two

years researching and meeting with residents, county agencies and stakeholders before introducing similar legislation, Bill 21-22, in February 2022. That bill needed too many amendments before it could pass, she said. The new bill attacks one part of the problem.

"In a council work session before our summer recess, I showed some slides of two cluster developments that had landscaping around the perimeter, with some open space, some recreational

space. That's the intent: to have flexibility in lot design, but

modifications have been given in some cases, taking away those open spaces or recreational spaces," Fiedler said.

"I'm changing the approach to chip away at this area of the code," Fiedler said. "We are starting with an update to the definition and will see where it goes. This bill is active for two more meetings ... I don't believe we will solve the cluster problem entirely in this term."

County Executive Steuart Pittman did not respond to a request for comment.

Karen Myers Uses Yard Sale To Fund Vital Missions

uriosity, and perhaps some divine intervention, landed Karen Myers at the helm of a decades-long community service event — the Severna Park United Methodist Church vard sale.

A longtime volunteer of the event, Myers decided to attend a meeting several years ago because she wanted to see who would take over the event after Gwyn Linthicum, who had chaired the sale for 20 years, stepped down. She couldn't have predicted the outcome.

"I raised my hand. Truly. It was actually a God moment," Myers said. "People had volunteered for sub commitments to the sale ... and I just had to make a decision right then and there. I said, 'I'll do it."

SPUMC hosts the yard sale typically twice a year, spring and fall, with the next one scheduled for Saturday, October 1. The event was put on hold for two years due to the pandemic, followed by a clothing-only sale this spring. Myers, as well as everyone involved, are excited to see the return of their complete yard sale this fall.

The sale will take up nearly every room on the church grounds and the yard, comprising the following categories of items: jewelry, holiday, children's toys, puzzles and games, household items, treasures, clothing, baby gear, books, shoes. Outside, shoppers will find outdoor items – bikes and garden tools – and furniture.

"Pretty much everything you would have in a house," Myers said.

As chairwoman of the sale, Myers

forms contacts to ensure the church has everything to make the event go smoothly. A local family donates a dumpster. Giant Food and Safeway lend grocery carts.

Past sales have raised about \$25,000. Proceeds are used to fund projects and mission events through two groups: Volunteers in Mission (VIM) and United Women in Faith.

"Volunteers in Mission organizes the mission trips or events that our church does, so if a group is going to Costa Rica to work on a church building, that group organizes it, that small group within our church," Myers said. "All Methodist churches have a Volunteers in Mission group."

The other yard sale beneficiary, United Women in Faith, meets for Bible studies and other activities on a regular basis.

They also have mission projects

that they do that are important to them," Myers said. "It might be providing food ... something that they do every year before school is they appeal to the congregation to provide backpacks and school supplies and they go to a school in Anne Arundel County that they have a relationship with — that's one of their mission projects."

During the pandemic when Severna Park United Methodist Church was not doing trips for VIM, members assisted with renovations at Serving People Across Neighborhoods (SPAN).

The yard sale is important to Myers because of the help it provides for those organizations, but also, beyond the "bang for your buck" that the sale offers, it assists many local

families in need.

"There are also quite a few people that have told me that this is where they have come to get Christmas gifts for their kids when they couldn't shop at a retail store; they could not have afforded to shop at a retail store, somebody that's setting up their first place and really needs things at an affordable price, that is what is the most rewarding for me," Myers said.

All are welcome to visit Severna Park United Methodist Church for the yard sale on October 1 from 8:30am to 1:00pm.

More than 150 church volunteers make the yard sale possible, and Myers is grateful for the community and volunteer support that have made it so successful since she has been involved.

"I have not looked back. I love it," Myers said.

Jeanette Sudano of Giving Back, Linda's Legacy. She felt moved to help.

"The presentation was extraordinary and incredibly inspiring," Major said. "It showed how desperate the situation was. You couldn't walk out of it without saying, 'What can I do to help?"

Linda's Legacy assistance relies in part on creating circles of giving and sponsorship. Friends, neighbors, coworkers, congregants of churches, and other groups of people join to sponsor an individual or family in a multitude of ways. Major's family built a sponsorship circle by reaching out to their friends for time, treasure and prayers.

It is sometimes hard for us, when people seem to be so different from us, to recognize the sameness in us all. It's a call to our humanity. [The Afghan refugees] just want a safe place for their children to be happy and healthy, with a roof over their head. That's all any parent wants, and we are called to help."

Fifty welcome boxes were assembled and distributed. The family's church, St. Martin's-in-the-Field Episcopal Church in Severna Park, gathered household items, furniture, personal hygiene products and money for the refugees.

Kathy Berge is another member of the St. Martins-in-the-Field Episcopal Church community. When she heard about the Afghan refugee crisis, she first contacted Global Relief, an international organization. Ultimately, Berge visited several refugee families located in Prince George's County. What she found was astonishing.

"I met a pregnant woman who was bleeding and needed immediate medical attention; children who needed major dental care but had no insurance; families who were living in an unfurnished attic apartment with no air conditioning because it was all they could find or afford," Berge said.

Both women have spent hours and days connecting refugees to medical care, English language lessons, immigration assistance, schools, and professionals in the community who are willing to help for free. Unfortunately, many Afghan refugees, even those with advanced education

and professional titles, have struggled to find jobs in America. Many find entry-level positions that barely pay the rent and don't include insurance benefits.

Helping the Afghan families in Anne Arundel County has been a transformational experience for both Major and Berge.

"It is emotional and inspirational to watch people who lost everything, who have led successful, productive, and happy lives but left behind homes, families, and jobs without flinching to protect their children and offer them a better life," Major said.

Berge said, "It is a joy and privilege to help in any way possible."

To see pregnant women with no medical care, the struggle of learning a new language, or even just women learning how to read and write, to watch the appreciation for all the freedoms Americans enjoy in the United States, is truly humbling.

The need to assist local Afghan families continues. According to Berge, that help doesn't have to be time-consuming or expensive. For example, two young girls were enamored with the idea of petting

horses. Under Taliban rules, girls are not allowed to touch the animals. Berge is setting up the sisters with a visit to a local farm.

"It only takes a couple of hours out of your whole year, and you've provided someone with joy," she said.

Consider volunteering to help teach English and language skills. Many classes are full, yet the refugees are desperate to learn how to speak. Anyone who wants to help can make phone calls to doctors, teachers, and other specialists on behalf of families or help fill out paperwork. An overriding issue is finding jobs. Berge calls on business owners and leaders to simply take a chance. Many refugees are well educated and willing to work hard for their families.

"If you are a business owner, even if [the refugee] doesn't speak the language, you could make accommodations for that," she said.

For those who can't donate time or treasure, consider donating financially through a church or Giving Back, Linda's Legacy, a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization. The donation may be tax-deductible.

"We help because it is what Jesus calls us to do," said the Rev. Nathan Erdman, associate rector and chaplain at St. Martin's-in-the-Field. "So much of Jesus' teaching and ministry was about serving those in need. We are so blessed to have a vibrant outreach and service team at St. Martin's. Our members have such a heart for service. I am so grateful that our wonderful team saw this need in our community and responded with compassion."

Vince Caropreso had it all, until he didn't.

Once on top of the world, Caropreso and his business partner split when the market crashed, and at home he was suddenly raising his children alone, all in just three months. There were weeks when he didn't know how he was going to provide for his young family. He humbly turned to SPAN Inc. in Severna Park.

"I would bring bags of groceries home and my kids thought I had been shopping," said the then single parent of his visits to SPAN.

He vowed to himself and to SPAN that when he could, he would give back to the organization that supported him and his family at the lowest time in his life. This October, he will continue to

keep his promise.

On Saturday, October 1, Team Caropreso at Keller Williams Flagship of Maryland will host its annual community fundraiser and fall festival to raise money to support and raise awareness for SPAN.

The Need For Food, Financial Assistance Has Increased



ach new school year brings a fresh start — new teachers, new classmates and new school supplies. This year's beginning brings the added fresh start of moving past many of the pandemic con-

straints that we have experienced over the last couple of years.

In addition to all the positive aspects of this, I heard from parents in the weeks leading up to the school start, about needing to purchase school supplies and having to prepare for school lunches. The federal grant to provide free lunches to all school children ended recently, at the end of the summer. For the first time in over two years, families will need to complete the application and meet the income criteria to receive free or reduced

price school meals.

These additional back-to-school expenses are especially difficult for some families. One of our recent clients at SPAN left a lasting impression with me as he reiterated how thankful he was for the food and how hard it was for him emotionally since he was not used to being in a position of needing to ask for help. I am reminded of another client recently who was particularly thankful for shampoo. She said she had been adding water to hers to make it last longer. Toiletries are often specifically requested items and are always wonderful things to donate; they are not covered by food stamps.

These client interactions stay with me as do the regular reminders of how generous and caring this community is. I am always impressed and feel blessed that when we communicate a need, we see a wonderful response from the community. I love how members of this community are quick to step up to make sure the needs are met. As we start this new school year, our current wish list

includes snacks (cookies, crackers, bars and nuts), peanut butter and jelly, and packaged fruit.

I am reminded how we are moving past this pandemic in the many little parts of our routines that have resumed and that we all took for granted before March 2020. I am also reminded of how we are moving on when I look at SPAN's data for the year that just ended. The need we see for emergency financial assistance has increased dramatically in recent months. When COVID first hit, government assistance increased and the number of families needing emergency financial assistance dropped considerably. Reflected in the end of the pandemic phase is the increased need for financial assistance.

The average monthly amount of emergency financial help SPAN provided increased almost 250% between the first and second half of Fiscal Year 2022 (FY22). The average number of families we have assisted with financial aid has likewise doubled in the second half of FY22.

With this increased need, it is great

to have our largest fundraiser, the 10th SPAN Turkey Trot, back for the first time since 2019. It is coming up on Saturday, November 5, and will be held at Kinder Farm Park. Registration is now set up; you can go to www.active.com and type in "SPAN." Thank you to all who are sponsoring and donating prizes for the event — we have had wonderful responses for both!

SPAN is an independent nonprofit food pantry and emergency services provider that has been helping local families with eviction prevention, utility turnoffs, medical/prescription bills, and food since 1990. SPAN serves 14 zip codes in Anne Arundel County. SPAN is located behind Our Shepherd Lutheran Church at 400 Benfield Road in Severna Park. Hours are Monday through Thursday from 10:00am-1:30pm. St. Vincent De Paul Society Expands To Meet Needs

tepping into the cool air-conditioning at the St. Vincent de Paul's food pantry in Severna Park, I was welcomed by the St. Vincent de Paul local conference president, Cindy Halloran. One older woman was completing her intake registration and a younger woman was pulling her water bill from her purse to share with a worker. A woman and a young girl with a huge smile were perusing the offerings in the pantry area.

"What kind of cereal do you like?" asked pantry manager Kathy Middel, smiling at the child.

"It's busy in here," I remarked to Halloran.

"Oh no, it's not busy now," she said. "It was busy this morning. This is just how it always is."

I was surprised. "The need is everywhere," Halloran said, reading my mind.

The pantry is a ministry outreach of St. John the Evangelist Roman Catholic Church. Parishioners provide volunteer hours, food and resources.

I asked Halloran if the pantry just opened. "Oh no," she said. "We've been around since the church began. People just didn't know we were here."

The team relocated the pantry in August to the "big blue barn" on Cypress Creek Road and Ritchie Highway, and neighbors are now discovering the resource.

Formerly housed in the basement of an old rectory building at St. John

the Evangelist, the pantry served a record number of people, 94, in three hours. Volunteers gave away 102 bags of groceries.

As I walked through the building, I met Shadrik Mokum, a seminarian with St. John the Evangelist. He was mingling, laughing, and joking with volunteers and visitors. Originally from Cameroon, Mokum has been with St. John the Evangelist for three months and provides spiritual support as needed at the pantry.

"The St. Vincent de Paul Society is a part of the way the church proclaims the gospel," Mokum said. "As one of our fathers in the church (referring to Pope Paul V) says, 'Modern man believes more in witnessing than in preaching."

You can preach all day and not reach people, but feeding the poor, and caring for those in need, makes them listen.

for those in need, makes them listen.

"Parishioners have been very supportive," Mokum said.

He also praised the ministry of St. Vincent de Paul Society and said his church in Cameroon was active with the society. "It's an international organization," he said.

Halloran said the St. Vincent de Paul pantry differs from other agencies. "We step out of the box," she said.

Volunteers work with people to help them with more than their utility bills. Through their network of agencies, they seek to assist with housing and even car repairs. Halloran said they strive to give people a helping hand before their needs get too far out of control.

Halloran, quoting the International Society of St. Vincent de Paul Society rule, said, "No work of charity is foreign to St. Vincent de Paul. It includes any form of help that alleviates suffering or deprivation and promotes human dignity."

The center is open on Tuesdays and Fridays from 10:00am to 1:00pm with volunteers distributing food, funding and other help to their neighbors in need. Visit the pantry or call 443-261-0109 for more information or to schedule an appointment.

Nonperishables or hygiene products can be donated at the blue bins at St. John the Evangelist Church or at the pantry.

I know you hate me asking but I think this is the only way to talk to you. I need




Love, Lauren"

Round Bay Sailing Association (RBSA) has varied levels of skipper and crew experience. In the past, we've highlighted newto-RBSA sailors. Now well into the season, we want to introduce you to some

experienced sailors who, like all new sailors, had to learn from scratch. For Deke Johnson and John Stefancik, RBSA helped them learn and grow in the sport.

Deke, who skippers the J/27 Revenge, has been sailing with RBSA since he was 10. He started with his dad and sailed Wednesday, Sunday and special races. Deke has taken season high points and many other prizes, but Revenge's claim to fame is 12 Linstead Cup victories, seven in a row. Linstead Cup is a challenging pursuit race that starts in Round Bay, proceeds to the Route 50 bridge and then returns. Deke acknowledged that crew work is key, and he is happy that new sailors have continually joined the fleet and have done well in RBSA standings.

John, boat captain on Tom Lloyd's Rosalita, a J/29, is another experienced RBSA sailor. He has been sailing since the age of 2 months! According to John, his mom's "favorite thing to do in the whole world is sailing," so it was the family activity from April to October. John took sailing classes at West River Sailing Club when he was 9, with a waiver from the 10-year-old requirement because he

had sailing experience. Lessons at Severn Sailing Association followed. But according to John, what really helped his racing career was racing with RBSA.

Sailing in the RBSA Wednesday/ Sunday and special regattas let John and Deke mingle with many sailors, in many events, not just on the Severn. Both have sailed in multiple iterations of Chesapeake events like the Governor's Cup, Solomons Island Invitational and Annapolis Race Week, but according to Stefancik, RBSA was "the foundation for everything we accomplished." This led to their participation, along with other RBSA members, in the J/27 North American regatta in Oakville, Ontario, where they placed first among U.S. and Canadian crews.

Sailing in Round Bay requires sailors to learn how to do well on every point of sail and to perform every kind of maneuver — reaches, dead downwind, spinnaker sets other than the typical bear away set (if these terms are foreign to you, join an RBSA crew and you'll learn; www.roundbaysailing.com). Protest hearings, although rare, were once open to all, to emphasize learning the rules, which change every three years.

According to John, "Some of the best sailors who I've sailed against are from RBSA." RBSA sailors can be competitive, but the RBSA approach to competition is also key — laid back/always learning from each other. That said, those experienced in the fleet sail hard against those with experience and allow those new to racing time to learn the rules. That behavior and mindset underscore the "Corinthian spirit" of the club and its sailors.

Severna Park Native Credits Successful Dual Careers In New York To Hometown Roots

ew York City resident Brooke Ashley Tjarks grew up in Severna Park and credits her upbringing to laying the foundation for her professional successes in consulting and modeling.

Tjarks attended Shipley's Choice Elementary School, Severna Park Middle School and Severna Park High School. She received both her bachelor's degree and Master of Business Administration (MBA) from Pepperdine University. She also has a second master's degree from Harvard University.

Tjarks moved to Manhattan in 2017 to build her consulting career and has since served a \$1.6 billion life sciences venture capital firm on Park Avenue, Morgan Stanley, the Metropolitan Museum of Art, and the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation, among others. She now owns her own consulting business advising in the fields of financial services, health care, life sciences and nonprofits.

When not consulting, Tjarks also has a successful career in modeling. She works in beauty, print and fit modeling. She has modeled for Calvin Klein, Tory Burch, MAC Cosmetics and goop.

I recently spoke with Brooke Tjarks to learn about her dual careers, the impact her Severna Park upbringing has had on her professional successes, and what she would like teens and younger women entering the workforce to learn from her experiences.

LMC: How did your upbringing in Severna Park influence your education and career paths?

BT: I feel very fortunate to have grown up in an area where getting good grades, working hard and doing your best — whether academics, sports, extracurriculars, community service - was popular. When I grew up in Severna Park, doing drugs and bullying was not cool.

Showing up for your community was cool and that made staying focused pretty easy for me. I was surrounded by a lot of mission-driven people when I participated in activities like National Honor Society, community service organizations and faith groups. That environment influenced my trajectory, including my education and my career.



Growing up in Severna Park I learned to admire hardworking, intelligent, humble, purpose-driven people. And when I left, I continued to be drawn toward people and groups with these values. I chose to stay at Pepperdine for my MBA, in part, because the curriculum required us to evaluate ethical and moral consequences of various business decisions. When I was getting my second master's degree, I chose to do my research under a medical doctor who founded a nonprofit with the mission of improving access to health care in low-income settings.

Though Severna Park was safe, it also taught me about resilience. I learned that people might seem like they have it all together, but everyone struggles, and sometimes they really struggle. Part of success is weathering those storms, giving yourself grace when you're having those

hard moments, learning self-awareness, and continually self-improving.

LMC: Tell me about how you got into your current positions.

BT: While working in Los Angeles during undergrad and grad school, I was exposed to a lot of people who worked freelance. So many people there work as independent contractors in film, television, commercial production, and dance. I took a similar route.

When I was 18 or 19, a friend invited me to an audition for a commercial and we booked it together. That's when I joined the SAG (Screen Actors Guild) union. Soon after, I joined another actor's union called AFTRA (American Federation of Television and Radio Artists) and guest-starred on an episode of a popular ABC Family show. I later worked behind the

camera for two prolific directors, as well.

Midway through my MBA, I became curious about other industries and was seeking a more professional working environment, so I let my education take me out of Los Angeles. I studied abroad at Oxford and Copenhagen Business School, and then found myself at Harvard.

When I graduated, I joined small and medium sized consulting firms to build skills, credibility and a network. Now I own my own consulting firm and I subcontract under others too. This past year, I reconnected with contacts in the media industry and signed with a modeling agency in New York City called Click Models. Having my own consulting firm allows me the flexibility to balance both.

LMC: What lessons would you like kids to learn from your story, particularly as you balance dual careers?

BT: Society might tell you to organize your life a certain way, but you don't have to do whatever corporate America says to be successful. There are some societal norms for a reason — they can help you to stay safe for example, so don't throw them all out.

But everyone has their own purpose and reason for being on the planet, somehow serving others, and the most important thing in life is to figure out what your unique contribution is and to do your best at that. Find your gifts, find your passions, and stay focused on them to help you find your profession.

LMC: Anything more you'd like to add?

BT: The world is getting better for young women entering the workforce, but I would say it's still rough. Being a female in the professional world still comes with so many obstacles.

I want young women to enter their careers with eyes wide open because it is still tough out there. To help you weave through the challenges, talk to female peers about what you are seeing, ask strong female mentors for advice, and get strong male advocates.

Golfing For Gabi Continues The Fight Against Pediatric Brain Cancer

s the Pellicani family gathered outside of Rockville Links Golf Club in New York last September, they laughed and smiled. Five-year-old Antonio hit the ceremonial tee shot, prompting applause from

the crowd. Attendees enjoyed a

day of fun and banter. But the inspiration behind the event was tragedy: the loss of Gabriella "Gabi" Pellicani, whose 10-month battle against glioblastoma, an incurable form of brain cancer, ended in October 2018.

Each year, the Pellicani family — including Severna Park couple Paul and Lisa Pellicani — raises awareness of pediatric cancer during the Golfing for Gabi tournament, organized by Gabi's parents, Nick and Fabiana.

Last year's event sold out with about 150 golfers

The fourth annual event will be held September 26. Although Severna Park High School is roughly 230 miles from Rockville Links Golf Club, the Severna Park community has rallied around the cause to support Paul, Severna Park High School's varsity basketball head coach, and Lisa, who taught at Severn School for 26 years.

More specifically, the community has supported Hole 5.

"Hole 5 is important for two reasons," Paul said. "It's a little par 3 and it runs parallel to the swimming pool. Gabi would lean against the pool fence and see if her dad was there. Also, she passed away when she was 5.

The goal is to make Hole 5 an unofficial sponsor because of its significance.'

Last year, Hole 5 accounted for roughly \$9,000 of the \$80,000 the tournament raised for the Dana-Farber Cancer Institute and the Jimmy Fund.

There is not much funding for pediatric brain cancer research because it does not have the investment return," Paul said, explaining why the fundraiser is so important. "The [Golfing for Gabi] entry fee is only a small portion of the funds raised. The course charges for X number of rounds of golf, and the meals have an expense."

That's where the raffles and silent auction help. This year's raffle items include a platter donated by The . Cottage and college football tickets secured by Nick Carparelli, the executive director for Bowl Season and a father who has had two student-athletes attend Severna Park High School.

"One of the many great things about living in Severna Park is the sense of community that exists and the support that everyone here is willing to give back to the people who have been good to them over the years,"

"Not only is Golfing for Gabi a great cause, but the sponsorship of Hole 5 is a way for the Severna Park community to show support for Paul Pellicani and the entire Pellicani family for all the things he did for so many people here throughout his career. It is a fitting tribute to him."

Severna Park has supported the Pellicani family

since they learned of Gabi's diagnosis. Kody Milton, a former baseball and basketball player for the Falcons, said it "was always a fun time" when Gabi attended a practice.

When she passed, it was really tough for the team," Milton said. "Coach P was an influence on all of us ... and he was just a good man, so we wanted to be there for him."

Kody personally ordered and distributed "Gabi Strong/Family" wristbands for his fellow players, the coaching staff and cheerleaders. He helped organize a basketball game in Gabi's honor.

'We knew it was kind of an escape for coach P and we all knew how much he cared about us, so we wanted to carry ourselves well. We had a mature group.'

Jake Vickery, English teacher and former golf coach at Severna Park High School, remembers Gabi visiting the school.

"She was very bright, larger than life," he said. Now that he semi-retired, he will get the chance to support Golfing for Gabi in person.

"I've always been involved in the tournament, but I never played because I would not leave school," Vickery said. "Now, this year, I'll get the opportunity to play, and I understand that I am playing with coach.

The Pellicani family recognizes that not everyone can make the trip from Maryland to New York, but there are other ways to help.

'People have been so supportive and compassionate," Paul said. "Here it is, a weekday on Long Island. It's not easy for people to take what is probably a three-day trip."

On September 26, golfers will gather again to smile and laugh, but they won't forget the reason for the event: to preserve Gabi's legacy and to fund pediatric cancer research.

The Pellicani family hopes that their efforts, and the support from everyone in Severna Park, will prevent more families from enduring what theirs did.

'We don't want other families to get the horrible news that we got," Paul said. "Let's not have this be just a sad story, but maybe something positive can come

Tripling The Offer From An Evil, Greedy Insurance Company

ary Grantham — a nod to my lovely wife's favorite PBS series, "Downton Abbey" — suffered painful head, neck and foot injuries in a rear-end motor vehicle

collision that occurred on southbound I-97 on the Friday before Labor Day in 2018. Coincidentally, we were about to try a motor vehicle collision case for Ms. Grantham in the circuit court for Howard County, a collision that had transpired two years earlier. Her injuries were similar. She had documented neck and foot problems, which were exacerbated by the August 31, 2018, collision.

The at-fault driver was insured by Snake Farm Insurance Company. Ms. Grantham incurred medical expenses totaling approximately \$7,200. Because she was the daughter of an earl, she suffered no lost wages. After a course of treatment that lasted three and a half months and included visits to the orthopedist, podiatrist and six weeks of physical therapy, she returned to her prior baseline level of symptoms, with occasional neck and foot pain. Nonetheless, she had experienced fear, pain and

suffering as the result of a careless driver's inattention.

Upon concluding treatment, we discussed the case with Ms. Grantham and valued it at \$20,000 (valuing injury claims is worth another article and is certainly more art than science). We sent a letter to Snake Farm, along with the motor vehicle crash report, our client's medical records, bills and related documentation. We started at \$31,500, a little higher than our valuation. After a few months of unreturned calls, I cornered the Snake Farm adjuster of the phone. Edna Braithwaite disagreed with our valuation and offered \$1,500 for Ms. Grantham's troubles.

Given our disparate views of the value, we concluded that continuing negotiations would be fruitless. We initially filed a lawsuit in the District Court of Anne Arundel County. We requested \$30,000 on Ms. Grantham's behalf, that figure being the high end of reasonable and the maximum allowed in the district court. Snake Farm requested a jury trial, as is its right under Maryland law. This jury trial prayer moved the case to the circuit court in Annapolis. The pandemic delayed justice for several years. The trial date was postponed three times.


The parties went through the process of discovery. Both sides answered interrogatories. We exchanged documents. Appearing for depositions. Richard Carlyle, the at-fault driver, testified that he could not have possibly

caused injury to Ms. Grantham because his foot nearly slipped off the gas pedal and he caused the slightest tap to her rear bumper. He was sorry for causing the collision, but Ms. Grantham couldn't have possibly been hurt.

After repeated COVID delays, the trial was scheduled for June 14, 2022, in the circuit court. In May, Snake Farm increased its offer to \$5,750, still not enough to cover medical expenses. Ms. Grantham held firm. We prepared for trial. One week before trial, the insurance company made its first reasonable offer of \$17,500. This was more than three times the offer from a month previous and more than 11.5 times its longstanding offer of \$1,500. Ms. Grantham never wanted to go to trial. She didn't bargain for the four-year odyssey outlined above. She accepted an offer on the low end of reasonable. The moral of the story is that injured folks do not have to accept ridiculously low offers from evil, greedy insurance companies.

Community Center Offers Free Swim Programs For Anyone With A Disability



he Severna Park Community Center (SPCC) has launched an adaptive swim program for children and adults with a disability. SEALS (Social, Educational, All Welcome, Limitless, Swimming) will give more people access to the sport of swimming.

With donations from the Fund for Anne Arundel, Anne Arundel County, and the John J. Leidy Foundation, this program is now available for free through June 2023.

"The SEALS program advances our commitment to our community in

making Severna Park Community Center a place where everyone belongs," said SPCC Executive Director Sarah Elder.

The program was developed by SP-CC's director of programs and partnerships, Shelly Beigel, and designed to promote water safety, foster physical fitness, and improve emotional health. Swimming is known for whole-person benefits including improved cardio ability, strength-building, flexibility enhancement and positive mental health.

"Our son, Jacob, was diagnosed with autism when he was 2 and half years

old," said Tracy Vest, parent of a special needs child. "When we learned of the SEALS program, I immediately signed Jacob up. We have been blessed to receive swim lessons for Jacob and for the first time he swam on his own (for a little bit). Programs such as the SEALS team are very important for families with special needs who may not be able to afford swim lessons."

SPCC developed these options, which are adaptive and carefully supported by trained staff:

Weekly group lessons: For those who have acquired basic swimming skills

but want to become stronger swimmers. Lessons are designed to build skills one step at a time.

Weekly private lessons: This is an introduction to water and learn to swim" program for children and adults with little to no swimming experience. Participants work one-on-one with instructors on basic swimming skills and water safety.

Swim team: (youth and adult) For swimmers to be able to swim 25 yards independently and follow directions from coaches on deck. There are three inclusive intrasquad meets a year with people with and without a disability competing together. Swimmers are also eligible to participate in Special Olympics locally, regionally and nationally.

Many Severna Park Community Center swim staff members carry multiple certifications including Swim Whisperers, an adaptive swimming certification, the American Swimming Coaches Association (ASCA) certification, and certification through Maryland Certified Educators in Special Education.

Jehovah's Witnesses Knocking On Doors Again



ehovah's Witnesses resumed their trademark door-to-door ministry September 1 when a two-and-half-year suspension of the work was officially lifted, just in time to begin a global campaign featuring a new interactive Bible study program.

The decision to resume their doorto-door ministry marks the complete restoration of all pre-pandemic in-person activities for the 1.3 million Jehovah's Witnesses in the 13,000 congregations in the United States. Houses of worship (called Kingdom Halls) were reopened April 1, witnessing in public places resumed May 31 and in-person conventions are once again being planned for 2023.

"Despite feeling a bit apprehensive, I am looking forward to doing what my wife and I always enjoyed before," said Mark Hagopian, a Severna Park resident who will head out with his wife, Alisa, to the neighborhood in the coming days. "It makes my day when I am able to share with my neighbors the hope that the Bible contains, right at their doorstep."

The suspension of the public ministry was a proactive response by the organization to keep communities and congregants safe. The move was also

unprecedented. Jehovah's Witnesses had been preaching from house to house without interruption for more than 100 years through an economic depression, two world wars and global unrest. But COVID-19 demanded a different response.

"We believe that the early decision to shut down all in-person activities for more than two years has saved many lives," said Robert Hendriks, U.S. spokesperson for Jehovah's Witnesses.

oming off their best season in over a decade, Severna Park traveled to play the Meade Mustangs to open the 2022 football season and hung on for a 27-20 win on September 2.

The game was a story of two halves. The first was a back-and-

forth scoring feast while the second was a much more methodical and slower half.

Meade got the game going with some quick fireworks as they scored less than two minutes into the game on a 45-yard touchdown pass. The Falcons responded with a long touchdown pass of their own, from

31 yards out just four minutes later. All three of Meade's scores came on long kickoff returns including an 80-yard return for a touchdown right before halftime that brought the Mustangs within 1 after the Falcons had scored a 5-yard rushing touchdown.

The Falcons offense was led by

the rushing attack, particularly starting quarterback **Seamus** Patenaude, who carried the ball 23 times for 136 yards and three touchdowns. On a 59-yard touchdown run, he ran over a cornerback in the open field on his way to the end zone. Patenaude routinely

ryouts are done. Rosters are finalized. Field hockey season is officially upon us. Here are season outlooks for Archbishop Spalding, Severna Park, Broadneck and Severn School.

ARCHBISHOP SPALDING

Following a season that ended with Spalding being IAAM A Conference champions, there's a fitting reason that Leslee Brady, Archbishop Spalding High School head varsity field hockey coach, has a positive outlook for the 2022 season.

"We were an offensive juggernaut last season, scoring 78 goals with 10 against, leading to a 16-1 record culminating with the IAAM championship," Brady said. "We graduated four Division I players, so we have our work cut out for us, but we will be a very strong team again, returning seven starters, all young players with championship experience.'

Key players for the Cavaliers this year include forward Ally Keith, a

Sophomore Carys **Donahue** — who played in the AAU Junior Olympics — will be another contributor this season.

"Obviously, the highlight of last season was the championship," Brady said. "The pleasant surprise was the way in which our freshmen developed so quickly. That's the reason for such high expectations this year: we have a lot of sophomores and juniors with a ton of experience at the highest level. You blend them in with our senior leadership, and that's a winning combination.

Brady is supported on varsity by coaches Kelsey Wuest and Logan Edmondson.

BROADNECK

Last season, Broadneck High School's varsity field hockey team had an overall record of 12-5, and they won the 4A East Region II championship. Following the region championship, Broadneck advanced to the state quarterfinals, where they fell 1-0 to eventual champion Severna Park, and the goal was scored on a penalty stroke.

Girls Soccer Preview

he 2021-2022 season was a rollercoaster for each of the local high school girls soccer teams. Some suffered heartbreaking playoff losses while one was able to claim their first title in over 15 years. How do the teams stack up this season?

ARCHBISHOP SPALDING

The Cavaliers are coming off a season in which they came agonizingly close to a conference title, finishing as runners-up in the Interscholastic Athletic Association of Maryland (IAAM) Conference A championship. While the end to their season was strong, the team did struggle against teams in their conference as they went 6-4-0 versus conference opponents, while they feasted on nonconference opponents, going 3-0-1. The team will return a strong group of girls led by 13 rising seniors after losing only three girls in 2022. Grace Faulkener, Kate **Dovi** and **Danielle Gargano** are some of the key players leading the team's offense while Grace's sister, Emma, will man the goal.

BROADNECK

The Bruins are coming off a season in which they made it to the state finals, finishing as runners-up with a 2-1 loss to Walt Whitman. While the team will lose some important players like goalie **Mason Smargissi**, many top scorers will return, including **Lilly Kelley**, **Olivia Orso** and **Lily Trout** with Trout and Orso being juniors. Being able to return so many experienced starters will be beneficial as the team looks to claim a title.

"Our players are experienced and understand the demands of the season," said head coach **John Camm**. "We continue to have high expectations for our program. We have a difficult schedule, so they know not to look too far ahead in the season. And we have a lot of returners coming off a 2021 season where we won 17 games. They are training hard, which will help them with this season."

SEVERN SCHOOL

Showcasing a stifling defense last season, the Admirals won their first IAAM B Conference title since 2005. Rising junior **Skyler Morton** scored the game-winning goal in overtime while the defense kept rising senior goalkeeper **Zoee Stencil** from having to face an onslaught of shots as she had to make only six saves in the game. Stencil and four other seniors are leading a young core that includes Morton and sophomore **Eliana Valencia**, who assisted Morton for the game-winning goal last season. With such a strong core coming back, the Admirals will look to repeat as conference champs.

SEVERNA PARK

For many teams, the toughest loss to overcome is one to their biggest rival. For the Falcons, that loss stings even worse since it came in the playoffs, when they lost to Broadneck in the regional finals. Given how tightly contested that game was, remaining scoreless until the Bruins scored with seven minutes left, the Falcons feel that they have a team that can compete and get past Broadneck this season.

"I expect us to have a very competitive team this fall," said head coach **Rick Stimpson**. "We have a lot of quality players returning and a great group of seniors that have done a really good job of bringing the team together. This group is very driven, and they push each other every day in training to get better. Having a lot of depth means players are constantly playing for minutes on the field and that means being sharp every day in practice."

Two of the top returning players to keep an eye on this season are seniors **Sophie Miller** and **Ava Schultz**.

The Falcons opened the season with a 5-0 win over Tuscarora High School.

he days are getting shorter, which means the World Cup is getting closer. Thirty-two countries will fight for the title, but before that, three local schools will look to repeat or exceed the success they had last year while another will hope their fortune turns around. ARCHBISHOP SPALDING

The Cavaliers kept Severn School from having a perfect season in 2021 when the Cavs beat the Admirals in the opening game. Despite the disappointing end to last season, Bruins head coach **Sean Tettemer** is confident about his team this year.

"We are working hard to improve each day," Tettemer said. "Hopefully we will become a better team and will be playing our best at the end of the season."

The biggest hurdle the Bruins must overcome this season is that only two

starters are returning, goalie **Matt Tettemer** and forward **Jaden Smith**.
But despite the turnover among the starting nine, the Bruins have several good players, like senior forward **Riley Erbe**, who will try and help the team meet their high expectations.

SEVERN SCHOOL

Severn had some dominating sports teams last year, with seven of them winning titles. Just like their female counterparts, the boys squad rolled to the title, finishing with an impressive 18-1 record, their only loss to Archbishop Spalding to start the season.

The Admirals had a suffocating defense and lights-out goalie last year as 11 of the 18 wins were shutouts. It's always tough to repeat, but many of the players on the team already know what it feels like to win a title, while also being able to stay focused on getting there first. That doesn't mean that the Falcons will lack in talent. Rising seniors **Evan Souder** and **Andrew Handen** will help man a defense that was key to the team's success last year while **Andrew Campbell** has shown he can be a reliable scorer. Overall, the Falcons are an interesting mix of returning experience and talent with young, unproven players, with high but not unrealistic expectations of bringing home the title.


ARCHBISHOP SPALDING

Spalding is replacing the 22 seniors who graduated, with 16 of those players going on to play college football. Some of their stars from last year will continue their football playing days at Maryland, Penn State and Virginia Tech.

Last year the Cavaliers went 10-0 in the regular season and were ranked in the top five schools in Maryland. They suffered a stunning upset loss to McDonogh in the first round of the MIAA conference playoffs.

Some of the Cavaliers' young stars include their sophomore quarterback Malik Washington, who has been offered full scholarships by numerous Division 1 schools; center Jason Shipman; receivers Max Moss and RJ Newton; as well as defensive leaders Keion Flowers, Ty McVicker, Trent Gillis, and freshmen TJ Moultrie and Sean Johnson.

'We'll definitely throw the ball more this year," Schmitt said. "This team has talent, and they have amazing pride in their team and school. These players came here to play big-time football and they are grateful for the opportunity.

To prepare the players for the gauntlet of games, Spalding faced DeMatha in a preseason scrimmage and played them to a 7-7 tie at halftime before losing 21-7.

"We fought like crazy and had a positive experience from the game," Schmitt said.

assistant coach at Spalding, as well as highly involved with the Old Mill Youth Association. The Admirals had 44 students try out for varsity and had numerous lacrosse players return to the gridiron to bolster their squad.

"We're further ahead than I thought we would be," Ballard said. "The lacrosse players we added are tough and they are great competitors.'

Severn also added some size with the transfer of **Alex Steffens** from Old Mill (6-foot-4, 265 pounds) and **Daniel Growney**, a wide receiver

from Montgomery Blair.
The offense will be led by **Jacob Todd**, who received a scholarship to play lacrosse at Princeton. The offensive line is young, without any seniors, but averages 240 pounds.

"The future is bright, and our big game is always against St. Mary's,' Ballard said. "We're changing the culture here and hopefully our recruits will see the change and enroll at our school.'


"We had a nice senior class that has moved on," Shrenchuk said. "So, I thought it was important to build some cohesion with our underclassmen and allow them to spend more time with our coaching staff this summer."

In 33 innings pitched, Murphy had an earned run average (ERA) just under 2.08 and threw 29 strikeouts.

Coach Skrenchuk got the idea for the Bayside Bears from seeing the Bruins soccer and basketball teams get more practice because of their ability to play in a summer league, which Anne Arundel County didn't have for baseball.

"What this allowed us to do, by picking up games and tournaments, was practice, which is where our kids really got better," Skrenchuk said. "Nate had 89 plate appearances this summer, so it was a full summer of me getting to evaluate him and see how he fits into what we're trying to do next spring."

Next spring, with the evaluations he was able to do this summer and the additional playing time his players got, Skrenchuk and the Bruins will look to advance further in the playoffs after losing in the first round last year.




Catcher **Nick Cicale**, a Broadneck athlete, hit in the middle of the lineup and threw out five of 12 attempted base stealers.




The players all felt like the summer competition advanced their skills.

Competitors Earn Gold Medals At World Stick-Fighting Championships

group of Anne Arundel County residents traveled to Cebu City in the Philippines in July to compete in eskrima, or stick-fighting, a martial art with a cherished history in the Philippines.

Of that Anne Arundel County group, representing Team USA and Kick Connection of Millersville, 12 competitors came home with medals in the 16th World Eskrima Kali Arnis Federation (WEKAF) Championships.

The Kick Connection competitors ranged in age from 10 to 53 and got to face challengers from Germany, Portugal, Brazil, India, Iran, Korea, Switzerland, Cambodia and other countries.

"It was really exciting because this was a full-contact stick-fighting event," said **Carlos Patalinghug Jr.**, owner of Kick Connection. "They wore armor and they hit, striked and blocked."

Worlds are held every two years, but because of the COVID pandemic, the last world tournament was held in 2018. Patalinghug said the event is modeled after boxing, with three one-minute rounds.

"The winners showed accuracy, speed and technique," he said. Of the winners, the Geldmacher

Of the winners, the Geldmacher family from Arnold fared especially well. **Tim Geldmacher** earned a silver medal in double stick competition and a bronze in single stick. His 12-year-old son, **Emery Geldmacher**, took home a gold in double stick, a silver in sayaw and a bronze in knife point. Tim's 10-year-old son, **Cooper Geldmacher**, won gold medals in single stick, double stick, and knife point; silver in padded point; and bronze in sayaw.

Kick Connection accounted for 13 of Team USA's 23 gold medals and 13 of its 21 silver medals.

One of the Filipino coaches heaped high praise on the Kick Connection group.

"He asked, 'How is it that your fighters are able to fight and fight?" Patalinghug recalled. "I really give credit to our instructors, Matthew Cerbas and Kim Everett, who train our students, and I train them too. For [the Filipino coach] to say that, it was a great compliment."

The event was capped with a ceremony that included music, food and representatives of the national government. Team USA also posed for photos in front of a shrine dedicated to Lapu-Lapu, a Filipino folk hero who fought Ferdinand Magellan in 1521 and defended his people against Spanish conquest.

"Filipinos in general are very kind," Patalinghug said. "I'm a dual citizen. It was great for our group to be so accepted and welcomed. They were like rock stars. They really admire the U.S. because they helped with liberating them from the Spanish."

Beyond competition, the Maryland visitors made an impact in the Philippines.

"We each took an extra suitcase with school supplies and clothing," Tim Geldmacher said. "We went to a school that was in need and donated some of the items. We gave the rest to other organizations."

Asked about that experience and helping the less fortunate, Tim said his sons are "very grateful for what they have."

Patalinghug said his groups have built eight water wells over the course of several visits to the Philippines.

"I try to not just compete but also give them the bigger picture," he said of his students. "It was such a great honor for us."

Metcalfe's middle students were elated they could continue to work and learn with her in their high school years.

Singing the national anthem at Camden Yards was a dream come true (just wish the Red Sox had been playing that night). It was a true honor when the varsity choir was invited to sing at the Pennsylvania Music Educators Association conference in Pittsburgh and perform the national anthem at the Defense Information Systems Agency.

The most magical night of the year was our annual invitation to sing at the State House by candlelight. I love when [assistant principal] Mr. Lou Anoff comes down to M-Hall to sing with the tenors and basses and learns to play guitar. The year my students were obsessed with the musical "Newsies" just happened to be the year my sixth- and seventh-graders got to take my other favorite field trip to see it at Toby's Dinner Theatre and they invited by boys to perform one of the songs from the show during intermission.

What will you miss the most?

My favorite part of this job is the students that surprise you and realize that you truly are making a difference in their lives. The student who did not want to take guitar class but, by the end of the year, is coming in once a week to show you the new songs they learned. The kids who are not chorus students but come down to play the grand piano. The student who made you want to tear your hair out, but you see

them at the high school and they're still in chorus, still singing. The boys in chorus class who never want to sing out during class, but when they are participating in a musical theater workshop in New York City, they are totally into it, and you realize that they can really sing and dance! And, then lead everyone is a huge sing-along at Hard Rock Cafe later that day.

What new challenges excited you to move over to SPHS? What are you most excited to do during your first year at SPHS?

I have performed a wide variety of vocal music over my career, and I am looking forward to learning something new and adding to my toolkit. And I'm extremely thankful that my dear friend Mr. Brisentine has offered to mentor me through my first year.

What is the secret to your success as such a loved teacher?

The real secret to my success: my students! I could not do what I do if I didn't have the most amazing middle schoolers who trust me, are willing to be goofy with me, love squeaky chickens and dragons (especially Mama Chicken), Alfred, "The Mice" and Mr. Bill, and take chances trying new things. I have also been extremely lucky to have had the most incredible parent volunteers who willingly put in countless hours to ensure the success of the musical, varsity choir, drama camp, musical revue and more.

Many of those parents are on the board of the Spartan Lyrical Society, which has been invaluable to the growth and prosperity of the music and theater programs at SPMS. I am humbled by the dedication these parents make to ensure the success of our programs at SPMS. However, we really couldn't do what we do if we didn't have awesome administrators at SPMS. I am forever grateful for their continued support of all of the music and arts programs at SPMS.

I love living in Severna Park and being able to support the musical community of our town. I am looking forward to maintaining my relationship with SPMS through feeder concerts, recruiting events, etc. and continuing the extraordinary legacy of music making at SPHS.

Educator Of The Month

Glenna Blessing

St. John The Evangelist School

In her 21-year education career, Glenna Blessing has been in middle and high schools, but as the new assistant principal at St. John the Evangelist, she will now aid in the development of elementary school students for the first time.

Blessing left Northeast Middle School after three years as principal following the 2021-2022 school year because she saw an opportunity to become more grounded in her faith and spend more time with her family, including a sixth-grader who attends St. John the Evangelist.

"I am a product of Catholic education," Blessing said. "My journey from kindergarten through high school was through Catholic schools and both my children are in Catholic schools, so I felt this vocational calling. It is grounded in faith-based practice. I am very excited to be able to return to my roots in Catholic education."

Blessing started her career as an assistant professor at Goucher College and dance department chair at George Washington Carver Center for Arts and Technology, both in Baltimore County. She then became chair of the Performing and Visual Arts program at Annapolis High School before joining Glen Burnie High School as an assistant principal in 2014.

Glen Burnie High School Principal Scott McGuire spent only six months working with Blessing, but that time was enough for her to leave a lasting impression. He praised her during a conversation with the *Voice* in 2019.

"Glenna is a collaborative leader," McGuire said. "She really built strong relationships with the students, the parents and the kids. She was also innovative and created solutions to problems."

Blessing is excited to help students academically but also holistically, in mind, body and spirit.

"Joy in prayer, making new friends as we start the school year, and learning how to do all the routines of school for the first time, that is exciting to see," she said. "Seeing students experience all that St. John is about is what is bringing joy to my role as an educator.

"Just like it's location, location, location, location with real estate, it's relationships, relationships, relationships [in education]," she said. "I want to build relationships not only with students but with staff and let them know I'm here for whatever they need whether that's assisting in the classroom or helping with lesson plans."

Academically, Blessing and the St. John staff will need to prepare students for a new standardized test implemented by the Archdiocese of Baltimore. She has no doubt that the teachers are capable.

"This is a community of strong educators who give of themselves wholly with care and compassion," Blessing said. "You see that everywhere with teachers ... but here, I have felt the excitement and energy. They want to do what is best for students and are thinking how they are going to meet the needs of all students in mind, body and spirit."

Blessing looks forward to school plays, the Junior Olympics, May Fair and other events at St. John.

"I think, as administrators, we feel a deep connection to each school community we work with, and I am looking forward to St. John becoming a school family for me," Blessing said. "I am looking forward to connecting with students, their families, and our teachers throughout the school year."

Meet The Student Member Of The Board, Zach McGrath

Severna Park High School senior Zach McGrath was elected to the Anne Arundel County Board of Education as student member of the board (SMOB) in April 2022. He began

his one-year term on July 1, becoming the first SMOB from Severna Park since Josie Urrea during the 2018-2019 school year.

McGrath was a youth representative for the Anne Arundel County Office of Health Equity and

Racial Justice and interned for Delegates Shaneka Henson and J. Sandy Bartlett in the State House. He currently interns for Senator Sarah Elfreth.

Prior to his election to the Board of Education, McGrath was active in student government. He served on the Chesapeake Regional Association of Student Councils executive board, the Maryland Association of Student Councils executive board, and was an officer for his high school's student government.

As a Boy Scout, he worked on numerous conservation projects, including working with Kinder Farm Park to support the local bluebird population. He also serves on the youth advisory council of the Maryland Civic Education Coalition and works with the organization to promote civic education.

With the school year underway, Mc-Grath told the *Voice* about his goals and experience.

- **Q:** You have an impressive resume between your work in the Maryland state legislature, serving your school's SGA and being on other councils. What motivated you to take on more responsibilities by running for student member of the board?
- **A:** Through my work in student government, I heard about the student member position. I researched it and found that I could positively impact the community and be a voice for all AACPS students.
- **Q:** Do you remember what initially piqued your interest in politics and public service? If so, when did that occur?
- A: I was initially inspired to get involved in politics and public service due to a Fourth of July visit to the Italian American World War Veterans Of The U.S. Post 40 in Milford, Massachusetts, with my dad. He served 31 years in the Navy as a naval aviator in Bosnia, Iraq and Afghanistan. Veterans of the Korean, Vietnam and second world wars told me stories of why they volunteered to risk their lives for this country and what they had to give up. I was inspired by their sacrifices for this country and wanted to continue their legacy of service.
- **Q:** You started as SMOB on July 1. How has the experience been so far?
- **A:** It has been great! The board members have been super welcoming. I have been able to tour a few schools and meet the teachers, custodians, food workers, and

staff that make our school system work. AACPS is an excellent school system, and I couldn't be happier to help support it.

- **Q:** During the SMOB debate, you mentioned some priorities: two mental health days for students, improving transportation, etc. Why are those important to you?
- **A:** When I decided to run, I wanted to focus on issues that would help the dayto-day life of students and their families. That's why I focused on transportation and mental health; both affect students' and parents' quality of life. I want to alleviate the stress on the community by making bus transportation more reliable while supporting our struggling students by providing the opportunity to take a mental health break.
- **Q:** You also mentioned following the lead of other counties, such as procuring electric school buses like Montgomery County. It sounds like you believe there are reasonable solutions to improve AACPS?
- **A:** Yes, I think electric buses would be a tremendous cost-saving investment next time the school system purchases vehicles. Our school system is currently focused on ensuring reliable transportation as the school year starts. After that, I am very excited to explore ways AACPS can make our transportation services green while being financially responsible.
- **Q:** Have you reached out to anyone for advice?
- **A:** Yes, I have. Drake Smith and Bunmi Omisore, my student member predecessors, have been great resources for advice on balancing academics, extracurriculars and my board responsibilities. I am incredibly grateful for their support.
- **Q:** Your idea of a team-building trip is laser tag, so I have to ask, have you persuaded your fellow board members to put that on the calendar yet?
- **A:** The board members were surprisingly really receptive to the idea. A lot of them thought it would be a great way to team-build while having. One board member even suggested a good laser tag place to use. Hopefully, soon, the board will not only debate with words but with lasers as well!
- **Q:** You're not just a representative for students but also teachers, parents and all stakeholders countywide. What is the best way for anyone to reach you about their concerns?
- **A:** I am a student member, but I represent everyone in Anne Arundel County. If you ever want to reach me, please email me at zmcgrath@aacps.org.
- **Q:** Is there anything else you want people to know?
- **A:** If you ever see me around, don't be a stranger! I may be the student member, but I represent everyone: teachers, parents, and every member of the Anne Arundel community. I'd be happy to stop and have a conversation. A successful school system needs public input, and I would love to discuss how to improve our schools with anyone.



Scouts Improve Their Community While Striving To Inspire Others

ver the course of 100 years, the Boy Scouts of America has had just over 2.5 million Scouts, less than 4% all time, earn the rank of Eagle Scout. Most troops will see maybe two or three members reach Eagle Scout every year. But Troop 918, out of Our Shepherd Lutheran Church, has had five over the past few months.

Daniel Palus has already been given his Eagle Scout award while Tyler Knox, Colin Stees, Jacob John and Kellen Curtis are planning their Eagle Scout Court of Honor ceremonies, which will be held soon.

Each of them planned,

designed and built an Eagle Scout service project that would benefit their community, while also demonstrating their leadership skills. John, Stees and Knox all had similar projects while John and Knox's projects worked in collaboration. John designed and installed a gaga ball pit at Lake Waterford Park and Stees installed another gaga ball pit at St. Martin's-in-the-Field Episcopal School. Knox's project added benches around John's pit at Lake Waterford, which made the area around the pit less barren while giving parents a place to sit while their kids played. Meanwhile, Palus and Curtis both had similar projects where they installed lending library boxes in two Severna Park communities, Evergreen and Carrollton Manor.

While these projects are meant to allow Scouts to lead, they often also allow them to inspire and teach their fellow Scouts.



Younger Scouts get to see what types of projects are being done and may be inspired to do a similar project for their own community, while also learning about the expectations of undertaking such a project, especially with regards to the mistakes and changes these projects often undergo. Just like many professionally done projects, these Eagle Scout projects don't always go to plan and it's up to the Scout leading the project to handle and overcome any issues that might arise.

Knox, Stees, Palus, John and Curtis all wanted to be able to inspire their fellow Scouts in Troop 918 in different ways. Knox wanted to give other Scouts of Troop 918 the ability to continue to add to the area around the pit.

"I talked to the park ranger, and we could almost turn it into an Eagle Scout zone," Knox said. "We talked about potentially adding a nice fire pit to the area and a brick pathway and nice bushes around it. And it could be just a really nice community project."

Palus said, "I wanted to inspire them in the good my project brought as well as how I went about doing it. But it was almost like the inverse of inspired, by making it a lesson. Showing that orga-

nization is a big factor for kids who are doing their Eagle Scout project now to consider, so that they can look at me and see all the good, the things that went well in its execution but also the things that could have been better. Even the downsides my project had, in terms of how it was executed, were good in the end, because they're kind of

a cautionary tale."

The journeys of these five Scouts are now over as they have reached the highest peak of being a Scout. The leadership they displayed both in their troop and in leading their projects, along with the service they gave to their troop and their community, are proof of their strong character.

supplies: hiking poles, clothes, GU packets, CLIF Bars. A three-liter container of water and iodine tablets to purify water. Blowup mattresses and tents.

Their first big obstacle came early into their ascent.

"The first day, just going up six miles with a constant steep grade, it was kind of grueling," Keefer said. "We spent two to three hours going up and then we realized we had another two to three hours."

Cawlfield agreed, saying, "The switchbacks on the first day of the summit were probably a mile back and forth before we got to a ridge where we thought we were getting toward the top. Then it was another mile."

The boys discussed sports and school as a distraction. Their next camp appeared at 12,000 feet. Grateful for a break from the exhausting hike, the group twice received another surprise.

"My dad and I were setting up a tent and beads of hail started beating down," Muldoon said. "It's interesting because it was hailing up there, but down below, there was no rain."

Harsh weather soon gave way to breathtaking scenery.

"You can see the bios change," Muldoon said. "It would start all grassy and then as we started to climb, we could see lakes and then it became rocks. Icecaps were melting down into deep-blue lakes. All the vegetation just seems to disappear in front of your eyes."

By Sunday, the group was tired, adrenaline keeping them alert.

"After seeing a sign that says Mount Whitney summit, we realized it was still two miles, which seemed so far away that it was demoralizing, but we knew we were almost there," Keefer said.

Less than 50% of hikers successfully summit Mount Whitney. The Severna Park residents joined that group of successful hikers.

"Getting to the top is almost as much of a relief as it is joy," Muldoon said.

Cawlfield said, "It was an awesome feeling of accomplishment, just to get to celebrate with everyone and finally getting cell service and being able to FaceTime my mom and show her the views."

The boys and their dads all hugged and savored the views for about 45 minutes.

"Seeing the mountains and scenery, it was completely worth it," Keefer said. "There was a sense of pride that we conquered it."

Their last stop was at The Oasis of Death Valley, a hotel with a golf course 214 feet below sea level. Now home in Severna Park, all three teens said they would do another hike in the future, despite the obstacles.

"It was a great bonding experience that we will remember forever," Keefer said

Muldoon said, "It's a feeling I won't forget. It helps me see what I can do by pushing through when something is difficult."

In addition to their memories forged on Mount Whitney, one other tangible reminder of their accomplishment still exists in California.

"At the summit, there was a book where we could sign our name and hometown," Cawlfield said. "Being able to write Severna Park was awesome."

BHS Grad Becomes Eagle Scout

his summer, Broadneck High School graduate and Troop 382 member Matthew Hayes was awarded the rank of Eagle Scout after completing a project for the Patriot House, part of the Arundel House of Hope.

Hayes has been a part of Boy Scouts of America for 12 years. He wanted to achieve Eagle Scout as two of his older brothers also achieved the honor.

To earn scouting's highest award, Hayes had to earn a minimum of 21 merit badges, serve in leadership roles within his troop, and complete a community service project.

The Patriot House is a homeless shelter for veterans. When veterans are ready to move out, it can be costly to get basic items. Hayes' project created boxes, which he called "movein kits," containing household items such as plates, glasses, pots, pans, cleaning supplies and towels.

"The reason he chose Patriot House was because of the veterans in our family — two brothers and one sister are vets, as is his father," said his mom, Debi. "He wanted to pay back others for their service and knowing that it could easily have been his family and hoping that if it should ever be

a family member that someone would help them too."

Hayes will take classes at Anne Arundel Community College this fall.







Student To Study Abroad In Jordan On Scholarship

uliana Augustine, a student from Severna Park, has been awarded a YES Abroad scholarship for 2022-2023. Juliana will live with a host family and study in Jordan for the academic year.

Juliana is one of only 65 students selected competitively from across the

United States who received a scholar-ship from the U.S. Department of State to participate in the Kennedy-Lugar Youth Exchange and Study (YES) Abroad program. The merit-based award covers the full cost of an academic year abroad, providing Juliana a full academic and cultural immersion experience, including living with a host family in Jordan, attending an international high school, and helping her develop the skills necessary to be a leader in the global community. The YES Abroad program is funded by the U.S. Department of State's Bureau of Educational and Cultural Affairs.

Through Juliana's participation in the YES Abroad program, she will be at the forefront of citizen diplomacy, serving as a "youth ambassador" in her host country, enhancing cross-cultural understanding and deepening trust by building lasting relationships with her host family and peers, and engaging in volunteer service and leadership training to help her host community. Through the YES Abroad experience, Juliana will develop the skills to share American values, find new ways for America to compete effectively in the global marketplace, and contribute to a more peaceful world.

The Kennedy-Lugar YES program was first authorized by the U.S. Congress in the aftermath of September 11, 2001, as an effort to increase dialogue and mutu-

al understanding between people of the United States and people of countries with significant Muslim populations. Initially created as a program for international high school students to live and study in the United States, the YES program was expanded in 2009 to include YES Abroad for American

high school students to study overseas.

For the 2022-2023 academic year, YES Abroad provides opportunities for Americans to study for one academic year in 12 countries, including Bosnia and Herzegovina, Bulgaria, Ghana, India, Indonesia, Jordan, Malaysia, Morocco, North Macedonia, Senegal, Thailand and Turkey.

YES Abroad is administered by a consortium of nonprofit organizations, including American Councils for International Education, AFS-USA, Amideast, and iEARN-USA. Exchanges taking place in Jordan are administered by Amideast. Amideast Education Abroad programs help develop mutual understanding through virtual and onsite programs for young people to study the Middle East and North Africa, improve their Arabic language skills, and interact with the peoples and cultures of the region, especially local families, organizations and students. Amideast strives to help develop participants' awareness of their positionality in the world and their capacity for intercultural humility while providing them with safe, secure, and healthy learning and living environments.





Arnold Resident Returns To A Hospital That Feels Like Home

Christine Frost Selected As Chief Nursing Officer For Luminis Health AAMC

uminis Health Anne Arundel
Medical Center (LHAAMC) is the
place where Christine Frost gave
birth to two children. It's the place
where she worked, twice, and advanced
her career. So, it was exciting news in
August when LHAAMC announced to
the community that Frost would be its
new chief nursing officer.

"The [hospital's] culture and connection to the community have been so strong and have been maintained," Frost said, when asked about returning to LHAAMC.

An Arnold resident, Frost will oversee the approximately 1,200 nurses at LHAAMC, as well as help manage finances, enforce policies and connect patients with the care they need.

"My leadership style is to be a transformational leader," Frost said. "I seek to understand the current state of nursing and collaborate with our team to innovate and advance the practice of nursing."

Frost was chosen after a rigorous nationwide search. Sherry Perkins, president of Luminis Health Anne

Arundel Medical Center, was looking for a candidate with "the perfect combination of the art and science that is nursing." Perkins previously worked with Frost and knew she would be a strong leader.

"What you look for in a chief nursing officer is exceptional clinical expertise, someone very community minded who understands what we want to do and is team based," Perkins said. "She also demonstrates compassion for people when meeting with them one on one."

Originally from Switzerland, Frost visited the United States during summers when she was a teenager before

moving to Anne Arundel County.

"At 16, I started as a candy striper and I fell in love with nursing, patient care and the team environment," she said.

She worked at Luminis from 1995 to 2000 and then returned from 2008 to 2017 in a leadership role.

"I already had a passion for the art and science of nursing, but then I also developed a keen interest in business and operations," she said.

Throughout her nearly 30-year career, Frost has held various nursing positions at the University of Maryland Medical System and the University of Maryland Baltimore Washington Medical Center. She received her bachelor's degree from Georgetown University School of Nursing, as well as a Masters in Nursing and a Masters of Business Administration from the University of Maryland.

One of her biggest challenges as chief nursing officer is tackling the nursing shortage, a problem that hospitals nationwide have faced since the onset of the COVID pandemic. Frost plans to work with LHAAMC's partners to attract and retain nurses.

Perkins believes LHAAMC has the right environment to accomplish that priority.

"I think the first order of business is to overcome the turnover challenges of the last two to three years," Perkins said. "Job one is to make the environment one that nurses want to stay in, and second, we have to continue to build the recruitment.

"We have attributes at Luminis Anne Arundel Medical Center that make it an environment where people want to work," she said. "We know nurses want a workplace that values flexibility, that values learning, that values innovation, that values the use of technology."

Frost is excited to build those relationships with nurses and she's also excited about her role in the community. She volunteers with a food pantry located at Discoveries: The Library at the Mall in Annapolis. Frost is also active at St. Margaret's Church and is the president-elect for the Maryland Organization of Nurse Leaders (MONL), a nonprofit that advocates for and facilitates the provision of competent, effective, efficient and compassionate health care.

"It's so valuable," Frost said of the opportunity. "We're all learning and growing together, and we talk a lot about collaboration."

For Frost, there is plenty of work ahead, but she also has plenty of reasons to be thrilled about her new opportunities.

Fitting Fitness In

s a busy mom of three, business owner and chronic over-scheduler, it's hard for me to find time. Often in life, we prioritize everything and everyone else over ourselves. What if you could start a fitness routine, carve

time out for yourself, and feel good about the progress you are making toward a healthier lifestyle? Even though some of us have more time than others, I've found there are three core concepts that, if followed, will help maintain a consistent routine and enable you to integrate fitness into your life.

fitness studio can kick off your fitness journey, help you with your goals and offer a roadmap for success. Your routine needs to be sustainable so you can build up over time and be encouraged to stick with it.

3. Do something you want to do! Don't buy a stationary bike if spin already wasn't your thing. If running isn't your jam, maybe group fitness is a better fit. I realize everyone can try new things, but don't force it. Find something you love to do. I personally love group fitness. I love the comradery of a studio, the scheduled classes and the accountability. Exercising at home has never been my thing, so I stick to what keeps me in a routine. Doing something you like to do promotes

consistency. Exercise should be something you look forward to because you've chosen a plan that works for you.





Prostate Cancer Treatment: What You Need To Know

ccording to the American Cancer Society, prostate cancer is the second most common cancer in American men, with about one in eight men diagnosed with it in his lifetime.



It may be time to schedule a prostate cancer screening if you:

- Are 50 years old or older
- Are 45 years old or older, African American, or have a family history of prostate cancer

Screening may involve a blood test called a prostate-specific antigen (PSA) and a digital rectal exam to feel the prostate for abnor-

malities. You and your health care provider should decide together if prostate screening is right for you.

If you have received a prostate cancer diagnosis, the good news is that, now more than ever, there are multiple treatment approaches for prostate cancer.

The National Comprehensive Cancer Network recommends several treatment approaches. These range from active surveillance for lower-risk prostate cancer, to a combination of surgery and/or radiation therapy and/or systemic therapy for higher-risk prostate cancer. Large studies have shown equal cure rates between these different options, depending on the situation. Your prostate cancer providers will talk to you about the risks and benefits of each option. Here are some basics about the major approaches.

ACTIVE **SURVEILLANCE**

Active surveillance (AS) means getting PSA testing and physical exams with your urologist. It is a way of keeping a close eye on your prostate cancer without actually treating it. This can be an excellent option, especially for men with lower-risk pros-



tate cancer. About half of men who choose this option are able to avoid treatment down the line. Ask your prostate cancer providers if AS is a good option for you.

Surgery is done by your urologist, and is an excellent option especially in younger, healthy men. It typically involves removing the entire prostate and is the only way to see what the true extent of cancer is inside the prostate. Today, the robotic assisted prostatectomy allows surgeons enhanced vision, control, and precision and translates to less pain, shorter hospital stays and faster recovery. Speak to your urologist about the possible side effects of surgery and recovery.

RADIATION THERAPY

Radiation therapy (RT) is another excellent treatment option. It is non-invasive, and typically uses high-energy X-rays targeting the prostate, and sometimes additional areas around it. It is typically given daily, Monday through Friday. There are many different RT regimens, ranging from just five treatments to 44 treatments, for a variety of clinical situations. You meet with your doctor every week while you are on treatment to review any side effects and to help manage them. RT is well-tolerated in the vast majority of men, and serious long-term complications are rare. Speak to your radiation oncologist about the possible side effects of RT and recovery.

SYSTEMIC THERAPY

Systemic therapy is treatment that goes throughout the whole body and can be important to reduce the chances of prostate cancer spreading outside of the prostate, especially to the bones. It is often an option in men with higher-risk prostate cancer. It is typically given in the form of androgen deprivation therapy (ADT), sometimes called "hormonal therapy." This therapy comes in different forms, and decreases your testosterone levels, which helps prevent the prostate cancer from spreading. In recent years, certain types of ADT have shown newly discovered benefits, especially in men with high-risk prostate cancer. It can be given over a period of four months, up to even three years, depending on the clinical situation. Ask your prostate cancer providers if ADT can benefit vou.

MAKING YOUR DECISION

So, what treatment might be the best for you? It can be a complicated decision. Your doctors will help you weigh the risks and benefits of these approaches to prostate cancer to help you decide which is best for you.



he "Stranger Things" phenomenon has struck again. A member of the Hawkins Middle School audiovisual club has gone missing. Thankfully, the AV club has clues that could lead them to their missing friend, Will Byers.

So goes the description for the Severna Park Library's "Stranger Things" escape room event on Thursday, September 22, from 4:00pm to 4:45pm. The event is best for groups with 10 people or less and for ages 10 and up. Registration opened September 8 and is expected to fill quickly. Call the Severna Park Library at 410-222-6290 to sign up.

As a public library, the Severna Park branch has a few more budgetary restrictions than a Netflix show. Despite that, the staff members working on the program are putting together an immersive experience for fans of the show.

The setting is Mike Wheeler's basement, so think "Dungeons & Dragons" paraphernalia, lava lamps, bad lighting and more.

"There's a part of the escape room puzzle that uses a computer, and sadly, we couldn't get it to run on an early '80s IBM PC, so we had to go modern for that," said Severna Park librarian Colin Chappell. "Everything else is, we hope, truer to the feel of the show. Many of the design elements are things staff had lying around at home or in their own basements."

The Upside Down — an alternate dimension existing parallel to the human world on "Stranger Things" — also features prominently in the escape room experience. But even if you have no idea what the Upside Down is, don't worry.

"Being familiar with escape rooms and how they work is probably more helpful than being a fan of the show," Chappell explained. "Regardless, we promise we'll let everyone go home in the end, even if they don't crack the case."

This is not the first escape room event at the library. In years past, staff hosted rooms themed around mad scientists, time travel to the 1980s, the book "The Wild Robot" — and that is just the Severna Park branch.

"In fact, we even held a successful 'Stranger Things' escape room program at the Severna Park Library back in early May," said Severna Park Library branch manager Samantha Zline. "Other branches have hosted 'Harry Potter' and 'Star Trek' themed rooms. They have all been very popular, and I think that is since escape rooms can be very expensive, and the library removes that cost barrier to allow friends and families to just come and enjoy the challenge of solving the puzzles together."

The escape room programs are different from other programs the library offers. While staff members normally seek to bring in as many people as they can, the escape room programs offer library customers a truly intimate and personal experi-



ence. When groups register for the program, they have the whole experience to themselves for 45 minutes.

"This allows customers who may feel uncomfortable attending bigger in-person events to come in and have some fun in the library with only their friends or household," Chappell said.

Escape rooms aren't the only events the Severna Park Library holds. A surprise hit has been the "Dungeons & Dragons" game nights, which launched over the summer and will continue into the fall. Numerous "Stranger Things" fans joined since the game is featured so heavily in the show. The next program is Tuesday,

September 20.

Chappell hosts the Classics Old & New Book Group at Park Tavern across the street from the library. The next book is Louise Erdrich's "The Round House," and the meeting will be held on Thursday, September 22.

The library also offers beginner line dancing, hosted by Jessie's Soul Line Dancers, as well as the popular Great Movies programs, which have in-person and virtual meetings.

Author Michael Hilliard Returns To Action With "No Safe Place"

ore than 4 million books are published, either traditionally or self-published, in the United States every year according to Toner Buzz. With that many written annually, it's hard to stand out.

Severna Park financial advisor and author Michael Hilliard hopes to do that with his action thriller "No Safe Place" after a nearly nine-year hiatus. Published in June, Hilliard's latest work is his first novel since "The Island Hopper" in 2013.

At 404 pages, "No Safe Place" tells the story of National Security Agency (NSA) analyst Pip Palmer. Despite his troubled upbringing, Palmer is the brightest computer hacker at the agency. Although the thrilling tale begins as a serial killer mystery, the novel transitions

into a cat-and-mouse chase after four former presidents are assassinated.

The book's Amazon description promises a gripping read, saying, "When the former presidents are assassinated and Pip intercepts crucial information, the very people he should trust may be the ones behind it all. He's forced on the run with an unlikely partner, and together they try to save each other and unravel the truth."

Hilliard has always been interested in the presidency. "I've always wondered what it's like for them personally when a president steps down," Hilliard explained. "As soon as they leave office, they are at a place in life

completely 180 then where they were just 24 hours before."

Hilliard also wondered what would happen if all the ex-presidents were suddenly killed and how the nation would react. Without revealing any spoilers, Hilliard said the title "No Safe Place" is spoken in the novel, a writing style of which Hilliard is a big fan.

"No Safe Place" is the third novel in an unofficial loose trilogy, beginning with Hilliard's first novel, "The Last Patriot" in 2005, and "The Island Hopper" in 2013.

Although Hilliard said family obligations and his primary career as a financial advisor were the main reasons it took nearly nine years for the novel to be finished, he also spent the time researching government agencies to make sure they would be depicted accurately.

Despite the presidential and government agency prominence in the novel, "No Safe Place" does not have a political message.

"The main takeaway I intend readers to get from the novel is entertainment," Hilliard

said. "There is no underlying message. If you want a nice action novel with a love story, 'No Safe Place' is for you."

Annapolis is also notably highlighted in the novel; the towers at Greenbury Point are instrumental in the plot, according to Hilliard. Readers should also look for the Severna Park references sprinkled throughout the action thriller.

Hilliard will sign books on Saturday, October 1, from 9:00am-11:00am as well as Saturday, October 15, from 9:00am-11:00am at The Big Bean in Severna Park. Annapolis Yacht Club members and their guests can attend another signing on Thursday, October 13, at 6:00pm at the club.

TOTs Podcast Enters Fifth Season This Fall

That do "Tiger King" star Carole Baskin, NASA astronaut Nicole Mann and suicide prevention advocate Kevin Hines all have in common? They've been interviewed by TOTs Podcast founder and host Ben Gardner.

Entering its fifth season this fall, TOTs is a podcast about interesting people, from all walks of life, having honest conversations about their personal journeys. According to its website, "TOTs stands for Thoughts On Things, because on this show, people talk about their thoughts ... on things!"

Gardner has lived in Severna Park his whole life other than when he went to college at Catholic University of America in Washington, D.C. He began TOTs in November 2019 while he was still in college and grew the show from there. Currently, Gardner has a small but dedicated team, including editor Ryan DeMarco and technical producer Chris Hopper.

Season 5, consisting of 12 episodes, will kick off on September 21. A new episode will be released on the third Wednesday of each month. From its humble beginnings in a Washington, D.C. apartment closet, TOTs has moved to a new recording studio in Dundalk, Maryland, so Gardner can release high-quality audio and video episodes.

When asked what his most popular shows have been, Gardner said, "If I had to guess, I would say as far as total views/listens between YouTube and audio versions, it would be Carole Baskin, Nicole Mann and Kurt Lewis, a former Secret Service agent. Thousands of people have watched or listened to those episodes over the course of a year."

It's no surprise that Baskin — CEO of Big Cat Rescue and firm believer that big cats don't belong in cages — would be a popular inter-

view after the March 2020 obsession with the seven-part Netflix documentary series "Tiger King: Murder, Mayhem and Madness." On the show, a feud between Joe Exotic and Baskin ensued. Exotic accused Baskin of killing her then-husband Don Lewis and feeding him to their tigers.

Baskin doesn't do many interviews, so it took a few months of talking for Gardner to get her to agree to a conversation.

"I think people should go listen to that episode because it will give them a different perspective on who she is as a person, not just as a celebrity," Gardner said.

Gardner also shared how Mann was a dream guest, who shared what it's like being an astronaut both from a technical perspective and from a human aspect.

"Nicole is one of my favorite people I've had on the show and is incredibly down to earth (pun intended) despite being so intelligent and successful," Gardner said. "I think that says a lot about her."

When asked about the style of the show, Gardner explained how he tries to structure the show simply around having a conversation.

"We don't edit anything out, and at the end of the day, most of what we do is add the intro and outro music and let the audience decide what they want to hear more of," he said.

Now that TOTs has hit a major milestone with the new studio, Gardner is looking to the future.

"Eventually I want this show to become larger and larger because I really do think there's value for people listening to intimate conversations with interesting people," Gardner said.





ping up the buttery garlic sauce, further flavored by the "taste of the sea" from the mussels, with a crusty grilled baguette.

My fried green tomatoes looked like a food sculpture. Two tomatoes atop a plate of greens were topped with sauteed jumbo shrimp, and the dish was drizzled from top to bottom with an excellent remoulade sauce.

I was looking forward to this dish after admiring it on Facebook. After popping the sauteed shrimp in my mouth, I sliced into the tomatoes. I've never been able to fry a green tomato that's crisp on the outside. The chef here gets it right. The tomatoes were bright green and tender and had the perfect tangy — almost sweet — taste you want in this dish. Combining the tomatoes with the greens provided a satisfying, savory taste, and the sauce was a combination of spicy and slightly sweet. I discerned a hint of the mustard and a little Old Bay. Overall, it was balanced well with just the right kick.

I picked the shrimp tacos for entrees, and my friend got one of the night's specials — seafood copping.

Our first impression of the tacos was how colorful they were — topped with purple cabbage, red radishes, and cilantro. They came with cilantro lime aioli and a vinaigrette.

Though the taco fillings were flavorful—the combined crunchiness of the cabbage and radishes, the perfectly prepared shrimp, and the spicy sauces—the shells were the best. They're homemade (everything at The Social is), and the corn flavor was surprisingly pronounced.

The highlight for both of us was the

seafood cioppino. "Wow!" my companion exclaimed. "Every bite is bursting with flavor!" And it was. This rich aromatic soup/chowder was chock full of healthy goodies: shrimp, mussels, monkfish, carrots, celery, onions and tomatoes. After a few bits, I commandeered a portion and savored every bite. Add a piece of that baguette, and you'd have a cold-weather meal that will warm your cockles, though we loved it in August! I don't know the secret of this dish, but in my mind, I imagine the chef simmering the seafood for hours before adding the vegetables to give this soup its bold taste.

The finale was a piece of key lime pie. What it lacked in size, it made up for in taste. This delightfully zesty treat was covered in fresh whipped cream and had a dollop of soft, slightly toasted marshmallow cream on the side. It was a luscious finish to a fabulous meal.

The bill was about \$80 for two appetizers, two entrees and dessert, without the drinks — pretty reasonable.

We will return to The Social frequently. We want to try many foods, and we like the atmosphere. I hope to see you there!

John McAfee Documentary Fails To Tell The Full Story

unning with the Devil:
The Wild World of John
McAfee" was clearly
Netflix's attempt to recreate the
success of "Tiger King." On the surface, there are parallels: a somewhat
crazed, charismatic man at the head
of an enterprise; an intricate web of
related figures who are all entirely
unsympathetic; and elements of
cult-like manipulation, fraud, and
just whacky, off-the-wall behavior
from everyone involved.

But John McAfee is no Joe Exotic — he's not nearly as interesting or complex. "Running with the Devil" is a montage of the ramblings of various insufferable narcissists. It is painful to sit through, and nothing like the wildly entertaining trainwreck that is "Tiger King."

The documentary does little to provide background on McAfee. It almost seems to add context as an afterthought here and there throughout. We are told about McAfee's success with the antivirus company, but we don't learn much about his multiple battles with drug addiction, or how McAfee was actually a mediocre programmer who made serious blunders down the line — blunders that caused him to be pushed out of his own company. We aren't told about his "sky gypsies," or his weird fake flight school, or the person who died as a result of that school's errors. We're told little about his experimentation with spiritualism, or about the woman whose pharmaceutical lab he promised to fund.

Instead, we are given a view of McAfee that is far too zoomed in, showing his day-to-day antics while he was "on the run" (from enemies both real, and mostly, imagined), and given an exhausting account of the rambling, irrelevant thoughts of the "journalists" (I would use that term loosely) who covered McAfee while he was running around like a madman.

Some of this sort of footage is quite helpful in understanding the psychosis of a narcissist or cult leader — I think back to HBO's "The Vow" which had similar footage of Keith Raniere, the recently jailed leader of the NXIVM cult. However, you have to balance this footage with background, context, and a more intimate look at the feelings of the victimized — even "The Tinder Swindler" documentary did a better job of this. The



filmmakers of "Running with the Devil" almost seem to assume we already know a lot about McAfee — playing into his narcissistic belief that he is so important that everyone already knows his story. Most people don't.

This documentary is almost irresponsible, in fact, in how it refuses to counter McAfee's narrative and view of himself. It doesn't tell you that McAfee isn't the giant computer mogul he appears to be — sure, he founded the antivirus company and earned a lot of money as a result. But we aren't told that his success was largely due to luck of being in the right place at the right time, that he lost the majority of his antivirus fortune by the time the documentary was being filmed, and that his prediction about the Michelangelo virus destroying the world's computers was nonsense and did not come true.

A good documentary about this type of man takes that man down — shows him to be self-aggrandizing, manipulative, and that his extraordinary claims have no basis in fact. This film does nothing to concretely fact-check McAfee's numerous claims and seems to leave it to the viewer to decide whether there was any truth to them — when it's so obvious to anyone who does any research that McAfee was full of it.

Good documentaries of this sort also show that those manipulated aren't hapless suckers and that anyone can fall victim to a cult or a manipulator in the right circumstances. "The Vow," Leah Remini's "Scientology and the Aftermath," and "Going Clear" all do this well. While "Running with the Devil" doesn't fact-check anything McAfee says, it also doesn't do a good job of explaining why on earth anyone would want to follow John or buy

into any of his nonsense. The Vice "reporters," whom he manipulates, and the ghost-writer of his biography come off as complete idiots, leaving the audience to assume they must just be stupid, full of themselves, or both. The women whom McAfee manipulated - particularly Janice — do not seem particularly sympathetic either, even though McAfee clearly took advantage of

them. This does a disservice to

former victims of cults, manipula-

tors, or conmen, many of whom are

intelligent people who were simply

taken advantage of by someone cunning in a moment of weakness or vulnerability.

Somehow, "Running with the Devil" fails to convince us of anything — to convince us that McAfee is an interesting subject worth nearly two hours of runtime, to convince us that McAfee's claims about his importance were untrue, to convince us McAfee's suicide was staged, or to convince us that McAfee had victims rather than suckers. It barely even clears anything up about the supposedly central premise of McAfee's flight from authorities — the alleged murder of his neighbor. If you want a much more interesting, funny and comprehensive account of McAfee story, I recommend Robert Evans' podcast — the episode is called "John McAfee is Not Funny Anymore.'



Change The Way You Think About Maryland

66 Thate Mary-┗ land́." This is a statement I hear frequently from my clients. As some of you already know, I'm from the great state of South Dakota, so the more

I hear remarks like this, the more I need to investigate. I have heard this statement from people with all kinds of different backgrounds, political beliefs, social statuses, etc., making this opinion not particular to one group of people, rather a diverse mix. I am going to look at this sentiment from a purely economic standpoint to illustrate how fortunate we all are to live in Maryland.

Most people mention taxes as their primary reason for sharing this opinion. Maryland's state tax of 5.7 percent is nowhere near the highest compared to California at 13.3 percent or Hawaii at 11 percent. Further, Maryland does not tax social security, which many of my clients are surprised to learn.

Maryland taxes pensions while some states like Delaware do not. Luckily, Governor Larry Hogan

recently passed the Retirement Tax Elimination Act that offered tax credits for residents over the age of 65 to offset the state taxes on pensions. I like what the governor did because instead of just giving the tax credit to those with pensions, he gave it to everyone over the age of 65 within certain income levels. Interestingly, Maryland is among the states with the lowest percentage of population 65 or older — only 16.3 percent. This tells us that people are moving out of Maryland upon

Marylanders may also feel like the cost of living is among the highest in the country - in fact, we are seventh highest in the country in terms of cost of living based on first quarter 2022. Mississippi and Oklahoma have the lowest cost of living while Hawaii, New York, and California are the top three most expensive. We make up for that high cost of living by earning higher income. The federal government is the largest employer in Maryland.

We all know someone who works for the federal government. If you do not work directly for the government, chances are you work for a contractor or for a company that does business directly with the federal government or contractor. I





That vision was fulfilled in August as Fivestar launched the app, which is now available on all Android and iOS devices.

"We're leveling the playing field for these athletes, so any athlete, no matter what sport, no matter where you're located, can get viewed," said McNeally, a Severna Park resident and co-founder and CEO of Fivestar. "Then we're putting the power back into the people's hands to let the people decide who the top athletes are per sport."

set up a profile and post their best highlights. Fans can then engage with athletes by rating highlights, reacting with animations, and earning an overall fan rating.

Fivestar has already signed several pro athletes to serve as brand ambassadors, including lacrosse stars Kyle Harrison, Trevor Baptiste and Kylie Ohlmiller; skateboarders Ryan Decenzo and Deon Harris; and women's basketball pro Angel McCoughtry. Fivestar athlete ambassadors will help raise awareness for the app and drive downloads, be active app users, scout and onboard future brand ambassadors, host events and more.

"We looked at how engaged their social following is, but more importantly, making sure these brand ambassadors work with the Fivestar culture: good character, good work ethic, competitive nature, all-in mentality," McNeally said.

Harrison, also a Severna Park resident, said it has been fun to be on the advisory board and watch the app develop over the last few years.

"As an athlete, you have highlights of yourself and I think there's a little apprehension about posting your highlights on Instagram, Twitter, whatever, because you'll get hammered by your friends for posting your own highlights, and two, the comments that come along with that," he said. "With Fivestar, the app was created for you to do that, so there's no ambiguity or weirdness about posting your highlights; that's what you're supposed to do."

Harrison sees the app as a tool that is also valuable for coaches.

"From an evaluation standpoint, if you're a coach, there's so many applications to how it can be used," Harrison said. "If you're running an event and you're selecting a team, you can post all your highlights there. So you know if the coach or staff members who are running said team tell their players, 'Post your highlights here and use this hashtag,' they can easily filter highlights of the players they want to select as opposed to going to You-Tube and watching 10-minute videos with rap music blaring. It's a streamlined process."

Users can download the app and

register for free, but a second phase is under development to offer a subscriber option with premium features.

"We are going to have a gamification aspect to it, so users are going to be able to earn Fivestar coins as they do certain activities in the app and will be able to trade in those coins for tangible and intangible prizes whether it be gear and swag or maybe tickets to a game," McNeally said. "We just want to make it more of a gamification and interactive environment for all users."

Fivestar plans to showcase top five plays of the day and of the week, generated by a proprietary algorithm. Those results will be filtered by sport.

'We'll have live feeds, so some of our brand ambassadors and other users who are verified will be able to come on and maybe do a live feed at 5:00 and Kyle Harrison can walk users through his signature shot and what runs through his head during that signature shot that he has — just engaging with the users a little bit more," McNeally said. "And the leaderboard, of course. Right now, we just have ratings in the app and in Phase II we will be able to have leaderboards where athletes will get ranked one through 100 per sport, per genre. People are deciding who the top athletes are per sport."

Fivestar's target market is athletes ages 13 to 22, focusing on lacrosse, basketball, football, skateboarding, soccer and volleyball content. McNeally said she would like to eventually include lifestyle sports.

"I know some of our users have pivoted to snowboarding and wakeboarding," she said. "It's summertime right now, being in Severna Park on the rivers, and then we have snowboarding and skiing coming up. And then tennis and golf. It's neat to see these athletes transition from that competitive environment to a lifestyle environment, too. Of course, we would like to get involved in Green Hornets and those organizations, structure strategic partnerships and give them a platform to be seen."

From Severna Park to cities across the globe, Fivestar is on a mission to change the way athletes and sports enthusiasts consume sports highlights. Next, the goal is to have international reach.

"Viewing sports highlights in an international language — it doesn't matter what sport you play, what language you speak, you can always view a highlight and rate it one through five stars," McNeally said. "That's why we're so excited about the app."

What Should Alzheimer's Caregivers Know?

a family member who has been diagnosed with Alzheimer's disease, or is starting to show symptoms, you will face some challenges. Navigating the

Alzheimer's experience involves a long journey, and there's no easy answer for how you can cope with your emotions. But you can at least address some of the financial issues involved to help give yourself a greater sense of control.

Here are some moves to consider: Plan for care costs and identify insurance coverage. The list of Alzheimer's-related medical expenses is long and includes ongoing medical treatment, medical equipment, home safety modifications, prescription drugs and personal care supplies. As a caregiver, you'll want to know the extent of your loved one's health insurance: Medicare, supplemental policies, veteran's benefits if applicable, and so on. One big question is how much coverage they might have for adult day care services, in-home care services and full-time residential care services, and other longterm care options. Long-term care is one of the largest health care costs not covered by Medicare, so you'll want to determine if your loved one has a long-term care policy or another insurance policy with a long-term

Identify assets and debts. You'll need to know your family member's financial position, both what they own — bank accounts, investments, property, etc. — and what they owe, such as credit card debt, a mortgage, lines of credit, and so on. This knowledge will be essential if you're granted power of attorney to take over your loved one's finances.

Look for tax breaks available to caregivers. If you're a caregiver, you may have to pay for some care costs out of pocket. Consequently, you could receive some tax credits and deductions. These benefits vary by state, so you'll want to consult with your tax advisor to determine your eligibility.

Ensure necessary legal documents are in place. As a caregiver, you may need to ensure some legal documents are in place, such as a durable power of attorney for finances, which lets you make financial decisions for your loved one with Alzheimer's, and a durable power of

attorney for health care, which lets you make health care and medical decisions on their behalf. It's important to have these and other necessary documents drawn up before someone is diagnosed with Alzheimer's or when they're just starting to exhibit the earliest signs of the disease, so they can understand what documents they are signing.

If you wait until they no longer have this cognitive ability, things will get much more challenging. You could apply to become a conservator, which grants decision-making abilities similar to a power of attorney, but the conservatorship process takes time and could involve court procedures. To avoid this potential difficulty, work with your tax and legal professionals to ensure all the relevant legal documents are in-force and updated.

Finally, you don't have to go it alone. To help deal with the emo-

tional challenges of caregiving, you can find local Alzheimer's support groups that can offer practical suggestions for coping. As for the financial issues, consider working with a financial professional who can look at your family's overall situation and recommend appropriate actions.

A diagnosis of Alzheimer's will change the lives of everyone in your family. But as a caregiver, you can help ease the burden.
