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“Your flight is departing from Lake Stockton Airport” City accepts local couple's offer to purchase airport and keep it public

Stockton Municipal Airport, open to the public, has been sold to Ophelia Air LLC owned by Michael and Dianna Saathoffs of Stockton. The city has discussed the possibility of selling the 53.88-acre airport to a private company or individual for a while. The airport lies three miles outside of city limits and is in need of an entire redo including re-asphalting the 3060 foot-runway. Most notably at a recent board meeting Mayor Brandon Cahill said the airport has lost \$176,000 since 2014.

The Saathoffs recently offered \$180,000 with an agreement to keep the runway open to the city and county in perpetuity. Why purchase a business with a continuous loss? The Saathoffs have the answer-and the dream. First, they own 36 acres adjacent to the airport. More importantly, the family has a desire to keep the airport operational for the community and for them. Michael, Dianna, and their oldest son, Hayden, are pilots and Hayden is graduating as an airport me-

chanic. Their son, Bryson is getting his pilot's license and starting college in engineering this year.

“It's in our wheelhouse,” Dianna said. “We just took a shot in the dark. It was like ‘how can we save this for our community and we benefit from it.... We didn't want to see it disappear. The city didn't approach us; we made the offer.”

When asked about putting the property out for bid, Mayor Brandon Cahill said, “Stockton City Code requires us to bid out property, wherever possible. In this instance, due to the city's desire to keep this property as a public airport, the level of expertise in aviation and familiarity with the Stockton Municipal Airport required to do so, our want for a reversion clause back to the city, and the assumption of lifetime leases, competitive bidding was not possible when this proposal was received. We believed it was in the best interest of the city to stop the bleeding of money right away and limit our liability as soon as possible and did not want to miss out on the economic development

opportunity for the city. The city and Saathoffs believe keeping the airport open by being privately owned with the runaway open to the public is a win-win for the area, especially with the Saathoffs' long range plans.

Being owned by an LLC means local contractors can be used, local events can be sponsored, and the public still has access to the area. A local contractor is now working to improve the pilot's lounge.

The Saathoffs admit the remodeling will take time, especially to fulfill a long-term dream of the family. They hope eventually to have an “airpark” on their adjacent property where the aviators can even build an apartment/ hangar or even a house “with a big back door,” Michael said. Those plans are not in the near future, the couple said. Right now, they plan to upgrade the buildings and asphalt the runway.

“There are about 10 years of deferred maintenance,” Michael said. But the Saathoffs said they do hope to offer some events and amenities soon.

Every two years each County Clerk in Missouri conducts a canvas of registered voters in the county. This allows us to keep our records current, verifying you do still live in the location you have indicated previously, and allows you to receive up to date polling location and redistricting changes by reviewing the information on your card. Polling locations, equipment, and many other variables are reviewed in order to determine whether to maintain certain facilities due to availability, redistricting, compliance, security, cost, and poll worker availability. It is with all of these things in mind that the decisions have been made to consolidate three polling locations. These are Cedar Springs, Madison BC, and Washington. The new voter registration cards that you've received this spring will note these new changes. These decisions are never taken lightly. I apologize for any inconvenience this causes but want to make everyone aware to check their new cards before driving to their polling location to ensure they make appropriate travel plans.

Ozark Music Festival-yes, I was there and would like to offer hope to parents of kids who do crazy things

“It was blazing hot and super cool.” That’s my recollection of the Ozark Music Festival in Sedalia 50 years ago last week. My mother, however, was not impressed that I made national news. In fact, “mortified” is probably not even close to describing her feelings. But, parents, there is hope.

A KY3 reporter ran a story last week about the Ozark Music Festival, which was held on the fairgrounds in Sedalia 50 years ago. One header taken from the event: “The scene on the grounds at Sedalia made the degradation of Sodom and Gomorrah appear to be rather mild.” Interesting observation. Since I am still alive, I want to present a different, not “opposite,” viewpoint and give hope to parents whose children embarrass them beyond measure.

(One commenter asked something like: What’s news in this? Everybody who at-

tended is probably dead now. For factual reporting, I am up to my nose in dirt, but still breathing.)

At the time, the Festival made national news for a few days, but most people today don’t realize it even happened. A documentary about it was shown in theaters in Independence last weekend, but, generally, after the estimated 250,000 to 300,000 people dispersed, it dropped into oblivion except in the memories of those who were smashed together in the 1974 hippy groove-in held in the hills of the Ozarks. We never knew it would turn out so big. Nei-

ther did the event planners. Some big bands heard about how everyone was headed to the hills of Missouri and dropped in unexpectedly-literally because there was no way to drive in. To say there was poor event planning is an understatement.

The KY3 reporter who looked back on the event wrote a fair observation, although most of the people I knew who were there would not have agreed 50 years ago. We were just at a vast, love-the-world, hippy peace-nik event in the 103-degree sun, hoping the “Give Peace a Chance” movement would spread worldwide.

The music festivals then were different than today. Today, a dark, almost evil atmosphere seems to linger over the event. If at least one number isn’t satanic, it’s considered a bust. Fifty years ago the music was peace, love, and pickup trucks.

Why did we go? For the lineup. I can still hear Wolfman Jack telling us of such bands as The Eagles,

Jefferson Starship, Marshall Tucker Band, Bob Seger, REO Speedwagon, Lynyrd Skynyrd, Joe Walsh, Aerosmith, Blue Oyster Cult, Nitty Gritty Dirt Band, and Boz Scaggs, among others, were topping the lineup. It was a once-in-a-lifetime golden gamble for a young college kid like me. While I was reveling in the experience, my

family, although loving, was most likely hoping I would change my name.

The comments given as a result of KY3’s story led me to reminisce and offer hope in this editorial. Some seemed to assume most everyone there turned out as druggies, felons, and dope dealers, when, in actuality, I believe most of us turned out as usual,

boring, respectable blue or white-collar workers and parents with an unforgettable memory.

It shouldn’t have happened; I shouldn’t have been there. But thanks for the memory.

Parrish Farms: Honoring a Family Legacy Through Preservation and Determination

The father and son duo of Jeff and Cameron Parrish are the heartbeat of Parrish Farms, located near Montevallo, Missouri, in #Agri-Ready Vernon County. The Parrish men have faced more than their share of adversity in the last two decades but have not let it slow them down.

Hose Parrish, Jeff's great-grandfather, founded Parrish Farms over 100 years ago near rural Montevallo, Missouri. Today, Parrish Farms is comprised of row crops, forage, and commercial cattle production. This multi-generational operation has continued to grow, even after over a century of farming. Like the generations before him, Jeff has done his part to lay a foundation that Cameron can build his future upon. Cameron wants to follow his father's example and keep building the operation for the next generation to prosper.

Vernon County, home to the Parrish family, is one of 70 counties granted Agri-Ready Designation by Missouri Farmers Care, a coalition of Missouri's agricultural groups. Through Agri-Ready Designation, the Missouri agriculture industry partners with county leaders to create new opportunities, enhance agricultural literacy and promote the county as a wonderful

place to live, work and do business. According to a 2021 study by the Missouri Department of Agriculture, Vernon County agriculture, food, feed, and forestry generates \$909 million in economic output each year. Positioned in west central Missouri, Vernon County agriculture has economic advantages in processing crops, manufacturing animal and pet food, cattle production, and agricultural support businesses.

While farmers worry about drought or the markets crashing, these challenges pale compared to the tough times that Jeff and Cameron have faced. It started on March 12, 2006, when a tornado swept a substantial portion of their farm infrastructure away. The tornado left only a few buildings, while their home and numerous other structures needed to be rebuilt. Through the decade following the storm, they rebuilt from that devastating day, while keeping the family operation running.

However, during rebuilding, more devastation visited the family. Over the course of five years, they experienced the devastating loss of four family members. Jeff lost his parents, Cap and Anna, his cousin Kevin, as well as his wife and Cameron's mother, Kim. These losses took the Parrish men to rock

bottom. They chose to move forward and persevere.

As they say, "Strong men rise from the ashes of difficult times." Jeff and Cameron made the best of the tough circumstances they were dealt. It took both men to keep their chins up and heads down to work, to thrive out of such challenging times. Cameron, who was in middle school at the time, had to step up to the plate and be Jeff's right-hand man. He learned to do a multitude of farm tasks at an early age to help his father with anything and everything.

Today, Cameron is making a name for himself in the show cattle world and sees the integration of registered show stock in the farm's future. Since his start, he has amassed

many accomplishments in the show ring. Cameron's most notable accomplishments are 2023 Cattleman's Congress Supreme Black Hereford Female and 2022 Missouri State Fair Purebred Grand Champion Female with DCD BCC MARK ME HIGH J260 ET owned by Rancho Moreno. He also had the 2023 Red Angus Junior Nationals 3rd Overall Percentage Female and Grand Champion Percentage Red Angus Female with ALT 1116K. He hopes to continue the successes in the ring and utilize the connections that he has made there to produce quality cattle and grow the operation to a household name in the industry.

Cameron is excited for the future and stepping up to lead the farm. He wants to honor his family legacy

and grow the century-long farming tradition that the family has built. He has big ideas for the future of Parrish Farms.

Jeff is an active member of the Missouri Young Farmers and Ranchers organization and has not missed the group's summer tour since 2001. Cameron and Jeff are members of the Missouri Cattleman's Association, a partner of Missouri Farmers Care. Cameron served multiple years on the Missouri Cattleman's Association junior board, volunteering at numerous MCA events. Cameron and Jeff were both active 4-H and FFA members and both men speak highly of their time in these organizations and how much they helped shape their youth, helping them become the producers they are today.

Unique facts about the Olympics

The 2024 Summer Olympic Games in Paris will attract spectators from all corners of the globe. Whether fans are in the City of Light for the competitions or watching at home, there will be plenty of awe-inspiring athleticism on display in Paris this summer.

Organizers of the 2024 Summer Games are promising a bold opening ceremony on July 26, and between now and then fans who can't wait for the Games to commence can consider these unique facts about this time-honored and beloved tradition.

It's an understatement to say the Olympic games have a lengthy history. Historians believe the first Olympic Games were held in Olympia, Greece, in the eighth century B.C. However, those ancient competitions likely shared little in common with the modern Games, which Olympics.com traces to Athens, Greece, in 1896.

The competitions that began in the eighth century B.C. were banned in the fourth century A.D. So when American James Connolly won the triple jump competition in 1896, he became the first Olympic champion in more than 1,500 years.

In hindsight, it's perhaps fitting that an American athlete became the first modern Olympic champion, as the most decorated athlete in the history of the modern games is an American as well. Swimmer Michael Phelps holds the distinction of winning the most medals of any Olympic athlete, and he even won the first medal of his storied Olympic career in Athens in 2004. Phelps

competed in the Olympics in 2004, 2008, 2012, and 2016, winning 28 medals, including 23 golds, across those competitions. Gymnast Larisa Latynina, who competed for the Soviet Union, is second on the all-time medals list with 18.

Though millions look forward to the Olympics every four years, there have been times since 1896 when the Games were scheduled to take place but did not. The 1916 Olympic Games were not played due to World War I, and the 1940 and 1944 Games did not occur because of World War II. The 2020 Games in Tokyo were delayed a year because of the COVID-19 pandemic.

According to a database created by members of the International Society of Olympic Historians, the United States has won

country has total medals, as Germany, the country with the second most medals, has won 1,211 overall.

The Guinness Book of World Records cites the Beijing Olympic Games in 2008 as the most watched competition in the history of the Games. Perhaps in part due to Phelps' historic effort during the Beijing Games, at which he won a record-setting eight gold medals, 4.7 billion people tuned in to watch the Games in 2008.

Community Blood Center of the Ozarks is in emergency need of blood

Joplin, Missouri – Community Blood Center of the Ozarks (CBCO), the sole supplier of blood, platelets, and plasma to patients at 45 area healthcare facilities, is in emergency need of all blood types. Blood inventory levels are at a historic low, with less than a one-day supply available. Eligible donors are asked to give immediately at a Community Blood Center of the Ozarks blood drive or donor center.

CBCO partner hospitals are also asking those in the community to make the time to give blood. "When emergencies happen, the need for blood is critically important for us," said Dr. Jesse Hatfield, Mercy Joplin Chief Medical Officer. "Community Blood Center of the Ozarks is facing emergency blood needs due to severe local blood shortages. CBCO is Mercy Joplin Hospitals local blood supplies, and our patients receive the blood products they need from blood donors who donate with CBCO. I encourage eligible donors to donate with CBCO this week to help with the emergency need."

"An adequate supply of blood is critical for any hospital throughout the year, but especially in the summer," said Paula Baker, President and Chief Executive Officer of Freeman Health System. "Our patients depend on us for care, and we depend on Community Blood Center of the Ozarks for blood products to help us save lives. We encourage everyone to donate."

"CBCO is currently facing extreme shortages of blood, with reserves at critically low levels. As the sole provider of blood to area hospitals, this shortage has a significant local impact," said CBCO Media Relations Representative, Michelle Teter. "We have

not experienced a blood shortage like this in over two years." Teter continued, "It does matter where you donate and the only way to maintain a healthy blood supply for local patients is to donate with CBCO. If you are eligible, we urge you to donate. If you have never donated before, now is the perfect time to start."

All donors in July will receive a plush, 'Chillin in the Ozarks' beach towel, while supplies last.

Donors can give at one of four CBCO donor centers located in Joplin, Mo, Springfield, Mo., Bentonville, Ark., or Springdale, Ark. There are also opportunities to give at mobile blood drives across the Ozarks.

Donors must be at least 16 years of age, weigh at least 110 pounds, be in good health and may not have given blood in the past 56 days.

SECTION 140.190 MO STATUTES

(Revision, 2003) No sale shall be made to any person who is currently delinquent on any tax payments on any property in Missouri, other than a delinquency on the property being offered for sale, and who does not sign an affidavit stating such at the time of sale. Failure to sign such affidavit as well as signing a false affidavit may invalidate such sale.

No bid shall be received from any person not a resident of the state of Missouri, until such the jurisdiction of the circuit court of the county in which such sale shall be made, and also filing with such collector an appointment of some citizen if said county as agent of said purchaser, and consenting that service of process on such agent shall give court jurisdiction to try and determine any suit growing out of or connected with such sale of taxes.

SECTION 140.405 MO STATUTES

(Revision, 2003) Any person purchasing property at a delinquent tax sale may not acquire the deed to the real estate, as provide in section 140.420, until all of the requirements of section 140.405 are met, concerning title search and notification to persons holding a publicly recorded claim. Failure of the purchaser to comply with this provision shall result in the loss of all interest in the real estate.

Real Estate purchased at third offering tax auction and has a publicly recorded deed of trust, mortgage, lease, lien or claim upon the real estate, the purchaser of said property shall notify anyone with the above claim, pursuant to this section. Once collector has received proper notification from purchaser, anyone with a publicly recorded deed of trust, mortgage, lease, lien, or claim upon the property shall have ninety days to redeem said property or forever barred from redeeming said property.

First Native Americans

I have been writing for the Polk County Historical Society's newsletter, "The Resumé" for a few years now, and it recently occurred to me that, although I have created or copied stories about our county's early settlers, I have never written about the first people here... the Native Americans who lived here long before white settlement began.

When I taught social studies at Bolivar High School in the 1980s-90s, my main 'job' was teaching American History, 'Reconstruction to the Present'. (I never thought of teaching as a job...it was just 'going to school'.) In that textbook there was a chapter called "The Last Frontier", in which Chief Joseph of the Nez Percé, Sitting Bull and the Battle of the Little Bighorn as well as Native dependency on the buffalo were mentioned. My students always watched the movie, "I Will Fight No More Forever", which made quite an impact on many of them.

The point is...there were Native Americans all over North America...not just out west. Most people know very little about them, their homes, their governments, or their way of living. One time, after my husband and I had presented a program on the Native Americans of the Northeastern Seaboard, a college educated woman came to me after the presentation and said, "I had no idea. I thought they (the Natives) were just out there wandering around."

The other widely believed theory was, at the time I was teaching, that all the Native Americans came into North America across the Bering Strait Land Bridge during the ice age, when the water levels were lower than they were later. I never believed that theory, and said so on the first day of class each year, as we were doing a bit of reviewing from what my students had learned the year before. I do not believe it's ever been possible to put people in boxes...they go places...they explore...they have boats and they travel long distances overland. We now know that Vikings once lived on Martha's Vineyard; there is the legend of Modoc, a Welsh prince, who came over here to get away from his father, and that later, some Welshmen came to North America and encountered a group of "Native Americans" who spoke Welsh. In the Archives in Seville, Spain, there is an account written by a Spanish priest during the early days of Spanish occupation, who was walking on the beach in California and described seeing a ship sailing down the coast. The priest's description nearly perfectly fits a Chinese Junk; and I have read reports of there being Chinese ballast stones in Seattle's harbor.

Don't ask me to prove these stories...I'm just passing along some of the stories and accounts that I have picked up along the way. If you want to research those stories more closely you are welcome to do so. I won't be the least bit offended if you don't agree with me. I'm quite accustomed to encountering people who don't agree with me!

We will, in this series of articles, explore some 'general' histories of various tribes. The main focus will be on the Northern Cherokee. Although they are not Federally recognized, their oral history is very interesting, and they have shared their stories with me. We will also explore Missouri's treatment of Native Americans, and many of the laws that were passed in this State following the time of the Trail of Tears.

Pitch Dark

I grew up in the country and, for most of my life while living at home, we didn't have a big yard light, just a front porch light. We parked our vehicles in the detached garage, which meant we walked from the garage to the back door at night with no light. I suppose we used a flashlight on nights when it was pitch dark — I really don't recall. Eventually, Dad had a light installed on a big electric pole so we could see clearly at night. I still live in the country and on nights when the moon is full, I can see good enough to go walkin' after midnight without a flashlight... not that I do, but I could.

The Word of God teaches us extensively in the Old and New Testaments that Jesus is the light. Jesus said, "I am the light of the world. If you follow

Have you ever met a vehicle at dusk with no lights on? I always wonder how long it will take the driver to realize he's actually driving in the dark? It's not a good thing to slowly become acclimated to the dark; and that can easily happen without obeying the light of Jesus in our hearts.

The Key: Believers are to be obedient to live in all the light we're shown.

About writing 3: Saved the best for the last

I've been a paid writer most of my life — 49 of my 76 years.

Of course, as a community journalist I've done much more than write, like photography, composing, interviewing, sitting through hours of public meetings and delivering newspapers.

The heart of it all was writing news, feature and opinion pieces. It began with my stint as a paid editor for my college newspaper, followed by three years as a US Air Force journalist, nearly two years with the Bolivar Herald-Free Press, most of a year as a graduate assistant in

SMSU sports information and 24 years as editor/publisher of the Buffalo Reflex. Most of another year I was managing editor for Springfield Magazine, followed by another 20 years as an editor, regional writer and freelance writer/columnist.

I enjoyed every year of it, and hope to enjoy several more. Some

things, however, were not a lot of fun. Science fiction writer Rod Serling (Twilight Zone) summed it up best in an interview I read years ago. Asked if he loved writing, he responded with a blunt "No."

Writing, he explained is just a lot of hard work. "What I like," he said, "is to have written." That's what we feel when we see our hard-wrought stories on the front page. We are proud to "have written" and be done with.

Much news is not enjoyable to write, but necessary. It can be profoundly satisfying to provide a family with a sensitively written story on the loss of a child, or to dispel scandalous falsehoods with publication of

simple truths.

Much is written about freedom of the press, but far too little about the responsibility of the press. All stories, editorials and commentaries are about people.

As a young journalist I wrote about organizations — the school board, for example — with little thought about the people behind the entity.

I eventually learned better. I learned to remind myself and staff writers what "power of the press" really means. Our words have the power to do a great deal of good or a great deal of harm to our subjects — people. It is imperative we choose our words carefully, ever aware

of the consequences of what we write. Most of the time we get it right, but sometimes we don't. I've never known a journalist who hasn't made a few mistakes.

I am thankful these days that I don't have to write editorials or cover politics. Editorials are important, but inherently risky, politics the same.

I was fortunate in my last decade as a paid staffer to have the freedom to choose many of my story subjects. As a result, I did a lot of farm family stories.

Among my favorites were all of the Century Farm features I wrote. Covering at least a half-dozen Ozarks counties I met some of the best people in the world. I loved them and their inspiring stories — still do. Contrary to

what many city folk may think, keeping a farm in production and in the family for 100 years or more is no small feat. It's almost never a simple transition from one generation to another.

I could ramble on, but best I don't. Let it suffice to state I was blessed to save the best for the last of my working years, but that's not quite right.

These years as a freelance columnist are equally a blessing. I still meet great people, and I don't have to cover school, city or jailhouse news.

I get to write about you.

When the truth hurts
Why we can't shrink away from pain

Here's something that almost never happens: You ask someone, "How are you?" And they respond with this: "I'm in so much pain I don't know what to do."

But sometimes, that's the unspoken answer. Those in pain don't often say it because they know most people wouldn't know what to do with that uncomfortable truth. So, instead, they follow the script and hit a more pleasant ball back over the conversation net. "I'm okay. How are you?"

But they're not okay, and the people who love them and witness their day-to-day pain aren't okay either.

I've been thinking about physical pain for months now. Not because I'm in it. Gratefully, I'm not. But I've seen it up close. I've seen its power. And it feels wrong not to write about something that changes so many lives.

Back in March, my mom (who is 79 and working full-time) suddenly began having back pain — a piercing sensation in the center of her back. At the time, we thought it was a side effect of chemotherapy. When you have cancer, you assume everything is connected to it. But when the pain continued and worsened, Mom's oncologist ordered an x-ray that revealed a

spinal compression fracture.

As an adult daughter and certified nerd, I manage stress by Googling every aspect of whatever keeps me up at night. I even read obscure medical studies written in such confusing academic jargon that I have to stop and look up every third word. Information is my security blanket. More than anything, I need to understand and find an answer.

What I learned is that some people with a spinal compression fracture don't even feel it. But others feel an invisible hand plunging a knife into their back again and again. Movement can trigger misery, even a tiny bump during a slow, careful car ride.

I could almost see my mom's pain move in real time because when it hit her, she flinched so hard it looked like she'd been hit by a stun gun. Pain can make even the most silent and stoic among us cry out or scream. It can turn a typically sunny personality into something unrecognizable. It can most certainly open the

door to depression.

I tried so hard to make her pain stop. Bedrest. Numbing creams. Pain patches. Doctor appointments. Prescriptions. Some of it helped initially, but the pain always found its way back. Then it accelerated into a series of daily back spasms, and I watched Mom get tortured from inside her own body. I could see her agony and the fear that it might not end. She would've crawled out of her own skin if she could. I sat beside her and promised it would end soon, even though I didn't know if it would. I silently pleaded with God and every person in Heaven for help.

During these moments, I realized I could do plenty of things for my mom — make her food, bring her medicine, clean her house, and talk to her doctors. But I couldn't stop the pain. At that all-important task, I failed every single day.

Pain can make you question everything. Am I just unlucky? Cursed? Broken? Is this punishment? Why aren't the prayers working? Why her? Why us? What's the point of this? When will it stop? What will we do if it doesn't? The shame of silent questions feels suffocating.

After weeks of waiting for an appointment, I drove Mom three hours to a specialist who stabilized the fractured vertebra with a procedure using "bone cement." It didn't work instantly, but slowly, that overwhelming tide

of pain began to recede. The relief felt miraculous and our gratitude immense.

But once you know what pain can do, you know. You can't un-know it. And now I think about all the people in pain who are still waiting. Searching. Begging, both silently and otherwise, for help. None of us are immune from this experience.

Sometimes, obituaries include the phrase "thankful that he is no longer in pain." Because grieving family members know that pain can get so big that it pushes everything else away, leaving only pain. They've seen it in ways they'll never forget.

So maybe we should be more willing as a society to talk about pain — not because we want to but because there's so much of it. And the people who somehow bear it need to have the pain acknowledged, not avoided or glossed over. They deserve the comfort of being seen even in their suffering.

For all those who are hurting today in unimaginable ways — and for the people who love them so dearly — may you find an answer, a cure, a treatment, and most importantly, relief. May it come in abundance so very soon. Until then, may you be surrounded by love and the compassionate balm of human connection.

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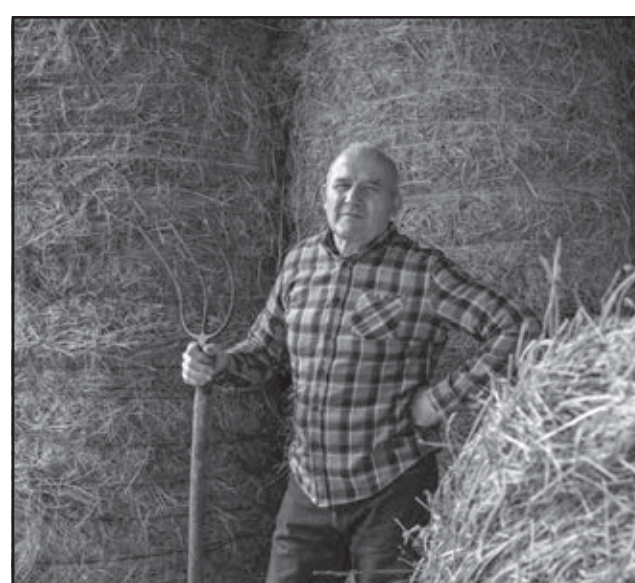

SPRINGFIELD, Mo. – Dogs can be a great tool for conservation-related work. That's why the Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC) launched its canine unit in 2021.

People will have a chance to meet two members of MDC's canine unit at this year's Ozark Empire Fair. Agent Corporal Susan Swem and her canine partner Astro, a yellow Labrador, and Corporal Andrew Feistel and his canine partner Titan, a German shorthaired pointer, will be giving programs at the MDC building on the west side of the Fairgrounds at 6:30 p.m. on these nights of the fair:

- Friday, July 26
 - Monday, July 29
 - Thursday, Aug. 1
 - Saturday, Aug. 3
- The Ozark Empire Fair runs from July 25 through Aug. 3. The MDC building will be open 4 p.m.-9 p.m. on July 25 – the opening night of the fair – and 11 a.m.-9 p.m. daily throughout the remainder of the fair.

unit demonstrations, Swem and Feistel will explain how these dogs and the other members of MDC's canine unit are used by conservation agents across the state. They will also demonstrate Astro's and Titan's scent-detection skills in seek-and-find demonstrations around the MDC building.

Statewide, MDC's canine unit consists of nine pairs of conservation agent handlers and dogs. All handlers and the dogs assigned to them had to complete a nine-week training program. Canines used in any type of law enforcement are required to be trained and certified in their respective fields of expertise so any evidence they discover can stand up in a court case. This training also develops

the skills of the dogs and strengthens the bonds between the conservation agent handlers and the dogs assigned to them.

MDC's canine unit is not breaking new ground – 36 other states already have canine units as part of their fish and wildlife agencies. Studies have shown that one well-trained dog can save enforcement personnel approximately 800 staff-hours per year.

Learning about MDC's canine unit is not the only conservation-related information people can get at the MDC building. The MDC building, located on the west side of the Ozark Empire Fairgrounds, will feature live fish, snakes, and an assortment of free information on Missouri's fish, forest, and wildlife resources.

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Sports that put athletes' eyes at risk

Playing sports can be beneficial to athletes' physical and mental health. Researchers at the American College of Sports Medicine discovered that middle school students who played sports and performed best on tests that gauged strength, endurance and aerobic capacity also performed better academically.

Sports is beneficial in many ways, but playing is not without certain risks, including the potential to cause harm to parts of the body, including the eyes. The American Academy of Ophthalmology says 30,000 sports-related eye injuries are treated in United States emergency rooms each year. However, 90 percent of serious

eye injuries can be prevented by wearing protective eyewear.

Different activities put the eyes at varying levels of risk, so some sports are higher risk than others. Sports that use a bat or racquet, ball, or puck are considered high risk for eye injuries. In addition, contact sports, which include American football, rugby and mixed martial arts, also are considered elevated risk for eye injury. Conversely, gymnastics, cycling and swimming are considered low risk. Here's a closer look at eye injuries, their connection to sports and how to mitigate them.

Basketball

The AAO says basketball causes the most sports eye injuries in the United States, beating out

baseball and softball, pellet guns, racquetball, and even hockey. Using polycarbonate, shatterproof lenses can prevent many eye injuries when playing basketball and other sports. They should be tested to meet the American Society of Testing and Materials (ASTM) standards or pass CSA racquet sports standards.

Blindness

Full-contact martial arts and boxing pose extremely high risk of serious eye injury, including blindness. There currently is no satisfactory eye protection for these sports, though thumbless gloves may reduce the risk in boxing.

Face shield

when playing sports like hockey or football can shield the eyes from injury.

Eye checkup

It's a good idea for athletes to get an eye exam so they can discuss risks and preventative measures with their physicians prior to playing.

Eye safety should be a concern for all athletes. Some simple precautions can dramatically decrease athletes' risk for eye injury.

Proposed Amendments to the Constitution of Missouri

To be submitted to the qualified voters of the State of Missouri at the Special Election to be held on Tuesday, the 6th day of August, 2024.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NO. 1

[Proposed by the 102nd General Assembly (First Regular Session) SJR 26]

OFFICIAL BALLOT TITLE:

Shall the Missouri Constitution be amended to allow places where individuals, corporations, organizations, and associations provide childcare outside of the child's home to be exempt from property tax? This is intended to make childcare more available, which would support the well-being of children, families, the workforce, and society as a whole.

State governmental entities estimate the state's Blind Pension Fund could have annual lost revenue of up to \$400,000. Local governments expect an unknown fiscal impact.

Submitting to the qualified voters of Missouri, an amendment repealing section 6 of article X of the Constitution of Missouri, and adopting one new section in lieu thereof relating to a property tax exemption for certain child care facilities.

Be it resolved by the Senate, the House of Representatives concurring therein:

That at the next general election to be held in the state of Missouri, on Tuesday next following the first Monday in November, 2024, or at a special election to be called by the governor for that purpose, there is hereby submitted to the qualified voters of this state, for adoption or rejection, the following amendment to article X of the Constitution of the state of Missouri:

Section A. Section 6, article X, Constitution of Missouri, is repealed and one new section adopted in lieu thereof, to be known as section 6, to read as follows:

Section 6. 1. All property, real and personal, of the state, counties and other political subdivisions, and nonprofit cemeteries, and all real property used as a homestead as defined by law of any citizen of this state who is a former prisoner of war, as defined by law, and who has a total service-connected disability, shall be exempt from taxation; all personal property held as industrial inventories, including raw materials, work in progress and finished work on hand, by manufacturers and refiners, and all personal property held as goods, wares, merchandise, stock in trade or inventory for resale by distributors, wholesalers, or retail merchants or establishments shall be exempt from taxation; and all property, real and personal, not held for private or corporate profit and used exclusively for religious worship, for schools and colleges, for purposes purely charitable, for agricultural and horticultural societies, or for veterans' organizations may be exempted from taxation by general law. In addition to the above, household goods, furniture, wearing apparel and articles of personal use and adornment owned and used by a person in his home or dwelling place may be exempt from taxation by general law but any such law may provide for approximate restitution to the respective political subdivisions of revenues lost by reason of the exemption. All laws exempting from taxation property other than the property enumerated in this article, shall be void. The provisions of this section exempting certain personal property of manufacturers, refiners, distributors, wholesalers, and retail merchants and establishments from taxation shall become effective, unless otherwise provided by law, in each county on January 1 of the year in which that county completes its first general reassessment as defined by law.

2. All revenues lost because of the exemption of certain personal property of manufacturers, refiners, distributors, wholesalers, and retail merchants and establishments shall be replaced to each taxing authority within a county from a countywide tax hereby imposed on all property in subclass 3 of class 1 in each county. For the year in which the exemption becomes effective, the county clerk shall calculate the total revenue lost by all taxing authorities in the county and extend upon all property in subclass 3 of class 1 within the county, a tax at the rate necessary to produce that amount. The rate of tax levied in each county according to this subsection shall not be increased above the rate first imposed and will stand levied at that rate unless later reduced according to the provisions of subsection 3. The county collector shall disburse the proceeds according to the revenue lost by each taxing authority because of the exemption of such property in that county. Restitution of the revenues lost by any taxing district contained in more than one county shall be from the several counties according to the revenue lost because of the exemption of property in

each county. Each year after the first year the replacement tax is imposed, the amount distributed to each taxing authority in a county shall be increased or decreased by an amount equal to the amount resulting from the change in that district's total assessed value of property in subclass 3 of class 1 at the countywide replacement tax rate. In order to implement the provisions of this subsection, the limits set in section 11(b) of this article may be exceeded, without voter approval, if necessary to allow each county listed in section 11(b) to comply with this subsection.

3. Any increase in the tax rate imposed pursuant to subsection 2 of this section shall be decreased if such decrease is approved by a majority of the voters of the county voting on such decrease. A decrease in the increased tax rate imposed under subsection 2 of this section may be submitted to the voters of a county by the governing body thereof upon its own order, ordinance, or resolution and shall be submitted upon the petition of at least eight percent of the qualified voters who voted in the immediately preceding gubernatorial election.

4. As used in this section, the terms "revenues lost" and "lost revenues" shall mean that revenue which each taxing authority received from the imposition of a tangible personal property tax on all personal property held as industrial inventories, including raw materials, work in progress and finished work on hand, by manufacturers and refiners, and all personal property held as goods, wares, merchandise, stock in trade or inventory for resale by distributors, wholesalers, or retail merchants or establishments in the last full tax year immediately preceding the effective date of the exemption from taxation granted for such property under subsection 1 of this section, and which was no longer received after such exemption became effective.

5. Because the availability of childcare supports the well-being of children, families, the workforce, and society as a whole, all property, real and personal, used primarily for the care of a child outside of his or her home may be exempted from taxation by general law. If a portion of the property of an individual or a for profit or nonprofit corporation, organization, or association is used for such childcare, an assessing authority may be authorized by general law to exempt from the assessment, levy, and collection of taxes such portion of the property of such individual, corporation, organization, or association that is used primarily for such childcare.

Section B. Pursuant to chapter 116, and other applicable constitutional provisions and laws of this state allowing the general assembly to adopt ballot language for the submission of this joint resolution to the voters of this state, the official summary statement of this resolution shall be as follows:

"Shall the Missouri Constitution be amended to allow places where individuals, corporations, organizations, and associations provide childcare outside of the child's home to be exempt from property tax? This is intended to make childcare more available, which would support the well-being of children, families, the workforce, and society as a whole."

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NO. 4

[Proposed by the 101st General Assembly (Second Regular Session) SS 2 SJR 38]

OFFICIAL BALLOT TITLE:

Shall the Missouri Constitution be amended to authorize laws, passed before December 31st, 2026, that increase minimum funding for a police force established by a state board of police commissioners to ensure such police force has additional resources to serve its communities?

This would authorize a law passed in 2022 increasing required funding by the City of Kansas City for police department requests from 20% of general revenue to 25%, an increase of \$38,743,646, though the City previously provided that level of funding voluntarily. No other state or local governmental entities estimate costs or savings.

Submitting to the qualified voters of Missouri, an amendment repealing section 21 of article X of the Constitution of Missouri, and adopting one new section in lieu thereof relating to the funding of law enforcement agencies.

Be it resolved by the Senate, the House of Representatives concurring therein:

That at the next general election to be held in the state of Missouri, on Tuesday next following the first Monday in November, 2022, or at a special election to be called by the governor for that purpose, there is hereby submitted to the qualified voters of this state, for adoption or rejection, the following amendment to article X of the Constitution of the state of Missouri:

Section A. Section 21, article X, Constitution of Missouri, is repealed and one new section adopted in lieu thereof, to be known as section 21, to read as follows:

Section 21. 1. The state is hereby prohibited from reducing the state financed proportion of the costs of any existing activity or service required of counties and other political subdivisions. A new activity or service or an increase in the level of any activity or service beyond that required by existing law shall not be required by the general assembly or any state agency of counties or other political subdivisions, unless a state appropriation is made and disbursed to pay the county or other political subdivision for any increased costs.

2. Notwithstanding the foregoing prohibitions, before December 31, 2026, the general assembly may by law increase minimum funding for a police force established by a state board of police commissioners to ensure such police force has additional resources to serve its communities.

Section B. Pursuant to chapter 116, and other applicable constitutional provisions and laws of this state allowing the general assembly to adopt ballot language for the submission of this joint resolution to the voters of this state, the official summary statement of this resolution shall be as follows:

"Shall the Missouri Constitution be amended to authorize laws, passed before December 31, 2026, that increase minimum funding for a police force established by a state board of police commissioners to ensure such police force has additional resources to serve its communities?"

Twisters

It's usually at the end of the review that I talk about a film's MPAA rating, but I'll twist it up for "Twisters." Or rather, for its 1996 predecessor "Twister" and its all-time terribly-worded rating justification. The film was rated PG-13 for "intense depiction of very bad weather." Yes, the depiction was intense, and yes, the weather was very, very bad, but those twisters were so violent and destructive that "weather" seems like the wrong word to describe them. They may as well have used the term "extreme windiness." The twisters are similarly violent and destructive in "Twisters," which is much more sensibly rated PG-13 for "intense action and peril, some language and injury images."

The new film stars Daisy Edgar-Jones as Kate and Glen Powell as Tyler, two storm chasers with different reasons for traveling Oklahoma looking for tornadoes. She's trying to set up a 3-D mapping system that will help scientists understand how tornadoes form and thus save lives. She used to think she could rig up a chemical reaction that could actually stop a fully-formed tornado, but a field test in the film's open-

ing moments turns deadly, so she has to settle for the mapping system endorsed by her old friend Javi (Anthony Ramos). Tyler wants to shoot fireworks into a tornado to make a cool visual that gets him subscribers on Youtube and increase his celebrity so he can sell tacky merchandise. Kate is glad to have the moral high ground, or so she thinks.

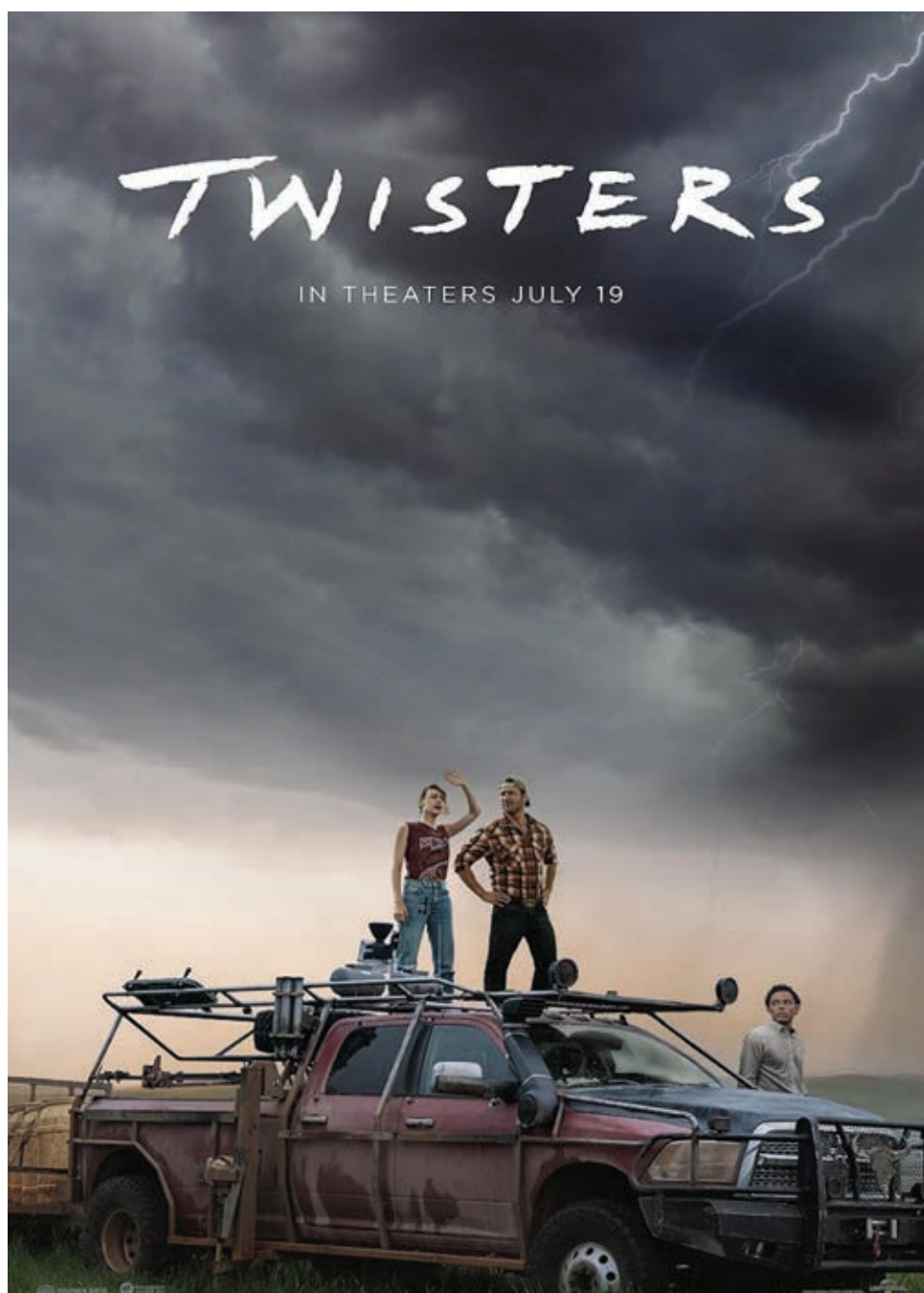
As the film progresses, Tyler shows he has more layers than Kate initially thought. He's a learned meteorologist and a big-hearted humanitarian. It also turns out that Kate may have jumped on the wrong bandwagon. She and Javi are noble, but their team's sponsor isn't. Kate and Tyler find that they like chasing the storms together, helping recovery efforts together, and just plain spending time together. Cute squabbling turns to cute flirting. Please tell me it's not much of a spoiler to find out that there's romantic chemistry between the smoldering cowboy and the beautiful scientist.

Then there are the twister sequences themselves. I used to be terrified of tornadoes, but the fear mostly dropped off when I hit my teens. This movie may rekindle some of that fear, especially after the open-

ing sequence. The rest of the sequences are fine. I was never unconvinced that there was danger afoot. One thing I knew going in was that twisters, while they can form quickly, don't lend themselves to jump scares, so I was wondering what the film would have to do to push my buttons that way. There are two effective jump scares that made me scream for half a second and then laugh for several full ones.

You can probably guess the kind of experience that "Twisters" provides. It's a PG-13 disaster movie. The action scenes, while fraught with mortal danger, aren't going to feature anyone getting ripped limb from limb. The comedic and romantic scenes are perfectly predictable as well, with Edger-Jones and Powell having the pleasing chemistry I knew they'd have. Of the characters that survive among Kate, Tyler, Javi, and Tyler's colorful team, I wouldn't mind seeing these characters in more movies. I'm sure the filmmakers can come up with more creative storm scenarios. For now, this was exactly the movie I expected it to be, but I had a reasonably good time watching very bad weather.
