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# R-II 2021-22 safe return to in-person instruction and continuity of services plan

Submitted to the El Dorado Springs R-II School District **Board of Education on** Thursday, July 8

**¬**he global coronavirus pandemic has introduced a new level of risk for in-person instruction and in-person gatherings. Our schools are designed to educate students in-person. Our staff and our parents have indicated that, when possible, in-person school is preferable to distance learning. We also know that student and staff safety are the highest priority for all of our district patrons. This document attempts to prioritize student safety and student learning through a flexible, situational approach to educating students.

For non-English speaking individuals, this plan will be made available in oral form by contacting the El Dorado Springs Superintendent's Office at (417) 876-3112.

The El Dorado Springs R-2 School District will follow the most recent Missouri Department of Health and Senior Services guidelines in the following areas: disinfecting, sanitation and cleaning; physical distancing of persons; personal protective equipment; best practices for individuals in outdoor and enclosed spaces; crowd sizes at events; other recommendations not listed here In the absence of guidance and directives from the Missouri Department of Health and Senior Services, the district may adopt recommendations from the Center for Disease Control, and guidance from local health care professionals and local, state and national government authorities.

As guidelines shift and change with the result of the scientific process and good data, the district is committed to a flexible approach to educating students and keeping all staff and students safe.

The El Dorado Springs R-2 School District's Safe Return to In-Person Instruction and Continuity of Services Plan (SRCSP) will be reviewed and revised, if necessary, every six months. This process may include, but is not limited to, parent and school (staff, students, and administration) surveys, public forums at local board meetings, question and answer forms on R-II's Facebook page, as well as input from the El Dorado Springs R-2 Board of Education.

Representation of the following groups being served by the El Dorado Springs R-2 School District will be identified, as well: civil rights organizations, stakeholders representing the interests of children with disabilities, English learners, children experiencing homelessness, children and youth with disabilities, migratory students, children who are incarcerated and other underserved students

In case of a disruption of a regular school session, R-II will provide district-owned electronic devices for all students. If a student does not have internet access at home, the student should contact the building administrator in his/her building immediately.

Regardless of the instructional medium used in the 2021-22 school year, all work is required of all students and is subject to existing grading practices and policies. Appropriate accommodations will be made as necessary or as mandated by an Individual **Education Plan** 

#### (IEP) FOR

**QUALIFIED STUDENTS** Parents who choose not to send students to in-person school will have access to R-II's online learning platform. These courses, provided by Launch, will require a semester-long commitment and require the student to provide access to a quality internet connection. The District's procedures for accessing online learning are available on the school website (Virtual Course Information) or by calling the Assistant Superintendent.



#### **OVERVIEW OF THREE** PLANNED APPROACHES IN 2021-22

#### NORMAL SCHOOL/ **ACTIVITIES**

Description: Under the green approach, school and its activities occur under a regular schedule. Buses run normally scheduled routes and all students move about in a manner which delivers instruction in as normal a manner as possible.

Description: Under the yellow approach, school and its activities are substantially disrupted. All staff are required to be at work, but all students will not be in school for a normally scheduled school day. In this approach, general societal physical distancing guidelines are likely in place with implications for building operations. Individual student education plans and 504s are still followed. It is important to note

that different approaches for different buildings, classrooms, staff and activities may be necessary.

#### - OFF-SITE SCHOOLING FOR ALL STUDENTS AND **MOST EMPLOYEES**

Description: Under the red approach, on-site school is effectively canceled. Instructional delivery, feedback and assessment all occur online. The district will work to make sure that all students have access to online instruction with limited in-person interaction where appropriate.

All student activities will be effectively canceled. Employees of the district will function remotely when possible, though some may be required to report to school for duties. Some employees may also be reassigned to other areas and duties as needed.

Disruptions in all areas of school operations will likely occur. Student and staff COVID-19

safety precautions  $These \ safety \ precautions \ will$ occur on all color-coded days, indefinitely.

#### COVID-19 **SYMPTOMS**

People with COVID-19 have had a wide range of symptoms reported - ranging from mild symptoms to severe illness. Symptoms may appear 2-14 days after exposure to the virus. People with these symptoms may have COVID-19: Fever of 100.4F or higher or chills; cough; shortness of breath or difficulty breathing; fatigue; muscle or body aches; headache; new loss of taste or smell; sore throat; congestion or runny nose; nausea or vomiting; diarrhea.

Any person who has two or more of the above symptoms should not enter the school building. All persons who are sick must remain fever-free without medication for 24 hours prior to returning to school.

If you develop two or more of these symptoms while at school, please see the school nurse immediately.

Frequent hand-washing is highly recommended for all. Hand sanitizer and tissues will be made readily available to all students and staff. Mask-wearing is permitted by any student or staff member at any time. Increased cleaning measures will be implemented by the custodial staff for all high-touch surfaces within the school.

#### STUDENT HEALTH MANAGEMENT

Mask-wearing is permitted by any student or staff member at any time. The district has suf-

ficient masks to provide to individuals, if needed. Students may

also provide an adequate mask of their own choosing. If students appear to have two or more COVID-19 symptoms, the

student will be sent to the nurse for further examination.

If a student is experiencing two or more of these symptoms, that student should report it to their teacher immediately. The teacher will send the student to the nurse.

If the nurse determines that two or more symptoms are present, the student will be sent home until they are symptom and fever-free for at least 24 hours (without the aid of fever-reducing medicine).

Frequent hand-washing and/ or hand sanitizing are required of all students and staff. Proper hand washing techniques will continue to be taught and reinforced on a daily basis.

Students will be required to stay, in as much as possible, classlevel or grade-level groups.

Reasonable precautions for maintaining appropriate physical distancing guidelines will be expected. The use of barriers, intentional routing of students and minimum distancing requirements will be enforced.

Deliberate violations of healthrelated guidelines or deliberately attempting to breathe on or infect others (even for those with no COVID-19 symptoms) will result in immediate disciplinary consequences.

#### **SCHOOL BUS GUIDANCE** Bus transportation remains

available for eligible students. Due to federal mask mandates, students and staff will be required to wear an appropriate fask mask on all buses. Masks are available to any student or staff, if needed.

Bus riders will sit on the bus in

assigned seats. Students will sit together in family groups. As much as possible, bus seat-

ing will observe recommended physical distancing practices. PARENT GUIDANCE

•If a student is sick or does not feel well, please keep them at home.

•Parents are encouraged to have a plan for childcare in place in case a student is sent home from school due to illness or quarantine in the case of possible exposure to COVID-19.

•Please reinforce with your children the importance of social distancing, handwashing and refraining from touching the mouth and nose area with hands.

•All persons who enter into any building or property owned

by R-II may be subject to basic health screening which may include: Temperature scan, visual examination and temporary isolation from others

**TION PROCEDURES** Situation one: When a staff member is recommended to take a COVID-19 test ...

•The staff member is to inform their immediate supervisor as soon as possible regarding the recommendation from a licensed health care provider. The staff member will not return to school until the result of the test is communicated to the staff member. Onsite testing is available for teachers and staff members.

•Staff members with a negative COVID-19 test may return to work if they are otherwise Symptom-free. This should be communicated to the staff member's immediate supervisor as soon as possible.

•Staff members who test positive for COVID-19 will be placed on an immediate 10-day quarantine. Staff members are to inform their supervisor immediately of any test results.

Staff members may return to work after the 10-day quarantine period when they are medically cleared by a licensed health professional and symptom and fever-free for hours without the aid of medicine.

•The district will take action to protect other employees and students. This may include contact tracing procedures, quarantines of other students or staff (and a subsequent transition to online learning) and other actions as recommended/required by the CCHD or state officials.

Situation two: When a student is recommended to take a CO-VID-19 test ...

•Parents of the student are asked to inform the school as soon as possible regarding the recommendation from a licensed healthcare provider.

•The student should not return to school until the result of the test is communicated to the student's parents.

•Students with a negative COVID-19 test may return to school if they are otherwise symptom-free. This should be communicated to the school as soon as possible.

•Students who test positive for COVID-19 will be placed on an immediate 14-day quarantine. Parents of students are asked to communicate with the school regarding the results of this test. Students may return to school when they are medically cleared by a licensed healthcare professional after the 10-day quarantine period if they are symptom and fever-free for 24 hours without the aid of medicine.

•The district will take action to

protect other employees and students. This may include contact tracing procedures, quarantines of other students or staff (and a subsequent transition to online learning) and other actions as recommended/required by the CCHD or state officials.

Situation 3: When an immediate family member of a teacher/ staff member is recommended to take a COVID-19 test ...

•For the purposes of this situation, an "immediate family member" has the following definition: any person living in the same household or otherwise having daily contact in the household of the staff member.

 The staff member is to inform their immediate supervisor as soon as possible regarding the recommendation from a licensed health care provider. The staff member will not return to school until the result of the test of any immediate family member is communicated to the staff member.

•If the family member of the staff member has a negative COVID-19 test, the staff member may return to work if they are otherwise symptom-free. This should be communicated to the staff member's immediate supervisor as soon as possible.

 Staff with immediate family members or who come into close contact with someone who tests positive for COVID-19 will be placed on an immediate quarantine. Staff members are to inform their supervisor immediately of any test results. Staff members may return to work after the 14-day (or more, as otherwise recommended) quarantine period if they are symptom and feverfree for 24 hours without the aid of medicine.

•The district will take action to protect other employees and students. This may include contact tracing procedures quarantines of other students or staff (and a subsequent transition to online learning) and other actions as recommended/required by the CCHD or state officials.

Situation 4: When an immediate family member of a student is recommended to take a CO-

•For the purposes of this situation, an "immediate family member" has the following definition: any person living in the same household or otherwise having daily contact in the household of the student.

•Parents of the student are asked to inform the school as soon as possible regarding the recommendation from a licensed healthcare provider.

•The student should not return to school until the result of the test is communicated to the student's parent.

•Students with family members with a negative COVID-19 test may return to school if they are otherwise symptom-free. This should be communicated to the school as soon as possible.

•Students with immediate family members or who come into close contact with someone who tests positive for COVID-19 will be placed on an immediate 14-day quarantine (at minimum). Parents of students are asked to communicate with the school regarding the results of this test. Students may return to school after the recommended quarantine period if they are symptom and fever-free for 24 hours without the aid of medicine.

•The district will take action to protect other employees and students. This may include contact tracing procedures, quarantines of other students or staff (and a subsequent transition to online learning) or other actions as recommended/required by the CCHD or state officials.

## Back to school letter for El Dorado Springs Elementary School

#### Pear Parents,

Telcome to the 2021-22 school year. We look forward to a wonderful year of working with your children. School will start on Wednesday, Aug. 25, this year. Here are a few important things to note:

•We are looking forward to having students back at school this year! Just a reminder, start and ending

times will remain the same. Our front door will open at 7:35 a.m. each day. Please make sure students are dropped off between 7:35 a.m. and 7:50 a.m. if they are eating breakfast. The tardy bell will ring at 8:05 a.m. Students arriving after 8:05 a.m. will be counted tardy.

As always, please pull as far forward as possible to allow other children to unload at the same time.

•Car riders should only be dropped off and picked up from the circle drive on the west side of the elementary building. Parents of regular car riders will receive numbers to display in their vehicles

to help speed up the afternoon pick-up process. These numbers will be available for pick-up at Open House on Monday, Aug. 23, or from the elementary office. Please do not park on the circle drive or in the area reserved for faculty parking. Thank you for your patience with us during the afternoon pick-up on the first few days of school as it will run slowly at first. We are making every effort to keep your children safe!

•Dismissal — Car riders will begin being dismissed at 3:05 p.m. Those arriving to pick up children should remain in your vehicles and go around the circle drive. A staff member will radio in for your child to meet

you and load in front of the school. Kindergarten, first and fourth grade bus riders will be dismissed by intercom at 3:07 p.m. Fifth grade students will assist the younger students in finding their buses during the first week of school again this year. Second, third and fifth grade bus riders will be dismissed by intercom at 3:09 p.m. Walk-

ers will be dismissed at 3:11p.m. and exit the building through the front entrance on the west side of the

school. Please do not ask teachers and students to open locked doors at any time throughout the school year as they have been instructed not to do so.

•Please remember Oak and Pine Streets are one-way from Main to Grand during the times of morning drop-off (7:30 a.m.-8:30 a.m.) and afternoon pick-up (2:30 p.m.-3:30 p.m.). Parents of elementary students should exit the way you entered (toward Twyman Street). If you will also drop off or pick up middle and/or high school students you may continue north on Grand to do so.

## **R-II Schools virtual courses policy**

Students residing within the district who are under the age of 21 and in grades kindergarten through twelve may be eligible to enroll in the Missouri Course Access Program - MOCAP - and other virtual courses at the districts expense.

#### **ENROLLMENT PROCESS**

•Prior to enrolling in MOCAP, the student must be enrolled fulltime and have attended public or charter school for at least one semester immediately prior to enrolling in MOCAPm unless the student has a documented medical or physiological condition that prevented attendance, or unless otherwise approved by the Superintendent.

•The enrollment process will be substantially similar to the district's current enrollment process for other than virtual courses.

•The district's designee must approve a student's request to enroll prior to the student enrollment in a MOCAP course or fulltime program.

•Students who transfer into the district while enrolled in a MOCAP course or program will continue to be enrolled in the course or program upon enrollment in the district.

•Transfer students who have previously gained credits through successful passage of approved courses under MOCAP shall be accepted by the district.



#### **APPROVAL**

•The district will approve an enrollment request as long as the student meets the eligibility requirements, enrollment occurs within the standard enrollment period, and enrollment in the requested course or program is in student's best educational interest.

•Parents, counselors and others may be consulted to determine whether MOCAP or other virtual courses serve a student's best educational interest.

•The "best educational interest" determination will be made on a case-by-case basis and will include facts and circumstances regarding an individual student's situation.

•In general, students with disabilities may enroll in MOCAP and other virtual courses using the same process applicable to other students. However, for students with disabilities served under the provisions of Individuals with Disabilities Education or the Rehabilitation Act of 1973. Section 504, student's individual education program or 504 team may beed to consider whether virtual courses or virtual school would serve the student's best educational interest, and if so, whether supports and services or accommodations are necessary in order for the student to participate.

 Enrollment in MOCAP courses or full-time virtual school will not exceed full-time enrollment in the

•Information regarding MOCAP and district-sponsored virtual courses will be included in student/parent handbooks, student registration materials, and on the district's website. Virtual course processes are outlined in the virtual course student/parent handbook.

#### **DENIAL, APPEAL, REMOVAL**

•Refusal to grant approval for a student to enroll in MOCAP courses will be for good cause and a determination that enrollment is not in the student's best educational interest.

•The district shall provide written notice to the family regarding the reasons for the denial and the family's right to appeal to the board and the Department of Elementary and Secondary Education — DESE. The written notice to the family will detail the appeal process.

•If a student is approved to enroll in a virtual course or program, the district will monitor a student's progress. If the course is not meeting the educational needs of the student enrolled in the course, the district may remove the student from the course. Recommendations from the course provider and/or DESE regarding the student's continued enrollment in the program will be considered before a student is removed.

How to navigate family feelings about returning to school

Whether it is your child's first day of kindergarten or the start of middle school, backto-school season can bring a range of feelings — from worry to excitement — for the entire family. This year may be more emotional as many families spent the better part of the past two school years at home due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

"It's important to remember that even in the best of times, it's normal for children to express feelings of sadness, isolation or stress," Tyreca Elliott, from KinderCare Learning Centers' inclusion services team, said. "Learning how to address those feelings helps us build self-confidence, resilience and independence. What's important is the way adults respond to children's stress. Offering comfort, reassurance and assisting with problem

solving will help children learn and grow from stress in a positive wav."

As an added bonus, Elliott said many of the most effective ways to help children learn to navigate their feelings work just as well with adults. Consider these three tips to help your children — and yourself — manage emotions during the transition back to school.

#### **PLAN AHEAD**

The fear of the unknown can be stressful. Children who are not able to clearly articulate their feelings likely will not be able to make the connection between new, uncertain situations — like going to school and being around other people — and their feelings. Instead they may become overwhelmed by emotions, which might look like more meltdowns, clinginess or a variety of other behaviors. Talk with your children about how they feel about going back to school ahead of the first day

of class. Ask questions to help them determine why they feel particular feelings when they think about school then work together to solve potential issues. That could mean finding a way to meet your children's teachers ahead of time, whether virtually or in-person, or practicing introducing themselves to

classmates. **BUILD A CONSISTENT ROUTINE** 

Routines can give children — and adults — a sense of security and structure, which in turn make it easier to cope with big emotions like stress and anxiety. Try to stay

consistent, and if you need to make adjustments, talk them through with your children. Be sure to mention key milestones instead of times, particularly if they cannot tell time yet. Make sure your children have

opportunities to ask questions about any changes to routines. They may need reassurance before they're ready to face something new. **CREATE SPECIAL** 

#### **FAMILY MOMENTS**

As important

as routine is, it is just as important to prioritize quality time together. That could mean a vacation or something as simple as Saturday bike rides or Sunday morning pancakes. Plan a family outing or special time together to celebrate completing the first week of school. Family rituals and celebrations can give children and adults something to look forward to. Quality time together also helps families


